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THE CHAOS IN RUSSIA

London, December 7th

A message from the Correspondent of the "Daily Express" in Warsaw states that over two hundred persons including women and children, have been shot during the past twenty four hours in Russia. Among these, according to the report, are the assassin of Kirof, his wife, sons, two daughters, and his mother, who was eighty five years of age. Besides these fourteen leaders of the O. G. P. U. of Moscow have been executed for "negligence". The correspondent adds that Stalin has discovered the existence of grave dissension in the O. G. P. U., and has discharged the leader of the organization, Jagoda, and at the same time ordered arrests and executions en masse, enforcing his orders by the use of military troops. It is also declared that when it was discovered that a spirit of great opposition was shown in the O. G. P. U. in Leningrad, Stalin ordered the translation of the members from that city to Moscow, arresting the Commissioner in Leningrad after a violent clash between the two armed forces. The Minister of War, Voroniloff, ordered that troops, armed with machine guns and hand grenades, should surround the building. As a result of the conflict all the Leningrad members of the O. G. P. U. have been placed under arrest, ten of them having been killed in the fighting. Stalin apparently now only has confidence in the army, and Moscow has been converted into a vast military encampment, troops having been brought in from all parts of the nation.

HUNGARIAN - JUGOSLAVIAN CONFLICT

Szeged, Hungary, December 7th

The Yugoslavian troops, after having crossed the Hungarian frontier upon several occasions, retired this morning into their own territory. However, there is great anxiety felt, as it is feared that an incident may occur due to the fact that these troops have only retired a short distance away from the frontier.

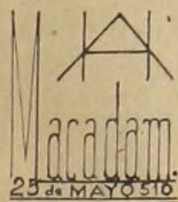
Rome, December 7th

It is officially announced that the Government is seriously preoccupied by the reports which announce that Yugoslavian troops have crossed the Hungarian frontier. It is believed that Yugoslavia is precipitating events in the belief that the League of Nations will absolve Hungary of the accusation made concerning the responsibility of that Government in the assassination of King Alexander. It was added that both the representatives of Italy and France will support the decision of the Council of the League of Nations which it is believed, will not be against Hungary. The expulsion of Hungarian citizens from Yugoslavia has caused great indignation in the Italian press, and the Italian Government is watching anxiously to see the possible results of the conflict. In official circles the hope is expressed that France may be able to influence Yugoslavia to use more moderation.

Belgrade, December 7th

The Minister of Foreign Relations has declared that "no mobilization of troops has been ordered upon the Hungarian frontier". It is added that the rumors that many soldiers have crossed the frontier have been spread by Hungary in order to distract the attention of the world from the protest made by Yugoslavia to the League of Nations in which Hungary is accused of complicity in the assassination of King Alexander. The Council of the League of Nations began its examination of the Yugoslavian accusation at 15.15 this afternoon. In the opening debate, the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Yugoslavia declared before the Council that his Government believes Hungary to be partly responsible for the murder of King Alexander and that "this crime constitutes a serious menace to peace".

THE NAVAL ARMAMENTS QUESTION

Washington, December 7th

In Diplomatic circles it is considered that the speech given by Mr. Norman Davis in London and the declarations made by the Japanese official, Admiral Saito, in Boston, are sureties that there will be no immediate steps taken by the interested nations to carry out an armaments race between the three major naval powers of the world. It is believed in Washington that Japan will denounce the Washington Treaty before the 20th. of December and that, in case no factible solution is reached concerning the naval problem, the American Government will consider that this ends the London negotiations. However, it is declared in an authorized manner that the United States will continue to seek friendly relations with Japan and an agreement upon the questions in dispute.

RUMOURED REVOLUTION IN BOLIVIA

Asunción, December 7th

"La Tribuna" of Asunción publishes new notices received from Yacuiba in which it is insistently declared that according to rumours from the Bolivian forces, there has been a revolutionary outbreak among the troops in the Chaco, although it is still unknown as to what elements have revolted against General Penaranda. It is stated that intense fighting was carried out yesterday between the rebels and the loyal troops. However, no official informations upon the matter has been received by the Minister of Defence or military officials.

THE UNITED STATES AND THE CHACO

Washington, December 7th

Mr. Cordell Hull, Secretary of State, has sent a cable to the League of Nations accepting the invitation made to the American Government to cooperate in the pacific plans to solve the Chaco conflict, and to send representatives to the Conference to be held in Buenos Aires. However, Mr. Hull, in his message, stressed that the United States will not be represented in the Chaco Commission as his Government does not desire to be involved in any complications of the League. He added that the United States will take part in the deliberations to be held in Geneva, but that her representatives will not vote nor compromise their Government without definite instructions. The American note has caused great satisfaction in circles connected with the League of Nations, as it is believed that it will have a valuable moral effect upon both Paraguay and Bolivia and lead to those nations accepting the plan of arbitration.

AN INTERVIEW

The high esteem earned by H. B. M's Plenipotentiary Minister in Montevideo, Mr. Millington Drake has reached truly remarkable proportions in a comparatively short time. His counsel and suggestions in Community affairs have been invaluable and it is with the keenest pleasure that we welcome him back from a well merited holiday in England and the United States.

We much appreciate the honour that Mr. Millington Drake should take the time from his multiple tasks to receive a representative of the Montevideo Times and to recount the following experiences and impressions.

Mr. Millington-Drake began by expressing satisfaction that an English-speaking person of such long experience of this country as our representative, Dr. Latham Clarke, had joined the staff of our paper. From what he heard, Dr. Clarke, could indeed be considered an old-timer here and to have seen the small beginnings of various institutions which had only developed since the War.

In reply to our first question, Mr. Drake stated that he had spent the whole of his official leave in England, except for some five days, as it was his belief that the Diplomat who performs stays away long periods from his own country and is expected to study men and affairs in the country where he is accredited, has the same obligation in regard to his own country — or rather to keep that knowledge and contact up-to-date so that he may claim to represent the country. For instance, Mr. Drake continued, being interested, as you know, in educational questions, I paid a long visit to Glasgow University and to the new Technical High School, which is one of the most modern in Great Britain and has been equipped, I might almost say, regardless of expense. Also I arranged for my visit to Glasgow to coincide with the launching of the "QUEEN MARY", at which memorable event I was present. It is hard to describe the thrill it gave one when the narrow, yet towering, mass of the bows just above the platform began to move and gathered speed as it receded down the slipway amidst the roar and clatter of the so-called anchor chains, and then to see the huge vessel floating on the river, the best part of a quarter of a mile away from one, with that slight up-and-down motion that a boy's model boat freshly plumped on a pond would have.

Before we pass from England, let me say how in London and the other big centres I visited there is every sign of returned prosperity and a spirit of confidence. The depressed areas, of course, still exist, but, as you know, we are tackling this grave problem courageously and effectively, thanks to Sir Hilton Young, whom perhaps few realise lost his arm at Zeebrugge.

I am looking forward to my task, here, which so many friends — Uruguayan, British and American — have made such an agreeable one for me. Particularly am I pleased to hear from several of the high officials whom I have met within the first two days of my arrival, that President Terra is rapidly returning to health with all the appearance of a man who has thrown off a great burden and feels a new lease of life. I hope to have an audience with His Excellency as soon as his health permits, to give him some account of my audience with His Majesty the King on my appointment here.

I have already seen a number of Uruguayan Ministers and high officials. I was once again impressed by the enthusiasm and clarity of vision of Dr. Charlone. I was glad to learn that my old friend, Colonel Baldomir, had become Minister.

nister of Defence, Señor Matos, the police officer whom he designated to visit England, was much impressed by all he saw and himself left the best of impressions. Supplementing Sir John Simon's categorical reply to a question in the House of Commons about this visit, I would say that it was merely, in my opinion, the most appropriate way for a Diplomat to contribute to the Police Fund, which I found in progress when I arrived here.

A most agreeable termination to my leave was the return via Canada and the United States, where I spent ten days — 8 of them in the United States — during which I spent two days in New York, one in Washington, one in Chicago, and nearly three in Los Angeles. I had only visited the United States once before in 1910, while a student at Oxford, when I spent some three weeks in New York, Boston, Harvard, Long Island, Lake-wood, Baltimore and Washing-

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ton. It was most interesting to return to New York and Washington after nearly a quarter of a century. New York and Washington had each grown enormously in the matter of buildings, but the spirit of the "Man in the Street" in New York — that indomitable spirit of enterprise — seemed just the same and indeed I may say that it had spread to Washington!

On my arrival here I was delighted to find in my new American colleague, Mr. Dominian, a man of scholarship and culture, who has studied the racial problems of the American Continent. Myself, having studied the latter so long from the South American angle, I felt that I should see it once more from the North American angle and, indeed, the new view proved most stimulating and interesting.

One of the most encouraging things that I find on my return is the permanent success, as is generally acknowledged, of the Anglo Uruguayan Cultural Institute, and since my arrival the large percentage of pupils who have taken the end of year exams., and done exceedingly well in them confirms this impression on the cultural side. The balance sheet, though far from definitely stable, exceeds the most optimistic hopes of the Committee and meets with the approval of that most critical of actuaries, our Honorary Treasurer, Mr. Steele. I earnestly hope that British and Americans in Montevideo, as well as Uruguayans, will continue to make use of the present premises — which is perhaps the only place in town centrally situated where a good English tea can be obtained quickly and cheaply in congenial surroundings — quite apart from its other amenities!

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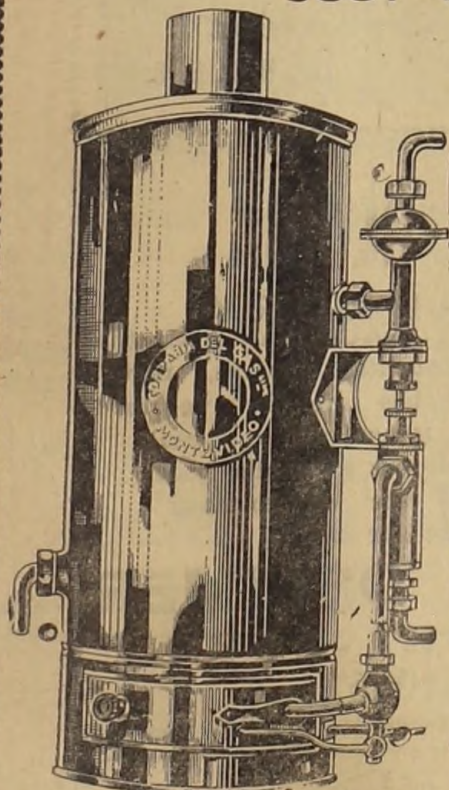

LORD RIDDELL

We deeply regret to report the death of The Rt. Hon Lord Riddell which occurred in London on December 5th. For the past few months he has been suffering from the effects of an operation which he had in 1931, and which has ultimately caused his death.

Lord Riddell was one of the best known of British journalists, and was Fleet Street's greatest benefactor. He was very popular in social circles, and his loss will be greatly felt not only in society, but in British journalism as a whole.

Lord Riddell was, Chairman, News of the World, Ltd., Director of Geo. Newnes, Ltd., and C. Arthur Pearson, Ltd., publisher of The Strand, John O' London's Weekly and many other successful Magazines and popular Weekly Journals. Lord Riddell was Chairman of the Newspaper Proprietors' Association.

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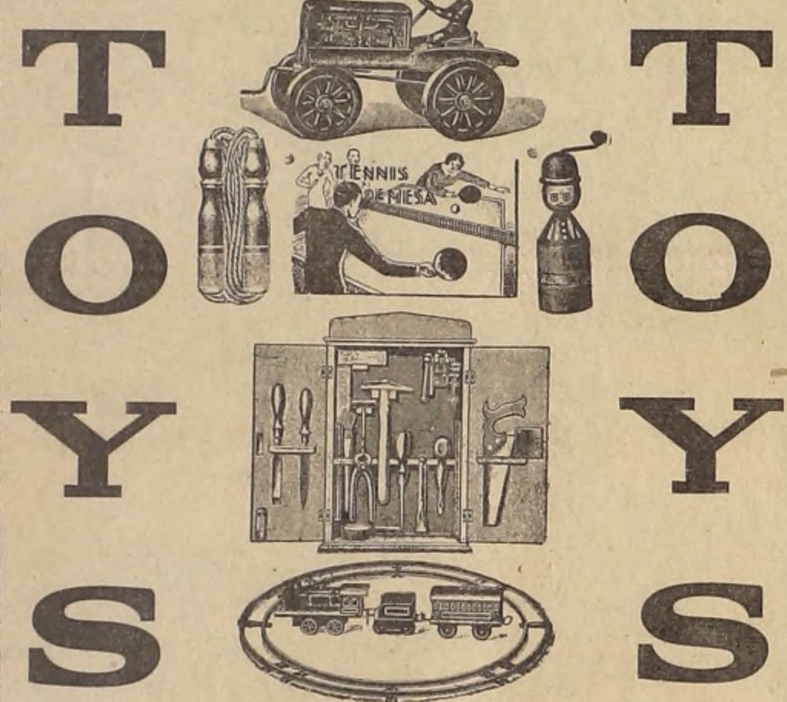
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LADY COTTON PLANTER

I am not native born. Life led me to the cotton country, and I love it. I have made its language and its customs my own, but my Northern birth and training show me lines and angles quite invisible to my Southern friends. My husband's death left me supervising one square mile of farm land, and controlling and counseling more than two score hands. As "de Mistis" I had learned much about these colored workers. Holding the "Boss Man's" job I was to learn more, much more.

I learned it was never possible to push the colored workers. It only brought on sullen resentment. "Ain't no lay-by time on dis place", they grumped. To insist upon such absurdities as currying the mules daily or not permitting "Sa'days", Sundays or holidays to interfere with milk-

ing the cows made one unpopular. That meant getting a bad name in the country — the reputation of being "pahticulah" or "qua'el-some", far more disastrous than being severe along accustomed lines.

As I settled into my duties as head of the place, I found that for each hand, and his family, I must be banker, doctor, jury, judge, court of domestic relations, and court of last appeal. These functions are exercised with semi-patriarchal authority, and warm personal feelings are involved. As "de Mistis" I had to learn the etiquette of ceremonial visits paid by Negroes who considered my husband's family "their white folks". I had found the required blend of cordiality and authority difficult to acquire, but in time I learned the technique of acknowl-

edging the unvarying introduction, "Yo' is my young Mistis now. You is my 'pendence, an' I looks to you". I even accented calmly the inevitable "Lawd!" ain't you pretty! ain't you fat?" In fact I grew to understand the lack felt by a Southern girl who had gone North to live, and who complained to me bitterly that her servants, though excellent, "showed no affection for any member of the family".

My role of Boss Man supplied fewer compliments, but more thrills. "Crazy Jane" brought to me a safe-keeping a conjure bag which she feared "They" might find on her. I own I was glad when she reclaimed it, not because I feared its magic, but because of its suggestive dinginess. Rosalie, sullen and unperturbed, took refuge in a servant's cabin near the Big House while I required Cleve, her husband, to surrender his shotgun to me. Rosalie had failed to have supper on time, and Cleve, somewhat drunk, was protesting. He did not in the least wish to give up that gun, but he obeyed orders, first slipping out the shells, and murmuring thickly, "She's awful easy on the trigger, Ole Miss".

At 11 o'clock one night I had to break up a "quilting party" at which were present when I arrived three women, ten men, and a pervading smell of strong drink. The party was being given, without permission, in a vacant cabin, and it was an education in the art of taking cover to watch that crowd disappear across an open field. One Sunday, Spot and Henderson, two of "the wages", got "mad", and Henderson, report said, was gunning for Spot. The families of both were becoming hysterical; plantation order had to be maintained. Rather wearily I mounted my horse and rounded up the pair. Henderson's gun had been impounded, but I made both of them turn out their pockets to prove they were not toting pistols, and then I spoke firmly: "So you boys want to fight? That's all right with me, but you are not going to do it with guns and murder somebody. You are coming up to the lot (barnyard) and we will square a circle. I'll be there to see fair play, but you will fight this out with your fists or you will shake hands here and now". They shook hands.

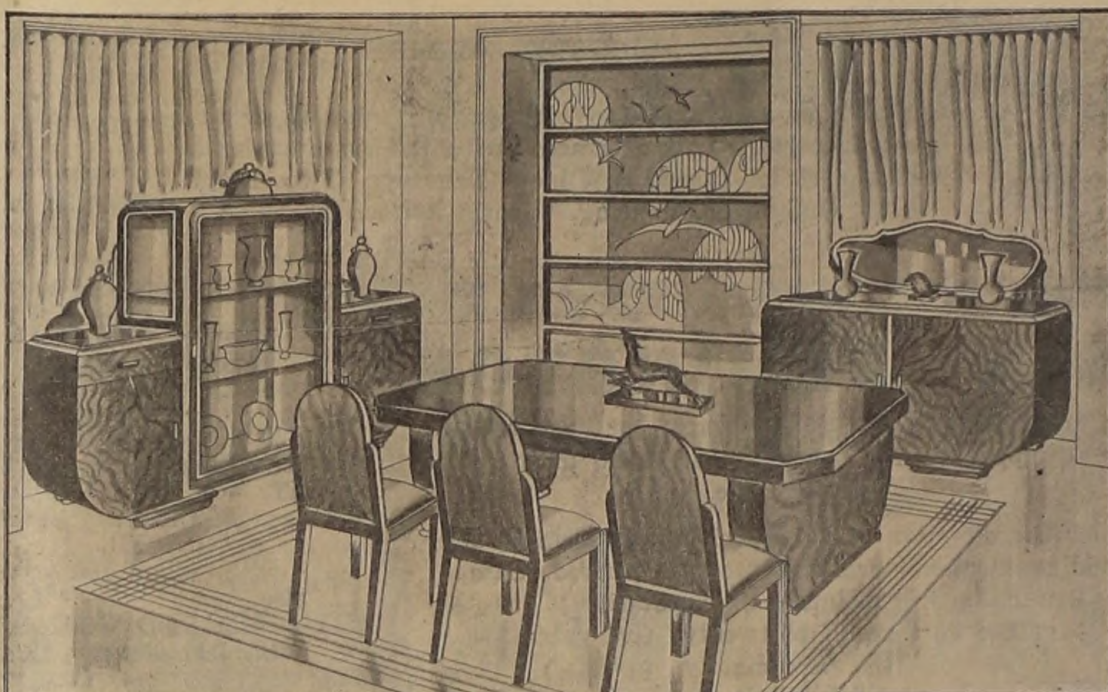
Do you think me high-handed, you good people of well-policed, closely settled neighborhoods? Remember, in the lonely lands beyond the country seat the planters are expected to keep order. It is better to fend off trouble than to have a "Quort (Court) Serape", with half the hands on the place summoned as witnesses. And that, perhaps, at the May term of court, when crops need constant care. Moreover, should a case actually reach the court house, the Boss Man must go there also. It is a moral obligation. When one of my hands fell foul of the law, my lawyers, who were of course his, greatly regretted a lady's appearance in the courtroom but admitted its necessity. Not because I was on a thousand-dollar bond for the appearance of the culprit, but because "Your labor expects it. You must, of course, stand by".

Plantation life is a bit in advance of the times as regards woman's work. Her place is not only in the home, it is a matter of course that she shall do her part in the field as well. That is not only a right, but a duty, and the cropper whose "women folks won't he'p himm" earns from his fellows a curious blend of pity and contempt. Trial marriage (though not so called) is so completely recognized by custom that the Burial and Benevolent Societies require that members shall designate by name the recipient-to-be of the "bereavement money", lest the "gennel-man's fus' wife tu'n up, an' ac'jes' scandalous". Short of stopping absolute murder, interference in "man and wife trouble" is most unwise. Rarely indeed is it forgiven. One night shrill howls came from a cabin, and grew so piercing and convincing that a small crowd gathered. Before authority could arrive to investigate, the woman who had been shrieking stepped out on the porch. "Now yo' all jes' go right away from heah!" she commanded. "Ain't nothin' the matter. Lovey uz jus' cussin' me".

Getting a pair license is a bit of social swank sometimes required by the aride-to-be, though it generally involves amazing circumventions of the law. Thomas, coal-black, steady, stupid, was greatly enamored of Pearlle, a fussy thing who insisted upon the

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social distinction of marriage.

The Boss Man almost invariably advances the money for the pair's license, so Thomas was duly accompanied to the office or the Clerk of the Court of Ordinary, and made his application. "How old are you?" (He looked forty).

"Twenty-four". "You must have been raised rough", commented the clerk. "Ever been married before?" "Yessuh". "Living with your wife?" "Nossuh".

"How long since you lived with her?" "Eight years". "How long did you live with her before you parted?" "Eight years".

"Eight years old when you were married, eh? Illegal. I'll issue the license". Sales at the plantation commissary are interesting. Of course, practically everything is sold on credit, and the amount must be deducted from the buyer's pay, so the problem of salesmanship lies in selling the idea of wanting as little as possible. When a sick hand sent to the "sto" for a "box of salmones" and a pound of cheese, I uttered no words of dietetic wisdom. I recognized that the ailing one was convalescent and entitled to sickroom delicacies.

Truly, life in the cabins is bare of luxuries, but I am sure that he dwellers therein pity us of the "Big Houses" for the burden of our possessions. "Too many gishes", I heard a boy murmur as he helped with spring cleaning in my pantry; and the ceremonial visit of a respectable old field hand closed in amazement that a house in which two persons live should have three bedrooms. "What fur?" she demanded blankly.

We and they stand at the same point and look along divergent sides of the angle to utterly different goals. The centuries of experience behind our race have given us the urge to acquire, to hand on to our sons. Behind theirs lies the jungle, with its insecurity of life. On the hottest summer nights their solid wooden shutters are closed to keep out zameless terrors of the dark. These people understand want — economy not at all. For them efficiency is not, but kindness of living is. Some day the world may compromise on a combination of both. North and South will then be a pleasanter place in which to live.

THE MINISTER OF FOREIGN

Relations, Dr. J. Espalter, has sent the following circular letter to all the Chiefs of Police throughout the nation: "In order to define and interpret Article 2 of the Decree of November 28th inst., I take pleasure in advising you that: 1st The Decree is not directed against the liberty of thought nor the liberty of opinion, but against the abuses of this liberty. If desired, therefore, a critical analysis can be made of the institutions and laws in existence, with the greatest freedom, and efforts made to reform them within the legal procedure—the acts and resolutions of the Public Powers can be censured. What is prohibited—as has already been expressed in the text of the Decree—is the non-recognition of the Public Powers, the expression of disrespect and sarcasm, and all propaganda which tends to cause crime or subversion. The free expression of thought is not limited, when it is truly used in error and un-ways be maintained, even prevent used in error and un-wisely, but the intention is to prevent this freedom from being used to affect public opinion in the sense of evil in its multiple forms, be it an attempt against moral order, juridical order, or political order, fundamentals of civilized societies. 2nd The period of ten days referred to in Article 3 of the Decree concerning cases of closure, should be understood as meaning the maximum penalty, and that therefore, such closures may be made for less days in accordance with the gravity of the transgression. When period publications are involved, days should be taken as meaning publications."

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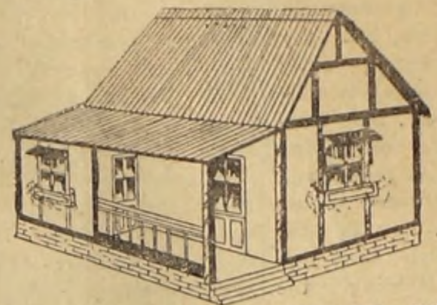
