NEWS OF THE DAY.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Another week has passed, and the convocation of the Chambers to Extraordinary Sessions has not yet appeared. The Government seems to be in no hurry—it rarely is.—Amongst other things, we may point out that the old Budget is only prolonged for a quarter, that is to say to September 30. If the Chambers do not resume business until the 15th, which it is believed will be the date assigned (it happens to be a holiday) there will be only six weeks for the new Budget to pass through all its stages, for, so far as we know, though it is nearly two months since it was presented, there has not even been a pretence of commencing its study in Committee.—It would also be interesting to know if the legislators are receiving their salaries during the recess, but this is one of the points on which public information is not vouchsafed.

According to a statement current yesterday, the memorandum which the Minister of Finance has prepared for presentation to the Cabinet is entirely adverse to the proposed Alcohol Monopoly, and condemns it as contrary to public interests.

Yesterday's *Siglo* adds its propaganda to that of the *Prensa* in favor of the reform of Article 229 of the Commercial Code (procedure in bankruptcy) being included in the topics of the Extraordinary Sessions, and it takes the opportunity of making some remarks about the administration of justice, which is such a prominent topic just now. That the existing laws are defective in many respects, it freely admits, but to say that there is no confidence in the administration of justice (as the *Prensa* said) it regards as being too sweeping an assertion and therefore not entirely just. What is really the truth, thinks the *Siglo*, is that there are certain Judges who unfortunately discredit the Bench, and in whose decisions no one has any confidence, but this is only the case with a limited few, and the majority of the Judges enjoy complete respect and confidence, and do not deserve to be involved in a general condemnation.—This is true enough, but at the same time it seems to us rather a quibble. The fact remains that, if one has a lawsuit or prosecution initiated, whether it be before the Correctional, Civil, Commercial or Criminal Court, there is no certainty before what Judge it will appear or whether the decision will be a just one, and it is as the *Siglo* itself has had to admit in the power of cunning and unscrupulous parties to eliminate the honest Judges and keep their cases before those who are notoriously otherwise. So long as this is possible—and the *Siglo* knows very well that it is possible—it is no exaggeration to say that there can be no confidence in the administration of justice.

As we said the other day, the purification of the Bench is even more important than the reform of the law, for, whilst there is even one unjust or incompetent Judge, the finest laws ever conceived will be of little avail. The Commercial Centre of Importers, etc., has presented a memorandum to the Minister of Finance protesting against the recent arbitrary change in the classification of imported gloves, which they allege will be very detrimental to their interests and to commerce in that article.

Political matters remain quiet. The only political article of any note in our contemporaries yesterday was one in the *Diario Nuevo*, in which, after referring to the President of the Republic as "the representative of the 'colorado' party in the Govern-

ment, it advocates the frank wiping out of all the positions attained by the nationalist party, and a return to an exclusive and intransigent policy towards that party. In other words, the government of the Republic is to be exclusively "colorado," by the party and for the party, and all who are not "colorados" are to be regarded as parasites in the land, unfit for public office or authority or for any share in public affairs.—The advice could hardly be more mischievous or reactionary—it is "collectivism" reditus in its worst form, but we venture to think that it will be rejected by the better sense of the country. It is precisely because Dr. Herrera and Idiarte Borda—in addition to other defects—regarded themselves as Presidents of the party, and not of the whole country, that their administrations proved so disastrous and culminated in revolution. And it is precisely because Sr. Batlle seems inclined to fall into the same pernicious error, and towards which the *Diario Nuevo* is evidently urging him, that his government threatens to be a failure, and to wipe out all the good work achieved by Cuestas. The *Diario Nuevo*, however, has never concealed its desire to see a restoration of the political situation that preceded the revolution of 1897, but we think that in this it will find itself accompanied by a very small and unimportant fraction of public opinion.

The Affair of the Insurance Companies.

We translate from yesterday's *Prensa*, as being of general interest, the following brief but significant defence which it has presented to the Correctional Judge Dr. Kovira, in reply to notification of a suit for slander instituted by Casimiro Castro, on account of certain of its publications in relation to the notorious affair of the Insurance Companies:—

"To the Correctional Judge:—
"Constancia C. Vigil, Director of the paper *La Prensa*, in the suit for slander which Don Casimiro Castro has had the effrontery (osadía) to institute against that paper, sets forth to your Honour:—That Sr.

Castro has not taken the trouble to fulfil the requisite of "conciliation" (preliminary appearance before a Justice of the Peace) which the Constitution of the Republic establishes as indispensable in commencing this class of law-suit.

"Furthermore, your Honour should have declared yourself impeded from intervening in the matter, for the reason that the principal co-author of the monstrous sentence which has caused the good name of our justice to suffer both at home and abroad, cannot possibly be a Judge who offers conditions of impartiality.

"Therefore, your Honour, should declare yourself impeded, or otherwise the corresponding challenge (recusacion) will immediately be lodged.

"I therefore beg your Honour to resolve in this sense, reserving to myself the right to reply opportunely and before the corresponding party, to the pending reference."

Empire and Education.

"Sound Learning, Sound Patriotism."
London, July 11.

The deliberations of the Allied Colonial Universities Conference, which concluded on Thursday, were followed last evening by a dinner at the Hotel Cecil. The Prime Minister presided over a company distinguished in science, in literature, and in Academic training. Among those who supported Mr. Balfour were the Earl of Aberdeen, the Earl of Glasgow, Lord Walsingham, the Earl of Harrowby, Lord Kelvin, the Bishops of Ripon and Rochester, Sir C. Dilke, M. P., Sir Gilbert Parker, M. P., Sir M. Foster, M. P., Mr. Haldane, M. P., Sir J. Wolfe-Barry, Sir A. Rücker, Sir R. C. Jebb, Sir Oliver Lodge, Sir H. E. Roscoe, Sir C. R. Wilson, Sir A. Rollet, M. P., Sir W. White, Sir R. B. Finlay (Attorney-General).

After the Royal toasts had been honoured,

The Chairman submitted the toast of the evening, "The Universities of the King's Oversea Dominions." That was, he said, a remarkable gathering in the individual capacity of the members composing it, but was still more remarkable when taken in connection with the idea which had brought them together. In that room were representatives of scholarship, of science, and all the great spheres of activity in which modern thought had indulged. They represented, he believed, what would turn out to be an alliance of the greatest educational instruments in the Empire—an alliance of the Universities, which, in an increasing measure, were feeling their responsibilities, not merely for the training of the youth destined to carry out all the traditions of the British Empire, but the furtherance of the great interests of knowledge, scientific research, and culture, without which no Empire, however magnificent materially, could really show it was doing its share in the progress of the world. (Cheers.) They boasted of a community of blood, of language, of literature, and surely they might also boast, without less reason, that the ideas of education which had effected so great a work in the old country were now doing their part with the younger children, and were carrying on in the self-governing portions of the Empire the work which had been performed in the parent country. (Hear, hear.) They had been quarrelling—it was not too much to say that they were still quarrelling—over both. (Laughter and cheers.) He asked them to consider the two elements conjointly, and he hoped the chemical compositions would prove less explosive than they did in their separate and individual characters. (Hear, hear, and laughter.) At all events, nothing he might say would hurt the sentiments even of the most ardent opponent of the Education Bill passed through Parliament last year, or would in the smallest degree anticipate that interesting discussion of tariff reform promised for the autumn (Hear, hear, and laughter.) The movement which had culminated in that gathering was not destined to finish with that evening's proceedings. Indeed, if by good fortune they met in this Metropolis years hence, they would find that the work just begun had not been unfruitful, but had worked great good, not merely for individual students, but merely for the cause of knowledge, but for the cause of Empire itself—(cheers)—and that, while learning ought never to be perverted to the cause of faction or to the cause of separation between different sections of mankind—nevertheless, it would prove true that the inter-communication between the oldest and the youngest in academic training would promote, not merely sound learning, but sound patriotism. (Cheers.)

The toast was responded to by Professor R. Threlfall, representing the University of Sydney, New South Wales, and the Hon. Sir John Buchanan, Vice-Chancellor of and representing the University of the Cape of Good Hope.

Sir G. Parker, M. P., gave "The Universities of the United Kingdom," which was responded to by the Rev. H. Montagu Butler, Master of Trinity College, Cambridge, and Dr. Mahaffy, Senior Fellow of Trinity College, Dublin.

Anti-Mosquito Campaign.

London, July 11.

The Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine has received a report from the Suez Canal Company on the subject of the result of Major Ross's recommendations for the improvement of the sanitary conditions at Ismailia, with special reference to the campaign against mosquitoes.

In December last the number of cases of fever had decreased in a most marked manner compared with preceding months, and the corresponding month in the previous year. The Secretary-General states that this diminution in fever has been maintained up to the date of writing, viz. July 2nd in the present year. Owing to the season of the year when the sanitary work referred to was put in hand, it has not yet been found possible to secure the complete disappearance of the Anopheles or malarial mosquito. It has, however, been found that the few Anopheles recently captured are not infected with the malarial parasite, a fact which the company think may be attributed to the large reduction in the unhealthy marshes.

On the other hand, it is interesting to note that, thanks to systematic oiling of pools, and thanks to unceasing watch kept over all likely places where larvae can be hatched, the ordinary mosquitoes of the genus Culex and Stegomyia have been annihilated, almost absolutely, and that even in the worst period of the hot season it has been found possible to dispense with the use of mosquito nets.

Every distinguished visitor, and some were not at all distinguished, every person who was departing upon or returning from a journey, or who had received an appointment or a promotion, or had published a book, or produced a play, or gained a lawsuit, or had done anything whatever to bring himself into momentary public notice, had to be offered a banquet by his friends, until the local world seemed on the point of resolving itself into one vast Society of Mutual Admiration and Reciprocal Banquets. We note, however, that the mania has recently received a check, and various persons on both sides of the Plate, by no means among the least worthy, have politely declined the proposed but doubtful honor. We hope the example will spread.

—HOMESTEAD LAW.—The B. A. Standard of Friday gives a full translation of a vast scheme for colonisation which has just been presented to the Argentine Congress by Dr. W. Escalante, on the basis of an issue of Bonds for fifty million dollars Argentine currency. Regarding this measure the Standard remarks as follows: "We direct the attention of our readers to Dr. Escalante's Homestead Law in another column, the most important step ever known in this country towards opening it up in its vast extent to labour, enterprise and capital. It is at first blush an admirable project and we have little doubt will stand scrutiny. We congratulate Dr. Escalante on this splendid departure which means so much for the progress of the country if put in practice, and honestly and carefully carried out. It will shed lustre on the decline of General Roca's period."

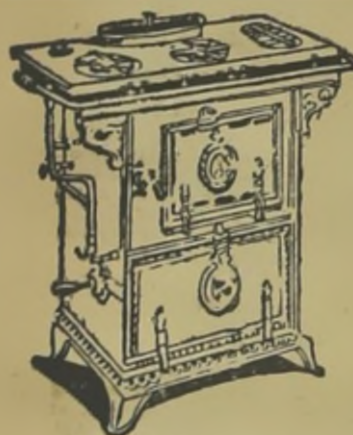

LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, JULY 11.

The King and Queen visited the Bath Club last night, and witnessed an interesting display organized by the Life Saving Society. The chief item in the programme was a demonstration of methods of rescue and resuscitation—the first of three international races for the challenge cup presented by his Majesty. In this preliminary contest England's representative was successful.

The King, as Captain General and Colonel of the Hon. Artillery Company, yesterday inspected the corps on the Horse Guards Parade, and afterwards addressed the officers and men in highly commendatory terms. His Majesty was accompanied on the ground by the Queen and Princess Victoria.

At the banquet given by the Trinity House last night the Prince of Wales spoke of the advancement the Brethren had made in lighting the coasts of Great Britain, and of their efforts to keep abreast of the needs of the time. Lord Rosebery, speaking of British dominions overseas, referred to the period when politicians who called themselves statesmen thought it might be desirable to cut the Colonies adrift altogether. At present, however, the policy was to bring them together, in order to consolidate the bonds of the Empire.

The Earl of Northbrook initiated an important debate in the House of Lords yesterday as to the position of India with regard to the proposed fiscal inquiry. Lord Lansdowne admitted that India was not in a good position to give preference to her friends or to retaliate against those who were unfriendly. Moreover, there were the interests of this country as a great creditor of India, the amount to be remitted to England every year for "home charges" being about £17,000,000. But the whole matter would be considered, and not from the economic standpoint alone. Pressed by Viscount Goschen, the Duke of Devonshire hoped by Tuesday next to be able to say when papers would be published.

On the motion for the second reading of the Naval Works Bill in the House of Commons, reference was made to the proposed establishment of a naval base in the Firth of Forth. Members declared that land was being acquired by the Government for this base at no less than eighty years' purchase, and Mr. Gibson Bowles characterised the arrangement as a "monstrous job." Mr. Prynne defended the scheme, doubting whether the Government would have obtained the land more cheaply if it had belonged to those who had been so ready to criticize. The Bill was read a second time.

Mr. Balfour presided last night at the Hotel Cecil over a banquet following the Conference for the Federation of the Universities of Great Britain and the Colonies. He expressed cordial approval of the scheme as foreshadowed, and predicted that not

Admiral Cotton and the officers of the United States squadron now at Portmouth were entertained at luncheon in the Mansion House yesterday by the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress. Speeches on the relations of the two countries were made by the Admiral, Mr. Chaucey Dewey and Mr. Chouteau.

Mr. S. B. Boulton, Chairman of the London Labour Conciliation Committee, and Mr. Morely were the chief speakers yesterday at an industrial conference held at the Crystal Palace in connection with the National Co-operative Exhibition, at which questions concerning arbitration and conciliation were discussed.

Mr. J. Williams Bean, Chairman of the L.C.C. Tramways Committee, gave further evidence yesterday before the Royal Commission on street traffic, and maintained his opinion as to the desirability of carrying the tramways over Southwark Bridge and having a terminus in the City.

Dr. Rabagliati argued at the Sanitary Congress at Bradford yesterday that the chief cause of fevers was not overcrowding but overfeeding, and that adults between the ages of twenty-one and fifty ought to do with one meal a day.

The annual cricket match at Lord's between Eton and Harrow was yesterday a great triumph for Eton, who, having dismissed Harrow for 115, completed an innings for a total of 425. At the Oval the Gentlemen, with five wickets to fall, are 251 runs ahead of the Players. At Manchester Somerset have made 177 and 292 for seven wickets to Lancashire's 245. At Brighton Sussex completed their first innings for 492, G. Brann getting a century, and Hampshire made 305 for seven wickets. At Derby the home county have scored 234 and 198, and Notts have made 117 and 110 for two wickets. At Coventry Warwickshire defeated the Philadelphians by seven wickets.
