SEVERE FIGHTING IN RUSSIA.

VIENNA, Aug. 6 (U.P.)
Severe fighting is reported between Russian Government Troops and Anti-Government troops on the Bessarabian Frontier between the Dneister River and Odessa. Rumania is concentrating troops on this frontier for the purpose of guaranteeing neutrality.

BLOODY BATTLES IN BESSARABIA.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 6 (U.P.)
It is reported from Moscow that Trotsky has fled after two of his relatives had been arrested at his house where correspondence was found which revealed a conspiracy to overthrow the Government. A state of siege has been declared in the Dneister District where bloody battles between Government and Anti-Government troops have taken place.

The Rumanian Ministry of War has ordered all troops to be in readiness for immediate despatch to the Russian Frontier.

SWIMMING

THE CHANNEL CONQUERED.

Gertrude Ederle's Wonderful Swim. KINGSDOWN, Aug. 6 (U.P.)
Gertrude Ederle, the American Lady-Swimmer swam across the Channel from Cape Grisnez in 14 1/2 hours, beating Tiraboschi's previous best by of 16 hours 23 minutes and setting up a world's record for the feat.

Miss Ederle arrived fresh and wanted to swim back and rejoin the tug, but the attendants dissuaded her.

THE ARGENTINE AVIATORS.

RIO GRANDE DO SUL, Aug. 6.
Duggan and his companions, who have been missing since Tuesday, arrived safely here to-day.

PRINCESS MAFALDA HAS A SON.

RACCONIGNI, Aug. 6 (U.P.)
Princess Mafalda gave birth to a boy to-day. Both, the Royal mother and son are well.

COBHAM'S PLANS.

MELBOURNE, Aug. 6 (U.P.)
Alan Cobham is leaving Port Darwin on Sunday for Brunettes Town, and is due to arrive in Melbourne on the 16th.

BRIAND AND BLANCO.

PARIS, Aug. 6 (U.P.)
Briand gave an audience to Dr. Carlos Blanco of Montevideo to-day.

CANE HOLOCAUST IN NATAL.

DURBAN, South Africa, Aug. 6.
A fire, five miles wide, broke out in the sugar plantations in the Illovo District, situated on the South Coast of Natal some 15 miles from Durban. The conflagration spread with lightning rapidity through the dense fields of cane entrapping the native labourers, thirteen of whom are known to have been burnt alive. The fire destroyed 2,000 acres of sugarcane, and all the planters in the district have been ruined.

NOBILE BRINGS STORMS.

ROME, Aug. 5 (U.P.)
Nobile's North-Pole trip did more harm than good. The peasants in various parts of Italy are grumbling; about the rain and hail, as well as the snowstorms, which are making this summer one of the most disastrous for crops in many decades. They hold that the flight scrambled up air currents and brought bad weather.

Intense storms are reported from Brescia, Mantua, Verona, Modena and Piacenza, with characteristic drops in temperature. Rome is now chilly and is inundated by rain.

AMERICAS.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (U.P.)
Exports to South America for the fiscal year ended June 30, according to the Department of Commerce, were valued as follows: Argentina, \$ 147,268,301; Chile, \$ 46,405,821; Peru, \$ 26,492,216. Imports from those countries were: Argentina, \$ 85,958,456; Chile, \$ 84,173,945; Peru, \$ 23,852,656.

The exports for June were: Argentina, \$ 9,769,865; Chile, \$ 3,935,634; Peru, \$ 2,102,360. The imports were: Argentina, \$ 7,364,729; Chile, \$ 4,262,660; Peru, \$ 2,645,228.

SLAVS BEING WATCHED.

ROME, Aug. 5 (U.P.)
Italy views with intense interest and concern the reports of tension between Bulgaria and Yugoslavia, and is prepared to do everything diplomatically possible — short of taking action as formal arbiter — to improve situation; according to a statement made this morning by a Government spokesman.

In regard to the rumours that Italy would step in between Russia and Rumania over the long-standing dispute regarding Bessarabia, the Government spokesman emphatically denied that Italy intends to re-open the question, or that she has assumed any responsibility in the matter.

TRADE FIGURES BETWEEN THE

BIG DOPE SEIZURE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (U.P.)
A trunk containing \$ 100,000 worth of narcotics was seized to-day upon arrival from Canada. Federal agents are of the opinion that the trunk is part of a \$ 3,000,000 shipment of narcotics en route to the United States from Russia.

COLOMBIAN LOAN

NEW YORK, August 5 (U.P.)
It is understood that three Wall Street firms are bidding for a 45,000 dollar Colombian loan to be issued at the end of the summer. Peru, Chile and the province of Buenos Aires are also mentioned as possible borrowers.

THE JAPANESE FLOODS.

TOKIO, August 5 (U.P.)
There are only three known deaths from the floods at Akita. The prefecture is profiting by the disastrous experience in the neighbouring province of Niigata last week and thousands withdrew from the danger zone.

ANOTHER GOOD EXAMPLE FOR LATIN REPUBLICS.

HAVANA, Aug. 5 (U.P.)

Hernan Pena will be garroted for the murder last year of the mayor of Santiago de Cuba, the President having signed the death warrant to-day.

The execution will take place 24 hours after the official notification, which is expected by midnight to-morrow.

MEXICAN MATTERS.

NEW YORK, August 5 (U.P.)

Sr. Paul, Mexican Secretary of Finance, has telegraphed to the United Press a denial of rumours that Mexican bankers have informed President Calles of the withdrawal of 27,000,000 pesos from banks. He states:

"Information in the hands of the national banking commission fails to show any decrease in deposits. Consequently I am able to deny emphatically the existence of a banking panic."

The Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus, representing 800,000 Catholics in North America, passed a resolution at Philadelphia to-day calling upon President Coolidge to direct the Secretary of State, Mr. Kellogg "resolute" to demand the protection of Americans in Mexico.

FRENCH FINANCES.

Wall Street bankers see indications of a new French loan of from 100,000,000 to 200,000,000 dollars.

M. Poincaré demanded a vote of confidence from the Chamber on the Bill authorising the Bank of France to purchase gold and foreign notes and to issue corresponding amount in notes without increasing the note circulation. He said "this is a very necessary complement to the other measures. Inflation and speculation have decreased the franc's value. It is impossible to fight without a mass manoeuvre which in unobtainable outside the Bank of France. In the event of French or foreign speculation intervening the Bank's mass manoeuvre will permit of instant counteraction."

The Chamber of Deputies have adopted M. Poincaré's Bank of France bill by a vote of 267 to 141. This bill empowers the Bank of France to purchase French gold at a higher rate than current on paper, to purchase foreign currencies and to issue bank notes in amounts necessary to make such purchases.

Informed by the United Press of the Wall Streets reports regarding a French loan, M. Poincaré refused absolutely to comment on the matter. Other Ministers told the United Press that they did not believe the reports were true, especially in view of M. Poincaré's statement yesterday to the Finance Commission of the Chamber that foreign credits are not necessary at present.

GOA GOES 'GAINST GOVERNMENT.

BOMBAY, August 5 (U.P.)

An uprising occurred to-day in the Portuguese Colony of Goa. The army council headed by Col. Marques Sequeira, compelled the acting Governor-General to abandon his office and took over the government of Goa and informed the Portuguese colonial minister that the colony is quiet.

This action on the part of the army council is due to the failure of the Governor-General to suspend an order retrenching military pensions.

Colonel Marques Sequeira declared to an interviewer to-day that the revolt at Goa was necessary because it was impossible for the retired army officers to live on reduced pensions without sacrificing the comforts of life to which they are entitled. Colonel Sequeira's action closely resembles the recent ouster of General Gomes Costa in Lisbon.

MINERS' EXECUTIVE BALLOT

LONDON, August 5 (U.P.)

The miners' executive council will meet on Tuesday to receive results of districts in the ballot on acceptance or rejection of proposals for settlement of the strike made by the English bishops. Voting is expected to be completed by Monday.

THE STEVENSON SCHEME.

LONDON, August 5 (U.P.)

The United Press is informed by the Colonial Office that "the Mincing Lane rumours that an abandonment of the Stevenson scheme is imminent, are entirely without foundation. The schedule, promulgated on Saturday, will continue throughout the present quarter."

THE BRITISH ASSOCIATION.

OXFORD, August 5 (U.P.)

Miss D. A. E. Garrod, formerly a

student of anthropology at Oxford, addressing the Archaeological section, described the finding of the skull of a "young person" over 20,000 years old, in a cave in Gibraltar, 150 yards from the cave where the so-called Forbes skull was discovered in 1848. She said that while as yet there had not been time to study the skull completely, "it is associated with an extinct species of man belonging to the Neanderthal race". This is a species supposed to have been widespread in prehistoric Europe.

Sketching the theory of evolution Mr. Henry Fairfield Osborn, a leading American authority on the subject, declared that science fully understands how evolution accounts for the origin of the species, but that it may require thousands of years of research to determine why it does. He said that Darwin's theory has been gradually modified but "the law of evolution and the standardising and directing principle of natural selection" as revealed by Darwin are absolutely established and a hundredfold times confirmed. Although laboratory research has made the origin of the species even more mysterious, modern field research has shown the manner wherein new species or subspecies take their shapes.

"Discontinuity of sudden origin of new species", after the manner termed mutational by De Vries is a real phenomenon but relatively rare. It is in a sense an abnormal process due to some irregular influence on germ plasma. Isolation seems to constitute the chief complex of causes in the origin of new species.

"Doubtless intensive field surveys from arid or hybrid and into the unexplored desert of forest regions of Central Asia, Australia or North and South Africa will yield further evidence of complete intergradation and of species in the making."

Professor J. F. Thoms, of the Imperial College of Science and Technology, warned that the increasing popularity of automobiles throughout the world threatens to cause a gasoline famine in a not distant period if consumption is maintained at the present rate and crude, wasteful methods not altered. He said that the United States in 1925 consumed nearly 800,000,000 gallons monthly, which exceeded production in the United States and constituted approximately 75 per cent. of the world's consumption and exceeded that of Great Britain twelve times.

MR. LLOYD GEORGE AT SWANSEA.

LONDON, August 5 (U.P.)

Addressing a meeting of the Welsh League of Nations Union at Swansea, Mr. Lloyd George declared that he did not believe the League of Nations would become a power in the world until "in some form or other on its own conditions and in its own way the United States have joined. America alone, given the guidance of God, can save the world from the horrors of war."

ARGENTINE FINANCES.

LONDON, August 5 (U.P.)

The "Financial News" devotes two columns and a half to Argentina and says: "The annual message delivered to Congress by President Alvear, indicates a sound condition of finances in the Argentine Republic. The ordinary budget is balanced and even leaves a considerable surplus to over part of the extraordinary requirements for public works. For a comparatively new country this is a most satisfactory state of affairs. Funds required for investment purposes were easily raised by loans in New York which enabled the Government to reduce the large floating debt considerably, the existence of which was the weakest point in the country's finance. It is well known that whenever Argentina appears in the market for fresh loans there is keen competition in New York. Financial houses in London would welcome the return of Argentina as a borrower."

ZINOVIEFF AND THE SOVIETS.

LONDON, August 5 (U.P.)

Commenting on the Zinovieff affair, the "Daily News" says "the rumour of Zinovieff's banishment to Siberia has been officially denied. Zinovieff has been sent to Kursk in Central Russia, 250 miles south of Moscow. Little is known of Kursk as a holiday resort but it is notorious as possessing nearly the worst prison in Russia."

Both in Moscow and Leningrad Zinovieff's expulsion has created a feeling of tension. One result of this state of affairs is that Stalin—Go chief of the triumvirate which took the reins of Communist control after the death of Lenin—is in daily fear of an attempt at assassination.

THE AMERICAN CHAMPIONS.

(By Francis Quimet).

Following closely on the heels of Jess Swettser's triumph at Muirfield came the victory of Bobby Jones in the British Open and for the first time in the history of the game of golf the two golfing classics of the world are controlled, for a year at least, by the two leading amateurs in the United States. Ten years ago such a thing would have been thought impossible and is just further proof of the high quality of amateur golf in America.

Jones has no superior as a medal golfer and I seriously doubt if a more consistent player will ever be developed than the little lad from Atlanta.

I remember back in 1914, at Prestwick, seeing Harry Vardon and J. H. Taylor fighting their death duel to decide which of the two would have the unprecedented honor of winning for the sixth time the British open. Each had accomplished the feat of winning it five times and on this occasion Vardon won, but only after a terrible battle. One of the most difficult tasks in the world is to compete at medal play with the chap who is closest to you in the scoring line. Vardon had it at Prestwick and Jones had it at Lytham and St. Anne's.

It is a tremendous ordeal. When Al Watrous, paired with Bobby took the lead at the end of fifty-four holes of play, by two strokes it would not have been surprising to find both Watrous and Jones striking a slump that would have permitted some other entry unnoticed to walk in with the honors. That is one of the most natural things to expect because the human mind and body can stand just so much punishment before finally blowing up. Had either man cracked badly enough some one else would have won, but these two chaps are not of the cracking type and they can continue their play based on sound styles which is something few can do.

Amateurs on Par With Pros.

With five holes remaining to be played Watrous was in the lead by two big strokes but on those last five holes Bobby made up four shots, sufficient to return him the winner by a two-stroke margin. What a championship and what a champion? Five years ago in his first effort in a British open, and a St. Andrews, Bobby tore up his card and did not finish, and immediately the cry went up that Bobby lacked the temperament to stand up in the face of a hard test.

Since then he has demonstrated that he not only can stand the strain of either a hard match or medal round but can do so more regularly than any other player in the game. What a great satisfaction it must be to Jones now to know that those who questioned his temperament must now retract their former statements and hail him as the golfing wonder of the world.

There was a time too when an amateur golfer hardly dared harbor such a thought as winning a championship against the leading professional golfers. It was similar to a college baseball nine competing against a big league ball team. Amateur golf has improved tremendous-

ly until now the leading amateur talent is quite a match for those who have made golf their profession. Personally I could never understand why a top notch amateur could not play just as well as a top notch professional. An amateur good enough to score in the low seventies is a match for anybody because the game can only be played just so well and those who can make seventy-twos can sometimes go lower.

The professionals should not feel badly because Bobby Jones has defeated them in an Open championship. Indeed I know they do not for they all realize whenever he enters an event that he has just as fine a chance of winning as any other. The amateurs are always delighted when he wins for they feel he is their superior and it is hardly within the realm of thought that another will come along to take his place for years and years to come. He has mastered and he has mastered himself which is something he should be proud of although in my humble opinion too much stress has always been placed on his temperament for I have been satisfied when the test came Bobby Jones would never be found wanting.

COWES, Aug. 6 (U.P.)

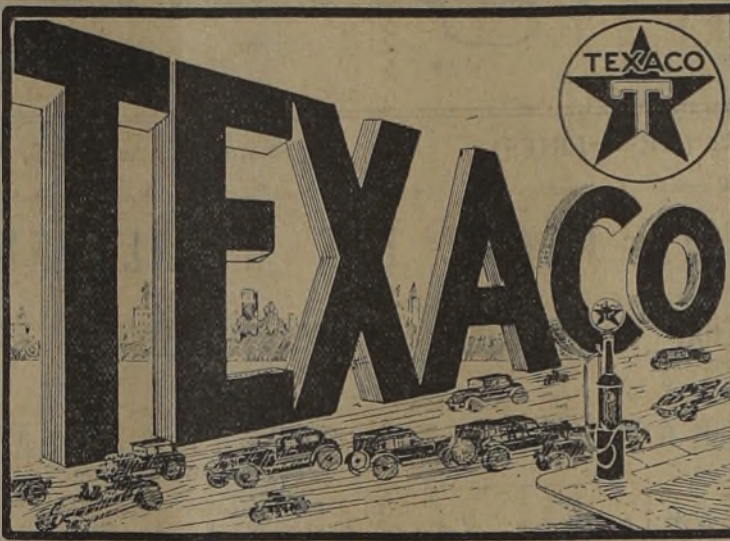
The "Mamoussa" of France won the International Yachting Trophy in Cowes week.

WAGE RATES IN 1925. Reductions in Mining and Transport.

Changes in rates of wages in Great Britain and Northern Ireland during 1925 are recorded and analysed in the current issue of the Ministry of Labour Gazette. The statistics concern 13 occupational groups containing over 1,700,000 workers, but do not record changes in the wages of agricultural labourers, Government employees, domestic servants, shop assistants, and clerks.

Taking the industries as a whole, a net decrease in wages equal to £79,800 per week took place during the year, but the report states that if changes in the wages of agricultural labourers were included, this would be converted into a slight increase. Reductions in wages affected about 860,000 workpeople, and represented a total of over £160,000, while the aggregate and increase of over £80,000 was divided among 870,000 workpeople. The clothing and transport trades and the public utility services accounted for over two-thirds of the persons whose wages were increased and for nearly two-thirds of the total amount. Over four-fifths of those whose wages were reduced belonged to the mining and quarrying, iron and steel, and transport groups. Net increases of note are shown for only four groups—brick, pottery, glass, chemical, andc. (£4,550 weekly among 28,850 workpeople); clothing £21,140 among 211,650 workpeople; building and allied trades (£5,000 among 43,000 workpeople); and public utility services (£15,600 among 164,250 workpeople).

The biggest decrease took place in the mining and quarrying group, where 404,000 persons were affected and the reductions in the weekly wages amounted to £68,500. Of the coalmining industry the report says: "Wages had reached the minimum level permissible under the 1924 agreement by the end of that year in all the principal districts, except Yorkshire and the East Midlands and the Radstock district, and they remained at that level throughout 1925. In Yorkshire and the East Midlands there was a slight increase in January from 59 3/4 to 60 7/6 per cent. on standard rates. In subsequent months there were decreases, apart from a small increase in April, till the minimum of 46 2/3 per cent. on standard rates was reached in July, after which no further change occurred. In the Radstock district wages were at 52 6/6 per cent. above standard rates at the beginning of the year. From January to November there was a succession of advances and reductions till in the latter month the minimum of 35 5/6 per cent. on standard rates was reached. In March, 1925, a subsistence allowance of 6d. a shift or such smaller amount as would raise the rate to 8s. 9d. a shift was agreed upon in the Yorkshire and East Midlands area. In West Yorkshire it was agreed, in July, that no man should receive a gross wages less than 8s. 7 1/2d. per shift and 8s. 5 1/2d. per shift in the eastern and western subdivisions respectively.

Heavy reductions in the transport and the iron and steel groups are recorded, those in the former group being accounted for chiefly by wage decreases in the merchant shipping service, and those in the latter group by fluctuations governed by the selling price of certain classes of iron and steel. The increases shown in the clothing trade were due to the raising of minimum rates fixed under the Trade Boards Acts.

COBHAM'S UNASSUMINGNESS.

Almost with mechanical monotony the cables from day to day have given the bare results of Cobham's Flight.

There has been no preliminary blare of trumpets, no gatherings of the populace en route, no extravagant homage, festivities and hysterics. — Alan Cobham has just stuck to his self-appointed task, flying from point to point with the utmost regularity.

What a fine example is furnished by his exploits.

Little as they have been lauded, for the one very good reason that Cobham himself has given the world no time in which to pamper to hero-worship, the British Aviator has gone remorselessly on from stage to stage — stopping for nothing, being stopped by nothing and just, accomplishing.

The public, and more especially, the Latin American public are accustomed to having all their national impressiveness and enthusiasm aroused by the exploits of those who have set out to earn fame by these national characteristics of temperament.

Their successes, and unfortunately their failures, have now passed into the limbo of the gone before.

Public subscriptions, hysterical welcomes and the adulation of the multitude have been stretched to breaking point by the support given to Spanish and South American aviators who have undertaken feats of flying, which, alas, in the majority of incidents have failed to justify the paeans of praise lavished on them before they have accomplished anything really worthy of statue-building.

The Argentine has been specially prone to fits of unmerited enthusiasm over the anticipated triumphs of several of her national airmen. The public has been worked up to a pitch of excitability, exuberance of fervour and patriotism long before there was any justification for the outburst.

The result has been a lot of fulsome praise and publicity for deeds which have hardly merited national recognition.

What a contrast is afforded by Alan Cobham's performances which have been chronicled in a skeleton-sentence or two with monotonous regularity about his arrivals and departures en route.

He first flew to the Cape and Back to London, and until he had actually accomplished his mission, the English Press and people had little to say about him — and he just did it!

Now he has reached Australia from England with only one hitch on the way, a hitch which was beyond his control by the dastardly, barbarian act of an Arab idiot which cost him the life of his mechanic young Elliott, who was as fine a type of manhood as his master.

Cobham felt the blow keenly and was all for cancelling the rest of his flight, weightier considerations than a mere human life were brought to bear, and he consented to continue.

He has now reached his goal — calmly, quietly and without a fuss — but none the less with a display of doggedness, pluck and ability that

commands our entire respect and admiration.

Had he flown from New York to B. A. under the aegis of Argentina, the bombs from all the newspaper offices in the City would have proclaimed his success — as it is, he is reported in a bare couple of lines cold print as having arrived. That's All!

But, we take off our hats to Alan Cobham, the greatest aviator the world has ever seen, and Thank God for it — he's British "Gentleman Alan Cobham"!

PEEPS AT THE PAST

AUGUST 7th.

THE FENMEN.

The Fenmen or inhabitants of the fens lying along the east coast of England were notorious for their obstinate opposition to all schemes of drainage. The earliest inhabitants would break down the embankments, because the exclusion of the water damaged the fishing; and the more enlightened landowners of later days invariably dreaded trouble, and change and risk of expense, more than annual destruction of property. The fact affords a curious illustration of that indolent spirit, apparently inherent in human nature, which clings at any cost to what is familiar. In one of those schemes for improving matters which were set on foot from time to time, so far back as the time of the Romans and which usually assumed considerable importance whenever a more destructive flood than ordinary had produced more than ordinary complaints, we find James I writing from Theobald's, and urging the undertakers of work to do their utmost describing the cause as one in which he himself was much interested and enjoying them, among other things, to inform him of "Any mutinous speeches which might be raised concerning this business" so generally intended for the public good. In any attempt of this kind it seems, a fair amount of opposition was of course anticipated. On this occasion the undertakers, form in number, began operations on the 7th of August, 1605, with so important a person as Sir John Popham Lord Chief Justice,

as one of the four: Yet although the scheme, was carefully organised and regularly arranged with the proper commissioners, the Fenmen, after all brought it to nothing. The undertakers engaged to drain 307,242 acres in seven years, and to accept in payment 130,000 acres "to be taken out of the worst sort of every particular fen proportionably".

The prospect of so handsome a reward as too much for the Fenmen, and so many grievances did they make out, so many objections had they to raise to the scheme, that a commission of inquiry had to be appointed. This commission decided against them, declaring amongst other plain truths, that whereas an objection had been made of much prejudice that might redound to the

poor by such draining they had information by persons of good credit, that in several places of recovered grounds, within the Isle of Ely, etc., such as before that time had lived upon alms having no help but by fishing and fowling and such poor means out of the common fens while they lay drowned, were since come to good and supportable estates yet although the king had taken up the scheme, and the good of it was self-evident the plan duly laid, and the operations even commenced, the work had to be discontinued; chiefly because, of the opposition which divers perverse-spirited people made thereto, by bringing turbulent suits in law, as well as against the commissioners as those whom they employed therein.

H. M. S. "COLOMBO".

His Majesty's Ship "Colombo" will arrive at Montevideo on the afternoon of August 24th and will leave on the 31st instant.

Recapitulating briefly the following are a few particulars about the vessel which is visiting us shortly.

Colombo is a light cruiser, built at Govan in 1918-19 and was engaged by the Fairfield Co. She is 451 ft. 6in. in length over all, 425 ft. between perpendiculars, 43 ft. 6in. beam and 14 ft. 6in. mean draught. Turbine engines of 40,000 H. Her armament consists of 5 6in and 4 qdr. quick fire guns, 2 3 in anti-aircraft guns, 2 2 pdr pompoms and 8 torpedo tubes mounted in pairs on turntables on deck.

Protection to the vitals is given by a broad belt of 3 in. armour amidships, tapering to 2 in. at the stern and 1 1/2 in at the bow. It is also narrower at the extremities.

WILLIAM CORY AND SON.

A slight decline in net profits is recorded by William Cory and Son, the coal factors and contractors, for the year ended March 31 last. After making "ample provision for depreciation" and the payment of debenture interest, one net figure for the year was £496,932, as compared with £503,993 for the previous year. As already announced, the directors are again paying a dividend of 15 per cent. on the ordinary and employees' shares for the fifth consecutive year. The balance remaining to be carried forward at £506,235, compares, with £488,808 brought in.

INSURING SHIPS' PASSENGERS.

For some years the Comité Maritime and a Committee of the International Shipping Conference have been at work on a scheme for the insurance of all passengers on board ship, and a provisional convention drafted by them was considered at the Genoa Conference in September last. In anticipation of that Conference an international conference of shipowners was held, at which certain amendments of the draft convention were made, and suggestions on various points put forward for the consideration of a sub-committee of the Comité Maritime. This sub-committee met recently at Antwerp under the chairmanship of Sir Norman Hill. The other countries represented included Belgium, France, Holland, Germany, Sweden, and the Scandinavian countries. Sir Norman Hill, in the address with which he opened the meeting, was able to show with the aid of statistics the very small risk of loss of life or injury incurred by passengers on board ship. The casualties are, indeed, but an infinitesimal proportion of the millions of passengers carried every year, and it reflects the care exercised in dealing with emigrant traffic that the loss of life among this class of passenger is not greater than among those who pay higher rates of passage.

The scheme which found approval at Antwerp, after a two days' discussion of the subject in all its details, is that a plan of general and compulsory insurance of passengers for a fixed amount without distinction of class, should be brought into operation. There were doubts whether German and French shipowners would accept a scheme of this character, but it was satisfactory to learn from Sir Norman Hill, after

the close of the meetings in Antwerp, that the vote on the subject was unanimous. There is an obvious advantage to all parties concerned in having a fixed amount, instead of leaving passengers to sue for damages in the Courts. The scheme as it present drafted is confined to a claim against the ship on which passage is taken, possible claims against another ship in the event of a collision being left undisturbed. All that now remains is to fix the amount of insurance which should, of course, be the same under ships of all flags.

AWARDS TO INVENTORS.

The Royal Commission on Awards to Inventors, sitting at the Royal Courts of Justice will hear on Monday the claims of Mr. F. Marten Hale in respect of rifle grenades and (2) Mr. F. Marten Hale respect of aerial bombs (part heard.)

A NEW U.S. SPYSCRAPER.

Work was started on the building in Detroit of the Book Tower.

The Book Tower is being erected by Mr. J. B. Book Junior, and the Book Estate, Mr. Book built the so-called boulevard of skyscrapers in Detroit. The new building will be 81 storeys, 873ft., high. The Woolworth building in New York, which is now the highest skyscraper in the country, is 60 storeys, 792ft. high. The new giant is in the heart of the Detroit business district. To make room for it several of the city's land marks had to be razed.
