THE PRESS TO ASSIST.

GENEVA, Aug. 18 (U.P.) Sixteen of the World's leading News Associations meet on Thursday before the Geneva Commission of the League of Nations on a project to improve the world-wide facilities for the interchange of News, as one of the surest ways of promoting an understanding between the peoples for the prevention of misunderstandings.

CENTRAL MINERS' COMMITTEE TO MEET TO-DAY.

LONDON, Aug. 18 (U.P.) In response to Mr. A. J. Cook's suggestion, the mine owners have arranged a central committee to meet the Miners on Thursday afternoon. The Miners' Executive has adjourned till Thursday for the purpose of receiving the owners acceptance for the proposed conference to-morrow.

The Executive has also informed the Government that the Conference has been arranged.

FRENCH ANTI-FOREIGN

ATTACKS EXAGGERATED. NEW YORK, Aug. 18 (U.P.) Ambassador Herrick arrived in New York from Paris and declared that the reported Anti-Foreign Attacks in France have been greatly exaggerated. Herrick declared that the Basic Situation of France showed that the present difficulties should be surmounted without trouble.

THE MEXICAN PLOT.

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 18 (U.P.) One hundred and fifteen non-descript followers of Estrada have been formally charged with an attempt to incite rebellion in Mexico. Their bail-bond has been fixed at 1,000 dollars each. The public prosecutor recommended 20,000 bail for Estrada.

THE 1814 AMERICAN MEMORIAL.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18 (U.P.) Secretary Kellogg in his speech to-day in connection with the dedication of the memorial to Commodore Thomas Mac Donough, the victor of the decisive naval battle of Champlain in 1814, emphasized that the engagement inaugurated 112 years of Anglo-American Peace. Secretary Kellogg further declared the contemplated development of the present ponderous engines of war, explained the world's desire for a relief from expenditure, and the horrors of modern warfare. He lauded the results of the Washington Conference, and emphatically denied that the United States wanted to withdraw from the preliminary conference on Disarmament at Geneva. Secretary Kellogg then urged a separation of the Land and Naval Disarmaments.

OBITUARY

LADY STRATHCONA.

LONDON, Aug. 18 (U.P.) Lady Strathcona and Mount Royal died to-day.

Margaret Charlotte Smith Howard, Baroness Strathcona was created in 1897. She was the daughter of the 1st Baron and Lady Isabella Sophia, daughter of the late Richard Hardisty of Canada.

The Late Lady Strathcona was born on the 17th January, 1854. Her heir is the Hon. Donald Sterling Howard.

VALENTINO PROGRESSING FA-

VOURABLY.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18 (U.P.)

Rudolph Valentino is reported as progressing favourably and is able to drink a considerable quantity of water with broth as first nourishment.

TRANS CHANNEL CRASH.

LONDON, Aug. 18 (U.P.) One person was killed and eleven injured in a cross channel flight to-day, operated by the French Air Union.

The plane crashed on a house in the fog when 2 miles from Lympne Airdrome; the plane was carrying 13 passengers.

THE COMMUNIST MENACE.

LONDON, Aug. 16 (U.P.) The Home Secretary, Sir William Joynson-Hicks, asserted that documents and papers available proved that Moscow's programme included the recent general strike in England and said that the refusal of the British Trades Union leaders to allow the strike to develop along revolutionary lines had noticeably angered the Communist leaders. The programme also included, simultaneous with the strike in England, a general strike on the Continent and contamination of the army navy air police and government organizations.

The Home Secretary's letter pointed out, first, that it was long known that Moscow, with the collaboration of revolutionary elements in the English trade unions, had advocated the general strike for the purpose of paralysing the community and the government, also preparing for an active overt revolution.

Secondly, the Executives of the Communist internationals as long ago as the summer of 1924 announced the methods of preparation. Thirdly, efforts, to amalgamate the Amsterdam International with the Red International labour unions had been attempted but failed.

Fourthly, the programme was settled in 1924, during the visit to Moscow of certain members of the Left Wing and of the trades unions, giving, the Trades Union Council directive power in an effort to capture the council for the purpose of using it as a medium for the general strike. Also Continental action was aimed toward a general upheaval culminating in mass violence.

Fifthly the Anglo-Russian advisory committee was created in April of 1925 for the purpose of coordinating the campaign for internal trade union unity.

Sixthly in the month of August, 1925, Moscow elaborated the programme into a simultaneous general strike in both England and on the Continent.

Seventhly the Communist Party in Great Britain under the direction of Moscow prepared to control the Trades Union Council and create local Soviets or councils of action to organize mass intimidation through picketing and to form workers' defence corps against the police and to contaminate the army, navy, police, air force, and other government organizations.

Sir William recalled the frequent warnings of the insidious attempt to penetrate the ranks of the ordinary workers, asking the question, "Why did the strike fail?" to which he replied, "because the government was resolute and the vast majority of citizens and the armed forces were loyal".

"The general strike also failed on the Continent and was rejected by the Amsterdam International. Moscow was also responsible there, but the trades union leaders admitted that the strike was illegal and halted it, despite Communist pamphlets and papers explaining the causes of the failure".

Sir W. Joynson Hicks summoned "all lovers of the constitution" not to believe that this was the first nor the last strike of its kind. He

warned that future strikes were planned and all must work openly and firmly to counteract them.

THE WORLD'S WHEAT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (U.P.)

The Department of Agriculture forecast of the world's wheat production says that the crop will be approximately equal to last year's with a stronger demand. The report adds that 21 northern hemisphere countries will produce 2,351,000,000 bushels as compared with 2,320,000,000 last year.

The Department has estimated the total European wheat crop to be approximately 100,000,000 bushels below that of last year.

Simultaneously the Department of Commerce announced that 843 milling companies were holding 35,334,000 bushels of wheat on June 30th, compared with over 92,000,000 bushels held by 310 companies on the corresponding date in 1925.

ARGENTINA'S CATTLE INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (U.P.)

The Institute of Economics, in a detailed study of the cattle industry in Argentina in relation to tariffs, says that the possibilities of expansion in the Argentine cattle industry without a rapid increase in costs are far exhausted and include further improvements in breeding and management, the development of transportation and water facilities and an increased alfalfa area, although this cannot proceed rapidly but is possible. With the corresponding expansion of the cattle industry under conditions more advantageous than exist in the United States, an other possibility is the production of more beef as part of the general farming of the permanent type. "The advantage arising from live stock production in connection with farming are too important to be permanently ignored. The tendency to carry more livestock is already ob-

THE FINAL TEST.

England Recovers The Ashes

4th. And Last Day's Play.

The wisdom of putting in an overwhelming bowling side was demonstrated by the result of the only Test match played to a finish this year between England and Australia.

The wicket must have been in a cruel state and have crumbled to nothing after England had set Australia 416 runs to make to win, and the best of the Antipodean Batsmen could do nothing against the formidable bowling array up against them.

At Lunch yesterday, England had got to 430 for 9 and the last wicket fell shortly afterwards for the addition of half a dozen runs more.

Australia opened disastrously in their 2nd innings, Woodfull going when the score-sheet had only just been opened. Macartney fell almost immediately afterwards followed by Ponsford and Collins and the board showed 34 for 4 representing a truly ominous state of affairs. Sixty-three for 5 was the next item and then the debacle started in earnest and the whole side was dismissed, for 125, England thus winning by 289 runs, truly a notable triumph.

From the resumption players and spectators alike appeared to experience an overawing sense of the gigantic struggle. Rain overnight rendered the pitch a bowler's paradise and for once the luck of the game was all with England. Every ball required watching.

No paean of praise can be sung without reference to Hobbs and Sutcliffe's batting of the day before, when the pitch was still treacherous, and had England's opening pair failed, the four-hundred mark would never have been reached as the mediocre scores of the later batsmen provide ample testimony. Hobbs was faultless while Sutcliffe grimly stone-walled after a shaky start; nevertheless both helped to build the bulwarks which Australia failed to break down.

England beat Australia. Thus regaining the ashes, by 289 runs. The last Test Series won by England was in 1912.

The last match at the Oval was drawn in 1921.

Australia has now won 46, England 41.

By the wonderful victory yesterday England has now recovered the mythical "ashes", as it was the only match played to a finish this year.

In the Triangular Tournament of 1912 after 2 unfinished matches at Lords and Manchester, England beat Australia at Kennington Oval by the narrow margin of 24 runs.

servable in the more thickly settled regions. On the larger agricultural holdings, however, grain growing rather than dairying is a feature and beef production is still widely neglected.

The report, which was written by Lynn Ramsey, concludes by saying that "Argentina's great natural advantage for beef production and the magnitude of her unexploited resources, point clearly to the conclusion that production can be greatly increased with but a moderate increase in cost. The world demand for beef tends to increase and Argentina is in an advantageous position to supply the demand. The existence of an adequate future market for Argentina's surplus seems assured".

The report constitutes one of a series of studies of international commercial possibilities now being prepared.

The Imperial Conference which is due to begin on October 19 is already preoccupying the representatives of the countries which supply the British markets. They fear that the representatives of the colonies and the Dominions may try to force the Home Government to reopen the question of preferential tariffs for their products.

Mr. Winston Churchill declared recently in the House of Commons that the Imperial Conference will not discuss tariff questions, but interested parties recollect that in the former conference held in 1923 Great Britain broke with her traditional free-trade policy by according certain preferences.

"From that time", say critics, "the Dominions have constantly asked for preference to be amplified, recalling the sacrifices made by them in the war and adducing other arguments in support of their claims.

A prominent South American commented as follows: "From the South American point of view, and especially the Argentine, the most formidable competitor is Australia. Also it must be borne in mind that the Australian Prime Minister, Mr. Bruce, who is a man of great resource and prestige, will be present at the conference. Who knows what he may propose?"

"Optimists say that it is impossible to substitute Argentine produce for Australian, since the latter country's land is inferior and it is subject to prolonged and devastating droughts. South Africa suffers from a variety of plagues which greatly impede the improvement in the class of cattle there while Canada will prefer to send her surplus to the United States. They deduce from this that the United Kingdom cannot get her wants supplied by her colonies.

The less optimistic on the other hand, admit that a danger exists, in the future, especially from Australia, if preferential tariffs should be introduced. In that event, the Dominions in the supply of mutton, pork and dairy produce".

One of the weighty arguments which, it is believed, may incline the British government to prevent the discussion of tariffs at the conference, is the large amount of British capital invested in South America".

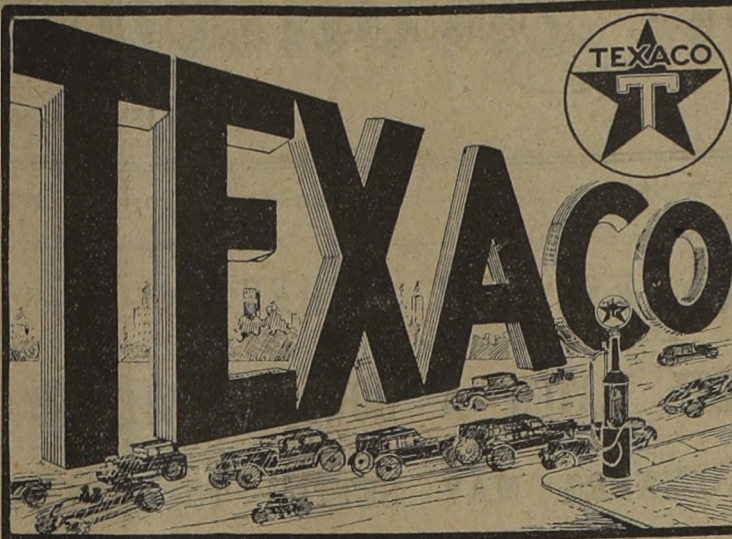

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RUHR COAL FIGURES.

Effect of the British Stoppage.

According to the official monthly tonnage production figures in the Ruhr mines, 9,209,841 tons of coal were produced in 24 1/8 working days in June, as against 8,336,680 tons in 24 working days in May. These figures represent the output of coal from the mines, and are not to be confused with export figures.

A working day consists of eight hours, and the German miner is paid for the time occupied underground. The actual number of hours which he works is roughly 6 1/2. Before the British strike, the Ruhr miner worked about 19 minutes longer than the British but if the British Eight Hour Act is brought into force the English miners' day will exceed that of the German by about 41 minutes. It must be taken into account, however, that the distances to be covered to and from the coal face are, on an average considerably longer in the Ruhr than in English mining districts.

The German wage-scale is complicated, and many subsidiary factors have to be considered. Roughly, however, the daily wage of the average miner is from 7 marks 5 pfennings to 8 marks 20 pfennings. With the usual allowances the figures work out at from 7 marks 45 pfennings to 8 marks 69 pfennings. Miners who work in water or are otherwise subjected to exceptional conditions are paid on a higher scale.

The number of tons of briquette produced in the Ruhr last month was 303,311, as compared with 283,145 in May. The coke output amounted to 1,644,755 tons, with a daily average of 54,825 tons. The pithead coal stocks in the Ruhr are now exhausted, but there are about 8,000,000 tons of coke still in stock. This is due to the fact that coke is but little exported, and the available supply in Germany far exceeds the demand. Nevertheless, coke has got to be produced, as the Rhenish-Westphalian Syndicate have many valuable contracts for delivering gas to municipalities and works.

THE RUHR EXPORT.

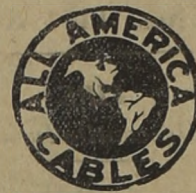
The British stoppage has not greatly increased the export of domestic coal from the Ruhr. The coals which the Rhenish-Westphalian Syndicate (the German selling organization) is exporting in greatest bulk are the good-quality industrial coals. Ever since the beginning of the British stoppage the question has been discussed whether the German miners and transport workers should refuse to aid in providing or dispatching coals for England. It would seem that the policy of the Ruhr workers in this respect is to support the ideal of solidarity, but at the same time to reap the greatest benefit possible from the present conditions. It is argued that the German workers cannot be expected to strike unless another general strike or a strike of transport workers be proclaimed in England. With regard to export, the miners and dockers profess to have no knowledge of the ultimate destination of the coal which they are producing or loading, since most of the coals are first sent to France or Holland, whence they are subsequently re-exported. The Ruhr transport workers recently made a show of refusing to load coal for Southern Ireland. When it was pointed out, however, that that country was now a free State and utterly dependent on foreign supplies no further difficulties were experienced.

These considerations, and also the fact that many thousands of tons of coal are reaching England from Poland, where labour is not sufficiently organized to come to terms with the German miners regarding a limitation of exports, militate against the taking of a definite course of action.

Opinion in the Ruhr is that the introduction of syndication and of a "rationalizing" process whereby poorly productive pits would be scrapped and overhead costs diminished is absolutely necessary before a complete rehabilitation of the English industry can be realized. It is hoped that some form of cooperation between England and Germany would then be evolved. Although the Ruhr industry is striving to obtain as many long duration contracts as possible, it is thought that for technical reasons affecting the consumer England will eventually regain nearly all her old markets. It is realized, however, that this is a process which must take many months and that the Ruhr will continue to enjoy the present "boom" for some time to come.

Apart from the coal industry, conditions in the Ruhr are materially improving, though manufacturers are reluctant to admit that any benefit has been derived from the British coal stoppage. Messrs. Krupp are at present carrying out a large contract (sublet by the North British Railway Company) for wheels and axles for the Egyptian railways. Neither this contract nor, the firm maintains, any other is a result of conditions in England. A recent report stated that Messrs. Krupp had cancelled a large number of dismissals that they were contemplating.

The cancellations, if any, had regard to Messrs. Krupp's mines, and not to the machine shop at Essen, where no alteration in the present scheme for reducing the staff has been possible. Messrs. Krupp are happy in that the Communists represent only about 4 per cent. of their staff. The Communist element in the Ruhr is still providing trouble. Minor riots are of frequent occurrence and propaganda is rife, though, owing to the recent improvement in industrial conditions, it is now chiefly of the purely political variety. The unemployment problem, however, which is still serious, offers plenty of scope.



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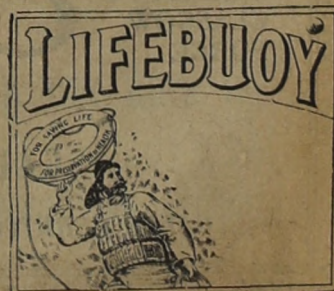

WILL THE COAL STRIKE NOW BE SETTLED.

The last cables on the Miners' Delegate Conference show that the miners are weakening considerably and in consequence a settlement should soon be reached once the Miners meet the Owners on an Equitable scheme for the adjustment of the present trouble.

The Miners must be prepared to seriously face the fact that the owners cannot and will not re-open the pits to run at a loss, and that they would far rather close them down altogether and cut the losses than continue till they are ruined.

The Miners on their side are entitled to an adjustment, but such adjustment must take production into account otherwise the future of the coal industry would be hopeless, and a patched up peace would not benefit the workers, owners or the nation as another impasse would be sure to arise in the near future.

The Owners are ready to accept the basis of a national instead of district settlements as desired by the Miners, Executive although it is well known at home that the Federation is not out to satisfy the workers but to secure nationalisation at any cost as a step to Socialism or even Communism in all industries.

As regards amalgamation of properties, the private owners are really better judges than the Government. The combination of coal mining with utilisation of coal cannot be best conducted by those who have built up and who understand the industry and all its multitudinous complications from A-Z.

The purchase of Royalties, subsidies and useless regulations which the Government will inevitably have to face with the Nationalisation of the Coal Mining Industry will be futile unless drastic action is also taken up by the Owners with the Government against intermediaries, such as Cook and Co., who will never allow themselves to be placated by any amount of concessions as they would then lose their jobs. Anyhow, to us the whole argument of the Miners' Executive appears most one-sided and like all other agreements between Labour and Capital is only binding on the other side.

PEEPS AT THE PAST

AUGUST 19.

ELIZABETH, ELECTRESS PALATINE.

Happiness such as rarely falls to the lot of crowned heads, might have been the portion of this lovely and interesting woman, had not a foolish ambition of being called a queen blighted in a moment the whole tenor of her life. The eldest child of James VI. of Scotland, she was born at the palace of Falkland, and when baptised, had for a sponsor the city of Edinburgh, in the proxies of its provost and bailies, who stoutly held to their right of seeing the princess brought up in the Protestant faith. When her father departed, in 1602, to take possession of the English throne, he left his consort and young family to follow him; and their progress through the counties was marked by festivals and pageants nearly as grand as those which had signalled the king's own progress. After a short stay at Windsor, it was deemed necessary that the little princess should be withdrawn from her father's palace and placed under the superintendence of Lord and Lady Harrington, at Combe Abbey. Very pleasant is the picture of the life led at this lovely spot, where beautiful gardens, aviaries, park, and river, charmed the eyes of those who had been accustomed, to the wild, desolate Scottish scenery. Many noble young ladies were sent to share in the education of Elizabeth, which seems to have been admirably conducted by Lord Harrington: a sincere Christian and learned man, he strove to instruct his pupil more thoroughly in life and its duties, than in mere outside show, and but for the lavish expenditure, arising from her generosity, which he could not subdue, we may say that he succeeded well.

At the age of fifteen, the young princess was removed to London, and proposals of marriage came from all the countries in Europe, France and Spain drew back, on the ground of religious differences, and at length Frederick V., Elector palatine, was the accepted suitor, who, though snubbed by the queen for his want of a kingly title, was yet the first in rank of the German princes, ruling those wide and fertile Rhenish Provinces which now form so valuable a part of the Prussian dominions. His reception in October 1612 was of a most joyous kind; water-processions, tiltines, masques, and feasts filled up the days, until the sad

death of Prince Henry threw the royal family into mourning. He and his sister had always been strongly attached, and his last words were for her. The opportunity was, however, given for her lover to offer his best consolations, and the deep attachment formed at this period was never abated during the many trials of their married life. St. Valentine's Day was appropriately chosen for the marriage ceremony; the first royal one that had ever been performed according to the liturgy of the Church of England. James's vanity induced him to load himself on this joyous occasion with six hundred thousand pounds worth of jewels, and the bride's white satin dress was embroidered with pearls and gems, and her coronet set in pinnacles of diamonds and pearls. Having taken a sad farewell of her parents, whom she was never to see again, she sailed to Flushing, and proceeded on a sort of triumphal march through Holland and Germany, arriving at her beautiful palace of Heidelberg amidst arches of flowers and hearty welcomes from her subjects. Frederick lifted her over the threshold in his arms, according to old German custom, and introduced her to his mother and relatives in rooms furnished with solid silver. The great tun of wine stood on the terrace, and was twice drunk dry by the scholars, soldiers, and citizens, who dined in the meadows beneath, by the banks of the Neckar. For six years this happy couple reigned in equal prosperity and popularity. Three lovely children rejoiced their parents' hearts; when the Bohemians roused to insurrection by the oppression of the emperor of Germany, offered their crown to Frederick.

Very thankful would the Elector have been to decline such a desperate venture as that of matching his strength with the Imperial forces; but Elizabeth urged him on with the question, 'Why he had married a king's daughter, if he dreaded being a king?' The stadtholder, Maurice, was on her side of the question; while the Electress-Dowager supported her son. Maurice one day abruptly asked the Electress-Dowager: 'If there were any green baize to be got in Heidelberg?' 'Yes, surely,' answered she; 'but what for, Maurice?' 'To make a fool's cap for him who might be a king and will not!' was the reply of Maurice. Thus overcome, Frederick signed the acceptance of the ancient crown of Bohemia, and in October he and his family made a ceremonial entry into the old city of Prague, where Taborites, Hussites, Lutherans, and Catholics were soon at daggers-drawing with each other and their chosen sovereign. The Spanish army immediately seized on Heidelberg and the Palatinate, whilst the Duke of Bavaria's cannon boomed over the Weissenberg, and his soldiers descended on Prague. The unfortunate king assisted his wife into the carriage in which she had to fly for her life, saying: 'Now I know what I am. We princes seldom hear the truth until we are taught it by adversity'. The Catholics broke out into songs of exultation. Mr. Floyd, a member of parliament in England, was expelled from the House, branded, and flogged, for repeating a squib, that the king's daughter fled from Prague like an Irish beggar-woman with her babe at her back. Placards were fixed on the walls of Brussels, offering a reward for 'a king run-away a few days since, of adolescent age, sanguine colour, middle height, a cast in one of his eyes, no moustache, only down in his lip, not badly disposed when a stoic kingdom did not lie in his way — his name, Frederick'. Henceforth this royal pair, with their large family of little princesses and princesses, were on indebted to charity for a home.

By the kindness of the States-General, Elizabeth found refuge at the Hague. She maintained a brave heart, indulged in her favourite sport of hunting, and seemed to suffer little from the difficulties and privations incidental to a life of penury. Her dejected husband was generally with the armies which were desolating Germany during the fearful Thirty Years' War, until death carried him away in 1632, at a distance from his loving wife, in the castle of Mentz; sorrow at witnessing the miseries of his people broke his heart when but thirty-six years of age. The sad tidings were wholly unexpected by his poor widow, and for three days she was unable to speak; her brother, Charles I., showed her great sympathy and kindness, allowing her £20,000 a year.

and begging her to come to him. This she declined; but her two elder sons, Prince Charles and Rupert, spent much time at the English court, until the former was once more settled in a part of the Palatinate.

Elizabeth occupied herself with the education of her daughters and younger sons, until the troubles began in England, when two of her sons, including 'the fiery Rupert', joined their unfortunate uncle. The close of the struggle with the death of Charles, threw the Electress at once into deep grief, and something like want, for her English pension necessarily ceased. Her court, nevertheless became a refuge for the persecuted loyalists, whilst her kind, affectionate temper, made her friends among all sects and parties. Louisa, one of her daughters, shewed such talent for painting, that her pictures were often disposed of to assist the needy household; this clever woman afterwards became a nun at Chaillot, much to her mother's sorrow.

The restoration in 1660, brought a last ray of hope to the sorrowful life of Elizabeth. She longed to see her native country, once more; and when her nephew, the king, declared his inability to bear the expense of a state-visit, she determined to come incognito, to her generous friend, Lord Craven, who offered her his house in Drury Lane. We soon hear of her entering into the gaieties of London, and being the first lady of the court; £12,000 a year was settled upon her, and happiness seemed in store; but in less than a year after her arrival, inflammation of the lungs attacked her, and she died on the eve of St. Valentine's Day, just forty-nine years after she had been made a happy bride, and was buried at Westminster Abbey, with a torchlight procession on the Thames. Of her seven sons, not one left a grandson; and it was through her youngest daughter, Sophia, that the present royal family came to the British throne.

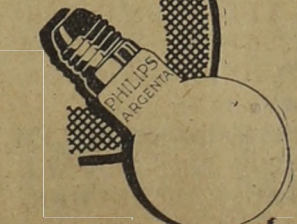

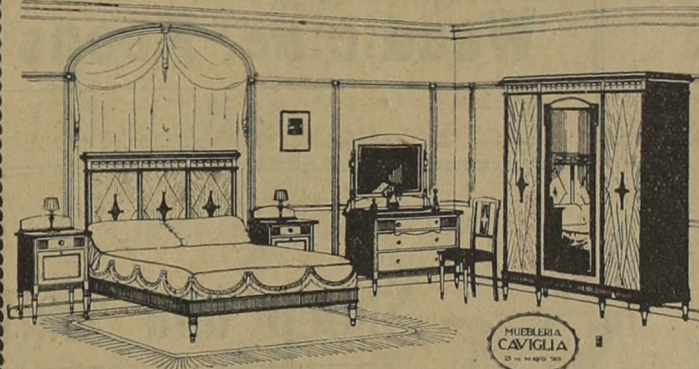

"LLOYD'S: YESTERDAY AND TO - DAY."

It has often been suggested that the alleged "seven wonders of the world," as handed down from age to age, stand in need of drastic revision. They certainly do, for among these traditional marvels Lloyd's finds no place, though its fame is widespread as the ocean; and among beneficent commercial institutions which spread civilisation and further the intercourse of nations the Corporation of Lloyd's has no peer. Over two and a half centuries have elapsed since its foundation was well and truly laid in a humble London coffee-house. The intervening years have been marked by the steady development of its activities, the maintenance of its high and honourable traditions; and such an expanded business as can no longer be conducted conveniently within the historic precincts of the Royal Exchange. While the magnificent domicile which the Corporation is building is rapidly coming into being and public attention is focussed upon the approaching new era in the history of the institution, we have, in deference to the wishes of many of our readers and of the marine insurance world generally, published a new edition of "Lloyd's: Yesterday and To-day". The previous editions are, of course, exhausted, and as the book is officially recommended for the use of students, who are required to have a knowledge of the origin and development of the present Lloyd's a new issue became still more imperative. The author, Mr. H. M. Grey has added some new and interesting matter and has dealt in greater detail with the various causes which ultimately led to the abolition of monopoly in marine insurance. Additional illustrations have also been included, thus enhancing the general attractiveness of the volume. The plan followed is very simple; the opening chapter deals with "Early Days," and then the "Rise of Lloyd's" is sketched. Following this there is a convincing section treating of the present-day activities of the Corporation. The account of the "Room," too, and the work which is there carried on is very appealing; while the chapter on "Insurance Frauds" shows underwriters have from time to time been regarded as fair game by unscrupulous insurers, that Nemesis in the shape of the strong arm of the law frequently overtook these would-be swindlers, and, incidentally, those who practise marine insurance are, in the majority of cases, very unlike the conies which are proverbially "feeble folk." The author, in his description of the early days of Lloyd's, says that when Edward Lloyd opened his coffee-house, marine insurance was a regular and common business of the day among the merchants of the City. The rendezvous was largely patronised by sea captains, owners and others whose business lay with shipping, and therefore it was understandable, cargoes and freights being settled there, that the business of insuring them should also be transacted. Underwriters would congregate in order to glean information respecting vessels in which they were interested, and thus all the requirements for the conduct of marine insurance were present. In 1692 he removed his establishment to a position nearer the centre of the commercial life of the City, and though this change of venue entailed some loss of custom from seafarers, the support of merchants more than compensated. The tavern soon attracted a considerable clientele, especially as frequent sales by "inch of candle" took place. Under this method of auction a pin was thrust through a candle about an inch from the top, and bidding went on until it was burnt to the pin and the last bidder was declared the purchaser.

Pepys has the following mention of such a sale in his "Diary": "To our office, where we met, for the sale of two ships by an inch of candle, where I observed how they do invite one another, and at last how they all do cry, and we have much to do to tell who did cry last. The ships were the 'Indian,' sold for £1,300, and 'Half Moore,' sold for £830." Some idea of the quaint figures cut by the habits of Lloyd's will be gained from the illustration of a scene in Lloyd's Coffee House. Though a caricature, it is very suggestive of the times, with its wigs and its quaint costumes and headgear. The news, too, which is in circulation, while evidently favourable to some, plainly spells misfortune to others of the company. In the chapter dealing with the "Rise of Lloyd's" it is noticeable that the institution has been peculiarly fortunate in the public and patriotic spirit of many of its leading members—a feature which is common to every stage of its development. Thus, going back to 1803, we find that Sir Francis Baring and Mr. Julius Angerstein, a reproduction from a painting of whom is included in the illustrations, were responsible

for the resolutions which was then unanimously agreed breathes that spirit of charitable endeavour which has ever been characteristic of the Corporation. Lloyd's backed this appeal with £20,000, as an example to others, and when the accounts were finally made up in 1826 about £630,000 had been collected. The fund was revived during the Crimean War, and has consistently carried on the work so eloquently outlined at the preliminary meeting.

Each of its succeeding chairmen has left his imprimatur upon this excellent phase of Lloyd's activities, and we may mention in this connection Mr. Percy Janson, our "Headlight" in this issue of "The Syren and Shipping," who has been the chairman since 1915. Much interest centres in the author's description of the "Room," concerning which we are told that Lloyd's is virtually a club, and therefore open only to members. Subscribers may, of course, introduce friends to show them round, but the presence of strangers is not encouraged. The visitor mentions to the janitor the name of the member he wishes to see, and this is repeated to the "caller," who stands in a kind of pulpit with a sounding-board in the large Underwriting Room and who sings out the name in bell-like, stentorian tones. Assuredly, the author writes, an exceptionally good pair of lungs is needed to make one's voice heard above the noise and bustle which fills the place, and catch the ears of those at the far end of the room where the huge clock and anemometer are faithfully recording the flight of time and the variations of the wind. The "Room" is not too well ventilated, and we are told the atmosphere frequently becomes oppressively close towards the end of the afternoon, when the Reading Room, with which it communicates, affords a welcome retreat. The Captains' Room, which was once the meeting place of mercantile commanders, is now chiefly used as a dining-room. Other interesting appendages of the "Room" are the Claims and Signing Bureau, which have materially assisted in simplifying the business operations conducted at Lloyd's "Lloyd's: Yesterday and To-day" is quite clear on a matter which is the subject of much misapprehension, viz., the liability of the Corporation in regard to policies issued by its individual members. The author points out that the corporate affairs of the society, as distinguished from the underwriting transactions of the members, are managed by the Committee of Lloyd's. This body investigates very carefully the status and financial position of every candidate nominated, and the vote is taken by ballot. Underwriting members are required to deposit with the committee such security for their liabilities as is thought necessary, and this remains in their custody. These securities amount to over £4,000,000, and are exclusive of the guarantees insisted upon by the Board of Trade. This method is evidential of the great care which is taken to ensure the perpetuity of the good name of Lloyd's. On such and all other matters appertaining to the history and operation of this great institution the reader will find "Lloyd's: Yesterday and To-day" a mine of reliable information, reference to which is simplified by a copious index.

ROYALTY AND CHEESE.

Queen Mary revealed a woman's horror of "ripe" cheese when she and King George were inspecting a dairy exhibition at Reading. "I like those," said the king, pointing to a pile of mildewed cheeses.

"I don't," said the queen, shuddering. "They are full of bugs!" The exhibitor explained that the "bugs" were simply mould, cultivated on some cheese to give it flavor.

A MAN KNITTING CHAMPION.

Lord Gainford, Baron of Headlam, one of England's largest coal owners, is also England's champion male knitter.

Whenever there is a knitting circle or competition of any consequence in any part of the island, Lord Gainford is usually present.

Retiring from the presidency of the Board of Education in 1915, this wealthy coal baron applied for, and was granted a political pension of \$6,000 a year. He gave the pension up under public pressure, but a few months later was appointed Postmaster General.

Later he retired to the quietness of the House of Lords, where he has frequently been spokesman for the mine owners. It is understood that Lord Gainford still knits.

RADIO RECEIPTS.

Radio fans in England paid nearly £1,000,000 for the privilege of listening-in last year.

Revenue to the British Broadcasting Company from the collections of \$2.50 each from citizens possessing sets increased more than \$350,000 last year over the previous year. There are now 1,965,000 licensed sets in England. Nearly 300 persons were prosecuted for failing to pay the fee.

THE KING'S CLOTHES.

King George has never been able to oust his son, the Prince of Wales, as unofficial dictator of Englishmen's fashions.

Although many of the 'old school' still carefully watch any changes that the King makes in his wardrobe, the youth of England copies, as nearly as possible, the styles dictated by what the Prince wears.

The King still makes all of his public appearances with his trousers very neatly creased—but at the sides.

Bond Street has long since given up its attempts to introduce the side crease. Several years ago the "man about town" did adopt the fashion for a short time, but it was not generally accepted by the public and, consequently, passed out as quickly as it had come in.

The Prince is everywhere accepted as the best dressed man in London and always appears in perfect dress. His clothes are never gaudy, although he frequently appears with clothes of the more conservative "brightness." When not carrying a stick, he nearly always carries a tightly wrapped umbrella over his arm.

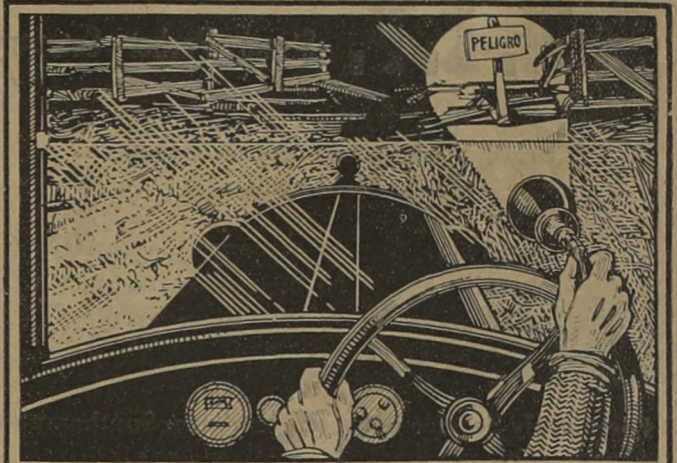

DR. LUIS ALBERTO DE HERRERA

We are sorry to report that the President of the Consejo Nacional is ill, and that while his illness is not serious, it is reported that he will have to keep to his bed for a few days.

We hope soon to be able to report his complete recovery.

RURAL DWELLINGS.

We notice in the report of the proceedings of the Consejo Nacional on Tuesday, that it was decided to offer a special prize for the competition which is being held for plans for rural economic dwellings.

The well known deplorable conditions of the dwellings used at the present time by thousands of rural labourers, who inhabit picturesque but anything but sanitary "ranchos" makes it necessary for Government as well as private enterprise to do all possible to foment any plans which may tend to a betterment of the living conditions of a large part of the population.

GENERAL O'BRIEN.

General O'Brien, who will be remembered by many of our readers, as United States Minister in this Country some years ago, has arrived by the S.S. "Southern Cross". We understand that General O'Brien has come out in order to study financial conditions in this Country.

POLICE HEADQUARTERS.

The Chief of Police, Sr. Juan Carlos Gomez Folle, has ordered that the Police headquarters at calle 18 de Julio corner of Cuareim, may be visited by the public on the 25th inst., from 9 to 12.30, and from 2.30 to 5.30 p. m.

The building which at one time was the residence of President Santos, and was noted in those days for its magnificence, has now been reno-

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vated and alternations made to adapt it to police requirements.

The police officials will be at their respective posts in order to provide the public with such information as may be solicited, with regard to the organization of their respective sections.

RIO NEGRO IN FLOOD.

It is reported that the Rio Negro has been rising in an extraordinary manner, so that the Rambla at Mercedes is entirely under water, and riverside dwellers have had to leave their homes, many of them being temporarily housed by the local Police. It is supposed that the flood will cause considerable damage to the Rambla.

Liga de Defensa Comercial.

Usual weekly session of the Council was held on Monday, the following members being present: Barreiro, Pesquera, Peyrou, Ruvertoni, Sanguinetti, Scarsi and Vilaró, Sr. Rubio presiding, and Sr. Serratosa acting as Secretary.

Communications were read and routine matters disposed of.

It was decided to request the Government to take measures to suppress smuggling which is being effected on the Uruguay River, and across the northern frontier.

Sr. Rubio was appointed to replace Sr. Galimberti on the Committee appointed by the Government for the study of the projected scheme for pensions to employees and workmen of commercial and industrial firms.
