COOK DECLARES COAL OWNERS OUT TO SMASH MINERS' FEDERATION

EUROPE TO BE COMBED FOR CONTRIBUTIONS TO STRIKE FUNDS.

Britain Opposes Tangier Question Being Taken up By League of Nations.

BUMPER HARVEST EXPECTED THROUGHOUT BRITAIN

Cobham Wins Aero-Derby Melbourne-Return Flight To Start Twenty-Fifth

(Special Service By The United Press)

COOK ACCUSES OWNERS OF TRYING TO SMASH THE MINERS' FEDERATION.

LONDON, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—A. J. Cook told the Press to-day that the Coal Owners are trying to smash the Miners' Federation and create dissension and division in the ranks by offering better conditions locally over short periods and even endeavouring to abolish district associations.

"The policy of the owners said Mr. Cook 'is to create both nationally and locally anarchy and confusion.' But Mr. Cook declared that it had only served to bring the Entire Trade Union movement back into favour with the miners.

He further declared that the T. U. C. had decided to send a delegation all over Europe to seek contributions for the miners.

FATAL POLO ACCIDENT.

DEAUXVILLE, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Colonel Sherman Harjes died at Deauxville as the result of a fall while playing polo. The late Colonel was a partner in the Morgan Harjes Bank of Paris.

COBHAM WINS AERO-DERBY.

MELBOURNE, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Alan Cobham won the Aero-Derby at the Essendon Aerodrome to-day. He intends to begin his return flight to London on the 25th.

ROUND SOUTH AMERICA FLIGHT.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (U.P.)—The United States War Department announces that five Army planes will attempt a flight around South America within a few months. The route details will be announced later.

BRITAIN ASKS LEAGUE TO LEAVE TANGIER QUESTION ALONE.

LONDON, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—The Sunday Times learns that Britain has opposed the League of Nations considering the Tangier question. Britain contends that the question should be considered outside of the League, when all the signatories to the Act in the Algeiras could be consulted.

VALENTINO SUFFERS A RELAPSE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—Rudolph Valentino the Italian Cine Star suffered a relapse to-day owing to the infection spreading along the abdominal walls causing considerable discomfort. The bulletin adds that there is no cause for anxiety at present.

BRITAIN EXPECTS BUMPER HARVEST.

LONDON, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—The Minister for Agriculture in an interview with the United Press forecasted a bumper crop throughout Britain this year. The Minister stated "Everything points to a harvest well above the average for the past decade."

THE COLLISION IN THE PLATE

The Collision between the Tanker "Tiburcio", and the Lamport and Holt meater "Molere" in the neighbourhood of Punta Indio, has proved to be more serious than was at first supposed.

The "Molere" was cut from deck to hold by the impact and driven out of the channel into the shallow water where she now lies aground with No. 2 Hold full of water. It will take a very high tide to refloat her as she is down pretty low by the bow. The "Tiburcio" managed to proceed on her way to Buenos Aires where she is now docked.

THE GENEVA PRESS

CONFERENCE.

GENEVA, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—The Press Commission unanimously adopted a resolution for recognising the property rights of news, but in including Roy Howard's exception relative to the unexclusive character of official news emanating from Government or State Institutions cannot be made the subject of any exclusiveness whatever, but on the contrary all information obtained by private initiative of newspaper or press agencies must be considered private property. The conference adopted Roy Howard's resolution requesting all Governments to transmit their despatches to all Newspaper Agen-

cies without giving priority to any one.

It was also resolved that the Governments be requested to abolish censorship in times of peace. The Commission then adjourned.

H. M. S. "COLOMBO" LEAVES RIO.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—H. M. S. "Colombo" left to-day en route for Montevideo and Buenos Aires.

POLITE PIRATES.

HONG KONG, Aug. 19 (U.P.)—Pirates who boarded a Standard Oil Company steamer near Talung in the Canton delta forcibly removed 3,000 cases of oil which they transported to waiting cargo boats. The pirates disappeared in their own vessels.

The tanker's crew was not molested. The pirate chief handed his personal card to the captain upon taking his leave. The Canton Government has dispatched troops to search for the pirates.

THE NEW MESIAH? — LEAVES FOR NEW YORK.

SOUTHAMPTON, Aug. 19 (U.P.)—Krishnamurti, styled by his clique the "New Messiah", and Anne Bosant, leaders of the "Order" of the Star of the East, embarked to-day for New York.

TENNIS

SUZANNE FEELS THE SQUEEZE.

SAINT MORITZ, Aug. 21 (U.P.)—The German Tennis Federation to-day barred Lenglen from participating in the local Tournament on the grounds that she is now a professional, as the result of her contract with Pyle the Promoter.

THE ANTI-MEXICAN PLOT.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 19 (U.P.)—Walter Carr, the head of the local Immigration Bureau has left for San Diego to investigate the status of all those arrested in the Estrada plot. He intends to order the deportation of aliens who, however, may appeal for permission to remain as political refugees.

It is reported that Government investigators have definitely linked De la Huerta with Estrada's attempt. Friends of the former, who was last known to be at San Antonio, predicted weeks ago that he would make a move against President Calles on the first favourable opportunity.

The Municipal authorities at the border town of Colimico, California, have petitioned the state for 500 soldiers to safeguard against revolutionary groups that are reported to be gathering along the frontier.

Meanwhile, the Mexican authorities at Mexicali are reported to have ordered a battalion to reinforce the Mexican side of the line.

It is understood that the Federal authorities have requested additional frontier guards for the purpose of coping with alleged widespread anti-Mexican revolutionary movements along the border. It is said that the second up last Sunday of General Estrada and a small contingent of followers armed and supplied with motor trucks with which to cross the border into Mexico is but a small element of a broader organisation.

PRINCE RUSPOLI MURDERED.

ROME, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

Prince Umberto Ruspoli, scion of one of the oldest Roman families, was murdered this morning by a thief whom the prince discovered in the act of robbing his farmhouse at Genzano.

Ruspoli attempted to apprehend the intruder but the thief quickly drew a revolver and fired point-blank at the prince, killing him instantly. Buspoli's chief hunter rushed to the spot and fired at the fleeing thief, whom he succeeded in wounding. Despite the fact he escaped from the farmhouse, the thief was captured later this morning and put in prison.

The murder created an enormous sensation in Rome and neighbourhood owing to Ruspoli's illustrious name. He was colonel of grenadiers, retired. He was decorated for conspicuous bravery during the late war. Many Roman families connected with that of the prince, are in mourning for his death.

Ruspoli's body to-day lay in state at the Genzano town hall. The bier was surrounded by an immense quantity of flowers.

The murderer is 17 years of age.

COAL PRODUCTION IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Aug. 19.

According to official statistics, the coal production in the Ruhr last month amounted to 10,100,000 tons as compared with 9,200,000 in June, and that in Silesia to 1,500,000 as against 1,300,000 tons.

THE KITCHENER MYTH.

LONDON, Aug. 19.

The "Daily Sketch" publishes an article over the signature of Mr. Singleton Gates, confessing that he together with "Frank Power" invented the story of finding the body of Lord Kitchener.

Gates asserts that their intention was to advertise a motion-picture entitled "How Kitchener was betrayed", in which Frank Power is interested.

NOTTINGHAM MINERS RETURN TO PITS.

MANSFIELD, NOTTS, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

Between 12,000 and 14,000 miners broke away from the Miners' Federation when they accepted the Bolsover Colliery Company's offer of the same wages as before the stoppage for a 7 1/2 hour day. Meanwhile the other Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire collieries are posting notices of similar terms.

LONDON, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

The number of miners returning to work is increasing. It is estimated that between 17,000 and 20,000 are working in the pits to-day.

ANOTHER BIG DIAMOND RUSH

JOHANNESBURG, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

One hundred and twenty women in running suits and bathing costumes participated in a diamond rush near Elandsputte. The runners, massed fifteen and twenty deep. Included sprinters who ran in University races, an ex-Olympic champion and many South African record holders. The rush is the greatest in the history of South Africa. It is estimated that to-night's population at the new diggings amounts to 50,000 including natives. Water costs pence a barrel. rel.

ARGENTINE ACTRESS.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

Berta Singerman, the famous Argentine actress was given an ovation at the Esmeranza Iris theatre to-night, when she recited selections of Argentine poetry.

THE COAL STRIKE.

LONDON, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

Prior to the report of the failure of the coal negotiations the miners' leaders said to the correspondent of the United Press, "We have nothing to offer to the owners beyond the clear and emphatic declaration that we stand exactly where we did at first. Now we shall ask the owners where they stand."

It is reported without confirmation, however, that the coal owners ruled the question of a national agreement, out of the discussion.

The miners' leaders meet to-morrow morning to discuss further plans. Meanwhile they have issued a statement urging the miners to stiffen resistance and appealing to the public for help, declaring that surrender would mean "object poverty and the lowering of the standard of living for at least a generation."

It is declared that the miners have offered to discuss a revision of wages provided that means for reorganising the coal industry are first discussed.

BOLIVIAN LOAN.

LONDON, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

It is understood that the Bolivian loan of £2,500,000 will be issued in the London market shortly.

GOLD FOR SOUTH AMERICA

LONDON, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

The Bank of England bulletin announces the export of 10,000 sovereigns to Argentina, 5,000 to Uruguay and 10,000 to Spain.

THE GRECO-BRITISH DEBT.

LONDON, Aug. 19 (U.P.)

It is reported that the formulation of new proposals by Greece to settle the Greece-British debt on the basis of either £250,000 or £300,000 annually are likely to be viewed more favourably by the Treasury than was M. Venizelos's offer in June of annual payments of £150,000 over 62 years. It is possible that the Treasury may concede Greece's proposals to pay first and second annuities of £150,000 and afterwards £250,000 or more.

It is pointed out that the total debt acknowledged by Greece is £20,710,312 and that negotiations broke down in June after the attempt made by M. Venizelos, at the request of General Pungalos to settle because the Greek government virtually asked for the debt to be cancelled against the Greek losses in the offensive against Mustafa Kemal, which the Greek press alleged was instigated more by Mr. Lloyd George than by any desire of Greece to attack Turkey.

Wall Street commission houses report that Dempsey is a 2 to 1 favourite to defeat Gene Tunney. It is stated that the definite assignment of the bout to Philadelphia has increased the betting. Ten thousand dollars were wagered yesterday.

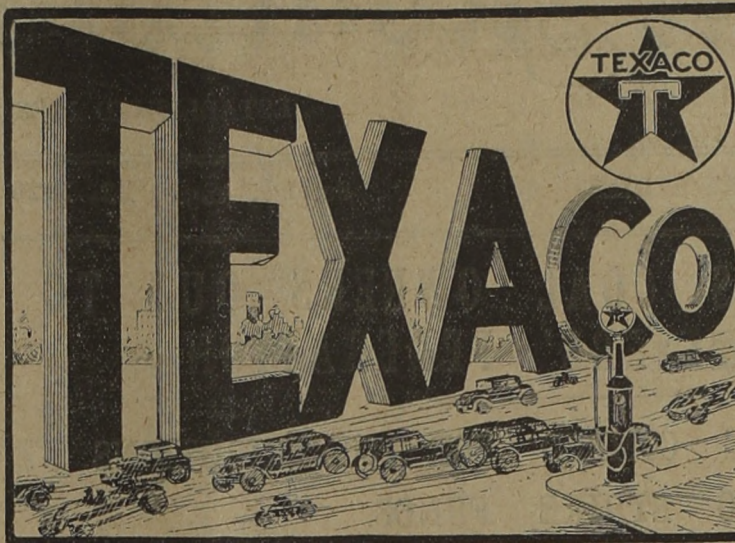
THE ARGENTINE TEAM.

DZERZHINSKY.

Organizer of the Red Terror.

With the death of Dzerzhinsky, which is reported on another page, one of the most important and the most sinister figures of the small coterie who rule Soviet Russia disappears from the scene. A Pole by origin, a revolutionary by profession, he was imprisoned and exiled under the Imperial régime, and stood out among the multitude of revolutionaries by reason of his cold tenacity of purpose and concentration of will. He became a close associate of Lenin during the years preceding the Revolution, and, accepting generally his leader's theories, he devoted himself specially to the technique of ensuring control over ignorant or distracted masses.

After the Bolsheviks seizure of power in November, 1917, he organized the chief instrument of his purpose, the so-called Committee for Combating Counter-Revolution and Speculation, generally known as the Tcheka, and renamed in later years the G.P.U. His organizing power, his personal incorruptibility, and his fanatical determination to destroy all who might be suspected of being enemies of the Revolution enabled him to create an appalling machine of terror, which murdered many thousands, often after horrible torture, and struck, through corruption, wholesale espionage, and sudden raids, a paralysing fear into the population of Russia. It was through this devastating fear that the Soviet coterie were able to maintain and confirm their power in the most difficult years. That a man who, by all accounts was personally honest and ever acted for his own private advantage should systematically use every means of bribery, corruption, intimidation, and betrayal in the interests of a campaign of wholesale and cruel murder is perhaps, a psychological riddle, but is, at the same time, an explanation of his power.

In later years Dzerzhinsky was employed by the Soviet Government on various missions in which ruthless decision was considered necessary — the purging of the railway administration, for instance, and the speeding up of industry. He rarely engaged in party conflicts or engaged in political initiative. To the end he was a fanatical instrument of destruction, carefully calculating on every element of human weakness or carelessness, hypnotizing his prey and then putting an end to it.

Dzerzhinsky's strongest conviction was that class-war means extermination. His personal honesty raised him above the weaknesses of many of his fellow-commissars. A correspondent thus described him in these columns in the summer of 1919:—

He can never be bribed, or assuaged, or talked round, or adulated into lenience. Torquemada himself might have envied those stern eyes, burning with fanatical hatred, those thin, ascetic, bloodless lips, that pale brow, those resourceful brains, enhancing the scourge of cruelty by the scourge of honesty. If the temple of universal happiness is to be cemented by blood and erected on an enormous pyramid of mutilated corpses, then, indeed, Dzerzhinsky is the only man to be entrusted with laying out its foundations.

The All-Russian Extraordinary Commission was established chiefly to combat counter-revolutionary activities, and Dzerzhinsky showed remarkable organizing ability in extending its ramifications by means of local commissions throughout Russia, and thus creating a Terror from whose sudden stroke no one, save possibly Lenin, could count himself exempt. He enrolled an enormous staff, which included not only coroners, magistrates, policemen, warders, experts, detectives, and executioners, but also hosts of secret agents, spies, and agents provocateurs, working not only in Russia but also in England and many other countries. All these creatures had to be extravagantly paid, chiefly by the proceeds of requisitions and confiscations from persons accused of "speculation".

THE DUKE AND THE YEOMEN

Surprises for Americans at London Spectacle.

Many American visitors were enthralled by the time-honoured spectacle of the annual inspection of the Yeomen of the Guard on the lawn of St. James's Palace. They saw the hundreds of bearded and stalwart figures, radiant in the crimson and gold of their Tudor costumes, with the gold and silver of their pikes touched by sunlight, lined up on the green sward as the Duke of Connaught arrived in Fieldmarshal's blue frock uniform at noon. The band of the Welsh Guards played the National Anthem as the Duke arrived, while the Yeomen gave the royal salute.

Some of the Americans had wandered in, unchallenged and ticketless. Their surprise at such an easy entrance to the grounds of a royal palace was only equal to their amazement when a tiny girl in pale green silk frolicked unhindered in front of the parade to the music of the band.

WHOSE HAND?

It is a significant fact that the burning of Mount Annan the day before yesterday coincided with the rupture of the settlement conference between the Miners Delegates and the owners, and it seems pretty evident that arson is one of the weapons introduced into our hitherto unbarbarous England for the purpose of reprisal against owners, capitalists and aristocrats generally. The hand of the Soviet is not hard to trace in these reprisals for they savour greatly of the destructive principles of Communism.

The aristocracy as a political power is no more — therefore, they need not consider it any more from that point of view, is the present theory of the Communists. But as landowners they are still dangerous to them because their independent existence is ensured through their resources. Therefore, it is essential for the Communists at all costs, to deprive the aristocracy of their lands, by the foulest means to hand.

During the last 18 months thirty-one old houses belonging to the English Aristocracy have been burnt out, together with the many treasures they contained in pictures, furniture, etc., which are irreplaceable from the point of view both of beauty and of value. Even if these houses were all insured for sums far above their actual monetary value, their loss is irreparable. They stood for the fine old tradition of gracious English hospitality and dignity, and they cannot be estimated in terms of a fire insurance policy.

There is nothing left to tell what caused these fires, so disastrous in their results. Fire, indeed, destroys all clues, and leaves no record of its origin behind it. Various suggestions have been made in the papers as to the possible causes of these mansion fires (as they are called), but none of them seems very probable. The suggestion that they are caused by cigarette ends thrown about by careless inmates or visitors seems the least likely of all. Do hotel visitors never throw cigarette ends about? As to the alleged defective or careless wiring of thirty years or so back, were these houses all wired at that unfortunate period, or were they the only buildings then done? Were no churches, theatres, clubs, colleges,

hotels wired at that time? Why are these fires confined to the class which pays the most taxes, and indeed bears the heaviest end of the national burden? It may be argued that these fires take place in all parts of the country, and even simultaneously. It is not many months since it was reported that enemy agents were stationed in every town and city throughout England each having instructions how to act when the call for action came. The war forced up rates and taxes. But that is, after all, a slow method of attack. To strike at the actual "resources" of income of the capitalists is both a quicker and a surer method of destruction. Tools fit and ready to carry out the actual work of destruction are easy to find, for there is a type of mentality that delights in destructiveness.

And then an attempt is made to surround these mansion fires with "mystery" when it is obvious to the veriest tyro—whose hand is really behind it all—and if we were asked the question we should unhesitatingly plump for A. J. Cook, as the Communist and Soviet Agent General in chief in England, whose dirty money he uses for the same foul purposes as those by which it was originally accumulated.

PEEPS AT THE PAST

AUGUST 22.

THE BATTLE OF BOSWORTH.

The 22d of August 1485 was an important day for England, not merely in putting an end to the reign and the life of a usurper and murderer, whose rule was a disgrace to it, but in finally freeing it from the civil contentions comprehended under the title of the Wars of the Roses. It must, after all, be admitted that the atrocious Crookback somewhat redeemed his life by the way he ended it. It was worthy of his brave race, and of the pretensions he had set up, that he should perish in the thick of a fight which was to conclude his dynasty.

On the other hand, the gallant adventure of Henry of Richmond in landing with only two thousand Frenchmen to fight his way to the English crown, his stout struggle at Bosworth, and the picturesque incident of Stanley picking up Richard's crown, and placing it on the brows of Henry on the battle-field, raise expectations with which the subsequent events are somewhat out of harmony.

It should be more borne in mind

than it is, that the first of the Tudor sovereigns was a Welsh noble, and owed much to the friendship of his warm-blooded countrymen. He was particularly indebted to the men of Pembrokeshire, his native county. At the time of the battle of Tewkesbury, Henry was a boy at Pembroke Castle, but this place not being thought one of safety, he was removed by his uncle, Jasper, Earl of Pembroke, to Tenby. Here he was received with much hospitality by the mayor, John White, who secretly conveyed him to Brittany in one of his own vessels. Afterwards, when he returned, it was at Milford he landed, marching thence to meet the bloody and usurping boar at Bosworth-field. Henry, upon coming to the throne, was not unmindful of the assistance he had received. He rewarded the mayor of Tenby with a lease, at a nominal rent, of all the crown-lands about that town; a good recompense, says the historian of Pembrokeshire, 'to one man for a good deed done to the whole realm'.

The treacherous Stanley may have placed the crown upon Richmond's head on Bosworth field, but the hand that virtually crowned him was that which dealt the gallant Richard his death-wound. According to Welsh tradition, the deed was done by Rhys ap Thomas, commonly called 'the valiant Welshman'. This hero of the principality came of a warlike stock. His grandfather fell fighting for the white rose, at Mortimer's Cross; his father was murdered as he lay spent and wounded by the side of the corpse of David Gough, whom he had killed in single-combat. Rhys himself was brought up at the court of Philip of Burgundy, and did credit to his knightly training. The death of his two elder brothers, killed in some petty border skirmishes, left him the representative of his race, and lord of the greater part of Carmarthenshire. During the latter part of Edward IV's reign, and through the minority of his successor, the Welsh chieftain occupied himself in training his tenantry in the art of war, that he might be ready for the troublous times he foresaw must come.

Of the part he played in the battle of Bosworth, his biographer gives the following account: 'While the avant-guards were in hot chase, the one of the other, King Richard held not his hands in his pockets; but, grinding and gnashing his teeth, up and down he goes in quest of Richmond, whom, no sooner espying, than he makes at him, and, by the way, in his fury, manfully overthrew Sir William Brandon, the earl's standard bearer, as also Sir John Cheney, both men of mighty force and known va-

liancy. In Wales we say, that Rice ap Thomas, who from the beginning closely followed the earl, and ever had an eye to his person, seeing his party begin to quail, and the king's to gain ground, took the occasion to send unto Sir William Stanley, giving him to understand the danger they were in, and entreating him to join his forces for the disengaging of the earl, who was not only in despair of victory, but almost of his life. Whereupon (for it seems he understood not the danger before) Sir William Stanley made up to Rice ap Thomas, and joining both together, rushed in upon their adversaries and routed them, by which means the glory of the day fell on the earl's side; King Richard, as a just guerdon for all his facinorous acts and horrible murders, being slain on the field. One Welsh tradition says that Rice ap Thomas slew Richard, manfully fighting with him hand to hand, and we have one

strong argument in defence of our tradition, to prove that he was the man who in all likelihood had done the deed; for from that time forward, the Earl of Richmond, as long as he lived, did ever honour him with the title of Father Rhys'.

Be this as it may, Rhys ap Thomas was knighted on the field, and was afterwards employed in the war with France and the rebellions at home. He was made a knight of the Garter and privy-councillor, and appointed constable and lieutenant of Brecknock, chamberlain of Carmarthen and Cardigan, seneschal and chancellor of Harverfordwest, Ross, and Builth, justiciar of South Wales, and governor of the principality. At the end of Henry VII's reign, the recipient of so many honours retired to Wales, where he practised the national virtue of hospitality in a style of great magnificence till his death, at the good old age of seventy-six.

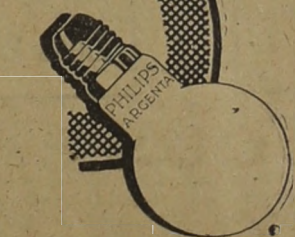

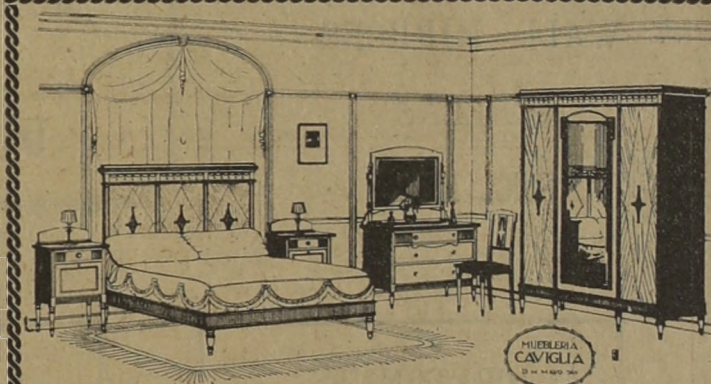

R. A. F. DISPLAY.

The King and Queen were present at the Royal Air Force Display at Hendon Aerodrome. At a conservative estimate over 100,000 people were gathered on the grounds, and the Royal party included, in addition, the King and Queen of Spain, King George and Queen Elizabeth of the Hellenes, the Duke of York, Prince and Princess Arthur of Connaught, Prince Chichibu, and the Infante Alfonso and the Infanta Beatrice of Spain. The political and military heads of the Air Ministry awaited the arrival of the King and Queen, and those in the Royal enclosure included Sir Samuel Hoare (Secretary of State for Air) and Lady Maud Hoare, Sir Philip Sassoon, Air Chief Marshal Sir Hugh Trenchard and Lady Trenchard, Air Marshal Sir John Salmond, Air Vice Marshal Sir Geoffrey Salmond, and Air-Vice-Marshal Sir Philip Game.

As an event of the London season the display has now a definite place, but its social aspect must yield to the technical brilliance of the pilots and the manoeuvres executed with such precision and apparent lack of effort. The performance of the new machines this year, too, marked a definite advance, particularly in speed and rapidity of climb — two essential factors in the air defence of a capital city close to the sea-line. Sixteen new types of machine were flown on Saturday, and at one moment the air was full of aircraft presenting vivid contrasts in size, speed and design.

There was the Avro Ava, a night bomber and coastal torpedo landplane, which carries more petrol and armament than any aircraft yet built at, for its class, a most useful speed. This huge machine might be described as a battleship of the air; with its two men in the forward gunpit, another two in the rear cockpit, and a single man suspended in a chair under the fuselage with a movable machine-gun to guard its tail and sweep the lower horizon. For a contrast there was the tiny Fairey Firefly, equipped with a 430 American Curtiss engine, which flashed in the sun like a streak of silver across the aeroplane at a speed which must have been near 200 miles an hour. At the end of its speed burst it climbed almost vertically to a thousand feet or more. Then there was the Avro Avenger, another single

seater fighter fitted with the latest development of the well-known Napier Lion engine — a new direct-drive power unit giving 525 horsepower. This machine made a most impressive climb from a standing start, and also showed wonderful powers of control at all speeds.

The Hawker Hornbill (which, with its 700 h.p. Rolls-Royce Condor engine, it probably the highest-powers scout in the world) and the Gloucester Gorchcock (also fitted with the new Napier) both demonstrated the value of high speed; the Fairey Fox and the Hawker Horsley, two day-bombers, showed how speed has been allied with load capacity; while slower Army Cooperation two-seaters provided the public with a ready method of comparing the big advances in speed secured in the other aircraft. The new 20seater machine of Imperial Airways, the Argosy, with its three Armstrong-Siddeley Jaguar air-cooled engines of 385 h.p. each, illustrated the capacities of commercial aircraft at the present day; but undoubtedly the machine which most delighted the public was the Pterodactyl—or tailless aeroplane — of Captain Hill. This machine is much more to the public understanding than the Auto-Giro of Señor de la Cierva, which, with its revolving vanes instead of wings, did all that was expected of it in the way of vertical landings. The Pterodactyl is more like an aeroplane, and, with its 34 h.p. Cherub engine, it fitted about with the seeming inconsequence of a moth, fluttering here, rising there, suddenly sinking so close to the heads of those in the enclosures that the crowd instinctively ducked, and then rising steeply at an unbelievably sharp angle of incidence at the whim of the pilot, Flight Lieutenant J. S. Chick. Beyond question it has a power of control over a surprisingly wide speed range, and these two machines alone may be said to have made the display noteworthy.

Service Exercises.

The demonstrations, however, were but interludes in the series of purely Service exercises, which started with the race over a 500-mile course of the heavy night-bombers and went on to the always interesting competition between the Army Cooperation squadrons in diving down to pick up a message suspended on two poles.

After lunch came the group evolutions of 54 single-seater fighters—Nos. 19, 23, 29, 32, 41, and 56 Squadrons—easily the most impressive demonstration of air power yet seen. The six squadrons, spreading probably over two miles of the sky, came in succession past the Royal box, dipping in salute and then dividing into two wings of three squadrons, and diving yet again to all appearance of each other from opposite directions. The low bombing by a flight of No. 19 Squadron, commanded by Squadron Leader H. W. G. Jones, was, as usual, full of incident, with the exciting dives and bomb-bursts round a moving tank. The air manoeuvres controlled by wireless telephony and carried out by No. 25 Fighter A. H. Peck), realized every expectation. The significance of this development has already been discussed in "The Times"; it only remains to add that the drill was of the highest quality, and the loud speakers made every command clearly audible to the crowd.

The slower day-bombing squadrons—Nos. 11, 12, 39, and 207 — again gave a precise exhibition of exact formation flying, and their "set piece" on Saturday resulted in a "hostile aerodrome", complete with hangars, machines, and sheds, being destroyed to the accompaniment of heavy smoke and heavier noise. The instructors' competition illustrated the first stages in a pilot's training, and two races over short courses maintained the sporting interest.

During the afternoon various presentations were made to the King, and among them were those of the six officers and two sergeants who made the recent Service flight to the Cape, and who flew over to the display during the afternoon. The members of the French Air Mission, which arrived last week, were also presented to the King, together with Major Wuori, the head of the Finnish Air Mission in this country. Then, when the Royal party went to inspect the new machines in the machine park, Sir Geoffrey Salmond, as the Air Member in charge of this department, was formally presented and with him Group Captain H. M. Cave-Browne-Cave (whose promotion was announced that morning). Captain F. T. Courtney, who has flown the Auto-Giro from the start in this country, and Señor de la Cierva, its inventor, were also presented. Señor de la Cierva was also presented to the King of Spain; and in the Royal enclosure the King of Spain personally expressed the thanks of the Spanish nation to Flying Officer A. M. Glover, who, it will be recalled, played a prominent part in the rescue of the Spanish airmen lost in the Syrian desert.

Night Bombers Race.

An entirely new feature of the display this year was the long-distance race for heavy twin-engined night-bombers, weighing over eight tons, over a course of 500 miles. At noon they had lined up on the aero-

drome in the following order of start—No. 7 (Bircham Newton aerodrome), Wing Commander C. H. B. Blount, Vickers Virginia fitted with two 450h.p. Napier Lion engines; No. 9 (Manston), Wing Commander V. Gaskell-Blackburn, Vickers Virginias No. 58 (Worthy Down), Squadron Leader A. T. Harris, Vickers Virginias; and No. 99 (Bircham Newton), Squadron Leader W. J. Ryan, Handley Page Hydrabads, also with Napier Lion engines. An interval of ten minutes was allowed between the first three squadrons, and as the Hydrabads are faster they were handicapped with a 30 minutes delay. Points were awarded not only for speed but also for quickness of picking up formation and maintenance of formation during the race. Other points were gained or lost for the manner in which they maintained wireless touch with the aerodrome.

The course took these big formations over to Calshot at the extreme end of Southampton Water; along the coast to Folkestone and Ramsgate; back across Kent and Surrey to Farnborough; north to Henlow, Bedfordshire, and down to Wiltshire; and then back, via Farnborough, to Hendon again. This gave a course of just over 500 miles, and with these heavy machines flying not at cruising speed but probably for miles at full throttle the test on the engines was particularly severe. Penalties were exacted for machines failing to start or falling out, and No. 7 were unfortunate in that a punctured carburettor float prevented one of their machines from starting. Once the squadrons had left the aerodrome it was assumed that nothing more would be heard of them until, 6.30, but actually the crowd were able to follow the fluctuating fortunes of the race all through by means of hourly reports through the loud speakers. Thus at 3 p. m. it was learned that No. 9 were between Folkestone and Margate that No. 7 were passing Folkestone, with No. 58 20 miles behind, and No. 99, scratch 12 miles N.N.W. of Bexhill, overhauling the other squadrons. Later the crowd at Hendon saw the

bombers, dots in the distance, steadily flying north from Northolt to Henlow, and at 6.40 p. m. just as the crowd were streaming away from the ground the first squadron home. No. 99, came flying in low over the trees.

It appeared later that the Hydrabad squadron had not completed the full course as their petrol supplies were running low — the result of racing at full throttle — and Nos. 9 and 58 had both dropped two machines in the course of the later stages, again probably the result of the heavy stress of racing instead of cruising speed. Owing to the complicated method of marking only a provisional result could be announced on Saturday, and this placed the first three squadrons as follows:—

(1) No. 99, Handley Page Hydrabads; (2) No. 7, Vickers Virginias; (3) No. 9, also Vickers Virginias, No. 7, which started one short completed the course otherwise with its full complement, and would probably have won if it had started with its full number.
