POLITICAL NOTES.

CONSTITUTIONAL REFORM.

On the resumption of the discussion in the Deputies on Monday, Dr. Simon contended that the officialization of the suffrage, of which the opposition complained was a universal defect, and always would be while there was a head of the State on whom all appointments depended, and in command of all the forces. The only cure for this was the introduction of the Collegiate Executive. He thought that the system of election proposed in the Bill was the most perfect imaginable. The minority party ought to be well satisfied, for they were being treated with extraordinary liberality, and the "colorado" party, having the power in its hands, might easily have approved some other system which would assure it an overwhelming majority. — Dr. Luis de Herrera then spoke at some length in opposition. After rebutting some of the statements of the previous speaker, he referred to the Bill. This, he said, undoubtedly had some good points, and offered some important guarantees, but the efficacy of these depended largely upon the good faith with which they were applied. It was not the laws that made pure elections so

much as the good faith of those in charge of the process. He could not believe in the sincerity of any election in which the police were allowed to act as electoral agents, and the omission to prohibit that vitiated the rest of the Bill. In any case he was determined to vote against the Bill because he thought reform was inopportune at the present moment — Dr. Blanco Acevedo spoke in favor of immediate reform in order that the country might have a Constitution that corresponded to its present ideas and necessities. One of the latter was the separation of State and Church, as the Republic was in full reaction of ideas against religious sentiment. He could not see any motive for alarm in reform, nor was there anything likely to promote a profound division of ideas. He was still speaking when the Chamber adjourned.

GOLD DEPOSITS.

It is announced semi-officially, with regard to the gold deposits of the private Banks in the Bank of the Republic, that the time for withdrawing them has been extended to one year. This decision has been reached by arrangement between the Government and the Board of the Bank, and in view of the general protest against the recent resolution of the Board notifying the Banks to withdraw the deposits within three months. The step, as we understand, maintains the *status quo* for another year, at the end of which the situation (it is to be hoped) will be different from what it is to-day. This, we presume, cancels the intention recently announced by the Government of applying for legislative authority to increase the special note issue related to the deposits.

CUSTOMS REVENUE.

The *Dia*, announces that the Customs Receipts for August will show a considerable increase over those for the same month last year, and will exceed a million dollars, a figure that they have rarely enough reached of late. This sounds satisfactory, and we hope that it will be fully confirmed when the official statement for the month appears. As will be remembered, the statement for the previous month of July was never given to publicity, though it is difficult to imagine what reason there could be for its suppression, as the figures have to be made known sooner or later. Incidentally it may be mentioned here that the Government seems to be acting on the supposition that the revenue from the Custom House and other sources as well is improving, and the financial crisis is more or less passing — at least, that is the only explanation that can be put upon its abandonment of the economical spirit it showed six months ago.

THE AMERICAN LOAN.

The end of August has passed without anything further being heard of the American loan of ten million dollars which we were assured by the *Dia* would be definitely arranged by the end of the month. Some of our contemporaries are saying that a serious hitch has occurred and the business has practically fallen through. Whether they have any basis for their statement, we cannot say.

INSURANCE MONOPOLY.

PROPOSED EXTENSION.

The Government has presented a brief Bill amending the Insurance act of December, 1911, to the following effect: —

The contract of insurances in general is declared a State monopoly, the Executive Power fixing by decree the date from which the monopoly shall become effective in each class of insurance. The

companies, societies or agencies at present effecting insurance operations may continue working with provisional character.

The Act of 1911, it is pointed out in the Message accompanying the Bill, limits the monopoly of the State to three classes of insurance, namely fire, life, and labor accidents, but experience has now shown that it is necessary to remove this limitation. By the purchase of the portfolios of other Companies the State Insurance Bank is now the only one operating in labor risks, thereby enabling the Government to decree the effectivity of the monopoly in this branch of insurance. But, as it now happens, the Bank is also the only one operating in hail and animal-life risks, but as these are not comprised in the Act, it has not been possible to decree the monopoly. This it is now desired to do, in order that the Bank, which has attained a firm position by careful management, and by the sacrifice (*sic*) of purchasing the portfolios of other companies, may carry out its program with absolute certainty of the results, and without being exposed to the appearance of rivals in those branches not previously included in the monopoly.

A Trip to Montevideo.

The following is the tenth of a series of impressions of Montevideo from the pen of the late Mr. E. T. Mullhall, Editor of the Buenos Aires *Standard*, written nineteen years ago. Subsequent articles will appear when space permits.

The English race-course of Montevideo is situated close to the little village of Maroñas, about 3 leagues from the Custom House. It takes a good hour and a half to reach by tram, and costs 20 cents the whole route. On a fine spring morning you can imagine no more agreeable trip before breakfast. You have the bracing sea air all along the way, and the streets are as clean as those of Leamington, which is about the neatest and cleanest town in all England. You have to change cars at the Union and take the little two horse car that carries you along a high mountainous country road, more remarkable for old tumble down houses and "ranchos" than anything else. Don Bruno Zabala, who founded Montevideo in 1725 with 20 families from the Canaries, must certainly have started his colony only on the Maroñas road. I noticed ancient houses with old Spanish pillared corridors almost in ruins, that must have been built 150 years ago. The old round tower mills which in bye gone years looked so pretty, are all in ruins; evidently, some Montevidean Quijote (and there is no scarcity of them) has tilted the roofs off the towers and the wings from the mills. They have modernized the stone towers into a sort of farmer's houses which makes them look even still more ridiculous.

Ascending a very steep hill you reach an eminence which has a commanding view of the city, the bay, the Cerro, and the Cerrito and even the Ocean on the other side. On the tip-top of this hill, a wealthy retired blacksmith of Montevideo has perched a tall round tower of Ireland; it looks from the road more like a lighthouse than anything else, and it seem to me to be constructed of iron. In a beautiful quinta on the slope of the hill resides a retired Montevidean baker, and pretty much all along the road the mayoral of the tramway pointed out some quiet residences belonging to retired tradesmen and mechanics.

There is a neat new church in the village of Maroñas, built by Dr. Ramirez;

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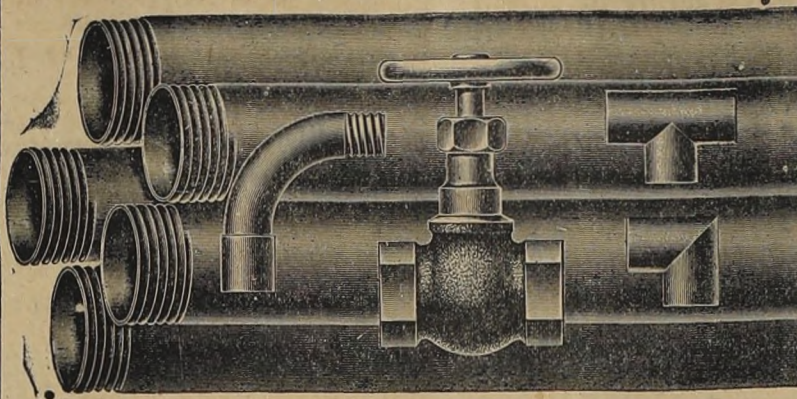

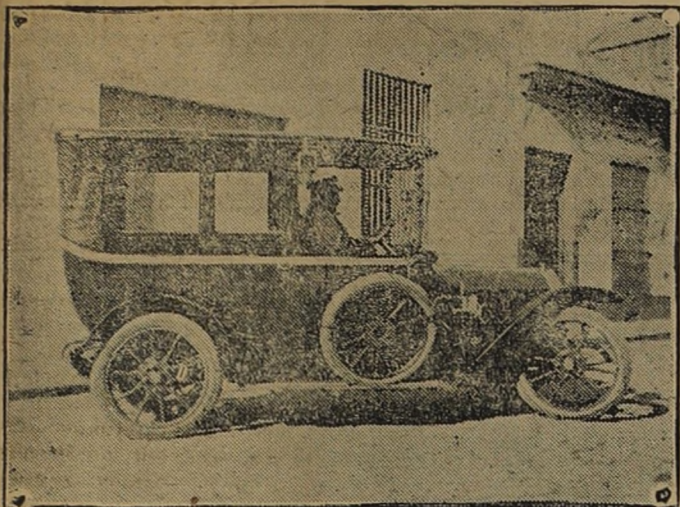
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whose large and magnificent quinta almost adjoins. I passed a big chacra with nothing but castor oil plants which suggest the idea that there is a good deal of native made castor oil in the boticas in Montevideo. On all sides I saw stables and it seemed to me that whatever vitality Montevideo has is due to the English racecourse. The mayor of the town astonished me by saying that the principal owners of the various studs are Montevidean lawyers who devote all their spare time to the breeding of race horses, which is a most expensive business.

The tram stops at the portals of the race course; the get up of the place falls very short of that of Buenos Aires. There are races held here every fifteen days, and as I walked about the course I thought of the day, very many years ago, when walking with Admiral Elliot, the news arrived at the race course that a Paraguayan gunner had fired a shell into the tower of a Brazilian ironclad. The tower was crowded with officers and men, every one of whom perished, and Admiral Elliot told me that it was the most wonderful shot in the annals of naval war. In those days the race course of Montevideo might be termed English, as all the English merchants, English officers of the fleet, and English clerks attended the races; to-day it is not so, and the race course is more Oriental than English.

There is a sort of produce market by the side of the road near the Union, which was filled with bullock carts, and reminded me somewhat of the old bygone days of the Plaza Once de Setiembre. Bullock carts from all parts of the Banda Oriental come into the plaza, where I suppose the wool and hides and sheep skins are sold from the perrito, but I saw no evidence of any such trade in the shape of barracas as in Bs. Aires. What greatly attracted my attention was the number of factories and tall chimneys in every direction. The manufacturing element of the city seems to have extended in this direction, and where in former years were large chacras and vegetable quintas now are manufactories of every name and nature. I had not time to visit these establishments but by merely counting the chimneys I could judge of the importance these local fabricas have assumed. Nevertheless every one in Montevideo tells me that business is dull, no employment for

capital, and labor so superabundant that hundreds of hands are going up to Buenos Aires; these hands are for the most part hired here by agents from Buenos Aires, to which city a free passage is paid by the agent.

British Patriotic Work in Uruguay.

REGISTER OF PERSONS OF BRITISH NATIONALITY.

About ten days ago we published in these columns a circular issued by the Committee of the British Patriotic Fund, announcing their intention of compiling a register of persons of British nationality in Uruguay according to British law, that is to say, persons born in British territory or naturalized as British subjects, and of persons born elsewhere whose fathers were, at the time, British subjects.

The fly leaf of the circular contained the form to be filled up with name, date and place of birth, occupation or profession, present address, etc.

Now the British Empire is engaged in the biggest and most deadly war in the history of the world. All members of the community will be aware that just recently a law was passed creating a National Register of all persons in the British Isles. This Bill was presented in Parliament after earnest consideration, the Government having decided that it was a necessary measure.

So far the Colonies have not passed similar laws, but it is understood that they propose to do so in due course. Until this is done, it has been decided not to extend the scope of the National Registration Law to British subjects residing in foreign lands; but all the same it is desirable that a complete list of persons of British nationality in foreign countries be obtained.

In Buenos Aires this work has been undertaken by the British Society. In Montevideo it is being handled by the Committee of the British Patriotic Fund. In Buenos Aires the response has been good. In Montevideo, so far, it has been indifferent, for varied reasons.

One of these reasons is that many members of the community have adopted the attitude that they do not see why the Committee of the British Patriotic Fund should take upon themselves to ask for information that can only be applied for by the British Government providing the corresponding law is passed. Surely this is a mistaken view? The Committee of the Patriotic Fund have already far more work to do than can be done without volunteer assistance. The volume of work has grown to enormous dimensions, and yet they assume still more work because they know it is necessary and has to be done.

The fact of the matter is that members of the community are looking at this new departure in a wrong spirit, and this applies largely to the younger generation, some of whom are afraid that it has something to do with possible conscription in the future and therefore shrink from committing themselves.

Others look upon it as a huge joke, while many have tossed the circulars on one side as not worth the trouble of filling in. From some points of view it is a great pity that all this has to be placed on record, but it seems to be necessary to remove a wrong impression.

In the course of a few days an endeavour will be made to reach all Britons in Uruguay whose addresses can be ascer-

tained. It would be a very good thing if the heads of the British concerns were to take the matter up and personally induce every British member of their respective staffs to fill in the forms and hand them to their chiefs to be forwarded to their destination.

If such a step were taken, it would at least minimize the possibility of a repetition of the act of a man who filled in his form as follows, in an unquestionably English business handwriting:

It is a very great pity that efforts are not being made to identify the handwriting. It is a joke in the worst possible taste and the present is not the time for any loyal Englishman to play a practical joke on a Committee who are doing such an immense amount of good sterling work and to ridicule efforts which are recognized on all sides as worthy of the highest commendation.

British War News.

The following cabled summary of some events of the past week was received by the British Legation in this city yesterday:

Zeppelin Raids.

The First Lord of the Admiralty, Mr. A. J. Balfour, answers to the following effect a correspondent who complained that the reticence of the British press over the air raids suggests that unpleasant truths have been concealed:

"The Zeppelins prefer moonless nights, when navigation is difficult and errors of surprising magnitude are possible. Why make further voyages easier by emphasizing past mistakes? Doubtless much suffering has been caused to innocent persons, though rumour magnifies this out of all proportion. To date, 71 civilians and 18 children have been killed, and 189 civilians and 31 children wounded. Judged thus, the cumulative result of these successive crimes unequals the single effort of the submarine which, to the unconcealed

German pride but to the world's horror, murdered 1,198 innocent civilians on the *Lusitania*. It is easy to reckon the airships' military success. No soldier nor sailor has been killed; 7 have been injured, and only on one occasion damage was inflicted which could by any stretch of imagination be described as of military importance.

A Denial.

The Germans have published a statement, alleged to have been taken from an English corporal prisoner, in which General Sir Charles Fergusson is quoted as advising his troops before battle to give the Germans no quarter. General Sir Charles Fergusson emphatically denies uttering anything bearing any such interpretation.

Munitions of War.

The Munitions Minister announces that 190 fresh establishments have been declared controlled under the Munitions Act.

Drop in Wheat.

The outstanding feature in the market is the sharp drop in the price of home-grown wheat, which now comes to market freely. The increased supply of wheat is mainly responsible for the lower values; but the exceptionally large crops now harvesting in Canada and the States, which will be available in October, points to a further considerable reduction in the price of bread.

Submarine E 13.

The bodies of the crew of submarine E 13 have been brought back to England amidst striking manifestations of Danish sympathy.

Movements of Steamers.

The P. S. N. Co's, *Oronsa* is expected early this morning, leaving later for the West Coast. The *Highland Piper* will leave for London this evening. The *Highland Scot* is expected tomorrow or Friday. No homeward steamer of the Royal Mail lines leaves this week, but the Dutch liner *Frisia* leaving on Saturday, will take mails for England, the mails closing the previous night.

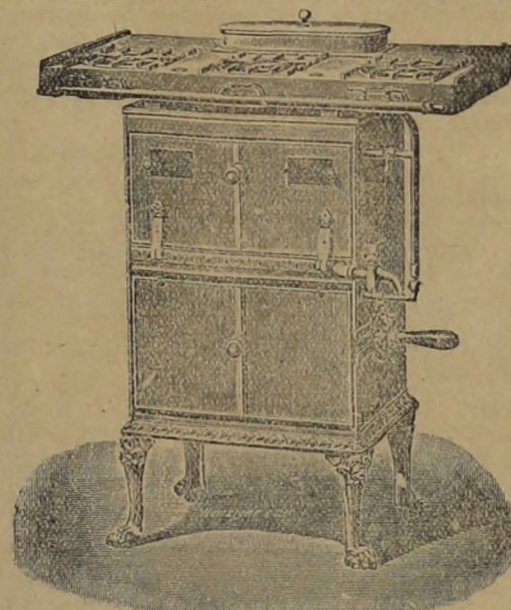
