The Situation.

That the financial event of Saturday, the suspension of conversion by the National Bank, has caused a great deal of alarm in the market, and has brought the threatening crisis to a sudden head, it is impossible to deny. At the same time, we do not think that the exaggerated fears expressed when the news was first circulated, and which interested agitators are still endeavouring to foment, are at all called for. The situation is serious, that it would be vain to deny, and for the moment has given rise to great inconveniences. But on the other hand there is no difficulty that may not be solved, with the assistance of a little patience, good sense and faith in the ruling powers. Whatever the causes that have led to the present difficulty, at present not entirely known to the public, we think we are justified in saying that they present none of the unpleasant complications which have been the unfortunate companions of the crisis in the neighbouring Republic. At all events, we have no fear of relations being made of clandestine emissions, malversation of funds, corruption in the employees, fraudulent operations, and the like charges, which have so greatly added to the Argentine difficulty. Moreover, such troubles there is, is confined to the limits of one institution.

Furthermore, we think there is every reason for congratulation in the prompt and energetic manner in which the trouble has been met by the ruling powers. We have no Prince Fainéant at the head of affairs, but a man who has not hesitated to recognise the real bearings of the case, and has acted accordingly, even anticipating the evil, by way of lessening its effect. A danger thus met is half overcome.

The moment the situation was made public, the Executive Power bestirred itself, and passed a message to the Chambers, who have been sitting the greater part of Sunday and yesterday. These sessions were secret, and at the time of writing we are not entirely certain as to the result. So far as we understand, it has been decided to allow the Bank a delay of six months in the conversion of its notes, but on such strict conditions as will make this «curse legal» in no way a burden to commerce in general, or a difficulty in the general circulation.

The resignation of the present Directory, we understand, has been accepted, and pending the reconstitution of the Bank on a new basis, men will be appointed in their place in whom the public have every confidence. This step, it is fully believed will give the Bank ample time to recover itself, considering that after all it counts with an emission comparatively small, and with great resources. The alternative would be the immediate liquidation of the Bank, which, although not the disaster to commerce that alarmists would make it out to be, would be, for many reasons a great pity, an enormous inconvenience, and to many, a serious loss.

That the confidence of the better class public has really been shaken in the value of the Bank's notes, we do not think, nor do we imagine that this temporary in-

convertibility will cause any serious depreciation in their value. It was a significant fact that on Sunday and Saturday all respectable business houses and shops continued issuing and receiving the Bank's notes as usual, in some cases even offering a premium for them.

The *campesinos*, on the other hand, must be charged with wanton mischief by the manner in which they have taken advantage of the lower and ignorant classes in buying in the notes at a discount, to the benefit of their own pockets and the robbery of their customers.

We prefer, then, to take a hopeful view of the situation, expressing full confidence in the wisdom and moderation of the President and his Ministers, and before long we hope to be able to chronicle the fact that the situation has returned to a normal state of affairs, without recourse to any of the extreme and dangerous expedients which have done so much to wreck the fortunes of the sister Republic.

Uruguayan Asperity.

Under this title the *B. A. Standard* of last Saturday publishes an article from which we quote the following paragraphs, not without their interest at the present juncture. We leave the comments to our readers.

That the vivacious Argentine should storm and fume and weep for poor humanity, in common with our sentimental Varella, because Uruguayan justice has executed two murderers of the deepest dye, is after all no matter for surprise. Our sentimentality oozes out of our very courts and accustoms us to reprove the sentenced criminal, and we turn with amazement, indignation, anger, when we see the sterner justice of Uruguay shooting down its murderers. Our sentimentality on the subject of punishment for murder has now gone so far that at this moment there is a bill before the Chambers for the abolition of capital punishment. The argument in favor of this bill will probably be that it is inhuman, barbarous, unjust to take the life of a fellow creature—not that the bill will tend to suppress murder or even decrease the percentage of this most heinous of human crimes. We all know, we all feel, that the abolition of capital punishment must exercise a pernicious influence on the criminal classes of society. The fear of something after the crime often stops the murderer; the absence of that fear must in the end prove an incentive. We may abolish capital punishment, but the day will come when the safety of society will demand the execution, the extermination of its murderers.

It is not necessary for us to have recourse to tedious statistics to show how effectually the tide of murder is stemmed by the enforcement of capital punishment; neither is it our intention here to indulge in a wearisome disquisition on the demerits of its abolition. As a French writer has very pitifully put it: capital punishment should only be abolished when murder ceases; and our honorable deputies, instead of suppressing death as a punishment, should endeavor to devise a bill for the suppression of murder. We merely wish to point out the difference and in some respects the superiority of the Uruguayan character when compared to the Argentine. It is not long since a fiend, arrayed in a priestly garb, committed two of the most terrible murders recorded in our criminal annals. Yet he was spared and he fattens to-day on the excellent prison diet of Sierra Chica. We are all paying indirectly for his support. That man, even in the days of Santos, would have been shot, in Montevideo, just as the two murderers were executed the other day in the same city.

There is more than justice in the Uruguayan character; there is austerity, with which no idle sentimentality can trifle. There is austerity in the justice, there is austerity in the finances of Uruguay, and the vivacious Argentine lifts up his hands with surprise when he sees that the Oriental prefers gold to paper. We have too much sentimentality in our finances as well as in our tribunals. A sentimental Varella to clamour for the abolition of capital punishment, a financial Varella to uphold the cause of paper money—our sentimentality culminates in the commutation of death sentences and in clandestine issues. The financial sentimentality of the Argentine is the cause of the crisis. Had it not been for that sentimentality the decree of forced currency would never have been signed. On the other hand let us watch the action of Uruguayan austerity. There is a crisis in Montevideo—present. Our proximity causes commercial uneasiness just as the iceberg is said to influence the temperature for hundreds of miles around. But we are safe in say-

ing that no pressure will ever be sufficiently great to cause an Uruguayan president to decree forced currency or persuade the Uruguayan people to tamely submit to inconvertible paper. It is in the administration of justice and finances that we see the superiority of the Uruguayan. His principles are rigid, not elastic. He devises a charter for a bank and to that charter the bank must conform or perish. He has his laws, and those laws must be enforced, even if a murderer have to lose his precious life. And, after all, this austerity and this rigidity in the administration of public affairs, as reflected in sound justice and healthy finances, are the only real elements of Government. Without them, our sister-republic would be floundering to-day in inconvertible paper money; its trade would be fettered and injured by a fluctuating gold premium; its state bank would break loose from its charter—there would be no end, in a word, to its misfortunes. No country in South America was a better subject for the paper plague than Uruguay, the usual specious excuse of revolutionary troubles could have been adduced to flood the people with bank notes under the tyranny of Santos. Yet even a tyrant, for whom the constitution was a dead letter, did not dare to force paper on the oppressed people. The austerity of the Uruguayan affords a striking lesson for Argentines.

Argentine Republic

Ninth of July.

A committee organized to celebrate this anniversary has resolved that the following programme shall be carried out in the Opera-House.—National Hymn to be sung by young school-girls, four «distinguished» young ladies of our high society singing the verses and the rest joining in chorus. They will be accompanied by the orchestra of the Opera. Distribution of bouquets to the warriors of the Independence. A patriotic poem, written specially for the occasion by Sr. Guido y Spano, will be recited, and 2000 copies will be distributed. Dr. Damas Centeno will deliver a short address on the objects of the «feast». «Apotheosis of General San Martín, representing him on the heights of the Andes.» This has been entrusted to Cols. Anaya and Oro, Lt.-Col. Lara and sub-lieut. Leopoldo Perez. March, executed by the orchestra.

Disturbance.

On Wednesday night the pupils of the School of Corporals and Sergeants refused to attend the classes. The origin of the mutiny was the dissatisfaction of the pupils who passed the recent examination and who have to enter the army as second sergeants instead of as «distinguished sergeants» as has hitherto been the rule.

Damages.

The Court of Appeal, reversing the decision of the Judge of First Instance, has ordered compensation to be paid by the Lacroz Tramway Company to Sr. Rodriguez, whose son was knocked down by the horses of one of the Company's trams.

San Juan.

This province proposes to raise an internal loan of \$1,500,000, by issuing bonds to be accepted at their face value in all the municipal and provincial offices.

Sport.

Mr. Lafin, the professor of the manly art of self-defence, etc., has called on the *Herald* to say that, having heard of some talk in sporting circles as to what this or that one could do with him, he is ready to make a match for a ring fight, up to his money on the spot, and meet any comer, without any nonsense.

Charter Parties.

«The United States consul at Buenos Aires has done a very sensible thing in calling the attention of ship masters and ship owners to the unfair manner in which charter parties for cargoes from this country to the River Plate are treated at the expiration of the voyage. Charter parties and bills of lading are what might be termed sensitive documents. Oftentimes their clauses are indefinite and ambiguous, and in the hurry and anxiety of the shipper to ship and the captain to sail frequent misunderstandings take place when the vessel is ready to discharge her cargo. The consul writes more particularly on the subject of demurrage, and pertinently observes that where he is stationed these claims for demurrage are rarely settled according to the terms and provisions of the contract, for either the masters are unable to get anything at all or they get only what the consignees choose to give them. This, to say the least, is discouraging to the carriers; but it is satisfactory to observe that the consul can refer to honorable exceptions in Buenos Aires, merchants «who are as scrupulous in their dealings with foreign ship masters as they are in protecting their own credit in bank.» Of course it would be possible for the ship master to prosecute his claims in the courts of Buenos Aires, but everyone knows what that means. No ship owner could spare the time or stand the delay which litigation would entail. Unscrupulous consignees know this, and, judging from what the consul says, they are not slow to take advantage of it.

The consul gives a case in point. He says, «Only a few days ago a case of peculiar hardship occurred here, where a vessel which brought railway materials to a railway management was kept waiting until she had thirty-six days' demurrage, which, at \$70 per day, amounted to \$2,520, but, after unsuccessfully dancing attendance on the company for nearly two weeks, the master was finally under the necessity of leaving port without receiving a centor effecting any settlement. Of course he could not afford to remain here with his ship to fight a wealthy railway concern in the courts.

The consul also calls attention to the unjustifiable construction put upon those clauses which relate to the delay days for receiving and discharging, and puts the whole case in a nutshell when he adds:

«Here in Buenos Aires, however, there appears to be no limit fixed by commercial law or usage, and vessels are thus left quite at the mercy of those to whom they are consigned. There are two vessels in port at the present time that had to wait upward of fifteen days before their consignees assigned them a berth for discharging. The injustice of such conduct is too glaring to require discussion.

The remedy suggested is that the ship masters should insist upon the elimination from the charter party of the clause which releases the charterers at home from responsibility after the bills of lading are signed and that a clause should be inserted which shall make it imperative that the vessel shall have a berth within a stated number of days after her arrival in port. These propositions, put into practice might not entirely abolish the evils complained of but they would certainly minimize them.»

Railway News.

—The Finance Minister has ordered payment to the Buenos Aires and Pacific Railway Company of \$79,179 in respect of the guarantee due on 30th March, 1890.

—Mr. A. de Courneaud has resigned his post on the Board of Public Works, and ceases, consequently, to be inspector of the works of the railway from Belgrano to Las Conchas.

—The Board of Public Works have reported favorably on Messrs. Green and Co's application for privilege to build a narrow gauge railway from Santiago del Estero to Lamadrid on the Central Northern Railway.

—Sr. E. Lombard is to inspect the lines of the Central Northern Railway from Santa Rosa to Oran and from Chombicha, Tinogasta and Andalgalá.

—Mr. George Evans will inspect the Transandine Railway from San Juan to Chumbicha and Salta, and Mendoza to San Rafael, and Sr. Alfonso Sensat the line from Villa María to Rufino.

—The Inspector-General has agreed to allow certain alterations to be made in proposed sites of the stations on the Bahía Blanca and the North Western.

—Inspector Schlatt has run over the Northern Line, and says that the new track between San Isidro and Kil. 22 has been well built. He calls attention to the fact that the two lines cross each other in several places, but it appears that the Company will run the two parallel to each other soon.

Parliament.

In the Chamber of Representatives, on Saturday, there was no sitting for want of a quorum. The report of the Committee of Foment upon the proposal of Young Castro and Co. for the export of cattle on foot, was distributed.

Football.

Rowing Club v. Cricket Club. This rowing match took place last Sunday and resulted in a victory for the Rowing Club, who thus avenged their previous defeat, by one goal and two tries to one goal and a try. The victors had still further luck in losing the ball twice in mauls in goal. The game was robbed of a good deal of its interest by the absence of several of the players whose names were down to take part which is much to be regretted. Despite the fact that both teams played short, a fast and pleasant game took place, though there was far too much of a scramble about it, and the passing and picking up left much to be desired. The tries for the winning team were obtained by H. Vignoles, P. Vignoles, and Benedict, and for the Cricket Club, both points were obtained by Dunbar. Besides those mentioned, Barrett and A. Lawrie distinguished themselves among the winning forwards, and Scoones and Dunbar were the only dangerous men for the opposing team, Harvey and Jefferies, however played a fair defensive game. The sides were composed as follows: Rowing Club, Back, Adam, 3/4 Backs, P. Vignoles and Benedict, Halves, Poole and H. Vignoles, Forwards, Faram, Barrett, A. Politeama Theatre.

If the performance of Boito's superb opera *Meisafotele*, as repeated on Sunday, did not attain the success of other representations by the same company, it must be attributed, not as a disparagement to the capability of the company itself, but to the character of the opera, which requires exceptional performance.

Sra. Gini Pizzorni as *Marguerite*, her dramatic style giving prominence to both the scenes in which she appeared, especially the mad scene. As *Helen of Troy* she was not quite so happy. Sr. Silvestri was, as usual, artistic and careful in the arduous part of *Meisafotele*, singing with taste, and giving due attention to the dramatic value of the part. But the music demands a far more powerful and telling voice than he is possessed of. Sr. Pizzorni, we regret to say, had not one of the qualifications necessary for the part of *Faust*. To atone for other shortcomings, however, the orchestra was once more excellent, and considering the very heavy share of work allotted to it in this opera may be said to have saved the representation.

«*Gioconda*», in which the company is seen to much better advantage, will be given for the last time this evening.

Postponements.

On account of the bad state of the course, the Committee of the Jockey Club decided to postpone the races that should have been held at the Montevideo Hippodrome last Sunday, until next Sunday, July 13. The banquet to Sr. F. Bauré, announced for Saturday night, was postponed until this evening. We did not receive the notice of either of these postponements until too late to announce them in Sunday's issue.

Interior of Uruguay Railway.

Messrs. Collett and Castro, the concessionaires of this railway, left on Sunday for Durazno, with two companies of engineers, to make the definite studies for the second and third sections of the line, namely, from Durazno to the Punta del Yi, and thence to the Brazilian frontier in the direction of Bagé. The head of the engineering department is Mr. John H. Middleton, known in connection with the extension of the Central North Argentine Railway to the Bolivian frontier. The works on this important line are being pushed forward with commendable activity since the new concessionaires have taken charge. In the first section from Colonia to Durazno, the studies under the charge of Engineer Birschoff have already reached kilometre 72, and it is hoped to conclude the section this month when the definite plans will be presented for Government approval.

Accidents.

Two serious tramway accidents occurred on Sunday. In calle Uruguay, between Florida and Andes, a policeman named José Villido tried to mount a tramcar from the front step, whilst in rapid motion. He missed his footing and was thrown to the ground, the wheels passing over his left leg, which was completely crushed. He was taken to the Hospital in a dangerous state. The driver and guard, according to custom, were taken to prison, although the bystanders testified that no one was to blame but the man himself, who made no signal for the tram to stop.

The other accident occurred in calle Constituyente. A child named Luis Etucone, aged 18 months ran out from the house, no. 147, just as a tram was starting in front of the door. She was knocked down and her left foot was completely crushed. The tram was taken to the Hospital, and it is considered amputation will be necessary.

The Situation.

In order to allow time to the Legislative Body to deliberate on the steps to be taken with regard to the National Bank, yesterday was declared a holiday, and the Bolsa and Banks remained closed.

The Chamber of Representatives held a sitting with closed doors, on Sunday afternoon, lasting until about 8.30 p.m. They then adjourned until 10 p.m. when the sitting was prolonged until about 3.20 in Monday afternoon.

They met again yesterday afternoon, the proceedings still being secret. At the time of writing the results were not officially known, but we believe the following to be the principle facts. The Executive forwarded a Message, containing a Law of thirteen clauses, which have been virtually accepted by the Chamber, and which ordain as follows. The inconvertibility of the National Bank notes for a term of six months, during which they shall be received in all public offices at their nominal value, excepting in the Custom House, where 20 o/o of the duties shall be paid in gold, the product being retained in the Bank as guarantee of the emission. Further emission of notes is restricted except against full guarantee, and only then to the amount of \$10,690,000, the amount of the paid up capital of the Bank. All interest, debt services, etc., to be paid in gold. Existing contracts to be fulfilled.

led in the form therein expressed, and future contracts to be according to arrangement. The resignation of the President and Directors to be accepted, and new ones to be appointed in the proper manner.

It is said that Mr. James Bond, the accountant of the National Bank, has resigned, on account of difficulties with the outgoing directors.

So far as we have learnt the Bank's notes are still given and accepted at par in all respectable houses of business, though a number of *campesinos* have taken advantage of the ignorant classes to buy them in at a discount.

The alarm of Saturday has cooled down, and things will very shortly resume their normal course. The result of the deliberation of the Chambers, and the appointment of the new Directorate is expected to be announced every minute.

We also understand that negotiations are being conducted with London Bankers to which a favourable answer is quickly expected.

So far as we can learn, the President and the majority of the legislators are strongly opposed to anything more nearly resembling "curso forzoso" than the measures described above.

Large sums of gold are said to be on the way from Buenos Aires, to the English banks, doubtless intended to relieve the situation.

The air is full of wild rumours of all kinds, which we prefer not to repeat.

Sundries.

The death took place on Saturday evening of Sr. Gregorio Conde, for many years *alcade* of the Custom House, and belonging to a well known native family. His funeral took place yesterday afternoon, and was largely attended.

We are pleased to hear that the football match on Sunday attracted a larger number of visitors than has hitherto been the case this season, though that may perhaps be due to the weather.

The plans of the Teatro-Circo Oriental, of which Sr. Arons is the initiator, will be presented to the Municipal Board this week. These plans were made by the unfortunate architect Sr. Tosi, now in the Asylum. The site selected is the corner of Andes and Mercedes, now occupied by the unlucky Variedades Theatre.

The great French comedians Coquelin and Judic are announced to appear at the Solis on the 17th instant.

The residents of the calle Rincon complain, not without justice, of the fact that gunpowder is frequently transported through their street in an open cart, under the charge of a police officer, who sits on top of the barrels smoking. They do not object in the least to this modern Guy Fawkes making a martyr of himself, but they do not wish to see their windows shattered and their houses wrecked on his account.

A Spaniard called José Marrero, aged 28 and carpenter by profession, committed suicide on Sunday, in the Cerro by shooting himself through the breast. Chronic illness is assigned as the cause.

The following paragraph is from London paper is not without its moral for those local "duendes" and "mashers" who delight in high collars. "The young gentlemen who rejoice in wearing collars fitting so tightly that in order to look to the right or left of them they are obliged to turn the whole body, no movement of the neck being possible, may with advantage study the case of Walter Newport, pharmaceutical chemist, who has just met his death in consequence of his fondness for a collar of that description. He was seized with a faintness, and fell to the ground, and, as was stated by Dr. Pain, while in that position was strangled by his collar, which was a very tight one. The male mind has for many years been exercised by the fashion of tight lacing on the part of women, but the mania on the part of young men for wearing tight collars is to the full as prejudicial to health, without possessing the excuse that it is an improvement to the figure. Why any man should voluntarily make himself uncomfortable, compress the blood vessels of his neck, and render himself liable to strangulation, is a mystery. The unhappy wearer of such a collar may be observed continually making little movements of the chin and neck, or furtively putting his finger between the collar button and the neck to relieve the pressure, and yet to some minds—very weak ones, we admit—the idea that such a collar is becoming suffices to reconcile them to its discomforts. The wearing of tight collars and tight boots by men is a proof that women do not possess a monopoly of vanity."

Business Notes.
