Inconversion.

The B. A. Standard of Wednesday speaks as follows concerning the law of Inconversion.—
«The excitement in this market was greatly increased yesterday by the stirring news from Montevideo, where, under terrible pressure, the Uruguayan President has been compelled to affix his signature to the appended law. Yet, although forced currency has been decreed to save the National Bank, the law breathes the high Uruguayan spirit of honor. All contracts, before and after law, are to be respected; the service on the cedulas and mortgage bonds is to be paid in gold, and those banks which will only receive gold must pay gold. In fact, forced currency has been so wisely decreed that while the Bank will be allowed to enjoy its advantages for a term of six months, the country and market are saved from all its disadvantages, from all its errors, from all its consequences. The law does not interfere with the business of the market, and we can see that the Government is determined, while protecting the bank, to reorganize it. The issue-department has been isolated and placed under special control. In six months Montevideo will have weathered the crisis.»

Whilst fully approving our contemporary's estimate of the honorable spirit of the law, we cannot but smile at the harmless exaggeration which represents the President as being compelled to sign the law under terrible pressure. The only compulsion was that of an unfortunate train of circumstances already in a fair way of being mended. Though the necessities that gave rise to the law are deeply regretted, the law itself has met the fullest approval from the financial authorities of the nation, and the business and general public. We do not think the President would require much compulsion to affix his signature to what he and every one else recognises as the best possible means of saving the situation.

Eucalyptus.

The Eucalyptus tree, though by no means the most picturesque of trees, is perhaps the most familiar in this part of the world, for the reason that the local conditions of the soil and climate seem to suit it admirably, and it therefore grows with a freedom apparently denied to most of its brethren. Its presence is found pernicious to other vegetation, which refuses to flourish near it, perhaps on account of the wide spreading nature of its roots, and wood is so far as we know, is of no use for industrial purposes, nor is it a tree that affords much shade. But, on the other hand, it is supposed to exercise a drying power on damp land, absorbing the surrounding moisture, and it has a healthy influence which is no fiction, for medical and scientific experiments have recently proved the oil extracted from its seeds and bark to be one of the most powerful natural antiseptics.

The scientific study of its properties is, however, still very incomplete and only in the stage of preliminary experiments, but there is reason to think that with further acquaintance, it may develop into a recognised and demanded agent.

Already one or two preparations supposed to bear eucalyptus oil or «eucalyptia» as their base, have found their way into the market. These reflections directly lead to the suggestion that the many eucalyptus trees with which the country abounds, and which give no trouble whatever in their cultivation, should be turned to profit in the same manner that other plants with medicinal properties are in other countries. In the extraction of the oil for exportation, or the preparation of such commodities as the oil may lend itself to, there is surely the opening for an industry which, if not of a very extensive scale, would at least prove an addition to the few really national industries, and which at all events would never be at loss for raw material.

To show that eucalyptus oil is already a recognised commodity in the London market, we quote the following paragraphs from the *British Manufacturer* of June 2.—
«Eucalyptia, the true oil of the *Eucalyptus globulus*, possesses at least three advantages over carbolic acid. It is non-poisonous and devoid of acid and irritating properties, possesses a refreshing pleasant odour, and has a higher germ-killing power. A very small quantity of eucalyptia arrests fermentation at all stages and prevents the development of the majority of bacteria, and in the preventive treatment of infectious diseases it may be usefully employed by diffusing the vapour through the atmosphere. In the latter case, a small quantity volatilized by pouring it on a hot plate, vaporized from a Codman & Shurtliff's steam atomiser, or a few drops sprinkled about a room quickly volatilizes and purifies the atmosphere of an apartment. It is frequently found that carbolic acid is especially obnoxious in the sick chamber, as, for instance, in a case of diphtheria. The eucalyptia, however, may be sprinkled upon a cloth and suspended in the room, and this will be found a very agreeable and wholesome means for purifying and sweetening the atmosphere. Dr. Wood says: «The vapour of carbolic acid seems to act very feebly as a disinfectant and germicide, and it is very evident that the popular estimate of the value of carbolic acid is too high.»

«An excellent means for purifying their air is the Pinol-Eucalyptia Dry Inhaler. This consists practically of a glass tube filled with an absorbent medium; upon this the antiseptic is dropped, and when the inhaler is held in the mouth, like a cigar, the air passes through the tube and carries with it a modicum of the antiseptic vapour. Eucalyptia possesses other useful properties. It acts as a stimulating expectorant and promotes a healthy condition of the secretion. As an antipyretic it has a most decided specific action in cutting short an attack of malarial fever. It relieves flatulence and gastric irritation.»

Colony.

Major Euclides Salari has arrived here, commissioned by the residents in Lavalleja colony in the Department of Salto, to obtain official protection in behalf of the agriculturists of that colony, who are mostly Orientals, and who are in want of the means of continuing their agricultural labours.

Taxes.

The Executive Power has forwarded to the General Assembly the Messages, containing the proposed Laws of Land and Rolling Taxes for 1890-91, which contain some differences from those at present in force but of none of radical importance. On this account and because of their length we refrain from reproducing them. They may be found at length in yesterday's *Siglo*.

Treasure Seeking.

We chronicled some months ago the departure of a Treasure Seeking Expedition under the leadership of Mr. E. F. Knight, the well-known author of that delightful book on South American travel, «The Cruise of the Falcon.» The adventurers had obtained, it was said, from some «ancient mariner» in the north of England, who had, in his youth, been a buccaner, a sketch map indicating the hiding place of a great amount of booty in silver and gold, said to have been buried in the lonely island of Trinidad in the South Atlantic. It was believed that this booty was the result of a robbery of the churches in Lima and elsewhere in Peru. It is recorded that Lord Cochrane (afterwards Earl of Dundonald) in one of his cruises in 1829, called at the island, where he found a band of twenty pirates, who had landed there with their treasure. The gallant officer made them prisoners, and subsequently handed them to the authorities, with the result that all were hanged with the exception of a boy, who was spared on account of his youth. It was the latter, or one of his descendants, who furnished

the map to Mr. Knight. Recently H.M.S. Bramble passed the island, and seeing some tents on the beach it was thought that they might belong to some shipwrecked persons. They were, however, found to be an encampment of Mr. Knight's party, laboriously engaged in digging their way through a landslip which had fallen over the entrance of the cavern where the treasure was supposed to be deposited. We now hear that, after working some four months, and removing about 12,000 tons of earth, the cave was at last reached, but, much to the chagrin and disappointment of the adventurers, only a few broken fragments of earthenware were discovered for its sole contents. All further search for the pirates' horde was fruitless, and the unsuccessful treasure-seekers have left the mysterious island for ever and a day.

Liebig's Extract of Meat Company.

The 25th ordinary general meeting of shareholders in this company was held at the Cannon Street Hotel on Monday, June 2, 1890, Mr. C. Günther in the chair.

The Secretary (Mr. Rotter) read the notice convening the meeting.

The Chairman, Gentlemen, this is the twenty-fifth time the directors have had the pleasure of meeting the shareholders in general meeting, and we must certainly congratulate each other in having passed such a considerable period of time so successfully. We cannot, of course, expect farmers in the River Plate to continue to sell to us their cattle at prices which do not pay, but, as shown in former times, when we had to pay somewhat higher prices for our cattle, our business is such that we may still rely on making a good profit. As stated in the report, we have continued to extend our clientele of customers, and that is one of the powers of this company to have such a large and increasing number of customers who place the most absolute confidence in our extract of meat, that up to the present no other company has been able to sell anything like the quantity we dispose of, and, in fact, most of our competitors in despair have given up their businesses.

The demand for extract has also been stimulated by that most extraordinary epidemic the influenza, which, as no other epidemic before, almost simultaneously spread over all parts of the world not even excepting our own neighbourhood in the River Plate. But for humanity's sake we must hope that the epidemic will not appear again next year. As far as we are concerned, we rely mainly on household consumption for our extract, knowing by experience that the quantity merely absorbed for medical purposes does not bear comparison with the quantity required for household use. The quality of our extract has continued as perfect as ever, and we do not believe that it would be possible to offer to the public any better make.

You will have perceived from the report that we bought a fine estancia called the «Bichadero», in close proximity to our own place. Both our River Plate representatives and ourselves consider this purchase highly useful as enabling us to secure more cattle in good condition and at reasonable prices. In fact, looking at the great number of cattle we require, we must, of course, use every means in our power to secure the largest possible supply at the cheapest prices, and it may be advisable should opportunities offer, to further increase our possession of grazing fields.

We have at every one of our general meetings expressed our satisfaction with the exertion of our various staffs, both in Europe and in the River Plate, and given them many votes of thanks, but on this occasion your directors have considered it their duty to give a more substantial expression to their gratitude by setting apart an amount of £5,000 out of the profits of the year, which will be distributed among a great number of members of our staff in both hemispheres, so as to encourage them to show further their zeal and activity in the interest of the company. I have no doubt that this step will be fully approved by the shareholders. There being no questions asked, I will now move:—

That the twenty-fourth annual report, with balance sheet and profit and loss account thereto annexed, and now before this meeting, be adopted and passed, and that the balance of such profit and loss account, amounting to £173,038 14s. 7d., out of which an interim dividend of 5 per cent. has already been paid, amounting to £24,000, leaving £149,038 14s. 7d., be dealt with, be appropriated in accordance herewith as follows:—

The Chairman: I now beg to move that Mr. C. E. Günther who retires from office pursuant to the articles of association, be and he is hereby re-elected a director of the company.

Mr. Scheibler seconded the motion, which was adopted.

The retiring auditor, Mr. John Sawyer, was then re-elected as auditor of the company at the same remuneration as last year.

The Chairman next moved that a cordial vote of thanks be and is hereby given to all our representatives in the River Plate and in Europe. He must say that their staff, both in the River Plate and in Europe, had exerted themselves to their utmost power to make the business succeed, and he considered that the vote of thanks was thoroughly deserved.

Mr. Scheibler seconded the motion, which was agreed to.

Mr. Segeleke said they ought not to separate without giving a vote of thanks to their excellent chairman and the directors for so satisfactorily managing their affairs; but more particularly to Mr. Günther, the originator of the company, and who had devoted so much attention to it for the last 25 years.

The resolution having been seconded by Captain E. B. Thornton, was agreed to.

The Chairman returned thanks, and the proceedings terminated.

Sundries.

—The Federal Government of Switzerland has been offered, and has accepted the envious post of arbitrator in the Anglo-Portuguese question respecting the Delagoa Bay railway and territory.

—The baritone Sr. Beltrami has retired from the Politiana, and will probably be replaced by Sr. Clariana, a Spanish baritone of good reputation. If the company could only secure a moderately good tenor there would be nothing left to desire, but since the days of the influenza even tolerable tenors seem to have become very scarce.

—We passed through the Plaza Zabala yesterday, but we did not see any signs of the promised improvements, not so much as a spadeful of earth turned over. At present they exist only the mind's eye of some imaginative reporter.

—The pressure of the beginning of the week has evidently used up the native papers, and they have revenged themselves by their exceeding barrenness of the last two days.

—We are constitutionally averse to admitting poetry into our columns, but the following little «pome», culled from a Buenos Aires paper, is so ingenious and so apropos that we reproduce it, although it is not in what the natives delight in calling «theoidom of Bacon».

—Political persecution has reached such a pitch in Entre Rios, and the Government authorities have been so outrageous in their suppression of political liberty that the opposition organ finds it necessary to advise its partisans to emigrate to Paysandu until the election.

—National Bank notes cannot be so very depreciated after all, for we observe that one Pedro Freyre has been sent to prison for stealing \$2 worth of them.

—Colonel Bardas was not liberated on bail, as was at first stated, legal difficulties having arisen over the step, which is opposed by the Criminal Prosecutor.

—The bailiff of General Salvador Tajes' estancia at Manga has got into trouble through detaining two cows that had strayed on to the property under his charge, further aggravating his offence by offering to shoot the proprietor when the latter attempted to claim them. The judges will now reach him to take his beef in a less violent manner.

—Señora Emma Wijak, once a favourite prima donna here, has withdrawn from the boards and means to establish herself in this city as a teacher of the art of bel canto.

—The inauguration of the Southern Tramway, announced for the 18th, has been postponed till the end of the month.

This will give time to complete the sidings, and to finish paying some of the streets through which it passes.

—Peral and his submarine boat are again filling the paper with copy, as an evident resource in the dull season. The "pruebas" of his boat still continue, and one paper yesterday continued to fill five columns with descriptions of the perils, — we mean, perils, of a submarine voyage. Perhaps in the course of a century the boat will pass from "pruebas" to "hechos," and then there will be another outburst of Iberian enthusiasm.

Telegrams

(From our Special Correspondent)

Buenos Aires, July 10.

Affairs in Entre Rios are getting more complicated and look very ominous. Little faith is held in the National Guard, on account of the disaffection in the line.

500 cigarette makers are on strike. The police have arrested several of the ringleaders and of the committee of the Club Union Cigarreros. The strikers are not allowed to hold a meeting.

The financial muddle thickens. The President is opposed to further "curso forzoso," and the scheme for emission of 100 million mortgage bonds is considered sure to pass. The market is greatly excited. Gold ran up to 320, but closed 312. "Conformes" for gold are being refused in the private banks even on deposit, thereby making matters worse than ever. Despair is general.

Commercial

Stock Exchange.

Montevideo, July 10, 1890.

The market remained in a state of anxiety yesterday, awaiting the publication of the regulations of the Law of Inconversion, as also the nomination of the Government appointees to the directorate of the National Bank, and the Emission Committee. The delay is working unfavourably, no one knowing what attitude to assume, and the Bank paper has consequently suffered some depreciation, not being taken so freely as before. Cambistas are charging 15 to 20 per cent discount on paper. Gold has been quoted ex-officially as high as 120.

It would probably be found necessary further to suspend Bolsa operations until Monday.

The shareholders of the National Bank have held a preliminary meeting at which the following were selected as their candidates for Directors, (subject to alterations) — Sres. T. Gischen, M. Lessa, J. J. Hore, P. Piñeyra, M. Llamas, A. Hoffmann, M. Aragayevita and A. Morales. And for Substitutes Sres. E. Castellanos, C. Shaw, E. Rolando, J. A. Palma, A. Sere, L. Puig and L. Vellazo.
