Economies.

In these critical times, when the new Government has the doubly hard task of not only having to compensate for the extravagances of its predecessor, but also to steer the Nation through other serious financial difficulties, it is pleasant to note that the promises of administrative economy made by President Herrera when he assumed office, are being carried out, not indeed with that violence and suddenness which might dislocate the machinery of the State altogether, but quietly and steadily.

As will be well remembered, one of the most fertile fields of extravagance, has hitherto been the sundry and extraordinary expenses of the various Ministries, especially the notorious *Eventuales*. These were made elastic to an unlimited degree, and there is little doubt served to cover up a considerable amount of corruption and misapplication, all the more because there was really no public account given of the moneys spent under this head.

But Dr. Herrera and his Ministers recognised from the first that this was a department in which entire reform was needed. That they intend acting up to their declaration is in a great measure proved by the following tables, giving the Sundry and Extraordinary Expenses of the various Ministries for May and June respectively.

An economy of nearly \$7000, is not to be despised, and we hope and think, may be taken as an earnest of better things to come.

As usual, the least satisfactory portion of the above figures are those for the Ministry of War. No less than 45 per cent of the above cost is monopolised by this Ministry, certainly the least useful and least necessary of all. The Military and Navy expenses have always been monstrously heavy here. We believe we are justified in saying that there are very few, if any, countries in the world where these expenses are so heavy in proportion to the population. And although it is only fair to acknowledge that reductions have already been made in this department, we would like to see them greatly increased. Considering the peaceful prospects of the Republic, and the necessity of public money for the foment of immigration and public works, it is little short of monstrous that nearly half of the above expenses should be swallowed by a Ministry which is of the smallest benefit to the country at large and the services of which cannot for a moment be compared with those rendered by any of the other Ministries.

The Situation.

The favourable feeling initiated on Saturday, was fully confirmed yesterday, and the opportune publication of the long looked for regulations to the Law of Inconversion has removed the last cause of complaint. These regulations, a translation of which is given in another column, deal principally with the duties of the Committee of Emission, and plainly evince that their post is intended to be no sinecure, but that they are meant to keep a close guard and hold a tight hand over all those operations of the Bank which fall under their jurisdiction. This helps to confirm the idea that there is no intention of trifling with the situation, but that the Government intends seriously to do all in its power to restore public confidence in the Bank and its emission.

The most important paragraph is perhaps the final one, which ordains that all Bolsa operations in public funds or other values, shall be in legal money, (*moneda legal*) that is to say, in inconvertible notes of the National Bank. This finally sets at rest the question that kept the Bolsa closed all last week, and we think we are justified in saying that it meets with the approbation of the large majority.

It is very reassuring to notice that the appointments made by the Government to the Presidency, Directorate and Fiscal Committee of the National Bank have given very general satisfaction. Even the most confirmed opposition organs extend a welcome to the names as those of men of integrity and ability, in short, just the men that were wanted to save the situation. It must be remembered, however, that the election of the remaining six members of the Directorate, the majority of two to one, rests with the shareholders, nor can the question be considered finally solved until the issue of the general meeting on the 24th instant be known. If the shareholders complete the task so well begun by the Government in electing men in whom entire confidence can be reposed, all will be well, and if we do not see conversion resumed very quickly, we shall at least see gold quoted—as indeed it ought to be now—as at a merely nominal premium. If, on the other hand, the undue influences and juggling tricks which unfortunately are occasionally allowed to come into play gain the upper hand on this occasion, all the good so far done will be lost, and we shall witness a return to a state of affairs far worse than before. Judging, however, from the present attitude of the shareholders, and the care being taken not only to select but to secure the election of proper candidates, we have every hope of the former coming to pass, and not the latter.

If we do not repeat the many favourable rumours prevalent as to operations for the assistance of the Bank, it is solely because as yet they are no more than rumours. But at all events they serve a useful purpose in sustaining the hopes of the market and in tending to a better state of affairs. If any of them result to be correct, so much the better for every one. The resumption of Bolsa transactions today, will no doubt show that the general tone of the market corresponds with this hopeful view. Even from the ex-official quotations of yesterday it was perfectly noticeable that the general tendency was towards an improved state of affairs, namely a falling gold premium, and a rising value in stocks and shares.

(July 16th)

An Abuse.

During the momentary alarm of the closing days of last week, a number of petty tradesmen, grocers, and others, supplying the public with general commodities of daily necessity, refused to take National Bank notes except at a discount of 20 per cent. As for small sums there was a great scarcity of circulating medium, this virtually amounted to raising their prices 20 per cent on all goods, for cash. Even now that official quotations of gold have commenced on the Bolsa, and the premium there, a purely speculative one, is from 13 to 15 per cent, the same discount, to the best of our knowledge, is maintained. The *campesinos* or money changers, have also, from the very first, taken advantage of the alarm and ignorance of the lower classes, and maintained a discount quite out of proportion to the real necessities of the situation.

For the smaller shopkeepers, landlords and others, to continue so high a discount is, in sheer exploitation, not to say robbery. Even taking the discount charged by the *campesinos*, which also includes their commission, this was only about 20 per cent for some few hours, 24 at the most. And the ex-official Bolsa quotations were always lower than those of the *campesinos*. It follows then that in sustaining a discount of 20 per cent on paper money, these tradesmen are simply consulting their own momentary interests, and grossly abusing the public.

It would be difficult to trace how the movement was initiated, for each makes the excuse that he does it, because his neighbours do it,

and he cannot afford to sell for less than they. This is a most mischievous principle, by which a small minority, representing perhaps one-fifth or one-sixth is enabled to force the hand of the whole market. It is somewhat analogous to the habit of carrying arms. If the minority of inhabitants habitually carry arms, the practice is forced on the majority, who feel obliged to do the same in self defence, and so as not to be at a disadvantage.

But apart from the clean robbery of this exaggerated discount, there is a very mischievous tendency in it. It helps to increase the alarm of the lower classes, who accept it as a veritable standard, and it retards the return of conversion. The more reluctance there is shown amongst the mass of people to accept the National notes, we will not say at par, but at their Bolsa value, the more difficult will be the return to conversion, and the more troublesome will be the public inconvenience. It is a cause and effect that re-act the one upon the other.

There has been little reason from the first, and there is less than ever now, for any discount at all to be charged upon National Notes for small amounts. It is simply ridiculous that any one should be asked to pay to-day 10 cents for that which cost 10 a fortnight ago. Some of the more important shops and institutions have, from the first, received the notes at par, trusting to the extra custom to atone for the small percentage lost in exchange. It is greatly to be lamented that all the shops have not followed their example. Still more it is to be lamented that at present the discount falls most heavily on the poorer classes, who are not allowed long credit, and who buy their goods in small instalments.

We repeat then, that the discount now charged by the *almaceneros* and other small shopkeepers is most unjustifiable, unnecessary and mischievous, and it should be protested against in the strongest manner possible.

(July 17th)

Figures and Facts.

June has always been a month of dulness and depression, sometimes of misfortune, for this Republic, and it has not belied its character in the present year. Turning first to the Customs Receipts, we notice that they fell to \$700,863, against \$954,484 in May and \$963,936 in April, that is to say they are about \$250,000 below the average of the last 12 months. This falling off, however, is nothing unusual in that month, and only recently we quoted figures to show how steadily the customs receipts had increased compared with those of previous years, and how high an average, little short of a million dollars a month, had been attained in the last twelve months.

Attention is next attracted by the port statistics for June, which we published last week. There were only 1587 arrivals of passengers against 1803 departures, showing a balance against us of 216. Moreover the arrivals declined from 2969 in May to 1587 in June, a falling off of nearly one half. This falling off was chiefly amongst Italians and Spaniards, and of course, due to the Government orders to restrict the number of state immigrants. At the same time it is only fair to add that there was also a considerable falling off in the departures, which declined from 2055 in May to 1803 in June. These two months generally show an unusually large number of departures, owing to those going home for the European summer.

A more reassuring effect may be obtained, however, by reference to the table published yesterday, comparing the arrivals for the first six months of the present year with those for the corresponding period of 1889. For that period the arrivals increased from 8420 in 1889 to 15,523 in 1890, an increase of 7103. The departures were 8743 in 1889 against 5816 in 1890, or a difference of only 2927. The gross increment, taking also into account the passengers from Argentine and Oriental ports, was 10660 in 1889 against 5279 in 1889, or an increase of 5281 over last year.

These figures show that the immigration movement to these shores has greatly increased this year, and become of really serious account. And as the departures have not increased in proportion to the arrivals, they also show that those who come, come to stay. As might be expected, the chief increase has been in Italians and Spaniards, that is to say, in passengers of the immigrant class. Of the 15523 arrivals from beyond seas in the six months of the present year, 9203, or over 57 per cent, were Italians, and 2594, or 16.5 per cent were Spaniards, making between them nearly 76 per cent, for all other nationalities. The number of Italians arriving increased from 3869 in 1889 to 9203 in 1890, a difference of 5334. This large figure entirely overshadows all the other nationalities. Although we are glad to notice so large an increase, we would have been far more pleased, and have considered it far more beneficial for the country in general, had the proportion been otherwise distributed. It is decidedly a matter of regret that the figures for nations of Saxon and Teutonic blood, small as they are compared with the above, show an absolute falling off in 1890. We think that in solely encouraging one class of immigration—and such a class—the authorities are

making a serious mistake, which they will find out when it is too late to remedy it.

ARGENTINE

(July 15th)

Finance.

On Thursday afternoon there was a conference in the Government House between the President and his Ministers and the Finance Committee of the two Chambers, with the view of discussing the Hypothecary note bill and the proposal of some Deputies to establish *curso forzoso*. The Minister of Finance rejected this proposal positively, and it was finally resolved to accept his bill, with some slight alterations.

Previously to this conference the managers of the private banks and several merchants held a meeting and afterwards waited on the Minister of Finance to represent to him the alarm which was felt by the public at the mere suggestion of the bill, or, at least, a ready caused a run upon the banks, the depositors of gold. The Minister could not give any reply till after the Cabinet Meeting, but in a second interview with him he informed the deputations that he was decidedly opposed to *curso forzoso*, which would be inefficient and also inconvenient.

He also declared that there was no intention to authorize any further issue of bank notes, except those of less than \$1, to the amount of five or six millions, as they are badly wanted in the provinces. The Finance Committee of the Chamber of Deputies met in the evening, the Minister of Finance being present, and discussed the distribution of the hypothecary notes, and also to limit to \$250,000 the amount of any one loan to a single person. The amount of a loan is not to exceed one third of the value of the property mortgaged.

The Minister of Finance says that these hypothecary notes will not be driven out of circulation by guaranteed bank notes, because neither issue has any intrinsic value. The copper coin recently issued are disappearing, the Minister means to issue nickel coins.

Madero Port.

An arrangement has been made with the contractors of the Port Work, relative to the construction of the channels, pipes, &c., for carrying away the flood waters from the streets of the city, so as to prevent the works from being flooded. The cost to be paid by the Government, will be \$246,047; these works are nearly completed.

Dock No. 3, is to be finished by September 30th, 1892, and Dock No. 4 by June 30th, 1893.

Railway News.

—Dr. Uladislao Frias has been recognised as a member of the local Boards of the P. C. Buenos Aires y Pacifico, the P. C. de Bahia, and the P. C. de la Villa Maria y Rufino line.

—The Executive has authorised the Great Southern of Santa Fe and Cordoba Railway to open the 2nd section of their line up to kil. 105, Venado Tuerto Station, to the public.

—The Board of Public Works have reported favourably on Mr. Bodalini's project to build a broad-gauge railway without guarantee from Pilar on the Pacific Railway to the Rio Lujan.

—The tariffs for goods and passengers on the F. C. Nord Este Argentino have been approved by the Executive.

—Messrs. G. Mesheit and Luis Gaudron, representing the Buenos Aires and Cordoba Railway Company, have purchased Messrs. G. Soler and Co.'s railway concession from Villa Maria to Reconquista, with this new concession, the company will extend the lines from the mouth of the Pilcomayo fronting Asuncion to Villa Maria, province of Cordoba a distance of 1150 kilometres, passing through Santa Fe, Coladine, and Reconquista, Resistencia, Formosa and other important colonies.

Exportation of Cattle.

The Argentine Consul in Marseilles makes the following report of the consignment of live cattle from Buenos Aires to that port.—Ten of the animals had an average dead weight of 271 kilos and five others gave an average of 240 kilos. The beef was sold at 142 francs per kilo.

Public Lands.

The Minister of the Interior has authorized Dr. Basavilbaso to receive proposals for the purchase of more than 300 leagues of land by a single person or company; the maximum was originally fixed at 500 leagues, but it is considered desirable to facilitate the formation of syndicates for buying the lands.

Preserved Meat.

Sr Benito Martinez de Castro is about to form a meat preserving establishment at Concordia, and has his three leagues of camp in order to rear cattle thereon for the factory.

Rosario Santa Fe.

The Literary and Social Guild gave an entertainment last Friday, which proved the most successful of the season. The first part of the programme was as follows:—Piano Solo, Duo by Misses Chute and Wood. Song "She wore a wreath of roses" Mr. Mobbs. Recitation "The Pilgrims' Song," Miss Amy Wood, and an encore being loudly called for she favoured the audience with "The Wedding Bells." Instrumental "Trio No. 1" by Bahr, Messrs Witt, Thielecke, and Trubenbach. Mrs. Chute, Song "Withered Roses."

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
