The 18th July, 1830.

The 18th. of July is a date that will ever be memorable in the history of this Republic. It is now almost sixty years since on this day, amidst the jubilation of the people, the Constitution of the Republic was solemnly sworn, and a nation, full of life and vigour, constituted itself independent under the name of the Oriental Republic of Uruguay.

By the treaty signed in Rio Janeiro by the plenipotentiaries of Brazil and the Argentine Republic on the 27th August 1828, the independence of the Oriental Republic had been recognized, but the swearing of the Constitution did not take place till some two years afterwards.

In congratulating the Oriental nation, and its government upon the happy result of this auspicious day, we add our earnest wishes that it may continue to follow in the path of progress it has so successfully initiated to the fulfilment of its grand destiny.

Canalization.

After railways and high roads, and next in importance to them for the purpose of facilitating traffic, come the «moving roads» of canals.

In Holland, both for transport and irrigation, canals take the very foremost position; in Great Britain and other European countries as well as in the United States, they also play an important part, and for certain classes of traffic, stone, coal, lumber and other heavy material, when speed of transport is not a primary object they are a valuable adjunct to railways and entirely supersede cartage, being so cheaply worked, and when once properly constructed, costing so very little to keep in repair.

The canals or cuttings, which like the «New Cut» at Bristol, connecting one basin with another, or the Boca at Buenos Aires, serve to increase the shipping accommodation, giving more room for the loading and unloading of small vessels, are a most useful addition to any port; and interior canals, or canalized rivers, which for irrigation purposes feed a thousand small areas branching from the main trunk in all directions, are invaluable to agriculture.

In England, apart from their utility, they form one of the most picturesque features of country life and few of us forget the characteristic old barge, as it glides steadily along up the quiet canal, through locks whose ponderous gates open to let it pass, heavily laden with the nation's wealth.

When shall we see the same thing here? Several schemes for canalizing rivers or cutting canals for different purposes have been already placed before this Government for consideration, some of which have been approved and accepted, but up to the present no work of the sort has actually been commenced.

In the department of Montevideo, no less than three canal schemes have been proposed; one for canalizing the Santa Lucia presented by Mr. Croker and others, one for canalizing the Pantanos, Santa Lucia, and San José, presented by señor Grané and backed by an Argentine Syndicate, and a shipping canal up the Miguelete in which several important Montevidean capitalists are interested.

The question of relative cost is one that will doubtless considerably affect the Santa Lucia project, but the advantage to be reaped by agriculture in the important departments of San José and Florida from irrigation and facility of export cannot be doubted, while the gain to shipping by the formation of a species of Boca at the mouth of the Miguelete is also very clear. Other canalization projects have been laid before Government; one at Arroyo de las Vacas, in Colonia, for example, and another in Rocha, the latter proposed by Mr. R. R. Pealer, who includes it as the final section of his projected railway to Lake Merim along the margin of the Cebollati.

Let us hope some of these schemes may soon be carried out, for it still remains for some enterprising engineer to claim the honour of constructing the first canal in Uruguay.

(HAYAS AGENCY)

(LATEST)

Paris, July 17.

The papers publish the act of accusation against General Boulanger, accusing him of complicity in a plot against the Government, of an attempt upon the security of the State, and of agitation.

The office of the High Court of Justice published the legal assignment to-day.

Buenos Aires, July 17.
The proclamation of Costa as candidate for the governorship of the Province takes place in La Plata July 28.

Governor Jarez arrived from Cordoba this afternoon.

The Minister of Foreign Affairs denies any difficulties with Chili.

The oppositions meet at General Mitre's tonight to settle the bases of their programme.

Rio de Janeiro, July 17.

The man who attempted to shoot the Emperor was arrested yesterday afternoon. He is an employee of Portuguese Nationality. All the papers are very indignant at the attempt.

Buenos Aires, July 17.

The Government of Cordoba has negotiated with Montgomery and Co. of London a loan of 5 million pounds sterling at 5 per cent interest, at the rate of 83 per cent. It is said the same Province is offered another 25 million dollars on the same terms. Governor Marcos Jarez will come to Buenos Aires next week to sign the contracts.

A fête is being organised to celebrate the laying of the foundation stone of the new Theatre Colon.

The impresario Clacchi has rented the Onruvia theatre for next year for \$800,000 national. A French dramatic company will appear there.

A company with a capital of £280,000 sterling is being organised in London to colonize lands south of the Republic. A limited Company is also being formed to establish tramways at Mar de la Plata.

The appearance of two new French papers is announced.

The Spanish Societies are organising great fêtes for the 21st, to celebrate the inauguration of works for a palace for the Spanish legation on a site presented by Sr. Castells.

President Celman has telegraphed to the Emperor of Brazil congratulating him on his escape. All the press condemn the attempt entirely and consider it without justification.

Weather bad.

(VIA GALVESTON)

Vienna, July 15.

The elections are over. There have been elected 71 Germans, 71 conservatives, 43 old Czechs, 54 young Czechs and 4 Bishops.

London, July 15.

According to the *St. James's Gazette* the widow of Mr. Acton, who committed suicide in the Tegernsee lake in Bavaria, belonged to an Italian family.

Berlin, July 15.

Owing to the initiative of Bismarck and Salisbury there will be held in Brussels next September a conference to discuss the claims of European powers in Central Africa, and to solve questions that have arisen since the Congo conference. The slavery question will also be treated.

London, July 15.

Lord Lytton, British ambassador in France, in ends resigning on account of bad health.

Paris, July 16.

Yesterday, Deroulede, Laguerre and other boulangist members of the Chamber of Deputies tried to hold a meeting in front of the Strasbourg statue in the Place Concord. About 2000 people assembled. When Deroulede began to speak, a police commissary named Clement stopped him. Deroulede then placed a crown on the statue and excited the crowd to cry «Vive Boulanger». Clement then tried to arrest Deroulede who resisted forcibly and refused to accompany him to the police office. Clement then seized him but the people made a rescue, treating the policemen roughly. The latter then charged the mob, making many arrests. Deroulede and Laguerre were taken in a carriage to «La Presse» printing office, in front of which the people made a tumultuous manifestation. The police cleared the street and made further arrests. These incidents have caused a sensation in the city, and it is feared they will have a bad effect.

London, July 16.

The approaching marriage of the Princess Louise of Wales excites great interest. The groom is 17 years older than the bride and comes of a Scotch family, he has great wealth and an irreproachable name. The Empress-widow Victoria and the Kings of Denmark and Greece will be present at the marriage. The Shah has bought a handsome present in Bond Street. Rothschild and his sons have presented a collar of rubies valued at \$80,000. The Queen will come from Osborne to be present, despite the rheumatism from which she is suffering.

(Note.—The telegram gives the bridegroom's name as «Count Fife». We believe the person meant is Alexander William George Duff, 6th Earl of Fife, and a member of the House of Peers.)

HERMANOS GOLD MINING COMPANY LIMITED.

We learn from Messrs. Elliot, Maccio and Co., the agents of this Company here, that Mr. Mc Carthy, the manager, has informed them that the outstanding lawsuit with Sr. Barriel Posadas has been gained by the Company, and that the final sentence has been carried into effect, the intruders on the property of the Company having been ejected in the presence of the Justice of the Peace and the commissaries, and their ranches demolished. There is now no further obstacle to the progress of the Company, which will now be able to go ahead, and as soon as the machinery already there, is in working order, a handsome yield may be looked for.

OPERATION.

Our attention has been called to a difficult and dangerous operation that was recently performed on señor Bavo of San José by the surgeons Casanella, De Leon and Isola. Sr. Bavo was suffering from stricture of the acrophagus, and quite unable to take any description of food. The only and last resource in such cases is the difficult operation known as «gastro fistula» and which consists of opening an artificial mouth to the stomach. This was carried out with complete success by the surgeons named, being the second operation of the kind ever attempted here, and the patient is now on a fair way to complete recovery, a living monument of surgical skill.

THE WATER WORKS.

Mr. Galwey, the manager of the Water Works Co. has issued invitations for the inauguration, to take place at Santa Lucia this morning, of the new filters and deposits that have been recently constructed. The addition of these, we understand, will greatly improve the quality of the water supplied, and there will be no more grounds for complaint. A special express train will leave the Central station at 8.30 this morning, and among the guests invited are the President of the Republic, Ministers, representatives of the press, and many notables. A sumptuous breakfast will be served at Santa Lucia, and the party will return in the afternoon.

Entries received until 8 p.m. on July 27. Weights will be assigned August 1, and forfeits declared until Aug. 5.

GENERAL MIRO.

This veteran, one of the few surviving heroes of the Independence, will be the object of a grand popular manifestation today being the anniversary of the swearing of the Constitution. The procession, we understand, will leave the Plaza Constitución at 1 p.m., passing through the streets Sarandi, Ituzingo, 25 de Mayo and Uruguay, to Cuareim, where the General will join it, and it will return to the Plaza. A large number of Societies, Corporations and School will take part, and all citizens are invited to join. Various presentations, for which popular subscriptions have been opened, will be made, and speeches given. A military and police guard have been appointed to maintain order. A decree will also be issued promoting the hero to the rank of Lieutenant General.

FOOTBALL.

Weather permitting (which at the time of writing seems very doubtful) a match will be played this afternoon between Montevideo and the British Navy. Navy: Leonard, captain, Lieutenants Hale, Tower and Parsons, Messrs. Hingham, Mitchell, Chaffield, Waisell, Cooper and Traut Umpire, H. C. Alexander. An interesting match is expected.

DOUBLE MURDER.

News was received yesterday from Villa Independencia of a horrible double murder committed that morning. The victims were a married couple whose name is not given and the assassins are believed to be two Italians, employed in the La Paz quarries. The motive is supposed to have been robbery.

CIRCUS.

Messrs. Crodara and Carbone, proprietors of the Politeama theatre expect a first class circus company from Europe in the middle of next month.

COLONIZATION.

We learn that Government has bought for \$50,000 some 12000 squares of land in the department of Artigas, near San Eugenio and close to the Cabello colony. The land will be given in charge to Sr. Cabello, who undertakes to subdivide and colonize it, returning the purchase price to the State within five years.

Argentine Republic

CONGRESS.

The following were included amongst the matters before Congress, at the last sitting of the Deputies, particulars being read out but no business done. Amongst others, a Bill calling for a credit of 50,000 dollars to defray the expenses of making the necessary surveys for a canal from Cordoba to Rosario.

Engineer Antonio Lavandera proposed the construction of an elevated tramway, within the municipality of the capital 25 kiloms. in length uniting the centre of the city with the Plazas de Mayo, Julio and Colon, on the north with Belgrano and passing through the Recoleta and 3 de Febrero park; on the west the Mayo Avenue to Flores and on the South the Boca and Barracas. Elevation up to 8 metres. No guarantee asked but 100 million right to expropriate the land necessary for stations, etc.

Frederick Benelise asked the suppression of articles 105 and 278 of the mining code.

M. Rodriguez and Co. asked permission to construct and work a port on the River Quequen Grande with depth sufficient for ocean steamers drawing 21 feet. The right of constructing railways for their own use reserved by the Company. No guarantee asked, but authorization to expropriate 200

metres on both sides of the River Quequen to the length of 10 kiloms.

A project of law was presented by the National Government converting the 600 loan on the Port Works into 4 1/2 per cent bonds as follows:

The National Executive shall convert the Obligaciones de Puerto de Buenos Aires, created by Law No. 1257 of 27th October 1882, bonds of 6 per cent interest and 100 sinking fund, into new bonds of the same denomination, bearing 4 1/2 per cent interest and 100 amortization in drawings at par, payable in London; the Government at liberty to increase the sinking fund.

These Obligaciones shall be issued in series «pari passu» with the opening of the several sections of the Buenos Aires port. They shall be issued in payment of those works.

According to paragraph nine of the first article of law No. 1257, stipulating the mode of payment specified in Art. 13 of the contract between the Executive and the concessionaires, under date Oct. 1st, 1886 the price at which these Obligaciones are to be received in payment shall be fixed, and in London. The current quotation, in payment, shall be that of the last issue of Argentine bonds of the same interest and sinking funds, but at the same time shall not exceed the quotation of any new loan launched or in process of negotiation, for at least three months after the instalments paid on the first sections. From the current quotation shall be deducted the interest due and the coupon running on the bonds.

Should any increase in the income tax in Great Britain take place, the Argentine Government shall indemnify to the amount of the difference that may arise in the 2 1/2 per cent commission in the launching of this new loan.

F. AMBROSIO KING

We learn that the claims of the Buenos Aires Rowing Club and the Tigre Boat Club upon Mr. F. Ambrosio King, have been discharged in full, the receipts given by the respective Hon. Treasurers to Mr. King, being as follows: that of the Buenos Aires Club for \$1144.61 m.m. (the full amount due, instead of \$2400, erroneously stated some time ago) and that of the Tigre Club for \$800 m.m.

RAILWAYS NEWS.

The Bustamante railway concession for a line from Chile via Antuco Pass Buenos Aires has been sold to a French company called the «Compagnie Française de Chemin de Fer International de Buenos Aires au Chili» who take it over for 4 million francs and 30 per cent of the profits. The concession enjoys a guarantee of 20 years. The line is to run through Navarro, 25 de Mayo, Dolivar, Guamine, Carbué, Achá and other important settlements, and to terminate in Jumbal in Chile, say 1400 kilometres of way.
