False Telegrams.

Yesterday's *Stiglo*, referring to the serious fall of the United Debt in the London market, attributes it to an alarming telegram despatched by an English contemporary (*por un colega inglés*).

The *Nacion*, also, calls attention to the fact that the Oriental Consul in Marseilles has found it necessary officially to deny rumours circulated by an English journal, relative to the National Bank.

With regard to the first, as we are the only English paper published here, the imputation apparently rests on our shoulders. So far as it touches us, we hasten to deny it most implicitly. We have no connection or correspondence with any London paper, and neither now or at any time of our existence have we telegraphed news to any one in London. If our name has appeared in connection with any news so transmitted it has been without our knowledge or authority. Moreover, the transmission of an «alarming» telegram would be in direct contradiction to the policy we have consistently maintained from the first. Whilst preserving the right of expressing an independent opinion, we have always tried to give affairs the best aspect consistent with facts, and so far from assisting have always opposed anything approaching an alarmist or pessimist policy. Even at the risk of offending a large section of our English subscribers, we have maintained this policy with relation to recent events, and are certainly not likely to change it suddenly for the sake of despatching false news to the English market.

That some such false news has been sent, there is little doubt. That alone could account for the sudden fall of the United debt in the London market. The same unscrupulousness which allows the rascally speculators who have too long been the curse of this market to spread false reports here, in order that they may grow fat on the losses of the innocent and helpless, would also allow them to play the same immoral tricks abroad, if they found a chance of succeeding. Such a process is no novelty, it has been done before frequently, and will be done again so long as there are rogues on one hand and dupes on the other. Thousands may suffer, a whole nation may be discredited, but no matter if the ring of gamblers can pocket a few thousand dollars by the process. The only thing they fear is failure.

We trust that this open expression of our opinion will be sufficient to carry the conviction that, so far from lending ourselves to such dishonest tricks, we hold them in the greatest contempt and abhorrence.

Ministerial Crisis

The news which we gave as rumour yesterday, has since been confirmed, though reserve is still maintained as to the exact details.

General Villar presented his resignation as Minister of War and Marine, on Wednesday evening, with the character of indeclinable. His alleged reason was ill health.

Dr. C. Pena also presented his resignation, equally indeclinable, of the portfolio of Finance, giving as reason the opposition offered to his financial schemes by the President and other members of the Cabinet.

The official acceptance of these resignations has not yet been published. The remaining Ministers, namely Sres. Berro, Vidal and Capurro, retain their posts at present, but, we understand, have signified their willingness to resign should the situation demand the entire renewal of the Cabinet.

The attitude of the President is entirely reserved, and nothing has transpired as to whom he intends appointing to the vacancies, though in view of the urgency of the situation, it is thought the posts will not be allowed to remain long unoccupied.

As probable candidates for the Ministry of Finance, rumour has already mentioned Dr. Carlos Maria Ramirez, Senator Duncan Stewart, Sr. Alcides Montero, Dr. Aurelio Berro, and others. The Ministry of War will probably rest between General Santos Arribio, Inspector of Arms, General Luis Eduardo Perez and Colonel Callorda. The decree making the new appointments is expected any moment.

A horrible accident occurred on Wednesday evening, on the Union tram line, nearly in the centre of the town of Union. The driver of one of the tram cars, Andrés Rossi by name, whilst leaning over the platform to adjust the reins, overbalanced himself, and fell under the wheels, which passed over his head, crushing it horribly. Death must have been instantaneous, for the guard and a passenger were at the other end of the car, and noticed nothing until the plunging of the horses called their attention, when they managed to stop the car, and found Rossi lying on the road, already dead. Rossi was an Italian, about 48 years old, and had been employed as driver on the line for more than 20 years. It is believed he was slightly intoxicated at the time of the accident. He leaves a wife and several small children quite unprovided for.

Sundries.

—We hear that Rosario Santa Fé is to be blessed (or the reverse) by another English paper, to be called the *Rosario Daily News*. Considering the large English Colony there, if we are not mistaken larger than that of Montevideo, we have often wondered that there should not be a representative paper there. We can only attribute it to the strange reluctance of English people abroad to support a paper in their own language, though they are always ready enough to read it.

—The «manifestations of coachmen to protest against the Municipal tariff has been transferred to eight o'clock this evening.

—The continued depreciation of paper money, and the violent oscillations to which it is subject through the machinations of unscrupulous Bolsa gamblers, have caused the Tramway companies to notify that after the 25th instant, their fares will be charged either in gold, or in paper money at a premium of fifty per cent. As usual, the helpless public and the poorer classes will be the sufferers. The companies will really be gainers by this proceeding, except in the loss of traffic.

—The Executive Power has signed and published the Law of Taxes on Rolling Stock for 1890-91. The term fixed for the payment of the tax is, for the capital from Sept. 1 to Oct. 31, for the Departments Sept. 15 to Dec. 15.

—Our readers will hardly want reminding of the Cienfuegos dance which takes place this evening, and which has been anxiously looked forward to as a pleasant landmark in an exceptionally dull season. The dance takes place at the French Saloon, calle Araya 228, between Maldonado and Canelones. Dancing will commence at 8.30 and is supposed to conclude at midnight.

—The London financial and other papers to hand for July 29, from the *S. A. Journal* downwards, are all very strong in their assurances of the impossibility of a revolution and the preservation of public peace in Buenos Aires. Had their publication been delayed another day they would have received the news of the revolution, which, unfortunately for their predictions, broke out on the very date of their publication.

—Our Buenos Aires contemporaries advise a «Grand Amate Musical Concert». This reads rather funny, but perhaps the advertisers know what they are about. We have recollections of amateur concerts which were a long way from musical.

—The management at the Politeama has not been able to secure the services of the tenor Tamagno for the patriotic festivals of August. The programme for the three gala nights has been arranged as follows.—Saturday, «Favorita» with Oxilia, Kaschmann and Gini Pizzorni. Sunday «Lucia di Lammermoor» with Oxilia and Svelcher. Monday, «Gioconda» Oxilia, Kaschmann and Gini Pizzorni. These three performances are not included in the subscription nights.

—The *B. A. Herald* says,—«Ex-President Juarez is about the unhappiest man in the Republic. He has the unenviable notoriety of being the only President the Republic has had since the federation whose administration was so bad that people of all parties detested him, and who was compelled to resign. He cannot appear in any city in the country with safety, nor can he find it pleasant to travel, and there is nothing left for him except to go to England and drop into obscurity, as Rosas did before him.» To this we may add that it is to be hoped he will not be allowed to leave the country, until he and some of the other thieves who were his accomplices have been made to disgorge some of their ill gotten plunder.

—The committee of the Club Uruguay has finally decided not to give the customary ball on August 25, the times are too critical.

—The «Mikado» is enjoying great prosperity in Buenos Aires. The next production of the Company will be the unforgettable «H. M. S. Pinafore». It is said that the Company has greatly taken the fancy of the natives.

—People are beginning to say that it is time for the committee of the W. E. E. S. to show signs of existence. The season has two or three months more to run before they can be allowed to rest upon their laurels.

—A tall man may be a thorough rogue, yet he will stand high in any community.

—The death occurred yesterday of Sr. Eduardo Davila, a formerly one of our leading auctioneers. He will be much lamented in business circles.

—The marriage of Mr. Isidro Fynn to Miss Valentina Butler, «both of this parish», was celebrated on Wednesday evening with great éclat. There was a brilliant ball in the house of the bride's father.

—The tramcar gave a sudden lurch in rounding a curve, and the charming young girl who was clinging to a strap nearly sat down in the lap of the man with the fur-lined overcoat who was sitting in the corner. «I beg your pardon, sir», she exclaimed hastily. «Not at all, miss», he replied, encouragingly. «Try it again.»

—Gold closed yesterday at 1401 according to which a paper dollar is worth 71 cents.

—Sr. Clouseau Mortet, Director General of Immigration has left to inspect the colonies established in Isla Cabello and Guaviyu. His report on the colonies inspected in his previous tour is already in the hands of Government.

—The Municipal Board has proposed to Government to purchase the lands in front of the Central Cemetery, to be converted into a *plazuela* for the evolution of troops during military funerals.

Argentine Republic

Sanitary Works.

Sr. Medici has been fined, altogether, \$970 for leaving the streets in bad condition after making the excavations for the sanitary works. He does not pay the fines. The Intendant has divided the Sanitizers' department into four sections and peremptory orders have been given for the sweeping to be done effectually.

Tucuman Bank.

It is stated that this bank has in circulation \$2,000,000 beyond the authorized note-issue.

It is also said that Dr. Ernesto Colombres, President of the National Credit Office, will be sent to inspect the affairs of the Bank.

Monument.

Dr. Alem and the other leaders of the Revolution propose that a monument shall be raised, by public subscription, to the memory of those who were killed in the Parque.

Fraud.

The sum of which the Provincial Bank has been defrauded by some of its officials is \$456,234.

New Dock.

The Juarez Government ordered a contract to be entered into with Messrs. Madero and Sons for constructing a careening dock at the extreme South of the port, at an estimated cost of \$1,570,458 gold, but the Inspector of Public Works reports that a contract involving such a heavy expenditure ought to be offered to public competition, and that it is necessary to be cautious in the matter because the Port works will far exceed the estimated cost of \$2,000,000 gold.

Death of Capt. Page.

The sad news of the death of Captain Page in his attempt to get to Bolivia via the Pilcomayo has caused sincere regret. His corpse was brought down the river by three men of his ill-fated expedition; but the fate of the rest, including a son of the lamented officer, Mr. Nelson Page, is as yet unknown. Four months ago Captain Page started up the Pilcomayo in the small steamer «General Paz», commanded by Lieutenant Zorrilla, with a packet of soldiers as an escort. Before reaching the western bend of the river he left the *Paz* behind and continued his way in a stern wheeling drawing only 8 inches, and two large

canoes, with provisions for three months, arms etc. The ascent of the stream was terribly difficult, and before they reached the Patito swamp, food began to get scarce; and soon the poor explorers had to eat reptiles and anything they could pick up. In the swamp they lost their way, and could only advance 200 metres a day, by damming the water to keep the steamer afloat. Lieutenant Zorrilla and Dr. Casias were then sent back for assistance. The trip down was most dangerous, as the river had risen and the current was very rapid. Before reaching the confluence Dr. Casias became halfmad from hunger, jumped into the river and swam to the bank, telling Lieutenant Zorrilla that he preferred to remain there. It is feared that he must either have been captured by the Indians or killed by wild beasts. Before leaving poor Page Dr. Casias considered his case lost, as he was very bad with scurvy and debility. The soldiers kept up their spirits bravely, ready to repel the hostile Indians that hovered round the swamp. Lieutenant Zorrilla endured terrible sufferings when descending the river. He says that help to the survivors will take three months to reach them unless sent round by Bolivia. We understand that the stern-wheeler, called the «Bolivia», in which Captain Page went up the river was built in B. Aires by I Mac Gregor & Co. She belongs to a syndicate in England, who supplied all the money for the expedition; and if it had reached Bolivia, this syndicate would have got a large land concession from Government. Mr. Kerr, who was sent out specially by the Royal Geographical Society, is with the expedition.

Damages.

The Court of Appeal has confirmed the judgment of the Court below which ordered the Southern Railway Company to pay \$12,000 damages, with costs, to D. Rodolfo Roballos, who was injured in an accident on the railway between Glew and Durazno.

The Company appealed on the ground that the ticket was issued by the Eusebio Railway Company, that the accident was caused by the breaking of the axle of a luggage van belonging to that Company and that the damages were excessive.

Great preparations are being made by the Oriental Club for the concert next Monday.

The house of Spinetto (hijos) has applied for a moratorium.

Vice-Governor Eleazar Garzon has assumed command of the province of Cordoba.

Congress has commenced the discussion of the new financial schemes.
