Parliament.

In the Chamber of Senators, on Wed-
nesday, various matters included by the
E.P. in the convocation to extraordinary
sittings were referred to Committee, and
a copy of the Message forwarded to the
other Chamber.

The report of the Committee on the
Law of Licenses (patentes) for 1890-91,
was read, and the Law, which is merely
a renewal of that of the previous year,
was put in discussion. After a few ex-
planatory remarks from Sres. Silva and
Cuestas, it was approved in general and
in detail. The second discussion was
suppressed and the law declared fully
sanctioned. No further business was
transacted.

Opinion.

Mr. W. R. Lawson, a recent visitor to
the River Plate, writes in a London
paper as follows:—

Recently the Uruguayan side of the
River Plate has also had a small crisis
but that is a mere reflection of the larger
one in Argentine. Uruguay itself is a
solid, conservative and quietly progress-
ing country. It has hitherto been dis-
tinguished as the only country in South
America possessing and strictly adhering
to a metallic currency. And its currency
is still metallic in spite of the so-called
National Bank of Uruguay having be-
come unable to pay its notes in specie.

That is in reality a private bank
of Argentine origin and the Government
of Uruguay has no responsibility for it
whatever beyond the guarantee given for
certain Cedula gold bonds which were
issued through it. There are four other
banks of issue in Uruguay which con-
tinue to pay their notes in gold. Urugu-
an securities are consequently on a
quite different footing to those of Argen-
tina, and nothing has happened to dis-
credit them as a whole. On the contrary,
if Uruguay has the sense to keep firmly
on a gold basis, it will greatly benefit
from the troubles of its too go-ahead
neighbour.

Deserters.

The following decree of amnesty to all
deserters has been issued from the War
office, dated Aug. 17.—
The President of the Republic

DECREES

Art. 1.º All members of the troops
that have deserted from the army up to
the present date, are hereby discharged
from the army, remaining exempt from
all penal proceeding.

Art. 2. The Ministry of Foreign
Affairs shall direct a circular to the
Ministers and Consuls in the Brazilian,
Argentine and Paraguayan Republics,
copying this decree, and authorising
them to extend the passages that may be
required for such individuals to return
to Oriental territory.

Art. 3. The Ministry of Government
will also address a circular to the Jefes
Politicos copying this decree and
ordering them to extend their most
decided protection to the citizens who
return to the Republic and to those
already in the country, on those condi-
tions.

Art. 4. Let this be communicated,
etc.

Patents.

Superior Government has recently

concessionaires.

James Anthony Coroles, of Chicago,
for a hydro-carbon gas burner.

John Henry Richard Dinsmore, of
Liverpool, for improvements in the ma-
nufactory of illuminating gas and of
apparatus employed in the same.

C. H. Th. Havemann, of Paris, and
Albert Berwich Cunningham, of London,
for improvements in the process of
extracting gold, silver and lead from
substances containing the same.

The Situation.

According to the information of the
Dia, which may be considered as semi-
official, the President held a Cabinet meet-
ing yesterday morning, at which he gave
account of the offers and propositions
made by Mr. Oliver, stating that he had
considered unacceptable the financial
conditions presented to him.

We have reason to believe that the
unacceptable part of the offer made by
Mr. Oliver was the strict condition that
the Directorate of the National Bank
should be moved to London!

The Dia adds that, wishing to save at
all cost the credit of the Nation, the Presi-
dent entertains the idea of having re-
course to an internal loan of two millions
which, added to the present resources
of the Bank, will be sufficient to restore
its emission to a state of conversion with-
in the period fixed by the Law of July 7.

Sundries.

—Members of the Cricket Club are
reminded of the General Meeting which
will take place at 8 p.m. this evening,
in the offices of the Water Works, Sa-
randi 126. The report and accounts for
the past year will be presented, and new
officers and committee will be elected.

—A specially interesting performance
will be given at the Politeama to-mor-
row evening when Bizet's popular opera
of «Carmen» will be played with the in-
imitable Preziosi in the title role, as-
sisted by Oxilia and Kaschmann. Such a
combination as this is not likely to occur
again.

—«Titmouse's» grumble about the pro-
gramme of the Candelaria dance has
raised quite a storm. Advocates of the
waltz consider themselves quite insulted
that it should be limited they should join
in any other dance and affect to look
down on the polka, schottisch etc., as
antiquated and vulgar, and maintain that
the programme was specially arranged
to please the ladies. Others, again, agree
with «Titmouse» in thinking that the
waltzing was certainly overdone, and
state that many of their lady friends com-
plained of the want of variety in the
programme. We think that the topic,
having been fairly started, may now be
left for the Committee to decide. We
publish one letter upon the subject, not
because it has anything to do with the
matter, but because it is rather amusing,
at the same time we think the ques-
tion of taste in dancing does not call for
an exchange of personal remarks.

—The decree, transcribed elsewhere,
extending pardon and free return to all
deserters from the Oriental Army, is
nobly and generously dictated, and does
great honour to the new Minister of War.

—The «landscape architect» Mr. Er-
nest André has just arrived from Paris
under contract with the Municipality to
design and carry out improvements in
the public street and plazas. We do not
wish to damp the welcome of this gen-
tleman, who is of renown in his particu-
lar line, but we certainly understood
that a similar architect was already un-
der contract for a similar purpose. How-
ever, we are glad to hear that, in these
hard times, the Municipality can afford
to spend money on urban embellish-
ments. M. André was, we believe, the
designer of Selton Park at Liverpool.

—According to Municipal resolution,
on and after next Sunday, the Sunday
fair hitherto held in the Plaza Cagancha
and Avenida Rodéau, will be transferred
to the Cordon, calle 18 de Julio from
Cuareim to Esie.

—Decrees have been issued appointing
Sergeant Major Guillermo Guevara to be
2nd Chief of the Artillery Battalion
(heavy), and Sergeant Major Juan J.
Deballi to be 2nd Chief of the Light
Artillery in place of Lieut. Col. J. J.
Pereira y Rocha, who is made aide-de-
camp to the President.

—The discussion of the financial
question continues, Dr. Pena having
published another long letter together
with the text of the Bill he proposed for
a remedy and the rejection of which
by the Cabinet led to his resignation.
However important the scheme, we do
not see the use of employing so much
space and trouble over the discussion
of what are now dead bones. What we
want to know is what is going to be
done, and not what was intended to be
done but will not be done.

—A youth named Andrés Bentancor
has been sent to the Asylum, with the
original mania of imagining himself a
great political personage full of schemes
and combinations. The crisis has affect-
ed his brain.

—Owing to some differences with the
impresario, Sr. Friedenthal, the Hun-
garian Orchestra has suspended its con-
certs. This is much to be regretted, for
they were a genuine musical treat.

—It is said that the Minister of War
is about to call for tenders for the sale of
two of the National gunboats.

—Women were made before mirrors,
and a cynical subscriber insists that they
have been before them ever since.

—Other papers are taking up the
complaint about the exorbitant premium
charged by the tramways. We wish
them joy.

—Serious disorders have occurred in
Berlin this week, owing to an attack
made by the police on a socialist meeting.
Many persons were wounded and 536
arrested. The people are alarmed and
disgusted and fresh troubles are feared.

—Gold closed yesterday at 135 1/2,
according to which the paper dollar is
worth 73.1 cents.

—We are requested to call attention
to the fact that the Right Reverend Lord
Bishop of the Falkland Islands will
preach at the English Church on Sunday
morning and evening next.

—A young lady resembles ammunition
because the powder is needed before the
ball.

—Count Greppi, the popular Italian
Consul in this city, has been promoted
by his government to the post of Consul
general in Guatemala. His place here
will be taken by Nicolas Massa, at pre-
sent Italian Consul in Rio Janeiro.

—Few attributes of character are more
charming than the faculty of gracefully
acknowledging one's errors. The man
who makes a blunder and sticks to it is
a person with whom argument or con-
troversy becomes impossible. The
trouble and time spent in attempting to
convince him of the truth are completely
wasted, for he will still believe that what
he has advanced must be right, even in
the face of actual demonstration that it is
wrong.

—A brilliant and successful concert
was given in the Club Catolico on Wed-
nesday evening, for the benefit of a fund
for raising a statue to General Lavalleja
in Minas. The leading families of na-
tive society were present. Disappoint-
ment was felt at the non appearance of
the Hungarian Orchestra, owing to dif-
ficulties with the impresario.

—Mr. Bedouret, the English acting
consul, has been the means of capturing
a well dressed and «high-life» swindler,
who has been going round with false
subscription lists. He played this game
to the tune of about \$300 for a «wreath
to be deposited on the tomb of a recently
deceased dignitary, and was trying it
again on pretence of raising funds for
the victims of the revolution when he
was recognised by Mr. Bedouret and
handed over to the police.

—Giddings—«That young Smitley who
got married the other day is a mighty
nice fellow.» Payton—«Don't know.
Saw him treating his wife the other day
as I wouldn't treat my dog.» Giddings
(excitedly)—«Is it possible! And she
so lovely! What was he doing to her?»
Payton (calmly)—«Kissing her. I wouldn't
kiss my dog.»

—The Moretti company of Italian
Opera will shortly occupy the Teatro
Popular, in the Aguada.

—The oft announced inaugural concert
of the Verdi Institute will take place
(if not once more postponed) at the
Cibils Theatre next Monday.

—Several days ago we recorded that
two first-class passengers arrived from
Italy in the steamer «Corrientes» had
been arrested, at request of the Minister,
on a charge of fraud, and lodged in the
Cábidlo. It now appears that they made
their escape yesterday morning, having
used an iron bar from their window to
break through the party wall at the back
of their cell, and which opened on to a
house in construction in calle Cerro.
Through this they crept at early dawn
and when the prison guards made their
usual round, the cell was found empty
and the birds had flown. The police are very
annoyed at this escape, which is not
complementary to their vigilance, and are
looking for the two men with redoubled
zeal.

—Decrees are expected making several
changes in the Geles Politicos of the
Departments.

—The auctions for next Sunday's
races opened with unusual animation
which augurs well for the success of
the meeting.

—On Tuesday the papers announced
that Sr. Tolosa of the «Sirena» had been
robbed of \$500 in gold. On Wednesday
it had grown to \$700, and yesterday we
found it recorded as \$1000. A few more
growths like this and it will outdo
Faust's men in buckram.

—It is said that although the coach
drivers have returned to their stands,
they refuse to submit to the tariff, al-
leging that it is in suspense.

The Rt. Reverend, the Lord Bishop
of the Falkland Islands will preach on
Sunday, August 31, morning and evening.

Argentine Republic

Senate.

In Saturday's Session a Message was
received from the President of the Repub-
lic, countersigned by General Lavalle,
stating that the Executive associated
itself with the initiative taken by the Se-
nate for obtaining the restoration to
their respective ranks in the Army of
the officers who were dismissed for tak-
ing part in the revolution. At the same
time, the President says, with truth,
that although an Argentine Government
ought to be essentially one of opinion,
it must not hesitate to assume the re-
sponsibilities of its elevated mission,
and that it cannot be admitted as a pre-
cedent that there are cases in which
soldiers may turn against the consti-
tuted authorities the arms confided to them
by the Nation, but that the standing army

must submit to the severe rules of disci-
pline; otherwise it would be better, in
order to preserve the public liberties,
to dissolve the army altogether.

However, the Government recognizes
that the present is an exceptional case,
and that the transcendent movement of
opinion all over the Republic justifies it
in yielding to the demand for a complete
forgetfulness of the incidents in which
every one fulfilled what he thought to be
his duty.

Diplomatic.

The United States Envoy Extraordi-
nary and Min. Plenipotentiary to the
Argentine Republic, the Hon. Mr.
Pitkin, embarked in the South Basin on
Tuesday afternoon in the steamer Ur-
uguay. He goes to the U.S. via Rio de
Janeiro, where he will transfer himself
to the American steamer Finance, to
leave Rio for New York on the 3rd prox.
He will be absent about three months.

Amnesty.

On Tuesday the Senate passed, unani-
mously, the bill granting a general am-
nesty for all political and military of-
fences; the right to a pension will no
be lost by any one for having taken part
in the revolution. The cadets who were
dismissed for taking part in the Civic
Union demonstration are to be re-admit-
ted into the Military College.

La Plata.

The Governor has ordered a new elec-
toral register to be prepared, and the
elections of senators and deputies to the
Legislature which ought to have taken
place on July 27th list will be effected
under the new register.

Sanitary Works.

The Intendant and Sr. Medici have
come to an arrangement about the re-
pair of the pavement taken up for the
construction of the works. As regards
the Western section, every square is to
be given up in perfect condition; the
Municipality is discharged from its debt
to the Company and the latter is re-
leased from the fines imposed and is to
pay to the Municipality \$15,000 for the
repair of the pavement which is now
being moved.

La Plata.

It is declared that the Hypothecary
Bank will meet all its engagements
punctually.

The Government intends to submit a
proposal to the Legislature for relieving
the Provincial Bank from the service of
the Hypothecary cedulas, but with ad-
ditional guarantees for the holders of
those securities.

The only military forces in La Plata
are the gao-guard of Sierra Cuica, San
Nicolas, Mercedes and Dolores, and
these are to return at once to their re-
spective localities.

Telegrams

(From our Special Correspondent)

Buenos Aires, August 28.

In an interview with a committee of the
Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Lopez, Mi-
nister of Finance, declared that the
scheme in which he had greatest hopes
was that for the creation of a conversion
fund. The economies in the Budget for
1891 would amount to 17 or even
perhaps 22 millions. He hoped to
normalise the situation within 6 months,
bringing the gold premium down to
reasonable limits. His declarations
have given great satisfaction.

The Finance Committee of the Senate
do not entirely approve his schemes,
and will probably advise a modification
of that relating to the issue of 60 mil-
lions in Treasury notes.

The custom house receipts for August
exceed two millions.

The unfavourable rumours respecting
the Provincial Mortgage Bank, are
denied.
