PASSING NOTES.

The Chamber of Representatives did a bad day's work on Tuesday in sanctioning the Bill for increasing the number of Deputies, and rejecting the saving clause that would have secured a corresponding reduction in the salaries or *dietas*. Of all the steps of the present Government there is none more foolish or inopportune than this bill. That the increase was required by the Constitution is open to serious doubt, and in the face of this doubt, the measure should certainly have been reserved for some more propitious times. That the increase will conduce to better or more general representation or to greater efficiency in the legislative body, no one imagines for an instant. So long as the electoral customs and laws remain what they are, and the people are calmly cheated out of their rights of suffrage, the legislative body will remain a mere mouth-piece for giving due form to the autocratic will of the President and his Ministers. The majority of them being nominees, will be sure to vote in the manner indicated by their nominator, with little reference to the intrinsic value of the questions placed before them.

This increase in the number of deputies implies an addition to the Budget of nearly \$90,000 a year. Certainly there is yet a chance that the new Assembly may muster sufficient patriotism to vote a reduction in their own salaries, but it is highly improbable that they will do so. This additional expense, inflicted upon the country when it is already over-burdened, over-taxed and suffering to a degree, to support a measure neither necessary nor useful, can only be stigmatised as sheer madness. Still worse does it appear when placed side by side with the fact revealed in the course of the debate, that the salaries of the present deputies are even now two months in arrears. When the English bankers, capitalists and investors learn this latest folly, committed at the very moment that they are to be asked for fresh investments in this country and for fresh assistance to put her on legs again, we can imagine them buttoning up their pockets tightly and pursuing their lips together with a grim and ominous smile. Dr. Herrera's Government is doing its best to cut its own throat, and is succeeding remarkably well, meantime the poor country has to suffer.

The Customs Receipts for October, published in another column, show a material increase over those of September and the two preceding months, apart from the extra \$72,673 arising from the additional 50 duty on imports. In fact they are nearly back to the high average on which we commented early in the year. This is partly due to the return of the busy season, and we hope it may be taken as a sign that trade is reviving somewhat from the stagnant state into which it fell from June to September. At all events, the prospect is a more pleasing one than that alluded to above.

Trade Union Congress opened, 1890. The Forth Bridge completed, 1889, 310 days past, 55 to the end of the year.

Parliament.

In the Chamber of Representatives, on Tuesday, Dr. Aguirre was appointed to the Committee of Finance for the study of the schemes for the reorganisation of the National Bank in place of Sr. Herrera y Obes, who is a member of the Directorate.

The proposition of Sr. Marcelino Dupuy to establish a paper factory was finally sanctioned, the expropriation clause having been withdrawn.

The Bill for increasing the number of Deputies was then discussed in detail. Sr. Pablo Otero stated at some length his opposition to the Bill, which he thought did not meet the requirements of the Constitution and responded to no public necessity. Sr. Aguirre made a short reply repeating some of his previous arguments in favour of the Bill. The first Article was then put to the vote and was approved. Sr. Barbat, in the name of the Committee then proposed the following Art. 2.—«The General Assembly shall meet before Nov. 20 to determine the salaries to be received by the members of the 27th Legislature, so that no alteration shall be produced in the amount of the present estimates for the Legislature.»

Sr. P. Carve opposed the article on constitutional grounds. The reduction ought to be a spontaneous act on the part of the future Assembly, and the present could not interfere. At the same time he trusted the reduction would be made in order that there might be no fresh burden on the country.

Sr. I. Borda considered that the Constitution was not clear on the point and he took benefit of the doubt to propose the article.

Sr. Herrera y Obes supported this view and referred to the fact that the salaries were at present two months in arrears.

After some further discussion not particularly to the point, the article was put to the vote and was declared rejected. The Bill was then declared sanctioned, and the sitting came to an end.

Central Uruguay Northern Extension Railway Company.

The first ordinary general meeting of shareholders in this company was held on Friday, October 3rd, 1890, at the Cannon Street Hotel, Mr. G. W. Drabble in the chair.

The Secretary (Mr. H. C. Allen) read the notice convening the meeting.

The Chairman, in moving the adoption of the directors' report and accounts up to 30th June last, said he would be only waiting time if he were to repeat the observations he had already made to the previous meetings. He wished, therefore, to confine himself to stating the fact that all the works of this company had been continued and carried out by the contractors to the entire satisfaction of the board, and they would see that the first section of 31 miles was practically completed. They had not received telegraphic advice that it had been opened, and the late telegrams mentioned that there had been a succession of heavy rains, which might have retarded in some degree the opening of the section, but it could not be materially retarded. It would be seen that Mr. Chamberlain, in reporting upon the construction of the works, speaks very encouragingly of the way in which the work had been done. The board, in accordance with the conditions of the contract, proposed to issue £420,000 in 25 debenture stock to be allotted to shareholders at par in proportion to their respective holdings. Practically this stock would be guaranteed by the Central Uruguay Railway Company, though it was not likely to be a positive burden upon the latter. He considered it would be a very valuable security for those who held it. The speaker concluded by formally moving the adoption of the report and accounts.

Mr. John Fair seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

On the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. Fair, Mr. C. O. Barker the retiring directors were re-elected.

The retiring auditors, Messrs. John Gane and Mr. G. Griffiths were re-appointed, and the proceedings ended.

Appointments.

Decrees have been issued from the Ministry of Government making the following appointments. Engineer Felipe Victoria to be Director General of Roads in place of Ignacio Pedraza, who died last week. Engineer Rodolfo Arriaga to be President of the general Council of Public Works, of which he was formerly Vice President. Engineers Carlos Honoré and Pedro Gianielli to be members of the Council, the latter in place of Carlos Arceña, resigned. Don Manuel Vicente Sanchez has been appointed second official of the Direction General of the Civil Register.

Politeama Theatre.

From an English point of view, Dumas' comedy of «Kean» played on Tuesday night, is utterly absurd, and has no more relation to the great actor Edmund Kean than it has to Oliver Cromwell or Julius Cesar. To make it more absurd, the period is transferred from the beginning of the century (Kean flourished from 1803 to 1833) to the present day, and we are presented with the anachronism of Prince George of Wales, the first grand-mother (and blackguard) in Europe, walking the board in full evening costume of 1890. The mistake lies in the title, had Dumas chosen an imaginary name criticism would have been disarmed, for intrinsically the play is

admirably put together and full of interesting passages. As the hero Sr. Novelli was much better suited than in Hamlet and gave us some excellent acting. His impersonation was consistent, natural and well studied, and on this occasion we once more felt enthusiasm for the great artist. Sr. Fortuzzi made a most sympathetic Anna Danby and the remaining parts were better played than is generally the case with this company. The audience was small but enthusiastic.

This evening Othello will be repeated, and we hope to see a large house.

A New Colony.

In that part of the department of Colonia known as «Ombues de Laval», a new colony has just been started by some twenty neighbours of the Swiss and Piemontese colonies, and under the direction of Sr. Armando Hugon. For this purpose some 60-0 squares of land have already been acquired and will speedily be devoted to agriculture. Government will be asked to open a port at Las Conchillas for the transport of produce, and to build a road to the same through the colony, also to vote a small sum towards a church and school house.

Sundries.

—At a late hour yesterday we learnt that the boxes and seats for the final Concert of the W. E. S. S. had been nearly all disposed of, so that there was every prospect of the good house that the merits of the programme and the charitable work of the Society deserved. A full account of the Concert will appear in our next issue.

—Another section of the Nationalist or Blanco party has issued a manifesto, intended as a sort of counterblast to that of last week. It advises its adherents not to abstain from voting, which is just the contrary to the advice given in the first manifesto. Probably further manifestos will be issued on the same subject, and as these are likely to throw the worthy citizens into great confusion of mind, we take the liberty of advising them to settle their perplexities by tossing up, sun or number, which is the Oriental equivalent for heads or tails. They will find it all the same in the end.

—Gold closed yesterday at 130 according to which the paper dollar is worth 76 cents.

—In consequence of a loud outcry about electoral abuses said to be committed in the Department of Treinta y Tres by the Jefe Politico, Sr. Washington Bermudez, the Government has summoned him to the Capital to explain. This is as it should be. Strange to say Sr. Bermudez was one of the civilians whose appointment was hailed with the greatest effusion by the independent papers as a step in the right direction.

—Attention is called to the advertisement of the C. variable raffie just opened for the benefit of the widows and orphans of the Buenos Aires revolution. The tickets or cedulas are only 20 cents each, and the prizes include a tremendous variety of useful and ornamental articles, many of high value, and also the title deeds to various desirable plots of land. For the small sum of 20 cents one may thus become a landed proprietor. This raffie, the object of which is very sympathetic, is open in the Hotel de Paris, 25 de Mayo 290, and at 18 de Julio 71, where the articles may be seen.

—The very popular circus proprietor and clown Frank Brown has embarked from Southampton in the «Magdalena» with a troupe of thirty artists who will form the delight of the River Plate public during the coming summer months. We presume they will appear in Buenos Aires first.

—The well known printers the brothers Schwengel have added to the resources of their establishment by the purchase of the machinery and type of the «Panperro».

—We notice that a gentleman rejoicing in the name of Mr. Sundries has made an application to the Commercial Judge for a dissolution of partnership. We do not know whence he derived his name, but we beg to assure our readers that our Sundries column will be continued as usual.

—A person living in calle Mini has reported to the police that on arising yesterday morning he found in the patio of his house a bundle of clothes soaked with blood. The street door had been open all night. The police are enquiring into this mystery.

London Notes.

London, Oct. 5.

The Bishop of North and Central Europe consecrated the first English Church in Norway at Cristiania on Monday in the presence of the Governor and all the civil authorities of the city. The Norwegian Bishop of Cristiania in his robes, attended by the Dean, walked in the procession. The service was one of considerable dignity, and those present were much impressed by the man-

in which it was carried out. The Consul Mr. Mitchell, to whom the building of the church is due, acted as registrar, and the chaplain took part in the service. The church, which is Gothic, is surmounted by a spire, and is dedicated to St. Edmund, the Martyr King of East Anglia. The Bishop's sermon dealt largely with the interesting story of the young King's reign and death at the hands of Scandinavians. The service was followed by a public luncheon, which was attended by the religious and civil authorities of the city. The Bishop has been visiting his Danish and Swedish chaplains. He leaves Cristiania this week for Bergen.

Sir George Graves, commander-in-chief of the Bombay Army, has added his testimony to that of Sir Frederic Roberts regarding the value of polo as a factor in military education. In congratulating the guests at the Poona Polo dinner on the fact that this game has now attained the unprecedented honour of being recognised in the Army orders, he gave his hearers some practical hints on the play in a good hand which will save the rider's head if he comes down, and don't be afraid of a big or a fast pony. The dangers of the game arise, according to his experience, from allowing men on the ground who cannot ride, and whose ponies have not been trained in the riding-school. Quite recently Sir George was «knocked over» by a pony, and on expostulating was told that the culprit was a beginner and couldn't keep his animal under control. His final counsels had reference to the senseless practice known as «charging», which, he observed, adds to the peril of the game, and has nothing to do with good riding, straight hitting, or any other skill whatever.

The numerous lady correspondents of «Woman» are still applying themselves to the solution of the «bachelor-tax» problem, and little by little light is being thrown on that momentous question. At all events the attitude towards it of the thoughtful portion of the gentler sex is being made clear. There is, to begin with, a pretty general agreement that the tax is not designed as a punishment for the men who will not propose, or, as one puts it, as a kind of whip to drive them into the matrimonial market. Moreover, in the opinion of Miss Freda Jeffreys, this would be useless for a rich man would laugh at it, grumble at it, finally pay it, and revel in his single blessedness. Besides, it might not be the bachelor's fault, and it is humanely suggested that at least one man who had done his best to cast off the stigma of bachelorhood by proposing to one or two or more, ought to be entitled to some consideration. Miss Dowie, another prize-winner, speaks out boldly, and tells us that bachelors ought to be taxed because men have leagued together to limit women's opportunities of gaining a living. «If woman's right to work», says this young lady, «is denied her, her only alternative is claim to the support by taxation if necessary of the more favoured sex.»

Missing—a literary treasure supposed to have been once in the possession of Her Majesty the Queen! The precious relic referred to is a copy of the original edition of «A Christmas Carol» presented by Dickens to the author of «Vanity Fair» with the interesting autograph inscription, «W. M. Thackeray, from Charles Dickens (whom he made very happy once a long way from home).» The story runs that the Queen possessed a strong desire to possess the little volume in which the names of these two great contemporary masters of fiction were thus associated; that an unlimited commission was given for its purchase, and that it eventually became Her Majesty's property for the sum of 25/ 10s., and was immediately transferred to her keeping. The original authority for the statement appears to have been the late Mr. Hotten, the publisher, but it is more important to note that Dickens's biographer, Mr. John Forster, has given it additional currency. The strange part of the matter, however, is that the Royal Librarian knows nothing about it, except that no such book is included in the collection under his care.

A curious abuse of the post in India, which has given some trouble to the postal authorities, is now, it is announced, in a fair way to be put down. It is known in Rujpura, where it has mostly prevailed, as «clubbing» letters, and consists in making them up in the form of heavy packets by enclosing pieces of iron, bundles of waste paper, and even fragments of brick. On inquiry it has been discovered that these unpaid missives were all sent from places in the Bombay Presidency by Marwari traders to their partners absent on leave, the intention being that the addressee should pay the double postage, and in this way be reminded of the necessity of returning to duty. Unluckily for the revenue heavy unpaid packets by post soon began to be regarded with suspicion. Once bitten twice shy. The truant partners took the hint, but refused the letters.

There was a curious scene in Paris the other day just outside the Opera House. Traffic was in full swing, when a lady who was crossing the street and had got on to one of the refugees sunk to the ground with a scream. She had put her foot on a large metal plaque, and immediately fell an electric shock. The usual crowd collected, and the usual police arrived. But the cause was clear at once. Quite close to the scene of the accident was a standard of clustered electric lights, and the wire which supplied the current passed close to the metal plate. With great presence of

mind the police sent for several electricians, keeping a cordon in the meantime round the plaque. The experts went to work quickly and cautiously. The metal plate itself was raised. It communicated with one of the subterranean passages that lead to the drainage system of the city. Then at last the cause of the accident was discovered. A workman employed in the drain wanted to emerge, and happened to push up the plate at the moment the lady's foot was on it. Hence the earthquake and the shock. Thereupon the crowd dispersed, the electricians went home, the police preserved impenetrable silence, and the lady, who really showed considerable imagination, decided to say as little as possible about the accident.

THE TAMENESS OF THE SCHOOL.

Mr. Wilson, of Clifton, complains that English school-girls are dull and tame, and do not enjoy life as they should, or as the boys enjoy it. The assertion certainly has the air of a half truth rather than of a whole one. For our own part, we have known many school-girls who have not merely giggled to excess, but have read purely dreadful, played cricket with their brothers, toyed down the staircase on a teacup, and made their governesses' lives a burden in what Mr. Wilson says. When a school-girl is industrious—as very many of them now are—her interests in life are sadly circumscribed; but this fault, if we may so call it, is one which she shares with intellectual ladies of the mature growth. It is one of the most melancholy limitations of intellectual ladies that they cannot understand how frivolity and intellectuality can go together. They imagine that senior wranglers never play billiards, and that first classics do not care about sitting out the lancers in the conservatory, or talking nonsense on the stairs. This, of course, is a mistake, and when the intellectual ladies discover it and act upon it, the word «bluestockings» will soon cease to be a mark for the cheap sarcasm of the scoffer.—Daily Graphic.

THE CHINESE EVOLUTION THEORY.

The rocks are the bones of the Divine body, the soil is flesh, the metals are the nerves and veins; the tide, wind, rain, clouds, frost, and dew are all caused by its respirations, pulsations, and exhalations. Originally the mountains rose to the firmament, and the seas covered the mountains to their tops. At that time there was in the Divine body no life besides the Divine life. The London quotation of Unifededs was inclined to recover, having risen 1/8 to 61. \$9400 sold here at 62, showing that this market has not been similarly affected.
