Letter from England.

A CHIP OF THE OLD BLOCK.

(Concluded)

And having mentioned Isonomy's sire Sterling, the performances of whose offspring both as runners and breeders reflect much credit on him, we see that the former's grandsires were Oxford and Stockwell, the former being by Birdcatcher out of Honey Dear, by Plenipotentiary who won the Derby in 1834, he being by Emilius who won it in 1823, Honey Dear's dam being My Dear, by Bay Middleton who carried off the «blue riband» in 1836, out of Mis Lety, a famous mare in her day, and winner of the Oaks. That famous horse Birdcatcher in his turn is a son of Sir Hercules, who was a son of Whalebone who won the Derby in 1810, he being a son of Waxy who carried it off in 1793, Stockwell, on the other hand, is a grandson through his sire The Baron, of Birdcatcher, and Isola Bella being a great-granddaughter of Fough-a-Ballagh, and own brother of Birdcatcher, by Sir Hercules out of Guiccoli, we have thus three strains of this famous, stout, and staying Irish blood in Isonomy, and one of Touchstone, and it is not surprising, taking also into account the other running blood in his veins, to see him attain great excellence both as a racer and as a sire. He also counts a fourth strain of Sir Hercules derived from one of his great-granddams, Miss Whitney, and it thus comes about that Isonomy is looked upon by many as one of the best examples living of an in bred horse and a good one.

This question of in-breeding is a very interesting and important one here at home, and it is well to know that such a great authority as «Beacon» maintains that the best results are obtained when the blood of the sire most resembles that of the dam, or in his own words, «to ensure success the pedigrees of both sire and dam should assimilate as nearly as possible.» I do not understand this to mean that I am forthwith to begin breeding from brothers and sisters, but as an example of its significance I shall take Seabreeze which you know is by Isonomy out of St. Marguerite, by Hermit, both her grandmothers being by Stockwell, and in the antecedent generation Touchstone figures twice on the dam's, and once on the sire's side further back. The Baron and Pocahontas figuring twice as the parents of Stockwell, and Birdcatcher and Faugh-a-Ballagh occurring again on her sire's side; and this is what is meant by the close assimilation of pedigrees, and when we remember what this mare has accomplished we pay some attention and respect to the argument. We are to-day beginning, I may say, our efforts in scientific breeding, and it may be well to remember those words which are the result of the study, observation, and practical experience of a man who has given close attention to the subject for well nigh sixty years. Nature, that wise and bountiful mother, lays down her rules and laws, and doubtless those who endeavour to work them out and follow them will most enjoy her smiles, and reap the best success; just as we all know that the land upon which to rear the best horses is that which rests upon the limestone. But perhaps we are a good way yet from the necessity of the practical application of the above when we remember the small number of blood mares that we have to work upon, and for some years to come our efforts will mostly be with the crosses from our criollas, and their descendants; but, assuredly, «coming events cast their shadows before».

In a former letter I referred to the success attained by the union of Isonomy with St. Marguerite in the production of Seabreeze, Antibes, and Riviera; and with Wife he produced the well known Satiety, and with Fideine, Galao who is in France, with Moorhen, Pallinule, and with Ellangowan, Caerlawerock; and Isoscelis, Oliver Fwist, Gens's Counsel, Countess Lilian, Formidabile, etc. are amongst the numbers of his successful offspring; and Coelenzie one of his sons who was on his way to the River Plate, is reported to have died at sea not long since.

At the Newmarket July sales there were sold two yearlings by Isonomy, one a filly out of Hermita, by Hermit, and the other a colt out of Katrine, by Blair Athol, each realized three thousand guineas, the total for the two in our currency being twenty nine thousand six hundred and ten dollars, and I leave it to others to calculate how many novillos, capones, and arrobas of wool we should have to sell in the season to realize that neat little fortune!

In the list of winning Stallions for last year Isonomy comes second to Galopin with a total of £26,837, twelve of his offspring carried off twenty eight races, the chief winner amongst them having already been mentioned. And when we remember that he is a typical blood horse, some five feet four inches in height (16 hands), bay in colour, of great strength, of large girth round a rosy chest, and with that sine qua non in the thoroughbred sire—lots of good bone, those who contemplate the acquisition of a stallion either to endeavour to breed race horses, or general utility ones, or in their efforts at improvement generally, could not do better than think of trying to obtain one of his sons.

PARLIAMENT.
In the Chamber of Representatives, on Thursday, various matters were received in transit from the other Chamber. For want of a quorum there was no sitting.

SEÑOR MONTES, an important *estancero* in the department of Canelones, has sent a request to the Immigration office for 200 of the immigrants now expected, to be sent to him to help to colonize his lands.

A NEW RACE-COURSE.
The new race-course, or, as it is termed in the vernacular, hippodrome, near the Station of the Pando Railway, will be completed next month, and will be inaugurated after the international races have been held at Maroñas in November. No expense has been spared in laying out the course, which will compare with any in South America. The Grand Stand is similar to that at Maroñas. It will be called the «Hippodromo Nacional».

ATHLETIC SPORTS.
Full particulars regarding the sports to be held on November 1, will be found in the advertisement we publish to-day in another column. Our Buenos Aires and Rosario, friends will notice that they are invited to compete. The entries close October 15.

As will also be seen, some changes have been made this year. The Gentlemen's Egg and Ladle race, has been expunged from the programme and a 120 yards open scratch race substituted for it. In the Tug of War, eight men a side take the place of the four of former occasions. We understand it is intended that the course shall be better kept this year, the public not being allowed within the enclosure.

One of the regimental bands will be engaged to enliven the proceedings. We expect this year the athletic sports will be more successful than ever, for immense enthusiasm has already been aroused, and many new men are taking part, who, judging from their performances in the cricket field will be likely to give the old champions some trouble.

DIPLOMATIC.

The decree has been issued accepting the resignation of Sr. Teodoro Barboza as Oriental Consul in Barcelona, and appointing Sr. Manuel L. Barreto in his stead.

Another decree appoints Sr. Ricardo Pettis as Oriental Consul in Corumbá, in place of Sr. A. Joaquín de la Rocha. Sr. Amelio Cuenca has been received as Vice Consul of Spain in Salto.

ON BOARD THE S. S. «CERVELLOS».

A concert in aid of the Seaman's Orphanage, Liverpool, was organized on board this steamer on the outward passage, and was eventually given on the 19th September, under the patronage of Captain Brown and His Excellency M. Ernest van Bruyssel, Belgian Minister to the Argentine Republic.

The long continuance of fine weather, during an exceptionally favourable passage inspired a faith in the clemency of the elements which unluckily was not justified by their works. A heavy down-fall of rain caused a postponement until 8-30, when it was resolved to bid defiance to the weather. The overture had unfortunately disappeared, having it is feared been washed overboard; it was therefore dispensed with, but the local numbers of the programme, or rather their exponents were all on the spot. The evergreen «Nancy Lee» was followed by «Xmasday in the Workhouse» (a recitation), «They all love Jack», by Dr. Lightburn the ship's doctor, which met with a vociferous encore, «The song that reached my heart», «White Lilies», «The kissing bridge», and a humorous sketch entitled «The lawyer outwitted». After an interval of 10 minutes the stage was occupied by a party of Christy Minstrels, whose complexions were not improved by the now fast falling rain. Possibly owing to the dampness of the weather, a number of the jokes missed fire but others, by dint of careful handling took effect. The third part of the programme, consisting of a Dramatic Sketch named «The Rival Runners» and one or two songs, was unavoidably absent. A very pleasant, if somewhat moist evening was concluded by the singing of «Auld lang syne».

RAILWAY NEWS.

—We hear from La Plata that the E. P. has sanctioned the transfer of R. A. Wilkinson and Co's railway concession to the Buenos Aires, Ensenada and South Coast Railway Company. The Engineers' department has been ordered to prepare the contract with Oyuela and Co. for a railway from Chivilcoy to Campana passing Franklin station and Giles. The E. P. has submitted to the Legislature the contract with Edward Ware and Co. for a line from Brandzen, through Monte, Alvear and Blanca Grande, to Puan. The bases of the concession to Messrs. Botet, of a tramway from Burzaco to Barracas, have been approved and also of a concession to Adolfo Hudson and Co. for a railway from Ferrari to Tapalque and Rocha station, with branches to Alvear, San Carlos de Bolívar and Guaminí. The E. P. has authorized the Railway Board to increase by 15 o/o the pay of the workmen in the Tolosa and Caballito workshops. The Committee of the Senate approved the following:—Messrs. Agustín Bernardo and Co. («ad referendum» contract) For a line from Campana to Mercedes, thence to Cañuelas, and from 9 de Julio to La Plata, through 25 de Mayo, Lobos, Cañuelas and San Vicente. Arthur Poleston: Railway from Junin to Lincoln, Lavalle, San Martín and Gaiñza. Messrs. A. Schweikart and Co. Line from San Nicolas to Salto, with branch to Chacabuco, Junin and Rojas. Messrs. Bourel and Co. Tram line from Chascomus to Port La Plata. Messrs. F. Halbach and Co. Railway from Balcarce to Paso de las Piedras, and from Blanca Grande to Pringles. Messrs. E. Videla Dorna and Co. From South Dock to Juarez, with branches to the Produce Market in Barracas, Las Flores and Tapalque. Messrs. P. Goytia and Co. From the Ensenada to Las Flores, Saladillo, 25 de Mayo, 9 de Julio, Lincoln, Lavalle, Alsina and San Borombon. Messrs. Buenaventura, Cortes and Co. From Blanca Grande to Carhué, Puan, and a junction with the Southern Railway at Torquinst Station. Messrs. Saavedra, Elia and Co., from San Nicolas to Bahía Blanca through Chacabuco, San Carlos and Pringles.

—The La Plata Executive promulgated on Tuesday the law authorizing the Government to sell the Provincial Railways.

—In the House of Deputies on Wednesday the report of the Committee was received on D. Jones's railway from San Pedro to Rosario. A motion to introduce amendments in the original concession to Messrs. F. Younger and Co. for the construction of a railway to Tartagal was thrown out. Deputies Escalante and Luro violently attacked the proposal to extend the term of guarantee; only three votes supported the amendment.

—The House granted permission to Messrs. Temperly, Ronax and Co. to build a railway from Buenos Aires to Corrientes. The railway passed first reading.

—The kilometrage run by the Western Railway last month was: locomotives 610,925; carriages 751,540; wagons 3,480,308.

—The Pacific Railway lost 20,970 dollars in July. Working expenses amounted to 90,864 dol.

Telegrams

(HAYAS AGENCY)

London, September 26.

The Bank of England rate of discount, which was raised to 4 per cent on August 30, has now been raised to 5 per cent.

Buenos Aires September 27.

The Commissary General of Immigration has rejected a number of blind and old persons, brought out by the shipping companies to obtain the Government subvention. They will be sent back to Europe at the expense of the Companies. The Gas Companies have increased their tariffs 20 per cent.

The Constituent Convention of La Plata has approved a constitutional reform by which the Provincial Governor will remain in office for four years.

The Auxiliary Committee of Santa Fe at the Paris Exhibition has obtained a special gold medal for oleaginous grains. Other provinces have obtained silver medals.

The Italian Francisco Culereti, employed in a café in calle Moreno, has been stabbed to death, receiving 18 wounds. The murderers are unknown.

Many of the carpenters on strike have returned to work, receiving an increase of 20 per cent. The strikers are still discussing the creation of an International Working Men's society. The Italian Democratic Societies have lent their assistance.

The manufacturers of cane furniture have granted an increase of 15 per cent. The stevedores are still on strike. They ask an increase of 20 per cent, and shorter hours of labour. The extension of the strike to Rosario, La Plata, Ensenada and San Nicolas is spoken of.

The bricklayers are in the same attitude awaiting an arrangement with the master builders who have met to make a protest against their demands.

Part of the house calle Moreno 1245 fell

down, being undermined by the drainage works. One man was killed.

It has been decided only to concede packet privileges to those Shipping Companies that consent to the conditions of the sanitary convention.

A subscription to offer a newspaper to Dr. Dardo Rocha on his return from Europe has been reopened in La Plata.

The second section of the port works will be commenced very shortly.

The Minister of War has indicated various punishments on those officers and soldiers of the Argentine Picket sent to the Paris Exhibition who misbehaved themselves.

A new company of Electric Light, Perroux system, has been established. Rumours are circulated of several heavy failures which will shortly take place.

It is said that President Juarez Celman will make a journey to Europe, as soon as Vice President Pellegrini returns, towards the end of the year.

Initiated by the Municipality, a night refuge for the homeless will be established in the Capital, in imitation of those in London and Paris.

The National Bank is issuing drafts on Paris at 250.

London, September 26.

Queen Victoria is preparing to go to Germany to return the Emperor's visit. She will probably leave next month.

Madrid, September 26.

The Government of Morocco having given Spain all the satisfaction asked, the question has subsided.

Vienna, September 26.

It is asserted that after the autumn meeting of the Minister of War will ask the Reichstag to vote the funds necessary to furnish the entire Austrian infantry with new guns.

Valparaiso, September 27.

The senators Manuel Valenzuela and Zeon Varas have died. Congress will be convoked to extraordinary sessions for October 1. The revolutionary movement in Chilo has been crushed and the leaders arrested.

(VIA GALVESTON)

Paris, September 24.

The French Republican papers rejoice at the result of the elections, and declare that the second voting will confirm the success. They regret the defeat of Ferry, and hope that his absence from the Chamber will not last long.

La République Française says that in electing a governor majority the country has shown itself tired of old quarrels, and wishes the Chamber to serve National interests, excluding problems that only lead to fruitless discussions.

The Journal des Debats does not believe in the prudence of the new majority.
