Parliament.

In the Chamber of Senators, on Monday, a Message was received from the Executive Power forwarding a petition presented by Sres. Herman Imlop and Mael Armand Agon in representation of various agricultural colonists in Colonia, asking for various exemptions for the establishment of a new agricultural centre.

The E. P. forwarded another message with a Bill creating a tax to be called «Security License» (Patente de Seguridad) to be applied to steamers navigating the La Plata and Uruguay.

The E. P. also forwarded a Bill imposing a tax of \$200 per voyage on transatlantic steamers with packet privilege and of \$50 on those navigating between Uruguay and Brazil.

The E. P. also forwarded a Message conveying a scheme of Don Lorenzo Lozano for fishery on the coasts of Maldonado and Rocha.

All these affairs were referred to the Chamber of Representatives.

The Bill edited by the Committee of Legislation, in accord with the E. P. for increasing the number of deputies, was then put in general discussion.

Sr. Torres called attention to the serious increase this would imply in the Budget, and thought it would be convenient to accept the hint of the E. P. to reduce the salaries of the Deputies, thereby meeting the increased cost.

Sr. C. Castro expressed the opinion that, these salaries having been fixed by the General Assembly, it was not in their power to reduce them at present. For that reason the reporting Committee had not referred to the question.

Sr. Vazquez made a lengthy speech opposing the bill on the grounds that

there was no call or necessity for increased representation, and that in proportion to other countries there were already more than enough deputies. The guarantee of public rights was not in the number but in the quality.

Sr. Carve combated these ideas and said they had only to consider the constitutional aspect of the question. Sres. Cuestas and C. Castro also spoke in support, considering the process perfectly constitutional.

The Bill was put to the vote and was approved in general.

In discussion of the Bill was altered as follows:—«The number of Representatives for the Department of Montevideo shall be twelve, that for Canelones six, and three for each of the other departments.» This was fully approved and it was resolved to suppress the second discussion.

It was then resolved to call Sr. Andes Avelino Gomez as senator for Colonia in place of the late Dr. Manuel Herrera y Obes.

The sitting then came to an end.

English Opera Company.

The Programme for the first three nights will be as follows:—Saturday «Mikado» Sunday «Pirates of Penzance» Monday «Dorothy» That for the two remaining nights is not quite settled.

The box-office at the Theatre will be open on Thursday morning, after which subscribers may secure their tickets, and non subscribers may also book seats for any performance, according to the tariff at the theatre.

M. V. Gas Company.

The Municipal Board has extended permission to the Gas Company to build new gas works on the site between calles Convencion, Isla de Flores and Orillas del Plata. These works will comprise gas meters, retorts, steam pumps, purifying sheds and tap deposits. It is ordered that the chimneys of the furnaces shall not exceed 18.20 metres in height from the roof of the furnace sheds, and that the roofs of the buildings must be of galvanised iron. There will be a tram line for the transport of coal from the Maúd dock by calle Andes to Convencion.

The Situation.

The Chamber of Representatives held a secret session yesterday afternoon, to consider a Message from the Executive, which, it is generally asserted, conveyed certain financial schemes for the improvement of the situation. Probably some result will transpire today.

Sundries.

«El Bien» utters a complaint about the bad behaviour of the youths who frequent the churches during divine service with no other object than to stare at the ladies and make rude remarks in a loud voice. Irreverence in church is no new complaint, and we trust that we will not offend anyone by suggesting that it may be due in great part to the nature of the service and the character of the curates. If these demands respect, the respect would probably be forthcoming.

The scheme of Sr. Torresella for establishing a sugar refinery, of which we spoke a few days ago, was down for discussion by the Chamber of Representatives yesterday.

Don Teófilo Córdoba, Jefe Político of the department of Salto, has arrived in town on business with the President. When a man finds a button in his salad he will hardly take the excuse that it is part of the dressing.

The North Railway Company has generously undertaken to transport the stone required for the Camino Paris, without making any charge to the Board of Works.

Some mischievous or malicious persons have been during their best to tear down and otherwise deface the really charming picture-posters issued by the English Opera Company. Apart from the expense of these artistic pictures to the management, this act of vandalism is to be regretted because they were quite an ornament to our streets, and so far as this part of the world is concerned, an entire novelty.

We learn that the Council of Public Works will very shortly issue its report upon the numerous schemes that have been presented for Port Works. Considering the length of time that these have been before the Council, and the importance of the subject, it is about full time that some movement was shown.

Gold closed yesterday at 134.4 according to which the paper dollar is worth 74.4 cents.

We are informed that a Buenos Aires chitchee has presented to the Municipal Board here a scheme for pavement on a new stem of which he is proprietor, if not inventor. It consists of letting into the side-walks covered grooves or ditches in which the gas and water mains, telephone and electric light wires could run, and could be inspected and mended without that necessity for tearing up the pavement and interrupting the traffic, which is one of the nuisances of modern cities. The idea is no new one, and if we mistake not has already been tried experimentally, but we have not yet heard of its having been carried out to permanent success.

Sr. Parallada, Jefe Político of Durazno, has presented to Government a scheme for colonisation with national elements.

Words are little things, but they strike hard. We would them so easily that we are apt to forget their hidden power. Fully spoken, they fall like sunshine, the dew, and soft summer rain; but, when unfriendly, like the frost, the hail, and the desolate tempest.

The detectives are looking for a couple of men said to have come here from Rio Janeiro, and accused of swindling a bank of that capital out of the comfortable sum of \$500,000.

We are informed that the recent death of Sr. Eugenio Ruiz Zorilla will not interfere with the publication, on December 1, of the «Annuario of Uruguay» for 1891, of which he was founder and Director. He left the work so nearly complete and in such good order that there will be no difficulty in publishing it. It is stated, moreover, that his rights in this Annuario, on which he spent much time and labour, are the only patrimony left to his widow and children.

Black ink spots may be taken from white goods by dipping the soiled parts in melted tallow, letting it be for a while, and then washing the ordinary way.

Remembering the depression of the times, we have thought it advisable to make a slight reduction in our tariff for small casual advertisements of «Wanted», «To Let», and the like. In future, advertisements of this class, not exceeding four lines, will be inserted at the rate of 50 cents for four days, \$1 gold for half a month. We trust our clients will avail themselves of this reduction and advertise their wants freely and with success.

It is telegraphed from St. Petersburg that another attempt has been made on the life of the Czar, Alexander Alexandrovich as he is called by the nihilists. No details are given, nor is it even said what degree of success the attempt has attained.

It is telegraphed from Rio de Janeiro that the «Jornal de Comercio», the leading Brazilian paper has been sold for \$150,000. This seems an enormous sum, sufficient to purchase a first class London paper, even perhaps the Times itself. We expect the figures have been greatly exaggerated. We know a good many papers here that would gladly sell themselves for one tenth the sum.

The crime in calle San José remains as mysterious as ever. A further examination of Lousteau's room brought to light a shirt and two match boxes, both stained with blood. It has been pertinently asked, how could the man take off his shirt and hide the boxes after wounding himself in such a terrible manner?—Five dollars fifty cents very depreciated paper money was the amount of cash found in the Provincial Bank at Santa Fé when the interventors took possession. A claim of six dollars would have broken the bank.

At the Politeama this evening will be repeated «Marina» and a version of the everlasting «Gran Via».

Led Out to Die.

M. Quad, in the «Detroit Free Press», it is a sight never to be forgotten, to see a man led out to execution by hanging, yet the picture is softened a great deal by the surroundings. There are generally two or three clergymen present—friends and acquaintances who look their pity—a hymn is sung, and a prayer offered and, if the executioner does not bungle, one can get through with it very well. But it is the sight of a man led out to be shot to death which makes a picture to haunt you while you live. No man has ever seen it who does not shudder at the recollection.

Desertions from the Federal army had become so frequent and had so demoralised certain regiments and brigades that it was determined, in the winter of 1884, to put a stop to them by inflicting the penalty prescribed in army regulations. A general order that this would be done was read in every camp, and it, no doubt, served as a warning to some. There were others, who were not so intimidated, and on the night of the day the order was issued a man in my company coolly left us. He went out of camp in the waggon of a teamster, and before roll-call next morning was far away. His name was Harbess, and he could not even plead homesickness as an excuse. He had neither home nor near relatives, but was a tough young fellow of twenty-two. A week after his desertion he got into some trouble in Washington, the papers published his name, and in that way he was located. He was brought back, in a defiant mood.

A court martial was called, a trial held and Harbess was convicted, and sentence to be shot. The finding had to go to the President for his approval, and it was only when it had been sent away that he was worried. I was one drawn to act as a guard over him, and saw him at least every other day. About the time the verdict of the court-martial was sent to Washington the press was clamorous for some remedy for desertion, and there was a public statement from the President that he would pardon no one duly convicted. This set Harbess to thinking, and he was not greatly surprised when the finding was returned approved. The day of the execution was set for a week ahead. This was, I suppose, that the matter might be generally talked

about in the whole army corps, and so it was. At noon, when Harbess was informed of his fate, he was roused, faced and showed no trace of anxiety. Four hours later, when I came on guard, I had to look twice before I was sure that it was he. His face was very pale, care-lines appeared here and there, and his eyes were sunken. Had he been ill for a month the change could have been no greater. It was the shadow of death. I watched him from day to day, and every day there was a change. For the first four days he was in a state of dumb despair. Then I saw a strange light in his eyes, and we searched him, to discover that he had secreted a knife, and contemplated suicide. On the morning of the day he was led out to die, Harbess was as weak as a child. I believe he lost at least twenty-five pounds of flesh within the week. For an hour or two he prayed and wept by turns. Then he got his nerve and braced up for the inevitable. Not one word did he say as he marched to the place of execution. He looked around at the soldiers gathered there, but I don't think he saw a single face. I think he was stone-blind from fear. When blindfolded he moaned out in his agony of spirit, but sat bolt upright. At the first low word spoken by the officer in command Harbess fell over backward, and when he was lifted up, it was found that he was dead—dead of sheer fright.

Buenos Aires, September 30.
The Committee of Legislation and Constitutional Affairs of the Senate have reported advising the rejection of all the proposed reforms in the electoral laws. When the National interventors took charge of the Provincial Bank at Santa Fé they found in hand \$5.50 paper money and \$200,000 in treasury bonds declared fraudulent by the National Government.

The Directorate of the National Mortgage Bank is preparing new regulation for the issue of loans.

There has been issued a flood of manifestos published by anarchists and socialists in propagation of their ideas. The Municipal Board has resolved that calle Cambaceres shall return to its former name of Buen Orden.

The Union Civica of Tucuman will hold a meeting of protest against the Provincial Government, next Sunday.

Affairs are again looking uneasy in Cordoba.

The Chief of the Post Office at Santa Fé is accused of a delinquency of \$41,700.

The sessions of Congress are to be prorogued until the 15th October.

Exchange remains steady with few takers. Discounts easy, especially for good names.

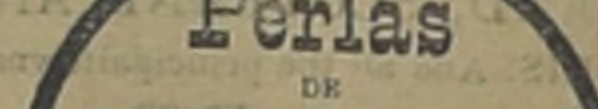
