Sanitary Precautions.

As the heat of summer approaches, the usual sanitary improvement questions once more come to the front.

Though Uruguay has been for many years wonderfully free of epidemics, forewarned is forearmed, and it is always advisable to be on the safe side. Our nearest neighbours are continually visited by yellow fever, cholera or some such evil scourge; but though the fresh healthy climate of Uruguay seems to be able to throw off all such attacks, still our sanitary authorities are quite right not to be over confident, and we cannot but applaud their determination to do all in their power to prevent even the possibility of the introduction of epidemic diseases.

In comparison with former years, there can be no doubt that the hygienic conditions of Montevideo, are now vastly better, thanks to the gradual labour of the Junta and the Sanitary Board, but we have still room for improvement. As long as it is found advisable to adopt what we have always considered a useless precaution, that of quarantine, our quarantine stations will require preferential attention. To pen all sorts and conditions of men together on an island, with a poor but dear supply of food, wretched sleeping accommodation and all sorts of discomforts, is sufficient if not to develop disease there, at least to lead to its breaking out here after they have landed. Let us hope then the first cares of our authorities will be directed to the improvement of our lazarettos, so that the causes for the endless complaints against these institutions with which our newspapers have teemed from time immemorial, may at length be removed.

But the best precautionary measures against the introduction of disease, are not, to our thinking, to be found in the rigorous imposition of quarantine, in all suspicious cases, but rather in strict attention to the hygiene of the city. In making contracts for the new paving of the city, an improvement which is now almost concluded, we think the municipality lost an opportunity of effecting an innovation that would have been most beneficial to the hygiene of the town, we refer to the making of rain gullies or gutters along either side of the street. When we are favoured with a regular deluge of rain, the natural slope of the city carries away the water to the bay, and thoroughly cleans the city, but in summer we are often favoured with slight rainfalls, which are not sufficient to effect this good, and the warm sun, shining out directly afterwards, causes miasma and effluvia to arise that could have been avoided had the streets been lined with these side gullies.

Of course much can be accomplished by the continuous use of rubbish carts, and it is to be hoped this summer the Junta will enforce strict compliance with the conditions arranged with the rubbish clearing contractors, and have the work thoroughly done, early in the morning or late at night.

The suppression of all city tamsos and public stables is another improvement which is earnestly demanded. We believe the municipality has taken a big stride in the right direction, in this respect, by refusing to grant new licences for tamsos or stables within the city.

Our sewage is no doubt improving, repairs being constantly carried on, and new sewers being laid down on the outskirts of the town, where the inhabitants had been too long condemned to do without this necessary adjunct to hygiene; but still there are many parts of the town where our sewerage is defective, owing to a great measure to the ancient and inferior class of latrine in use. When shall we see nothing but the English system adopted?

Along the border of the bay, from the Captain of the Port's mole, along side the barracks, at low water, the effluvia is often anything but salubrious. It is useless to hope for any improvement here, till the long talked of harbour works are begun and finished! If these necessary works are to be delayed much longer, it will certainly rest with the Municipal authorities to devise some new system of drainage which shall do away with these inconveniences.

Saint Nicholas, Anthony Trollope died, 1882. Her Majesty's Theatre burnt, 1860. Parliament.

In the Chamber of Senators, on Wednesday, the discussion in particular of the Hypothecary Cedula Bill was again resumed; the modification in Art. 1 proposed by Sr. Cuestas being under debate. Sr. Terra continued his speech, considering it necessary to decide whether the present Bill would prevent the issue of other Cédulas. Sr. Castro combatted these ideas, and Sr. Cuestas opposed the hampering the law with too many conditions. After some further debate the article was put to the vote, and the form proposed by the Committee was rejected; the modification proposed by Sr. Cuestas being accepted. An additional article was then proposed by Sr. Terra, providing for the conversion of the Cédulas commencing from five years of their emission. After a short debate this was put to the vote and approved. The original Art. 2 was then brought forward. This was attacked by Sr. Vazquez, who considered that one of the greatest injustices of the concession made to the National Bank for the emission of hypothecary cedulas was the right granted the Bank to collect a uniform commission of 1 per cent during the whole term of the mortgage. He then proposed a modification to the effect that the commission should be according to the amount of the capital. This was opposed by Sr. Terra, and being put to the vote, the original article was approved. Art. 3 was then brought forward. Sr. Terra proposed a substitutionary article, providing for the valuation of unoccupied properties. This was in debate, when the hour sounded and the Chamber rose.

Disclaimers.
The B. A. Standard of last Wednesday prints an article on "The Census of Montevideo" which it attributes to us. We thank our contemporary for the kind intention, but it has fallen into some mistake, as the article in question never appeared in our columns, but is a free translation from one of the native papers, *La Razón* if we remember aright.

"H. M. S. Flamingo".
In reply to several enquiries we are enabled to state that, for various cogent reasons, the Committee of the Winter Evening Entertainments has resolved not to repeat the performance of «Pinaflore», although the general demand for a third performance would have ensured a tolerably full house. So far as entertainments are concerned then, the season may be looked upon as closed. A general meeting will be called opportunistically for the Committee to give an account of their labours.

Appropos of this, we may mention that a most lifelike and telling photograph of the inimitable personator of Sir Joseph Porter, K. C. B., in one of his most characteristic attitudes, has been admirably taken by Messrs. Chute and Brooks, and may be seen in the window of Jacobsen's Library, 25 de Mayo 155.

Bridges.
The building of the 345 bridges and culverts, for which estimates have been included in those of the road works of the department of Montevideo, will be commenced. This is a work of general utility which has already been delayed too long.

Cavalry.
The Battalion of 1st Cavalry is expected to arrive this week from Arapay, department of Salto, where it has been stationed for some time. A large barracks in the calle Sierra is being prepared for its reception.

The Civil Code.
The Committee of Advocates appointed to prepare the official text of the new edition of the reformed Civil Code has decided to reject all the tenders made for the printing of the same. The Committee is of opinion that the printing ought not to be done on Government account but should be free to any publisher, with the provision of official comparison and certification.

Civil Register.
A decree has just been published appointing January 2, 1890, for the opening of the Civil Register throughout the Republic, the books to remain open until March 1. The inscriptive tables and juries of enquiry will be formed in conformity with the law of Dec. 15, 1874. The Ministry of Government is to take charge of the details.

The Oriental Republic and the United States of Brazil.
In order not to be behind our Argentine neighbours in doing honour to the great pacific revolution recently carried out in Brazil, the following decree was issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs yesterday.

DECRETE.
The provisional Government of Brazil, presided over by Marshal Manuel Deodoro de Fonseca, having communicated directly to this Republic, through the Minister of Foreign Affairs, in the circular dated Nov. 19, the political events recently occurred there, which resulted in the proclamation of the Republic of the United States of Brazil, and which communication was also opportunely made to our representative in Rio de Janeiro, expressing at the same time the desire to maintain cordial relations with this country and to be officially recognised by it, the which has already been done by means of the Oriental Legation, to which orders to that effect were remitted with the special recommendation to reciprocate their friendly sentiments.

The President of the Republic, confirming this acknowledgement, and further desiring to celebrate this event of such transcendental importance, especially to America, decrees—

1. On the 8th instant (Sunday) the National Flag shall be displayed on all the public buildings, and these shall be illuminated.
2. At 12 noon of that day the fortress General Artigas shall fire a salute of 21 cannon shots, saluting the flag of the new Republic of the United States of Brazil, and a similar salute shall be made by the vessels of the National Squadron, which latter shall show their flags during the day.
3. The Chief of Police of the Capital shall invite the native and foreign residents to decorate their private houses with plays and illuminations. The garrison bands shall play in the Plaza Independencia and Constitution from 8 to 11 p.m.
4. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs shall transmit this decree by telegraph to the Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Republic in Rio de Janeiro, in order that on the day appointed he may visit the Minister of Foreign Affairs for Brazil and convey to him, with an authorised copy of this resolution, the votes of the Oriental Government and people for the felicity and aggrandisement of the Brazilian Nation.

5. Telegrams shall be sent to the «Jefes Politicos» of the Departments of the Republic, instructing them to cooperate in this celebration.
6. The present decree shall be legalised by the Major Officials charged with the business of the Ministries.

7. Let this be communicated etc. Signed, TAJES—Oscar Hordenano—Andrés M. Ferrando—Ramon Lopez Lomba—Eduardo Maciel—Estanislao Perez Nieto.

Distinction.
Sr. Antonio Piaggio, the well known agent in Montevideo of the Italian Navigation Company, has been honoured by the Italian Government with the distinction of Chevalier of the Crown of Italy.

Argentine Republic
La Plata Territorial Society.

A large number of shareholders of this Society met on Monday evening in the hall of the «Operai Italiani» to devise measures for the protection of their interests. Mr. R. P. Saunders, who was the initiator of the meeting, proposed that a syndicate of shareholders should be formed to receive shares for deposit in the National Bank for three months at least, and also to receive 25 cents per share in order to form a fund for payment of any law costs which it may be necessary to incur. There were shareholders present who appeared to be friends of the directors and they opposed Mr. Saunders' proposal, which, however, was after a warm discussion carried by a large majority. The syndicate was named and consists of Messrs. Remigio Regal, F. H. Mulhall, Francisco Ambrosio, R. P. Saunders and Dr. Francisco Ayerza, with Messrs. Duggan and John Nelson as substitutes. The shareholders undertook to deposit 60,000 shares with the syndicate.

Immigration.
During the month of November 36,484 immigrants arrived in Buenos Aires.

Bridges.
The estimate drawn up by the Board of Engineers for the construction of a bridge over the Rio Quinto at Sarmiento valley, province of Cordoba, has been approved by Government. The calculated cost is \$117,622.92.

Santa Fe.
The Provincial Government has submitted to the Legislature, Mr. John G. Meigs' proposal for constructing a large port which will be an entrance canal from the river Colastine to the new port. It is also proposed to make a basin of 3,000 metres, with wharves, warehouses, railways, &c. The E. P. is to issue foreign bonds, bearing 5 o/o interest and 1 o/o amortization, in payment for the works. The contractors will receive the bonds at 85 o/o of their face value.

Port Works.

The engineer Savelius has reported to the Minister of the Interior that the outer wall is not sufficiently solid.

Municipal Committee.
In Monday's session the agreement between the Intendant and the Anglo-Argentine Tramway Company for a deviation at the Boca was approved.

San Fernando.
The Port Works here are reported to be in preparation by Mr. Hopkins, who has the concession.

The Tigre.
The Tigre shows the only example of life in land sales, and even there it is getting a little lame.

Dr. Peacan, of this city, has a pretty chalet well along towards completion near the second bridge on the River Tigre. The bridge over the Tigre near the station is being paved with wood and therefore closed to travel for the time being. Rents are enormous. We hear that a fair-sized quinta has been rented by Dr. Gramajo for \$6,000 for the summer.

Boatmen.
There was a tremendous dust and hail storm in the afternoon, of the 2nd, which caused great destruction of glass. The wind was extremely violent and many "galpones" have been blown down and roofs have been blown away. In one house the wall fell on four children, one of whom was killed and the others injured. Much damage was done to the shipping in port. The Municipal engineers have recommended the acceptance of Agar Cross and Co's tender for the construction of the slaughter houses.

Telegrams
HAVAS AGENCY.
Buenos Aires, December 5.

The Bolsa brokers are still under arrest, and have been much visited. Dr. Mariano Varela has undertaken their defence, and has asked their liberation on bail.

General Campos and Dr. Emilio Bunge have offered to Government to construct waterworks for service outside the radius occupied by the present Sanitary Works Company.

A reception is being prepared at La Plata for Dr. Rocha on his return from Europe. A lazaret is being prepared at Ensenada for the reception of those in quarantine.

There will be an assault at arms in the Opera House this evening, given by Baron de San Malato and several professors and amateurs.

The vessels recently bought in England to form the river squadron will be christened «General Paz», «Canguazú», «Belgrano» and «Yerua».

The scheme to establish a lazaret at Isla Verde has been abandoned as unsuitable.

The idea of making an artificial island on the Banco Chico is again mooted.

The Chief of the Engineer's Department commenced yesterday the arrangement of a national shooting range at lower Palermo.

Amongst the new imposts created by the Municipal Committee is one of \$300 on luxurious funerals. Livery carriages will also have to pay a heavy tax.

Government has refused to recognise General Nicanor Flores as Minister for Bolivia. President Arce has been informed telegraphically that the appointment is considered inconvenient on account of General Flores having recently mixed in political affairs in Salto, and also having challenged a National Senator to a duel. President Arce has replied that he will select another Minister without delay. In the meantime the legation is in charge of the Secretary, Sr. Polidoro Moscoso.

News is arriving of damages caused in the various provinces by the violent storm of Monday. Many of the telegraphic lines are interrupted.

The Bolsa continues inactive. Four more brokers were arrested yesterday and taken to the Penitentiary. It is thought they will all soon be released on bail.

The submarine cable is interrupted and no messages have arrived from Europe.
