A PLEA FOR THE JEWS.

We must confess our astonishment at the illiberal manner in which the propositions of Jewish colonisation have been received by several of our contemporaries. That the *Bien* should combat the idea tooth and nail is not surprising. Knowing the habitual policy of this paper, we expected nothing less, but we are astonished that such ordinarily liberal papers as the *Pais*, the *Tribuna*, and *Ferre-Carril*, and others we cannot recall just now, should show such decided opposition to the proposal.

The main arguments against the Jews appear to be, 1st, that they are not agriculturists. 2nd, that they are too exclusive.

The first is certainly the most formidable, but in the present absence of evidence to support the assertion, it cannot be held proven. And even if these Jews are not agriculturists, which remains open to doubt, there is no doubt that in all other branches of industry they attain a very high position. Baron Hirsch and his coreligionists would scarcely think of sending them here unless they clearly foresaw a fit opening for the application of their talents, and therefore since it is mainly agriculturists that the country requires as colonists, and to whom it offers any reward, it may fairly be presumed that the proposed colonists will be, in the greater number, agriculturists. If it were otherwise there would be little use in sending them, and as a large capital will be staked on the venture, it is not likely so important a point will be overlooked.

As to the exclusiveness with which they are charged, we do not think it matters much. The laws of the country permit no interference with the practice of their religion, and their social customs are no worse, and in many instances far better, than those of the other immigrants we have thrown open our doors to. True it is that they rarely apostatize from their religion and that they do not frequently intermarry with other races, but on the other hand, when allowed to settle down in peace, they take root very quickly, and soon develop an ardent patriotism. Remove from them the disabilities imposed by prejudice, ignorance and jealousy, and they soon become ardent supporters of the country which gives them shelter. To prove this reference is only necessary to the great services rendered to England, by Jews, in politics, finances, science, art, commerce, and every conceivable department, since their emancipation early in the present century.

This fertile Republic today lies gasping and mourning for want of population. More than that, a check is wanted to counterbalance the too great proportion of Latin blood in such immigration as she has recently had, an immigration which has many undesirable points, both in character, religion, and above all

intrusions, and which is notoriously unstable, as has been too plainly proved in the present crisis. We are now offered immigrants superior in intelligence, education, customs, fidelity, and many other particulars. Is it not our duty then to cast aside old black prejudice, mainly founded on ignorance and superstition and for the sake of the languishing country, welcome this persecuted race and accord it the shelter only denied by the most barbaric parts of Europe?

We repeat, then, that we think our contemporaries have spoken too hastily, and we think that on examination they will find they are doing their country a poor service in thus rudely rejecting so advantageous an opportunity as the present.

The Missing Archduke

Now that the mysterious fate of Herr Johan Orth, *ex-Grand Duke John Salvator*, is being generally discussed, the following particulars, from a London paper, may be of interest.

"The Prince, who was the youngest brother of Ferdinand IV., *ex-Grand Duke of Tuscany*, was born at Florence on November 25, 1852. He never married, and resigned his rank, with the consent of the Austrian Emperor, in November last. He was a handsome man, well read, an excellent soldier, and very ambitious—more so, indeed, than was becoming in the son of a dethroned House, who ranked as an Austrian Archduke only through membership of a minor branch of the Hapsburg family. His differences with the late Crown Prince Rudolph, and also with Field Marshal Archduke Albrecht, the victor of Custoza, both of whom he tried to overrule on military matters, were sufficiently notorious. The Prince also caused great inconvenience to the Vienna Foreign Office by first offering himself for the Bulgarian throne after Prince Alexander's abdication, and when he despaired of the Emperor's consent, furthering the candidature of Prince Ferdinand of Coburg, thereby exposing serious consequences."

Such escapades could not be overlooked, and the reports he received roused his sense of pride—of which he had all too much—and he resolved upon a career of private adventure. It can be understood with what a heavy heart the Emperor consented to make the scandal public, and how deeply the Archduke's untimely end will affect the kind-hearted Sovereign whose brother was shot and whose son committed suicide. His Majesty went to Meyerling today to pray at the spot where Prince Rudolph died, and must have been more than ever borne down by the misfortune of his family."

To the above may be added that when the Prince left Austria, he took 600,000 florins in cash. He had with him on board the St. Margarete a beautiful woman, once wellknown on the operatic stage, and to whom it was believed he was legitimately married.

SUNDRIES.

—The Oriental tent Oxilia, who did not go to Italy some six weeks ago as was then announced, but has been singing at the inauguration of the new theatre in La Plata, embarked on Wednesday in the "Europa" for Milan, after which he will go to Lisbon. We understand he will be out here again next winter.

Certainly one of the attractions of the Spanish Fêtes next Sunday will be the tent for the Wheel of Fortune of the "Brillante Sol." This wheel of Fortune has been going with success in the 25 de Mayo for some time, and several of our English friends have taken out very acceptable prizes. The system of playing is quite different

to that of the *rifas* in vogue, and much fairer and more above board.

—Times must be hard indeed when the President of a Republic is three months behindhand with his rates and taxes. For further particulars enquire of the Municipality and tax collectors.

—The infamous criminal Alejandro Tesson, convicted of and condemned for some four or five murders of the most brutal description, and who ought to have been shot or hanged long ago, for he is a mere wild beast in human form, has just been frustrated in an audacious attempt to escape from the Penitentiary. He had already succeeded in making a large hole in the wall of his cell, when an inopportune noise directed attention to him and he was found out. He raved like a madman on being discovered and boldly expressed his intention, had he succeeded in escaping, of having attempted the lives of some of his judges and jailers. This unspeakable ruffian is so evidently possessed of homicidal mania in the worst form that we should say the Asylum would be a fitter residence for him than the Penitentiary.

—The new German Minister, Dr. Krauer, is to be officially received next Thursday.

—The Athletic Sports will be continued this afternoon, at 5 p.m., the events on the programme being the first two heats of the 120 yds. Hurdle race, the Long Jump Running, and Kicking the Football. We will publish the results of the first two days' competitions in our next issues.

—The pen may be mightier than the sword, but just the same the successful literary man has to sit by the wall and watch the smartly-uniformed young lieutenant waltz happily off with the belle of the ball.

—We call attention to the advertisement of the Buenos Aires High School, of which Mr. Watson Hutton is rector. The school is now booking boarders, at reduced fees, for the term commencing next February.

—The *British Medical Journal* says:—Tobacco has been charged with many sins, and among others, lately, with assisting to cause the depopulation of France, in virtue of the physical degeneration to which it gives rise. "And Germany," it is the natural reply, but to this M. Decroix, the president of the Anti-Tobacco Society of France, replies that the Germans smoke much more than the French, but they poison themselves less, first, because they smoke pipes and not cigarettes; secondly, because they smoke very poor tobacco, and further they wash it down with copious draughts of beer, which "cleanses the organism."

—Gold closed yesterday at 138 1/2, according to which the paper dollar is worth 72.2 cents.

—Dr. Mariano Soler, Bishop elect, left for Rome yesterday. It is his intention to ask the Pope to release him from the appointment as he wishes to retire into a convent. Several religious societies went to see him off. During his absence or until a successor is appointed, Dr. Ricardo Lassa is left in charge of the diocese.

—The proposed, or rather, the suggested monopoly on salt and tobacco, has been the subject of excited comment in the press. The *Siglo* asserts on the authority of a Cabinet Minister, that no such proposition has been made. On the other hand the *Razon*, which was the first to start the news, re-affirms its statement most positively. We have reasons for inclining to the latter.

—Kisses are like an actress's diamonds. The oftener they're stolen the better their owners are pleased.

—It is many years since there were so many houses and rooms to let in the city and suburbs. In nearly every square may be seen the ominous white paper which indicates a vacant room, whilst the other day we noted a house standing to let even in such a favoured site as 18 de Julio. The centre still remains full, but there are plenty of vacancies in the "new city" and the suburbs. Meanwhile rents are making the corresponding reduction but very slowly.

—We return our thanks to the Director of the Military College for an amiable invitation to be present at the annual military examination of the cadets, which takes place this afternoon.

—About the only interesting item in the telegrams from B. Aires yesterday was the announcement that the south of the city had been invaded by a swarm of locusts.

—A woman named Carmen Aragon tried to commit suicide on Wednesday, with a solution of matchheads, but was not successful. She lives in Calle Buenos Aires, 148, is 42 years old, still unmarried, and quite tired of this world.

—Another suicide is reported from the Caridad Hospital. About midnight on Wednesday a Spaniard named Salvador Arbelais, aged 52, and afflicted with the incurable disease "ataxia locomotriz," made an excuse to enter the corridor, and

thence threw himself on to the flags in the patio below, breaking his skull and dying at once. This is the second suicide that has taken place in this manner, in some few months. The authorities should look into the matter, as it certainly betokens a want of care.

LONDON NOTES

London, Nov. 6.

The Prince of Wales, accompanied by the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, on Tuesday opened the new underground electric railway between King William-street, City, and Stockwell. A distinguished company assembled. The Prince entered a car at the City station, and travelled thence to Stockwell. Speaking at a luncheon there, he expressed a hope that the line would relieve the congestion of the streets, and that it would be a material boon to working men.

At Brooklyn on Monday evening Mr. James Bryce, M.P., delivered a lecture in which he characterised the present age as one of discontent. Even in America the sanguine feeling which should belong to a young people was fast diminishing, and he thought the people of the States were beginning to feel the depression and discontent which existed in Europe. The lecturer referred to the bitterness of national spirit in Europe, which was exemplified in the prohibitory and retaliatory tariffs which were being passed by the Legislatures and accepted by the people.

A fac-simile of the original manuscript of the Book of Common Prayer is about to be published. The Queen has accepted the dedication of this interesting publication. It is a copy of the well-known "Annexed Book" preserved in the House of Lords Library. It is being reproduced by Messrs. Eyre and Spottiswoode, the Queen's printers, from photographs taken within that building, and will be published conjointly by her Majesty's printers and the Cambridge University Press early next year.

As Christmas-time is approaching, it may be well that those who think of sending presents by post to friends in the United States should know that upon most of the articles so sent duties—now, those of the McKinley Tariff—have to be paid by the recipients. Thus curious things fall into the hands of the Customs House officials. Many will remember the controversy about the Maori idol, valued at 50l., which was returned to New Zealand. Kid gloves, glass eyes, razors, wooden shoes, and jewelry, are among the objects entrusted to the mail bags. Unsealed packages are opened and inspected, and if dutiable merchandise be found it is subject to seizure. When such parcels are detained the addressee is instructed to communicate with the collector of the port, and if there be no evidence of fraudulent intent the package is released upon payment of the usual duty. In the case of a sealed parcel the addressee is sent for to open it. The largest seizure ever made is said to have been a package containing diamonds worth 4,000l.

Mr. Gladstone on Fashions. What next will the Grand Old Man tackle? Greatly daring, he discoursed on the subject of female dress last Wednesday, his comprehensive mind being possibly directed there to by the patriotic Scotch song, "Up, up with the bonnets of Bonnie Dundee!" Be that as it may M. Gladstone spoke with much good sense, when he said:—"Fashion was one of the greatest enemies of beauty. Fashion in dress for instance meant perpetual change. If fashion was to be useful, it should mean perpetual progress; instead of that fashion was a zig-zag, a wheel that whirled round and round, coming back in the end to the same thing. He had seen this wheel of fashion going round and round, always puzzling one like a firework wheel, but always landing in a total negation of progress, and with a strong tendency to the substitution of mere caprice and mere display for the real pursuit of beauty."

Native literature in Bombay appears to be in a flourishing, and is certainly not in a lethargic condition. During the past year there were published in the Presidency 395 books in the Marathi and 445 in the Gujarati language. It is noted in Mr. Sathé's official report as a curious fact that while so much is heard of the awakening of India to political questions, these publications only include one which relates to politics. Gujarati writers during the twelve months found it appears, subjects of living interest in two such dissimilar personages as General Booth and the Golewar of Baroda. Both the languages mentioned were made the vehicle for discussing the topics which Sir William Hunter and Mr. Malabari are bringing into prominence. It was a Gujarati playwright who gave a dramatic turn to the subject of the National Congress—particularly ridiculing the notion that it was a disloyal or seditious gathering. Translations into the vernacular of English novels and stories appear to be especially popular. "Sandford and Merton" still flourishes in Bombay in the shape of a translation into Gujarati

by the late wife of the Dewan of Cutch. Lady Audley's Secret" has received a like honour, though Miss Braddon herself might fail to recognise it under the title of "Bai Saheb." Some samples of native publications have come under the notice of the police magistrates; but neither Marathi nor Gujarati has produced a Zola; and we have the authority of Mr. Sathé for saying that there is little in the vernacular literature of the Presidency that has a harmful tendency.

It is curious that divorce, so facile in some parts of the United States, plays so small a part in American literature. A case is reported from Minneapolis in which a machinist's wife, after living with him for a few years, during which time two children were born, obtained a divorce on account of his intemperance. A few weeks ago, the eldest boy was run over by a train, and lost a leg. The parents met again at his bedside, were reconciled, and re-married, in three days.

THE LOSS OF THE VIZCAYA.

New York, Oct. 31.

The steamer Vizcaya, from this port for Havana, came into collision with a schooner yesterday, off the coast of New Jersey. Both vessels sank. The captain and sixty-one of the crew and passengers of the Vizcaya were drowned.

A further telegram states that only sixteen of the victims were passengers, the remainder being members of the crew. The Vizcaya belonged to the Spanish Transatlantic Company, and was of 1,900 tons gross burden. She was bound for Havana, Santiago de Cuba, Colon, and other ports in Central America, with a general cargo. Her captain was one of the most experienced and trusted of the company's officers, and the steamer was considered perfectly staunch and seaworthy, having been only recently renovated. She carried sixteen passengers, all of whom, as previously stated, were lost. They were all of Spanish nationality, and comprised ten men, two women, and four children. Among them were Senhor Calvo, a Cuban millionaire, and his wife and two daughters. The collision occurred at eight o'clock last night, six miles off Barnegat Lighthouse on the New Jersey coast, the vessel with which the steamer came into contact being a four-masted schooner. Both vessels sank within five minutes. The only survivors from the Vizcaya were the chief and second officers, one engineer, a surgeon and eight seamen. They were rescued from the rigging of the submerged vessel by the steamer Humboldt, which sighted the wreck this morning, and brought the news of the catastrophe to port. Nothing whatever has been seen or heard of those on board the schooner, and it is feared that all on board perished. The last advice was that the crew of the Vizcaya numbered 73 men.

Nov. 2.

The collision between the Spanish passenger steamer Vizcaya and a four-masted schooner loaded with coal, which took place off Barnegat on Thursday, is now proved to have resulted in the sinking of both vessels in seven minutes and the loss of 61 lives. The disaster excites amazement, as the night was clear and the moon bright, and the vessels were in full view of each other for fully half an hour. The officers of both seem to have taken the chances of clearing by a close shave, and not to have altered the course till it was too late. The schooner, which proves to have been the Cornelius Hargreaves, from Philadelphia for Fall River, had the right of way and burned a torchlight in order to be sure of attracting the steamer's attention. The steamer had 16 passengers, including four children, and 77 officers and crew. All the passengers were lost and 45 of the crew with the captain. The schooner had a crew of 11, who were all saved. The survivors give heart-rending accounts of the scene when the steamer went down. The passengers were nearly all upon deck at the time, and seven minutes after the crash not one was to be seen. With wild despairing shrieks they went down with the ship. The twelve survivors clung to the foretop of the schooner, which remained above water till morning when, almost exhausted, they were rescued by a passing steamer. Others clung to planks and wreckage, and were picked up next morning by pilot boats.

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he saw Joe's wife, weeping profusely and ostentatiously, after the fashion considered to be correct by her class; and though he pitied her from the bottom of his heart, he could only think by contrast of Christina. What were that good woman's fears and sorrows by the side of the grief, and shame, and unspeakable horror he might have to bring upon his Christina? Pray Heaven the shock, if it came, might kill her outright; that would at least be better than that she should live long years to remember. More than judge, or jury, or prisoner, Walter Dene saw everywhere, behind the visible shadows that thronged the court, that one persistent prospective picture of heart-broken Christina.

The evidence for the prosecution told with damning force against the prisoner. He was a notorious poacher; the vicar was a game-preserved. He had poached more than once on the ground of the vicarage. He was shown by numerous witnesses to have had an animus against the vicar. He had been seen, not in the face, to be sure, but still seen and recognised, sinking away, immediately after the fact, from the scene of the murder. And the prosecution had found stains of blood, believed by scientific experts to be human, on the clothing he had worn when he was arrested. Walter Dene listened with terrible, unabated earnestness, for he knew that in reality it was he himself who was upon his trial. He himself, and Christina's happiness; for if the poacher were found guilty, he was firmly resolved, beyond hope of respite, to tell all, and face the unspeakable.

The defence seemed indeed a weak and feeble theory. Somebody unknown had committed the murder, and this somebody, seen from behind, had been mistaken for John for Joe Harley. The bloodstains need not be human, as the cross-examination went to show, but were only known by counter-experts to be mammalian—perhaps a rabbit's. Every poacher—and it was admitted that Joe was a poacher—was liable to get his clothes blood-stained. Grant they were human; Joe, it appeared, had himself once shot off his little finger. All these points came out from the examination of the earlier witnesses. At last, counsel put the curate himself into the box, and proceeded to examine him briefly as a witness for the defence.
