## PASSING NOTES.

This is a bad time for the writers of editorial articles, a statement which is corroborated by the fact that many of our contemporaries, like ourselves, frequently find it more convenient to appear without any leading article. The truth is that the situation is in such a condition that it is difficult, if not impossible, to find anything worth saying about it. The presence of the crisis and the terribly depressed condition of all finance and business are too notorious to require further illustration, and one gets tired of penning eternally pessimistic observations on this head and of objugating a Government which shows itself about as sympathetic and responsive as the Great Wall of China. The schemes now awaiting the final approval of the Chamber of Senators are so far beneath criticism—not in their aim, but in their feasibility,—that the thought of them only brings irritation. And there is nothing else, absolutely nothing else, left to criticize. Even suggestion seems to have succumbed to the general inaction, and the prospect remains a dead blank. Under such circumstances silence is the only resource.

We learn, and the news is confirmed by Buenos Aires papers, that Dr. Lowenthal, Colonel Von Vickersy and Mr. Charles Edward Cullen, as representatives of the great European Jew Banker and capitalist, Baron Hirsch, have arrived here with the idea of presenting to Government important schemes of colonisation, proposing to bring to the country and establish as colonists a large number of the unfortunate Jews driven from the centre and east of Europe by barbarous persecutions. For our part, we hope, not only that that news is correct, but that these gentlemen may be entirely successful in their efforts. Not only do we look upon the Semitic persecution now going on in certain parts of Europe, with undisguised horror, but we also entertain a certain admiration for and sympathy with the Jew races, and we are confident that they would make excellent colonists for this too neglected land, whilst their presence would serve as a wholesome check to the too great preponderance of Latin (chiefly Italian) elements of the lower grade, which so far form over 90 per cent of our immigrants. We think it would be a fine thing if this Republic were to throw open its hospitable lands to this persecuted race, whose industries, economical, honest and law-abiding qualities are beyond all question, and we trust that no prejudices of class or religion will be allowed to interfere with any reasonable offers made for the purpose of finding them a refuge and of endowing the Republic with such desirable colonists as we are confident they would prove.

**Official Reception.**  
As already mentioned the official reception by the President of General George Maney, in his new capacity as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the United States to the Republic of Uruguay place yesterday afternoon, in the presence of the Ministers of State and other Dignitaries and Officials.

General Maney spoke as follows.—  
«Mr. President:  
Since assuming my official relations with your Excellency's Government, it has been deemed proper by my own, to raise the grade of its Diplomatic Representative at your Capital, from Minister Resident, to that of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, and in this capacity to accredit me.

While certain, Sir, that my Government's course in this, has been prompted more from its sense of the importance of the Oriental Republic of Uruguay in the family of nations, than by any personal merit on my part, still, if my official communications of the future possible to Uruguay, with her advantages in soil, climate, and a people determined upon progress, supplemented with the blessing of good government, have in the least contributed to the result, my fullest aspiration is satisfied.

It is, Mr. President, my special instruction, with the voice of my promotion, to renew to your Excellency assurance of my Government's profound gratification in past relations of cordial amity with Uruguay, and of its earnest wish to draw even closer, if possible, the ties of friendship which happily have without interruption been heretofore maintained.

As a token of the sincerity of these assurances, I beg most respectfully to invite your Excellency's attention, and that of your Government, to the action of mine, (under recommendation of the recent International American Conference), in appropriating means proportionate to its population, for the initial steps, to prompt construction of a Trunk Railway to unite the systems of the Three Americas, and for impartial service of all.

In support of my Government's sincere desire of the reciprocal co-operation of its sister Republics, in furtherance of this great design, I trust you will forgive the suggestion, that, apart from every improvement of the present, being in degree a contribution to posterity, it may be submitted as a truth that Railroads are not more the servants of commerce, than promoters of harmony between nations, in affording facile means of rapid communication, and advantageous interchange of what each or either may hold as surplus, so binding them to friendliness in the strongest of bonds, enlightened self interest.

Fortunately too, difficulties to the success of the undertaking are more apparent than real, since under the light of fact and experience, its entire distance when completed will scarcely measure a twenty-fifth part of the Railway mileage now actually constructed and remuneratively operated within limits of my country alone, and the total outlay for construction may be readily compensated in the expansion of values upon its line; but, Sir, were the obstacles to its accomplishment many times greater; to the genius of its Peoples, and the measureless resources of our Hemisphere, nothing so fecund of benefits should be accepted as impossible.

Confiding, Mr. President, that my Government's earnest aspiration in this matter of this grand enterprise, so largely in interest of the entire family of American Republics, will meet the cordial sympathy and co-operation of yours, it but remains for me in concluding my duties to this occasion, to place in your Excellency's hands, this my letter of credence, from the proper authority of my country, as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary near your Government.»

The President replied as follows, (by request we give the original Spanish).—  
«Señor Ministro.  
Recibo con verdadero agrado las cartas credenciales que os acreditan en el nuevo y elevado carácter de Enviado Extraordinario y Ministro Plenipotenciario con que vuestro Gobierno acaba de investiros, dando al mio una prueba mas de una buena amistad y a vos una recompensa merecida a vuestros servicios y buenos servicios.

He escuchado con vivo interés las manifestaciones que acabais de hacer respecto a los proyectos que animan al Gobierno de vuestro pais de estrechar y consolidar cada dia mas las relaciones políticas y comerciales entre todas las Repúblicas que forman el continente Americano, ligandolas por grandes vias ferreas que haciendo desaparecer las distancias que hoy las separan, animen el sentimiento fraternal de comunidad de origen y de en solidaridad de destinos.

Puedo aseguraros, Sr. Ministro, que vuestros esfuerzos, en el cumplimiento

de vuestra misión encontraran de parte de mi Gobierno toda la cooperación que le sea dado prestaros dentro de los límites de sus facultades constitucionales, y que vuestras gestiones diplomáticas serán siempre atendidas con la simpatía y buena voluntad que habeis sabido conquistar en el cargo de Ministro Residente que habeis desempeñado antes de ahora.

Al felicitaros cordialmente por la merecida distinción de que habeis sido objeto de parte de vuestro Gobierno me complace especialmente en declararos reconocido en el carácter de Enviado Extraordinario y Ministro Plenipotenciario de la Republica de los Estados Unidos de la America del Norte.»

**Another Benedict.**  
The numerous bachelor friends of the well-known broker Mr. Phibbs Thurburn, brother of the manager of the London and River Plate Bank, gave him a dinner at the Hotel Pyramides, on Thursday evening, by way of farewell to his bachelor life, Mr. Thurburn being on the eve of marriage with Miss Young, daughter of the well-known estanciero, Mr. James Young, the happy event being fixed for December 6. Between thirty and forty friends were present, who did justice to an excellent dinner provided by mine host of the Pyramides. Later in the evening there was spirited flow of eloquence, toasts being exchanged on all sides, and some entertaining music, the cordial conviviality which should mark all such occasions, reigning supreme. We understand that Mr. Thurburn intends to return the hospitality of his friends next week.

**Cabinet.**  
Sr. Gonzalez, the new President of Paraguay, has constituted his first Cabinet as follows.—Minister of the Interior, José Tomas Sosa. Finance, José Segundo Decoud. War, Colonel Egusquiza. Justice, Worship and Instruction, Benjamin Aceval. Foreign Affairs, Venancio Lopez.

**SUNDRIES.**  
—Criminal Judge Ballestrero has passed a sentence of 26 years imprisonment on Luis Rossi for the premeditated murder of Agustín Gnizaga, on June 27 of the present year. This sentence well deserves recording, both for the unusual promptitude with which it has been issued, and for its severity, which we hope may be looked upon as a sign that the former foolish leniency towards assassins is dying out.

—We are intense admirers of the poet Laureate, and consider every line of his at least worth reading, but although considerably over a year has elapsed since the publication of his last volume, it has never been our fortune to see a copy. If any of our readers can oblige us with a loan of the volume, we will regard it as a personal favour.

—The fire in the *barraça* of Vicente Moo, calle Salsipuedes 79, on Thursday afternoon, proved less serious than was anticipated, and was soon extinguished. The damages are estimated at under \$3000. The business was not insured, but the building was, in the «Italo Uruguay».

—Gold closed yesterday at 139, according to which the paper dollar is worth 71.9 cents.

—The Committee of the Colorado Party has selected the following as candidates for the representation of Montevideo in the approaching elections.—Sres. Javier Rivarola, doctor Carlos de Castro, doctor Arturo Berro, doctor Abel J. Perez, Eugenio Garzon, doctor Luis Melian Lafinur, don José B. Gómezoro, don José E. Zabala, doctor Miguel Herrera y Obes, don Ruperto Mendez, doctor Antonio M. Rodríguez, doctor Francisco del Campo.

—El Bien states as follows.—«A person of high position guarantees us that the conversion of the notes of the National Bank will take place within the term assigned by law. This assertion is based upon the word of President of the Republic, who is now combining the means to have ready the necessary resources for this operation on the date appointed.—This is good news, and we shall hasten to believe it—when it has been proved true.

—Our contemporary the *Cosmos* has disappeared from this scene of journalistic troubles after an existence of barely a month. Its life was harmless and its death leaves no blank.

—An Englishman once bet a Yankee five pounds that the latter could not write or speak thirty words without using a slang expression. The wager was accepted. «What shall I write about?» said the Yankee. «Oh, describe a storm», replied the Englishman. Brother Jonathan at once went to work.—«The sky was black and dreary; murky and ominous clouds drove furiously from the west, and in fifteen minutes it rained like everlasting hooks.» At this point he was stopped by the Englishman, who told him he was anxious enough to hear the remainder, but would in the meantime trouble him to hand over the five pounds.

—The death is announced as having taken place in Paraná of Sr. Emilio Rajneri, a well known impresario of Italian Opera and dramatic

companies, who has frequently brought companies to the River Plate, both on his own account and in conjunction with Cicchi and Ferrari. He was fifty years old.

—The annual picnic and *festa* of the Spanish residents, in aid of the funds of the Spanish Mutual Benefit Society, will take place the first Sunday in December, in the *quinta* of Sr. Marquez, Paso del Molino. It will commence with music and the indispensable rockets, at four in the morning, and will be continued, with numerous intervals for refreshment, until midnight.

—The family of the late Sr. Ponte Ribeiro, wilhelm Brazilian Minister in this capital, left for Lima in the P.S.N. Co's «Saxtas», yesterday.

—There must be some very dirty people going about this city, for we read in the *Siglo* that the municipal employees had to wash with disinfectants some of the benches in the Plaza Arrola on account of the parasites left behind by some recent occupants.

## LONDON NOTES

London, Oct. 25.  
The Daily News is responsible for the two following paragraphs.—  
Four hundred and odd sailors deserted from vessels arriving in the port of Montevideo alone last year. What became of them? Our Consul-General has no doubt that the great number took service aboard British vessels on a hint from the crimps who infest that port that wages are higher in Montevideo harbour than from the ports from which these men originally shipped. By the local law sailors who desert are liable to arrest and surrender, but the captains rarely avail themselves of this remedy. They prefer, we are told, to let their men run. The reason alleged is that the captains are practically under no obligation to give any account of the deserters. By the Merchant Shipping Act, it is true, they are required to pay such arrears into her Majesty's Exchequer, but by some strange oversight they are not bound to do this until an action has been brought against the deserter and judgment given against him. In practice, it is stated, no such actions are brought. The remedy for this absurd and mischievous state of things is in our Consul-General's opinion easy. The Legislature has only to give to her Majesty's Consuls the some power of calling on the master to render an account of wages due in the case of deserters as they possess when the mon die or are discharged.

Uruguay is not a reading nation. The printing done at home is very small, and the importations of books and periodicals are stated by our Consul-General to represent the principal proportion of the consumption. But though the language is Spanish no printed books whatever were imported from Spain in 1888, and in other years the value of this trade has not exceeded eight cents per head of the population. French books, both literary and scientific, are the favourites. The English books imported are supposed to be for the use of the comparatively small number of English-speaking residents.

«Cléopâtre», the joint product of M. Sardon and M. Moreau, was given for the first time on Thursday evening at the Porte-Saint-Martin Theatre in Paris. Madame Sarah Bernhardt, who impersonated the heroine, achieved one of her greatest triumphs. The authors have made many important changes in the arrangement of the play as written by Shakspeare. The tendency has been to simplify, and whole scenes have been cut out.

M. Ephrussi, whose Aliante won the Cambridgehire Stakes, is probably in a better position than any body, except Lord Rothschild, to give an opinion as to the relative magnitude of the sums involved in horse-racing compared with financial transactions. As a rule, bankers take little notice of what goes on in betting circles; but the large sum won by French backers of this horse—variously estimated at from 40,000l. up to 150,000l.—is alleged as possibly explaining a slight fall in the Paris exchange on London, and this is a matter which no banker can afford to disregard. The exception only illustrates the rule, and it may be confidently asserted that the bet-

ting on the Bourse involves in the course of a month or so twenty or thirty times the sums which change hands on racecourses. It is only in recent years that international betting has grown large, and perhaps some day we shall find the grave bankers and brokers who attend Change regarding the race-courses as a powerful factor in the movements of the money market.

Miss Julia Rappoport has been emulating, in the Antipodes, the intellectual successes of her sex in England. Three years ago, when only sixteen, she passed the matriculation examination at the Melbourne University with honours in Greek and French. At the last examination for the clerical division of the Victorian Civil Service, when 167 candidates presented themselves for 25 vacancies, Miss Rappoport took the highest marks ever achieved in arithmetic securing 492 out of a possible 500. She now holds a Government appointment in the Melbourne Central Telegraph Office. The clever young lady is anxious to take the M. A. degree. It is thought that she may eventually become a doctor, or even emulate the young Roumanian lady, Sarnissa Bilecos, and become the first woman barrister of her country.

«Lovers' stationary» is one of the newest ideas in note-paper in America. The watermark is a blending of two hearts pierced by an arrow. On the lower corner of the last page appears a little mark which is intended to denote the kissing spot. It is covered with an aromatic gum, which is said to impart to the lips an agreeable odour and taste. This note-paper is having a great run in some of the large towns in the States.

Slow eaters are long lives, we are told, but fashion has now ordained in France that the service of the table shall be so very rapid that those who eat slowly cannot adequately dine. Country house guests are bitterly complaining just now, of the rapidity with one course follows another. The palate of the gourmet is defrauded by this fashionable haste, which tries even the possessors of teeth that have done but twenty years' duty.

**COUNT MOLKE ON ENGLISH EDUCATION.**  
Count Molke, acknowledging the receipt of a copy of Dr. Rayd's new book on «English and German Education» says—«The chief thing is not what boys learn when at school, but how their minds are formed. Physical education, by means of gymnastics and sports, is, I think, better cared for now, since the new regulations came into force. I am only anxious that, by awakening patriotic feeling, children may be strengthened for the period from sixteen to twenty-one, from leaving school until their entrance into our universal training institute, the Army, and their minds enlightened as to the imprudence and mischief of Social Democratic theories; to which they, as experience teaches, only too easily succumb during that perilous period. What pleases me most in the English mode of education is that, as you say, lying is treated not only as an offence, but as a disgrace, or as a habit unworthy of gentlemen.»

**THE TROUBLES OF A «HARD-UP» SOVEREIGN.**  
A very amusing if indiscreet collection of souvenirs has been published in Paris. The author is Baron Du Casse, who was formerly aide-de-camp to Jérôme Napoléon, ex-King of Westphalia. The dethroned monarch, as it is well known, became what is familiarly termed «hard-up» when he retired into private life, and the Baron Du Casse, who entered his service about the time that Jérôme was appointed Governor of the Hotel des Invalides, describes the efforts made by the fallen King to make both ends meet. Jérôme was made Governor of the French Chelsea Hospital by Prince Louis Napoléon, and was allowed £1,800 a year. To this was added another annual sum of £1,600, which Princess Mathilde, who had married Prince Demidoff, gave her father, by order of the Tsar. When Louis Napoléon became Emperor of the French he made old Prince Jérôme a marshal. This brought the ex-King in a handsome salary, which released Princess Mathilde from her engagements to her father. The Emperor further allowed «Uncle Jérôme», as he was called, a sum of £80,000 in monthly instalments, and always, according to Baron Du Casse, half of the monthly sum was shared with the present Prime Jérôme Bonaparte, usually called «Prince Napoléon», the Princess Mathilde receiving nothing. When Prince Napoléon did not dine with his parent the latter ordered dinner in a restaurant and a box for the theatre afterwards, whereupon the son stormed and spoke about extravagance.

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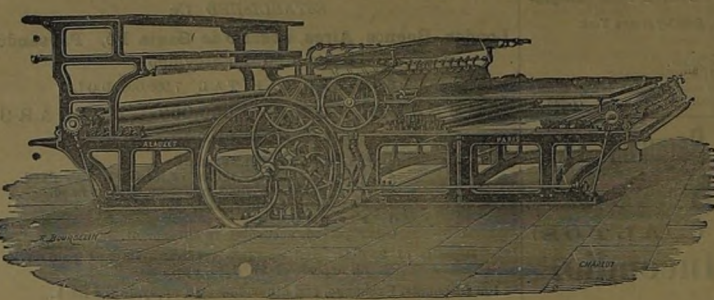
