Parliament.

In the Chamber of Representatives, on Tuesday, a Message was received from the Executive accompanying a proposition for reductions in the Budget of the Municipal Board. This was referred to the Budget Committee.

The report of the Committee of Legislation on the Message proposing Ministerial reforms was distributed.

The discussion in detail of the proposed reforms in the Budget was then resumed, the plan for the Ministry of Justice, Worship and Public Instruction being under consideration.

A long and desultory discussion ensued in which various details of the plan were considered in a conversational manner. Deputy Tavolara caused great amusement by saying that he had received anonymous letters from various of his countrymen threatening him with death on account of the reductions he proposed in their salaries. Finally the plan was approved in part, the consideration of the rest being set aside for the present.

The plan for the Ministry of War gave rise to a similar conversational debate, in which several modifications were proposed, and some accepted. Sr. Melian Lafinor pointed out that the plan included a pension for one of the 33 patriots, who had died years ago. More than one deputy complained that the Committee had framed their report very carelessly and apparently without any consideration of the effects.

Sr. Melian Lafinor commenced speaking on the proposed addition of 30 to the consular rights, which he said had not been properly studied, when the Chamber was counted out.

Murder.

A shocking murder was committed in La Unión about half past ten on Tuesday night. The victim was an Oriental named Carlos Mendez, about 19 years old and of humble position. The assassin is Adolfo Sosa, also Oriental, aged 26, a man of bad antecedents and only recently released from prison for a murderous assault. There were no witnesses of the crime, but according to Sosa's own confession the two had a quarrel over some expressions used the day before at a game of cards, and Mendez attacked him with a knife. He then threw Mendez down, seized the knife and stabbed him. He persists that he only acted in self-defence. The body of Mendez shows three tremendous wounds, either of them mortal. After the crime the murderer went home, and was arrested about an hour later when

in bed. The affair caused a great sensation in La Unión, where the victim bore a good character, and the police had to protect the assassin from the people.

The Alleged Loan.

Yesterday's papers still contained more references to the alleged loan from Brazil, but hardly couched in such positive and definite terms as a few days ago. The latest version is that the loan is for \$1,500,000 cash, from the Banco de la Republica de los Estados Unidos de Brasil to the National Bank here, and that Government only interposes in the matter indirectly, that is to say it is not a State loan, but a loan from one Bank to another.

We have made enquiry respecting this alleged loan and are in a position to assert that, at an advanced hour of the afternoon yesterday, nothing was officially known about influential quarters most likely to be acquainted with the facts. Even if the rumours have any basis, which is open to doubt, the negotiations are not in the advanced state that has been represented by some of our contemporaries. In fact there are several who think the whole affair, like many preceding rumours which for a time possessed the market, has been started with a view of influencing the Bolsa for speculative purposes.

Exchange at Rio Janeiro on London had dropped yesterday to 19d., a fact which also has its bearings on the case. On the whole then, we feel justified in warning our readers not to believe the current reports until they have received more substantial corroboration.

SUNDRIES.

The Provincial Chamber of Deputies of Buenos Aires has been discussing economies. They declined to reduce their own salaries, but in the general expenses of the Legislature they suppressed one *peon*. Excuse a passing smile.

Mr. R. P. Palar wishes the report corrected which sends him as delegate from Uruguay to the International Railway Congress at Washington. The Consul-General of Uruguay to the United States was appointed delegate some time ago.

The unspeakably raffish habit of carrying loaded firearms to a dance, only too common in the River Plate, has just had fatal consequences in Buenos Aires. The following is the account of the affair, from the *Herald*.—On Saturday the Society "Sin Rival" gave a ball in the saloon of the "Centro Gallego." Among those present was Carlos Rivero, a young man, who became intoxicated during the evening, and who, happening to meet a woman with whom he had a quarrel, showed her his revolver and said he would kill her. This was regarded by the bystanders as a joke. Shortly afterwards, about 2 a.m., a quadrille was formed, and Rivero, who was standing opposite the same woman, repeated his threat and drew out his revolver. Some friends seized his arm, but in the struggle the revolver was discharged and the bullet struck a girl, Soledad Montoya, in the head. Rivero fled but was afterwards captured. The girl died within two hours. It is to be hoped that this dangerous young lunatic will receive an exemplary punishment that will warn his companions as well as himself. We wonder who were the bystanders who looked on a loaded revolver as a joke?

In the window of a jeweller's shop in calle 18 de Julio may be seen a very handsome and costly album which the Spanish residents in Paysandu are about to present to Peral, the alleged inventor of a submarine boat. We think in these times of crisis they might find some more sensible outlet for their superfluous cash.

Guerrillero, the hero of the International race last Sunday, is about to be photographed for the benefit of his admirers. We hear that his owner Colonel Belinzon has made a big haul over this event, and has presented the jockey Carlin with half the prize money, or £500. It may not be generally remembered that Guerrillero, by Childeric Petticoat, won the Grand prize of 1889, won the Espom Grand prize of 1889. The B. A. Standard accounts for the defeat of the Argentine champions by difference in the courses, the Maron track being up and down hill. We presume it was the same for all the horses running, unless our contemporary means to insinuate that it was up hill for the Argentines and down hill for the Orientals. That would be a novelty in race courses worth seeing.

The performance at the Politeama Oriental this evening will include two acts of "Macbeth" and "La Gran Via." The latter piece is given very well by this company. The company of dwarfs who were at the other Politeama some months ago have returned and will presently be exhibited here.

According to all accounts Brazil has caught the speculative fever very badly, even worse than we had it in the River Plate two years ago. It is "booming," just as we were once. Land has been run up to terrific values, and every day sees

the launching of speculative companies with an enormous capital—in paper. The Brazilians, being very young as a republic, evidently want their own experience, and will not take warning by the fate of their neighbours, ourselves to wit. We could tell them, if they would only listen, that such "booms" have one invariable end, and that is expressed in a word of six letters which is *Crash*.

A peculiarity of many of the *rifas* or lottery-rafts held here is that month after month, in different *rifas*, one sees most temptingly exposed to view and carefully numbered the same objects, or if not the same, so like each other that an ordinary observer cannot distinguish the difference. There are certainly some which we have recognised in half a dozen different *rifas* in the course of twelve months. To a suspicious mind this is very suggestive. These remarks, however, do not apply to the Charity Raffle still open in the Hotel Paris, which we believe to be conducted on strictly genuine principles, and where we know many of our English friends have been rewarded with prizes of considerable value.

According to the *Diario* of Buenos Aires the proposal of Otto Bernberg and Co. to establish here a Banco Fundario or Agrícola, with ten million dollars capital, for the purpose of promoting colonisation, has not been permanently abandoned, but has only been withdrawn to await more auspicious times.

According to official statistics the number of sheep killed in the Department of Rivera by the storms of last December amounts to 31,000 head.

The "saltona" or locust larva has appeared in tremendous quantities in the 2nd section of the Department of Flores.

We understand that the Pope has refused to allow Dr. Mariano Soler to decline his appointment to the bishopric of Montevideo, and accordingly he will be consecrated on his return here, early next month.

Cocktails are always dangerous drinks, and seem to be especially so in Colonia, where four worthy persons have just had just a narrow escape from poisoning through a convivial participation in this drink. It transpired that the bottle labelled "curacao" contained some home-made sheep dip.

The boatman at the Pocitos baths has lodged a complaint to the effect that some rascal has stolen his life-boat. If anyone has a second hand life-boat offered them for sale, they may know whence it comes. Of the enormity of the offence we are powerless to speak. The man who would steal a life-boat is capable of running away with Cleopatra's needle or embezzling Cheop's Pyramid itself.

Notwithstanding the crisis and general scarcity of money, it appears we are to have a Carnival, or the pretence of one. The Municipality will provide the usual gas illuminations. Last year, when we were not hard up, the *Corso* was very poor, and this year it is likely to be worse. In fact we hear that the *comparas* are limited to thirteen, twelve of which are formed by niggers. Carnival is a fast-dying festival, and has become little better than a vulgar nuisance, and we should not be sorry to see it given the *coup-de-grace*. Above all we would like to see a stop put to the use of that offensive and stupid invention the *pomito* or scent-squirt, the unrestrained use of which has effectually destroyed whatever there was of fun or picturesque in Carnival time.

The Debate in the Chamber of Representatives, on Tuesday, was conducted in so loose a manner that we are unable to deduce from it how the matter of economies stands. A number of amendments seem to have been brought forward, but whether they were put to the vote or accepted we cannot definitely say. Any how it seems decidedly ridiculous that the Chamber should waste time discussing and voting estimates for the Ministry of Justice just when that Ministry is about to be abolished and another instituted in its place.

Gold closed yesterday at 128 1/2, according to which the paper dollar is worth 77.9 cents.

It is a peculiar fact that the men who always make a fuss about the poor cigars that are presented to them never murmur about the poor ones they buy.

The well-known auctioneer Sr. Manuel García de Zúñiga has had the misfortune to lose his young son Ulises, who died yesterday from lung disease.

According to the *Razon* the very important stone quarries at La Paz have stopped work on account of the crisis, thereby throwing some 600 men out of work. These quarries were the principal support of the little town of La Paz, and consequently great trouble and distress is anticipated.

A friend from Buenos Aires who visited this city for the first time on the occasion of the recent races, stopped two extra nights on purpose to admire the promenades in the

streets of an evening. He has travelled considerably, and he says he never remembers seeing so remarkable a show of tastefully dressed and beautiful women and girls as can be seen here in the evening when nearly all the population turns out of doors. Certainly there is nothing like it ever to be seen in Buenos Aires, where the evening promenade is not an institution as it is here. So that, despite the crisis, the Montevidean girls keep up their reputation for good looks.

On Tuesday evening a boy named José Galbarini, aged 14, was riding in calle 18 de Julio, when his horse shied at a passing cart and threw him. He fell to the ground, but his left foot caught in the stirrup and he was being dragged along by the horse in a dangerous fashion. The efforts of the passers-by to stop the steed only accelerated its paces. The situation of the boy was evidently critical when an officer drew a revolver and fired, hitting the horse in the leg and bringing it to a halt, and the boy was rescued. This strange method may have been justified, but it certainly forms a very dangerous precedent. The boy escaped with some severe bruises.

TTE "NEW JOURNALISM" OF THE DAY

As to the New Journalism of today, why multiply words about it? Preaching at it is of no use. The sanguine Auditor declared that "all rational men abhor its methods." If this be true, the rational mind need not buy and read the ill-printed, ill-written, ill-conceived rags of the cheap press. Unluckily the very people who are always denouncing the hasty and irresponsible tissues of scandal, fable and simple silliness are too often seen with examples of the New Journalism in their hands. Nature foresaw "what a baby man would be," and foresaw the New Journalism. When everybody can read, when the least educated and worst bred are the largest public, of course the wants of that public will be supplied, and even anticipated. It has long been so in America; and now that the *midus* of the disease has been prepared in England, we have the malady. The manner the mind which has to be amused, the more are "personalities" introduced. They are almost always very trivial; they are in many cases absolutely false. There is an audience which never dreams of reading an author's books, but never tires, apparently, of hearing about his dress, his health, his domestic habits. Why people should care to hear that Brown the poet, when they never study, has an aunt who squints, or that he suffers from chilblains, is a great mystery. We cannot cure the taste, because we cannot comprehend it. We must endure it; nothing is gained by railing at it, nothing by losing our tempers.—*Saturday Review*.

MANNERS.

BLACKWOOD'S MAGAZINE.

It is common complaint among older people that manners have grievously deteriorated with the present generation. Perhaps it is so; but similar complaints have been uttered over every successive generation; there are always plenty as if it were bloody revolution. Our contention is that, changed as they are, there is still plenty of scope for consideration of others, which is the fount of social sweetness. The eighteenth century abounded more than does the nineteenth in courtesies; it was more picturesque. There is less formality now both in dress and address than of yore, but the gulf that separates the well-bred from the ill-bred remains as deep and wide as ever. If we have not so many Sir Charles Grandison, surely we have fewer Squire Westerns. Is it the refinement of a *fin de siècle* drawing-room a hundred years ago that would most impress one of us, could he be transported back to it? Change of manners and habits is inevitable, but it does not necessarily imply deterioration. Sweetness of manner has its source far too deep to be learned by practice or rote; it is no use trying to learn the trick of putting it on, like a grenadier's cap, to make one's self of consequence; it must be innate, for it is the outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace—an instinctive consideration of the feelings of others, a forgetfulness of self. Courtesy is the counterfeit, often passing muster for the real thing; its success is commensurate with the success of the efforts to please others.

But, it may be urged, a man may be full of kindness and sympathy for other and yet fail to please because of his shyness. Well, shyness is of two kinds, the first and least deplorable being a gracelessness caused by unfamiliar surroundings and uncertainty how to behave. It produces agonies of misgiving, with perplexity that scatters thought. But, observe, this kind of sufferer is apprehensive, not of being laughed at, but of intruding on or being a bore to other. He dreads giving offence. Painful though it be, his is, if properly and timeously treated, a transient malady, and

often leaves the convalescent more able to give and receive pleasure in the society of others than many who have never suffered from the disease. The reason for this seeming paradox is that shyness of this kind is the result of a lively imagination acting on love of approbation, each of which is in due measure, essential to a sympathetic nature. But it must not be neglected or encouraged by circumstances, or it will become chronic, and the torment will be life-long. The other and more malignant form of shyness is really nothing but pride, generating suspicious watchfulness and cold reserve, each of them fatal to a pleasant manner. You cannot give a sullen pool the sparkle and dash of a mountain stream, any more than Lord Chesterfield could pour his own light and grace into his son's dull nature.

How far is a man responsible for not having a good address? If our contention is right, he is as responsible for not having natural sweetness as one who is without courage, honesty, continence, or any other natural virtue. But the punishment falls less heavily on the selfish man than on one for whom life without the friendly esteem of others is worthless. Never to please is to feel the firm clasp that betokens the answering warmth in a friend's bosom, nor enjoy the genial glow that welds two equal spirits moving to the same goal; not even, it may be (though herein exist some different and perplexing considerations), exchange that exquisite flattery of preference between man and woman which is no small ingredient in the sweet draught of love. Never see faces look round brightly at the sound of your footfall, nor a circle open with glad acclaim on your approach; but, instead, mark the chill diffused among those into whose company you come—the constraint of remarks addressed to yourself compared with the ceaseless flow of talk among others. Never please! it is worth much study and much pains, if by study and pains the trick might be learnt: but to worry one's self over the rules without cultivating the virtue which is at the root of the whole matter, is so much study and pains thrown away.

JOTTINGS.

He was an ingenious smuggler who the other day, entered the port of New York with £30,000 worth of diamonds on his chest, concealed under a porous plaster. The duty on diamonds is very heavy in America; yet, looking to the smallness of the gems, one would imagine that it was well-nigh hopeless to attempt to stop them from being smuggled into the country. Large seizures are, however, made from time to time. Diamonds have been over and over again found concealed in the heels of boots, and, a few years ago, if being in America, you ordered a pair of boots from England, nothing was commoner than to discover, on the arrival of the goods, that the heels had been cut off, and very clumsily replaced by the Custom House officers.

Last year over 775 millions of passenger journeys were made over the railways of the United Kingdom; but only about 80 millions of these journeys were made in first-class carriages. For every one first-class passenger there are two second class passengers and twenty third-class; and, in spite of this, the proportion of first- and second-class passengers is every year decreasing. The distance traversed by all the trains of the country in the aggregate was about three times the distance between the earth and the sun; the expenses per mile were, as nearly as possible, half-a-crown; and the receipts per mile amounted to over 4s. 6d. The number of miles of railway open for traffic was 19,743, and the average value of the railways per figure was £43,955. These are big figures. It is, however, satisfactory to find that, taken as a whole, the railways paid over 4 1/2 per cent. to their shareholders, and that the general railway business of the country is steadily increasing—a proof, if proof were needed, that, in spite of our complex network of

lines we have not, as yet, more railways than are really wanted. We are still building new lines at the average rate of 120 miles a year.

The Emperor is a saddening specimen of strength and weakness. There is no doubt about his intellectual ability and his mental quickness; and on horseback there is no finer or handsomer uniformed figure than his. He has untiring energy, and during the recent manoeuvres he was in the saddle morning after morning by seven o'clock. But his left arm is as useless as if it were non-existent. He cannot raise it, nor can he hold anything with his left hand. This is the hideous skeleton in the cupboard of the Imperial Household. But, perhaps, this very weakness is an advantage to Kaiser Wilhelm. Germans are very superstitious, and there is an ancient prophecy to the effect that the German Empire shall be raised to the highest pitch of glory by a one-armed Kaiser. It is often a good thing for a ruler to be able to pose as a man of destiny. Napoleon I. appreciated the value of the position, and for eighteen years Napoleon III. utilised it successfully. Yet Kaiser Wilhelm has his own strong personality to rely on as well. He is to-day the most remarkable figure in Europe.

They closed in first ring at 28 3/4 cash, 30 for February 15. In the second ring they were still weaker, and after touching 27 3/4 they closed 27 3/4 cash, 28 to-morrow, 28 3/4 sold.
Cédulas were quiet with a marked fall. \$61,900 series A sold at 42 1/2 to 40 cash and tomorrow, 41 1/2 for end of February. \$9,000 Mortgage Certificates at 42 cash. \$55,000 Amortizables went at 27 1/2 to 26 1/2 cash, 26 for to-morrow.

National Company shares were the only exception to the downward movement of the day, and had an unexpected rise. 500 sold at 7 1/2 and 8 cash.

The London quotation of Unifeds has risen 3/8 to 49 3/4. \$9,400 sold here at 54 cash, a rise of 1 point.

BUSINESS NOTES

—From the Argentine News of Rosario we take the following—
Business of very kind in this city is going from bad to worse and everyone is complaining of the hardness of the times.

The following prices for wheat are quoted in the northern colonies: 620; 650; 700 and 720 per fanega. Prices are looking up and sellers are holding out for 9 mps for export wheat. Bran also is rising considerably, sales being effected at \$2 and 250 per 100 kilos.
Santa Fé is deluged with Treasury Bonds the last patent substitute for claudesbank bank notes. They circulate with a discount of 15 cjs over and above the regular depreciation of the paper currency.

—The B. A. Herald says,—"Notwithstanding these hard times real estate has not fallen much in price, the sales are limited but prices are very firm, there is a good demand for chacras outside the city."

—In the Concordia Saladero belonging to Sres. Lezica, Suburu and Co., 47,000 head of cattle were slaughtered last year. All the products were exported direct. In a few weeks the firm will commence the manufacture of extract of beef, for which purpose 300 novillos a day will be killed.
