WANTED, A PUBLIC WHITEWASHER!

In glancing over the long list of officials and functionaries who fill various useful and useless posts in the complicated administrative machinery of this little Republic, it has occurred to me more than once that there is a striking want of a Public Whitewasher, whose peculiar office it should be to whitewash the characters of office-holders and especially of government-nominees, charged with any grave offence.

It happens, we might say it frequently happens, that some officious person smarting under an exaggerated sense of wrong, or some too busy writer in the press burning to distinguish himself by blackening the character of those in authority, brings a charge of serious misconduct—at least they call it serious—against some high official, such as a Jefe Politico, Commandant of a Regiment, Director of a Penitentiary or the like; at times they even let fly at such comparatively smaller game as a sectional commissary. Of course this arises from their ignorance of the fact that in this eminently well administered country, persons in authority are invariably in the right (we have frequently had the assurance of the *Nacion* and other government organs for that) and are not supposed to be amenable to ordinary considerations of law or justice, especially if they wear a military uniform, as they generally do. Still, the accusations are sometimes brought with such clamour and insistence that the Superior Powers find it necessary to take notice of them—on the principal of the Unjust Judge in the New Testament parable—if only to silence them. What is sarcastically called an enquiry is ordered, which, least the light of day should accidentally fall on any dark or dirty spot, is conducted with careful secrecy and by processes quite unintelligible to the uninitiated. The Nation is far too cultured to allow of any washing of dirty linen in public it even prefers that it should not be washed at all. (If a captain has stained his uniform, it is easy to hide the stain by giving him a colonel's coat to cover it.) Of course the accused party is allowed every possible liberty, advantage and privilege, including that of threatening and frightening the witnesses, during the enquiry. Otherwise, such is the force of evidence, he might accidentally be found guilty. After this enquiry has been dragged on long enough to wear out the patience of the most determined accuser, and to allow the public to forget all about it (neither press nor public being allowed to witness the process) it is quietly shelved or put on one side, or as they say here, *sobresido*. The accusers have no further chance of being heard, justice is considered to have been satisfied, and the accused returns to his former sphere of duty, unless his patience and fortitude under trial are rewarded by removal to a more important post.

Now all this, we claim, is not satisfactory. Like the Scotch verdict of "not proven" it leaves matters rather worse than before. It is not proper that high officials, generally nominated to their post on account of their personal friendship with the Superior Powers, should be permitted to retain office with some horrid accusation standing against them, neither established nor refuted. Respect to Authority, (with a big A) forbids it! And, as of course, enquiries are rarely instituted with the object of finding the accused parties guilty, it follows that there ought to be some proper means of effectually clearing their character, so that thereafter no one could throw a stone, point a finger, or put their tongue in their

cheek, at them. This could best be effected by the establishment of a Public Whitewasher, who would thus prove to be an even more important functionary than the Public Prosecutor.

It should be this person's express duty to conduct all enquiries into charges made against public officials or authorities, and at the close formally declare them innocent, thereby of course the evidence adduced—as a necessary but tiresome formality, akin to the necessity in every Presidential Message of expatiating on the loyalty and self-abnegation of the army—the evidence, we say, would have nothing whatever to do with the result. That would be quite too utterly absurd.

Such a functionary would have a busy time of it, and would fulfil a most useful sphere, putting an end to countless scandals, hushing all malevolent tongues, and generally making things comfortable and proper. He would also do away with the shocking charge occasionally brought against the Republic of holding an original code of morality and of being unable to expose or prosecute high offenders.

Captain So and So has been accused of thrashing a private to death.—"Oh dear no! he has been Whitewashed."—"Sr. Whattishname, Director of the National Bank of Discredit, has been accused of embezzling half the capital and of an unauthorised issue of notes."—"Dear me, what a mistake, he has been Whitewashed!"—"Senator Thingumbob is accused of selling his vote on the banking question for \$10,000."—"Quite wrong, I assure you, he has been Whitewashed."—"Colonel Touchemup, Jefe Politico of Treinta y Cuatro, has been accused of seizing ten leagues of land from a resident whom he thrust into prison for daring to protest."—"Quite an illusion, he has been Whitewashed."—And so on. Had I as many months as Hydra, such an answer would stop them all.

Thus the Public Whitewasher might become one of the most important functionaries in the Republic, and would be rewarded with a large salary, which addition to the Budget a grateful and contented people would never grudge. His high offices would never be exercised on anyone below the rank of a First Commissary or a full Captain, the smaller fry being left to the less delicate processes of ordinary justice; and in the case of those unfortunate officials, who, although of high rank, have been so mistaken as to incur the displeasure of the Superior Powers by an adherence to the wrong political party, or by an exhibition of independent opinion, the Public Whitewasher would be incapacitated by a convenient attack of influenza, and his place taken by the Public Prosecutor, converted for the nonce into a Blackwasher, and it should be the duty of the latter to see that their character was sufficiently blackened to prevent their holding office again, irrespective of that foolish mass of words called evidence.

We are quite surprised that the President did not include this obviously necessary reform, in his recent Message. It would have been much more to the point than abusing the creditors of the Republic.

The Conversion Scheme.
Although it seems certain now that the large majority of bondholders have accepted—or been forced into accepting—the Conversion, nothing is known about the attitude of the guaranteed railways, which play an important part in the scheme. The official founts of information are entirely, we might even say suspiciously, silent on the point.

Under the heading of the "Uruguayan Debt Middle" the following letter was published in the principal financial papers in London.

Sir,—The Uruguay Five per Cent. Bondholders' Committee has been inundated with inquiries as to what is the position under the Conversion Scheme of the bondholders and guaranteed railway shareholders. Kindly allow me to reply to these inquiries through your columns.

First, as to the bondholders. Under the scheme, all hypothecations in favour of the United Five per Cent. Bondholders are swept away, and only a portion of their security is to be handed over for the benefit of all the creditors of Uruguay. The special hypothecations granted by the railway guarantees are in like manner swept away entirely.

According to the customs receipts of last year, and if the receipts of the present year equal those, which is extremely doubtful, the Government cannot even pay the amount requisite for the 3½ per cent. promised to the bondholders, whilst there will be nothing for the railways.

The position of the guaranteed railways under the law and the arrangement of the Council of Foreign Bondholders is that they have no claim on these funds until the bondholders have been satisfied. It has been stated that a majority of the six railway companies mentioned in the arrangement, viz:—(1) Central Uruguay Eastern Extension; (2) Central Uruguay Northern Extension; (3) North-Eastern of Uruguay; (4) Midland Uruguay; (5) North-Western of Uruguay; (6) Uruguay Northern—have given their adhesion to the scheme. This is not accurate.

In reality, there are only four guaranteed railways, as the three first-named companies are simply branches of the Central Uruguay Company, and their share and debenture holders' interest is guaranteed by that company, and they have practically the same board of directors. Of the three other companies, one, the North-Western of Uruguay, has not held a meeting. The shareholders of another, the Midland Uruguay, actually refuse to pass the report and accounts solely on account of this Conversion Scheme. The shareholders of the remaining one, the Northern Uruguay, notwithstanding the adhesion of their directors, passed at a special meeting a resolution on conditions. As those conditions cannot be complied with under the law, that resolution falls to the ground. Afterwards, at its general meeting, the matter again came up for discussion, when the shareholders rejected the scheme. Thus we have three of the railways out of four manifestly opposed to this confiscation, and without doubt had the shareholders in the other line been as well informed, they would have adopted a similar course.

In conclusion, it must be clearly understood that under the law of October 7, no other security than that of the 45 per cent. of the customs receipts is available to provide interest on the watered debt and the railway guarantees—I am, Sir, your obedient servant,

Carnival.
Carnival takes place on Sunday and Monday, the 28th and 29th instant, and Tuesday, March 1, and the "burial" on the following Sunday. The Chief of Police has just issued the usual regulations, which differ in no way from those of preceding years.

The throwing of water or any other substance is "completely prohibited," as it was supposed to be last year. Let us hope the police will not, like last year, receive private instructions to let the prohibition remain a mockery, and to permit all sorts of scandalous and degrading scenes. We regret to notice that playing with "pomitos" is still permitted. We think the new Chief of Police would have done well to put a stop to this senseless and offensive amusement.

The use of disguise and masks is completely free, but according to Article 3 it is forbidden to wet the masks or to use "pomitos" during the "corso." This is a prohibition which we have never yet seen enforced, though its non-observance is undoubtedly one of the reasons why respectable people have ceased to take any active part in Carnival, and why one rarely sees a fancy dress worth a second glance.

We have not heard of any arrangements either for a "corso" or for illuminations, and consider it very doubtful if there will be either.

The Baring Estate.

It is really time that the Baring estate should be dealt with in some way, so as to remove an incubus, which at present greatly interferes with the general recovery in the markets and in financial enterprises. I really do not see why the whole state should not be taken over by an assets company. There would be plenty of pickings for such a concern and with moderately good fortune there might be a surplus for the Barings, for we have again the assurance of Mr. Liddell that the position is not so bad as it has been painted. At the meeting of the Union Bank of London on Wednesday Mr. Thomas R. Grant, who presided, explained that he had had an opportunity of an interview with the Governor of the Bank of England on the subject. He had learned his views, and he had Mr. Liddell's authority for communicating them to the proprietors. He would do so in his own words. They were these:—"In spite of the very heavy fall which has taken place in the value of many of the securities held on account of Messrs. Baring Brothers and Co., I believe that in the absence of serious political complications in South America, and with careful management, there is not likely to be any claim upon the guarantors." Continuing, the Chairman said, Mr. Liddell added that in framing his estimate he had assumed the lowest data; that it had been his care not to lean towards too hopeful a view of the case." The statement

was received with applause, which is not unnatural, as the shareholders in the Union Bank no doubt felt relieved at the statement. There is, however, not likely to be any applause on the part of the general public, who have suffered so severely from the Baring collapse, and the least that could be done for them is get the matter out of the way.—"Capel Court Gossip" in S.A. Journal of Jan. 16.

Cricket.
To-morrow there will be a practice match for the Buenos Aires team against the rest of the Club, commencing at 1 p.m. Unfortunately no fewer than four members of the B. A. team are prevented from attending, which is to be regretted, as it would have been advantageous for them to have had at least one chance of playing together before crossing the water. The teams for Sunday will be made up as follows.—B. A. Team, Messrs. Chater, Howson, Hyde, Leng, Moor, Poole, Stanham and 4 others.—The Rest, captained by Mr. W. Penfold, R. N. Messrs. SUNDRIES.

Neither of the Chambers held any sitting on Thursday, but the Senators were convoked for yesterday, and some important proceedings were expected. The *Razon* asserts that the opponents to the Banking Bills are nine in number, or a majority, and names them as Sres. Aguirre, Terra, Berro, Magariños, Torres, Stewart, Carve, Castro and Costa. It is said, however, that at least two of these are doubtful. Anyhow the debate promises to be unusually lively. We shall see—what we shall see.

According to the *Dia* the Penitentiary Council, employed to enquire into the charges against Col. Quinceos, Director of the Penitentiary, ask for his immediate dismissal on the grounds that he is guilty of abuse of authority, ill-treatment of the prisoners, misappropriation of funds, and other serious offences. They recommend Colonel Enrique Pereda in his place. Seeing that charges of misconduct against Col. Quinceos have been continually occurring for eighteen months or more, it is strange that he should have remained in his post so long without a proper enquiry.

"He didn't know it was loaded." A policeman was cleaning his carbine in the barracks on the 6th, and sent a ball through a corporal, who thereupon resigned.—*Rio News*. One of the best reasons for resignation we have heard of for some time.

Amongst the victims of yellow fever in that pest-hole Santos we regret to note the name of Mr. Arthur Fenner Lee, United States vice-consul and son of James Fenner Lee, late U. S. secretary of legation at Rio de Janeiro, aged 22 years.

Australia is threatened with the extinction of the lyre bird. We wish we could extinguish the whole race of liar men and we would stand the birds.

A decree has been issued from the Ministry of Government creating a Judgeship of the Peace in the agricultural colony of Embues de Lavalle, founded by Sr. Francisco Varella in the Dept. of Colonia, and appointing the 13th of March for the election of a Judge.

According to yesterday's telegrams from B. Aires it seems almost settled that Dr. Roque Saenz Peña will resign his candidature to the Presidency if he can be said to resign that which he has never formally accepted—in favour of his son Dr. Luis Saenz Peña, to whom will be transferred the powerful support of the Mitre-Roca coalition as well as that of the National Civic Union. Dr. Luis Peña will thus figure as a coalition candidate for the leading parties.

From February 2nd to 9th inclusive the following number of deaths occurred in Rio Janeiro:—From yellow fever 327; from other fevers 55; from small pox 18; from various causes 309. Total, 707 deaths or over 100 a day!

The eldest brother of the celebrated French composer Massenet has died at Bordeaux. He had been for 15 years the chief of the maritime service of the "Messageries Maritimes" and formerly commanded the "Navarra" and the "Scinde".

The trouble between the United States and Chili having come to a pacific termination, the American fleet sent to these waters awaiting orders to proceed to the West Coast in view of a possible war, is beginning to break up. The "Philadelphia" left for St. Thomas and the "Concord" for the Barbados, on Thursday. We understand that after a short visit to La Plata, the remaining vessels, with perhaps one exception, will leave these waters in the course of a week or two, either for the United States or other destinations. Their loss will be felt by the port purveyors, to whom they brought a welcome access of business.

The Water Pantomime, Venetian fete, swimming contest, and other attractions quite too numerous to mention, will be repeated at the Politeama this evening. The circus

season comes to a conclusion next week, and during Carnival the theatre will be given up to the customary masked balls, more popular than select.

"Wise men hesitate; only fools are certain," remarked a business man to his wife a few evenings ago when she was arguing a point with him. "I don't know about that," she said testily. "Well, I'm certain of it," he replied, so emphatically that she laughed in his face, and there has been wondering ever since what she thought was so funny about it.

Payment of the local estimates for December is proceeding apace, and it is actually hoped to conclude it by the end of the month, then beginning on those for January. This is due, we believe, to the receipt of the land taxes, licences, and other yearly imposts now flowing in. At this rate we shall only be one month in arrears and there is even a possibility of seeing the payments brought up to date. Of course this implies a certain relief, though not much, in the tightness of the situation. The worst of it is, that not a few of those dependent on the Government for payment, perhaps for daily bread, have already discounted the sums due to them at exorbitant rates (we have heard of cases where 50 per cent has been demanded and accepted) so that the only benefit is now being reaped by the usurers and pawnbrokers.

The *Nacion* denies the report that President Herrera intends to ask the Chambers for three months leave of absence, to rest from his arduous labours.

It is said that the Argentine Statesman General Roca will spend Carnival week here. His family are here already.

The wine-growing industry is developing rapidly and promises to become of great importance in the Republic. A new company, with a capital of \$114,000, has just been formed for the production of wine in the "Hilda" vineyard at Dolores Department of Soriano. The partners are Messrs. Remigio G. Moreno, Carlos G. Moreno, Dolfin Viera, and Pablo and Alexandro Halvor Solberg. Perez Brothers and Podesta of Dolores will be charged with the sale of the wines and other produce of the vineyard. We may add that a great number of private proprietors have lately taken to wine-growing on a small scale, finding the results most satisfactory.

Col. Abella, the new Chief of Police, has already shown signs of most commendable activity, which we hope will continue. He has personally inspected the working of the sectional police stations, and has succeeded in unearthing thence a number of policemen who previously shirked duty, so that now there are many more to be seen in the streets on service than formerly. He has also managed to improve their appearance, by what miracle we cannot say, but it is certain that many of the policemen on duty in the centre, instead of the slovenly, slouching appearance they formerly had, now look quite creditable and respectable. He has instructed them to be more civil in their dealings with the people. He has sharpened up the commissaries in their attention to their office. He has issued orders for the police to close all gaming houses, high or low, and to keep a sharp watch on the notorious "casas amuebladas" and to suppress any open offences against public morality. He has already suspended one commissary for abuse of authority (the favourite offence of those officials, whose sweet will has generally been law to them) and contemplates removing and changing others whose proceedings are not satisfactory. And he has petitioned to be allowed more policemen (which might easily be granted by having fewer soldiers). Altogether he has made an excellent start, showing himself everything his predecessor was not, and we hope he will go on as he has begun.

One of the first and most arduous tasks of Col. Abella has been to get the books of the Central Police office in order. It appears that they were left four or five months in arrears.

Mr. Ernest Satow, our esteemed British Minister, came up from quarantine yesterday in the "Magdalena," as also Mrs. Vignoles. The same boat takes home Mr. Milton Prior, correspondent of the *Illustrated London News*.

The *Nacion* has incautiously let the cat out of the bag. In summing up the qualifications of General Garcia, just appointed Chief of the Frontier, it concludes "and he is a personal friend of the President." Now we know the why and the wherefore. Having said thus much it might have omitted the other qualifications as superfluous.

BUENOS AIRES
—On Tuesday, Dr. Donovan, his advocate Dr. Diego Gonzalez, and Dr. Alem attended before the Judge of Crime, Dr. Soneyra, to enable him to effect, if possible, a reconciliation between the parties, in the matter of the prosecution instituted by Dr. Donovan against Dr. Alem, on account of an alleged libel contained in a telegram from Dr. Alem, published in *El Orden*, of Tucuman,

and reproduced by the Buenos Aires newspapers. Dr. Alem said that the first step was to establish the prosecutor's personality in the matter, and, if the proceedings were to be continued, Dr. Donovan must acknowledge his responsibility for the acts alleged by the telegram to have been committed in the Capital on Sunday, the 7th instant, and which, if proved, would convert Dr. Donovan from accuser into accused. If he refused to accept such responsibility the prosecution was at an end, because the police, as an institution, could not be either accuser or accused. Dr. Gonzalez said that the parties were there to attempt a reconciliation and for no other purpose. Dr. Alem repeated that unless Dr. Donovan owned his responsibility for the acts of the police, he had no *locus standi*. "I am going to prove these crimes. If I fail to do so, I go to the Penitentiary. If I prove them I shall ask for Dr. Donovan to be sent there." Dr. Donovan said that he was sorry to disagree with his advocate, but he was convinced that no tribunal in the world would condemn him for what he had done, and therefore he did not hesitate to declare that he assumed all the responsibility for the acts of the police during the elections of February 7th to which the telegram referred. A record of the proceedings was then drawn up and signed by the parties. —It is proposed to make a public demonstration in favour of the candidature for the Presidency of Dr. Luis Saenz Peña. —The Central Committee of the May Avenue has resigned en masse, because the Intendant talked of renewing a portion of the Committee. —The hall of the «Opera Italiana» was filled on Tuesday evening on the occasion of Mr. Melton Prior's lecture on the Soudan Expedition, 556 tickets having been sold. The lecture was very interesting and was well received, the lecturer being frequently interrupted by the applause of the audience. —It has been proposed that the members of the English Literary Society shall present the Rev. J. H. Gifford-Spilsbury, who has twice held the office of President of the Society, with his portrait and an address, as a recognition of his «valuable services to the Society» during many years and as an «expression of their good wishes for his success in his new sphere of labour.» —The Government has ordered the site of the Argentine Hippodrome to be conveyed to the Jockey Club, to be held as its property so long as it is used as a race-course. —B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES

TUESDAY, JANUARY 19. It is officially announced that the Queen had intended and even settled to attend the funeral of the Duke of Clarence to-morrow, and only yielded, most unwillingly, to the Prince and Princess of Wales's reiterated entreaties that she would not expose herself to the risk of catching cold on the journey to and from Windsor in this uncertain weather. Her Majesty, it is added, though deeply grieved, is well. Ten Royal Princes and their suites, in full uniform, will travel from London for the purpose of attending the service in St. George's Chapel. Under the presidency of the Lord Mayor, a special meeting of the Dublin Corporation was held yesterday at which a vote of condolence with the Queen and Royal Family upon the death of the Duke of Clarence was unanimously passed. A largely-attended meeting was held yesterday in the Memorial Hall, Farringdon-street, in opposition to the draft charter of the proposed Albert University. Mr. G.S. Soudnell presided, and among the speakers were Mr. Lyul, Mr. Stanley, Mr. Osborne Morgan, Mr. P., Mr. Stuart, Mr. P., Mr. Eiton, M.P., and Mr. Carvell Williams. Three resolutions embodying the objections to the charter as being against the recommendations of the Royal Commission of 1888, and as practically contravening the University Tests Act, were carried unanimously. One of the resolutions called upon Parliament to exercise its veto, with a view to further inquiry. A committee was appointed to take the necessary steps to that end. Resolutions were passed by the Executive and Radical Union yesterday dealing with the subject of public meetings at the World's-end, Chelsea. Pecuniary aid will be rendered by that body to enable the legal questions that are involved to be satisfactorily raised in the Queen's Bench Division, and a deputation to the Home Secretary will be organised, to be composed of representatives of all bodies interested in the maintenance of the right of open-air meeting in London. Yesterday the Bermondsey Public Library at Spa-road was formally opened by Sir John Lubbock, M.P., in the presence of several local supporters of the Free Library movement. The building and site cost 10,000, and a further sum of 1,600, has already been expended in providing books. Yesterday the Khedive held his first grand reception at the Abdin Palace in Cairo. The Ministers took the opportunity to place their resignations in the hands of the new ruler. The Khedive, however, in a short speech requested them to retain their portfolios and to continue to

him the valuable services they had rendered to his father. A Bill is being prepared by the German Government, with the object of placing restrictions upon emigration. The provisions of the projected measure are not yet known, but it will probably be framed on the pattern of similar legislation in Switzerland. A special object will be to check the efforts of emigration agents, who induce poor people to leave the country, regardless of their responsibilities at home or their chances of improving their condition abroad. Percy Courtenay, of Lewisham, was brought up at Bow-street Police-court yesterday, charged with having assaulted his wife, known professionally as Marie Lloyd. Mr. Lushington bound over the defendant in the sum of 25l. to keep the peace towards his wife for six months. Four of the men who are alleged to have been concerned in the illicit distillation of spirits at 217, Abbey-street, Bermondsey, were yesterday discharged by the magistrate sitting at the Southwark Police-court. In the case of the other two defendants—George E. Cheeseman and John Millarish—remands were granted. Mr. Alpe, who appeared for the Inland Revenue authorities, said that according to his instructions penalties amounting to nearly 4,500l. had been incurred. Charles W. Perryman, proprietor of a financial newspaper, surrendered at the Central Criminal Court yesterday, upon an indictment charging him with having published defamatory libels concerning Anthony Pulbrook, a City solicitor. Evidence having been given for the prosecution, Mr. Cock, Q.C., addressed the jury for the defence, after which the hearing was adjourned. Pulpit references to the death were very generally made in London and throughout the country yesterday. Arrangements have been made for the requiem and funeral of the late Cardinal Manning to take place on Thursday—the former at the Brompton Oratory, the latter at the Catholic Cemetery, Kensal Green. It is estimated that fifty thousand persons witnessed the lying-in-state of the body at the Archbishop's House, Westminster yesterday. Suitable references were made from the pulpits of Roman Catholic places of worship. In spite of the frost there was considerable football on Saturday. The interest was almost concentrated in the English Cup competition, which embraced the first round of sixteen matches. All the southern clubs were beaten. Many protests were the outcome of the frostbound fields, while in two games the scores were equal. A Berlin Correspondent gives the chief provisions of the Bill now before the Reichstag dealing with public drunkenness in Germany. The measure prohibits the sale of spirits to youths under sixteen, persons already intoxicated, and persons who have been in prison for drunkenness within three years of the date. It provides for the appointment of guardians to persons incapable through drink of conducting their affairs, and gives guardians so appointed power to place such persons in asylums. Severe penalties are proposed. The Bill is certain to be strongly opposed, as it is regarded as dangerous to personal liberty, and as placing too much power in the hands of the police. The Khedive arrived at Alexandria early on Saturday, and was received with the firing of guns from the forts and from the British ships in the harbour. After a hurried reception he left for Cairo, where he was met by the Consuls-General, the officers of the British and Egyptian armies, and the various Government officials. At the Abdin Palace, where the Ministers awaited him, the letter from the Sultan appointing him Khedive was read, the bands present afterwards playing the Turkish and Egyptian hymns. At a coroner's inquest held at Green Lanes on Saturday concerning the deaths of the three persons found poisoned at Bowes Park on Monday last, the jury returned a verdict that Alice and Sidney Wear were murdered by Francis Wear, who afterwards committed suicide, and that the cause of the act was financial difficulty. What is known as the Pall Mall outrage was disposed of at the Central Criminal Court on Saturday. As the defendant, Samuel G. White, a retired army surgeon, was certified to be of unsound mind, the prosecutor, Miss Maude Ridley withdrew the charge, and the accused left the dock. He was taken charge of by persons who were in waiting to receive him. Sentence of nine years' penal servitude was passed on Saturday at the Central Criminal Court upon Charles A. Byner, a physician, who was found guilty of having forged and uttered deeds of transfer and warrants for the payment of dividends on Messrs. Courage and Co. and other companies. In passing sentence, Mr. Justice Cave said the prisoner had endeavoured to shield himself at the expense of an innocent person, and looking at the history of what he had been doing since February he had certainly been as hypocritical as he had been wicked. 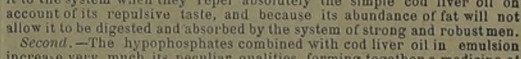
