W. E. GLADSTONE.

Born Dec. 29, 1809; Died May 18, 1898.

A brief afternoon telegram announces that the prolonged illness of Mr. W. E. Gladstone has had the expected end, and that he died yesterday morning. We are not yet in possession of particulars.

The death of Mr. Gladstone means not only the loss of one of the five or six greatest Englishmen of the century, but also of one of the few, very few, remaining members of the brilliant galaxy of political, scientific and literary geniuses who were born in the first quarter of the century and who contributed to form what will be known in all history as the Victorian Era. Mr. Gladstone had outlived almost all his contemporaries, and may be regarded as the last but one of a race of intellectual giants—the other being Mr. Herbert Spencer, who was born in 1820.

To describe Mr. Gladstone's political career would be to rewrite the political history of the Victorian reign—in fact he first entered Parliament in 1832, five years before Queen Victoria's accession—and we shall not attempt to condense in a column that which requires volumes. Suffice it to say that he has been associated with the principal liberal reforms of the reign, and that his fame has been established not in England only, but throughout the civilised world as one of the greatest statesmen of the century. Indeed it may be doubted if any other English statesman of the century, except his great rival Lord Beaconsfield, has enjoyed such an extraordinary popularity on the Continent, where he has always been regarded as the incarnation and great champion of liberal and progressive principles. But it was not alone as a statesman that he shone. He was a grand orator, exceptional financier, brilliant man of letters, and a philanthropist. His energy was as indomitable as his intellect and gifts were exceptional, and there was hardly a department of public life in which he did not achieve high distinction. In addition to this, two other remarkable facts stand out in connection with him, his great personal magnetism, and the almost saint-like purity of his life both as public and private man. Throughout a long and chequered career, he not merely kept his name unsullied, but has left it as a model of public and private virtue, blameless in every respect. His life was almost an ideal one—in many respects resembling that of Tennyson, the great poet who was born in the same year—he outlived petty jealousies and party hatreds, and has sunk in his rest, full of years and honors, amid the mourning of the nation to whose welfare and progress he devoted his talents. He was a great—a very great—Englishman, and we do not hesitate to say that the whole nation, forgetting all political differences, will be mourners at his grave.

Mr. Gladstone's career has been too long and important for us to attempt even to summarise it, but we give below a few of the principal dates and events.

He was born at Liverpool Dec. 29, 1809; fourth son of Sir John Gladstone of Fasque, Kincardineshire, Scotland; a Liverpool merchant. The family was of distinguished Scotch origin.

Educated at Eton and Christ Church, Oxford. Entered Parliament as Conservative M.P. for Newark, 1832. Made Junior Lord of the Treasury by Sir Robert Peel, 1834. Under Secretary for Colonies, 1835. Married Miss Catherine Glynn of Hawarden, 1839 (His wife survives him and is a very distinguished lady.) President of the Board of Trade, 1841-45. Colonial Secretary 1846. Visited Naples, 1850, about which period he became converted to Liberalism. Chancellor of the Exchequer under Lord Aberdeen, 1852, and again under Lord Palmerston, 1859. Repealed the paper duty, 1861. Leader of the Commons in Lord Derby's administration, 1866. Prime Minister Feb. to Nov. 1868. Premier 1869-74 (when Disestablishment of the Irish Church, Irish Land Act, Abolition of Purchase and of University Tests, Ballot Act and other very important reforms were passed.) Premier for second time 1880 (third Reform Act, Employer's Liability Act, etc.) Premier and 1st Lord of the Treasury, 1886. Golden wedding, 1889. Premier for the fourth time 1892. Retired from public life, after the defeat of the Home Rule Bill, 1894. He is the author of a long list of works, some purely literary, but mostly of a political and controversial character.

POLITICAL NOTES.

There is nothing new of importance about the alleged conspiracy, and matters are once more quiet. A great number of persons have visited Sr. Cuestas in order to congratulate him on the failure of the attempt. The general opinion, however, is that the alarm has been exaggerated and that there was nothing sufficiently serious to warrant the precautionary measures taken by the Government. This idea is reflected in yesterday's *Siglo*, which points out that a certain amount of conspiracy may naturally be expected from the "collectivists" until they are finally dissolved, for it may be said that conspiracy against public order and welfare is their natural condition, but the Government will act unwisely if, at every announcement of this description, it has recourse to measures of precaution that only serve to alarm the people, and to violent changes and to arrests. To do this only gives the "collectivists" a greater importance than they merit. Left alone they are harmless so long as they are kept out of posts of trust, and it is bad policy to persecute them during an electoral period, for that will give them an excuse for challenging the liberty of the elections, as in fact, they are already trying to do. Let them alone, until they are convinced of their own impotence and cease from trying to disturb public order.

Various military and possibly also some administrative changes, tending to the elimination of the elements antipathetic to General Garcia and Estevan, are expected to take place as a result of the affair, but none of them can yet be announced definitely. Sr. Julio de Medina has resigned as Secretary of the Staff Office, also Colonel Mairet, Quintana and B. Vila and Major J. T. Iribar as members of that office. These were all appointments made by General Garcia. A rumor that Dr. Mendoza would resign the portfolio of Finance is authoritatively denied by the *Dia*. Rumors are again circulating of the resignation of General G. Castro as Minister of War, but probably have as little foundation as on previous occasions.

Publication has been made of a circular letter issued by the Committee of the Nationalist (blanco) party to the Departmental Sub-Committees warning them against subversive movements on the part of the deposed collectivity, who, deprived of their positions and animated by a spirit of revenge, will not be deterred by any patriotic motives from conspiring to overthrow the present situation. Members of the party are therefore asked to be on their guard against any such movement, and the Departmental Committees are requested to report all such movements to headquarters in order that the attitude of the party may be decided. The circular shows the nationalist party to be strongly in favor of the present situation and Government, and its publication has produced an excellent impression.

The Executive has just forwarded three Messages to the Council of State, which have been passed on to the corresponding Committees. The first conveys the Budget for 1898-99, particulars of which should appear shortly. The second Message asks for authority to reappoint the three retiring Directors of the Bank of the Republic, Sres. Echegaray, F. Capurro and D. Pons. The third presents the administrative accounts for the year 1896-77.

The Report has been published of the Legislative Committee of the Council of State on the Reformed Electoral Law. The Law as recommended by the Committee is substantially the same as was approved by the late Chambers shortly before their dissolution, with a few amendments of secondary importance introduced by Dr. Arcechaga. It will probably be discussed next week.

The Executive has promulgated the recently sanctioned Law relative to the cession of Property. The object of this is to revoke the Law of July 15, 1895, and restore the procedures of the Civil Code in the matter referred to.

The Department of Live Stock and Agriculture has applied to the Government for the removal of the duties at present imposed on the importation of seed wheat, as also of duty on seeds imported for purposes of experimental cultivation. Such an application recommends itself.

Death of Mr. James Dodds, of Buenos Aires.

"After a long and painful illness, borne with great fortitude, Mr. James Dodds breathed his last on Monday morning. In moving down this venerable and well-known gentleman, death has removed one of the most prominent members of the Scotch community, and possibly the oldest. We may say that Mr. Dodds was identified with the growth of the Scotch community. He came to this country as far back as the year 1844, at the age of 21, to the late Mr. Geo. Bell, whose estancia at Magdalena he managed. Later on he took over the management of the Viadmonte estate, and subsequently settled in Chascomus, where he purchased the beautiful Adela Estancia, that at one time belonged, we believe, to the tyrant Rosas. Mr. Dodds built a chapel in Chascomus in 1872, under the auspices of the Rev. Martin P. Ferguson. The origin of the Scotch Chapel at Chascomus arose when service was held in 1854 by Rev. James Smith on Mr. Dodds's estancia. Some time later, a cottage was built which served for a chapel during 14 years, and here service was held by the Rev. James Smith and Dr. Francis Gabbie, until the present chapel had been erected.

Mr. Dodds took a lively interest in every expression of Scotch vitality. His name is identified with the Church and the School, and he was president of the St. Andrew's Society. Esteemed and beloved by all, he has passed away ripe in years and with the consciousness of having done much good for his countrymen. He was a native of Berwickshire. He wrote the annals of the St. Andrew's Scotch School, and subsequently "The Scottish Settlers of the Plate," an important work which we reviewed at the time. His loss will long be felt, and his memory enshrined in the hearts of the community.—*B. A. Standard*.

THE WAR.

We stand *in statu quo* so far as definite war news is concerned. The American and Spanish fleets are still dodging about the West Indies, and it is waste of time to repeat the perpetual contradictions of the telegrams as to their exact whereabouts. We suppose they will meet some day. These news seem to be an idea that the greater part or all of the Spanish reserve

fleet, which was generally supposed to be still in Spanish waters, is near the West Indies, and that Admiral Cervera is waiting for it to join him before seeking combat.

We are not surprised to learn from Washington that the U. S. Government has been discussing the advisability of imposing a censorship on the press, to prevent the publication of false or premature news prejudicial to national interests. The discussion, it is said, was specially provoked by certain publications of the *New York World* and the *Journal*—the two leaders in what is known as "gutter journalism." It would be no loss to civilization if they were suppressed altogether, for these and similar "gutter" journals have not only long been an utter discredit to American journalism and civilization, but a positive public danger, and the protest against their unscrupulous methods has become very general, and is not confined to the United States. These papers have had a great share in provoking the war, and before now have given rise to serious international complications.

There is still no news of the intended invasion of Cuba, and there also seems to have been delay in sending reinforcements to Admiral Dewey at Manila. General Wesley Merritt, who was appointed to conduct the military operations in the Philippines, has insisted on being accompanied by a sufficient force of veterans and trained soldiers, not having sufficient confidence in the militia and volunteers.

The telegrams have an incoherent story about the explosion of a torpedo at Cardenas, killing 18 persons. Spaniards according to one version, N. Americans according to another. Some say it happened on shore, others that it was an U. S. vessel blown up. Yet another version has it that it was merely a decoy vessel, filled with old iron, stones and other (sic) explosives sent out by the Spanish, which the Americans fired upon and sank. Our readers may make what sense of this they can; we give it up.

The cable to Santa Lucia, which was cut by Admiral Cervera, has been repaired.

The Archbishop at Manila has issued a proclamation worthy to stand by that of the Governor who called the Americans "the scum of the earth." He exclaims, "Christians! Defend your faith against the heretics who have raised an impossible barrier to the immortality of the soul, who enslave the people and rob the cemeteries of their crosses, who forbid the priests to celebrate baptisms, marriages and funerals, to console the afflicted and to absolve sinners!" We shall next expect to hear that the war is one of religions as well as of races.

It is stated that Sr. Sagasta has succeeded in forming a new Cabinet, but as there is still doubt about the names we do not repeat them. Another version is that he will not form a Cabinet until he can do so on the basis of a great Spanish victory. He may have to wait a long time.

The U. S. Squadron has been warned to look out for some large Spanish steamers which are said to have left with coal for Admiral Cervera's squadron.

SUNDRIES.

The passengers by the P. S. N. Co's "Oravia," which arrived last Sunday, have been put into eight days' quarantine at Flores Island, for some reason best known to the Health Authorities, and consequently will not land until Monday next. For this reason the Rev. Mr. Small will not be able to officiate at Holy Trinity Church on Sunday next.

The R. M. S. "Nilas" is expected to-morrow morning bringing London dates to about April 30.

The "Divisions of the Clergy" is one of the subjects of the first number of *The Church Gazette*. The hunting parson, it says, is not quite extinct yet, for there is a Rural Dean who keeps three hunters, and a well-known High Churchman indulges occasionally in "going straight," but at a distance of 100 miles or so from his parish. Our Archbishops own to being fond of recreation. His Grace of Canterbury likes "light literature"; the Archbishop of York prefers riding and walking; the Primate of All Ireland owns to a weakness for conversation. The Bishop of Bath and Wells states that when in Australia he was given to boating and swimming, but now cycles. Cycling is a sport shared in by the Bishops of Carlisle, Ripon, and Stepney. The last-mentioned Prelate likes "elves" also. Photographic has a votary in the Bishop of Limerick, and golf in his Lordship of Bangor. The Bishop of Aberdeen, one fears, has had rather a joyless winter, for his favorite pastime is curling. Quite a number take their pleasure in more

or less scientific ways. Dr. Michelson studies conchology and geology, while the Bishops of Southwark and Hereford have a weakness for gardening. The Bishop of Truro collects old books and engravings, and his brother of Southwell is a numismatist. Dr. Alford writes *precis* and shorthand—not to most people an ideal amusement, but still more pleasing than the Bishop of Oxford's favourite amusements, which are "making out pedigrees and correcting proof sheets." Dr. Perowne of Worcester owns to a liking for croquet—possibly a reminiscence of his curate days.

There will be afternoon and evening performances at the Solis Theatre to-day, at both of which will be performed the melodrama "El Soldado de San Marcial."

The telegrams are allowing the excitement caused by Mr. Chamberlain's speech to die down. In the Commons, on Tuesday night, Mr. Balfour declared that the Government had nothing to say respecting Mr. Chamberlain's declarations, and in the Lords, Lord Salisbury said that he had not even read them! As we expected, Mr. Chamberlain was, not for the first time, speaking for himself, not for his Cabinet colleagues.

We had hoped to have published the programme of the forthcoming Concert of the Entertainment Society today, but owing to some changes in the numbers are obliged to reserve it for our next. That need not prevent our readers from securing their tickets.

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 20.

The Conference Committee of the United States Senate and House of Representatives at ten minutes past one yesterday morning finally agreed to the Cuban resolutions as passed by the Senate, striking out, however, the Turpie amendment recognizing the Cuban Republic. The Conference report was adopted in the Senate by 43 votes to 35, and in the Lower House by 310 votes to 16. The resolutions as passed by both Houses declare that the Cubans are and ought to be free; demand the withdrawal of Spain from Cuba; direct the President to use the Army and Navy to carry the resolution into effect; and disclaim any intention on the part of the United States to exercise control in Cuba.

At New York the imminence of war causes little excitement. Positive action, of whatever kind, is hailed as a relief, and it is believed that the conflict will be short, and cause little bloodshed. While there are many opinions as to the wisdom of Congress, there is, a Correspondent says, an absolutely unanimous desire to support the Government, and when war is declared the President will have the whole nation behind him.

The United States Government have virtually completed their preparations for war. The Army has been mobilised and troops are already on the march to the coasts. A Bill has been submitted to Congress increasing the army to 200,000 men, and declaring that all able-bodied males between the ages of 18 and 45 are to constitute the national forces. The War Department's first call, it is expected, will be for 80,000 men. In New York recruiting offices have been opened in tents in the public parks, and volunteers are offering themselves in large numbers for service against Spain. A telegram from Madrid states that all the important military posts in the country are being fortified and defended by lines of torpedoes.

To-day the Cortes meet at Madrid, and Queen Christina will deliver in person the Speech from the Throne. According to a newspaper forecast her Majesty will appeal to the nation to assist the Throne and the Government, in defending the honour and integrity of the country. Señor Gullon, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, has addressed to the Spanish representatives abroad for presentation to the various Governments, a memorandum stating the Spanish grievances against the United States, which Power, he declares, will be solely responsible for war should it take place.

There was a morning sitting of the House of Commons yesterday, which was devoted to a discussion on the Vaccination Bill, the second reading of which was moved by Mr. Chaplin. The measure was still under consideration when the adjournment was reached. Prior to the debate Mr. Balfour made a statement as to British diplomatic action taken at Washington and Madrid in the dispute which had arisen between Spain and the United States. A statement was also made by the Leader of the House as to the proposed course of business. At the evening sitting Mr. Lloyd George's motion in favour of Universal Board Schools was rejected by 183 votes to 101—a majority of 82.

Primrose Day was observed yesterday in the customary manner. The statue of Lord Beaconsfield in Parliament square was decorated with floral tributes.

Amongst the latest contributors to the Nellie Farrer Fund is the Prince of Wales, who has sent a cheque for 25l. The total sum realised is over 7,260l.

A terrible disaster occurred at Whitwick Colliery, Leicestershire, early yesterday morning, by which it is feared no less than thirty five lives have been lost. About three o'clock in the morning a gob fire was discovered in the pit. The flames spread with great rapidity, destroying the supports in the workings. Only five men out of forty managed to make their escape, and these experienced great difficulty in making their way to the bottom of the shaft.

Under appointment by the Judges of the High Court Mr. Mansell Jones sat at the Chelsea Town Hall yesterday to hear the petition presented against the return of Mr. E. J. Horniman and Mr. J. Jeffrey, Progressives to the London County Council, at the recent election in Chelsea. The allegation was that the candidates had been guilty of corrupt practices, the petition being based upon the fact that an entertainment was given to local Liberals by the father of Mr. E. J. Horniman. For the respondents, Mr. Asquith, Q.C., contended that agency had not been proved. The hearing was adjourned.

Progress was made by the Westminster Coroner yesterday with his inquiry into the circumstances attending the death of Mrs. Uzielli, the wife of a stockbroker, living at Buckingham-gate, Dr. Collins, who attended the deceased lady in her last illness, tendered himself as a witness. There was, he declared, not the slightest concealment about his treatment, and the operation he performed became absolutely imperative. The inquiry was again adjourned.

THURSDAY, APRIL 21.

An Ultimatum has been sent to Spain, and a reply is due at Washington on or before Saturday. The Spanish Minister yesterday demanded his passports, and has left Washington. A Correspondent telegraphs that the President's plan is first to send relief to the Reconcentrados at Havana, in the hope that the Spaniards will not open the attack. It is officially announced that the United States will not resort to privateering in case of war.

A brilliant and impressive scene marked the opening of the Spanish Cortes yesterday. The hall of the Senate, in which the ceremony took place, was densely crowded, many ladies being present and the Diplomatic Body attending in full dress. On her arrival Queen Christina was received with fervid enthusiasm. Her Majesty remained sitting while she read the opening speech, having the young king beside her on the throne, and Señor Sagasta, the Premier, standing near. The speech places all responsibility for the present crisis on "part of the people of the United States," who it says, fearing that autonomous government in Cuba might defeat their schemes against Spanish sovereignty, delayed the suppression of the troubles in the island. Should the Government at Washington blindly follow this current, threats and insults hitherto regarded by Spain with indifference would become intolerable, and compel the Queen's Government to break off relations with the United States. The Queen Regent refers in terms of gratitude to the mediatory action of the Pope and of the Powers, which has strengthened her belief in the righteousness of the Spanish cause. The Speech from the Throne concludes with an expression of the Queen's confidence that should all the efforts to preserve peace prove unavailing, the Spanish people will stand together to defend the King's Throne and the honour and integrity of the country. It is believed Spain will in the end triumphantly pass through the crisis which it is sought to bring upon her.

A telegram from Shanghai states that the Viceroy of Nanking, Wuchang, Foochow, and Canton have agreed to support each other should the Peking Government seek to impose measures calculated to restrict their powers, or to add to foreign influence in Chinese affairs. Among claims put forward by them is one to revise any restrictions having reference to important matters affecting internal administration. This is thought to aim at the foreign control of the likin duties.

Amongst those who attended the Easter Banquet at the Mansion House last night were the Duke of Cambridge and the American Ambassador. Responding to the toast of the Ambassadors and

Foreign Ministers, the latter spoke of the goodwill which had long existed between Great Britain and the United States. The two nations were joint ministers in the same sacred mission of liberty and progress; and were charged with duties which they could not evade by the imposition of irresistible hands. They were bound to a sort of partnership in the beneficent work of the world.

Yesterday's sitting of the House of Commons was occupied mainly by a discussion of the Corn Sales Bill, the second reading of which was moved by Mr. Rankin. The object of the measure was to establish a standard weight for the sale of corn. Authorities were divided as to the practicability and utility of the suggestion, and the second reading was, on a division, rejected by a majority of 74. The Land Tenure (Wales and Monmouth) Bill was under discussion when the House adjourned.

Mr. Alfred Cock, Q. C., who was a native of Shrewsbury, died yesterday at the residence his brother, Mr. James Cock.
