THE PUBLIC DEBT OF URUGUAY.

The *Telegrafo Marítimo* of Tuesday evening publishes an interesting, and at the same time appalling, analytical statement of the growth of the Public Debt of the Republic during the last four administrations. For the benefit of our readers, we present it in the following condensed form.

Administration of Máximo Santos, 1885-1886.—Amount of Debt on January 25 1885 \$55,736,917. —Emitted: 1885 Internal Debt \$1,775,531. Unified Debt \$468,991. —1896 Internal Debt, \$13,812,130; Unified Debt, \$4,485,624. —Total Emitted, \$18,297,755. —Debt amortised 1885-86 (including Internal Debt presented for unification) \$4,471,475. —Increase of indebtedness \$16,468,804. —Amount of Debt on Dec. 31, 1886, \$72,255,721.

Administration of Máximo Tajes, 1887-89.—Emitted: 1887, Internal Debt, \$433,653;—1888, Internal Debt, \$1,572,270; External Debt, \$9,999,900;—1889, Internal Debt, \$3,843,343;—Total emitted, \$25,749,177. —Debt amortised 1887-89, \$16,075,146. —Increase of indebtedness, \$9,074,030. —Amount of Debt on Dec. 31, 1889, \$9,074,030. (During this administration was created the Debt of Conversion and Public Works, in which were consolidated various existing Internal Debts at an increase in the total amount of \$7,962,772.)

Administration of Dr. Julio Herrera y Obes, 1890-93.—Emitted: 1890 Internal Debt, \$1,298,163; External Debt, \$1,400,000;—1891, Internal Debt, \$86,182;—1892, Internal Debt, \$1,041,994; External Debt, \$90,561,950. —Total Emitted, \$113,888,289. —Debt amortised, 1890-93, \$91,084,002 (this statement includes the Consolidation of the foreign Debt and unification of the Internal Debt at an increase of \$2,771,976). —Increase of indebtedness, \$22,804,286. —Amount of Debt on Dec. 31, 1893, \$103,584,039.

Administration of Juan Idiarte Borda, 1894-1897.—Emitted: 1894, International Debt, \$3,500,000;—1896, Internal Debt, \$2,663,193; External Debt, \$13,662,950;—1897, Internal Debt, \$1,000,000;—Total Emitted \$23,766,149. —Debt amortised, 1894-97, \$6,005,000. —Increase of indebtedness, \$17,761,149. —Amount of Debt on Dec. 31, 1897, \$120,765,097. (This statement does not include the floating debt left on account of unconverted Treasury Certificates, nor the unpaid claims resulting from the civil war. These are now being formalised by the present administration, and will signify an increase to the public debt of about \$7,500,000, bringing the total debt created by the Borda administration up to the tremendous figure of about \$21,700,000.)

Summary.—Total Debt emitted in 13 years, \$133,863,894. —Debt amortised, \$118,885,714. —Increase of indebtedness, \$65,028,179 or say an average of over \$5,000,000 the year.

The eloquence of the above figures is overpowering, irresistible. They show beyond the possibility of all argument or reply what has been the cost to the country of the four most characteristic "collectivist" administrations. Under 13 successive years of these, the Public Debt of the country has been more than doubled; it has

been raised from \$55,700,000 to \$120,700,000, an increase of \$65,000,000; and for this sum of money, enormous in relation to the size and population of the country, there is next to nothing to show in the way of public works, of increased population, of colonies, of development of its resources, of expansion of commerce. During the greater part of the period the country has barely vegetated; in some respects it may even be said that it has retrograded, for in relation to the population the general wealth and the commercial movement are less per head than they were 13 years ago, whilst the burdens of indebtedness and taxation are much greater. The country has to bear all the burden of this vast debt without having received any appreciable benefit from the money, nine-tenths of which has been wasted in administrative extravagances, in plundering of officials, in exaggerated military expenditure, in monstrous legislative and administrative salaries, in favoritism and nepotism, in "commissions," in unjustifiable pensions, in untidy jobs, in open corruption, and in a hundred other means devised for enriching the few at the expense of the many. If a Commission were appointed with instructions to report truthfully and unreservedly on the manner in which this 65 millions of dollars has been employed, putting on side the amount applied to legitimate public purposes and genuine necessities, and on the other the amount pilfered or wasted, the report would probably be one of the most startling ever given to publicity in any part of the world. Moreover, it must be remembered that whilst this Debt was being accumulated, the Governments responsible for it were also engaged in spending a revenue beyond the resources of the country and which could only be raised by excessive taxation that was and is inimical to its development.

Even if there were no other sins to be laid to their charge and as it happens there are great ones—the above statement affords the most complete condemnation of the "collectivist" administrations of Santos-Tajes-Herrera-Borda that it is possible to write. Governments which cost the country so much, doing next to nothing for its material progress, demoralising and corrupting it politically and administratively, and finally leaving it in a state of anarchy, discredit, and civil war, can only be described as pernicious. They are worse than locusts, plague, famine or earthquake, for these at give some chance of recovery after they have passed and do not mortgage the future as well as devastate the present. We can hardly imagine any natural catastrophe which would leave the country with such a burden to fight against as the legacy bequeathed by the "collectivists."

In the face of such figures as those, it would be inconceivable, did we not know it to be true, that they were any Uruguayans so lost to all sense of patriotism and public morality, so absorbed by selfish or partisan motives, as to desire the restoration of the "collectivist" regime and to obstruct the reformatory policy of the present Government, imperfect though it may be. Such a proposition seems to us monstrous, so criminal, that we hardly know in what terms to speak of it, and can only place its existence on record as a sign of extreme and inexplicable moral aberration.

Before quitting the subject of the public Debt, there is one peculiarity connected with it worth pointing out which we have not yet seen noticed, and this is as follows. Although the amount of the debt is the high figure of \$120,765,000, on which interest has to be paid at various rates, the whole amount could be redeemed at the present moment for about 45% of the sum, say roughly \$54,400,000. This is owing to the fact that the foreign Debt and most of the internal Debts are redeemable, not at par, but by purchase at the current market price, which may be taken at an average of 45%. If, therefore, a sudden operation of redemption were possible, it would not require such a vast amount to carry it out, though, of course, the knowledge that it was contemplated would at once greatly appreciate the quotation. This may be consolatory from one point of view, though hardly flattering to the credit of the country. Another peculiarity is, that the more the country recovers its credit, the more difficult will it be for it to redeem its debt, as the market price will be the higher. This anomaly will always offer a dangerous temptation to the Governments to keep the public credit down in order that redemption may take place more quickly. This is worth thinking over.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law creating the Treasury Certificates Debt. As our space is otherwise occupied to day, we reserve translation for another opportunity.

Attention is now directed towards the frontier at Rivera, which would seem to be the scene of "collectivist" agitation. According to a telegram thence published in yesterday afternoon's *Razon*, the existence is known of a body of 60 or 70 armed men on the Brazilian side of the frontier, commanded by an officer suspected to be the ex-major Isasmendi. The same informant states that to-day (Thursday) is fixed for the commencement of their operations, which will be in connection with rising of the "collectivists" in other parts of the Republic. This may be taken *cum grano salis*, but it seems undoubted that there is something on foot in that district, and the Government is taking measures accordingly, one of which will be to increase the local Urban battalions. As regards Rivera, the Government forces, including the mobilised frontier regiment and the police number some 600 men, so that, provided they are faithful, no great fears are entertained. The *Razon* adds that the Government has received corroboration of its telegram, but does not attach serious importance to the matter, even if the invasion is attempted. The Brazilian authorities will be asked at once to disarm any suspicious groups. The Com. Calleros who was arrested by them a few days ago, has already been released, and he seems to be mixed up in the matter, as also two or three minor officers. Generals Estevan (of course) and Simon Martinez are spokesmen of the organisers and military leaders. In Melo a packet was picked up in the street containing "colorado" hat ribbons with the inscription "2a. Cruzada Libertadora—Viva la Revolucion." If popular opinion were asked, we think it would be more likely to call it "Cruzada Esclavadora" for the object is to place the country once more under the disastrous and oppressive yoke of the "collectivists," to enslave it, not to liberate it.

The Insurance Tax in Argentina.

The cable has brought out news that cannot fail to exercise opinion a good deal, since with the Budget coming on for discussion, the tax upon Insurance Companies will be brought boldly on the tapis. A telegram from London announces that the resolution of the Argentine Budget Committee to upset Dr. Escalante's proposal of equal tax for native and foreign insurance companies, has caused a very bad impression, and that the *Financial News* takes up the matter in the light of diplomatic representation being necessary to induce the Government to influence Congress towards a more just and honourable policy. We have little doubt most of the leading English organs will write in the same strain. Undoubtedly, if Congress adopt the line laid down by the Committee, the result will be a dire blow to Argentine credit, as portrayed by the *Financial News*. And it would be only prudence on the part of Congress to weigh reasons very carefully before casting the die. The matter stands thus. When the Foreign Insurance companies were between the devil and the deep sea over the "Forced Loan," last year, they arrived at a *modus vivendi* with the Executive under which they took up Treasury bills instead of the loan and these afterwards they converted for bonds of the Patriotic Loan, but on the understanding that the taxation for native and foreign companies would be made equal. There could, of course, be no understanding, but it was a distinct understanding and naturally the companies expect the Executive to act up to the spirit of the unwritten bond. The proposal, therefore, to levy 8% on foreign companies and only 1% on native companies is a moral breach of agreement. There is no reason why there should be a differential rate established unless the aim is to make war on Foreign Capital, and this we can hardly credit. It would have a terribly bad effect at this particular moment, when there is a move to redress the false theories and principles in vogue since 1896 and, though Congress is only too likely to resent any interference from home or pressure from abroad it is only too necessary that such extremists should be put out of court by maintaining a just balance for all.—*B. A. Standard.*

SUNDRIES.

—The great event of this evening for our readers here will be the production of "Charles's Aunt" at the San Felipe Theatre by the amateurs of the Entertainment Society. We have no doubt there will be a large and brilliant audience, the production having aroused great interest. We may mention that the music will be an important feature of the Entertainment. Mr. G. R. Schwarz has organised an excellent orchestra of some 14 or 20 players, which will be directed by Sr. Formentini. The pieces to be played will be as follows:—1. March, "Jeannette," G. E. Still.—2. a. Serenade, Van Wert.—3. a. Piccadilly, R. Eilenberg.—3. a. "Colombe," C. Gounod.—4. Waltz, "Flirtation." As the comedy itself is rather short, the music will fill up the evening very agreeably. Those who have not yet secured their seats should lose no time, as there are not many left.

—We call attention to announce ment of the Spring Lawn Tennis Tournament, which will take place on November 1st (holiday) entries closing on the 28th instant.

—The R.M.S. "Magdalena" is expected to-morrow afternoon or Saturday morning, bringing London dates to about the 1st instant, and will sail homeward bound on the 29th instant.

—The funeral of General Perez yesterday morning was an imposing affair. All the garrison regiments attended to perform military honors, and there were also present the Ministers, most of the members of the Council of State, the Judges, and many other civil and military notabilities. As the cortege passed the "President's" house, Sr. Cuestas appeared on the balcony to salute it. The only funeral oration was pronounced by Sr. Gabriel Terra, who had the good taste to avoid political allusions.

—The Theatres will resume activity this evening. At the Cibis the Forlet French Company will present "Madame Mongolito," and at the Solis the event will be the debut of Sr. Buron's Spanish Dramatic Company, which has just completed a successful season in Buenos Aires. The artists of this Company arrived yesterday, and come accompanied with an unusually complete equipment of scenery, costumes, and properties for the pieces in their repertoire, which will consequently be staged elaborately.

—Messrs. Crodara and Carbone have secured a renewal of their lease of the Solis Theatre for two years, that is to say until October, 1900. They have already arranged with Sr. Bernabé, ex-secretary of Ferrari, to bring out a special Italian Opera Company for the months of July and August in each year.

—A horrible accident occurred on Tuesday afternoon in the *barraca* La Paz 66. A large iron girder fell from its place, completely smashing the skull of a peon named José Nieto Barreiro and breaking the arm of one of his companions. Barreiro, whose death was instantaneous, leaves a young wife and two small children in Spain.

—Most distressing news from Buenos Aires.—The *Herald* says:—"This season of the year seems to be rather unfavourable for engaged couples, as we are assured that no less than three engagements among the English-speaking community have been broken off within the last month. Perhaps the young ladies are exacting or hard to please, or mayhap the young men are turning too frivolous and do not keep true to their promises."

—There is no foundation, says a London paper, for the report which is now being put into circulation to the effect that the authorities at Scotland Yard are apprehensive of renewed Anarchist activity. Since the raid upon the Club Autonómico the Anarchist in London has been an almost negligible quantity. The Club Autonómico ceased to exist. Even if these facts fail to be entirely convincing, there could be no better proof of the equanimity of Scotland Yard than the fact that Chief Inspector Mel-

ville, who is at the head of this special branch of the police headquarters, is at present absent from London on leave. Inspector Quinn being in temporary charge of the department. As a matter of fact the Anarchist fraternity can now do little or nothing without Scotland Yard being aware of their movements. In Mr. Melville's own words, the police can place their finger upon any Anarchist who may be wanted in London at a moment's notice.

—The numerous friends of the Rev. Dr. Thompson, of the Methodist Church, will condole with him on the loss of his venerable mother, who died, in Buenos Aires, on Sunday.

—We quote from the *B. A. Standard*.—"Gigantic robberies are the order of the day. The capture of the Inza barraca, Calle San José 1536, has confessed that he had for the last six years been stealing horse hair from his employers who had placed the utmost confidence in his honesty. For years a deficit had been noticed in the half yearly balance, sometimes amounting to 10,000 kilos! At first it was thought that it must be dust that had caused the difference. Eventually, recently, a detective was employed who followed the capataz one day with a bundle in his pocket. This he was seen to throw into the entrance of a brush factory. Immediately the detective pounced on it, and imagine his delight when he found it contained hair! To calculate the value of the robbery it is only necessary to add that horse hair is worth about a dollar and a half a kilo. Say that only 10 tons were robbed each year since '92 and we at once have the handsome sum of \$90,000. The question remains—what could the capataz have done with his ill gotten wealth? A most tremendous swindle is said to have been discovered in Rosario. Yesterday morning, at the instance of Messrs. Paats, Roche and Co., the police made a raid on the factory of one of our largest cigar-factories and seized more than half a million cigars which Messrs. Paats, Roche and Co., the sole agents here for the Italian Government, say have been prepared to be sold as genuine imported Italian cigars, thus infringing on their rights. At the same time more than two million cigars without stamps were also found on the premises, so that if the case can be proven against them, the firm in question will have to pay, as fine to the Fiscal, \$170,000."

—General Roca has informed 32 Governments by autographic letter that he has taken office as President of Argentina. For the first time Japan has been notified. The only sovereigns not informed are those of China and Turkey—the Sick Men of the East and the Far East.

—A Sicilian named Lupo Salvatore, of Comiso, has just been convicted of 63 different acts of serious fraud, in which he had forged the signatures of judges and stolen the seal of the Chancery. The sentence passed upon him was three years for each offence, it being specially decreed that the terms of imprisonment should not run concurrently. Salvatore, therefore, will have to serve one hundred and eighty-nine years in prison before he has purged his offence. It is rather a good thing for him, because the prison officials are bound to keep him in such good condition that he shall live long enough to finish his sentence.

—Yesterday's telegrams have a great deal to say about the enthusiastic reception given by the Sultan to the German Emperor and Empress on their landing at Constantinople on Tuesday morning. The Sultan turned the city upside down and inside out to receive them—as might be expected, for he has never had nor is likely to have such a friend and protector as the Kaiser, but for whose protection he would probably have been kicked out of his kingdom long ago. The Christian and the Mahomedan Monarchs embraced each other warmly and had a long chat together. It is not said whether Abdul told William to what extent his slumbers were disturbed by the ghosts of the thousands of Armenians to whose assassination he was an accessory. It should have been an interesting topic of conversation between the two. The grand joke of the day is that the *Berliner Post* has published an article eulogising the goodness, intelligence and other

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great qualities of the Sultan, and comparing him to the Kaiser himself. Surely the Kaiser will not like this. Perhaps, however, the Post was having a little joke. The latest tale about the alleged anarchist conspiracy against the Kaiser is that it was invented by the police to give themselves importance. Such things have happened.

There have been severe storms in the British Channel and the German Ocean, with considerable damage to property and shipping, and some loss of life.

The U. S. flag was formally raised in San Juan de Porto Rico on Tuesday, and the U. States is now in formal possession of the island. The Peace Commissioners in Paris are still at war over the Cuban Debt. The latest absurdity is that the Spanish Government pretends that the peace protocol obliges the withdrawal of the Spanish troops from Cuba, but does not affect the sovereignty of Spain over the island. Vice Admiral Dewey will be the Democratic candidate for the future Presidency of the United States.

LONDON NOTES

Tuesday, September 20.

We regret to announce the death of Sir George Grey, which took place yesterday at South Kensington. The deceased gentleman, whose age was eighty-six, had in the course of his long career held served important Colonial appointments.

The death took place in the Northampton General Hospital, last evening, of Mr. James Thornton, shoe manufacturer, of Leicester, the seventh victim of the Wellington railway accident, which occurred on the 2nd inst.

By the collapse of a building in course of construction in Govan-road, Govan near Glasgow, five workmen were yesterday killed, and several others injured.

Whilst an electric tram was proceeding down a steep gradient near the Grange Congregational Chapel, Bradford, yesterday, it left the rails and overturned. About sixty persons were travelling in the car at the time, and of these one man sustained a fractured skull, from which he afterwards died; some fifteen other persons being seriously injured.

The Duke of Orleans has issued a vigorously worded manifesto with regard to the Dreyfus affair.

Major Esterhazy is at the present moment in London, and although he has not committed his story to writing his declarations are all in favor of Dreyfus.

Mr. Kestell last evening at Birmingham addressed a meeting on the subject of "Idolatry in the Church of England" and a resolution calling on the Government to abolish the episcopal veto, and grant the laity the privilege of taking part in the election of bishops and clergy, was carried after a noisy discussion.

Scarcity of water, as before, continues to be felt in the East End, though the conditions are somewhat modified by the cooler atmosphere and slight rainfall. The supplementary supply is not yet fully available.

Beyond a militant manifesto issued by the men, and the receipt of a letter from the Chairman of the Highway Committee of the County Council, stating that nothing can be done until that body meets, to deal with the alleged breach of agreement by the company, there is practically no change in the position of affairs in the tramway strike.

At North Tynd Registration Court yesterday, as the result of a test case brought before the Revising Barrister, about 6,000 men, who had worked in the stone-yards during the late coal strike, were disfranchised on the ground of having received parish relief.

The second of the series of five races to be sailed between the Medway yacht Maid of Kent and the Australian yacht Ilex took place yesterday, over a twelve knots course, on the river Medway below Gillingham, and resulted in another victory for the English boat by four and a half minutes.

At the Central Criminal Court, yesterday, before the Recorder, John Wm Jago and John Kynaston, who had been employed on the White Star liner Britannic, as chief and third officer respectively, pleaded guilty to robbing the mails on board that vessel on the high seas. Jago was sentenced to eight years' penal servitude and Kynaston to twelve months' hard labour.

Dr. John Lloyd Whitmarsh, of Bromford was indicted at the Central Criminal Court yesterday before Mr Justice Darling, for the murder of Alice Rebecca Bayly, a milliner by the performance of an illegal operation. The case had not concluded when the Court rose.

It is reported from Manila that an attempt has been made to poison Aguinaldo, the insurgent leader.

Charging his clergy at the Diocesan Synod yesterday, the Bishop of Lichfield dealt with the subject of ritual at length, holding that the ceremonial use of incense, the invocation of the saints, and other similar practices were illegal; and that no additional services should be held without the approval of the Bishop.

Additional supplies of water to the East-end through the Tower Subway are now secured by the East London Company's pipes to Whitechapel, Shoreditch, Bethnal green, and other of the low lying districts, and it is hoped that in the course of a day or two sensible relief will be felt.

Mr. Benn wrote last night to the Secretary of the Tram Workers' Union stating that he had summoned a special meeting of the Highway Committee of the London County Council, for to-morrow, to consider the alleged breaches of the lease by the North Metropolitan Tramways Company.

Nawab Akbar Khan, aged 63, describing himself as a medical man, was yesterday convicted at the Central Criminal Court of stealing certain property belonging to Lord Balfour of Burleigh. It was shown that the accused, under the pretence of being highly connected in India, had for years maintained himself by fraud, and had deceived a large number of well known persons. He was sentenced to eighteen months' hard labour.

A number of men were found guilty at the Old Bailey yesterday of brutal attacks, sometimes accompanied by robbery, upon persons in the streets of the metropolis, and were sentenced by the Recorder and the Common Serjeant respectively to terms ranging from twelve months' hard labour to six years' penal servitude.

Mark Hutchence, a member of the East Ham Council, was charged yesterday, at the Thames Police-court, with damaging an omnibus and assaulting its conductor. It was shown that accused's conduct, on an attempt being made to prevent his entry into the vehicle, which was already full, was most violent and alarming. Mr. Mead sent him to hard labour for fourteen days.
