POLITICAL NOTES.

Dullness prevails in the political world, except as regards the question of legislative candidates. As this is not one that greatly concerns our readers we leave it to our native contemporaries.

The Siglo of yesterday takes up the article of the Nacion of the preceding day, and accepts it as a declaration that on Feb. 15 Sr. Cuestas will resign his provisional presidency into the hands of the President of the Senate until his election as constitutional President on March 1st. It is not at all clear that the Nacion has made any such declaration, but nevertheless the Siglo rejoices at it as if it were an important point gained. All that the Nacion says is that the Constitution will be observed, and the Constitution happens to be indeterminate on the point, as the Siglo itself has acknowledged previously. The Constitution says that in case of vacancy the President of the Senate shall assume the Presidency of the Republic - but in the present case the vacancy does not exist. The Presidency has its provisional occupant, and all that will be done, will be to substitute one provisional President for another for a term of 15 days, to the danger and inconvenience of the Republic, a step which is not contemplated either by the letter on the spirit of the Constitution. The attitude which the Siglo and some other of our contemporaries have taken on this point is to us quite incomprehensible and, if we may so without disrespect, devoid of common sense. One might think from their references, that some terrible calamity would befall the Republic if Sr. Cuestas, who is to be elected Constitutional President on March 1st, is allowed to retain the provisional presidency which he already occupies, from Feb. 15 to that date.

Sr. Cuestas drew his presidential salary for October on Thursday, and in doing so ordered the discount of 5% to be made therefrom as provided for in the Law of the Treasury Certificates. We can imagine the horror with which his great and good predecessors Julio Herrera and Idiarte Borda would have received the insolent proposition to make any discount from their salaries.

The Executive has issued a Decree confiding to the Rural Association, as the fittest body, the task of drawing up regulations for the importation and exportation of livestock.

The Executive has signed and promulgated the Law confirming the prolongation of the Treaty of Commerce and Navigation with France, of July 14, 1892.

CUSTOMS RECEIPTS.

The following were the Customs Receipts for the month of October, 1898. Importation \$ 590,885.08; Exportation 27,161.46; Depositions estimate 40,000.00; \$ 658,046.54

Same month, 1897, \$ 846,169; Same month, 1896, \$ 923,725

The month of October is generally one of recovery from the dullness of the winter season, and the month in which the importing houses despatch most of their spring and summer goods. In the present year, it has unfortunately proved an exception to this rule, and the above receipts show unmistakable depression, being much lower than those of any preceding October for some years past - the October receipts have always exceeded \$800,000 - and also lower than the receipts of any month, except June last, under the present administration, and in June there were special reasons for the drop. We do not think it would be difficult to find an explanation for this depression in the political unrest of the past month, and the revolutionary alarms which were continually prevalent, and which caused commerce, especially as regards the interior, to be limited to the barest daily needs. Whether there will be any improvement in the current month, is more than we will venture to say - we rather fear not, as confidence is not likely to be restored until the elections are over. Such a state of things is regrettable, but we suppose it must be regarded as an inevitable evil of the situation.

LIBRARY.

Rudyard Kipling's Latest. - Writers of short stories there have been from time immemorial, and never more than at the present day, but it has remained for Mr. Rudyard Kipling to raise the short story to the rank of literature, and in this achievement he still stands unapproached. His latest venture is now before us in No. 354 of Messrs. Macmillan's popular 'Colonial Library' and forms a solid volume of nearly 400 pages, containing a baker's dozen of tales. The title Mr. Kipling has chosen for the collection is 'The Day's Work,' but he might better have called it 'A Gospel of Labour,' for underlying nearly all the stories is the moral of the dignity of labour, and this Mr. Kipling applies, in his own peculiar fashion, to man, beast, and inanimate thing. Mr. Kipling is not merely a tale-writer, he is also a poet - we could see it in his stories, if he had not shown it to us in his verses - and like all persons with more than half an ounce of imagination in their composition, he is pantheist to his fingers' tips. And thus he personifies - he imparts intelligence, feeling and character to - not merely the beasts of the field, but even inanimate things and parts of things. To him, not merely a living thing, but every plate, rod, rivet, beam and piece of which they are composed; and he makes every one of these preach the same sermon, and that sermon is 'do the work before you, and do it with all your might.' This is an audacious undertaking, and one which only Mr. Kipling could attempt, but then he has more genius in him than any other living writer, and how successfully he achieves the task may be seen in the two stories 'The Ship that Found Herself' and '007.' In 'The Maltese Cat,' he preaches the same sermon from the mouth of a polo pony, and gives a tale of a polo match that will set most readers' blood aflame. These stories are in his happiest style, and so is 'The Bridge Builder' in which there are some wonderfully powerful touches of description. In 'The Tomb of His Ancestors' and 'William the Conqueror' he gets on to familiar Indian ground; the latter dealing with famine scenes in a very interesting manner. The other stories are, perhaps, hardly his best work, and they all show, more markedly than usual, the peculiar limitation of Mr. Kipling's great talent, in his inability to introduce feminine interest and deal with female character. He seems to live, move and think in a world in which women take a very small share. On the whole, the book will be a very welcome one to his admirers, and, though its quality is rather uneven, some of the tales in it will be read and re-read many a time.

From Messrs. Macmillan we have also received their three Magazines for October, namely Macmillan's, The Century and St. Nicholas. We have praised these Magazines so often, that there is little left for us to say, except that they maintain their high standard in every particular. In Macmillan's we note two specially interesting articles 'A Grandmother's Tales' and 'Private Hook, V. C.' Mr. Tallentyre's 'Country Notes' are also very charming reading. The Century has so many good things on the Contents list that we have no room to repeat them. Boys and girls of all ages from 5 to 50 will revel as usual in St. Nicholas with its happy combination of amusement and informa-

tion and its admirable illustrations. This is of the very highest type of juvenile magazines, and it does not fall into the error of imagining that young folks are incapable of appreciating good writing and high aims. From Messrs. Longmans Green & Co we have received the Badminton for October and find it a capital number. Amongst numerous good articles, the one that will most attract readers here will be 'El Pato,' by Mr. W. H. Hudson, in which he gives a vivid picture of this game as played in the River Plate during the time of Rosas, with some interesting historical references to Whiteock's pitiful campaign which lost the Plate to British rule. The illustrations to this are accurate, except one which represents a gaucho as riding between hills which certainly do not exist anywhere within 250 miles of Buenos Aires.

CENTRAL URUGUAY NORTHERN RAILWAY.

The report of the Central Uruguay Northern Extension Railway Company, Limited, for the year ended 30th June, laid before the ordinary general meeting convened in London on 14th October, states that the gross receipts came to £23,425, as against £21,774 in 1897; and the working expenses to £19,445, as against £19,063; leaving £2,970 as against £2,708. To this balance must be added Government guarantee, £51,332; and balance from 1896 7, £3,584; making £67,886; from which has to be deducted interim dividend of 3s 6d. per share to December 31st, 1897, £17,500; debenture interest paid and accrued to June 30th, 1898, £31,358; income tax, £1,140; interest, £530; leaving a disposable surplus of £17,358. The line has been worked by the Central Uruguay Railway for 60 per cent of the gross receipts, as provided for in the working agreement made with that company. The increase in such receipts is £654, equal to 2.05 per cent., and the increase in the net profit is £282, or 2.05 per cent. The number of miles open for traffic throughout the year has been 182. The receipts from passenger traffic show an increase of 0.53 per cent., and from luggage and parcels an increase of 5.31 per cent. The receipts from goods traffic show a decrease of 9.39 per cent., and from animals an increase of 203.12 per cent. The receipts per train mile have been 9s. 0 3/4 d., as against 9s. 2 1/4 d., and the expense of working per train mile has been 5s. 5 1/4 d., as compared with 5s. 0 1/4 d. The board are glad to state that, notwithstanding the serious interruption to traffic during the first three months of the past financial year, owing to the damage sustained by the line during the revolution, the results of working are slightly better than those of the previous year, although, until the custom house at Santa Ana is an established fact, the full benefits which would accrue to the company from the interchange of traffic with Brazil will not be fully realised. The board have pleasure in reporting the prompt payment of all claims for guaranteed for the year, and the chairman of the local committee reports that relations with the Government continue to be of a most satisfactory nature. Out of the available balance the board recommend the payment of a balance dividend of 3s. per share on the share capital, making, with the interim dividend, 6s. 6d. per share for the year, free of income-tax, equal to 3 1/4 per cent., and leaving to carry forward £2,358. The director who retires at the coming meeting is Mr. Loftus Fitzwygram, who is eligible and offers himself for re election.

CENTRAL URUGUAY EASTERN RAILWAY.

The report of the Central Uruguay Eastern Extension Railway, Limited, for the 12 months terminated 30th June, presented at the ordinary general meeting to take place in London on 14th inst., states that the gross receipts were 205,340, as against 255,288 in the preceding year; and the working expenses £34,619, as against £30,864 leaving £170,821 as against £24,424. To this balance must be added Government guarantee £20,245; and the balance from 1896 7, £2,127; making £23,194; from which has to be deducted interim dividend of 3s 6d. per share to 31st December, 1897, £12,250; debenture interest paid and accrued to 30th June last, £23,170; income tax, £728; interest, £190; leaving a disposable surplus of £16,855. The line has been worked by the Central Uruguay Railway for a percentage of the gross receipts, ranging from 52 1/2 per cent. to 60 per cent., according to the weekly earnings, as provided for in the working agreement made with that company. These receipts show an increase of £10,052, equal to 18 1/2 per cent.; and the increase in the net profit is £6,397, or 26.19 per cent. The number of miles opened for traffic has been 128. The receipts from

passenger traffic show an increase of 12 2/7 per cent., from luggage and parcels 20.79 per cent., from goods traffic 22.11 per cent., and from animals 9.30 per cent. The receipts per train mile have been 11s. 1 1/4 d., as against 9s 11d., and the expense of working per train mile has been 5s. 10 1/4 d., as compared with 5s 6 1/4 d. The board have satisfaction in stating that, although the first three months suffered heavily from the effects of the revolution, the results of working during the past financial year show an improvement in almost every branch of traffic as compared with those of the previous year, and they trust that the development of the various sources of traffic will continue to manifest itself during the current year. The board have pleasure in reporting the prompt payment of all claims for guarantee for the year, and the chairman of the local committee advises that relations with the Government continue to be of a most satisfactory nature. Out of the disposable surplus the board recommend the payment of a balance dividend of 4s per share on the share capital, making, with the interim dividend, 7s. 6d. per share for the year, free of income-tax, equal to 3 3/4 per cent., and providing a carry forward of £2,856. The director who retires at the coming meeting is Mr. Loftus Fitzwygram, who is eligible and offers himself for re election.

Insects and Disease.

Nothing could more strikingly illustrate the importance of small things than the large role which is now attributed to the mosquito in the etiology of some of the most serious and widespread diseases to which the human race is subject. It is truly said that what prevents the successful colonisation of many tropical countries and what throws the greatest obstacle in the way of civilisation of and good government in vast regions of Central Africa, is not climate, not distance from home, and not unfriendliness on the part of the natives. The obstacle is malaria, and now we find that the prevalence of malaria so far as man is concerned depends on the mosquito, and that this pestilent little insect, in addition to irritating and annoying, is the means by which the poison of malaria is propagated and distributed. For years back botanists have known the important part played by birds in the scattering of seed, and of insects in the distribution of the pollen of plants, and it seems not unlikely that pathologists will have to recognise, in a much larger degree than has till lately been done, the large part taken by the subordinate forms of life by which we are surrounded - our cattle, our horses, our dogs and cats, our flies, our mosquitoes, and perhaps even our fleas - in distributing disease from man to man, and, as is stated in regard to the mosquito and malaria, in deciding whether the extension of our empire over great areas of the globe's surface shall be possible or not. - Hospital.

SUNDRIES.

The first class passengers arrived by the R. M. S. 'Thames' yesterday were Mr. and Mrs. Rey y Bensaude and family, and Mr. H. Mackworth. No first class passengers left this port by the P. S. N. Co's 'Liguria.'

At the Cibola Theatre is evening the French Company will present the capital comedy 'Le Voyage de Mr. Perrichon.' An English version of this under the title 'Peacock's Holiday' was played by the amateurs of the Entertainment Society two or three years ago, in the same theatre.

At the Solis Theatre this evening will be presented 'Felipe Darblay,' which is a Spanish version of the popular 'Ironmaster.'

The Committee of the St. Andrew's Society are preparing energetically for the annual banquet, which will take place on the 30th instant, and which we do not doubt it will be as successful as in former years. Amongst other novelties, a ample supply of real Scotch heather has been secured through the kindness of the kindred Society in Buenos Aires. (N. B. The heather was grown in Scotland, not Argentina.)

The marriage of Miss Emma Nebel and Dr. Gonzalo Ramirez Chain, both well-known in native social circles, was celebrated on Thursday evening.

The beautiful Miss Blanca Pezrey will be married to Sr. Leopoldo Storace on the 24th instant.

The telegrams continue to have a great deal to say about the extraordinary bellicose preparations in England. It seems unquestionable though we have hitherto doubted it - that there has been some unusual mobilisation of naval forces, but it is certainly doubtful if this has had anything to do with the Fashoda question, as the telegrams have pretended. A Berlin message contains a hint that it is more probable provoked by the movements of

Russia in China, and this seems corroborated by the news that the British squadron in Chinese waters has been placed on a war footing and that Hong Kong is being fortified. Meanwhile, Capt. Marchand has arrived at Cairo. He is said to have reported frankly to the French Government that his position in Fashoda was untenable, and it is fully expected that he will be instructed to evacuate it and hand it over to the Egyptian Government. There is a tale, requiring confirmation, that Sirdar Kitchener is in possession of documents proving that Capt. Marchand offered the Caliph an alliance with France against England.

There is an unconfirmed telegraphic rumor that the U. S. transport 'Panama,' which was taking 300 troops to Cuba, has been lost with nearly all on board.

At Brussels the plans for the mobilisation of the troops and 73 military maps have been stolen from the secret archives of the Ministry of War. At Constantinople four secretaries of the Ministry of Justice have disappeared, taking with them 'delicate' papers of State.

Says the B. A. Standard of Thursday: - Very terrible news reached us late last night. Mr. Learmonth, the manager of the Pastories Estancia near Vodla, was yesterday shot by one of his peones and is not expected to recover; while another Englishman, Mr. Robison, also on the estancia, was shot dead, presumably at the same time. No details had been received, and we can only hope against hope that the news has been exaggerated.

A telegram says that the New York World has published a violent attack on Abner McKinley, the President's brother, accusing him of selling his influence to contractors etc. This is probably nothing more than 'scandal campaign' for political purposes. The World is the yellowest of 'yellow journals,' that is to say it is unscrupulous and disreputable, and an attack in its columns is rather an honor than otherwise.

At Blackwall on Tuesday the successful launch took place of the Japanese battleship 'Shikishima.' This magnificent new vessel is of 14,850 tons displacement, 400 feet in length and 75 in breadth.

The Sultan has given the supposed house of the Virgin Mary at Jerusalem to the German Emperor, and he has handed it over to the German Catholics.

Sir Walter Scott used to tell a story of one of the nursery gardeners of his day: 'An old friend of mine having asked him to supply him with a dozen of anchovies, he replied, 'He had plenty; but, being a delicate plant, they were still in the hot-house.'

Some friends of the missionary cause recently made a tour round the world, visiting most of the chief stations. When they were landing in New Guinea one of the men of the schooner sang out to a native: 'Hallo, Jimmy, are you a policeman now?' 'Policeman - no fear; too much hard work policeman. Me deacon now.'

The reign of Turkish military butchery in Crete is over at last. Yesterday the foreign Admirals at Canea occupied with the troops under their command all the administrative positions, on the withdrawal of the Turkish forces, who retire to their barracks until they embark for Constantinople. Their departure will be made as expeditiously as possible, vessels for that purpose being placed at their disposal. The guardianship of the arsenal will be undertaken by the troops of the foreign powers.

The steamship Monserrat has arrived at Cadiz with 1498 soldiers from Gibara. Amongst these are 800 sick. The captain declared on his arrival that 98 bodies have been thrown into the sea during the voyage.

Mr. Long, Secretary of the Navy at Washington, has received as a souvenir of the late war the personal ensign of Admiral Cervera, which was captured from the Spanish cruiser Cristobal Colon when she surrendered after the failure of the famous dash out of Santiago Harbour. In connection with this ensign naval officers who took part in the engagement relate that when the battleship Oregon and the cruiser Brooklyn were chasing the Spanish flagship, and had got almost to close quarters, the flag which she was flying at the moment was hauled down in token of surrender, and the American warship, of course, im-

London papers inform us that there is no truth in the story, telegraphed out here some four weeks ago, that the Queen and the Empress Frederick had met with a carriage accident at Balmoral.

LONDON NOTES

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 7. A Correspondent in Crete, telegraphing last night, says that the news of the dispatch of the Ultimatum of the Powers to the Porte causes general rejoicing among the Christians.

The proposal of the foreign Ministers at Peking to summon military and naval escorts to protect the Legations is meeting with some opposition from the Tsung-li Yamen. They have now called upon the Chinese Government to afford every facility for the forwarding of the several detachments from Tientsin, asking that special trains may be placed at their disposal.

Telegrams from St. Paul, Minnesota, state that fierce fighting has taken place between a detachment of United States troops, under General Bacon, and a band of disaffected Indians some miles from that place. It was reported yesterday that the General and his whole party had been massacred, but this was not confirmed.

At their annual Congress at Stuttgart the German Social Democrats have adopted a resolution strongly protesting against the introduction of a Bill for the suppression of strikes, as promised by the Emperor in his recent speech at Oeynhausen.

Londoners extended a hearty welcome to the 1st Battalion of the Grenadier Guards on their return from the Sudan yesterday. Early in the morning the suburban soldiers disembarked from the troopship Dilwara at Southampton. Crowds had there assembled on the piers to give them a cordial reception, and many friends of officers on board were waiting at the Empress Dock when the transport came alongside.

At the half-yearly meeting yesterday of shareholders in the East-London Water Company Mr. George Banbury, Chairman, defended the Company against attacks made upon them, and attributed all the shortcomings of supply to the unprecedented drought and the diminished use of cisterns.

Arising out of the condemnation of thirteen tons of livers on August 27, the first of a group of Vestry prosecutions under the Public Health Acts took place yesterday at Southwark Police-court. Mr. Falle Geary, described as trading under the name of Rulfin and Co., manufacturers of table delicacies, of 53, Fort-road, Bermondsey, was summoned as the person upon whose premises the 'terrible stuff' was seized.

Mr. Lushington resumed the hearing, at Bow-street Police court yesterday, of the charge of forgery and fraud against Herbert Davies, 'private surgeon,' who had been employed by Lieut.-Col. Shipway to make investigations with a view to establishing his right to bear arms. After a sexton had given evidence, the Rev. George Alford, Vicar of Mangotsfield, entered the box and on being questioned as to how he came to testify to the genuineness of the alleged antiquarian 'discoveries,' said he did so because he had implicit faith in the prisoner and took his word for everything. There was a further remand.
