### PASSING NOTES.

The financial question is the absorbing topic of the day, but the situation is still one of such absolute suspense that comment is difficult. All rational hope in the new Bank seems founded, and an official declaration to that effect is generally looked for but as any moment may bring both that and the proclamation of a new programme, it is vain to criticise and difficult to suggest. It is vulgarly said that sets got used to being skinned; here it seems we must get used to being on the expectative, for that is the position in which governmental folly, obstinacy and incapacity have kept us for nearly the last two years. It is not natural, still less is it healthy or comfortable, but until the market shows sufficient unity and strength of mind to throw the Government over and take its own measures for regeneration, it is unavoidable. This is the course we now recommend, for we see no hope in Government measures. Government, as it has been all along, the chief obstacle, in spite of its patriotic declarations to the contrary. For all we can see it may go on, playing fast and loose, making specious promises never to be fulfilled, professing everything and doing little, until the expiration of its term in February, 1894. With such a prospect, the only alternative to general ruin is for the market to act independently, to insist, so to speak, on Government taking its unclean finger out of the financial pie. Once the market could be freed from Government interference we have little doubt that it possesses powerful resources of resuscitation and could rapidly cure the crisis so far as general business was concerned.

The late despot Santos was an abominable and immoral ruler, but he had sufficient sense not to meddle with financial matters; the consequence was that there was no financial trouble, and business and commerce were comparatively much more flourishing than now. Another consequence, agreeable enough for him, was that there was much more for him to rob. When people are flourishing, they can afford a certain percentage to thieves. There are not a few who would prefer Santos with his non-interference, prosperous times and quiet robberies, to the present situation. There is a moral in this which we leave the present Government to find out for itself.

On Saturday evening some three or four hundred University students and other unfledged youths held a noisy demonstration in favour of Dr. Alem, the prominent Argentine politician, at present staying in the Hotel de Paris. The usual fulsome speeches, overflowing with unbounded patriotism were made. We cannot say we altogether approve of this. Effervescence of this kind is not genuine patriotism, and these downy youths would do better to attend to their studies and confine their precocious political demonstration to private life until access of manhood's years gives their opinions some weight. Moreover, it must not be forgotten that at present Dr. Alem is under impeachment as the leader of a murderous conspiracy. It is very possible that in this he is an injured martyr—the alleged conspiracy in Buenos Aires seems to have been nearly as farcical as that in the Union here last October, and the declaration of a state of siege and subsequent arrests were little more than a not particularly creditable political coup d'état on the part of the Argentine Government to silence annoying opposition to its plans for the future Presidency. But, whilst that stigma endures, such a demonstration as that of the students on Saturday, is to say the least, improper. They might equally well make a demonstration in favour of dynamite, assassination and

anarchy. It is an old vice of Spanish South America to regard treason as no crime and political murder as a merely venial offence, and that same fatal doctrine still obtains in favour of a man accused of plotting both the one and the other. Some of our contemporaries applaud the behaviour of the students as a proof of advanced, manly and noble ideas. For our part we regret it in the extreme as a proof that the rising generation is infected with the same looseness of political morality that has so frequently proved the bane of South America in the past and which makes her Governments to be regarded with such suspicion and distrust by sober Europe. Dr. Alem may be a great man, a hero and a patriot, but it is not fitting that University students should demonstrate in his honour at the present moment.

### PASSING NOTES.

The Chamber of Representatives was convoked on Saturday. In the absence of both the President and the vice-President of the Chamber, Sr. Echegaray was voted to the Chair, which he solely occupied for the purpose of declaring that there was no quorum present to hold a sitting. Two minor matters having been referred to Committee, the proceedings then closed.

### The Montevideo Gas Company, Limited.

The directors in their report, for presentation at the ordinary general meeting held on Tuesday, May 31, submit to the shareholders the following statement of accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1891.—The net profit on the working of the year, as shown by the revenue account, was £36,478 10s. 11d., which has been passed to the credit of profit and loss. From this latter account, provision has been made for interest on debentures, for income-tax, and for bad and doubtful debts, and £1,632 7s. 1d. has been written off capital expenditure for depreciation. The balance then remaining at the credit of profit and loss available for dividend is £35,123 12s. Of this the directors paid on 23rd November, 1891, an interim dividend in respect of the half-year ended 30th June of 10s. per share, free of income-tax, and they now recommend the payment of a further amount of 10s. per share, also free of income-tax, making together a dividend of 5 per cent. for the year. This will absorb the sum of £27,096, and leave a balance of £8,027 12s. to be carried forward. The year 1891 was marked by great depression and a complete stagnation of business in the City of Montevideo. Not only was there a stoppage in the erection of new buildings, but many important establishments were compelled to close their doors, and in the autumn of the year it was reported that at least 1,000 houses remained unoccupied. This reaction from the prosperous conditions of 1889-1890 seriously affected the company's revenue from all sources. As against these adverse circumstances, the long-continued depression in many branches of trade on this side, enabled your directors to make purchases on very favourable terms, and to deliver the coal and other material at exceptionally low rates of freight. A profit also was realised in the exchange on remittances to London of £636 9s. 9d. The saving on these heads, added to the economies effected under the new management in Montevideo, enabled the directors to recommend the above dividend at the rate of 5 per cent. for the whole year, and to carry forward a substantial balance; and they believe that the shareholders will regard this as satisfactory, seeing that it has been fully earned during a period which, financially and commercially, was one of the most disastrous the country has experienced. Although the company's contract with the Municipality of Montevideo for the public lighting of the city remains unrenewed, the company since the beginning of the current year, at the request of the authorities, has lit with gas thirty-one additional lamps. It is satisfactory to the directors to be able to report that the current indebtedness of the authorities is being regularly discharged. The company's offices and show-rooms in Montevideo have been removed to new and more convenient premises recently acquired in a commanding position in the important thoroughfare Calle 25 de Mayo. The old works and the trunk mains have been upheld in a state of efficiency. The smaller mains and the services continue to be thoroughly overhauled as opportunity offers. Steady progress has been made towards the completion of the new works.

### Liebig's Extract of Meat Company, Limited.

The directors have issued their report and statement of accounts for presentation at the twenty-seventh ordinary general meeting of the company, which took place on Wednesday June 1. They state as follows:—

On the 16th and 17th of November last, the River Plate local directors held their usual annual meeting at Fray Bentos, when the company's books and accounts there, to the 30th September, 1891, were examined and certified as correct. All our factories, machinery, and plant were reported to be in their usual efficient state. The enlargement of the slaughtering place, and the erection of the new buildings mentioned in the last report, have proved of great advantage, and from some further works, since carried out, equal success is anticipated. The Fray Bentos manager does not propose any new buildings for this year. Owing to the imposition of export duties, to the lower value of produce in Europe, the profit is, we regret to say, somewhat less than last year, season. The sale of our staple article "Liebig's Company's" Extract of Meat, has again proved very gratifying, and the number of our clients continues to increase in all parts of the world. Our estates are reported to be in a first rate condition, and have given a result which we must look upon a favourable one. Our stock of cattle on the 30th September last was 49,652 head.

Mr. C. E. Gunther, one of the board of directors, left London in November last to pay a visit of inspection to our Fray Bentos establishment, and to confer with the local director at Buenos Aires and Montevideo, and it gives us much pleasure to report that Mr. C. E. Gunther found everything going on satisfactorily at Fray Bentos, and the prospects for next season propitious. The balance of the annexed profit and loss account amounts to £31,143 8s. 7d., to which under section No. 161 of the articles of association the directors propose to transfer £15,000 from the reserve fund, making £35,143 8s. 7d.; out of this an interim dividend of 5 per cent. was paid on the 15th February last, amounting to £24,000, and the directors further propose to appropriate the balance in the following manner:—To pay a dividend to 12 1/2 per cent., equal to 50s. per share, £60,000, being, together with the interim dividend, equivalent to interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, and a bonus of 11 1/2 per cent. per annum (both free of income-tax); to carry to the Employees Provident Fund, £1,000; to deduct for percentage of European directors and River Plate local directors, 13 per cent., £6,127 15s. 10d., leaving a sum of £5,020 12s. 9d., to carry forward to profit and loss new account.

### FINANCIAL.

The Nacion definitely announces that the President has accepted the resignation by Dr. C. M. Ramirez of the Ministry of Finance. The decree to that effect, however, has not yet appeared.

Nothing new has transpired respecting the new Bank, and the general opinion is that negotiations have finally collapsed and that Mr. Notzlin is not prepared to do anything serious. It is semi-officially announced that a Government Message on the subject will be presented to the Chambers within a day or two, setting forth the true situation and evolving plans for the future. This is most anxiously looked for, the situation being one of painful uncertainty. It is thought that the first step will be to make considerable reductions in the Budget and that the Chambers are at last convinced that they must consent to this. The wildest rumours are afloat as to the nature of these reductions.

### The report that Mr. Oliver had presented a bank scheme is denied.

### SUNDRIES.

The endo quorum scandal in the Chamber of Representatives continues in full blast. On Saturday it was so bad that neither the President nor the vice-President of the Chamber were present and a deputy had to be elected who took the Chair for the sole formality of declaring that there was no quorum present to hold a sitting. And thus it goes on—rather, does not go on when it ought to.

### Bishop Sterling arrived on Sunday morning as expected, but he was so unwell, suffering from a severe chill, that he was unable to preach at the English Church as announced, and under medical advice retired to bed. We regret to say that his Lordship was still seriously unwell yesterday and consequently unable to proceed to Chili in the "Iberia" as he had originally intended.

A ludicrous printer's blunder appeared in our issue of Sunday in the note referring to the visit of Bishop Sterling. We were made to say that his Lordship would be pleased to see "any of the residents who may deserve to call." Of course the word should have been *desire*. We had not the remotest intention of reflecting on the deserts of any of our readers.

The papers received by yesterday's London mail contained little of interest regarding Uruguay. We note, however, that our remarks of two months ago about the slight improvement in the Customs revenue for the first quarter of the year were quoted in several journals, and seem to have created a favourable impression.

The *Financial Times*, which distinguished itself by its advocacy of the confiscation scheme and its abuse of the Uruguayan creditors who objected to it, commits the absurdity of attributing the slight improvement in the Customs revenue directly to the passing of that scheme. It might, with equal truth, attribute it to the equinoctial gales or even to the preaching of the *Financial Times*.

The same remarkable journal expresses extreme astonishment that we, *The Montevideo Times*, should, after our opposition to the confiscation scheme, venture to find anything favourable in the said receipts. Our London contemporary is not yet reconciled to independent and honest English journalism in Uruguay and fails to understand that we are prepared to tell the truth and shame even the *Financial Times*. The *S. A. Journal*, however, takes a different and more complimentary view, referring to us as follows:—

"The *Montevideo Times* is a candid friend of the Uruguayan Republic. It never shrinks when it is a case of uttering unpalatable truths. Our contemporary, in short, is an outspoken, but not the less a conscientious and impartial critic. When he can say a good word for the country, its commerce, its prospects, or its Government, our colleague does not remain silent. In this spirit he refers to the Customs returns for the first quarter of the year, in terms of frank congratulation."

The Almanac for this part of the world requires reforming. It assigns three months to each of the four seasons, which is always inaccurate. If it were to give nine months between summer and winter and the remaining three between spring and autumn, it would be far nearer the mark.

Our objectionable weekly contemporary of last Sunday has a note referring to our report on the recent "Cinderella," in which, after uttering a deliberately false statement, it once more exhibits its disregard of the most ordinary journalistic decency by making remarks evidently intended to be personally offensive to the writer of our report.

As, however, our contemporary has long placed itself outside the pale of respectability and good taste, its silly impertinences require no answer. Our only regret is that it should continue to exist to the discredit of English journalism in the River Plate.

In Turkey the papers are allowed to eulogise, but not to exercise independent criticism. This atmosphere would well suit a certain nameless contemporary of ours, which only knows the two extremes of sycophantic eulogy and offensive personality. In Turkey its utterances might meet with that acceptance which is denied them here. We advise it to emigrate thither and relieve us from its presence. The climate is fine and, if any other inducement is required, plurality of wives is permitted.

The hockey match on Sunday, England *versus* the World, resulted in an easy victory for the former by five goals to none after a lively game.

The strike of the *verduleros*—the greengrocers, and market gardeners—continues, and the city is practically without green food. No one seems to know all the ins and outs of the case, except that the strike is a protest against an attempt of the Municipality or the market authorities or both to impose a fresh tax upon the vendors, and thereby render still dearer the already monstrous cost of living. This being the case, we wish all success to the strikers.

If taxes and dear living were a sign of prosperity, Montevideo should be one of the first cities in the world. Unfortunately in the present case they are rather the reverse.

The performance at the Politeama this evening will be for the benefit of the clever singer Sr. Pavan Moretti. The programme consists of "Cavalleria Rusticana," in which she is seen to great advantage, preceded by a select and attractive concert.

At the Cibola this evening will be given "Torear por lo fino," "Una Vieja" and "El Monaguillo."

Yesterday being the Anniversary of the Queen's Accession, the British flag was noticeable in port, and the Government offices also flew their bunting in conformity with the custom shortly to be abolished.

Amongst the deaths registered yesterday we note that of Robert Campbell, English, aged 37, single, from pulmonary tuberculosis, in the Caridad Hospital.

The influenza claimed a victim on Sunday in the person of the veteran Captain Juan Hegoburo, who figured in the defense of Montevideo early in the century. He was lately proprietor of a small bathing establishment in Calle Canelones. He was French by birth, but had lived in this country for seventy years, having come over when he was four years old.

The revolution in Rio Grande seems to be accomplished. According to telegrams which may or may not be genuine, the proclamation of Dr. Castillos as governor has received general support. A skirmish took place on Sunday morning, near Santa Ana de Livramento, between Government cavalry and a band of revolutionists, the former being routed. There were a few killed or wounded. The telegrams accuse Col. Escoba, Jefe Politico of the frontier department of Rivera, of openly favouring the revolutionists. We hear that the Federal Government has resolved to recognise Dr. Castillos, thus putting an end to further trouble.

### BUENOS AIRES.

The Minister of the Interior has directed the Land Office that the allotment of lands to Sr. Graubien is to be made in the Territory of Santa Cruz, that the present tenants are to preserve the rights recognised by their contracts and that the clause of the decree of May 14th prohibiting any sale of lands in the said Territory under other conditions than those fixed by the law No. 2875 does not apply to tenancies created by the Land Office prior to the said date.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Alexander Marriott Hancock, brother of Mr. Hancock, the chief of the Railway clearing house in this city.

We regret to state that Mr. Fitzsimon, the Inspector of National Colleges is seriously ill from influenza.

Complaints have been made by colonels of battalions encamped in the Rural Society's grounds that only three of the seven surgeons appointed to attend to the troops ever visit the sick soldiers. General Luis Campos has resigned the command of the troops in camp, the reason given being that he is ill.

We regret to announce the following deaths which have occurred during the last two days: that of Dr. Esteves Sagui, one of the oldest lawyers and well known by this city. Mr. German Scheiner, a resident of this city for over 60 years, at one time proprietor of the only foreign grocery store in Calle Peru near the old market, Don Eduardo G. Stegman, of the family of Bengoles and Stegman.

The death is also announced of Mrs. Holmes, Senr, which took place on the 16th inst. in the partido of Carmen de Arco. The deceased was the mother of the late Thomas Holmes, who had the Drapery Store in Calle Florida and was so well known and much esteemed as the leader of the Choir at the Scotch Church in Calle Piedras.

On Friday morning Mr. Michael J. Duggan was married to Miss Maggie Ballesty, youngest daughter of the late Mr. James Ballesty, of Rojas. The ceremony was performed at the Merced Church at 9 o'clock by the Rev. Father Silvestre (Passionist). The bride, who was dressed in white satin, was given away by her brother Mr. James Ballesty of Rojas and looked most beautiful. The bridesmaids were Miss Annie Ballesty and Miss Bella Duggan. Dr. Cotton, of Mendoza, assisted by Mr. Thomas Duggan junr, was best man. At the conclusion of the ceremony, mass was offered for the future welfare of the newly married couple. Mr. and Mrs. Duggan left by the mid day train for Rosario, en route for Coughin, for their honeymoon.

### The Presidential Election.

In reply to the ridiculous gush of the *Standard*, the *Herald* makes the following very sensible and truthful remarks respecting the election of Dr. Luis Saez Peña to the Argentine Presidency:—

"That there should be a marked feeling of relief at the turn which political affairs have taken is natural and proper, and that this should be reflected in an improved tone of feeling and business is quite as legitimate, but he is neither wise nor serious who undertakes to inspire false confidence or who would hold

out such allurement as among the possibilities of the case. If it were true that the principal causes of our troubles are due to political disorders, either actual or threatened, then a settlement of political questions peacefully might be expected to work a great transformation in our favor, but he who knows anything of the causes which have brought us where we are, knows that every principle of political economy has been broken in the administration of public and private finances, that all laws have been set aside or trampled under foot, and every economic heresy of which modern times have known has been adopted by us.

Every such a one knows that these policies of economic wrong are still in operation among us and not one of them has been abandoned; indeed, every cause which tended to the crisis of the present is in full operation, and how, then, can any man in his sober senses go off on a tangent of jubilation and predict gold at fifty per cent premium in three months, as does the Standard? That there will come a slow, steady, improvement we hope, but not without doubt. The fact that the President's name will be Sanz Peña instead of Pellegrini signifies nothing. Hopes are not so high now as when the multitude crowded our streets to hail President Pellegrini as the Moses ordained to lead us from the wilderness of our troubles to the land of prosperity, and, yet, what advantage came from changing the name Juárez to Pellegrini? It is not the fact of a new President that will help us, but first, the fact of a change without trouble, and that is, so far as unknown quantity the President-elect is an honorable man. So far, good; but some of the sorest afflictions that any people have suffered have emanated from the most amiable and honorable of men, and, despite Dr. Sanz Peña's mature age, no one can tell what will be the tone of color, strength and efficiency of the new Government. The Public Debt, the finances of the nation, the entire currency question, must be reformed, because they rest upon the most pernicious, rotten, inequitable expedients possible, and, so long as they do, there can be only the slow improvement which comes from the handicapped development of enormous resources, which, untaxed, and aided by a common-sense Government, would enable us first to pay all we owe and then to become rich and solidly prosperous.

## LONDON NOTES

THURSDAY, MAY 19.

Princess Christian, on behalf of the Queen, held the second Drawing Room of the season at Buckingham Palace yesterday. It was not so well attended as that on Monday, the presentations numbering only about 235. The number of black and grey dresses worn was exceptionally large.

The House of Commons was occupied throughout its sitting yesterday in discussing a Bill, the second reading of which was moved by Mr. Shaw Lefevre, for abolishing plural voting. Mr. T. W. Russell moved an amendment against the principle of one man one vote unless the number of representatives allotted to England, Wales, Scotland, and Ireland were previously settled in proportion to the population. Mr. James Stuart, Sir George Trevelyan, Mr. Sexton, and Sir W. Harcourt supported the Bill; while Mr. Bousfield, Mr. Parker Smith, and Mr. Goschen opposed it. The closure having been agreed to, the second reading was refused by 243 votes to 196 a majority of 47, and the amendment carried by 237 votes to 189, a majority of 48.

The Annual Conference of the Home Counties Division of the National Union of Conservative Associations was held yesterday at St. Leonards. In the evening Lord Salisbury spoke at a crowded meeting. He said he believed that the impending election would issue in a manner agreeable to their common hopes. With regard to foreign affairs there was at present an absolute calm, but unfortunately within our borders it was different. It was indeed painful to see workmen who ought to be working with the capitalists at this moment so divided that misery stalked abroad. He earnestly desired that labour should receive sufficient for its maintenance in comfort, but this was not to be brought about by the ukases of Governments but by the growth and wisdom of public opinion itself. Referring to our external trade, he said foreign nations were raising a barren wall of Protection around their shores which excluded us from their markets. While he would not do anything which would endanger our supply of food or raw material, we must be prepared to inflict upon nations which injured us the penalty of refusing them access to our markets for such luxuries as wine, silk, spirits, gloves, or lace. In regard to Ireland, he denied that in his recent speech he had looked, or appealed to, or encouraged any rising in Ulster. He had only indicated the dangers, and there was no doubt that the dangers had indicated were real.

Earl Spencer addressed a meeting of the Richmond District Liberal Association, which was called last night in support of the candidature of Mr. Charles Hodgson for the Kingston Division of Surrey. He said that if Mr. Gladstone had a majority in the next Parliament he would be able to carry not only a measure of Home Rule, but also a great many measures which were of importance to different classes, and which were to be found on the Newcastle Programme. Repudiating the allegation that the Newcastle Programme was dishonest and could not possibly be passed, he pointed to the work of the Parliament of 1868, contending that that Parliament had passed a programme quite as great. Earl Spencer went on to advocate at length the policy of Home Rule for Ireland.

Lady Aberdeen presided at the concluding sittings of the annual council meetings of the Women's Liberal Federation at the Memorial Hall yesterday, when a resolution was passed declaring belief in the wisdom of the policy of Home Rule for Ireland, and urging all the members to endeavour to return a large Liberal majority to the next Parliament to enable Mr. Gladstone to carry that and other reforms. Further resolutions passed related to the economic position of women, sentences for assaults on women and children, the divorce laws, women on County, District, and Parish Councils, Welsh Disestablishment, and temperance legislation. Lady Aberdeen also presided at the annual meeting of the Federation in St. James's Hall, when speeches were delivered by Mr. Stansfeld, M.P., Mr. Lloyd George, M.P., Sir Wilfrid Lawson, M.P., Mr. William O'Brien, M.P., Lady Henry Somerset, Lord Aberdeen, and others.

The witnesses heard yesterday by the Theatres and Music-halls Committee of the House of Commons included Mr. Howard, on behalf of the country theatres; Mr. Fardell, who explained and to a certain extent defended the principal clauses in the Bill promoted by the London County Council; Mr. J. G. Johnson, a "sketch" actor; and Mr. William Bailey, music-hall manager.

Last evening a large number of representatives of the banking and mercantile interests were entertained at dinner at the Mansion House by the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress. The toast of the evening was "Prosperity to the Banking and Mercantile Interests of the City of London," proposed by the Lord Mayor, and responded to by the Governor of the Bank of England.

A letter has been received in Berlin from a missionary correspondent in Uganda, which, besides reporting the complete stoppage of Catholic missionary work in consequence of the recent bloodshed, contains charges against Captain Lugard, of the British East Africa Company. The writer accuses Captain Lugard of supplying the natives with rifles, in contravention of the stipulations of the Brussels Act, and of refusing protection to the Catholic missionaries. The English Protestant missionaries are declared to have preached hatred against the Catholics, and they and Captain Lugard are held responsible for all the bloodshed.

The Governor of Victoria has declined to accede to the petition for a postponement of Deeming's execution. This does not interfere with the appeal to the Privy Council, which it is expected will be heard to-day.

At Nottingham yesterday the Rest of England declared their first innings closed when 214 runs had been scored for eight wickets. Lord Sheffield's team then entered upon second innings, 125 behind, and had made 117 for two wickets. Mr. Grace contributing 63, when rain stopped play and the match had to be abandoned as a draw. At Cambridge, the Gentlemen of England (with Rawlin) defeated the University by four wickets.

Prince Soltykoff won the Newmarket Stakes yesterday with Curio, Mr. Milner's St. Angelo being second and Mr. Rose's St. Damien third. At the same meeting Mr. Sneyd took the Spring Two-year-Old Stakes with Pink, Mr. T. Jennings, jun. the Selling Plate with Blankney, M'Callmont the Maiden Plate with Isinglass, Mr. Low the Selling Plate for two-year-olds with Royal Douglas, and Mr. W. De la Rue the Second Welter Handicap with Dearest. At Hamilton Park the Spring Handicap went to East Linton.

Mr. Justice Grantham and a jury had before them in the Queen's Bench Division yesterday the case of Sinclair v. Wilbrow, brought to recover damages for wrongful dismissal from a theatrical engagement. The plaintiff claimed that he had been engaged to play the part of "Paul Jones" for the run of a tour, but had been dismissed at a fortnight's notice. The defendant pleaded that he was justified according to the usage of the theatrical profession in what he did, and called witnesses to support him. In the result, the jury found for the plaintiff for salary to the amount of £120, and judgment was entered in accordance with this.

## ORIGIN OF THE TERM "GRIPPE"

La Midecine Moderne gives an extract from a meteorological journal kept at Versailles in the eighteenth century, and in which the meteorological variations are carefully noted day by day, with a few reflections upon remarkable atmospheric occurrences—storms, hail, thaw, &c. Commenting upon the months of February and March, 1743, the journal says: "There was a prevalence of colds and inflammations of the chest at Versailles and Paris. The king named this malady 'la grippe.' It was observed that bleeding was wholly contraindicated. Such persons as had not been bled, and who drank much, were the most quickly cured." It results from this document, that it was King Louis XV. who gave the name of

grippe to the influenza that then prevailed under a meteorological state, as the journal shows, analogous to that of recent years and of the present year.
