AN EXPLANATION WANTED.

The Government organs have made much of the fact that Government is paying its local accounts with a certain degree of regularity. But they have quite omitted to mention the not less important fact, which has come to our knowledge in the most direct manner possible, that Government is paying the said accounts, not in currency, but in minor notes of the ex-National Bank at 80 per cent of their nominal value. In the first place, this represents a serious loss to the unfortunate creditors of Government, because the said notes are not current, are useless for ordinary business transactions and are only negotiable on the Bolsa at about 62 per cent, finding purchasers with difficulty. But the most serious part of the business is that, not only has the Bank suspended conversion of these notes for over 12 months and is now in liquidation, but that any fresh issue of these notes is distinctly illegal. Government is authorised to receive the minor notes in part payment of Customs duties, but it is certainly not authorised to keep the notes in circulation by reissuing them in payment of its accounts and at a rate distinctly prejudicial to the recipients.

The liquidation of that treble unfortunate and mismanaged institution the National Bank was delivered into the hands of Government by the vote of Chambers, not a few members of which were personally interested in the business, and still more interested that there should be no clearing up of the many scandals connected therewith. Government took over the Bank for the purposes of liquidation on March 24, the date on which the Law to that effect was promulgated, but it has not yet appointed a Liquidating Committee, nor has it shown any serious signs of doing so. What it has been doing with the Bank in the meantime may be guessed but is not known. It is not long since the Minister of Finance was called to explain to the notes of the Bank, how it was that the notes of the Bank, supposed to be withdrawn from circulation, were being used for payment of employees of the Bank, and his explanation gave little satisfaction. We now have also the circumstance alluded to above. In addition to this it must be remembered that there is now no Minister of Finance, but that financial matters are practically being regulated by a President whose antecedents in such matters do not inspire confidence. It may also be mentioned that, although the Bank has been in a state of inconvertibility for over twelve months, although the extra 5% Customs duties imposed some 20 months ago for the express purpose of securing the conversion of its notes is still religiously exacted to the detriment of commerce, and although the notes by strict law have preference to all other claims upon the Bank, despite all this, there is no hint of approaching conversion of the said notes, and their market value is daily depreciating, purchasers being found with difficulty. All this is very ugly and unsatisfactory, and we think we are right in saying that an explanation is required.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Friday, the Message concerning extension of the moratorium of the English Bank was received from the Executive and passed on to the Representatives. Some routine business was transacted. Leave was granted to Dr. C. M. Ramirez, ex-minister of Finance, to absent

himself from the country for 60 days, on account of bad health.

Sr. A. F. Costa then resumed his explanation of the Bills he recently presented. He dealt at considerable length on the port question, the floating debt, and other matters, and was still speaking when the hour sounded and the sitting was brought to a close.

The Liquidation of the English Bank.

According to a tabulated statement published yesterday and signed by the Liquidating Committee, the definite cash liabilities of this branch are reduced to \$1,382,072.96 and there is a further item of \$903,053.94 corresponding to drafts upon Europe not yet located in any liquidation, part of which may fall upon the branch here. The assets on May 31, deducting shares deposited and drafts to be collected, are estimated at \$6,333,883.69. Next week we intend to refer to this statement at fuller length, and by that time we may also have before us the representations made by the Liquidators to Government and embodied in the Message of which we spoke yesterday.

The idea is gaining ground that an informal meeting of creditors should be held without delay, to discuss the attitude to be assumed for the protection of their interests and, if necessary, to appoint representative and investigating committees. It only awaits for some leading creditor take the initiative for this to be carried out. We think this would be a very proper course to pursue, and entirely necessary under the circumstances, and we hope to hear of its being put into action before the matter comes before the Chambers for discussion. It would also be well for a representative of the creditors to telegraph to the reorganising company in London, and demand from them a definite statement as to their intentions with regard to this market, about which they have hitherto been so suspiciously silent.

According to rumours current yesterday, there would be considerable opposition in both the Chambers to the proposed extension of the moratorium, or at all events to any extension over three months, the idea being that the London company ought to assist this branch as it has the branch in Buenos Aires, and that the liquidators here should make more effort to realise the assets, represented at so large an amount.

The Finance Committee of the Representatives has issued a lengthy report upon a petition recently presented by various lithographic and typographic establishments for protection in the way of increased duties on imported goods of that description. The Committee accedes to the petition with certain modifications. They propose the exemption from import duty of printing and lithographic machinery, paper, ink, and other material, at present paying of 8%, on their value; and they propose the suppression of the present *ad valorem* duty on printed books and matter, substituting therefor specific duties in some cases so high as to be practically prohibitive.

The following is the substance of the Bill recommended by the Committee. The following specific duties to be charged henceforth, per kilogramme:—printed books in paper or boards, 4 cents; the same, superior binding, 6 cents; printed music, 6 cents; unprinted manuscript books of all kinds, ruled or unruled, 50 cents; the same, partly printed or lithographed, 80 cents; paper ruled for music, unprinted, 50 cents; writing and drawing paper, white or coloured, 12 cents; the same, ruled, 30 cents; writing paper, ruled or unruled, with designs, monograms or other impression, \$1; plain envelopes, 40 cents; envelopes with any kind of printing, \$1; lithographed or printed commercial forms or papers, such as accounts, invoices, bank notes, draft bills, cards, labels, advertisements with or without illustrations, upon paper, cardboard, cloth, etc., in ink of one colour, \$2; the same in inks of more than one colour, \$3; paper, printed, lithographed, or autographed, of any kind, with ornaments or designs, in whole or part, and all other work of lithography, typography, photo-type or other system, in ink of one colour, \$1; the same in inks of more than one colour, \$2; empty boxes for matches, drugs, confectionery, perfumery, etc., \$60; the same in parts not made up, 40 cents. Typographic and lithographic machines and presses, paper for the same in open leaves not less than 82 by 54 centimetres, cardboard in sheets and printing and lithographic inks, to be exonerated from import duty. The extra Customs duty of 5%, imposed by the Law of Oct. 4, 1890, to remain in force, however.

Some of the duties proposed above are equivalent to fully 100 per cent on the value of the articles!
Standard Life Assurance Company.
Following the satisfactory valuation report for the five years ending November 15, 1890, the Standard Life Office shows for 1891 a report containing results of the most successful nature. The amount of new business accepted during the year

was the largest in the history of the Office, and this is saying a good deal when it is remembered that for nearly thirty years the annual new business accepted has been over a million. Last year the precise amount of new business was \$1,692,564, an increase of \$120,000 on the previous year, which in its turn showed an advance of \$200,000 on the 1889 return. If the amount of new business annually transacted is to be taken as a fair indication of the popularity of an office, the Standard, stands almost at the head of the list in the estimation of the public.

As about one-fourteenth of the whole business is re-assured the same proportion would give the net new business for last year at about \$1,550,000—a remarkable total. At the annual meeting the chairman remarked that the board are satisfied in view of the competition which exists at home, and which all life assurance companies are feeling strongly, that the policy of extension abroad, carried out carefully and within judicious limits, has been a wise one, and conducive to the permanent interests of the whole Company. At the same time, it must be understood that the home business of the Company—which is after all its great standby—is being as carefully fostered as ever, and continues to show most satisfactory returns. The claims of the year nearly equalled the premium income in amount, the company having again suffered considerably from the ravages of influenza, but although heavy, were still within the expectation. From this cause, and also the fact that the new annual premium income showed last year a smaller percentage on the sum assured than was the case in 1890, the increase in both premium income and funds is less than might perhaps have been expected. At the same time, an increase of over \$1,100,000 in premium income, and of nearly \$200,000 in funds, constitutes progress of a very solid order.

The rate of interest earned is fairly well maintained, and in this connection we note that the amount invested in mortgages on property within the United Kingdom has been further reduced by about \$30,000. As recording the results of the first year of the present quinquennium, the report is a most encouraging one.—*The Policy Holder*, June 1.

Outrages in Santos.
According to the *Paiz* of yesterday, which quotes largely from an Italian exchange, several unwarranted outrages have recently occurred in the port of Santos, which demand immediate repression. No civilized country would permit such aggression on the part of its officials, and no foreign commercial nation is likely to submit to them. If the stories told are true, the Brazilian foreign minister will very soon have a demand for satisfaction on his hands which will cause no slight embarrassment. If the government chooses to make amends at once and to put a stop to the brigandage and violence which have for some time existed in Santos, it will in great measure retrieve the credit which it has lost; if, however, it prefers to temporize and to let these abuses go unchecked, serious results will surely follow.

According to the narrative published in the *Paiz* the master of the Italian brig *Pietro Ten*, by name Mario Anatra, was asked by some custom-house guards on the 15th if a woman employed on board as cook was not there for immoral purposes. The master was naturally indignant and did not hesitate to tell the guards what he thought. Half-an-hour later his ship was attacked by a dozen guards, and Capt. Anatra, coming out of his cabin unarmed, was cut down with swords, beaten brutally, and then carried ashore a prisoner. The next day he was liberated with the admonition that he should have a care the next time not to insult the guards. The Italian consul then asked for *corpo delicto* on the injured man, which was not accorded. Shortly after Capt. Anatra died with a traumatic fever, resulting from his injuries, but the officials called it yellow fever, as a means of concealing the crime.

The officers of the Italian steamer *Mentana* being witnesses of the outrage, talked about it openly and expressed their indignation more freely than the guilty parties liked, so an assault was made on that ship on the night of the 21st by a party of about 45 guards and policemen, armed with guns, revolvers and swords. The crew of the *Mentana* defended themselves as best they could. Finally a reinforcement of sailors from the Italian steamer *Santa Fe* enabled the crew to drive their assailants ashore, and the captain then took measures to prevent another invasion by drawing away from shore. In reply to the complaints of the Italian consul the delegate of police and *guardia* nor stated that they could not guarantee the punishment of the criminals, nor verify the damages on board, nor prevent a reproduction of the assault. On the contrary they sent men with loaded guns to prevent the withdrawal of the vessel. In view of these facts the government should not lose a minute in causing

an impartial investigation and in putting a stop to the savagery which exists in that port. If the Brazilian government does not protect the foreign vessels and seamen in its ports, then foreign naval forces certainly will.—*Rio News*, June 28.

SUNDRIES.

—Dr. A. E. Costa's interminable eloquence once more flooded all other business out of the Senate on Friday. Will no one give the worthy Doctor a hint that these oceans of talk do not make the least difference to the merit of his schemes, and that the merit of his schemes has nothing to do with the chances of their acceptance by the Chambers.

—Dr. C. M. Ramirez, the ex-minister of Finance, is in bad health and will probably go, with his family, to Paraguay for the remainder of the winter. He has obtained the necessary leave of absence from the Chambers.

—There was a sensible and moderate article in yesterday's *Tribuna* respecting the English Bank. The writer points out that the application for a renewed moratorium is hardly justified, and that its granting will add to the difficulties of the market.

—We had to hold over, for want of space, some editorial remarks respecting the monstrous taxes proposed on printed matter under the pretence of protection.

—We call attention to the remarks quoted elsewhere from that leading insurance journal *The Policy Holder* respecting the Standard Insurance Company, of which Mr. B. Lorenzo Hill is agent in the River Plate.

—We are requested to mention that the Choral Practice of The Entertainment Society will not be held to-morrow (Monday) the new music expected not having yet arrived. Due notice will be given of the resumption of the practices.

—To-day is the anniversary of the birth of the reformer John Calvin, who enunciated the doctrines of predestination and eternal damnation for the majority of human beings, and whose terribly cruel religious ideas have been responsible for a vast amount of mental suffering and misery. His cruelty was not confined to theory for he was also responsible for active persecution and religious murders, thereby sharing the errors of those he opposed. Many of his theories still survive.

—We are requested to state that there will be a return polo match to-day, commencing at 2.30 p.m., Orientals and Irish against the World. This and the return Football match, M. V. C. against Albion F. C. are the only fixtures of which we are aware. Weather permitting applied to both.

—A telegram from London dated Friday denies the alleged appearance of cholera in that capital.

—There will be two performances at the Politeama to-day. In the afternoon a parody of *Juan Moreira* (we expect this is far more edifying than the original) at children's prices, and in the evening the piece itself, together with the usual circus function.

—The Company at the Solis Theatre will give this evening a grand spectacular drama dealing with the adventures of Christopher Columbus, and the discovery of America. This piece was written by the renowned author Giacometti for the great tragedian Salvini, and will therefore probably be worth a visit, though we expect it will suffer from the poor scenic resources of the theatre.

—The death occurred on Friday night of Sr. Juan P. Caravia, who was Minister of Government during the Presidency of Dr. Berro, and also had occupied the posts of Senator and Jefe Politico. For some time he was the head of the Blanco or National party, and ten years ago took a vigorous part in protesting against the brutalities of the Santos regime, from the evil military traditions of which we still suffer. Of recent years his advanced age caused his withdrawal from public life. He was highly respected by all parties, and his loss is much lamented.

—Our Argentine neighbours held high festival yesterday to celebrate one of their many anniversaries of independence. Considering the frequency with which these anniversaries are celebrated in different parts of South America, about one every ten days more or less, it is a pity the South Americans do not show themselves more worthy of the independence of which they are so proud, by making better use of it.

—We have heard nothing more about the U.S. gunboat said to be aground up the Uruguay, and expect it is a fiction. Anyhow it is not the "Bennington" that was telegraphed yesterday that she was just leaving Buenos Aires for Palos, where she will represent the N. American Government in the Centenary celebrations. Palos is a small port at the mouth of the Tinto, in Andalusia, and is believed to be the port from which Columbus sailed on his first voyage of discovery.

The Foment Committee of the Representatives has reported favour-

ably on the petition of Theobald and Co. for a concession for establishment of a factory of textile fabrics, cotton, silk or woollen. They propose exonerated from taxes and duties on the machinery and raw material for ten years; the Company depositing a guarantee of \$20,000, in public bonds, and having the factory established within two years.

—It is stated that the long promised Presidential Message is at last ready, and is to be forwarded to the Chambers on Monday or Tuesday. We were promised much the same thing this time last week.

—The "Centro Vasco-godo" will open this evening for a ball-playing match by electric light, which has recently been installed for the purpose. Some well known ball-players will take part. This novelty will doubtless prove very attractive, for ball-playing is a favorite sport here.

—Dr. F. Susviella Guarch, the Oriental Minister in Berlin, has had the misfortune to lose his wife, Sra. Carmen Ramos de Susviella, a lady much esteemed in Montevideo circles, where she had friends and relatives.

—Have you change for sixpence? asked a tramp. "Yes, replied the gentleman. "Where is the sixpence?" "I haven't one, but I thought if you had change for sixpence you might have a copper or two for a poor man who's been better days. All the gentlemen I have asked for help said they hadn't any change."

—In pursuance of a policy to which we already referred, the Chief of Police has now issued orders that names of no offenders or arrested persons are to be given to the public. This is simply monstrous and we directly deny his right to withhold such information. Col. Abella is evidently following the bad road of his predecessors. When will we get a Chief of Police with ideas advanced beyond the seventeenth century?

—According to London telegrams dated Friday the result of the general elections so far was 160 for Salisbury, 128 for Gladstone, the Conservatives having lost 20 seats. So far it does not seem that the Home Rulers are gaining the majority they expected. The MacDonaghties are reported as carrying the day in Ireland.

LONDON NOTES

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 8.
Mr. Gladstone has written to an Edinburgh elector, who, as an office-bearer in the Church of Scotland, felt difficulty in supporting a Home Rule candidate who also advocated Disestablishment, advising that Liberals opposed to Scotch Disestablishment might seek opportunities of supporting gentlemen who, like Mr. MacLagan, have voted against it. If this were found impossible, it

would become a question of choice between a Liberal in favour of Scotch Disestablishment and candidates against the entire Liberal policy, including the great Imperial question of harmony with Ireland.

Mr. Gladstone, addressing yesterday from the terrace of Hawarden Castle about 800 excursionists from Lancashire and Warwickshire, excused himself from speaking at length on the ground that he had heavy work before him. He went on, however, to refer to Liberal prospects, remarking that they never had a greater cause, a more sacred cause, a more hopeful cause than that to be decided at the coming election.

Speaking at Hawhurst, Kent, last evening, the Chancellor of the Exchequer compared the Liberal and Conservative programmes, very much to the advantage of the latter. When the General Election would take place was only a question of weeks, but the Government would seek in what remained of the Session to carry the Irish Education Bill. Denouncing his opponents for "promissious promises," he at the same time said that the Government believed that the lot of all who cultivated the land. They would be prepared to support a fair division of the rates in connection with a further development of local government.

Mr. Chamberlain, addressing a meeting at Birmingham last night, declared that the prospects of the "Unionist" party at the coming election were extremely favourable. The position of the party had improved during the last few months, while that of the Liberals had declined. He proceeded to criticise Mr. Gladstone's attitude in respect to various questions and to refer to the position of Ulster.

Mr. T. Burt, M. P., presided over the third International Miners' Congress, which commenced yesterday at the Westminster Town Hall. Mr. Pickard, M. P., the general secretary, was unable on account of illness, to be present. The chairman impressed upon the delegates the necessity of obtaining the right of combination in every country, and the necessity of perfecting their organization. The conference then unanimously agreed to the principle of forming an international federation of miners, composed of as many nationalities from Great Britain, Europe, and America, as desired to join. Considerable difference of opinion was expressed on a resolution "to limit the hours of underground labour to eight hours from bank to bank," and the resolution was passed only upon the understanding that another resolution, embodying certain amendments that were proposed, should be placed before the conference this morning.

The suggested schemes of State-aided pensions were discussed yesterday at the A.M.C. of the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows at Derby, and at the assembly of Druids at Manchester. The Amalgamated Society of Engineers met at Leeds for the purpose of revising the rules of the society. At the Co-operative Congress at Rochdale Mr. Tom Mann read a paper on the duties of co-operators with regard to the hours and the conditions of labour.

A Correspondent with the forces in the Isle of Wight telegraphs details of a night attack which was made upon Freshwater and neighbourhood and the Solent. For a time the enemy were able to hold a position on Afton Down. Eventually, however, they were repulsed. A vigorous attempt was made to force the passage to the Solent, but the hostile ships were checked by a heavy fire from Hurst Castle.

A Correspondent at Chesterfield sends an account of the ceremony, performed by Mrs. W. Arkwright, of cutting the first sod of the Lancashire, Derbyshire, and East Coast Railway yesterday, and gives further details in regard to the new line.

The Czar left Kiel at half-past nine last night, after spending the day there as the guest of the Emperor William. At dinner the Emperor drank the health of the Czar, and appointed him an admiral of the German navy. The greatest precautions had been taken by the police to ensure the safety and absolute privacy of the Czar. Traffic had been stopped from an early hour in certain parts of the town, and the population took no part in the reception of the Imperial guest.

M. Carnot terminated his visit to Nancy yesterday. On Monday evening at a dinner given by the Mayor he expressed his appreciation of the reception which he had met with from the authorities and people of the town, and his belief in their entire devotion to the Republic.

The Republican Convention at Minneapolis was opened yesterday, when Mr. Fasset was elected Chairman. The balloting for Presidential candidates will probably not begin before to-morrow. The President's supporters are more confident than ever of his re-election.

When stumps were drawn at the Trent Bridge Ground yesterday, Nottingham had the best of the match with Surrey, wanting only 46 runs to win and having seven wickets in hand. At Sheffield, Yorkshire defeated Lancashire by four wickets after a keenly contested game. Somersetshire in their second innings at Lord's fared badly, and were in the result beaten by Middlesex by 112 runs. Gloucestershire reserved their position in the match with Kent, and now held a substantial advantage. Sussex defeated Hampshire by 205 runs, and Warwickshire had an innings victory over Leicestershire.

On the second day of the Kempton Park Meeting the Midweight Handicap was secured by Ardington, the Ashford Handicap by Caste-

lar, the Whitenstide Plate by Marvel, the Biennial Stakes by Tanzmeister, the Claremont Plate by Peter Piper, and the Twickenham Two-Year-Old Plate by Sweet Music.

Sir Peter Edlin in charging the grand jury at the Clerkenwell Sessions yesterday regretted that the calendar was heavier than usual, showing 83 prisoners for trial as against 53 in the corresponding session of last year. More than one-half of the prisoners on the present list had been previously convicted, many of them several times.

Between the 1st April and the 4th inst. the total receipts into the Exchequer amounted to 14,976,526l., as compared with 15,234,123l. in the corresponding period of the previous year; and the expenditure to 15,760,287l., as against 14,779,856l. On Saturday last the Treasury balances stood at 3,733,475l., and on the same date in the previous year at 4,688,722l.

Miss Lilian took the Ingestre Handicap at Dunstable Park, Sly Shot the Stanton Plate, Shortbread the Staffordshire Handicap, Icenit the Juvenile Plate, and Lucellum the All-aged Plate. At Redcal the Eston Handicap went to Wrinkles, the All-aged High Weight Plate to Thimbleby, and the Cleveland Plate to Mr. Macgregor.

Sir Gilbert Campbell, William James Morgan, and David Tolman were brought up at Bow-street Police-court yesterday, and remanded on a charge of conspiring to defraud the Rev. Marcus Rickards and other persons of various sums of money by false representations, in reference to certain alleged bogus literary and artistic societies in which they were said to have been interested.

THURSDAY, JUNE 9.
Sir William Harcourt presided last night at a banquet in the Town Hall, Derby, given by the Derby district to the delegates attending the A.M.C. of the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows. When submitting the toast of the evening, Sir William stated that the results achieved by the Unity constituted a marvellous example of thrift and self-denial. Bearing those results in mind, he thought it would be in the highest degree injudicious, unwise, and impolitic for the State to take any steps which would compromise the position of the great Friendly Societies, or in any way interfere with their absolute independence. He believed that the question of old age persons could only be wisely and effectively dealt with by the voluntary action of working men through the medium of the Friendly Societies.

Speaking at Gawthorpe, near Burnley, yesterday, Lord Herschell keenly criticised the Liberalism of the Dissenting Liberals, admitting that they probably thought themselves unchanged, but pointing out that they had supported the Tories on almost every question, and in particular had abandoned the great Liberal principle that political rights were independent of religious opinions.

At the Westminster Town Hall yesterday the International Miners' Congress was resumed under the presidency of Mr. S. Wood (British Section) and Mr. Colinaest (Foreign Section). The discussion on the Eight Hours Day question was continued on a motion that one of the objects of the International Federation should be to obtain the eight hours working day for all workers employed in and about mines. Conflicting opinions were expressed upon this, and ultimately it was decided to adjourn the discussion until a later stage in the deliberations. It was resolved that the Federation should endeavour to obtain proper supervision and inspection of mines, including the right of the workers to elect additional inspectors, such inspectors to be paid by the State.

Miss Beatrice Potter read a paper at the Co-operative Congress at Rochdale yesterday on the question of "How best to do away with the sweating system." After some discussion the subject was referred to the Parliamentary Committee with a view to their supporting such an amendment of the Factory Acts as would place upon the sweeter responsibility for the conditions of labour similar to that already imposed upon factory owners.

The German opera season began at Covent Garden last night with Wagner's "Siegfried." A Vienna Correspondent telegraphs that owing to the recent severe storms the Danube is inundating the country in many parts, and that some apprehension is felt in the capital itself.

Another report of Emin Pacha's death has been received in Berlin. A Correspondent says that, notwithstanding the untrustworthiness of African news, the present statement is not altogether improbable, as the last intelligence received from the Pacha represented him as being in bad health and nearly blind.

Yesterday's Grand Hurdle Race at Auteuil was won by Le Gouray, Assurus and Benbur being second and third.

As expected after the previous play, Notts won a brilliant victory over Surrey yesterday by seven wickets. Gloucestershire were again seen to advantage at Bristol, where they defeated Kent by 31 runs. Racing was commenced at Manchester yesterday, Cabin Boy winning the Carlton Plate, Tommy Tittlemouse the Oldham Plate, and Mrs. Butterwick the Hartington Plate. Alice cured the Salford Borough Handicap, Thimbleby the Wednesday Selling Plate, Primrose Knight the May Two-year-Old Selling Plate, and The Heir the Trial Handicap.

For employing his son and daughter, both under the age of 18, contrary to the provisions of the Factory Act, and for other infractions of that measure, Marks Cohen, a tailor, of Artillery-street, Bishopsgate, was yesterday cast in penalties amounting to 3l. 8s. by the mag-

istrate at the Worship-street Police-court. Louis Posner, clothier, of Duncan-street, Whitechapel, was also summoned at the Thames Police-court for keeping his employees at work beyond the statutory hour. The case was adjourned.

A verdict of "manslaughter" was yesterday returned by a coroner's jury at Birmingham against F. E. Fear, driver of the Midland train which, on the 27th of May, came into collision with a North Western train in that town causing the death of two persons. A number of witnesses testified that the signals were against the Midland train, but Fear and his fireman contradicted the statement. He was committed for trial at the Assizes, but admitted to bail.

According to the Registrar-General's return the deaths in London last week numbered 1,419, or 107 fewer than the average, the death-rate per thousand per annum being only 17.4. There were three deaths from small-pox. Deaths from measles slightly declined, while those from scarlet fever fell from 23 to 12. The fatal cases of diphtheria, 40, were more than double the average.
