ANOTHER CAUSE.
In our last issue we recorded our impression that the collapse of the negotiations for the new Bank was in great measure due to the thorough failure of the Conversion scheme so far as regards the objects by which it was proposed by Messrs. Noetzel and Cassel and sustained by the Government in the teeth of the opposition of the bondholders; that is to say as a means of "unloading" otherwise unsaleable bonds and of settling the Western Railway business.

This, however, is merely a conjecture. At all events, it bears no resemblance to the narrative of notes and telegrams appended to the recent Message, and which we translated the other day.

Taking that narrative as it stands, then, the first impression it gives is that neither of the negotiating parties were working on any very certain or solid basis. Each was always "counting" on some contingent circumstance or condition, which, when put to the test, proved illusory. It confirms the view gradually forced upon the market by one disillusionment after another that Government is not dealing with the situation seriously or in good faith.

In the Message presented to the Chambers on August 29, 1891, the Executive categorically declared that in a few days it would be able to present to the Chambers definite propositions for the establishment of a new Bank, about which it added various bombastic prophecies. For that purpose the provisional moratorium granted the National Bank on its second collapse in the preceding July, was indefinitely extended and the Chambers granted the Executive 30 days for the presentation of its plans. The 30 days did not prove sufficient, however, and had to be extended, and it was not until December 7 that they saw the light. The Executive then stated that it had "well forwarded" negotiations for the establishment of the new Bank. For all that, and urgent as it was pretended the business was, it was not until March 24 that the Bill authorizing the E.P. to contract for the establishment of the new Bank was finally sanctioned, and even then it appeared that the definite contract yet had to be arranged. For this the arrival of Mr. Noetzel was awaited. He came in the end of May, and after a lot more of playing fast and loose, during which the official mouthpiece of the Nation amused its readers by its reiteration of the phrase "The Bank will come," the whole affair collapsed and the Bank did not come.

The narrative supplied by Government only opens last January, and the reader is left to exercise his imagination with regard to the preceding negotiations which had extended as far back as the inception of the Conversion Scheme, some six months previous. But, in any case, the very positive protestations of Government were not supported by the facts, as shown in the information itself has now supplied.

The difficulty which wrecked the business, according to Government showing, was the clause respecting the nomination of the President of the Bank, and the object of the publication of this interesting appendix seems to have been, not to give the public an insight into the truth so much as to throw upon local capitalists the odium of having been the cause of the failure, and consequently of the renewed crisis. We do not think this mean attempt will succeed; on the contrary, the local capitalists, as represented by the Commercial Bank, deserve all applause for their firmness, and we unhesitatingly declare that in their resistance to undue Government interference in banking matters, they have the support of the market as thoroughly as in their resistance to inconvertible paper money. The one is hardly less a calamity than the other.

It was Government interference that wrecked the old National Bank, that aggravated the crisis, that caused the failure of the first attempt to resuscitate the National Bank and that has since filled the market with distrust. It is the same cause that now, according to its own showing, has brought about the collapse of the latest negotiations on which it built so many hopes. Its very obstinacy in the matter showed that its intentions were not straightforward, and that it wanted the power of interference for illegitimate purposes, for if it had been merely the question of saving the "national dignity" it would have accepted the suggested compromise of a President with limited authority. And still it has not learnt the lesson. It pretends that it desires above all things a new Bank as the most important step towards conquering the crisis, and yet it obstinately imposes an obstacle fatal to the establishment of such a Bank. It protests one thing and does another, and yet it is astonished that the market distrusts it. Such want of sincerity and seriousness condemn themselves.

It is the height of folly for Government to complain of the want of confidence when every fresh act and new revelation show how unworthy it is. If it wants to reform the situation let it begin by reforming itself which is the most to blame for the situation.

The Minor Notes of the National Bank.
The following decree has been issued from the Ministry of Finance, dated July 30—

Considering that the obligation of the Offices of State to receive 5% of all public taxes in minor notes of the National Bank, was created by the Act of August 1, 1891, granting a moratorium to the said Bank:

Considering that this obligation was based, not only on the existence of the Bank, the working of which it was intended to assist, but also and chiefly to give value to its fiduciary emission on account of the quality of legal tender which it then had:

Considering that the said Act of Aug. 1, 1891, has been derogated entirely by the Act of March 24 last, which ordained the liquidation of the Bank, the obligation of the State to receive the minor notes of the said Bank as money thereby ceasing:

Considering that the major emission of the National Bank, as well as minor, now forms part of its liabilities, but with the character of privileged debt:

Considering that the payment of this preferential debt has to be made by the Liquidating Committee of the National Bank, with the product of its assets and within the term fixed by law:

Considering that the Liquidating Committee of the National Bank is already in possession of its post and exercise of its functions:

The President of the Republic accords and decrees

Art. 1.—From August 1 of the current year the payment of public taxes shall be made entirely in gold.

Art. 2.—Let this be communicated, ed, etc.—HERRERA Y OBES.—E. J. MADALENA.

The above decree has made a favourable impression. It had been the custom of the Executive to receive these minor notes in payment of 5% of public taxes and Customs duties, and, instead of thus withdrawing them gradually from circulation, it had constantly reissued them in payment of its administrative accounts, although they were not current, and not having been convertible since July, 1891, were not legitimate tender. Moreover, as Government reissued the notes at 80%, whereas their negotiable value was only about 60%, this implied a serious loss to the unfortunate creditors of Government, and was a distinct abuse. And lastly, there being no confidence in the Government manipulations of the National Bank, this illegitimate circulation of the notes always gave rise to the fear that there was no proper check on the number issued. It is to be hoped the above decree will put a stop to these abuses and raise the quotation of the notes.

The preamble refers to the "term fixed by law" for the redemption of the notes. The Act of Liquidation of the National Bank, fixes no term and makes no reference to the redemption, this being one of the causes of want of confidence in the liquidation and of depreciation of the notes.

The 5% additional import duties which were imposed nineteen months ago to guarantee the conversion of the notes of the National Bank, still continues to be charged. It would be better that this should either be withdrawn, or that the public should see it applied to its proper purpose and the redemption of the notes commenced. It is now nineteen months since the Bank suspended conversion, and there has not yet been the least hint of redemption, although the amount in circulation is supposed to be under a million dollars.

Since we wrote the above, we learn from the *Razon* that just before the decree denouncing the minor notes was issued, Government took advantage to pay administrative accounts for some \$100,000 in these notes! Such a piece of chicanery supplies its own comment.

We understand that the above decree will be interpreted as meaning the exclusion of the convertible notes of existing banks of emission from payments to public offices. Government, whilst complaining of the want of circulating medium, thus assists in increasing that want by denouncing the existing notes for public purposes. This is not very consistent.

SUNDRIES.
The *Siglo* has been enquiring into things and denies the rumours that Government had given drafts on the Custom House to a well-known engineer to pay for making port soundings, but confirms the hardly less ugly rumour that Government had paid \$12,000 in minor notes to an operative impresario to bring a company for the August fites. It is further said that Sr. Jaime Herrera, a nephew of the President is a partner of the impresario in question. Public disgust at this untimely revelation, which recalls the times of Santos, is extreme. The *Nacion* foams and raves with well simulated indignation at the above charge, which has only increased the suspicion of its truth.

Stamp collectors look out. There is to be a new issue of stamps in Argentina, making the third within three years. Argentina seems to be copying the example of Nicaragua, Honduras, Salvador and other little states, which have a new issue of stamps every year, not because they are required for postal purposes, but because a guaranteed sale reaching 20 or 25,000 to stamp dealers and collectors, is a source of revenue by no means to be despised. It may be added that these States show their gratitude by issuing stamps which are really handsome and artistic, fine specimens of the engraver's art, which is more than can be said of any of the recent clumsily executed and vulgar looking Argentine stamps.

The *B. A. Standard* announces that two new English dailies are to appear in Buenos Aires, instead of one. We rather doubt it; we can understand the establishment of a third, but not of a fourth, nor can we see where it will find room, unless it is dependent for support on other means than subscribers and advertisers, that is to say, unless it is a subsidised organ.

According to promise, we commence the publication to-day of "Captain or Convict" a tale by Sir Gilbert Campbell, Bart., whose name is now before the public in connection with a charge of literary swindling. The tale, which first appeared in a Christmas magazine several years ago, is rather longer than our usual selections and will take some three weeks to complete.

An absent-minded doctor, on calling upon a gentleman who had been for some time ailing, put a fee into the patient's hand, and took the medicine himself which he had prepared for the sick man. He was not made sensible of his error till he found himself getting ill, and the patient getting better.

Sr. Strauss, manager of the Telegraphic-Telephonic Company of the River Plate, advises us that the fee for delivering telegrams in the "new" city, beyond Calle Ejido, is abolished, and the recipients will only be charged with the tramway fare of the messengers.

A decree has been issued from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, appointing Dr. Maurice Molnar as Oriental Consul in Buda-Pesth, Austro-Hungary.

The Italian Dramatic Company recently appearing at the Solis Theatre will give a performance this evening at the Cibola Theatre for the benefit of the impresario Sr. F. Bianco. The programme will consist of the comedy "El Marito in Campagna," known in English as "The Serious Family," and a concert by a special orchestra. The same Company will shortly give a series of ten performances at the Politeama Theatre.

A telegram from Cadiz dated Saturday, states that uneasiness is felt at the non-arrival of the Argentine men of war 25 de Mayo and Almirante Brown, consorts of the ill-fated Rosales. As they are not due till Wednesday or Thursday the uneasiness is rather premature.

The *Tribuna* thinks that the renewed moratorium applied for by the Liquidators of the English Bank will be reduced to four months.

The Ferrari Opera Company, which is to appear in the Solis Theatre, is expected to arrive this morning, and will make its debut to-morrow, but the opera is not yet announced. We hear great things of its performance of "Lohengrin."

On Sunday, a sailor of the "Iberia" named Jacob Thomas, fell from the rigging to the deck, breaking his right leg. He has been left in the British Hospital for cure.

A peon named Luis Castellone was run down and killed by a locomotive on the Central Railway, near Sayago station, in the fog on Saturday evening.

It is said that the police are taking steps to check the mendacity—no, the mendacity, in the public streets. The latter has reached the proportions of a formidable nuisance. There is also no lack of the former, chiefly in Government organs.

It is telegraphed from Buenos Aires that an incipient revolution has been discovered and frustrated in Salta. The police, not the military, were at the bottom of the trouble this time. The ringleaders were arrested. There was a considerable exhibition of that indispensable S. American weapon the revolver, but no bloodshed.

It is telegraphed from London that the struggle between the partisans of Gladstone and Salisbury has already begun! (Parliament does not reopen till the 4th.) They are quarrelling over the proposed lists of titles. If many more such selections as Joe Chamberlain are made for honours, we are not surprised at the irritation. Another telegram states that even the conservatives are not pleased at the present attitude of the Cabinet. It is officially announced that Gladstone is unwell, suffering from general loss of forces. Lord Spencer's famous library at Althorp has been sold.

It is telegraphed from the Rivera that the *caudillo* Nio Coronel, who had been giving trouble along the frontier, has at last been seized by the Brazilian authorities, at request of the Uruguayan Government, and his band of 200 men disarmed and dispersed. Let us hope this will quiet things down.

We remind our readers that we can receive orders for subscriptions for the new daily of Buenos Aires, *The Times of Argentina*.

The centenary celebrations in Spain commence to-day, being the 400th anniversary of the sailing of Columbus from the port of Palos, province of Huelva, on the memorable voyage which resulted in the rediscovery of America.

The Oriental painter, Sr. Juan Manuel Blanes, is suffering from a severe attack of influenza.

BUENOS AIRES
A Telegraph Company has been registered by Sir John Pender, Sir James Anderson and others, under the name of "Pacific and European Telegraph Company" with a capital of £100,000, to establish telegraphic communication from Buenos Aires to the West Coast, and make suitable arrangements with the Brazilian Submarine, Western and Brazilian, and West Coast of America, Telegraph Companies, each of which shall name one of their directors to sit on the Board of the new company. The company has a concession from the Chilean Government for a submarine cable from Valparaiso to Tomé, Lota, Coronel, Concepcion and Talcahuano, to be completed within two years from date. The Government gives free use of public lands for offices, &c., and the Company may fix its own tariff but cannot alter it without giving 30 days notice.

The long pending question between the Government and Don Lucas Gonzales about the reconstruction of some works of the Ferrocarril Central Norte has been closed. Messrs. Gonzalez and Co. have to reconstruct a portion of works at a cost to them of \$280,000 gold and to refund the Government \$50,000 dollars gold.

A committee of ladies of the Society of Beneficence have presented a petition to Congress asking permission to organise a gigantic lottery to be drawn at Christmas, the proceeds of which, estimated at \$400,000, would be applied to the building of a Children's Hospital.

The cruiser 9 de Julio was successfully launched at Birkenhead on Tuesday.

A new association with the name of "Cosmos Club" has been formed by a number of young Argentines and Englishmen, with objects somewhat similar to those of the Hurlingham Club. It is intended to acquire a locality for the club at Ramos Mejia.

The following order has been made in reference to the officers of the "Rosales"—Capt. Victoria and Mohorade are to take command of the torpedo-boats "Murature" and "Jorge" respectively; ensigns Irizar, Donovan and Jaudin are to join the "Espera." Ensigns Gould and Gonzalez, commissary Solerno and the engineers Barbara and Picasso are to return to the Torpedo Central Station, and engineers Alvarez and Villarojo to La Plata station.

The Government has authorized the Railway from Balcarce to Neococha to be opened. At present the terminus will be at Quequen, about 4 kilometres from Neococha, which is on the other side of the river.

The Buenos Aires Rowing Club and the Teutonia Boat Club have organized a Regatta for the benefit of the "Rosales" Fund. It will be held on August 7th, in No. 3 Dock.

It was said that the Bank of the Nation would demand of the Conversion Office the sum of \$3,000,000 to meet the 75% of the nominal value of the National Internal Loan and coupon of July, the payment of which will commence on Monday. With this extra sum the bank will have received \$18,000,000 on account of the General Bond.

We regret to announce the death of the Rev. Thomas H. Stockton, the Minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which occurred on Friday afternoon. He returned not long ago from a visit to the United States and England, during which he had an attack of influenza, from the effects of which he had not fully recovered; he also suffered from a chronic internal painful complaint, and latterly from much mental anxiety, which deprived him of the power of resistance to the disease. His death will be sincerely regretted by a wide circle of friends, and by the members of his congregation, to whom he had endeared himself not only by his eloquence in the pulpit and the faithful discharge of his pastoral duties, but also by his genial disposition and his kindness of heart which made him ever ready to assist the poor and suffering.

The American Church was quite filled on Saturday afternoon on the occasion of the funeral service for the Rev. Thomas H. Stockton, which was conducted by the Rev. Dr. Thomson, Dr. Smith, G. P. Howard and A. M. Milne. Dr. Thomson preached an eloquent and affecting sermon, dwelling particularly upon the duty of all of us to be just and forbearing in our judgment of others, and declaring his opinion that, in general, men are better than to the outer world they appear to be. At the conclusion of the service in the church, a procession was formed to accompany the remains of the deceased to the British Cemetery. The severe storm which was at that hour, prevented many persons from joining in it and the church service who otherwise would have been present, but the large number of persons in the church, including a good proportion of ladies, was an eloquent testimony of the love and esteem in which Dr. Stockton was held, and which extended widely beyond the membership of his own congregation. The Rev. Dr. Thomson is himself an invalid, but he braved the storm in order to pay a tribute to his departed companion in arms in the Church militant. This will probably be the last burial in that Cemetery, for it will be closed after Monday. The coffin containing the body is deposited temporarily in a vault belonging to friends of the deceased, the intention being to take the remains eventually to the United States.—*B. A. Herald*.

The Government has appointed Mr. James Thomas Tillock of Sydney to be Argentine Consul in New South Wales. This gentleman is son-in-law of Mr. Charles Ledger, of Goulburn, New South Wales, for many years resident at Cachi, province of Salta, in this republic, so favourably known for the introduction of Jesuit back into the East Indies, and who received the thanks of Parliament for his patient endeavours during many years (though unsuccessful) to acclimatize alpacas, vicuñas and guanacos in Australia. Mr. Ledger is now in his 76th year, and is much esteemed in Argentina and Australia.

that we have to announce the unexpected demise of Mr. Alexander Kinkaid, a gentleman esteemed and popular in both native and English circles. Especially were his high qualities and sterling character appreciated by his comrades in the engineering community, in which sphere his scientific attainments and natural amiability stood out in bold relief. Mr. Kinkaid started in life as a marine engineer, but he soon abandoned this in favour of railway work, with which he continued in close connection down to the date of his death. His first important post was on the St. Petersburg and Moscow railway, a position which he only resigned on the transference of that line to a French company. In the year 1868 he came out to the River Plate and for some years was the manager of Mantón's dry dock in Colonia. He subsequently was occupied in connection with the starting of a line of steamships between Glasgow and Newfoundland; after which he was selected by Sir John Arnot for the delicate post of superintendent to the docks which Sir John established at West Passage, Cork. This post he only relinquished on the abandonment of this enterprise on account of political troubles. He returned to the Plate in 1884, and was soon entrusted with the responsible post of Locomotive Superintendent of the Central Entrerriano Railway during the critical period of its construction. Of late his services had been engaged by the Rio Negro Salt Co. for the building of the proposed railway from the salt lakes to the port of San Blas, and whilst preparing for his journey South he was attacked by a severe fever which has carried him to a premature grave; but it was only two days ago that his illness assumed a dangerous character. In all the numerous positions he occupied his kindly heart, cheerful ways and straight-forwardness in variably endeared him alike to both those whom he served and the humble individuals who served under him. His loss will be deeply felt by a large and varied circle of friends.—B. A. Standard.

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, JUNE 4.
Mr. Gladstone visited Glasgow on Saturday, and addressed a monster meeting in the Theatre Royal. His reception in the streets, both to and from the station, was of an enthusiastic description. As at Edinburgh on Thursday his speech was largely devoted to the exposure of Tory fictions concerning Ireland. By the quotation of statistics he disproved the oft-urged claim that the policy of the existing Ministry has resulted in the pacification of the country. In a spirited peroration, he declared the Home Rule Bill to be the Castor and Pollux of Ireland, storm tossed through centuries. Already it had produced anticipations of love and good-will. Liberals had at length found the means of meeting the worst and oldest of all our difficulties, and of substituting for disorder, for misery, for contention, the actual arrival and the yet fuller promise of a reign of peace.
Mr. Gladstone, writing in support of Mr. Broadhurst's candidature at Nottingham, says that the Irish are governed under a system which Mr. Chamberlain long ago described as disgraceful and intolerable. He could not and would not believe that the miners of Nottinghamshire would on account of their supposed interest (on the eight hours question) elect a man who would perpetuate such shameful evils.
Sir William Harcourt, speaking at Birmingham on Saturday, said that he had been blamed for having, perhaps in the heat of the moment, called Liberal Unionism a rotten affair. He would withdraw that term and substitute a better, viz., a party in a state of decay.
Mr. Labouchere was the principal speaker at a Liberal meeting which was held at Coventry on Saturday by which the party campaign in the town was brought to a close. A telegram was received from Mr. Gladstone, expressing the hope that the success at the by-election would be more than maintained.
There were further unopposed returns on Saturday to the number of fourteen. With the return of Lord Randolph Churchill on Friday there are accordingly fifteen members of the new Parliament. More unopposed returns will take place to-day, and the pollings will also begin in a large number of boroughs. By tonight nearly a hundred members will have been chosen.
Addressing a meeting at Paddington on Saturday, Lord Randolph Churchill reviewed the Irish policy of the Government, and contended that after six years' trial all doubts and anxieties as to the possibility of governing Ireland under the existing Union were absolutely removed.
The class list of honours in the Theological School issued at Oxford on Saturday shows that of the seven gentlemen in Class I. three were from Mansfield.

Correspondents send graphic descriptions of the circumstances attending the stranding of the human liner City of Chicago, near the Old Head of Kinsale on Friday night. According to one of the passengers, there was great excitement on board when the vessel struck. The officers, however, acted promptly. Rockets were fired and help soon arrived. Rope ladders were let down from the top of the cliff, and by this means most of the passengers ascended safely, the others being taken off by tugs. The position of the vessel is a very dangerous one. The captain signalled to the Alaska yesterday that it was unsafe for the crew to remain on board.
An action for breach of promise was commenced on Saturday before Mr. Justice Lawrence and a special jury, in which Miss Eleanor Barrington was the plaintiff and Mr. Stanhope Bayley, son of a Judge in the High Court at Bombay, the defendant. The plaintiff also claimed 200l. money she alleged she had spent on behalf of the defendant. Miss Barrington gave evidence as to having had repeated promises of marriage from Mr. Bayley, and the hearing was adjourned.
At the Central Criminal Court, on Saturday, a man named Charles Wilson was indicted for forgery and bigamy. The prisoner's record was described as one long career of crime, and Mr. Commissioner Kerr sentenced him to ten years' penal servitude.
Some careful statistics recently compiled and published by Mr. Muspratt, of the Financial Reform Association, are well worth reference at the present time, when unscrupulous Tories and Dissentient Liberals are misrepresenting the comparative results of Liberal and Conservative finance. Tory-Dissentient leaflets, scattered abroad by the hundred thousand, assure the voter that the last six years' stewardship of the National Exchequer has been a thrift itself in comparison with the extravagance and the waste of Mr. Gladstone's six years of government. Mr. Muspratt's figures expose the absurdity of such statements. We can only summarise them very briefly. Under Mr. Gladstone the public revenue rose from 81,872,354l. in 1881, to 89,581,301l. in 1886. Under the Salisbury Government it rose from 90,772,758l. in 1887, to 95,593,000l. in the present year. In spite of the great increase of taxation under the Salisbury Government, Mr. Goschen, continues Mr. Muspratt, has reduced the fixed charge for the reduction of the National Debt from 28,000,000l. to 25,500,000l.
Mr. Muspratt then shows how enormously the Salisbury Administration has increased the war expenditure over the figure at which the Liberals left it. The total war expenditure in the six years of Mr. Gladstone's Government amounted to 177,971,463l. The Salisbury Government has spent in six years 196,174,535l. «We have», says Mr. Muspratt, «deducted from the Gladstonian years the amount of grant to India towards the cost of the Afghan war and added to the Salisbury period the amounts spent out of loans. The Government has in a time of peace expended eighteen millions more than their predecessors, though the latter had to carry on an expensive war and prepare for threatened hostilities with Russia.» Home Rule as it is in operation in the Isle of Man will be exemplified to-morrow on the Hill of Tynwald. Here, says a Correspondent, on an artificial mound composed of soil brought from each of the seventeen parishes in the island, will be promulgated the laws which have been passed by both branches of the Insular Legislature since the 5th of July, 1891. In the year ending on that date ten Acts of Tynwald were passed. This year there will probably be about the same number. Up to a very recent period the whole of the Laws were read in Manx and in English; but of late the title and marginal summary of each clause only are read in those languages. The 5th of July is observed as a general holiday throughout the island, all places of business, Government Offices, &c., being closed, and the inhabitants flocking to Tynwald Hill to witness the ancient ceremony. «You see, Sir», adds our correspondent, «a people who make their own laws, pay all the expenses of Government, and remit ten thousand pounds sterling a year to the British Government for simply letting them alone, can afford an extra holiday.» «No dance music at Sunday performances» is as «The Lutes» points out, a regulation which the London County Council will find it easier to promulgate than to enforce. In the first place, it will be necessary to institute a commission of experts to inquire what are the elements of that style of composition; but it is often difficult to distinguish between sacred and secular music, the one being so much like the other, and it would puzzle all the Doctors of Music in the kingdom to point out the difference in a religious sense,

between some of the modern hymn tunes and the sad melodies often found in the present-day waltzes. A little time ago one of our most sedate organists was, we are assured, taken to task by an authority of the Church for using a waltz as a voluntary; nor was the complainant satisfied with the information that the so-called waltz was the allegretto from Mendelssohn's «Hymn of Praise.»
