A lighthouse required.

Probably, with the exception of the long talked of Montevideo port and harbour improvements, there are few schemes which have produced a greater variety of projects, all of which claim to be the only satisfactory solution of an important question, than the proposed substitution of the old pontoon light, which at present marks the dangerous English bank, in the river here, by a lighthouse or some other effective beacon.

The portfolio of the Minister of War and Marine must indeed already be full of plans and offers and proposed contracts on this subject, but nevertheless a new scheme has lately turned up, which, whether it be better adapted to meet the exigencies of the case than any of the others already presented or whether it be accepted or not, will at least serve to once more draw attention to this important question which, in the interests of our maritime commerce, ought to have been arranged long ago.

That the present light on the old pontoon, is quite inadequate for the purpose for which it is placed there, is clearly proved by the repeated complaints of captains and masters of vessels and by numerous shipwrecks on the running ground of steamers on the bank, of the presence of which it is supposed to give timely warning.

Señor Crovetto, an experienced seaman, in his petition addressed to the government, which accompanies the new project we have referred to, says, on this subject, that the present floating light, anchored two miles to the North East of the bank, is not sufficient as its reflection in bad weather is only visible at a very short distance, while the bank extends nine miles from North to South. Such being the case it is very certain it is high time the light was changed for one or more that would be visible in the worst of weather at a considerable distance; for a light that can only be seen in bad weather,—the only time when it is required in fact,—when the vessel is already too near to avoid the danger of which it is supposed to give warning, is not only useless for the object for which it is designed, but in fact becomes a positive danger to navigators, who through not being able to see, in bad weather, a light which they know ought to be visible, may easily be led thereby into the very danger they wish to avoid.

The system proposed by Sr. Crovetto is that employed in many points dangerous to navigation in Europe, at the entrance of the Bosphorus, for example, and in the English Channel. It consists of a pontoon furnished (1) with a cannon to be fired every quarter of an hour, (2) with a loud whistle or foghorn, the sound of which can be heard at more than three miles distance, being sounded every five minutes, and (3) with a light, visible at a distance of ten miles, in ordinary weather.

The projector it appears, proposes to make use of the pontoon at present in use arranging it to suit the new system, and also to establish another similar one. He offers to undertake the service on a contract for 15 years, to provide the necessary lights in fair weather, and, in time of heavy fog, to make use of the cannon flashes and fog horn as explained above.

Whatever the advantages or disadvantages of this system may be, let us hope something or other may soon be done to supply proper protection to navigation in our waters, a want so plainly recognized by all maritime authorities.

Parliament.
A quorum not attending on Wednesday no session was held by the Chamber

of Senators. Note was, however, taken of the following matters: the E. P. acknowledged receipt of the Law granting the guarantee of the state to the Hypothecary Cédulas of the National Bank; the Report of the Finance Committee on the message from the E. P. soliciting authorization to emit bonds of Amortizable Debt for the amount of the credit claimed by Don Lorenzo Llantada, was received and ordered to be distributed; the report of the same Committee on the proposal of Messrs Vazquez and Escofet for the establishment of a woollen factory was also received and likewise ordered to be distributed.

Those awful boys again.

Some unfortunate individual was foolish enough, on Wednesday, to attempt to give a lesson to one of the street urchins in Calle Ciudadela near the plaza Independencia. The youth, offended, called his comrades and fairly pelted the individual with dirt and stones. A policeman who was attempting to interfere in behalf of the aggressed, was treated in a similar fashion and had to whistle for the assistance of his colleagues. When they appeared the playful boys decamped, but some of them have since been caught, and will most likely have to learn a lesson after all. The hat of the individual was seriously injured in the fray.

A Brazilian Legation.

The Legation of Brazil was installed yesterday at No. 162 Calle Rincon.

The losses by the fire.

The following are the losses occasioned by the recent terrible fire at the barracks of Montero Wentuises, according to official data.

Señor Montero values his losses at 120,000\$ to 200,000\$. His establishment was not insured. Don Florencio Elzaurdia was insured in the La Plata and North British and Mercantile Companies for \$36,000.

The Carriage Factory of Messrs, Arbonet and Sons was also uninsured. Their losses are between 2,000\$ and 3,000\$. The Livery Stables of Sr. Francisco Thomas were insured for 6,000\$ in the National Argentine Company. His losses are calculated at \$13,000 or \$14,000. The Barraca of Don José Suarez was insured for 100,000\$ in the La Plata and North British and Mercantile Companies. The losses amount to \$120,000. The damage suffered by the Banco Real de Crédito Uruguayo have not yet been valued.

The works of reparation are to be commenced at once or rather as soon as the ruins of the entire square have been removed.

Night birds.

It is said that a few days ago a cargo of housebreakers arrived from Buenos Aires where they have been doing a pretty good business lately. Our police are on the look out and have already managed to take charge of one or two of them.

Carnival.

It appears that after all, Tossi will not be called upon to exercise his ingenuity in the adornment of our streets and plazas for carnival, the adornment being confined to illumination only.

Two or three allegorical cars are in preparation, it is said, which will attract considerable attention in the Carnival days, as they will refer to the political and financial questions of the day.

Education.

A Committee composed of Drs. Carbonell, Vivas and Barceló has been named to study and prepare a general budget for all the branches of Public Education of the Republic.

Telegraphs to Brazil and Paraguay.

The director of the Platense Brazilian Telegraph Company has notified that since the 1st of the month the offices at Pan de Azúcar and Punta del Este are open to public service.

Official notice has also been given that the office of Bella Vista has been united with that of San Roque, thus placing Corrientes in communication with Paraguay.

Homage to Bocayuva.

The gold card which the Brazilian residents are going to present to Sr. Bocayuva on his return here, is on view in the window of Carassala the jeweler.

The next Bull Fight.

As the native bulls gave so much satisfaction to the frequenters of the bull ring at the last bull fight, being declared even more game than the Spanish ones, at the next bull fight more native bulls than Spanish will be led to the slaughter.

The Playa Ramirez.

It is said that the Playa Ramirez has lately been invaded by several men armed with guns presumably for the shooting of birds. These bearers of fire arms have caused much distress amongst the lady bathers who naturally have no desire to become either the butt or target of unskillful marksmen. The curious thing of it is that there are no birds at the Playa just now.

A room fallen in.

Señor Bevilacqua reports that a room in the house he occupies in Calle Sarandí 248, belonging to Carrera and Fynn, fell in on Wednesday night. Luckily no one was hurt.

We recommend our builders to go in for a little more mortar and a little less sand.

Pirates.

The cutter of the Resguardo when on its usual rounds in the interior of the Bay on Wednesday night found a boat abandoned to the mercy of the waves. It contained

about 100 sheep skins that had evidently been robbed, though the robbers had seen fit to leave their booty. The skins were found to belong to the owner of the Barraca de Mayo; the boat had been stolen from the Comercio mole where it had been fastened up by its owner Sr. Escofet. The pirates have not yet been discovered, but Sr. Bechón, the owner of the Barraca, has made the finders a present of 30\$.

Nine waggons.

The fire which on Tuesday destroyed the entire block of buildings of which Sr. Montero's barraca formed part, destroyed nine tram cars, belonging to the new tramway line of which the Banco de Crédito Real Uruguayo holds the concession. These were intended for the inauguration of the line which was to take place shortly. They are valued at over 15,000\$.

For our roads.

On Wednesday six large boxes, containing implements and machinery for the construction of the departmental roads, were dispatched at the Custom House. The machinery recently arrived from London in the «Zol».

A «Charity» Dinner.

Sacarelo the winner of the big prize in the last Caridad lottery will give a dinner, at the Prado Hotel, to his friends.

Sport.

The two celebrated horses «Cormelies» and «Bolívar» which are coming from Buenos Aires to take part in the Races of the 3rd and make a struggle for the Grand International prize of 10,000\$, to be run for at the National Hippodrome on that day, are to be shipped for Montevideo this afternoon, at least so says the Nacional of B. Aires.

Yellow Fever and Matto Grosso.

The Sanitary Board, who met on Wednesday, have resolved,—in view of the official report received from the Consul in Corumbá, stating that since the 2nd inst. there has been no case of yellow fever in the province of Matto Grosso,—to do away with the sanitary observation imposed by their ordinance of the 31st October of last year on all vessels from that province.

Mr. Trimble.

We are glad to hear that Mr. Trimble has been pronounced somewhat better and that the doctors are feeling confident of being able to save his life, which at one time was considered in very serious danger.

On Wednesday, Dr. Perez, the municipal doctor, furnished the Criminal Judge with the medical report he had demanded. In his report Dr. Perez says that Mr. Trimble's state is at present satisfactory but recommends that great care should be taken not to excite him in the least when taking down his declaration, which the Judge may do without the probability of injuring the patient, if such care be duly taken.

Sr. Crosa has been much visited by his friends. He is still at the Penitentiary awaiting the result of his application to be released on bail.

Sale.

From La Plata we hear that the sale of the 14 vessels belonging to the estate of the late General Santos, used there in the carriage of stone and other materials, have been sold to Señor Teófilo Petit for 64,000 national.

Tramways.

Sr. Echegaray one of the members of the Municipal Board has laid a motion before that body, recommending that all the tramway companies should be obliged to bear the expenses of keeping their roads in order.

Metro.

The Ciudad de Londres, a well-known store here, has advised its customers by circular that from the 1st proximo, they shall only admit the use of the metro; as a measure in their establishment, doing away with the antiquated *carra y gard*.

The idea is good; when shall we see *einten* and *cobre* also disappear. A country that boasts a decimal coinage and a metric system of measurement should not countenance such expressions as *dos eintenes y un cobre la carra*.

Saved.

A lady who fell into the water on disembarking from the «Eolo» yesterday morning, was promptly pulled out again by several boatmen.

Flores Island.

The latest news from Flores Island is that the employees who were ill with influenza have all recovered; at present not a sneeze is to be heard on the island. From the «Manila» 8 adults and 7 children have been landed, attacked with measles.

From the Uruguay.

The «Rivera» came back yesterday from Salto where she had taken 150 immigrants. She will leave next week for Paysandú with 200 more who are ready for the colonies there.

Candidates.

Messrs. MacEachen and Capurro are spoken of as likely candidates for the presidency of the Chamber of Representatives during the period of preparatory sessions.

From here to La Plata.

We are glad to see «La Platense» is at last waking up to the necessity of doing something to improve the service between this capital and the other side. Competition is indeed a wonderful stimulant. Let us trust we shall soon be able to chronicle some further innovations as excellent as that which this line

has now undertaken, by running steamers between this city and La Plata, as we announced yesterday.

As the «Jupiter» is in future to leave La Plata at 10.30 p.m. three times a week, we ought now to be able to get late news both from La Plata and Buenos Aires every other day, while the facilities offered to passengers, in a hurry to reach the neighbouring capital, will be decidedly welcome, as «La Platense» will, we understand, provide all those booked for Buenos Aires, with a free passage by rail from La Plata, both for themselves and their luggage.

The Western Railways.

The contract for the construction of these railways, made between the government and the concessionaries of the railways from Montevideo to Colonia and from Mercedes to Nueva Palmira, has been published and distributed to the Deputies.

Some clauses of this contract are referred to in the message of the E. P. asking for legislation explaining or amplifying certain parts of said contract. This matter which has already passed the first discussion was down for particular discussion by the Deputies yesterday.

The Post Office again.

A public service of the importance of the post office, should certainly endeavour to carry out all arrangements necessary to the proper accommodation of the public. Why should the head office in Sarandí close at the early hour it does every day so that it is often impossible to purchase stamps there for correspondence destined for Buenos Aires that evening? Why should this office also close at 1 o'clock on Sunday, and give business men the trouble of sending all their correspondence to the maritime branch at the custom house?

The Hydrophobia Institute.

It appears that the Council of Hygiene have sent a note to the acting Minister of Government advising him that Dr. Perez has announced the opening of his Institute for the treatment of Hydrophobia by the Pasteur system, without obtaining the previous consent of the Council of Hygiene, or even consulting them as to the convenience of establishing such an institution. They simply announced the fact and leave the Minister to draw his own conclusion and act as he may see fit.

An incident of the Bocayuva visit.

The Nación of Buenos Aires says that some unpleasantness was caused when Minister Bocayuva was here by the unintentional omission of the names of the Commander and officers of the «Riachuelo», and others of Bocayuva's party, from the list of those invited to the banquet given at the Argentine Legation by Dr. Zeballos. The worthy Argentine Finance Minister declares that he'd got 'em on the list but somehow they were missed out. He laid the blame on the shoulders of Minister Guido and hence the visit the next day to the «Riachuelo» when due explanations and apologies squared the matter.

School of Arts and Trades.

President Tajes has decided to open the splendid new building which has been constructed for the Escuela de Artes y Oficios near the Playa Ramirez, before he retires from office. Besides the School of Arts, the Naval and Military Schools will also be removed to the new building, which is now quite finished and is very large and commodious.

Open to public service.

From the 1st February the new line of the North Eastern Railway going to Nico Perez, will be opened to public service.

The Tadei Immigration.

Señor Tadei who contracted with the government to bring out a large number of immigrants has up to the present brought out some five thousand, most of whom are agricultural labourers from Italy.

They have found immediate employment, only about 400 of them still remaining in the Immigrants hotel, the rest being placed in one colony or another about the country.

Sr. Tadei has brought out some with their families and some without them, the latter not caring to risk all in a new land till they saw for themselves what the reality might be like. The verification of Sr. Tadei's promises has led these immigrants in almost every case to already beg passages for the other members of their family, which request has been granted. From the department of Colonia the immigrants there have also asked for the passages of 50 families, friends or relations of their own, from Rio Negro 37 more and from Guaviyú 24.

As we have said the immigrants brought out by Sr. Tadei up to the present have been agricultural labourers, but the contractor, with reason, suggests the advisability of bringing some servants of both sexes, cooks, coachmen, etc. as there is a great demand for them at the Immigrants' Hotel, the proprietor of which is regularly besieged with applicants for decent servants. Sr. Tadei thinks that at least from 100 to 150 per month should be brought out, to meet these demands.

Argentine Republic

Rosario.

We see from the Reporter that Mr. Hugo MacLean claims ten thousand dollars damages for injuries to his dignity and eye, inflicted by Mr. Clunie of the Hotel Ingles. We sincerely hope he may

get it. In England the maximum fine for presenting your neighbour with the adornment of a black eye, is 40s.

Drought.

The South camps are suffering terribly from the continual drought and large fires are reported in extensive zones, for instance, in Santa Cruz, 45 square leagues have been ravaged by the flames, whole flocks of sheep perishing and crops being destroyed. The news received from the department of Bahía Blanca is particularly disheartening.

Municipal Loan.

The negotiation with the banking firm of Caen d'Anvers has been broken off, but an offer has been received from another firm of £1,000,000 on signing the contract, and another million in June, but the Intendant wants £2,000,000 at once.

A Good Old Age.

Dña Mauricia Leiva de Diaz has died in Belgrano, and her age is stated to have been 121. This ancient lady must have witnessed a fair amount of Argentine history.

Santa Fé.

The Provincial Bank has resolved, in consequence of the scarcity of coin and notes, to issue *celes* convertible at sight.

Tramways.

The Anglo-Argentine, City of Buenos Aires and Central Tramway Companies, and, we believe, another Company, have come to an arrangement, subject to the sanction of the Municipality, for establishing a uniform fare of ten cents which will enable a person to go from any part of the city to any other part, and, for that purpose, to change from one line to another, for a single fare. We trust the Montevideo tram will follow this example, but substituting the 10 cents by a lighter charge.

Fish.

Sr. Sebastian Canovas has submitted to the Government a proposal for establishing a fishery on the South coast, for which he requires a privilege. His boats would fish at night by electric light, which it is supposed would attract the fish in large numbers from the deep to the shallow water where they would be easily caught and be placed in salt water tanks to be brought alive to Buenos Aires. Let Sr. Canovas have a fishing station, by all means, but no privilege! The more fishing stations there are the better; it will not be easy to catch too much fish.

Railway News.

—The Pacific Railway Company intend building another railway station at Paterno, in front of the Gas Factory.

—The Buenos Aires and Rosario Railway Company have applied for official inspection of their Sunchales extension as far as kil. 232. The extension will be completed next month, and the Company intend opening it to traffic on the 1st of March. The Company deserve every praise for the activity with which they have pushed the works ahead.

—According to the official report just to hand, the following work was done on Messrs. Clark's Monte Caseros and Corrientes Lines from January 1st to 20th. The cubic thrown up was 181,000 metres, making a total up to date of 4,810,000 cubic metres. Twenty kilometres of earth works were laid, making a total of 500 kilometres. Two hundred bridges are now finished and 35 are in course of construction. The rails now stretch over 200 kilometres. The rolling stock comprises 18 locomotives, 17 carriages, 233 waggons. The telegraph wires stretch over 170 kilometres, and there are 4,900 men at work.

Municipal Budget.

In Monday's session the Municipal Committee took the budget into consideration. Mr. Seebor made a long statement in which he endeavoured to prove that the financial condition of the Municipality was better than appeared from the report of the budget committee, and that, at any rate, there was no necessity for cutting down the salaries of the employees. He enlarged upon the wealth of the inhabitants which enabled many families to spend more money in a single night at a theatre than would pay their taxes for two years. He concluded by saying that his wish was to impose the taxes in a rational and equitable manner, and that some of the items of expenditure proposed to be struck out of the Committee were indispensable for the proper conduct of the administration. Dr. Piñero supported the Committee's report and condemned the operation of paying for land with lottery bonds. Mr. Seebor replied and again urged the necessity of a small increase to the value of last year's budget. —600 fanegas new wheat from Canelones were sold in F. C. C. U. station yesterday at \$4.20 to \$4.40 the 110 kilos.

—Sr. J. Gil, the President, and Sr. R. Sanchez, the secretary of the Cia. Edificadora S. Americana have gone to B. Aires, on important business of the Company.

—The following are the exports from Montevideo for the second fortnight of January, 34181 dried and 5/2-9 salted hides, 40 bales hair, 65133 wool, 976b sheepskins, 21766b. jerked beef, 898 pipes and 403 bords tallow, 150 sacks flour, 707 sheep, 230400 cases, 358 cases feathers, 1400 sacks wheat, 60 sacks and 728 quar. cases tallow, 780 cases grease, 629 cases tongues, 350 sacks maize.

—No great alarms seem to be felt for the coming liquidation in B. Aires this month, although events in Montevideo are being watched with some anxiety. The failure of Sr. A. Ferrari, and the large sum he owes the National Bank, nearly a million paper money, has produced a bad impression on the bank shares. It is said that his assets are large and valuable and will cover the bulk of the liabilities. Operations in general stocks continue very dull, almost nil.

—The "Compañia Nacional de Pavimentación," recently founded in B. Aires, and which has many shares placed here, is announced as in liquidation on account of inability to fulfil the ends for which it was instituted.

—The statutes will shortly be presented for approval of a new mining Company to be called "La Providencia," which proposes to work coal and other mines in Casapá, department of Florida, known as "Paz y Trabajo" and "San Diego." Capital \$100,000 in \$100 shares.

—The B. A. Standard asks "who is buying all the gold?" It says that neither the Germans nor the private banks are the culprits, but beyond that it is unable to answer the question. It further states: "There is considerable surprise in the market that the Minister of Finance has backed out of his excellent measures decreasing a reduction of the currency. That reduction, ordered by Government decree, should amount to seven millions to-day; yet, not a single dollar of the currency has been withdrawn to our knowledge. Can it be wondered under such circumstances, when absolutely nothing is being done to appreciate paper-money, that the slightest demand for gold, the slightest drop in exchange, has the immediate effect of putting up the gold premium?"

—The adjourned meeting of shareholders of the Banco Italiano del Uruguay takes place today.

—The general meeting of shareholders of the Bolsa Bank took place on Wednesday. The report and balance sheet were passed and a dividend of 6 per cent approved. Sres. A. Fin, E. Cobé and E. Sanguinetti were appointed to the Fiscal Committee.

Shipping Notes.

—The steamship City of Paris arrived at Queens own Dec 31 from New York, having accomplished the passage in 5 days, 22 hours, 50 mins. This is the fastest recorded eastward passage, and beats by seven minutes the best record of the same vessel.

—Mail advices from San Francisco state that intelligence had been received there on Dec. 23 that the mate and three seamen of the British schooner Enterprise were killed and eaten by cannibals at Hammond Island, one of the Solomon Group, on Oct. 29, and that news of the massacre having been carried to Cap. Hunt, of H.M. corvette Royalist, he had the villages on the island shelled from the warship.

—Rough weather prevailed in the port on Wednesday evening and all Thursday, putting a stop to nearly all port operations. Several vessels have had to wait for their visit. Some of the smaller craft have been knocked about but we have heard of no damage of importance.

—The river str. "Jupiter" having been completely repaired will recommence service next week.

—Sr. Teofilo Petit has brought for \$74,000 Argentine the fleet of 13 steam launches belonging to the estate of the late General Santos.

—The Captain of the Norwegian bk. "Prince Frederick" has declared that on the voyage out from Cardiff, on December 6, the carpenter Paul Hausen fell overboard and was lost.

—At two o'clock on the morning of Dec. 29 a collision occurred at Tower Point, a few miles from Greenwich, between the steamers Ovington and Queen Victoria. The Ovington sank almost immediately, the steward, three firemen, and a boy being drowned. Among those who escaped were Capt. Gorley, Mr. Holme, the mate, and several other men, all belonging to Maryport. The Queen Victoria received comparatively little damage. There were washed ashore at Ascog a man's body and some wreckage. The latter comprised a mast, part of a hull, a bell bearing the inscription "Ovington, 1873," a clock that had stopped at 1.30, and a lifebuoy with the name "Queen Victoria."

«Somerhill» which arrived on Wednesday, has declared that on his voyage hither from New York, on Dec. 27 he met a severestorm which cleared the deck cargo, washing away two large cases marked F. C. O. U. and other goods.
