Saints John Francis Regis and Aurelianus.—167 days past, 193 to the end of the year.

OFFICIAL NEWS.

The following is the freely condensed substance of the Official Bulletin issued on Monday evening, too late for us to insert in our last issue.

The Purser of the "Venus" gives account of the events of Sunday night and Monday morning. The vessel left Buenos Aires with some 200 passengers. About 10.30 p. m. when she was in front of Colonia, signals were whistled and cries heard of "Viva la revolución." Six men armed with carbines took charge of the skipper, and others of the other officers. A Sr. Livardi appeared as chief of the expedition, which was in league with a similar expedition on board the "Montevideo." Sr. Livardi assumed command of the vessel, put his own pilot at the helm, and made for the "Montevideo." The two vessels anchored off Banco Chico until about daybreak, when there appeared a large ketch with some 500 (?) persons on board. It was understood they were waiting for Juan Smith, the leader of the expedition. After waiting without result until about 10 a. m. on Sunday, Sr. Britos ordered all the revolutionary people on board the "Venus," leaving the "Montevideo" free to pursue her journey. The "Venus" was ordered to go up the river Uruguay. At that moment she fell in with the "Olympo" from Paraguay, and all the passengers were transferred to the latter to be taken back to Buenos Aires. Just as this was concluded, the Argentine gunboat "Gaviota" approached the Montevideo, flying a white flag. The rebels had orders to fire on any vessel bearing the Uruguayan flag, but let the "Gaviota" come alongside, their leader thinking she was friendly. A boat put off with the Maritime Prefect of Buenos Aires Sr. Luis Garcia, the Chief of the "Gaviota" and another officer. These boarded the "Venus," and having learnt what had happened, ordered all persons on deck. This was obeyed, the "blancos" presenting themselves without their rifles. The Prefect then brought twenty armed marines from the "Gaviota" and placed them at the hatchways with orders to let no one leave the deck. A Coastguard tug which had followed the "Gaviota" then came up and took charge of the vessels of the "blancos," and the "Venus" was taken to the Boca in custody of the "Gaviota" and handed over to the Argentine authorities with all on board.

Dr. Frias telegraphs that the Argentine Executive had resolved to instruct the Fiscal (Public Prosecutor) to proceed before the

Federal Court against the members of the "blanco" revolutionary Committee in Buenos Aires. It is not stated whether any order had been given for their arrest. The revolutionaries on board the "Venus" were also detained under arrest to await trial.

The Bulletin also contains other telegrams confirmatory of statements made in our last issue. The Chief of the Squadron telegraphs reiterating his denial of the assertion that these had been any violation of Argentine territory or waters by the vessels and forces under his command. The coast was tranquil, he enemy were going towards Salto.

(Note. In our condensation of yesterday we were in error as to the "Montevideo." This vessel arrived safely in port here on Sunday, about sunset. This was not stated in the Bulletin, hence our error.)

POLITICAL NOTES.

The General Assembly met again on Monday, but only for a few minutes. The report of the enlarged Committee on the dismissal of University Lecturers was presented. After a short debate, a motion to discuss the question summarily was rejected, and it was resolved that the discussion should take place on Saturday. The sitting then concluded.—We may mention that the Report is to the effect that the dismissal in question lies within the jurisdiction of the Senate. This is signed by a bare majority, the minority taking a more radical view and declaring that the Executive has exceeded its powers.

The political agitation continues although without visible result owing to the silence imposed on the press. Amongst the latest rumours is one that General Tajes will shortly be named Commander in Chief of all forces. It is also asserted that at least one ministerial resignation has been presented within the last few days, but the President has refused to accept it. There are several other matters to which we might refer, if speech were free.

The resignation of Col. A. P. Pizurina as Jefe Político and Military Commandant of Treinta y Tres has been accepted, and Col. Basilisio Saravia named in his place, as regards the military post. The documents, which have been published, are peculiarly phrased. Col. Pizurina says, "Motives of personal delicacy oblige me to present the indeclinable resignation of the post with which I have been favored, carrying with me the tranquil conscience of having fulfilled my duty." The Government Decree says "The Dept. of Treinta y Tres being without authorities, Col. B. Saravia is hereby appointed, etc."

Comment is being caused by the circumstance that no publication has yet been made of the resignations of Generals Vasquez and S. Tajes and the appointment of Gen. Henavente, although the latter has been in charge of his post for several days now. The Decree is also still awaited reconituting the National Committee of Clarity.

Further applications, personal and general, have been made to the President of the Republic to allow wounded rebels discharged from the hospital to return to their homes in the interior, but all have been met with a sharp refusal and the men in question are not allowed to leave the city, although for the most part they have no means of maintenance here.

Yesterday's *Nacion* was quite disappointing, for it contained no pleasant and playful allusions to the desires for peace. Perhaps it will atone for the deficiency to-day.

According to our contemporaries, General Perez has intimated to his friends his intention to retain the portfolio of War.

The resignation by the veteran General Pacheco of the command of the Eastern Division is confirmed, and the General has arrived in the capital, in bad health. It is expected that General Valentín Martínez will be named in his place.

The Government has ordered the transfer to Montevideo of Col. Utubey, recently taken prisoner in Treinta y Tres. The residents of the Department are about to present a petition for his pardon.

MONTVIDEO GAS COMPANY, LIMITED.

The directors, in their report for the year ended December 31 last, state that the profit on the working of the year, as shown by the revenue account, is £25,648, which has been passed to the credit of profit and loss, and increased by interest and discount, profit realised by sale of securities, and the balance brought forward, to a total of £36,341. Out of this provision has been made for interest on debentures, income-tax, loss on exchange, bad and doubtful debts, and for depreciation. The balance then remaining at the credit of profit and loss available for dividend is £31,552, of which the directors paid on November 21 an interim dividend in respect of the half-year ended June 30 of 10s. per share, less income-tax, and they now recommend the payment on June 1, 1897, of a further amount of 10s. per share, also less income-tax, making together a dividend of 5 p. cent. for the year. This will absorb the sum of £27,096 and leave a balance of £4,456 to be carried forward. The reserve account remains at £74,000 and the insurance fund at £12,500. The 12 1/5 per cent. reduction in the price of gas, which took effect as from July 1, 1896, was followed by an increase in the number of consumers and in the consumption of gas, and both these would doubtless have continued to grow very satisfactorily had not the disquiet and unrest in political matters that prevailed in the closing months of the year at length culminated in open revolution. This (following on a locust plague), abruptly checked business, and all growth in the revenue from gas. On the other hand, the sales of products continued good; and the year's revenue from the dock, workshops tug, &c., was the largest on record. So that, to pay the dividend of 5 p. cent. for 1896, it is only necessary to take £2,175 from the balance of undivided profits brought forward, leaving intact the large amounts at credit of the reserve accounts.

Opening of the Carrening Docks in Buenos Aires.

The carrening docks have been at last opened by being practically used. On Friday the Italian steam ship "Regina Margherita" entered the dock. Early in the morning, the pontoon gate was removed and the water was allowed to enter. At 10.30 a. m. two powerful tugs were attached to the "Regina Margherita," but, owing to the wind and tide, they were unable to move it. Mr. Mihanovich, who was personally superintending the manoeuvres, had to call for two more tugs, and finally the steamer began to move towards the dock. She was profusely decorated with flags and as she entered the dock slowly an immense crowd that had collected near the site cheered her enthusiastically. When she was inside, the gate was replaced and the exhaustion of the water was begun.

Meanwhile a splendid lunch was served on the steamer by the captain and agent. The contractors Madero, Engineer Cremona, Mr. Mihanovich and others were on board.

SUNDRIES

—Many of our readers here will learn with sincere regret of the death in London, on May 13, of her 72nd year, of Mrs. Mary Solbe Hoskin, relict of the late Rev. T. R. Hoskin, some time Consular Chaplain in Montevideo.

—What on earth may this mean? An Athens telegram asserts that the Italian representative in that capital has sent to the Foreign Office a note of protest against the bad treatment of which the Italian volunteers have been the victims. They complain of having been the objects of acts of hostility on the part of the native population, not only of Athens but also of the provinces of Thessaly and Epirus.

Various facts are stated in the protest which amply justify its being made, and special mention is made of the total loss of the baggage of those volunteers who remained in that city after the Garibaldi legion left on its return to Italy.

—The Naval Commission of the French Chamber of Deputies has approved the report presented by one of its members, who advocates the opening of an extraordinary credit of 250 millions of francs to be expended on the navy. Of that amount 200 millions will be devoted to the construction of quick-sailing cruisers.

—The French are responsible for having discovered the patron saint of cyclists. A Parisian cyclist has suggested that St. Catherine of Alexandria should be regarded as the patroness of devotees of the wheel, on the ground that the martyred virgin is generally represented standing

On land was the Minister of Finance, who was invited also on board, but as he had his wife with him he could not get on the steamer, water being too rough. The exhausting of the dock was carried on without difficulty and the greater part of the water was taken out on Friday. Yesterday the remainder was taken out and the repairs to the screw were commenced.

After the "Regina Margherita" has finished repairs all the men-of-war will be overhauled. The first to enter will be the cruiser 25 de Mayo, followed by the torpedo-boats Entre Rios and Misiones. It is expected that all will be finished by the end of next month. Meanwhile Mr. Mihanovich is reported to have proposed renting the docks for \$5000 gold a month. But it is not considered a serious proposal and was made for some ulterior purpose. —B. A. Herald.

It had been hoped that some golfers from Buenos Aires would have entered for this Handicap, but doubtless the disturbed state of affairs has deterred them from doing so.

Human Beings with Tails.

Tails are not so rare among human beings as is generally thought, but they are always deformities, no race of tailed men being known. The report of the French traveller, who claimed to have discovered a tailed race in Farther India, certainly does not prove the contrary, for his own story showed that he saw only one of the tailed men, and students of the subject think that this man was probably deformed. The *American Naturalist* says on this subject: "According to Professor W. Waldeyer who has recently gone over the subject, a tail is to be defined as a portion of the body that contains the caudal, i. e. post-sacral, vertebrae, and sundry other derivatives of caudal segments, all surrounded by integument. With reference to man, Virchow, in 1880, distinguished between tails with vertebrae and soft tails—a distinction generally recognized. As is well known, the human embryo always shows evidence of a true vertebrate tail that may even persist after birth, yet in no case is it certain that more vertebral elements are present than are to be found in the normal coccyx. What occurs in tailed human subjects is the soft tail of Virchow, which corresponds to the distal nonvertebrate portion of the tail in other animals. In some cases this may be partly bony, but there is no increase in the number of caudal vertebrae."

—The *Bien* is growing witty under its new editor. It says, referring to the rumoured appointment of General M. Tajes as Commander in Chief, "Given the superior knowledge of this officer, it is to be supposed that our squadron will not again find itself pursued by cavalry, as was stated in a recent bulletin of the *Nación*."

In the infancy of advertising, Warren's Blacking took the lead in ingenious devices to attract public attention. A man with a pot of black paint was employed to inscribe on all dead walls, "Warren's B——" and then run away, as if pursued by an enemy. The public saw the joke in time. The rest was "blackening."

—Yesterday's *Razon* contains a wonderful account, pictorially illustrated, of a signal cure effected by the surgeon Dr. A. Lamas and the dentist Sr. Alejo Martinez, in the Caridad Hospital, on one of the wounded in the battle of Tres Arboles. The patient, Sr. Miranda, aged 32, had his upper jaw, teeth, palate and part of the base of the nose shot away by a bullet, leaving a horrible gap in place of a mouth. Dr. Lamas covered the gap by means of the delicate operation of autoplasty, which consists in transplanting or transferring flaps of the patient's own skin.

The dentist was then called in and contrived a new palate, new set of teeth, and an artificial moustache to cover the cicatrices. Sr. Miranda can now eat and talk without difficulty, and only a close inspection reveals the presence of surgical apparatus.

The *Razon* concludes its account by the doubtful compliment that he is better looking than ever before.

—The golfers tomorrow had better be on the look-out for stray cannon balls, as there is to be artillery practice at Punta Carretas.

The highest temperature yet known was registered at Jaco-bad, on the frontier of Beluchistan, on Monday, when the thermometer reached 126° Fahrenheit or 52° Centigrade in the shade.

—The earthquakes in East India have been very serious, doing much material damage in several cities, destroying railway lines and houses, and causing many victims. They were felt at Calcutta, Smila, Agra, Bombay, Danipur, Assam, Darjeeling and many other cities.

—The windows of the "Anticuario," in Calle 18 de Julio, were

beside a wheel, the instrument of torture which won her martyr's crown. The novel conjecture has been received with satisfaction throughout France, and already a number of cycling clubs have been placed under the protection of the newly-discovered patron.

Among our Queen's many virtues, her accomplishments are apt for the time being to be forgotten. It is therefore with a keener interest that the elder generation will be reminded, and the younger informed, by the Costa relies now on exhibition at the Crystal Palace, of her Majesty's proficiency in the arts of the drawing-room. Although an amateur, the Queen has been no half-hearted performer, for from the programmes of the Royal private concerts left by Sir Michael Costa we find that on one evening she sang no fewer than five times, and on occasions sang in duets and trios, not only with the Prince Consort, but with such artists as Rubini and Lablache. This is a performance of which few but the most accomplished amateurs of to-day would be capable. Indeed, Mendelssohn himself has borne enthusiastic testimony to the Queen's excellence as a vocalist. —*Daily Graphic*.

—The following "Reuter's" telegram appeared in the London papers of May 18. —*Montevideo*: It is officially announced that the rebels have been completely routed, and have fled, and that the revolution is considered at an end.

—We quote from a London weekly.—The question of how the men behaved at the Paris Bazaar fire is agitating Paris society, and there is very bitter feeling against some of those who escaped without injury. There is of course, a danger that the very fact of escape may be used as the basis of a charge of cowardice in some cases; but where the charge is true, the retribution will undoubtedly be a severe and lasting one. Every drawing room will be closed against the man who is proved to be guilty. It must be remembered, however, that there were comparatively few men present for a bazaar is a thing which the male sex avoids if possible. There were probably not more than twenty-five or thirty men in the building. Of these five lost their lives, and six were injured in their efforts to save the women, so that the margin of possible cowardice is comparatively small. After the noble way in which some of the women met their terrible fate, it will be a stain on the other sex if it be proved that any of the men present saved themselves at the expense of those for whom they should have abjured their own safety.

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—The windows of the "Anticuario," in Calle 18 de Julio, were

stoned and broken on Monday evening by some ruffian who objected to the exhibition of an Official Bulletin to be read backwards. Although close to the President's residence, the police were remarkably slow in appearing.

The Paris police have made many arrests, but have not yet succeeded in catching the author of the outrage on President Faure. Experts are of the opinion that the infernal machine was too clumsy to be dangerous. It was charged with ordinary gunpowder.

A sensational telegram from London states that the celebrated South African millionaire Barney Barnato, the «Diamond King», committed suicide by jumping overboard during the voyage from the Cape on the «Scot», which left the Cape on the 20th inst. The news was telegraphed from Funchal, and no further details are yet given.

The Eastern question is *in statu quo*. An exchange of prisoners has commenced between Greece and Turkey.

BUENOS AIRES.

It is reported that Mr. Miha-novich has proposed to the Minister of the Interior to rent the careening docks from the National Government, paying \$500 gold a month in rent. The tariffs would be 15 per cent less than what is paid at Montevideo, and a rebate of 25 per cent would be made for men-of-war.

The Ministry of War has received a telegram from Colonel Locaso at Reconquista, Santa Fé, stating that a large party of Indians made a raid on the Plaza colony. The few soldiers at the station aided by the settlers were in pursuit, recapturing the booty and one of the Indians. The savage who has been captured is to be sent to this city.

The Minister of the Interior is drawing up a message to Congress proposing the extension of the railroad to the Santa Cruz territory which the Southern Railway is willing to undertake.

The committee of the water-works has presented for approval a project for installing two triple expansion force pumps in order to increase the water supply of the city. The cost of the pumps and their installation is estimated at about \$16,900 gold. The Argentine Minister in London will be charged with the purchase of the material.

The municipal authorities have possession of the lands of the old Central Station and the lines of the railway along Paseo de Julio and Colon. Yesterday about 150 men were at work levelling the site of the rails in some parts.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, MAY 18.

The Turks advanced yesterday upon Domokos, and fighting continued until after sunset. The Greeks abandoned their positions on the left flank, but, it is stated, kept the Turks in check in the centre and on the right.

In the House of Lords yesterday the debate on the health of the army was resumed. At its close the Marquis of Lansdowne said the War Office entirely accepted the policy enunciated in the dispatch of the Secretary of State for India. The case for the regulations was, he considered, an overwhelming one.

Sir William Harcourt, returning after illness, was warmly cheered on entering the House of Commons yesterday. Questions having been answered, as to the proposed limitation of members' speeches, and the constitutional obligations of the member for Crews, the second reading of the Workmen's (Compensation for Accidents) Bill was moved by the Home Secretary without comment. Mr. Drago met this with an amendment, declaring that no Bill dealing with accidents to workmen would be satisfactory which did not provide for the prevention of accidents as well as for compensation in case of injury. In the course of the debate the Home Secretary expressed readiness to consider amendments dealing with the question of common employment and the extension of the application of the Bill to trades at present excluded, but added that the Government was firm on permitting contracting out. The debate was again adjourned.

After holding a levée at St. James's Palace yesterday, the Prince of Wales, accompanied by the Princess of Wales, and the Princess Victoria visited the Imperial Institute and opened the Yachting and Fisheries Exhibition. The coronation arranged was of a simple character, but even this was marred by the crowd which had assembled in the building breaking bounds and completely disorganizing the procession. Herr Eduard Strauss's Vienna band made its first appearance this season.

Earl Spencer, First Lord of the Admiralty of the late Liberal Government, yesterday gave evidence before the Litcham Committee as to the steps taken by him to enquire into complaints of alleged unfairness at Warton. He was unable, without troubling the matter up to pronounce a decided opinion as to whether the lifeboat service would be better conducted by the State. It would, he said, be a very expensive thing, and would throw enormously increased responsibility upon the Admiralty.

Considerable damage was done by a curious fire which occurred yesterday in the Fairfield Ship-building Yard at Govan. From some cause at present unexplained the loose woodwork beneath the first-class cruiser Argonaut, which is in course of construction in the yard, was set on fire, and fanned by a strong wind, the flames spread to the teak planking with which the iron plates are covered. The blocks on which the cruiser rested did not appear to be much damaged.

An exceptionally strong eleven was got together by the M.C.C. to meet Lancashire at Lord's yesterday. It was, however, not a batsman's wicket, twenty one men being disposed of in the course of the day for less than 300 runs. Yorkshire, at Taunton, thanks mainly to the brilliant batting of Mr. Jackson and Denton, ran up a total of 335, and then disposed of half the Somerset men for 33 runs. Essex met Warwickshire at Birmingham, where W. G. Grace was seen to considerable advantage. At Oxford a commencement was made in a match between sides chosen by Mr. Bardwell and Mr. Cunliffe in place of the customary game between the Eleven and Sixteen Freshmen.

Amusing passages of arms occurred in the Court of Appeal yesterday between Counsel and the Master of the Rolls, when an application was made with the made with the object of getting the proprietary chapel of St. George's, Albemarle-street licensed for marriages. The application was in the end refused.

Four bicyclists were fined at the Highgate Police Court yesterday for furious riding. The constable who proceeded against them stated that two of them were going at the rate of seventeen miles an hour. A resident of the neighbourhood, a stranger to the defendants, asserted that the pace did not exceed seven miles.

NUEVO TAPON ADHERENTE

"Mohun the Duellist"

A SEVENTEENTH CENTURY PORTRAIT.

Without having any fixed idea of a "whitewashing" my Lord Mohun's reputation, a careful search into the details of his career reveals him to us as by no means so black as he has been painted by writers in general, even including Thackeray, who assigns him the rôle of villain in "Esmond," but hardly with much historic justice. Charles, the fifth and last Lord Mohun, came of an ancient and illustrious stock, and was born about the year 1675, in the days of the "Merry Monarch," and of those fair and frail ones whose portraits adorn the "Beauty Room" at Hampton Court. From his youth up he appears to have been subjected to no control, for he was left an orphan when only a year old; his father, the fourth Lord, having met his death in an "affair of honour." His mother soon married again, and the young heir was left in the hands of guardians, who concerned themselves but little about giving him an education suitable to his rank.

In his youth, this last scion of the Mohuns, and the last wearer of their coronet, is described as being of a bright, daring, warlike aspect. The last he certainly was, for as early as the seventh of December, 1692, when only seventeen years of age, he quarrelled over the dice with Lord Kennedy, the dispute resulting in his first recorded duel, in which both parties were disarmed. Only two days later he played a sorry and ignominious part in the circumstances that led to the death of Will Mountfort, one of "His Majesty's Players."

Captain Richard Hill, a gallant of the town, was the principal in this affair. He had conceived a "passion," or "tendre," for Mrs. Bracegirdle, the beautiful and charming actress. He offered her his hand, but was refused, and this he attributed to her preference for Mountfort, the actor; an unlikely state of affairs, seeing that "Will" had a good-looking wife of his own, and was generally credited with being a fond and affectionate husband. Hill's passion at last became so ungovernable that he determined upon carrying Mrs. Bracegirdle off by force, and to this end induced his friend, the young Lord Mohun, to assist.

The two gentlemen dodged the fair actress for a whole day at the theatre, stationed a coach opposite to Lord Craven's house in Drury Lane in which to carry her off, and hired six soldiers to force her into it. About ten at night Mrs. Bracegirdle was seen coming down Drury Lane on the way to her own lodgings in Howard Street accompanied by her mother and brother, and by a Mr. Page, with whom they had all been supping. At a given signal one of the soldiers rushed forward, seized the actress in his arms, and endeavoured to place her inside the carriage. Page flew to the rescue, whereupon Hill drew his sword, and struck violently at his head, the blow fortunately falling only on his hand.

The ladies' screams soon drew a crowd about them, and Hill, finding his endeavours ineffectual, ordered the soldiers to desist. All this time Lord Mohun had been quietly sitting in the coach; he now stepped out of it, and he and Hill, neither of them very sober, then insisted upon seeing the ladies home. It must have been a queer procession.

Arrived at Howard Street—in those days a newly-built and ultra fashionable quarter—the ladies entered the house and securely barred out their ruffianly gallants, who persisted in keeping watch outside, sword in hand.

After a time Mrs. Bracegirdle, doubtless alarmed by this continued state of siege, despatched a servant to her friend, Mr. Mountfort, who lived in the adjoining Norfolk Street, with a message "to take care of himself, for that my Lord Mohun and Captain Hill, who, she feared, had no good intention toward him, did wait in the street."

Such a message to a man of spirit would have only a provocative effect, and Mountfort, who might otherwise have been out of the whole affair, presently appeared from the direction of Norfolk Street, with, it is said by one witness, his sword over his arm. He addressed Lord Mohun, saying how sorry he was to find that his lordship should countenance the rudeness of Captain Hill, or keep company "with such a pitiful fellow," or words to that effect.

Captain Hill turned upon Mountfort fiercely, sword in hand. It is doubtful whether the actor had time to draw. Anyhow, he fell next moment with a desperate wound on the right side near the short rib, of which he died the next day, assuring his friends that Hill ran him through the body before he could draw. Lord Mohun affirmed that they fought, and that he saw a piece of Mountfort's sword lying on the ground. When Mountfort fell, Hill immediately turned and fled, and the "watch" came up, to whom Lord Mohun surrendered himself without making any resistance, and with his sword still in the scabbard. He was conveyed to the Tower, and his trial before his peers took place in Westminster Hall in January, 1693, and was the sensation of the hour. After a protracted enquiry, the accused was, on Feb-

ruary the fourth, acquitted by sixty nine votes to fourteen.

Those who care to examine the evidence in this trial with any minuteness, will probably come to the conclusion that Lord Mohun was free from any intent of injuring Mountfort.

The following October found Mohun lying dangerously ill at Bath; but upon his recovery, he soon resumed his former riotous life in London. In 1694 he again figures in a duel with Francis Scobell, M. P. for Grampound. Soon after he volunteered for the Brest Expedition, and was made a Captain of Horse in Lord Maclesfield's regiment. He served with distinction in Flanders during the next two years, but returned to England early in 1697, in as turbulent a mood as ever. He had been back only a few weeks when he was involved in a duel with Captain Bingham in St. James's Park, but this time the combatants were separated by the sentinels before any serious harm could be done. On the fourteenth September he was in at the death of Captain Hill, who met his end in a confused and discreditable brawl at the "Rummers" Tavern. In November, 1698, he was engaged with his old associate, the Earl of Warwick, in deep potations at Locke's Coffee House, which were followed by an affray in Leicester Square between Captains French and Coote, with my Lords of Warwick and of Mohun as seconds.

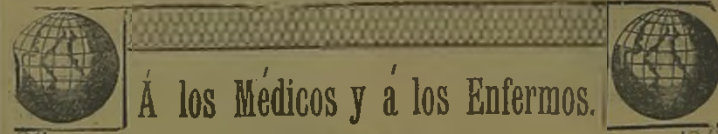

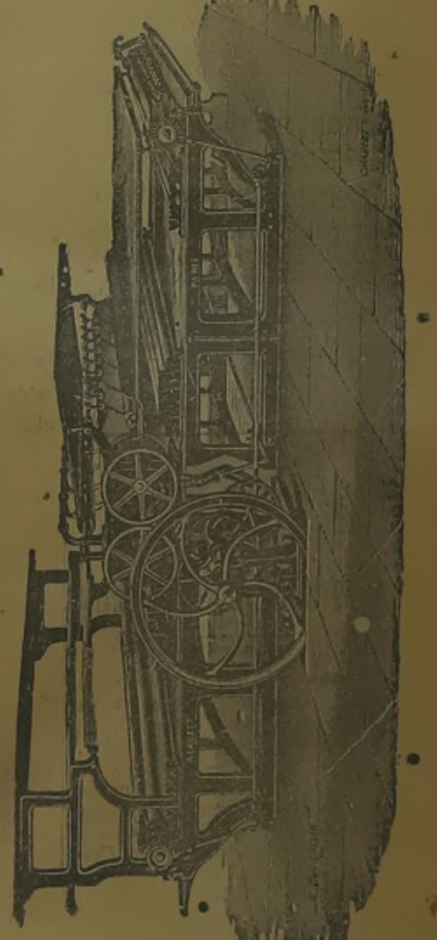
