## NEWS OF THE DAY

### POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Monday.

Acute agitation continues in political circles, and we might fill a column with the various rumours current of ministerial changes and other matters. Numerous as they are, though, it can not be said that any have any very substantial basis, and they appear one minute to be fully contradicted the next. For this reason, and in deference to the Decree, we prefer to leave them alone. Our contemporaries also contain numerous references to various meetings of political personages, conferences, formation of new clubs, agitations in regard to the next presidential election, and so forth. These are all symptoms of the political crisis through which we are passing, and the only question is how much longer it will take to come to a head.

Several legislators have written to our contemporaries desiring it to be stated that they voted in favor of Dr. Herrera's motion in the Assembly on Saturday last. This makes the majority in favor of the motion larger than was at first supposed.

It transpires that the two young men A. Tomás and A. Adami, of the Nat. Department of Engineers, who have been under arrest since Saturday, are accused of having employed the type-writers and copying machines of the Office for copying seditious circulars and prohibited news for distribution among their friends.

The Ministry of Finance reports that on the 18th instant there took place in London the 2nd amortisation of the 1896 Loan (Bank of the Republic). £17,700 nominal was amortised at the average rate of 49 3/8 o/o. The amortisation was not really due until July 1, but as the funds were in hand the Minister ordered it to be effected.

The President of the Republic did not attend at the Government House on Monday, which, indeed, has been very little of him during the last ten or twelve days. The Ministers have also been very irregular in their attendance.

Sr. F. S. Laso, the University Lecturer on Grammar who was summarily dismissed by the Executive Decree of April 25, in connection with the attempt of the student Ravacca against the President of the Republic, has presented a petition for restitution to his post, based on the assertion that the allegations which brought about his dismissal were unfounded.

### JUDICIAL REFORM

The Legislative Committee of the Senate has just reported in favor of a Bill embodying a series of reforms which, if eventually approved by the Legislature, will have an important effect on the administration of the Uruguayan Penal Law.

Avoiding certain legal technicalities and intricacies which would be of no use to our readers, the most important of the reforms proposed are as follows:—In criminal cases, the Judges may not apply a greater penalty than that asked for by the Prosecutor, whether Public or private.—The sentence in third trial (*tercera instancia*) may not exceed the maximum nor be lighter than the minimum imposed in the previous trials.—The jury in third trials shall be abolished.

The legal procedure in Uruguay is so radically different to that in England, where all cases without exception are tried and discussed verbally and in public, that it is difficult to make any comparisons that would be intelligible to our readers. We may remark, however, that in our opinion, the first reform is one decidedly in the wrong direction. In cases of crime which demand the action of the Public Prosecutor (Fiscal) the duty of the latter should be limited to preparing and presenting the case, and the decision of the penalty should be left entirely to the Judges. For the Prosecutor to establish the penalty seems, to our thinking, a clear usurpation of the prerogative of the Judges and of one of their most important functions. In any case, the Judges should, most undoubtedly and unquestionably, be allowed to apply a penalty greater than that asked by the Prosecutor, if the case seems to them to demand it. We have noted many cases here and in Buenos Aires, especially of murder, in which the Prosecutor has taken far too lenient a view of the crime, and in which the Judges would have served public interests by imposing a penalty higher than that demanded by the Prosecutor, and have even expressed their desire to do so. A salient case in point is that of the murder of Mr. Wanklyn in Buenos Aires

where the Public Prosecutor, for reasons best known to himself, has asked for the miserably insufficient sentence of 15 years imprisonment. For the Judge not to be allowed to exceed this, in such a case, would not only produce a miscarriage of justice, but would be positively dangerous to public interests that demand the adequate punishment of murder. In effect, the reform proposed gives the Prosecutor a higher authority in determining the penalty of a crime than the Judge himself, which is an obvious absurdity. If the Prosecutor is to determine the penalty, of what use is the Judge at all?

Similar remarks apply to the second reform. If the offence is one against society, the Judge, not the private prosecutor, is the only competent person to estimate the penalty. Where however, the offence is a private injury for which the prosecutor claims damages, then the latter may justly be left to estimate the maximum of his own injury, subject to the decision of the Court.

The third reform we can approve heartily. The jury system does not work well in Uruguay; on the contrary, it works very badly, and always will until the jurymen are inculcated with a stronger sense of their responsibility to public interests, and until trials are conducted verbally instead of by writing. The case of the murder of Mr. Lewis, recently discussed at such length in our columns, affords an illustration of this. It was solely owing, both in first and third trial, to a verdict of the jury that can only be stigmatised as a monstrosity, that his slayer was acquitted. In both trials the Judges perceived the incorrectness of the verdict; but, according to Uruguayan law, had no power to remedy it. If there had been no jury in the third trial, and the sentence had been left to the Tribunal of three judges, there is no doubt that the crime would have received at least some of the punishment due to it. Uruguayan Judges are by no means immaculate, but they are certainly far more to be trusted with the ultimate administration of the penal law than are the juries, and the proposed reform would prevent such gross miscarriage of justice as occurred in the Lewis case. A still better reform would be to give Judges the power, as is the case in England, to set aside the verdict and call for a new jury, when the verdict is obviously at discord with the evidence—as again was the case in the Lewis trial. At present the power of the Judges is too limited, and they are little better than figure-heads subservient to the decisions of the Fiscal and especially of the Jury.

We understand that the reforms above mentioned will shortly be discussed in the Chambers.

### JUBILEE NOTES.

An account of the Commemoration function at the New Station will appear in our next.

Our native contemporaries publish very sympathetic and appreciative articles in reference to Queen Victoria and the Diamond Jubilee. That in the *Telgrafo Marítimo* of Monday evening is remarkably well written, and gives a very pleasing summary of her Majesty's life and principal characteristics. The *Razon* of yesterday publishes a very good engraving of her Majesty. The French, Italian and Spanish papers also take sympathetic notice of the event.

The British residents in Buenos Aires and Argentina generally have taken up the Jubilee with enthusiasm, and the list of events announced by our contemporaries is most imposing.

Over three thousand children of English parents attended the Jubilee performance given at Frank Brown's Circus in Buenos Aires on Saturday afternoon, and were liberally catered for by Frank and other kind persons.

At the opening of the United States Senate on 26 May, during prayers, Mr. Milburn the blind chaplain delivered, an eloquent invocation in reference to the near approach of the Queen's Jubilee, alluding to the long and illustrious reign of the gracious lady, Queen Victoria, whose character as a wife and a mother, as well as a sovereign, had enshrined her in the hearts and reverence of all true-hearted men and women over the world. "May her last days," he concluded, "be the best and happiest of her life!"

It is understood that her Majesty has taken very kindly to the animated photograph, and has consented to afford every reasonable facility for the acquisition of films during the successive episodes of the Commemoration. There will be cameras for the purpose during the Royal procession at Buckingham Palace, St. Paul's Cathedral, and perhaps also the Houses of Parliament and the Horse Guards. Other films will be taken during the garden party, at

the Aldershot review, and, in all probability, at Windsor. It is anticipated that photographs will be taken by flashlight at the State banquet in St. George's Hall. An album is to be specially prepared for the views, and on Queen's Day itself a still further photograph will be taken of her Majesty for publication.

Of ideas for the proper celebration of the Queen's Jubilee there is, apparently, no end. One of the most curious comes from Uitenhage, in the Cape Colony. The local paper there suggests that in order to celebrate the Jubilee an extra month should be started, and called the month of Victoria. Instead of having, as at present twelve irregular months, it could be decided to have thirteen months of uniform length. This suggestion has at least the merit of novelty.

St. Paul's Cathedral is to be illuminated by electricity on the occasion of the Jubilee. If it be properly done it should be done of the finest lights to be seen during the jubilation. This dome, with its magnificent proportions, lends itself admirably for this purpose, and we only hope that the design will be entrusted to someone who will have appreciation enough of the opportunity to content himself with emphasising by means of lines of light the beautiful architectural features of the building. Such a building wants nothing in the way of stars or crowns or trophies of flags such as will be too plentiful during the decorative period.

The working carpenter is reaping a magnificent harvest out of the Jubilee. His rate of wages has risen in London to fifteenpence an hour, and some firms of upholsterers are paying eighteenpence an hour in order to retain the more experienced men during the next month.

The decorations and illuminations at the English Club were a great success, being both tasteful and effective.

The British colony made an effort, and there were plenty of red ensigns to be seen in the city and suburbs on the Jubilee days. But, where, oh where, was the flag on the British Bank and the London and Brazilian Bank?

The London and River Plate Bank was prettily decorated. So was the balcony of Mr. E. Cooper's residence in Calle 25 de Mayo.

Several English firms and houses of business made holiday yesterday. Probably the rest would have liked to, but, like ourselves, found circumstances too strong for them.

The Clerk of the Weather was again unkind, and yesterday gave us a stormy day, bitterly cold in the morning, wet in the afternoon and threatening for the night.

We must again confess ourselves unable to cope with the very lengthy telegrams descriptive of the Jubilee fêtes in London and elsewhere. That the celebrations have been tremendous and the enthusiasm unbounded we need hardly say. The Queen had a magnificent reception on her arrival from Windsor on Monday. Both Houses of Parliament have voted congratulatory addresses, the Irish members alone striking a discordant note. One telegram says that discordant meetings have been held in several parts of Ireland, which we hope is exaggerated. It is frankly impossible for us to mention the numerous incidents and events, but so far no serious mishap has occurred, though the police have great trouble in managing the unparalleled crowds and keeping the roads clear. Many persons took up their seats to view Tuesday's procession as early as Monday evening, passing the night in them. The weather in London was fine and warm. Numerous Jubilee honors are being distributed.

Mr. G. Schwengel, proprietor of the printing and book-binding establishment where this paper is printed, has presented to the Jubilee Commemoration Committee a very handsome Album, in crimson morocco with gilt lettering and edging, made for the occasion, and which was taken to the Hall last night in order that all present at the Commemoration Entertainment might sign their names therein. The Album is contained in a no less handsome case, both being beautiful and luxurious specimens of the bookbinder's art. Later on they will probably be placed on view in the English Club or other convenient place. The gift is a really handsome and generous one.

At midday yesterday H. M. S. "Retribution" flagship on this station, and the U. S. S. "Lancaster" fired a salute in honor of the Queen's Jubilee, which was answered by the Corro fortresses.

A Jubilee Present Stolen

It is reported from Hyderabad that the historical Imperial Diamond, sold by Mr. Alexander Jacob, the dealer in jewels, to the Nizam of Hyderabad, has been

stolen from the Government treasury of his Highness, and replaced by a paste imitation. The affair has caused a great sensation. It is further reported that the Nizam intended to present the diamond to the Queen this month. The diamond in question formed the subject of a prolonged suit which became a *cause célèbre* in India. Mr. Jacob, the original of the Mr. Isaacs of Mr. Marion Crawford's novel, was charged, in the High Court at Calcutta, by the Nizam of Hyderabad, with having criminally misappropriated the sum of twenty-three lakhs which had been deposited at a bank at Calcutta as earnest-money for the purchase of the diamond. The Nizam had, in the first instance, agreed to buy the stone—a gem of remarkable size and brilliance—for the sum of forty-six lakhs of rupees, or nearly three hundred thousand pounds, and the sum of twenty-three lakhs was paid as security pending the completion of the purchase to Mr. Jacob, who was acting merely as a broker in the transaction. Eventually, owing to the intervention of the British Resident, who objected to such lavish expenditure for an article of pure luxury, the Nizam declined to carry out the bargain, and, on Mr. Jacob making difficulties to the return of the earnest money, commenced a criminal suit, which terminated in the acquittal of the defendant. Subsequently the stone appears to have been handed over to the Nizam.

### The Cuban Question.

The Cuban question—as we know by our own experience in England very vexed questions are apt to do—has for the moment demoralised a Legislature. The Spanish Minister of Foreign Affairs has knocked down a Liberal Senator on the suspicion that his views in regard to Cuban independence are not altogether sound, and there is a sort of personal crisis in the Spanish Ministry. Señor Cánovas, the Premier, is doing his best to patch up the quarrel, and we are to learn the result to-day. It is not an easy task. He has to persuade Señor Comas that he was knocked down under an entire misapprehension, but he may find it extremely difficult to complete the demonstration by convincing him that honour is satisfied. The incident shows the state of tension on the Cuban question that now prevails in Spain. No one has the courage to recommend that the much misgoverned island shall be suffered to depart in peace from the mother country. Spain, therefore, will probably go on fighting for it until both she and her great dependency are ruined together. The United States watch the course of events with ever increasing uneasiness. The Senate has been captured by interested parties for a sort of demonstration in favour of the recognition of Cuban belligerency which necessarily creates great alarm at Madrid. If the Senate, however, is not in a position to proceed from words to acts, it has made a great tactical mistake. The threatening resolution has necessarily strengthened the position of the Conservatives who are in office, and Señor Sagasta will have to patch up again the tangle of toleration of the Government measures which he announced his intention to break the other day. For all that we repeat our conviction that the useless butchery in Cuba is near the beginning of the end.—*Daily News*, May 24.

### SUNDRIES

—We had hoped, and indeed fully intended to have kept holiday yesterday and have published no paper today, but we found such an accumulation of news of various kinds that we determined to sacrifice ourselves for the benefit of our readers and publish today as usual. However, we consider that we have booked an extra holiday to our credit, and may claim it on some future occasion.

Wednesday, June 23, 1897.

—The Bishop of British Columbia, who preached recently in Westminster Abbey, is always pleased when he can tell a story about himself. In Victoria, Vancouver Island, there is a large colony of Chinese, and annually they spend many dollars in the purchase of fireworks for the New Year's festivities. The Bishop once asked his 'boys' why his countrymen were so extravagant, but the reply was unanswerable, but the servant placidly said that 'English Queen's birthday comes, English ship fire big guns, much more money wasted.' On another occasion, a visitor having given the Chinese attendant a tip, the latter straightway took it to the hostess, not understanding the meaning of the present. When he had the matter explained to him, he pressed half the money into the hands of his mistress, saying: 'You have hard work, therefore you have half pay.'

—At the extraordinary meeting Shareholders of the London and Brazilian Bank Limited, held in London to give effect to the resolution passed by the Shareholders at their annual general meeting on the 27th April to increase the remuneration of the Directors, the Chairman of the Bank, the Hon. P. C. Glyn, informed the meeting that the Brazilian Government had renewed the charter under which the Bank was established in Brazil, for a further period of twenty years, to date from the year 1900, when the existing authority expired; and he remarked that nothing could have exceeded the friendly consideration and promptitude with which the Brazilian Government had received and replied to the Bank's petition, an announcement which the meeting received with much applause.

—What sort of a ruin would London make? The Bishop of London, in the course of an interesting sermon at St. Paul's Knightsbridge, rather took the conceit out of Londoners on this score. We should not make nearly such a fine corpse be argued, as some other great cities:—His lordship pointed out (says the report), that we were very proud of our material civilization, but it was nothing to that of Rome with its splendid system of law, its great buildings, its beautiful cities, its commodities more at the disposal of everyone. If London ever became a desert, its ruins would be less imposing than were those of Rome, Babylon, or Nineveh. But did Dr. Creighton remember how many of the wonders of Nineveh are now themselves in London, and available therefore as ruinous assets? As Rossetti said in his fine poem, 'The Burden of Nineveh,' those winged bulls which attest the colossal scale of the Assyrian builders may one day pass themselves off as 'ruins now of London, not of Nineveh.'

—Japan, as was expected, has presented a formal protest against the threatened annexation of Hawaii by the United States.

—The telegrams still give no definite news respecting the negotiations for peace between Greece and Turkey.

—A Calcutta telegram states that a fanatic has mortally wounded the 'millionaire Deputy Ros.' We have not the remotest idea of to whom this may refer.

—Serious earthquakes have been felt in San Francisco and parts of Mexico.

## LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, MAY 25.

Her Majesty's seventy-eighth birthday was celebrated yesterday at the chief naval and military stations in the usual manner. Parades of troops and bluejackets were held, ships in commission were dressed, and royal salutes were fired from battleships and by garrison artillery. In London the public offices were beflagged, and the bells of various churches were rung.

Yesterday, in honour of the Queen's Birthday the Raads at Pretoria, at the request of President Kruger, adjourned until today. Mr. Conyngham Greene gave a banquet at which a number of Boer officials were present and at which the toasts of her Majesty and the President were drunk.

In the House of Lords the Marquis of Salisbury made a statement as to the government of the territories of the Royal Niger Company. There were, he said, difficulties attaching to the present state of things, and they were occupying the most anxious attention of the Government. The Volunteers' Bill was read a second time, and the Infant Life Protection Bill a third time.

Sir John Gorst stated in the House of Commons that there was no likelihood of the Government introducing a Bill to rearrange the electoral divisions of London for School Board purposes. Mr. Chaplin introduced a measure to amend the law respecting the Metropolitan Water Companies, and it was read a first time. The Bill enables consumers or local authorities to apply to the Railway Commissioners to call upon the Companies to fulfil their obligations. On the motion to go into Committee on the Workmen's Compensation Bill the Speaker ruled nine instructions out of order, and the tenth was rejected on a division by 243 votes to 144. The rest of the sitting was occupied with the consideration of proposed amendments.

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N. B.—Steamers calling at La Plata to coal only with J. Mudd and Co. are free of Entry and Wharf dues.

First-class cricket engagements were entered upon at six centres yesterday. Surrey meeting Derbyshire at the Oval, gave the visitors a long day's outing, scoring 408 before the last wicket fell, just upon time. At Lord's Essex made a poor show against the M.C.C., finding themselves, after each side had completed and innings, no fewer than 107 runs behind. Yorkshire at Leeds, were opposed by Leicestershire, and scored 399 for the loss of seven men. Lancashire, at Nottingham, hit up 318, of which number Baker was personally responsible for 153 Cambridge University were altogether outplayed by Sussex. Oxford, on the other hand, gave an excellent display of batting against Mr. A. J. Webb's Eleven.

A strange story was told at the Marylebone Police Court yesterday, when a Frenchman named Louis, by calling a sailor, was charged with having stolen a chest of plate worth 200l., belonging to Mr. Hercules Robinson, son of Lord Rosmead. Prisoner is alleged to have travelled from Ireland with a servant to whose care the chest was committed, to have possessed himself of cloak room tickets when the plate was deposited at Euston, and to have finally made his way with it to Dover, with the object of crossing to the Continent. He was committed for trial.

Yesterday, the inquest was resumed on Henry Pitts, who died from injuries received in the explosion that took place at Aldersgate Street Station on April 26. Sir V. Majendie, Inspector of Explosives, gave evidence. He regretted to say that he could come to no other conclusion than that the explosion was an outrage. The jury found that the deceased met with his death from a bomb, or some other explosive, maliciously placed in the carriage by some person or persons unknown.
