TWO YEARS.

THE MONTVIDEO TIMES completes today its second year under the present proprietorship and editorship, during which time we trust we have earned the respect and confidence of our readers and have succeeded in establishing the paper on a higher ground than has yet been occupied by any other English journal hitherto published here. We have committed our errors of judgment, we know, but we have endeavoured to be sincere, earnest and consistent, and can, on these points, appeal to the verdict of our readers with clean hands and a clear conscience. We think we may claim to show that our defence and representation of English speaking interests has not been an idle vaunt or a mere catchword to entrap subscribers, but an active and inspiring principle which we have always kept in sight, and which with us has gone side by side with a determination to sustain the honour of English journalism, and the duty, to us nothing short of a religion, of fighting for truth and honesty. In this we think we have had and we always hope to have the courage of our convictions. Our inspiring motto has been that which may also be found on the title page of an English contemporary on this same continent—
"For the cause that needs assistance,
For the wrong that needs resistance,
For the future in the distance,
And the good that we may do."

We thank our subscribers and advertisers for the support they have given us through two years of trial and difficulty, and take this opportunity of reminding them that we cannot continue the struggle without their material aid—we cannot fight without the sinews of war—and that we hope that as soon as improved circumstances will admit they will remember us and give more liberal expansion to their support, thus helping us to carry out our long delayed plans of improvement and enlargement, so as to place this paper on a par with any published in South America.

A CONTRAST.

Let us take two striking examples of River Plate Justice of the present moment, one from each side of the River.

In Buenos Aires, it will be remembered, at the beginning of last month, a young Argentine named Jorge Brown Arnold, shot dead with a revolver in a public theatre, an individual who struck him. The provocation was undeniably great, and the murdered man was a quarrelsome, ill-tempered, notorious bully and fire-eater, a professional duellist, who deserved and invited his fate. But none of these circumstances can justify another man for taking the law into his hands and inflicting that capital and irremediable punishment which society at large alone can inflict through the officers of the law. Nothing short of self-defence when in peril of life could possibly justify so violent and extreme an act, and in this case there was no pretence of self-defence for it was proved that the victim was unarmed, whilst Brown deliberately provided himself with a revolver before going to the theatre. The means to do ill deeds once more made ill deeds done. But the Criminal Judge to whom the case was submitted, deciding it with a speed hitherto unexampled in the River Plate, has already acquitted Arnold of any offence and ordered his liberation without a stain upon his honour. And there is little doubt that this extraordinary condonation of crime will be echoed by the majority—let us hope not all—of Argentine Society, where it is the fashion for young men to carry revolvers and to use that resource of the coward and the bully with or without the least provocation. Arnold is now free, and at liberty to shoot dead the next man with whom he has a personal difference. By this acquittal the Judge has legalised murder and carried back the

Argentine capital to a state of lawlessness hardly paralleled in the most licentious periods of the middle ages. Such moral laxity as this, such neglect to punish crime, justify all that we said in our article of Thursday, and make us ask once more what is this new and shameful moral code which the River Plate is trying to establish for itself in defiance of the European civilisation to which it falsely pretends?

Now let us see what is happening on this side. For the merely technical offence of using certain banners without police permission, an act which neither infringes public order, morality, or the national dignity, for the infraction of a ridiculous and unreasonable law shamelessly passed to gratify the petty vanity of an unconstitutional dictator, a law which no reasonable person can be called upon to respect, for this, the Uruguayan Minister of Government is threatening to inflict on some respectable and inoffensive members of society a fine of great severity or in default an imprisonment for a term exceeding that allotted here to those who have been guilty of taking human life. The offence, if so harmless an action can possibly be called offence, would have been amply punished with a nominal fine of ten cents or even a mere admonition, followed by the immediate repeal of an Act which discredits the statute-book.

The contrast could not well be greater. The rational conclusion is that in the River Plate—for the two republics are one in these matters—there is neither morality, justice nor respect for human life, and that it is a lighter offence violently to murder a fellow being than to fly a flag without police permission.

Such morality, such administration and such laws are only worthy of undisguised contempt and open resistance. The River Plate needs yet another revolution in which such laws and their makers and administrators shall be swept into the oblivion they merit. Let them be given to posterity not as a pattern to imitate, but as an example to deter. If this be the Christian morality of the nineteenth century, let us go back to that of the pagan philosophers and the ancient Romans, for it was immeasurably superior.

A Complimentary Note.

The following complimentary letter has been addressed by the British Minister to Messrs. F. Lussich and Sons, the well-known tug and launch owners, (translation).
H. B. M. Consulate General, Montevideo.
Sept. 26, 1892.

Dear Sirs,
I have the greatest pleasure in tendering you my sincere congratulations on the services lent by the steam tug "Plata" in aid of the crew of the British bark "Kaffir Chief," which was wrecked on the south coast of this city in the storm of the morning of the 20th instant.

Without doubt the salvation of the lives of the crew of the "Plata," and especially of the skipper Domingo Raffo and the machinist Ernesto Bartolozzi. Special mention should also be made of the services rendered by the two mariners Geronimo Traverso and Angel Promone, who went at the risk of their lives in the boat of the "Plata" in order to bring the shipwrecked men on board that steamer.

It will be my pleasant duty to acquaint the Government of H. B. Majesty with these valiant deeds and the names of those who took part in this noble action.

The first match of the M.V.C.C.

The first game of the season of the Albion Cricket Club, played on Sunday last, was very successful; nearly all the members being present. The Captain requests us to announce that there will be a pick up match on Sunday at 2 p.m. sharp, on their ground at Punta Carretas, and hopes that all members who can possibly do so, will turn up, as without the united efforts of all it is impossible for the A.C.C. to succeed.

Burial Reform.
The question of burial reform, or speaking more correctly the reform of burial service customs, recently raised in Buenos Aires by Mr. G. H. Tucker, has evidently taken root, and has brought forth a suggestion that the services should in future take place in the Church or in private houses, thus doing away with that long and tiresome ride to the cemetery and back which frequently renders attendance at a funeral an impossibility for a busy man. As the distance of the British Cemetery from the city of Montevideo offers the same disadvantages, we think the same reform might be initiated here with great benefit.

The following are the suggestions set forth in St. John's Church Magazine of Buenos Aires and which may be recommended for adoption here—
One of the goodliest and most graceful features of social life in Buenos Aires is the respect that is expressed towards the Dead by the large attendance of friends and relations at funerals. The notice of burial is ordinarily extremely short, and such attendance must frequently be given at much personal inconvenience.

It is very much to be wished that the removal of our interments from the present British Cemetery to our new Burial Ground in the Chacarita will not diminish this pious and gracious custom. Yet the distance, and the time which that involves, must necessarily impose upon mourners hindrances which, much to their regret, will prevent this last tribute of affection and respect being paid to the departed.

The Rector accordingly desires to offer every possible facility to Mourners to engage in the last religious offices for the dead by providing, whenever desired, either a Service in the chapel or ardent in the house of death, or a Memorial Service in St. John's Church—it being distinctly understood that under existing regulations the coffin may not be brought into the church. This proposal has the authority and sanction of the Select Vestry. Thus all who so desire will have opportunity of giving religious expression to their grief and sympathy.

Any services of this kind will of course be arranged by the Clergy who conduct them in accordance with the wishes of the surviving friends and relatives, and will naturally depend considerably upon general circumstances. The form of service at the house just before the removal of the body would most appropriately be modelled upon the Burial Office. That in the church might be either a mortuary celebration, or a suitable arrangement of matins or evensong according to the time of day.

The immediate friends and relations of the deceased would very likely wish to follow on to the grave, and the clergy will be always willing to accompany them to make the final committal to the earth. But those who are otherwise prevented will feel that they have been enabled thus to pay their debts on the sad occasion, and the bereaved will be glad and grateful for the sympathy thus expressed.

The service in the house, in the capilla ardiente, is already in extensive use amongst us. That in the Church is of growing use in the mother Church of England and has been occasionally used here. Mortuary Celebrations have been provided for by the First Reformed Prayer Book of Edw. VI in 1549, and in the Prayer Book of 1560 in the reign of Queen Elizabeth. More and more the Communion of the Lord's Supper is being recognized as an intercommunion with all God's whole Church, and a commemoration before Him for all His servants departed this life in His faith and fear.

Politeama Theatre.
There was a large and fashionable audience on Thursday evening to witness the debut of the Sra. Boettig Walvassara, which took place with complete success. In the exacting and not very sympathetic part of Tosca, this lady showed herself a most accomplished actress of the Bernhard school. Her many passions were portrayed with reality and intensity, showing that she has carefully studied her model. We must

take exception, however, to the extreme violence of some of her transitions and to the inelegance of some of her attitudes. We cannot extend the same praise to Sardon's drama "Tosca," which seems too evidently written to order for a "star" actress, and the argument of which is unsympathetic and in some cases repulsive. The final act is very weak after the painful horrors of the two preceding. The piece was splendidly played, however, which made it more tolerable. Sr. Ferrati as Mario and Sr. Bertini as the Chief of Police both acted admirably, and the minor parts were not less well played, showing the exceptional completeness of this company which may worthily rank as equal to that brought by Emanuel.

This evening Sardon's drama "Fedora" will be given.

SUNDRIES.
No quorum in the Representatives again on Thursday. We have quite lost count of how many "no quorums" this makes this sessions. Our powers of calculation are quite too limited and we can only have recourse to the system of certain savages who, unable to count above a certain number, express a larger quantity by throwing up their hands.

Nothing about the loan. October has commenced, and there remain but 14 days for the fulfilment of the bombastic promises and assurances of Government. Government, however, is still enveloped in silence and mystery respecting this affair.

We call attention to the advertisement in the second page from the American pastor, Mr. W. Greenman. We also take this opportunity of mentioning that in the American Church tomorrow morning there will be a reception of members and celebration of the Holy Communion. The hour of the evening service has been altered to 7 p.m. and that of the Thursday prayer meeting to 8 p.m.

The reprehensible habit of carelessly throwing about lighted wax matches caused, on Thursday afternoon, an outbreak of fire in the

tapestry shop of Molino and Cerri, Ituzingato 203. Thanks to prompt assistance, the fire was quickly extinguished with a loss of some \$100, but the consequences might have been much worse.

The Uruguayan and Sanitary Boards of Health seem at last to have come to an agreement respecting the precautionary measures to be adopted with all transatlantic vessels. The Direction of Health has also resolved to carry out a close inspection of the city tumbos and livery-stables, immediately closing those which are found unhealthy. This process should be carried out at once, before the summer comes, cholera or no cholera.

Our readers should be wary of advertisements, chiefly from France and Belgium, from pretended dealers in postage stamps, offering to send goods in return for a parcel of used stamps. We have heard of several instances in which persons have sent stamps, sometimes of value, in reply to these advertisements, and have never heard anything more about it. There are a certain number of respectable dealers, however, who undertake this business, whose names are well known in stamp collecting circles, and who may be depended on to give proper value. Most of these dealers have a fixed tariff for the purchase of stamps, which may be had on application. In this connection we call attention to the advertisement of the Scott Stamp and Coin Co. of New York, who are the first dealers in N. America, and whose respectability we can guarantee.

It transpires that the Buceo port scheme about which so much was heard a few days ago, is presented by Sr. Carlos Rowley in representation of a company or syndicate. Great preparations are being made for the sham bull-fight, pageant and tourney which are to be held in the Bullring during the Centenary Celebrations. Twenty dressmakers are at work on the historical costumes, which are to be of the XV century style, and the King itself is being repaired. The Municipality will lend 70 horses for the occasion on condition that they are returned without damage.

It is telegraphed from Brussels that it has been determined to hold a universal exhibition in Antwerp in the year 1895.

—150 military promotions is the Greek gift with which Dr. Pellegrini threatens Argentina on his relinquishing office.

We call special attention to the eloquent article on "The Curse of Conspiration" which we reproduce elsewhere. If "Conida" had any experience of militarism and service in South America, she might have added a few more telling passages to her tirade against the deadly curse of conscription.

The "Sorata" arrived at 6 a.m. yesterday, but, as is generally the case, the mails were not delivered until sundown, or fully twelve hours later.

The Nacion tries to smooth down the opposition to the Silver Coinage Bill by saying that the Brazilian silver will only be demonetised gradually and with the least possible inconvenience to the market. Why, then, is not this stated in the Bill. The Nacion quite omits to add that Government will take upon itself the loss caused by the demonetisation, which is the only honest thing it can do. The report of the Finance Committee of the Senate on this Bill is expected to-day.

The banking conflict is still unsettled. We believe that the Directors of the Mortgage Bank have decided to deny the right of Government to interfere in the matter. Government invariably does something wrong when it interferes in banking matters.

The examination of the "algibes" proceeds apace. Out of 137 inspected in the Cordon, the water of 85 was declared potable, that of 37 unpotable or not fit for use, and that of 45 as dangerously bad. The latter will be emptied and cleaned at once.

The death occurred on Thursday evening, from a sudden attack of the heart, of the Sra. Maria Romero de Chucarro, wife of Don Urban Chucarro, National Inspector of Public Instruction.

It is telegraphed from Hamburg that the experiment made on Mr. Stanhope, the correspondent of the New York Herald who allowed himself to be inoculated with cholera virus prepared by Pasteur, has proved entirely successful. The cholera telegrams yesterday show a slight decrease in most points.

An explosion took place about 10 a.m. yesterday in the firework manufactory of C. Rodriguez in the neighbourhood of the Paso del Molino. The buildings, consisting of some sheds, were completely shattered, and the noise greatly alarmed the neighbours. However, no one was hurt, the two workmen employed having had a warning which enabled them to escape, and the damages are some \$2000, not covered by insurance.

BUENOS AIRES
—The Criminal Judge, Dr. Acevedo, gave judgment on Tuesday in the case of Jorge Brown Arnold, accused of killing Luis Guennini in the National Theatre on the night of 3rd of September. The judge acquits him "without a stain on his honour." At 5 p.m., the judge's secretary went to the police department and notified Arnold of this fact. He was placed at liberty at once.

—The vice-rector of the National College in Cordoba is to assume the post of the present rector, Dr. Palacios, pending an investigation has been made in the request preferred for Dr. Palacios's dismissal by the Inspector of secondary education. It is improbable that Dr. Palacios will be dismissed, as Dr. Pellegrini is disinclined to make any alteration during his few remaining days of office.

—The Executive has issued a decree declaring null and void the law passed during the Presidency of Dr. Suarez Celman, conceding to Messrs. Cadret and Ratazin, in perpetuity the lots No. 30 to 35 of the lands reclaimed from the river by the construction of the port works, consisting of 58,063 square metres, in exchange for 78,480 metres which the concessionaries stated the Municipality had taken from them.

—The inquiry into the wreck of the "Rosales" is now terminated. The President of the Republic at the request of the Fiscal agent has telegraphed to Admiral Solier, ordering his return as his presence is necessary at the end of October. As soon as this officer has made his declaration the report will be sent to the Chief of the Staff and he will send it to the Auditor, who has to decide if there is cause for a Court Martial.

—The transport, "Villarino" is to be placed in readiness to sail at a moment's notice for the Southern seas. It is believed that it is intended to send into banishment in this vessel certain officers implicated in the recent conspiracy.—B. A. Herald.

POLITICS AND SELFISHNESS.

(B. A. Herald.)

There are many political leaders of more or less importance who to accomplish their object or desire would plunge the country into civil war, sacrifice hundreds or even thousands of lives and leave the present and future generations an additional enormous amount of debt to be paid by more sweating of brow, and all for what? To obtain for themselves and for their friends the possession of power and the administration of government. This is the sole reason for what they do and for what more they would do if they had the power. It is not alleged that the President-elect is a bad man. No one charges him with being dishonest, tyrannical, arbitrary or dangerous. No one even supposes that he will not administer the affairs of the Government just as well as they themselves would, so far as relates to the general good of the public. There is not one of these would-be revolutionists who even think that matters would be any better for the country or for the public or for our future prosperity if they should succeed to power by throwing the President out of office. There is no reform in substance or methods which any of them would carry out. There is no defect nor abuse that they would remove any sooner than Dr. Saenz Peña, so that it comes to be a mere scramble for power and for plunder, for the holding and the giving of office, and for what can be made out of them. This is the low and vulgar object and end of partisan politics in this Republic. There is no principle at issue. There is no difference of policy or government which rallies sympathisers, but there is a scramble for office, a mob of place-hunters, a rush for the possession of a little brief authority, and the dispensing of favours. There are in other countries political contests, sharp and hot, but they are struggles of opinions, and those engaged in them never think of going outside the realm of moral force to plunge their country into civil war. This view of the situation is the most cheerless and hopeless for the Argentine Republic. Patriotism in an individual endowment, and is by no means so powerful in general as self-interest. There are plenty of Argentine leaders who would bathe the Republic in the blood of civil war in order to serve their own selfish ends.

ALTHORP AND HIS TREASURES.

Althorp both in itself and by association formed a perfect home for such a library. Since the earliest years of the sixteenth century the Spencer family has resided at Althorp. The house has grown with the growth of the family, and upon the walls of its many chambers hang the portraits of famous men and lovely women who have been so directly connected with its life. Some of the Cartons and early English books may have occupied the leisure hours of the John Spencer who in the reign of Henry VIII laid solidly and well the foundation of the family greatness. The first Baron Spencer, in the closing months of Queen Elizabeth's life, planted some of those trees which afterwards aroused the interest of John Evelyn. Here the wife and son of James I. were entertained on their way to London in 1603. Hence Henry Spencer, the first of the family to enjoy the title

of Earl of Sunderland, the youthful husband of the lovely Dorothy Sidney, Waller's Sacharissa, went in 1643 to the battle of Newbury, where he lost his life. It was while playing bowls at Althorp that Charles I. was summoned by Cornet Joyce to begin that fatal journey that ended on the scaffold at Whitehall. Here the second and most famous Earl of Sunderland passed much of his time, and here he entertained William III. His son, the third Earl of Sunderland, who collected the great library known by his name and sold under the hammer a few years since, here indulged his literary tastes. By intermarriage the Spencers became allied with the Marlboroughs and the Cavendishes and other great English families, and many noted portraits of these family connections adorn the walls of Althorp. But it was during the later years of the life of George John, Earl Spencer, and especially between 1807 and 1834, that the great bulk of the bibliographical rarities at Althorp were obtained. Coming late in the family history, they seemed to complete nobly the rich collections accumulated in the old house during three centuries of strong vigorous life. To the historic imagination it appears fitting that a mansion enriched by so many memories of kings, statesmen, nobles, poets, and beauties should add to its family portraits by Vandeyck and Lely, and Reynolds and Gainsborough, to its masterpieces by Raphael and Rembrandt and Teniers, the library so amply supplied with all most cherished and sought for in bibliography. To the practical mind of to-day it seems even more fitting to take these thousands of books from where they could be consulted only by tens, and place them where they may delight and interest and educate thousands. Glance for a moment or two through the stately rooms where the volumes are disturbed from their half-century's repose. Wherever they turn it falls upon volumes which are a treat to see—a luxury to handle. It is not so much the number which impresses one as their choice quality! At every turn magnificent examples of all the past masters in the art of binding abound. You take down a volume at hazard, and discover that it is an early classic, printed upon pure and lovely vellum, and as clean as the day it left the printer's hands. You see long rows of huge folios, and on closer inspection discover that they are not only a complete set of the great Bible Polyglots, but that two of them, the Antwerp and Walton's, are on large paper—books to make any ordinary collector at once break the Tenth Commandment and give way to despair.—Speaker.

THE FACTS ABOUT RAIN-MAKING.

George E. Curtis, Meteorologist to the recent Government Rain-making Expedition, discusses in the New York Engineering Magazine the recent experiments to produce rain by means of aerial explosions.—Examined in detail, with all the attendant circumstances, it is evident that the experiments have utterly failed to demonstrate that explosions can develop a storm, or can produce a measurable rain, and they have been not only unsuccessful in result, but meagre and trivial in themselves. After the conclusion of these experiments, two members of the party continued operations at El Paso, and at a point near San Diego Texas. The explosions are said to have been on a more extended scale. But a careful study of the report of these operations and the attendant weather fails, however, to assure me that the results were any more conclusive. But while, for all practical results, the explosions at Midland were a failure, they afforded one fact of scientific interest. In several instances, when a dense, threatening cloud was overhead, a sharp, detonating explosion was followed, after an interval of twenty or thirty seconds, by a spatter of rain, or, if it was already sprinkling, the blast was followed by a noticeable momentary increase of the drops. This result occurred a sufficient number of times to indicate that the phenomenon was a real result of the explosions. But this is not what the experiments were designed to accomplish. It was supposed that rain might be produced in measurable quantity whenever and wherever needed. The Government appropriation has been expended, and we are no nearer the desired result than before. The mere waste of the 9,000 dollars is a trifle, but the misconceptions to which the reported successes have given rise render the matter very serious. Charlatans and sharpers have not been slow to seize the opportunity. Artificial-rain companies have sprung up, and are now busily engaged in defrauding the farmers of the semi-arid States by contracting to produce rain, and by selling "rights" to use their various methods. In South Dakota the subject has become one of the vital questions of the day. This aftermath of the rain-making experiments serves as an excellent warning. For the honour and good name of the Government and of science, it would be well if we had seen the last appropriation to produce rain by bombarding the heavens, and the last expedition which should mislead the people by sending out premature and sensational reports.

THE CURSE OF CONSCRIPTION.

SOME PLAIN WORDS FROM "OUIDA." In the Fortnightly Review Ouida crosses swords with Lord Wolsley for his praise of conscription. Although disclaiming any authority to speak on military matters, she says she thinks she knows more of the effects of compulsory service than does Lord Wolsley, and she gives the reasons for the faith that is

within her in a vigorous article, the key note of which is the declaration that "conscription is the pole-axe with which the patient citizen or labourer is brainned, and it is cut from the wood of his own roof tree." "Ouida" stoutly denies that the soldier is the highest type of humanity, or that obedience is the highest human virtue. The obedience which is exacted from the soldier is very much like slavery, and it is no moral act and teaches no virtue:—
"There is no servant, groom, artisan, farm-labourer, or hireling of any kind so lazy, so impudent, so insubordinate, and so useless as the young man who has recently come out from his term of compulsory service. When Lord Wolsley utters the preposterous declaration that the education given by conscription teaches a lad 'all the qualities calculated to make him a thoroughly useful and loyal citizen,' has he the least idea of what is the actual moral state of the barracks-yards and barracks-rooms of the armies of the Continent? Has he ever reflected on the inevitable results of the pell-mell confusion with which the clean-living young sons of gentle-people and bourgeoisie are flung together with the lowest ruffians from the cellars of the cities and the caves of the mountains? Will he even credit how constantly the healthy, hard-working, obedient lad from the farm-side or the counting-house, who left his people happy in his duties and clean in body and mind, comes back to them, when his time is over, cankered body and soul, eaten with disease, scornful of simple was, too useless to work, too depraved to wed, too puffed up with foul desires and braggart conceits to earn the bread which he considers his father and brothers bound to labour to provide for him?"

"When the youth has had purity and strength of character and of mind enough to resist the contagion in which he has been steeped, he will in nine instances out of ten be a spoilt agriculturist, artisan, student, labourer. I can conceive nothing so appalling to the world as would be the forcing of the military temper down the throats of its entire multitudes. Militarism is the negotiation of individuality, of originality, and of free liberty. Its sombre shadow is spread over Europe; its garroting collar of steel is on the throat of the people. The whole people sweat, groan, perish under the burdens laid upon them for the maintenance of the vast battalions of young men imprisoned in barracks-yards in enforced idleness and semi-starvation, whilst the fruitful lands of the Venetio, of Apulia, of the Emilia, of Sardinia, and of Calabria lie untilled under the blue skies, the soil crying for its sons, the spade and the scythe rusting, whilst the accursed sabre and musket shine." These remarks may be respectfully commended to Lord Wolsley and all those who like him imagine that it would be an advantage to England to do away with the one boon which the encircling sea gives her which no other European nation possesses.—Review of Reviews.

THE PAYMENT OF MEMBERS.

A writer in the European Mail says:—"A bill for this purpose" will be brought before the House at the first opportunity. Some members are terribly keen over this project. Can we wonder? Was there ever an M.P. who did not serve his country and his constituents at a vast sacrifice? When it is passed every solicitor's clerk with a taste for leading the mob will have a new profession opened for him. It has been stated that members were not readily forthcoming at the late election. Will they not flock in crowds when our public men are paid like civil servant clerks, as well as honoured as M.P.s? The world will have new openings for its sons!
