BAD LEGISLATION.

The Chamber of Representatives, not content with having just passed the mischievous Silver Coinage Bill, did another bad day's work on Tuesday in sanctioning the not less mischievous Bill of increased duties on printed matter. The more we consider this Bill, the less we like it, for a study of its details shows more and more clearly that the effects of the practically prohibitory duties imposed will be felt throughout almost every branch of commerce and industry and in many other ways as well. When it is considered how important a part printing and stationery play in the daily life of a large (we cannot just now add busy) city, this becomes evident. One of the first effects of the Bill will be greatly to increase the price of all European printed books, irrespective of their contents or authorship. This will be felt by literary and professional men, students, schoolmasters and parents, and the reading public generally. Another effect will be practically to prohibit the introduction of such advertising material as show cards, coloured posters, pictures, and the like, thereby considerably prejudicing many importing and retail businesses. All commercial houses and others using large quantities of stationery and printed forms, will also be affected, as they will be forced to pay higher prices and perhaps have to put up with inferior workmanship as well. Even the ordinary correspondent will suffer on account of the prohibitory duties imposed on writing paper, envelopes, and such little trifles as birthday and Christmas cards. In fact, there is scarcely any one who will not be made to feel the pernicious effects of this Bill in one form or another.

Nothing could be fairer than the pretence of protection under which this Bill is being advocated. It is simply idiotic to pretend that European literary, scientific or other works can be printed here, or are ever likely to be produced by any local industry. What house here is ever likely to print a Webster's Dictionary, an "Almanach de Gotha," Zola's "Debut," or any other work of pleasure or reference, the sale of which in this city perhaps does not reach 500 copies? And yet, under the false pretence of protecting local industries, all who have occasion to use these works will now be called upon to pay an exorbitant tax. Similar remarks apply to nearly every other article specified in the Bill, for in truth there are hardly half a dozen of all those mentioned which can be produced here in conditions favourable to the consumer. Moreover, the utter falsity of the whole pretence of protection is shown by the action of the Chambers in cutting out the only article that was really protective and unobjectionable, namely that suppressing the import duty on printing machinery and material. In fact, throughout the Bill we see nothing beyond an insane desire to tax, tax, tax, however disastrous and maleficent the consequences to the market and the city in general. That is not legislation, nor could such measures ever emanate from Chambers which had the least perception of or sympathy with the interests of the people.

We must repeat again and again that if the printing industry is languishing and unprofitable, it is not from want of "protection" of this class, for not all the duties in the world will ever obtain for local houses orders to produce one tenth of the goods taxed in this Bill; it is simply suffering from the same causes as many other industries, namely an oppressive system of general over-taxation and excessive protection which swallows up the profits, renders development impossible and makes labour and living dear. In seeking for more "protection" the printing industry is merely increasing the evils from which it already suffers, besides imposing an undoubted burden on the many for the very doubtful benefit of the few.

Thanks to bad government and over taxation, life in this unhappy republic, which should be one of the most favoured spots on the face of the globe and which enjoys so many natural advantages, is already difficult and undesirable. A little more legislation of the character with which the Chambers and Government have recently favoured us with, and it will become entirely impossible, and there will be no resource left but wholesale emigration and the general abandonment of all business. If that is the end for which Government is working, it seems on the right road to attain it. We have not much faith left in the Chamber of Senators, which, for all its talk and boasted independence, has shown itself as little careful of the interests of the people as the other Chamber; still, let us hope that it will not pass this Bill without perception of the mischief it is likely to cause, and without radical reform—the best reform being to confine the Bill to the exoneratory article so carefully repressed by the Representatives.

NEWS OF THE DAY

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Representatives, on Tuesday, the petition of various city proprietors against the Government Bill concerning municipal taxes was referred to the Committee of Finance. Some other routine business was transacted.

The modifications introduced by the Senate in the Silver Coinage Bill were approved without remark.

The annual Bill of Licences (patentes) on Rolling Stock was approved in detail with some modifications of a secondary character.

The Bill imposing increased duties on printed matter, etc., was put in discussion in detail. Sr. Vigil made a few attempts to modify some of the clauses of the Bill, showing that they would simply result in prejudice to the consumer without assisting any industry, but his efforts were all unsuccessful. The article concerning printing machinery and loose paper and cardboard from import duties was rejected, leaving them subject to a duty of 8 per cent. It was agreed that the Bill should come into force within 15 days from the date of its promulgation. The rest of the Bill was passed without modification.

The sitting then terminated.

Silver Coinage.
The Chambers having finally sanctioned the Government project for Silver Coinage, the Executive has lost no time in signing and promulgating it, so that it is now Law. The Nation affirms that Government has already received some advantageous proposals for the coinage thus authorised.

As the Bill has undergone some modifications, we repeat below the articles of public interest, omitting those referring to technical details, (translation.)

Art. 1.—The Executive Power is hereby authorised to have coined up to the sum of three million dollars silver, divided into pieces of \$1, 50 cents, 20 cents and 10 cents, with a uniform law of nine parts of fine metal and one of copper of good quality under tolerance of two milligrams.

The coining shall be effected in two series, of which the first shall not exceed two millions.

The contract for the coining of the second series shall only be effected when the E.P. shall have received and put into circulation the first.

Art. 4.—The E. P. may contract for the coining of the silver by call for tenders or directly with the proprietor who may offer best advantages for the State, as it deems convenient.

In both cases there shall be taken as base for the operation the price of silver bars in Europe at the moment of the contract, and to this price shall be added the total of commissions, expenses and interests occasioned by the operation, and which shall be those usual for this kind of contracts.

Art. 5.—The payment of the coining of silver authorised by this Law may be made by the E. P. in cash, or in bills on the Custom House for terms of not less than 90 days and bearing interest of not more than 6 % per annum.

Art. 7.—In payments under \$10, up to \$5 may be made in silver.

For larger quantities the following scale shall rule:—
From \$10 to \$25, 30 percent
" 25 " 100, 20 " "
" 100 " 500, 10 " "
" 500 " 5000, 5 " "
For over \$5000, 2 " "

Art. 8.—All or part of the coining authorised by this Law being realised, the E. P. shall prohibit throughout the Republic the circulation of silver not of national coinage.

Without prejudice to that determined by the preceding paragraph, the importation of all silver of foreign coinage shall be strictly prohibited from the promulgation of this Law.

The infraction of this disposition shall be considered as an offence of

contraband and punished in accordance with the Laws now in force.

Art. 9.—When this operation is realised, account shall be given to the H. General Assembly of the profits arising therefrom, and the H. G. A. shall determine the convenient application of the same.

SUNDRIES.

The Silver Coinage Bill is now Law, and it is as well to remember that by this the importation of foreign silver is rendered contraband. We presume this does not apply to the silver change a foreigner may have in his pocket on landing, and is merely intended to refer to silver introduced for purposes of general circulation, though with the usual carelessness of laws drawn up by the present Government, this is not specified.

The majority of men in the Government and the Chambers, are, at all events call themselves, Doctors of Law, and yet they cannot, as a rule, frame a law which shall be clear, explicit, comprehensive and grammatical. If they cannot do this, which is their profession, what success may be expected of them when they meddle with banking, finance and other matters which are neither their profession nor their business?

The framers of the Bill on printed matter have not been thorough or consistent. Since newspapers are a staple product of local printing firms, they should have "protected" the local industry by proposing a prohibitory duty on the introduction of foreign newspapers, magazines and reviews. That the republic would be thus deprived of news and of information of the world's progress and thought, would be, of course, quite an insignificant consideration in the eyes of the protectionists. It is just as reasonable and consistent to imagine that local printing industry will be assisted by impeding the introduction of the London Times, the Paris Figaro, or the Berlin Deutsche Zeitung, as by impeding the introduction of the products of the European press, the Christmas cards of De La Rue, or the pictorial advertisements of Pear's Soap or Beecham's Pills. For our part, if we allowed personal interests to weigh, we should be very pleased to see a prohibitory tax imposed on English papers from London, New York, Buenos Aires or elsewhere, so that we might have a practical monopoly of supplying the English-reading public with news. Such "protection" would be quite as justifiable as any proposed in the Bill. Once this "protection" game is fairly started, there are no limits to its extent.

Our readers are reminded that the first of the proposed course of "Health Lectures" will be given at the Latone Memorial Hall at 8.30 this evening, when H. B. M. Minister, E. Satow Esq., will discourse on "Japan," an interesting subject on which he is eminently qualified to speak. We hope to be able to record a large attendance. All are freely invited, and there is no charge for admission.

We were amused as well as surprised yesterday by the appearance of a new contemporary called *La Propaganda Comercial*, of which 20,000 leaves are said to be distributed gratis. This new journalistic enterprise disdains such ordinary steps to success as advertisers and subscribers, nor does it even pretend to favour its readers with vulgar news, but it confines itself to the celebration of the advantages of certain firms and their products in doggerel verse. An inspired bard is kept on the premises and for a not exorbitant fee is prepared to immortalise (more or less) any particular business in hexameters, or pentameters, or Alexandrines, as occasion may suit, and in order that there may not be the least doubt as to the intention, the subject thus versified to order is displayed in capital letters. We wish this new and extraordinary departure in journalism all that success which we think it has not the slightest probability of attaining.

N. American papers announce the death at Danville of Dr. James M. Ayer, for many years resident in Buenos Aires, which he left in 1886 on account of failing health.

Some Spaniards have been wishing to establish bull-fighting in Chicago. Mr. Taylor, of Chicago, thereupon telegraphed to Mr. John G. Shortall, President of the Illinois Humane Society, who is now in Paris, and asked him whether "bullfighting, same as in Paris," was a thing which the society could permit in Chicago. Mr. Shortall has gone to see the so-called sport in the Bois de Boulogne, and having formed his conclusions from what took place there he has sent the following message by cable to Mr. Taylor: "Permission refused; would arrest promptly and prosecute vigorously."

Mr. Shortall has also addressed a note to the President of the Paris Society for the Protection of Animals. "I am informed, dear sir, that the exhibition I refer to is much regretted by the thoughtful and considerate people of your great city, who have protested against it earnestly and frequently. But I add my own regret that an exhibition that seeks

to arouse only the basest, the most barbarous, and I may add, the most dangerous, instincts of human nature, should be tolerated in the great centre of nineteenth century civilization."

The late American poet, J. G. Whittier had an appreciation of humour and one of his stories which a correspondent of the *Manchester Guardian* noted was that an old monthly meeting of Friends passed the following "Irish" minute: "It is the sense of this meeting that Gould speak no more in meeting until the Lord speak through him to the satisfaction of this meeting."

At the Cibola Theatre this evening will be given the popular drama "La Carajada" in which Sr. Prado will appear as Andres, a part in which he greatly distinguishes himself.

The performance at the Politeama this evening will be for the benefit of the Italian Schools, and a varied programme will be given, including the drama "Cavalleria Rusticana," the comedy "Da Galeotti a Marinaro" and other attractions.

It would be a blessing if the rain which has been threatening for several days would come down heartily and without further delay. It is sorely needed in camp.

The first harbinger of the new year reached us yesterday in the shape of the *Siglo Almanac* for 1893, a useful and comprehensive publication the yearly reappearance of which is always welcome. This is the 31st year of publication of this indispensable work, and it contains the usual mass of useful information in a compact and accessible form, besides a quantity of desultory reading. We return thanks for the copy sent us, which will not leave our office desk until replaced by its successor.

The new Argentine President is beginning well by a general cutting down of the administrative expenses an example that should be taken to heart here. It is whispered, however, that his severe notions of economy are not entirely pleasing to his Ministers and that a crisis may ensue.

Judging from the remarks of well informed contemporaries, Government is chiefly occupied just now with the approaching senatorial elections, which are to take place in November, and is letting the crisis take care of itself, which it is doing by going steadily from bad to worse.

Rumours have been current for several days that the neighbouring Brazilian province of Rio Grande is again in an unsettled state and that another revolution is imminent. According to a telegram published in yesterday's *Siglo*, dated from Porto Alegre, 18th inst, there is no foundation for these rumours, and everything is quiet. The authorities have no reason to anticipate any subversive movement, but at the same time are prepared for any contingency that may occur.

There is some unpleasantness between the Spanish Societies and the Municipality, owing to the refusal of the latter to allow the annual Spanish Fêtes to take place in the Place in the Prado, where they have generally been held hitherto. The Municipality alleges that the fêtes do considerable damage to the grounds and trees.

We made a slip yesterday in mentioning Dr. Vasquez Sagastume as Oriental Minister in Paris. He is accredited to Italy, but it is in Paris that he has fallen ill.

Have we reached bottom yet? We are beginning to doubt it. "Thus bad begins, but worse remains behind" was the remark that met our eyes on opening our Shakespeare yesterday.

On Tuesday afternoon, in the lodging house Camacho 34, a determined fight took place between the landlord, named Severiano Chao y Rodriguez, and a lodger named Camilo Alvarez, owing to the latter, a *changador* out of work, being unable to pay his rent. Rodriguez attacked Alvarez with a knife, stabbing him in the right arm and the breast, the latter being a dangerous wound which it is feared will prove mortal. Rodriguez, who is also proprietor of an *amuseo*, then fled, but was soon captured and made to confess his crime. Both men are Spaniards, Alvarez being 42 and Rodriguez 55. The latter is father of a large family and has hitherto had an excellent character.

It was telegraphed from Buenos Aires yesterday afternoon that a violent storm was raging in the port there, impeding all operations.

The daily cholera list in Hamburg is reduced to six cases and one death. There are no telegrams from other parts of Europe, so we may suppose that the epidemic is practically at an end except in Russia and the extreme east of the continent.

BUENOS AIRES

A bill has been sent by the Provincial Government to the Legislature to make the killing of locusts obligatory on the owners and occupiers of land.

At the end of August Sr. Juan M. Ibarret was appointed Inspector General of Immigration Office in the absence of Sr. Alsina. He took possession of his post, issued many orders, signed many documents, and

on September 19th presented a Report of his proceedings and made suggestions for various reforms, and also denounced the bad service of some branches, especially as regards the supply of provisions, &c., for the immigrants. On September 29th, a decree was issued whereby it was declared that Sr. Ibarret had been appointed by mistake, and his appointment was therefore annulled and D. Julian I. Maniz was restored to the post of Inspector General.

On Saturday, some boys were amusing themselves in Calle Ombé, between Tacuman and General Viamonte, by throwing stones, when one of them, thrown by Leopoldo Lencini, 12 years of age, unfortunately struck a passer-by, Cesario Montes, and wounded him in the forehead. The injury was not at first considered serious, and therefore Montes did not at once consult a surgeon, but it caused his death on Sunday. The boy Lencini has been arrested.

The aeronaut Caillaud made an ascent from the Rural Society's grounds at Palermo on Sunday afternoon, at 4.45, in his balloon "L'Explorateur," accompanied by Sr. Isidro Levy. A strong wind was blowing and the balloon, taking a north-westerly direction, was soon out of sight. The descent was made near Moron, but the wind was so strong that the balloon was dragged for some distance along the ground till, at last, the occupants of the car having been thrown out, the balloon re-ascended. Messrs. Caillaud and Levy were both injured but not seriously.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Henry Thompson, at his late residence in Barracas, Mr. Thompson, although only 59 years of age, was one of the oldest residents in the country. Mr. Thompson arrived in Buenos Aires in the year 1850 together with his brother and Mr. Nicholas Lowe, of Mercedes, in the bk. Isabella. He took part in defending the city when it was besieged by Gen. Urquiza, which lasted for nine months.—B. A. Herald.

GRAB APPLE BLOSSOMS.

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, SEPT. 12.

The Hamburg-American Company's liner Scandia arrived at New York late on Friday and reported 32 deaths from cholera during the voyage. Several more deaths occurred on Saturday, and two yesterday, bringing the total of fatal cases up to 38. The disease was also reported to have appeared on board the Guion Line steamer Wyoming.

A telegram from Simla confirms the news of two recent defeats of the Afghan troops by the rebels. The Governor of Herat, with two regiments, has been despatched to Maimana, to quell the Uzbek rebellion, and a large force has been collected to deal with the Hazaras.

An explosion, causing the loss of four lives and injuries to several persons, occurred in Paris yesterday. The accident was due to the explosion of a quantity of colloid at the establishment of an enameller of photographs.

On Saturday evening a disastrous conflagration destroyed a large number of houses in the suburbs of Quebec. A hundred and twenty families were rendered homeless.

Large parties of ladies and gentlemen who had been attending the Oriental Congress visited Oxford or Cambridge on Saturday.

The Conference of the Institute of Journalists was resumed and concluded at Edinburgh on Saturday, when Mr. Charles Russell, of Glasgow, was elected President for the ensuing year, and it was arranged that the next conference should be held in London. In the evening the delegates and their friends dined together at the Waterloo Hotel when the toast of the Institute was proposed by the Earl of Rosebery, who in his speech humorously compared the work of journalists with that of the Foreign Office, and anticipated for the Press even greater influence than it at present enjoys.

The Trade Union Congress came to an end at Glasgow on Saturday. Mr. Fenwick, M.P., was re-elected secretary of the Parliamentary Committee. Among a large number of resolutions passed was one calling for an extension of the Factory and Workshops Act to work in private houses. Miss Frances Hicks, who moved it, stated that about two months ago she was making trousers for the Duke of York, and she thought it quite possible that the waistcoats belonging to them were made in a room in the next house, where, at the time, two children were seized with fever. The President, replying to a vote of thanks, expressed the opinion that the sharp edge of the new Unionism was getting rubbed off.

About 2,500 Liberals and Radicals of North West Ham attended a Demonstration at Hawkwood, Chingford, on Saturday, to celebrate
