CONCERNING TAXATION.

Another instance of the oppressive effects of the present terrible system of over-taxation has come to the front in the case of the *almacenesistas*. These *almacenesistas* can hardly be called grocers, but respond more to what may be called general dealers, for they retail not merely groceries, wines and spirits, but many articles of household use as well, even including hardware. At a moderate computation, the number of them established in the city and suburbs cannot be far short of a thousand, their businesses, of course, varying in importance to the capital invested. There is no other branch of retail trade which is even half as great in number.

The chief complaint of these *almacenesistas*, as revealed in a very representative meeting held on Wednesday, is that, whilst they have to pay heavy rent, licenses and taxes, they are finding a great portion of their trade being taken from them, in the first place by peripatetic vendors or street hawkers, who pay neither rent nor licenses, and in the second place by the action of many importers and wholesale dealers, who favor the said hawkers by supplying them with small quantities of goods at wholesale prices, and who, in some instances, have of late taken to selling retail as well as wholesale.

Another complaint is to the effect that the present law of licenses or *patentes* presses on them with undue severity, making them pay distinct licenses for what is in reality one single business.

With regard to the first complaint, we have considerable sympathy with the *almacenesistas*, for we know that no branch of trade has suffered more severely from the crisis or from the monstrous system of taxation imposed by recent governments to support their abominable waste and dishonest extravagance, but at the same time we fail to see what just remedy they can propose, short of that reduction and rearrangement of taxation which it is useless to expect from a Government so entirely alienated from and ignorant of all business interests as the present. The *almacenesistas* cannot pretend to a monopoly of selling any particular class of goods, nor can they claim a protection which would only result in the prejudice of the consumer. No law can compel consumers to buy their groceries in certain shops only, nor is there anything improper or illegal in hawkers selling groceries from door to door, or in importers doing a retail as well as a wholesale business, if it so suits them. To place any undue restriction on these for the advantage of the *almacenesistas* would be an improper and unconstitutional interference with freedom of action which should not even be contemplated.

This question is in a certain degree parallel to the still pending question of the printing industry. The sore point lies, not in the want of protection but in the excess of it, that is to say in an iniquitous and burdensome system of unjustly distributed taxes, which render trade difficult and unprofitable. In the first place, general excessive taxation renders rent and labour abnormally dear; and in the second place, the *almacenesistas* in particular have to suffer from oppressive and badly distributed special taxation in the shape of licenses or *patentes*. The cure for this evil is obvious and does not lie in burdening others with similar over-taxation—in making them fellow sufferers and in mulcting the consumer, causing the many to pay for the benefit of the few. That would be only to increase the evil and to make the situation worse. The real cure consists, generally, in a reduction of all those excessive taxes which impede commerce, whether wholesale or retail; and, specially, in a reduction and rearrangement of the special taxes or licenses which directly affect the *almacenesistas*.

If it is the intention of the *almacenesistas* to agitate for "protection" in the form of a prohibitory license on hawkers or on wholesale dealers accepting retail orders, they will be doing the public a bad service which will inevitably recoil upon their own heads. They, as well as the rest of the public, will be general sufferers in any movement tending to keep up prices of articles of ordinary consumption.

This requires little illustration. For instance, supposing A to be a grocer and B to be a draper. B by purchasing his family groceries from a hawker or a wholesale dealer economises a certain sum which enables him to sell his drapers' goods at a lower price or less profit, whereby A, who purchases them, is benefited. If, however, B is compelled to pay a higher price for his groceries at an *almacen*, in order to maintain his balance, he is obliged to charge a higher price for his own wares, and A, the purchaser thereof, is the sufferer, so that the "protection" which A imagines he gets out of a prohibitive tax on other dealers, in reality comes out of his own pocket. This rough illustration is an example of the vicious circle, extending through all businesses and affecting all consumers, inevitably created by all so-called "protective" measures tending to maintain high prices or to make the many pay for the benefit of the few.

If an industry or trade is suffering from over-taxation, the only effective and rational remedy is not to increase the disease by extending the taxation, but to counteract the effect by reducing the cause, that is by reducing the taxation. Self-evident as this axiom is, it does not yet seem to be understood here, or, if understood, it is never acted upon.

The principle embodied in this question, as in that of the printing industries, and which, indeed, is extensive to all industry and commerce, is, when considered in this light, one which affects the whole system of taxation in the Republic. This system—if that can be called system which has no method—is not only radically wrong in theory, but has been applied in such a haphazard, careless and irresponsible manner by Governments and Chambers ignorant of business interests and solely actuated by a desire to increase the revenue at any cost, that it is no wonder that it is either negative or mischievous in its results. There is not a single branch of commerce or of industry that is not suffering from taxation which is misdirected as well as excessive.

When the taxation was lighter and business brisker, the evil was felt less acutely because a larger margin was left, but the false principle and wrong distribution of taxes were just as much existent as to-day. Now, however, that taxation has increased and business is depressed by a long crisis, the effects of the system become painfully evident, and the more the system is persisted in the worse will those effects become. It is especially to be regretted that, as in the case of the printing industry and perhaps now of the *almacenesistas*, the very sufferers from that system should be so blind to the patent causes of their troubles, that they should apply for an increase of the very evil under which they are already suffering. It is just as rational as a man loaded with chains were to expect to obtain freedom by asking for more chains, or as if an over-weighted horse were prepared to win a race by burdening him with more weights.

Of course in so radical a question as this, in which the very sufferers themselves appeal for a false remedy, there is little hope of any rational reform, especially so long as the Government maintains itself in direct conflict with the progressive interests of the country, and so long as the Chambers are constituted as at present and legislate with such wilful inattention to the real interests of the Republic, if not indeed, to the most ordinary dictates of political economy. Still, we have no hesitation in calling attention to the matter and in showing that we are not inclined to share or condone the economic errors prevalent around us.

With regard to the second complaint of the *almacenesistas*, we know it to be well founded, and in their agitation for reform we wish them all the success which they merit, but which we are afraid they have scant hope of securing under present circumstances.

Parliament.

In the Chamber of Senators, on Wednesday, the Annual Bill of Licenses on Rolling Stock (*patentes de Rodados*) was passed in general and in first discussion in detail without remark or modification. The second reading was suppressed and the Bill declared fully sanctioned. The Bill reducing the import duty

on yerba mate was similarly approved.

The sitting, which had lasted 20 minutes, then terminated.

Coinage of Silver.

It is officially announced that Government has accepted the offer of Dr. Juan Agustín Barriga for the coinage of three million silver dollars, as authorised by the recent law, and the corresponding contract was signed on Wednesday afternoon. This contract, we are informed, is for the immediate coinage of only one million dollars, with option to two millions more when deemed convenient. The price arranged is at 70 cents gold for each silver dollar, thus leaving the State a profit of \$300,000 on each million coined. The coinage is to take place in the National Mint at Santiago under supervision of Sr. Arrieta, Uruguayan Minister in Chili, and use is to be made of the dies which were employed for the coinage of Uruguayan silver in Paris in 1877, which have already been reclaimed for the purpose. The silver thus coined is to be delivered in monthly instalments of \$200,000, commencing within 90 days of the receipt of the dies by the contractor, and to be deposited in the London and River Plate Bank to the order of Government which will draw on it as occasion requires. Payment of the \$700,000 gold will be made in bills at 90 days. The contract has been signed by Dr. Barriga on account of a syndicate of Chilean bankers, and he leaves for the Pacific to-day in the "Lusitania."

This offer is said to be practically the lowest tender made, though Sr. Pedro S. Lamas is said to have presented another at the rate of 69 cents gold per silver dollar, but with the unacceptable condition that Government should take the risk of difference consequent on any rise or fall in the price of silver bars after the signing of the contract.

The coinage of only one million dollars at a time will greatly relieve the market from the fear of any immediate depreciation in silver, but there still remains the injustice to holders of Brazilian silver who are offered no compensation for the serious loss consequent on the sudden demonetisation of their coins.

Protective Action.

On Wednesday afternoon a meeting was held in the Nuevo Politeama, of some 400 to 500 *almacenesistas* or retail general dealers, to consult as to steps to be taken to protect their mutual interests. The chair was taken by Sr. Cocchi and the platform was occupied by a provisional committee composed of some fifteen leading *almacenesistas*. Many who were unable to be present sent letters signifying their adherence to the resolutions of the meeting. It was pointed out that their business was suffering from the hawkers who sold their goods from door to door but paid no rent or license, and from the importers and wholesale dealers who frequently now accepted retail orders, imposing on them a ruinous competition. It was also pointed out that they suffered unjustly from the effects of Art. 11 of the Law of Licenses.

After some discussion it was unanimously resolved to form a Central Association of retail dealers, of a permanent character and in such a form as to be recognised by law, for the protection of their mutual interests, and also to petition the public powers for a removal of the disadvantages under which they suffered. The provisional committee was permanently reappointed to carry out the necessary steps. It is probable that Dr. De María or Dr. J. P. Ramirez will be asked to become legal adviser of the association.

SUNDRIES.

Nothing whatever new has transpired about the mysterious Paris loan, nor, up to the time of writing, had any ratification been announced of the alleged deposit of the guarantee. Both Government and Banks are still without information. The affair is beginning to look not merely mysterious, but ugly as well. The general opinion is that, although some negotiation or movement is going on, the loan itself is a myth and will never be seen. We doubt, however, if the mystery can be maintained much longer.

Thirteen dollars odd a day is not bad payment for the legislators who have recently been amusing themselves with "no quorums" and twenty minute sittings. We would undertake to do the work twice as well for half the money.
—The R. M. S. "Magdalena" braved the stormy weather and entered and sailed yesterday as announced, taking as first class passengers for Rio Janeiro Messrs. J. Broad and L. A. da Silva Porto with two sons. The R.M.S. "Trent" is expected Tuesday morning, bringing London dates to the 4th instant.

The severe storm of Wednesday afternoon and night, did considerable damage, though mostly of a minor character, in the city and suburbs. The worst we have heard of is that a great portion of the zinc roof of the Montevideo Tramways Company's Station was blown off. The few vessels in port had a rough time of it, and some fishing and other minor boats were knocked to pieces. In some cases the boatmen had a narrow escape. The water in the bay was abnormally high. We have not yet heard of any serious shipwreck.

During the storm on Wednesday afternoon, Sr. Enrique Muñoz, ex-secretary of the National Bank, venturing on too exposed a spot of the coast, was blown over. Falling on his umbrella it broke underneath him and a splinter of the wooden handle entered the eye, inflicting an unpleasant wound. He was attended to in the Caridad Hospital.

The Law has been promulgated reducing the import duty on Paraguayan mate to a specific duty of 4 cents the kilo.

The Tribunal of Second Appeal has commuted to 9 years' imprisonment and 20 days' solitary confinement the sentence on Samuel Torri for the murder of his mistress Dominga Littieri. The crime was committed as long ago as October, 1888, so it has taken justice just six years to arrive at a decision.

A movement is on foot amongst the leading residents of the Cordon to form a club or social centre in that important suburb.

We learn that the North American School in calle Rio Negro 172, which has been so successfully carried on by the Misses Hyde and Bowen, has received a reinforcement in the person of Miss Rebecca J. Hammond, who has recently arrived, a teacher of considerable experience and who brings very high recommendations. Miss Hammond is a graduate of one of the higher colleges of the U. States. We may add that it is intended to strengthen the English department of this useful school.

A letter has been waiting for several days in our office for the advertiser "E. M."

It is only right that the *almacenesistas* or grocers should form a provisional committee. Nothing could be more appropriate.

The performance at the Cibi Theatre having been suspended on Wednesday evening on account of the bad weather, the piece announced "Lo Positivo" will be presented this evening instead.

The wind was less violent yesterday, but heavy rain continued to fall at intervals and the temperature was unusually cold for the time of the year. The rain, we understand, was general in the south and east of the Republic, but only partial in the north and west. The weather showed no signs of change at sundown.

It is announced that the well-known river steamers "Eolo" and "Venus" of the Platense Line, which have hitherto always shown the British flag, will in future fly the Argentine and the Uruguayan flag respectively. We are not in a position to state the reason for this change.

According to a telegram from the Uruguayan Consul at Genoa, gold medals have been awarded in the Genoa Exhibition to the Exhibitors Cayetano Cambiasso, Marciano and Co., and Riching and Co. —It is telegraphed from London that Sir Charles Tupper has been appointed Plenipotentiary in Paris for the negotiation of the commercial treaty between France and Canada. The weather is still extraordinarily cold and tempestuous on land and sea. The Durham miners have voted against the 8 hours movement. The Irish Secretary, Mr. John Morley, has presented to the Cabinet a scheme for the liberation of all the Irish political prisoners whose arrest was ordered by the Salisbury Cabinet. The Cabinet is preparing for the approaching session.

BUENOS AIRES

On Tuesday, the Senate discussed the amendments made by the Chamber of Deputies in the bill directing intervention in the province of Santiago del Estero, and the amendments were rejected by 11 votes against 7. The announcement of the numbers was received with loud applause from the bar and the galleries. The Commercial treaty with France was approved. In secret session the Senate voted a credit of \$50,000 gold for expenses of the Brazilian Boundary Commission in 1893.

The news published of a revolutionary movement in Corrientes has not been confirmed.

The National Executive, in accordance with the resolution of the Chamber of Deputies, telegraphed to Santiago, warning the authorities that they would be held responsible for the safety of the deposed Governor. A telegram was received in reply stating that the ex-Governor had been removed to the Cabildo for the purpose of security. Sarvello Ruiz has been defeated and his forces were dispersed.

—Apropos of the trouble in Santiago, the *Times* says:—"The rottenness of the whole country's institutions is however so great, that even a general warfare would perhaps be

preferable to the continuance of the present maladministration. We hear of preparations, and rumours of preparations, for overthrowing this or that form of Government, and we hear of a league of Governors to defend each other whenever and by whomsoever attacked. We further see military men of the highest rank secretly and surreptitiously ordering drafts of men to fight for one or other cause, and we see a weak and incapable Minister of War allowing such insubordinate acts to continue from day to day. In some Provinces an intimation from General Rosas carries more weight than a Presidential command; and Governors publicly and openly place the resources of their Provinces at the command of an overthrown colleague. National military men are parading the country in plain clothes, and the arms and ammunition of the Nation are being transported from place to place without orders from the proper authorities, and it may be said against the orders of the said authorities. This state of things cannot last much longer; it is time that a firm stand was made against it, and the National Government should either fall or rise in the attempt to uphold the law, the dignity, and the Constitution of the country. To countenance a perpetuation of such a pandemonium, amounts to a recognition of weakness and incapacity to govern the Republic."

AUSTRALIAN MYTHS.

BELOVIA.

The Australian aborigines have a curious myth with regard to the origin of water. They say that originally there was no water in Australia. They got along very comfortably without it till one day some adventurous spirit suggested that they ought to do something to procure it. A solemn council was held and they determined to apply to the oldest and wisest inhabitant as to the course to be pursued to attain their object. The venerable native listened to their complaint and told them that the water was contained in the stomach of a gigantic toad which lived in a cave at the top of one of their highest mountains. All that was required was to make him laugh, when the water would run out of his mouth. Another great consultation was held, when it was decided that all the animals should be asked to give co-operation to obtain the desired result. They readily agreed to, and natives and animals repaired in a great body to the toad's mountain to try their powers in the way of laugh raising. The first to make the essay was the ass. He brayed so loud that he might have been a demagogue expatiating on the crimes of the classes as against the virtues of the masses. He shook his long ears till they rattled again, he kicked his heels into the air higher than any donkey had ever elevated them before, he out the most fantastic capers, all to no use, and the toad did not so much as wink an eyelid. Crestfallen the donkey retired, and the cock strutted up with a self-satisfied air as though he and he alone knew the secret of how to make the toad laugh. But alas for the vanity of feathered aspirations, his crowing and flapping of wings had no more effect than his predecessor's braying, and he too retired discomfited. One after the other all the animals, birds, and fishes tried their best to raise a laugh, but with no better success. At last when everybody was beginning to despair came the eel wriggling along on the ground, and strange to relate, the toad blinked an eyelid and watched its contortions. Seeing this the eel raised himself into an arch and walked along on his head and his tail. Those watching the gigantic toad saw the muscles of his mouth begin to quiver. Now the eel twisted himself into a single knot and walked solely on his head. Lo! and behold the toad smiled, and out of each side of his mouth water began to trickle down. Seeing this the eel doubled his efforts, he twisted himself into a double knot and walked jauntily along on his head and his tail. This extraordinary performance was too much for the toad, he opened his mouth and laughed loud and long. Out gushed the water in a mighty torrent down the mountain-side, and spreading over the country formed rivers, lakes, and pools; and down, too, came the natives, rejoicing that at last they would have an abundance of water.

The following story shows that ghosts can be vindictive in Victoria, and resent meddling with the body they once inhabited. A man travelling in the country of a friendly tribe came upon a deserted habitation. Above the doorway he saw the usual crooked stick, pointing in the direction the family had taken, and all round about the place pieces of bark covered with white clay, indicating a death. He found tracks leading to a tree in which he soon discovered a dead body. Anxious to

know who had died he laid down his rug and weapons at the foot of the tree and ascended it. On removing the opossum rug from the face he found that it was a friend. He wept for a long time, then went away. He had not gone far when he heard some magpies making a great noise as though they saw something strange. He turned round to see what it was and to his terror saw the ghost of the deceased come down and follow him. He was so terrified he could not move, but managed to address it in these terms: "Why do you frighten me when I have come to see you and never did you any harm?" It never spoke, but followed him for a considerable distance, scratching his back with its nails, and then returned to the tree. When he reached his friends he told them what had happened, showed them his back lacerated and bleeding; and said he had a presentiment that something bad would befall him before long. At the next meeting of the tribes he was speared through the heart.

PERHAPS!

In a hundred years from now, according to a French scientist, great industries, as a general thing, will have crushed out small industries, and machines will have completely replaced hand labour. The price of manufactures of wool, of cotton, of paper will keep constantly getting lower by reason of the immense quantities easily produced. Objects in iron, in steel, in aluminium, in nickel, in silver, will be astonishingly cheap. One can form some idea of the cheapness by comparing the price of a watch to-day with the price of one forty years ago.

Carriages drawn by horses will be replaced, in part at least, by steam or electric carriages. There will be steam velocipedes and electric velocipedes. Electric tramways will connect villages. Printing will be very cheap, for there will be composing machines, and paper will be almost valueless. Lamps, clocks, watches, sewing machines, writing machines, glass, porcelain, will be produced at a very low price. All this cheapness, be it understood, will apply to things in ordinary use only. Objects of art or of artistic industry will be extremely costly. Everything made of wood or rough stone will be very dear; for wood and rough stone will be scarce, and, besides, the fall in prices for objects in general use will coincide with an enormous increase in price for objects of great luxury.

Buildings will be of iron. Even houses in the country will be of that material. Theatres, palaces, museums, universities will be done away with. The end of the twentieth century will be truly the age of coal and iron, and people will laugh at the folly of the architects of our day who have obstinately persevered, from the most disinterested motives, doubtless, in using stone and brick for the buildings they are employed to erect.

The art of the engineer will have made incomparable progress. The isthmus of Panama will be pierced as well as the isthmus of Corinth and the isthmus of Malacca. A tunnel will connect England and France. There will be a Baltic canal, a canal from the Gulf of Lyons to the Gulf of Gascony; perhaps even a tunnel or a colossal viaduct will connect Europe and Africa across the Strait of Gibraltar. The great rivers will be enlarged so that vessels of large tonnage can navigate them. Paris will be a seaport like London. In a word, the barriers which Nature has put between peoples will disappear more and more, thanks to the triumphant force of industry.

Chemistry will exercise its power over alimentary industries—the manufacture of sugar and alcohol. The meat of Australia and South America, preserved by chemical processes, will reach Europe with all its sweetness and freshness intact.

As to photography, it cannot be doubted that, long before the year 1992, we shall be able to photograph colours instantaneously. That will probably be the acme of this admirable invention; for when it shall be possible to reproduce instantly, by photography, objects with all their colour and relief, it is not perceptible that there will be anything more for photography to do.

THE RAILWAY TO JERUSALEM.

The first locomotive from Jaffa has arrived at Jerusalem. In this event we have a new and ample text for the preachers. The associations of the Holy City and its contact with the railway system is something incongruous to contemplate. It will be sufficient to excite the wrath of Mr. Ruskin, as it must appear to him to be a greater sacrilege than that of the British tourist shooting on Mount Sinai. Letters received from Jerusalem by the Palestine Exploration Fund, dated the 22nd August, announce that the locomotive had reached the city on the previous day. Trains are not yet running, but the rails have been laid down all along the line; and our Paris Correspondent says that the line, which it being made by a French company, will be opened on the 20th of this month. The terminus is unfinished; it will be on the west of the road to Bethlehem, not far from the south end of the Montefiore Almshouses. The Wadi Rababeh, perhaps better known as the Valley of Hinnom, will separate the railway station from the town; and it will thus be about half-a-mile from the Jaffa Gate. Luckily, the Temple site, with Gethsemane and the Mount of Olives is on the opposite side of the town, and will not be much disturbed by the course of the railway. It may be mentioned that the Wadi Rababeh means "The Valley of the Latrines," the Arabs will now have to call it—*if* Arabic words can be found for the

sentence—the "The Wadi" of the Railway Whistle.—Daily News.

VIRCHOW'S IDEAS OF CHOLERA.

Prof. Virchow, who has just made a flying visit to Russia, believes that the official statistics of cholera there are correct. His statement concerning Moscow is surprising, he having found only six cases in hospital. He believes that perfect quarantine, if it were possible, is an absolute protection from Asiatic cholera, and instances the ten years' immunity of the Farne Island from contagion of all sorts, no vessels touching there in that time; but passengers should be examined at starting as well as on arriving. He thinks a week's quarantine enough, but believes in complete safety, and thinks cabin passengers on an infected ship may easily transmit infection if no care is exercised.

A particularly important statement by Prof. Virchow is that cholera can be transmitted only by the excreta or vomit, and in no other way; but soiled mouth and hands, clothing or shoes, or merely stepping on a soiled floor, increase the chances of infection to a very wide range. He warned a quarantine official who was moistening his fingers with his tongue in counting Russian bank notes.

GOLD-MOUNTED FIXTURES FOR RAILWAY CARS.

A curious fact in connection with the question as to the use of gold in the arts is that the Pullman Car Company has begun using gold in connection with the metal work in its newest cars. All the metal work which is used about the lamps, the seats, and the brackets is gold-mounted. The Pullman managers say that this is not extravagant, but sound business, because the gold will prove more serviceable than any metal used before for the purpose. The first cars in which gold is thus employed are for the use of the Pennsylvania Railway.

THE RATE AT WHICH A LIMPET WALKS.

Did you ever see a limpet walk? This question is asked by a contributor to the *Evening Gazette*, who says:—"I do not think the question has ever been asked, though a somewhat similar query has been propounded in respect of the more pleasing and digestible oyster. It may be doubted if limpets can walk, but I can honestly affirm that I saw one of these creatures march over a rock the other day for the space of three inches, doing the distance in about four minutes. The shell was raised about one-eighth of an inch; a tiny feeler peeped out, waved to and fro, and felt the next twenty-third of an inch was suitable for progression. Satisfaction being obtained on this point, the edges of the limpet's body began to work slowly all round the edge of the shell, and a step forward was made. It was an interesting performance, and one rarely exhibited in public. I love to make the boys happy—let them work out this as a little sea-side holiday task: If a limpet can cross three inches of rock in four minutes, how long will it take him to cross the bottom of the Atlantic?"

CLIPPINGS.

A Correspondent at Georgetown, British Guiana, writes under date of the 24th Aug: "To-day the Most Reverend W. P. Austin, Bishop of this See and Primate of the Province of the West Indies, who is in his eighty-fifth year, completed the jubilee of his episcopate, having been ordained on St. Bartholomew's Day, August 24th, 1842, in Westminster Abbey. The unique occasion—an episcopal jubilee being of very rare occurrence in ecclesiastical history—was commemorated by a thanksgiving service in the Pro-Cathedral and parish church, and a dedicatory service in the eastern wing of the new cathedral now in course of erection from designs by Sir Arthur Blomfield, of London, a son, it may be mentioned of the chief officiating prelate at Bishop Austin's consecration half a century ago. Our venerable Bishop was unable to be present at more than the dedication service, a recent illness, from which he has not as yet recovered, having unmistakably wrought havoc on his fine physique and he well-nigh broke down as he in trembling accents pronounced the blessing. Addresses from the clergy and Corporation were presented in the course of the proceedings, which were graced by the presence of our Roman Catholic Governor, Viscount Gormanston, Bishop Austin is the oldest bishop of the Anglican Church so far as length of episcopacy is concerned, and in point of years he is only junior to the nonagenarian Bishop of Chichester. During the day Dr. Austin received through the Governor a cable congratulation from the Marquis of Ripon, Secretary of State for the Colonies in the new Administration.

Cautioning teachers in schools against undue development of the sentimental element in their teaching Mr. Wells, Tutor of Wadham College, says it is the "verse-writers" who have especially brought a false note into our text books of early English history. Not understanding the real character of the Anglo-Norman and early Plantagenet Kings, they invented situations all the period are full of mawkish stories which are untrue. It is especially in the later period that sentiment reigns supreme. One would think,

says Mr. Wells, from the popular accounts of the Civil Wars that the Puritans were a poor set of men, who invariably ran away from their opponents; and so the founders of modern England—on both sides the sea—are still denied the honour due to them. No doubt our children have the right to the good old stories of English history, however often they have been refuted. What if Prince Henry did not strike Judge Gascoyne, and then nobly apologise when King? "He might have done it, and the story helps us to realise what one of our greatest Kings thought of duty." There is only one class of stories which should Mr. Wells thinks, be rigidly excluded, those which have been invented by little men to blacken the memories of great ones whom they did not understand. We may rejoice that "we have not to fit brutal cruelty to Wallace into the character of our great Edward, or weak remorse before Charles I's picture into that of Oliver Cromwell."

The great attraction of the next exhibition in Paris is to be a telescope which is to throw that of Lord Rosse, and even the great instrument at Lick Observatory, completely into the shade. M. Deloncle, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, first conceived the project, and he has had long conferences on the subject with the principal officials of the Paris Observatory, together with an optical instrument maker, M. Gautier, and a couple of architects. The tube of the colossal machine is to be as large as the Vendôme Column, and its mirror is to be three metres in diameter and fifty centimetres in thickness. The cost will be about 100,000,000 francs. The success of the scheme depends upon whether a disc of glass large enough can be made for the great mirror, which in itself will weigh nine tons. It is expected that with such a telescope one would be able to discern on the moon anything as small as a man, although a man would appear only as a minute speck.

The German Emperor has lately expressed in an unmistakable manner his disapproval of the anti-Semitic agitation in Germany. A Berlin Correspondent says that certain articles in the anti-Semitic Press, attacking Lieut-Colonel von Mosser on account of his descent from Israelite ancestors, were laid before the Emperor. In consequence the Emperor promoted the Jewish officer to be his aide-de-camp, assuring him at the same time that he deeply regretted the existence of a religious and political hatred in Germany which regarded nothing as sacred as long as it could give vent to a morbid delight in slander.
