THE FOREIGN PRESS.

(Translated and condensed from the *España* of Nov. 8.)

Unenviable from every concept would be the political and social position of the foreigners situated in this Republic, who by force of work and economy had therein acquired greater or less interests and had created for themselves a home and a family, if there should succeed in prevailing the absurd theories of certain journalists and of certain legislators respecting the rights and duties to be exercised or fulfilled by those who have not had the fortune or misfortune to be born on the land.

According to the opinion of the said journalists and legislators, these veritable patriots of the Oriental mass, should only be permitted to cultivate the soil, work in the factories from dawn to dusk, follow industries and businesses, pay taxes to cover the national expenses and to replace the windows broken in the governmental orgies and the financial escapades of the directors and administrators of the common treasury; but without voice or vote, direct or indirect, in public affairs; without being able to manifest their satisfaction or dissatisfaction, by word or writing; without the right of either censuring or applauding the many errors or the few good actions of those who command and administer.

In order that the abuses now committed by the foreigners who attempt to interfere in matters which do not concern them may cease, more than one certain notabilities of the Chambers and certain lights of journalism have asked that the liberty of the spoken or written word, that liberty which the Constitution accords without distinction to all the inhabitants of the country, shall be declared the exclusive patrimony of those born here or who have received letters of citizenship, and that it shall be prohibited to all the rest to speak or to write, except of commercial matters, agricultural interests, of horse races, of births and marriages, of music and the drama, and of matters not related to administration or politics.

If this original division between natives and foreigners, we might say between patriots and pariahs, should some day become established, and a different law be made for the one and the other, it will follow that the privileged journalists may occupy themselves at their pleasure not only with the men and events of their own land, but may also censure or applaud the men and the policy of foreign countries, whilst we poor foreigners may not say a word either good or bad respecting our native country or referring to that we have adopted, nor enter into criticisms or comparisons upon rulers and administrators, American and European, because that will be forbidden ground to us and we may not trench with impunity upon regions of either national or foreign policy.

And even if we should see ourselves directly injured in our dignity or our interests by an imprudent administration or by a disastrous and discreditable policy; even if we should daily see our compatriots victims of the brutalities and irregularities of the provincial caudillos who represent the national government, it would be forbidden to us to raise our voice in the press to point out the evil political proceedings, to indicate the administrative irregularities, to denounce the abuses and even crimes of authority of which so many foreigners have lately been victims and for whom the hour of justice and reparation has not yet arrived.

If the two different laws of the press had existed, one for natives and the other for foreigners, and if the latter had not been able to manifest their opinion, favorable or the reverse, concerning the administrative or political personages or events of the country in which we live, allied to it by the double tie of family and of interests, it is certain that we would never have been able to unite our voices to those of our Oriental brothers to protest against dictatorial governments whose lash reaches us all, and against conscienceless administrators who have assaulted both public and private finances.

This mania of certain journalists and legislators, fortunately and for the honor of the country already few, to deny to foreigners the right of free speech without further corrective than the law of the press, the same as any other inhabitant of the Republic, must be condemned as ridiculous, even ill-intentioned.

For ill-intention must be hidden in the desire to seal lips so that they may not denounce rascalities, to deprive of speech those who made use of it to publish the iniquities of which they have been victims, to prevent foreigners writing on good or bad policy, on moral or immoral administration, on the abuses and arbitrariness of city and country, military and civil, authorities. This would have some resemblance to the gags used by certain *Chevaliers d'industrie* to close the mouths and silence the cries of the victims they are about to rob or murder.

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NEWS OF THE DAY

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Wednesday, after some conversation respecting the Commercial Treaty with Germany, the discussion in detail of the Annual Bill of Licenses (patentes) was resumed.

Str. Costa again occupied considerable time in proposing various modifications, all tending to increase the tax on different industries.

Str. Stewart, on behalf of the Committee of Finance, said that that Committee did not intend to admit any increase, in view of the situation of the country. Since the modifications proposed by Str. Costa met with the approval of some of the Senators, the Committee desired in this manner to register its vote.

Str. Magariños Cervantes spoke in defense of the newspapers and printing offices, which he said had hard work to live in these times, and he protested against any increased tax upon them.

The hour having sounded, the debate was once more adjourned without any progress having been made.

Central Uruguay Railway Northern Extension.

The third ordinary general meeting of shareholders in this company was held on Friday, Oct. 7th, 1892, at the Cannon Street Hotel, Mr. G. W. Drabble in the chair.

The Secretary (Mr. T. H. Ridsdale) read the notice convening the meeting, and the report and accounts were taken as read.

The Chairman: Gentlemen, I shall not have to detain you long in moving the adoption of this report, for, as you will see by the remarks of our traffic manager, it is impossible to make any comparisons as regards traffic, as only a portion of the line was open last year. Nor is it desirable, in my opinion, to make any comment upon the amount of traffic that we have received so far. It is certainly disappointing to a great extent, and we can only express our hope that the views shadowed forth and expressed by the manager, and endorsed by Mr. Chamberlain, will prove to be correct. That is to say, they consider it is only a question of time—the arrangement of the custom-house frontier question. When that is arranged, the Northern Extension will become the high road for the conveyance of a very considerable amount of traffic from the sea-port of Montevideo to the Brazilian frontier. Now I will not give any opinion upon that point. Those on the spot ought to be able to form their own conclusions than we can for them. They certainly speak very strongly upon it, and in the conversation I have had to-day with our consulting engineer, who has just come from Montevideo, Mr. Wingate, he equally endorses the views both of Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Henderson. If their views be correct there can be no doubt about the future of this company. In the meantime, gentlemen, I think we have no reason to feel disappointment as regards this company, for certainly, by the arrangement that has been made with the parent line—the Central Uruguay—to work the traffic for 60 per cent, and by which this company receives a net 40 per cent, that is a sufficient earnest of this company as a nucleus of the payment of the debenture interest, supplemented as it will be by the government guarantee which we are now enjoying, and which, as I told you at the other meeting, I cannot for one moment suppose will ever go into default, that the Government cannot go into default. And you will see, gentlemen, that we are very greatly dependent upon this guarantee for the distributions we have made to you, we having given you an interim dividend of 5s. 9d.

per share, and to-day propose to make a further distribution of 3s. per share, making a total distribution of 4 1/2, per cent, for the year. If we can but continue even in this way, certainly our position is a happy one, as compared with the position of the parent line. (Hear, hear.) I don't for one moment believe the parent line is going to continue as it is doing to-day, although Dr. Trewhella shakes his head and does not appear very happy. But although I may have said hard things and taken a pessimistic view as to the Central Uruguay, still I feel that it is best always to tell you what my own feelings are. If we can improve upon that 2 per cent, on the parent line next year and increase it to 3 or 4 we shall be pleased. The government guarantee has been fully discharged, we have paid everything up to date, and we know by telegram that payments have been made to the 35th September on the internal bonds. That is an earnest, I think, that we shall be paid, and of what the Government intend to do. With these remarks I beg to move: "That the directors' report and audited statement of accounts for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1892, now submitted, be received and adopted." (Cheers.)

Mr. L. Fitzwyggham: I have much pleasure in seconding that.

Mr. J. P. Hurst asked for an explanation with regard to some items in the accounts, and also inquired how the case stood with the contractors.

Mr. Barker, in reply, said he was able to answer the inquiries of Mr. Hurst with a great deal of pleasure, because their position was almost a unique one. The real position was that the railway had been completely finished within the estimated capital. They had settled up with the contractors and now had £5,000 in hand. (Cheers.) The £67,000 on the credit side of the accounts was a mere item of account, for the whole thing was now cleared up, and the company had a balance of capital in hand for working purposes. (Cheers.)

The report and accounts were then agreed to.

The Chairman then moved that a balance dividend of 8s. per share, making with the interim dividend paid in April last, 8s. 9d. per share for the whole year, be and the same is hereby declared upon the share capital of the company.

Mr. Parish seconded the resolution, which was agreed to.

The retiring director, Mr. John Fair, was re-elected; and the auditors, Mr. J. G. Griffiths and Mr. J. Gane, were re-appointed, and the proceedings terminated in a vote of thanks to the chairman, directors and staff.

Central Uruguay Railway Eastern Extension.

The third ordinary general meeting of shareholders in this company was held on Friday, October 7th, 1892, at the City Terminus Hotel, Cannon Street, E. C., Mr. G. W. Drabble in the chair.

The Secretary (Mr. T. H. Ridsdale) read the notice convening the meeting, and the report was taken as read.

The Chairman: Gentlemen, I might almost make the same remarks at this meeting that were made in the case of the Northern Extension, for now, as then, we can make no comparison as regards traffic—the line last year not having been completed. I can only state that all the accounts have been most satisfactorily settled, and in connection with the working agreement, the arrangement with the Central Uruguay to work this line for 60 per cent. of the gross receipts, leaving 40 per cent. for this company, is a very satisfactory arrangement, for this company, at least; and I think, after the process of time, and in a very short time too, it will be a mutually satisfactory arrangement. Then, gentlemen, I shall later propose to you a dividend, and it is satisfactory already to see that the receipts of net traffic on this line for the year amount to £14,702. Therefore, knowing as I do, perhaps, more about the country traversed by this line than I do of the Northern, I feel myself greater confidence on that account as regards the future of this line than I did in speaking of the Northern Extension. The country is richer, the country is better, but the Northern Extension has a great advantage, as I explained at the meeting of the shareholders—that company, of being possessed of the great high road to the Province of Rio Grande. Upon that a great many are agreed, and I dare say it will prove a true doctrine. But this line runs through a rich agricultural country, and only requires time to develop its resources. A great deal of its traffic consist of stone, but we cannot believe that the great city of Montevideo is going to stand where it is. A great deal of money has been spent in huge buildings in that city, but that investment has been made in a very foolish manner. If these monies had been invested in developing the country's industries, in encouraging immigration, and in the spreading of agriculture, then those people who were investing would by now have been receiving good returns for the money invested.

Those investments in the city are fruitless now, but, as I have said, this state of things is not always going to exist, and, as Dr. Trewhella wisely said at the Central meeting, we must have patience, and all the companies which I have had the pleasure of speaking of, I have no doubt, will recover from the depression under which they are now labouring, and we shall meet you again with a more satisfactory report from each company. I might add that the dividend that we recommend to be distributed will produce for the year a total of 5 1/2, per cent, which even now is not a very unsatisfactory return for those who are shareholders of this company. Gentlemen, with these remarks I beg to move that the directors' report and audited statement of accounts for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1892, now submitted, be received and adopted. Mr. Barker will second that, and perhaps he may have something to say.

Mr. C. O. Barker: I have very much pleasure in seconding the adoption of the report, and I would remark that I endorse much more warmly the latter part of the chairman's remarks with regard to the Eastern Extension Company, than I do those which he delivered with regard to the Central Company. I think the chairman was not quite as hopeful as he might have been with regard to the whole of these three concerns. I think some little credit may be given to our friend Mr. Chamberlain, who has been there 25 years, and who would not write hastily—and I think we may say he knows something of the line—and I think Mr. Henderson would not have written so bravely as he has done if he had not some hope. I am sure the chairman is wise in being cautious and in warning you, but at the same time I think we need not despair.

Dr. Trewhella asked what progress was being made with regard to colonization.

The Chairman replied that there was no general system of colonization, but all the landed proprietors were waking up to the advisability of breaking up their lands and turning pastoral lands into agricultural.

The traffic now consisted of a considerable tonnage of wire and posts, and that meant that the country was being broken up and being subdivided. That was a most significant fact, for the people were turning their attention to agriculture. He fully endorsed the remarks of the manager upon that subject. That was a most important feature because a great many more hands would have to be employed and more families to be supported, and a very much larger return would be produced in the shape of wheat and maize.

Dr. Trewhella asked whether the question of agriculture and immigration had received the attention of the board.

The Chairman said that that was one of the strong points which was urged by Mr. Chamberlain when he was in this country, but the board considered that it was not within the province of a railway company to devote any monies belonging to the company for the purpose. The board would give every possible facility for the carriage of immigrants to their destination—in fact, they carry them for nothing. They would do anything to assist in the development of the country.

Mr. Buchanan asked whether a dividend to be paid was derived from the profits of the traffic or from the Government guarantee.

Mr. Barker replied that £14,700 was from the traffic carried, and the balance was from the Government guarantee. The Government paid the company for the half-year £17,254 in cash. The claims upon the Government would be about £34,000 a year. The debenture interest to June 30 was £22,000, and he thought there was no danger of its falling off now, as they had expectations that the line would earn more money. The traffic of the line was going on satisfactorily.

The resolution was then put and carried unanimously.

The Chairman then moved: "That a balance dividend of 4s. per share, making with the interim dividend paid in April last, 10s. 9d. per share for the whole year, be paid, and the same is hereby declared upon the shares."

Mr. Barker seconded the motion, which was agreed to.

A vote of thanks to the chairman and the board closed the proceedings.

SUNDRIES.

—Dr. A. F. Costa's mischievous efforts to increase the licenses on trade and industry are still pending in the Chamber of Senators, and it is to be feared that he will succeed in

some. There always seems to be a party in the Chambers ready to vote for increased taxation, though when it comes to lightening the taxes the tale is quite different. We note with pleasure, however, that the Finance Committee declared emphatically against any increase in the present burdens.

At the very moment when the printing establishments are appealing to the Chambers for protection on the plea that they cannot live, Dr. Costa coolly proposes to raise their license from \$40 to \$100, or 150 per cent. The printers will not thank the Chambers for protection of that class.

The *Nacion* is still engaged in the impossible task of trying to persuade its readers that the Government is successful and popular, and the country prosperous, and that all is as it should be. The *Nacion* may succeed in convincing itself, but it will certainly never succeed in convincing any one else, and it might as well employ its talents for some less unattainable end.

Nothing more has been heard about the Message, and everything in political and financial circles is painfully dull and barren. Still there is a strong undercurrent of agitation which makes us give ear to the announcement of more than one journalist that some important movement is in preparation, perhaps, involving radical changes. Either a change of policy or a change of government would be very welcome just now. The present situation can only be described as deadly.

The resignation of the President having once been fairly mooted has now become a general topic of discussion and conversation, and has even been referred to—with the horror which might be expected—in the columns of the *Nacion*. The general opinion seems to be, however, that, whilst such a step would be very welcome and produce a good effect, it is far too patriotic and popular an act to expect from one who has shown himself so consistently deaf to public opinion and blind to the consequences of his acts.

Should Dr. Julio Herrera resign the Presidency, his constitutional successor until March 1, 1894, would be the veteran Don Tomas Gomensoro, Vice-president of the Republic and President of the Chamber of Senators.

It is expected that the mail arriving to-morrow will bring the corpse of the Paris loan—that is to say the altered contracts, and other documents relative to that still-born monstrosity.

Telegrams received yesterday confirm the announcement that Mr. Grover Cleveland has been elected, for the second time, to the presidency of the United States. The fact is of especial importance, outside the States as well as within, for it probably signifies the downfall of the McKinley tariff and the protectionist system which had such a prejudicial influence on many European industries and on the States themselves. The protection theory has had a fair trial and the results have been unsatisfactory all round. It is now to be hoped that the principles of free trade will spread more and more, even until they are recognised by the South American Republics which have been so long cutting their own throats by an entirely false system of protection, such as maintains in Uruguay. The election is not without importance in the River Plate, for it may also signify a wider opening of the N. American market to River Plate produce.

The N. Americans are fortunate in having had for presidential candidates two men of equally unblemished honor, high character and deep integrity. However much opinions may differ as to the differing policies represented by Cleveland and Harrison there can be only one opinion as to the personal worth of both men, and all the world may be assured that the election between them has been fairly fought and that the results will be honestly accepted. South American Republics are very fond of pretending to imitate the United States, let them imitate this.

The announcement that the Cowley Manor Estate, Cheltenham, is still in the market reminds a correspondent of a quaint story told in connection with Chosen, a small village lying at the fringe of the property. A worthy *locum tenens* thought to please the good people of the village, and gave out as his text, "And make all thy Chosen people joyful." A horny-handed swain, however, who had wandered from a distant parish, interpolated the ejaculation, to the no small consternation of the said *locum tenens* and the amusement of the Chosen people themselves, "And what about we poor Hucklebuck folk?"

The M. V. C. team to play against the Rio Janeiro team next Monday and Tuesday will probably be constituted as follows—Messrs. Alexander, Hyde, Poole, Slater, Hunt, Chater, Moor, Scoones, Stanham Wright, and dams.

Here is the latest story of President Harrison. When passing through Philadelphia the other day the carriage conveying him to the ferry was delayed for a time at Ninth-street. A small newsboy standing on the curbstone called out—Mister,

gives a ride? "Where are you going?" asked the President. "To Camden," was the reply. "Jump in, then," said the President, and the boy clambered eagerly into the carriage, his stock of papers under his arm. When the ferry was reached the boy presented his unknown companion with one of his newspapers, which token of acknowledgment Mr. Harrison cordially accepted, and shook hands with the boy as he left.

There will be a grand "fashionable" function at the Politeama this evening. The comedies "Inocencia" and "Seguidillas" will be performed, and a grand ballet divertissement. The spectacular ballet "Lola" is in preparation and will be presented tomorrow or Sunday.

Tennyson will, if we reckon Chaucer, be the eighth poet Laureate buried in Westminster Abbey. The other seven are Chaucer, Skelton, Spenser, Johnson, Dryden, and Row. There are monuments to several of the other Laureates in the Abbey, including Thomas Shadwell, who was buried at Chelsea, Southey whose remains were interred at Kew, and Wordsworth, whose dust lies in Grasmere Churchyard. Tennyson had been poet Laureate for over forty years. This is a longer period than that of any of his predecessors. The poet who comes next in length of time was Southey, who was Laureate thirty-one years. Southey's efforts as Royal poet, it may be remembered, did little to advance his reputation. LONDON NOTES

SATURDAY, OCT. 8.
The funeral of Lord Tennyson is fixed to take place in Westminster Abbey at half-past 12 next Wednesday, an offer of a burial place there having been accepted by the family. A Correspondent at Folkestone shows that opposition to the clergy at the Church Congress has not been confined to the doctors. The soldiers have likewise spoken out, and the temperance meeting was not harmonious. The two principal subjects discussed yesterday had reference to preaching in the Church of England, and the provision for seaside visitors. It was noted at the first of these meetings that the clergy were no better listeners than the laity, as there were repeated cries of "speak up," and Canon Twells was heard to distinctly state that a secretary had to read his paper. A conversation at night marked the close of the Congress. The tickets of membership for the Congress numbered 3,700, this being below what was hoped for.

The Congress of Railway Servants was concluded at the Memorial Hall yesterday, when sanction was given to a conference of signmen to be held at Newcastle to consider certain grievances of that grade of railway servants. Glasgow was appointed as the place of meeting next year. Mr. Harford, the general secretary of the Society, expressed the opinion that more progress had been made this week than at any previous congress, and he thought their organization had been considerably strengthened.

Reports received in Dublin with regard to the failure of crops strengthen the fear, that the coming winter will be a hard one for Irish agriculture.

The Emperor William, in confirming the election to office of Dr. Zelle, the new Burgomaster of Berlin, has written to him expressing his congratulations in cordial terms. Dr. Zelle is a Liberal, and a Berlin Correspondent sees ground in the action of the Emperor to hope that the time for boycotting political opponents of the Government is now over.

A Paris Correspondent telegraphs that the obsequies of the late M. Renan took place at the Collège de France in that city yesterday. The occasion was one of great ceremony. All the Ministers, the judges, and a large number of State functionaries were present, and M. Burgeois, Minister of Public Instruction, among others, delivered an eloquent eulogy of the deceased writer and his works.

been previously convicted of violent assaults. Mr. Vaughan sentenced him to two months' imprisonment with hard labour. Notice of appeal was given, but the magistrate declined to accept bail without notice to the police, consenting, however, to hear an application this morning.

At the Marlborough-street Police Court, Mr. Newton expressed a determination to show his opinion of omnibus conductors who were abusive to passengers. He therefore fined a conductor 5s, with the alternative of a month's imprisonment, the defendant's licence to be suspended for three months.

According to the Board of Trade returns issued yesterday, the statistics of imports and exports showed no improvement in September on the average of previous months of the year. Compared with September, 1891, the decline was about 8 per cent.

The comic opera "Inocencia" was successfully produced at the Lyric Theatre last evening.

Yesterday the long distance ride between Berlin and Vienna practically came to an end. Baron von Reitzenstein, who arrived in Vienna yesterday morning, a Vienna Correspondent says, is the only German winner among the first seventeen, but takes the second place, having covered the distance in seventy-two hours fifty-eight minutes. This is only one hour twenty-four minutes longer than the time taken by Count Starbemberg, the Austrian champion. Baron von Reitzenstein's horse on reaching the winning post dropped dead before it could be taken to a stable.

The international Boat-race on the Seine took place yesterday. The Frenchmen won an easy victory. They not only outpaced the Londoners, but showed themselves superior in nearly all points. The result was received with much enthusiasm, and it is expected that it will greatly encourage the Union des Sociétés Françaises de Sports Athlétiques in its effort to promote and purify athletic exercises in France.

The wife of Major Fisher (who was recently before the South Western Police-court for using threatening language towards her) yesterday obtained another summons against her husband for similar threats.

A charge of felony was yesterday preferred against the notorious character known as Tottie Fay. She was accused of stealing 3s. 10s. from the room of a commercial traveller at a temperance hotel in Bloomsbury, and was committed for trial.

George Cooper Trent, alias Count Trent, was again brought before Mr. Fenwick at Southwark Police-court yesterday, charged with obtaining money and other articles from widows on the pretence of marrying them. Evidence having been given to show that prisoner was a married man with five children, he was again remanded.
