NEWS OF THE DAY

OFFICIAL NEWS.

The following is the substance of the Official Bulletin issued on Thursday night.— Consul Carrion telegraphs from Bagé confirming the defeat of Saraiwa. Mena is seriously wounded. Lamas was said to have arrived Wednesday evening, also wounded, but his whereabouts are uncertain. Caseres, a Major in the "blancos" forces, has been detained and interned at Rio Grande. Aparicio Saraiwa was on the road to Rivera. There were not many wounded at Bagé, but a great many on the frontier. It is said there were 150 at the estancia of Dr. Terulliano Correa, near the line. Great numbers of the defeated "blancos" were crossing. Angel Muniz, ex-commissary of Cerro Largo, Col. Gabino (or Gabino Coronel) and Arzetegui of Treinta y Tres were dead. Lamas, wounded in the arm, was with Saraiwa. Many of the wounded are said to have died since Saraiwa's losses, including deserters, are immense. Mena (who thought he was reported dead) and Gil, disgusted with Lamas and Saraiwa, disbanded their followers on crossing the frontier. General Villar telegraphs to the Military Commandant at Salto that the residue of Lamas and Saraiwa's army, about 800 men, were making forced marches to Rivera; where they might arrive about Friday (yesterday.) The authorities of San Eugenio were warned to keep horses out of their reach. On Sunday and Monday the neighbours, aided by squads of soldiers, buried 170 corpses of the enemy, who also took over 300 wounded.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Representatives no-quorummed on Thursday, and only routine business was transacted. The Annual Laws of Direct Taxes were received from the Executive and referred to the Committee of Finance Sr. A. Sanguinatti, proprietor of a paper mill, presented a self-interested petition, which we hope will be rejected in public interest, for an increase of the duties on wrapping and straw paper. Also referred to the Committee of Finance. We quote the following from the Montevideo Telegram of the B. A. Standard, but are not in a position to add to the information therein conveyed.—In regard to the construction of the port in this city, Government called for amended and reduced proposals. The Greenwoods refuse to send in such proposals until after the revolution is over, which practically and really amounts to a withdrawal. Notwithstanding the recent Government victories, which are the beginning of the end of the revolution. Messrs Pearson & Sons will get the contract for any port that is made here. This reflects great credit on the diplomatic abilities of Mr. Macdonald, representative of Pearson, who has conducted these delicate negotiations with a skill and tact which indicate him as the proper man to be selected to arrange the Greco-Turkish question. It seems that the Red Cross Association, nothing daunted by the recent Decrees of the Government pointedly ignoring its existence, has made a formal offer to the Government of its assistance and cooperation in the relief of the wounded. The document conveying this offer, the text of which has not been published, was presented to the Minister of Government on Thursday afternoon by a special commission composed of Drs. Garcia Lagos, Gonzalo Ramirez and C. M. Pena. The Minister received them favorably, and said that personally he had no objection to utilising the services if the Association, but that it was necessary for him to consult the President of the Republic on the point. The result of this consultation is now awaited. It may be pointed out that the offer was a necessary one, not only account of the deficiency of the Government military medical resources, but also because it is obviously desirable in a contention of the present character that the wounded should be assisted by neutral rather than by official elements. Respecting General Tajes, it is alleged (for the twentieth time) that his mission in Buenos Aires, whatever it may have been, is at an end, but that he will remain there to witness the annual fêtes on the patriotic anniversary of May 25, after which he will return to this capital. It is stated that the Minister of War has given orders for the gradual disbandment of the extraordinary forces, including the National Guards, that have been raised in the southern and central Departments of the Republic, these being now regarded as practically pacified. This is partly confirmed by the Nacion, which states that orders to the effect are already being carried out in Canoas, Colonia, San José, Rocha and elsewhere. This will be of assistance to agricultural interests, as the sowing season is about to commence. Some surprise has been felt at the retrogression in the London quotation of the Consolidated Debt just now, when doubtless favorable news has been telegraphed of the approaching termination of the revolution and there is a decided spirit of recovery in the local market. However, the circumstance finds some explanation in a London telegram of yesterday stating that the London market has been unfavorably impressed by the announcement of the sanction of the new loan.

Football

The Athletic event of to-morrow is the match between the teams of the Albion and C.U.R.C.C., which will be played at Peñarol, kick off at 2.45. Great interest is being taken in this match as the result last year was a tie after a most exciting game. In order to give every facility to spectators Mr. Henderson has kindly decided to put on an express train, which will leave the Central Station at 2 p.m. sharp. The price of first class tickets has been reduced 50% for the occasion so that the return tickets only cost twenty cents. Cheaper travelling and diversion is practically impossible. We have no doubt that the game will be witnessed by a large number of spectators. The Albion Football Club is to be congratulated on awakened great interest in Athletics among the native youths, who look upon the Club as a pet Uruguayan institution. This can be plainly seen at the matches at Punta Carretas. Be the match against Navy or Local Clubs, the spectators always show their sympathy towards the Albions by loudly cheering all their men. The locust-plague is a very serious matter in countries where these voracious insects breed freely. Cyprus was for many years all but completely devastated, and its crops totally ruined by the ravages of locusts. Since that island has been under British dominion, large sums of money have been spent in attempts to destroy the prolific creatures, and though a fair measure of success has been attained, incessant warfare has to be maintained, or they would quickly get the upper hand once more. They also have some experience of locust plagues in Africa, but there they are turning to science to combat the mischief. It has been found that there exists a certain fungus which is fatal to locusts, and Dr. Edington, of the Bacteriological Institute of Grahamstown, has been cultivating this parasite with the object of using it in the destruction of locust swarms. Dr. W. A. Soga and Mr. H. Percy Browne have made tests of its value for this purpose and so far as the experiments have gone they have proved highly successful. A few locusts are caught and inoculated with the fungus. They are then set free, when they inoculate others in the swarm, with the result that in a few days the locusts die in large numbers. The experiments are to be continued on a larger scale on the first suitable opportunity, and if these prove as successful as those already made, the efficiency of the remedy may be regarded as established.

Royal Mail Steam Packet Company.

Mr. T. R. Tuffnell presided on Wednesday, April 23, at the meeting of the proprietors of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, Limited, held at Cannon Street Hotel. The Report stated that there had been shown a revival of interest in rowing in the past year although untoward circumstances had prevented the Club from competing either in the Tigre regatta or in that held here by the Club Nacional last February. The Club had purchased a new stock of oars and sculls, costing \$80, and closed its year with a balance in hand of \$110, showing the finances to be in a satisfactory condition. The profits from the Smoking Concert held last November were only \$19. No new boats had been bought, though some "gigs" were badly wanted, it was hoped the want would be supplied this year. During the year 49 new members had joined, 20 had resigned and 9 been struck off for non-payment. The Treasurer complained of unusual difficulty in collecting subscriptions, but it was hoped this would disappear with quieter times. For nearly 3 months the Club boathouse had been practically closed, owing to the police regulations forbidding embarkation in the bay, but it was hoped this trouble would soon be removed. The Report and accounts having been approved, the election of a new Committee took place, and was conducted with more than usual warmth. The result was as follows: Messrs. G. Colladon, President; Arturo Davie, Vice; C. Sturzengger, Captain; H. Schneckenburger, Vice; D. W. Fraser, Mr. Adam, H. Lichtenberger, D. O'Donoghue, W. L. Poole, K. H. Stapledon, J. M. Maclean, G. Ferguson, J. D. Hogge and C. W. Martin. The meeting closed with the usual votes of thanks.

Lancashire audiences on the condition of affairs in the East.

Mr. Gladstone asked him, wherever he went, to give the following message to the people: "This war in Thessaly is entirely the work of the Six Powers. The Greeks did not want war in Thessaly, but the Six Powers have done the work of the Turks in Crete, and driven the Greeks to Thessaly. They have sacrificed honour, decency and humanity in order to preserve peace, and they have caused war." The reading of this message was loudly cheered, and Sir Walter Phillimore said the Lancashire people had the reputation of having roused the nation in the past. What they said to-day England would say a fortnight hence. With regard to the blockade of Crete, he contended that it was distinctly illegal from the standpoint of International Law, and he hoped some enterprising Yankee skipper would run a cargo to Cretan ports, and h imagined the blockading ships would not dare to stop him.

SUNDRIES

Negotiations are once more on foot, and are said to be nearly concluded, for the purchase from the Mortgage Bank of the San Felipe Theatre and block of buildings for conversion into a new General Post Office. Such a building is wanted, but we think the conversion would cost quite as much as the raising an entirely new edifice. The destruction of the Theatre will be a loss to the city, the place of amusement in which seem to be decreasing rather than increasing, and will be specially regretted by the English-community, for which the pretty little theatre has many pleasant associations in the way of amateur performances, but we suppose the change is inevitable, as it has not been a paying property. President Crespo of Venezuela has asked Mr. Cleveland to act as advocate of that Republic before the Arbitration Tribunal, but Mr. Cleveland has declined, saying that his intervention as President in the questions at issue has incapacitated him for accepting such a post. A young man in Rosario has taken a decidedly new and original departure. He has given a banquet to his bachelor friends to celebrate the breaking-off his engagement to be married. From this we presume that he considers he has had a "lucky escape."

One of the Members of Parliament not long ago refused to don Court dress.

Now we see that Mr. Bailey, the leader of the Democratic minority in the United States Congress, refused to accept an invitation to dinner to the White House for the reason that he objected to donning a swallow tail coat. From his position in the House, Mr. Bailey's prejudices against conventional evening dress possess a significance that they might not otherwise have, and it will be interesting to see how far his followers will subscribe to the sartorial eccentricities of their leader. It should be added, however, that President McKinley assured Mr. Bailey that he would be welcome in the clothes he preferred to wear, and he attended the dinner in his ordinary clothes. The New York correspondent of the Daily Mail says that Professor Crehore, the head of the electrical department at Dartmouth College, has invented a wonderful instrument, called the synchronograph, by which he claims that 3,000 words per minute can be telegraphed received, and automatically recorded. He predicts that his invention will eventually revolutionise existing postal methods, and enable letters to be telegraphed, instead of forwarded in the present manner. Experts (we are gravely assured over the cable) believe the proposed postal telegraphic system to be perfectly feasible. "We differ in religion," she said doubtfully, "Your church shall be mine, darling," he replied, with fervour. "But we differ as to best make of bike," she faltered. "That is serious," he muttered, and his happy face became clouded with doubt. The banes are not yet put up. In Japan, it seems, people don't throw stones, and a Dutch physician at Yokohama has taken advantage of this amiable defect to build himself a glass-house. The house is built of pieces of glass tanks which are filled—not with sugar and spice, as analogy might suggest—but with a solution of certain salts, the composition of which is known only to the Dutchman. In this way heat is absorbed in summer and released in winter, so that an almost even temperature subsists within throughout the year. Air is laid on from a distant height above the reach of germs, filtered through cotton wool, and as an additional precaution, passed over a plate coated with glycerine, which captures, like sticky flypaper, any remaining microscopic life. The marriage took place on Thursday of Mr. Leon L. Bemporat to Miss Petronila Silva. Mr. Hugh Miller, manager of the Anglo-Argentine Bank in Buenos Aires leaves London for the River Plate on the 1st proximo. Mr. Laing, Attaché to the British Legation in Buenos Aires, embarks from Southampton in the "Niles" on the 28th instant. Despite the depression of the times, there is to be dancing this year, and the married ladies have put the bachelors to shame by taking the initiative. A Ladies' Committee, consisting of Mesdames Costabadie, Henderson, Lane, Nuttall, Reid, Sloane and Theobald has been formed and is organising a series of subscription Cinderellas, the first of which will be held in the Italian Hall, Calle Lavalleja 98, on Wednesday evening next, a wisely selected day, as it is the eve of a holiday. Dancing from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. We have to thank the Committee for a card of invitation. Invitations are in circulation for a banquet in celebration of her Majesty's birthday, which will be given by Mr. E. Thornton, H. M.'s representative, at the Hotel Oriental on Monday evening the 24th instant. Up to the present nothing of importance has transpired respecting the mysterious box, suspected to be an infernal machine, addressed to the President of the Republic, as stated in our last. It has been submitted to the Rontgen rays, but they have not revealed anything and some other means will now be employed of ascertaining its contents. For its small size the box is heavy, weighing about 10 kilos or 22lb. avoirdupois. The most important telegraphic news of yesterday was that the U. S. Senate, after a prolonged debate, has approved Mr Morgan's motion for the recognition of Cuban belligerency by 41 votes against 14. The motion of Mr. Fairbanks in favor of definite intervention in favor of Cuban independence was rejected by 35 to 15. It must be understood, however, that except as an expression of sympathy, the motion is of no practical effect until ratified by the other Chamber and accepted by the Executive, which later has a power of veto. The Standard correspondent in Madrid asserts that Spain will never consent either to sell the island of Cuba or to accept the intervention of the United States. The authorities have granted the necessary permission for British residents to fly the British flag on the Queen's birthday, Monday next. We have been asked to publish a suggestion that it should be generally agreed that evening dress is barred on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee function which is in preparation. This would certainly tend to make the affair more popular and general, and to remove any feeling of class distinction, and for our part we applaud the suggestion very heartily and hope that it may be adopted. The armistice between Turkey and Greece is for 20 days, not 24 hours as was absurdly stated yesterday, during which the troops are to remain in statu quo. Lord Salisbury thinks three millions sterling a sufficient war indemnity, but it is expected the Powers will demand still more. Among the Garibaldinos said to have been killed at Domoko was Sr. Fratti, leader of the Republican party in the Italian Chamber of Deputies, and a prominent and popular character. His death is not yet confirmed. The war correspondent of the London Star is also said to have been killed by a stray bullet. The Hospital for the new treatment of wounds by the oxygen process was opened in London on Thursday. The Mansion House Indian Famine Fund has reached the splendid sum of £26,000. The Paris papers again assert that President Faure will go to Russia to return the Czar's visit, and are discussing the arrangements. A robbery of 200,000 cartridges from the National Arsenal at Buenos Aires has been discovered. The stolen goods have been recovered.

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LONDON NOTES.

FRIDAY, APRIL 23. Telegrams from the Turkish headquarters in Thessaly state that Edhem Pacha is preparing to strike a decisive blow. On Wednesday when the last dispatches to hand were sent off a fierce battle was in progress on Mount Kritiri, where the Greeks had strongly entrenched themselves during the night. The Greeks, after a terrific fusillade, had attempted to storm the Turkish position, but were repulsed with great loss. Among the Turkish killed was Major-General Djelal Pacha. It is reported from Salonica that Nezeros has been taken by the Turks.

Izzet Bey, the Sultan's favourite, has been arrested for keeping back telegrams from Edhem Pacha. Yesterday the German Emperor attended the review of the Vienna garrison in company with the Emperor Francis Joseph. It is stated in well-informed circles there that the object of the Kaiser's visit is to effect a union between Austria and Russia, and thus to restore the alliance of the Three Emperors. An attempt was made yesterday to stab King Humbert while he was driving to the racecourse, five miles out of Rome. His assailant was a young blacksmith, who presented a petition with one hand and with the other aimed a blow with a dagger at the King. His Majesty warded off the weapon with his arm, and the man was at once seized by gendarmes. Yesterday was the 29th anniversary of the King's wedding day. Last night at Bolton Sir Walter Phillimore delivered a message to the people from Mr. Gladstone. The war in Thessaly was declared, entirely the work of the Six Powers. The Greeks did not want it. The Powers had sacrificed honour, decency, and humanity in order to preserve peace, and they had caused war.

Sir H. Fowler, M.P., gave his annual address to his constituents at Wolverhampton last night, and spoke at some length upon the failure of the Concert of Europe to settle the Cretan question, and to keep the peace of Europe. He expressed some uncertainty as to where the policy of her Majesty's Government would be declared—whether by a French Minister to the French Legislature, at a smoking concert, at the annual meeting of the Primrose League, or—most improbably of all—by a Cabinet Minister in the House of Commons. The Government were not afraid of a vote of censure, but they were afraid of a by-election. In speaking upon the Voluntary Schools Bill, the right hon. gentleman condemned the Government's unequal treatment of the Board schools, which it would be the duty of the Liberal party on a future occasion to redress—not by withdrawing the grant from the Voluntary schools, but by putting the Board schools on an equal footing with them. A vote of confidence in the right hon. gentleman was passed.

Mr. Courtney, M.P., last night at Saltash, held that the Crimean war had involved this country in a moral responsibility for everything that had happened in the Turkish Empire since, and that this country was also responsible in the matter of Crete, having prevented the annexation of that island to Greece when the Hellenic Kingdom was established. Another opportunity had occurred lately, and if the Powers had been wise they would have brought about the annexation. In speaking upon the war, Mr. Courtney recognised the value displayed by the Greeks, and said that if the Powers were not willing to do justice to Greece and Crete, it would be the duty of Great Britain to withdraw from the Concert of Europe.

Representatives from all parts of Ireland attended a Convention held in the Mansion House, Dublin, yesterday, at which it was determined to form an organization to be called the Irish Financial Reform League. The object of the League is to further the movement for the redress of the Imperial taxation in Ireland, and to maintain the financial rights to which she is constitutionally entitled.

It was announced at a meeting of the Executive of the General Body of Protestant Dissenting Ministers of the Three Boards, held yesterday at the Memorial Hall, that arrangements were being made for representatives of the leading Nonconformist bodies to be present at the service at St. Paul's on June 22nd.

Signor Puccini's opera «La Bohème» which was presented at the Italian Opera Houses last year, was given for the first time in English by the Carl Rosa Company at Manchester last night.

Alderman Sir Walter Wilkin, sitting at the Mansion House Police-court, had yesterday again before him the Jaeger Company Trade Mark case, which raised important points under the Act of 1887. It was originally heard in October last, and was then dismissed by the Alderman, who declined to permit witnesses to give evidence respecting the «custom of the traders» to the meaning attached to the imposition of a trade mark with English words. The Board of Trade appealed to the High Court, and the case was remitted to the magistrate to be re-heard, evidence as to custom having to be admitted. This was now tendered. At its conclusion Sir Walter Wilkin again dismissed the case, but declined to award costs.
