Parliament.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

The two Chambers met in General Assembly on Saturday. The Message of the Executive conveying the administrative accounts for the period 1895-96 was read and referred to the Committee of Accounts.

A Message was received from the Executive giving account of the Extraordinary Measures taken in view of the revolutionary outbreak. It was resolved to treat this summarily.

After a short interval the Committee of Legislation presented a brief report approving the measures taken.

Being put to the vote this was approved unanimously and without discussion.

The sitting then closed.

EXTRAORDINARY MEASURES.

MESSAGE OF THE EXECUTIVE.

The following is the substance of the Message of the Executive presented to the Chambers on Saturday last.

Hardly three months ago the Executive reported to the Hon. Permanent Commission that the chieftain Aparicio Saravia, at the head of a numerous group of bandits without political aims, had disturbed public order, compelling the employment of the extraordinary measures included in Art. 81 of the Constitution, and in virtue of which that vandal rebellion was promptly vanquished.

Now the Executive is regretfully obliged to report that the country is again disturbed by the same anarchical elements, which, for the satisfaction of criminal ambitions, propose to drag us into a civil war, which, if not promptly suffocated, would cause enormous evils and bring certain ruin on the general interests of the nation.

Comotion is already produced in the interior. Strong groups with "blanco" badges have risen in various Departments against the constituted authorities, and on the 1st instant a group of some 200 men, also with "blanco" badges, commanded by the Brazilian chieftain Julio Barros, invaded the Dept. of Rivera, being repulsed and disbanded by the Government forces. It is publicly notorious, and the Executive has trustworthy information in this respect, that on the Brazilian frontier and in some of the Argentine provinces there are numerous revolutionary groups, which, armed and led by the chieftains Aparicio Saravia and Juan Francisco Mena are ready to invade at any moment in combination with the anarchical elements already risen within the country; of which groups the 200 men who passed to Rivera under Barros formed part.

The Executive feels certain of concluding efficaciously with this revolt, which if it takes body in the country will have fatal consequences on its political and social destinies; but no immediate results could have been obtained if it had not been in conditions to act with all the rapidity and energy required by the urgency of the case, taking these indispensable measures of prompt security authorized by the Constitution.

These measures have consisted, so far, in intervention in all the telegraphic lines of the Republic, mobilization in all the Departments of the forces necessary to restore public order, and momentary restriction of the liberty of the press, in accordance with the very serious situation of the country.

No government has shown more respect for the liberty of the press or carried further its condescension in this respect. This is proved by the propaganda of the greater part of the opposition papers, inciting armed rebellion, advertising the revolutionary preparations on the frontier and proclaiming the downfall of the constituted powers, without the Government having taken any notice or tried to impose any limit on this licentious overflow. To-day the case is different. The country is convulsed by the very elements that a part of this exalted press has been inciting to rebellion, and in face of the gravity of the consequences of this armed movement, it would be fatuous to tolerate within the country the powerful assistance of the press to the revolution, in the form of articles and of false news destined to support it in public opinion.

The situation is an extraordinary one in which the Constitution considers indispensable the temporary suspension of individual guarantees, and it would be illogical to imagine that, in the presence of this suspension, there could exist an unlimited liberty of the press. This liberty, like all individual rights, finds a limit in the exceptional gravity of a situation in which the first object is to save the sacred existence of the country, and therefore the Executive, much to its regret, is obliged to restrict it.

The Executive further reports that for the mobilization of forces and the other necessary urgent measures, there have been incurred extraordinary expenses, of which account will be given to the Chambers in due time.

OFFICIAL NEWS.

The following is the substance of the Official Bulletin issued on Saturday evening, after our paper had already gone to press.

Julio Barros was combated by Col. Foglia y Perez, and had to recross the frontier.—Lieut. Valiente and Ensign Mirazo, who were sent on a commission to Batovi, fought with a rebel party, defeating them, taking four prisoners and some horses.—All quiet in Cerro Largo, all the "colorados" Chiefs who had raised forces, having incorporated with the regiment of Col. Gutierrez, forming a column of some 1000 men, with whom General Muniz was working in perfect harmony. The rebels of Flores were still pursued by the forces of Cols. Barriola and Vera, who had caused them many losses and taken 22 prisoners, among them Major Gabino Vallente, ex-inspector of police in Flores. Major N. Sanchez took 12 prisoners.—The tug "Ernestina R.", which had arrived at Sauce, landing there Major Diego Lamas and some officers, was captured by the expedition under the Minister of War, with all her cargo, consisting of much war ammunition.—The rebels who had come to Sauce to receive the said ammunition fell back on Rosario, where events of importance were expected.—General Pacheco has accepted appointment as Chief of the Rocha Division and already taken charge.—Nothing new from other parts of the country. All the Departmental Divisions are being mobilized and their armament completed.—North of Rio Negro Gen. Villar is ready to commence operations with a mobilized force of over 7000

men, not including the reserve forces in each Department.—Col. Casalla has taken two prisoners at Minas from the groups under Juan Muñoz.—A group of some 40 rebels has been seen near Mansevilagra, Durazno.

POLITICAL NOTES.

The Message of the Executive concerning Extraordinary Measures met with unanimous approval from the General Assembly without a word of discussion, thought it is only fair to add that the few independent Deputies were absent. We could like to discuss the Message for them, but we may not.

The President still continues absent from the Government House, and his private residence is the centre of all official operations and movement. His health is reported as rather better.

The marine battalion of which we spoke in our last has already been formed, and consists of some 250 men, who are lodged in the Aduana Kiosk formerly devoted to the inspection of luggage. It is under the command of Col. Lopez Bolani and Major Borges. The battalion of Prison Guards is also being formed rapidly. The object of this is not yet understood. We believe that in both cases the men are genuine volunteers and there has been little or no resort to pressing.

Lieut. Cols. F. L. Rodriguez and A. Gimenez have been named Chiefs of the new battalions being formed in Durazno. The strength of the forces existing in the Commandancy South of the Rio Negro is estimated at over 8000.

The steamers "Oroño" and "Rio Negro," momentarily expected, bring another large consignment of Belgian arms for the Government, including two batteries of Canon and Bange cannon, with ammunition. Two French officers are also expected to arrive with them, as instructors in their use.

The Colorado Committee has opened a club room at Rio Negro 170, for the general exchange of news and ideas on the situation, the same being prohibited to the press.

Up to the time of writing no further Official Bulletin had made its appearance.

THE FORGERIES.

Important Capture.

The police may be congratulated on the very prompt capture of the forger of the Bank of the Republic notes, mentioned in our last. The criminal is the notorious Cattaneo, a very skilful lithographer, who has been arrested on charges of forgery several times but dismissed for want of proof. This time, however, the proofs against him are overwhelming. Searching the lower part of his house in Calle Isla de Flores, the police have found photographic, lithographic and typographic implements and utensils, the forged plates of the Bank's notes and of notes of several other banks, and packets of the forged notes, of forged Treasury certificates for the months of November, December and January and of various other documents. Amongst them were a large quantity of forged notes of the Bank of the Argentine Republic, and also \$20 notes of the Bank of the Republic here bearing the effigy of President Borda, a note and value unknown to the Bank authorities themselves. All these forgeries are of the most skilful description, and the nominal value is estimated at \$800,000 to \$1,000,000. Further discoveries are expected, and there is a large safe which the police have not yet been able to open. It is impossible to say yet how much of this forged stuff has been put in circulation, but it is already known that several exchange shops have been "stuck," principally with Treasury Certificates, for amounts varying from \$200 to \$1000 each. Amongst the principal victims are the "Banco Turco" in Calle Zabala and Sr. Flaminio in Calle 18 de Julio. The persons arrested are Cattaneo himself, his wife and two men named Tillot and Hernandez who are accused of being instrumental in passing the forged material.

The police may be congratulated on having promptly run to earth a very pernicious scoundrel. We understand that they were put on the track by Sr. Gall, the manager of the Bank, and Sr. Burmeister of the *Razon*, who had had previous experience of Cattaneo's handiwork.

DEATH OF MR. J. B. WANKLYN.

(B. A. Standard, March 7.)

The curtain has at last dropped on one of the greatest tragedies ever known in Buenos Aires. Mr. Wanklyn died yesterday morning in the British Hospital at 5 a.m., after an agony of 34 hours.

Mr. Wanklyn was one of the best known Englishmen in this city; he came to the Plate quite a youth some 27 years ago, and entered his uncle's office alongside the old Bolsa in Calle San Martin,

as a sort of junior clerk. His uncle, the late Mr. Frederick Wanklyn, carried on at that time a species of banking brokerage business which does not exist in the market to-day. Mr. J. B. Sala was partner of Mr. Fred. Wanklyn, and Mr. Ramon Garcia the head clerk or cashier. The firm did a very large business, which very soon, with the assistance of the late Don Eduardo Lumb, Don Tomas Armstrong, Don Federico Elortondo, and Messrs. Leizaola and Lamas, merged into a regular joint stock bank, called the Banco Comercial, of which, perhaps, very few in the market to-day have the least recollection, as by some mishap Mr. Wanklyn's friends hit upon a name for their bank which at once brought them into collision with the Banco Comercial of Montevideo. The name of the new bank had to be changed to that of the Mercantile Bank of the River Plate, which was managed and directed by the late Mr. Frederick Wanklyn the uncle of the subject of this obituary, who figured as secretary or head clerk in the concern.

The failure of the great firm of Leizaola and Lamas and of the Argentine Bank, and the great crisis which followed, brought the Mercantile Bank down. Mr. F. Wanklyn, founder and manager, died, and some years after, on the ruins of the old bank, Mr. Duffield came down from Rio and started the English Bank of the River Plate. Mr. J. B. Wanklyn, whose sad death we now record, sundered his connection with the bank and started afresh in this market a financial agency which grew in a few years to be one of the most important in the Plate. His great business talents, his high connections both here and in England, and his long apprenticeship under his uncle in the market brought him at once to the front; he was named local director of some of the most important English joint stock companies working in this country; his opinion was always consulted on matters of great import connected with English interests in Buenos Aires; and his firm sprang into such a large business that it ranked almost with some of our banking institutions. With admirable tact he steered his firm and the Companies which he represented safely through all the tremendous vicissitudes of the late crisis. He was a man of sound judgment, polished manners, good education, excellent early training, and of a kind and affable disposition. He married early in life the daughter of our esteemed Scotch Pastor Padre Smith, by whom he has a numerous family. He never mixed in politics, and was of a retiring disposition, but we always find his name as contributor and supporter of the few local charitable institutions connected with our community. He lived all his life in Flores, where he was greatly esteemed by all the English and Argentine families.

THE RECORD OF WRECKS.

It takes some time to gather in the records of shipwrecks, and the return now issued by Lloyd's Registry of Shipping is for the quarter ending with September, the months when land experience suggests that nature is kindest, and yet 211 vessels of 162,724 tons were "removed," a record which exceeds those of the corresponding periods during this decade, excepting 1895. The normal tonnage is 130,000 tons, but in the autumn months of 1895 193,480 tons were removed, and, as indicated, 162,724 tons is returned as the waste shipping of last autumn. There is one satisfactory feature, however: the amount of tonnage broken up voluntarily is higher than it used to be. Foreigners would not have our old ships—they prefer the modern economically engined steamers—and the old metal has now to be sold. Thus 180,000 tons of shipping have been broken up in the past year; and one cannot help feeling that if still more were similarly treated we should not have that same long record of ships missing the saddest of all fates. Some 60 or 70 ships a year are so "posted" at Lloyd's; in the quarter under review, nine of 8,550 tons sailed from port and were never again heard of. This is much below the average; it is quite high enough. Wrecks accounted for 96 vessels being deleted from the lists, the tonnage being 62,763 tons. This compares with 79 vessels, of 51,873 tons, in the two previous quarters. Collisions usually involve the loss of from 12,000 to 16,000 tons; for the quarter under review the tonnage is 14,386, the measurement of 24 vessels. It is some satisfaction to find that the rate of loss of British ships is low even among all the nations, being 46 for each 10,000 vessels owned, while for Austro-Hungary it is equal to 228, Norway 120, Spain 111, Holland 111, Colonias 110, Sweden 95, Italy 85, Russia 83, United States of America 72, France 70, Germany 54, Denmark 49. When we come to the return of the sailing ships, which provides

two-thirds of the losses, partly because of their impotence under adverse conditions and also their age, we find a greater tendency to abandon the ships at sea, and in this respect the Norwegian presents a bad return. Thus in a year 18 Norwegian sailing ships had been abandoned—seven in the quarter under review. Their loss rate for sailing ships is 137 per 10,000; that for Holland is 172; Spain, 156; the Colonias, 144; France, 122; Sweden, 119; Russia, 116; Germany, 90; Italy, 84; United States, 79; Denmark, 76; and the United Kingdom, 61. The Austro-Hungary ratio appears high again, but it is in both instances due to the large proportion of vessels broken up. It is interesting to note that although Britain possesses nine times the steam tonnage of any power, Norway as well as the United States have sail tonnage equal to half that owned in this country.—Engineering.

SUNDRIES.

—We call the attention of our readers to the list opened in our office for subscription to the Red Cross Association, the humane objects of which require no explanation.

—As might have been expected, no one took any notice of the "burial" of Carnival on Sunday except a few infatuated street-boys. The Municipality had the good sense to suppress the illuminations, and most of the Club and Society balls that had been announced were suspended.

—It appears from the decision of the New York Courts against the Cigarette Trust, that tobacco in any form is a necessity and not a luxury, in the view of the United States law. In reply to the contention of counsel for the Trust that its product is not an article of prime necessity, the Court quoted with approval the language of Mr. Hugh McCulloch, in a report as Secretary of the Treasury, in which he said of tobacco: "An article which is so general used, and which adds so much to the comfort of the large numbers of our population who earn their living by manual labour, cannot properly be considered a luxury." This should be a comforting standing to many.

—Our Buenos Aires contemporaries received yesterday contain several things which we were anxious to know and which our readers would like to know, but which it would never do for us to communicate to them.

—The steamer Septimus, coal-laden for the River Plate, has been lost off Las Palmas, Canaries. She is a total loss.

—All our comic and satirical weekly contemporaries are suspending publication, finding existence impossible under the press gag. Happy land!

—On account of the bad condition of the course from the recent rains, there were no races at Maroñas on Sunday. They are transferred to next Sunday instead.

—According to statistics compiled by the sanitary authorities in Bombay, the cases of Black Plague that have occurred in that city since the outbreak of the scourge amount to 8,383, of which 6,979 have been attended by fatal results.

—If the Post Office takes on itself to suppress newspapers and letters posted to the interior, it would only be common honesty to return the money paid for postage on them.

—Says the *Times of Argentina*,—"Cards have been received here announcing the marriage of Mr. James H. Covode, C. E., an American gentleman formerly well-known in Montevideo society. The bride was Miss Louise Bournonville daughter of Mr. Andrew Jackson Moulder. The ceremony took place in Bush Street, San Francisco, California, on February 17th."

—Yet more matrimonial items from the other side.—About the middle of next month the sound of wedding bells will be heard in green Lomas. The date of the wedding of Mr. J. Walker, the tea-merchant, and Miss Wright, the accomplished daughter of the well-known Bolso broker, has been fixed for the 20th, at the English Church. The Rev. Mr. Cocks will perform the ceremony, after which the happy couple will take a six months' trip to a Europe before settling down in Buenos Aires.

—About two months later Mr. P. L. G. Bridger will be united in the bonds of holy matrimony to Miss Gibson, daughter of Mr. Diego Gibson, one of the principal residents in the suburb of Lomas.

—The P.S.N. Co's "Orcaña" arrived at Flores Island early yesterday morning, but her mails were not distributed until an advanced hour of the afternoon. She did not bring any first-class passengers for this port.

—The recent issues of the *Nacion*, *Prensa*, *Diario* and other native papers of Buenos Aires have been suppressed in the Post Office to prevent their circulation here. We understand that they contained a certain Manifesto and

other matter which the Government did not wish to become known here.

A tragic affair occurred in the port on Saturday afternoon. The Captain of the German str. "Montevideo" of the Hamburg South American Line, which had arrived from Hamburg on Friday, went to pay a visit to his friend the Captain of the "Moravia," for whom he had a parcel to deliver. Coming back he missed his footing whilst getting into the tug "España" and fell into the water. Every effort was made to save him, but he was carried away by the tide and drowned. It is thought he must have been partially stunned in the fall, as though he rose to the surface he seemed unable to catch the life-buoys and ropes that were thrown to him. His name was J. Riedel, and he had a daughter in Buenos Aires, married to Mr. Neuss, to whom he had just telegraphed telling her to expect to see him the next morning. We have not yet heard of the body being recovered.

The "Cortijo Lereña" of Sr. Lereña Lenguas, near Juanico station, Dept. of San José, was destroyed by fire on Sunday, the losses being considerable. The cause of the fire is unknown.

The organization of the Red Cross Association proceeds with great activity, and its Bases or Rules have already been formed and sanctioned. One of the most active members of the Committee is Mr. T. W. Howard, who has also made a handsome donation of \$200 to the funds. Meetings are held every afternoon in the offices of the Rural Association, at 3.30 p.m.

The marionette show at the Pavilion does not amount to much, and in any case the public are in no mood for theatres just now, so it will probably close its doors in a day or two. The building is not at all suited to such performances.

The Cretan question again looks most serious. The reply of Greece to the collective note of the Powers was to have been delivered yesterday and, according to the telegrams, it was practically certain that it would be a refusal to their demand to evacuate the island. Bellicose preparations in Greece continue on the most active scale and amid frantic popular enthusiasm. The declaration of war against Turkey would probably be followed by risings in Macedonia and the Balkan provinces. Bulgaria would probably join Greece. The Powers are said to be perplexed as to what course to pursue. Public opinion in England, France and Italy has manifested itself so strongly in favor of Greece that the Governments are wavering. Many volunteers have offered themselves from all three countries. Turkey is also making preparations for war and has 70,000 troops ready.

The Queen is expected in Paris on Thursday, and after receiving the salute of President Faure, will proceed to the residence prepared for her near Nice, where she will pass the spring months.

General Weyler has once more returned to Havana without having carried out his threat of utterly squashing the rebels. His recall is now considered almost certain. The released U. S. citizen Sanguily has arrived in New York and is making terrible revelations of the cruelties perpetrated in the Cuban prisons. He says 600 U. S. citizens are among the prisoners! Telegraphic communication with Buenos Aires was fully restored yesterday, but was interrupted with various points of the interior.

BUENOS AIRES.

A most important and interesting point of law has just been decided by the Supreme Court. Mr. Samuel Johnston brought an action against Mr. James Knott, Prince Line of Steamers, for breach of contract, claiming the damages therein stipulated. Mr. Knott under advice of his counsel pleaded that he was not within the jurisdiction of the Argentine Law, being domiciled in Newcastle on Tyne, in which city the contract was signed. Furthermore, he pleaded that action should be brought in the Federal, not in the Commercial court, as under law of 13 Sep. 1868 all questions concerning ships, navigation and seamen and relating thereto, were to be exclusively under Federal Jurisdiction. Mr. Thomas B. Holway, on behalf of Mr. Johnston, maintained that as the contract was to be fulfilled in Buenos Aires, it was decided under the jurisdiction of the Argentine law, no matter where Knott might be domiciled. Furthermore, that it did not come under the law of 13 Sep. 1868 in any way, being a simple commercial contract for services to be rendered and having nothing whatever to do with navigation or seamen. The Commercial Judge gave the verdict in Knott's favor on both pleas and Mr. Holway appealed. The Cámara reversing the verdict on both points, Knott thereupon appealed to the Supreme Court and the verdict has again been given against him on both points with costs, thereby upholding Mr. Holway's interpretation of the law.

The Minister of the Interior invited the managers of the different railway companies to a conference, in order to ascertain in what proportion each company would contribute towards the erection of a new Central Station. The managers have promised to communicate with their respective boards on the subject.

The Castells' liquidation on the Bolsa has involved the failure

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of five brokers whose names were on Friday posted on the board. However, a curious point awaits solution. Suppose one of these brokers, whose name has been posted up, should, when the testamentaria has been arranged receive the \$200,000 to which he is entitled, what is there to compel him, supposing him to be unwilling, to refund the sum for which he was declared a defaulter?

A boy named Gonzales, 13 years of age, on Friday shot the manager of the factory where he was employed in Caballito and subsequently another man who hurried to the spot on hearing the report of the revolver-shot. The manager is mortally wounded.

Report says that serious differences have arisen between General Roca and Dr. Pellegrini in connection with the lamentable state of affairs in San Luis and the alleged arbitrary conduct of Governor Berrondo.—B. A. Herald.

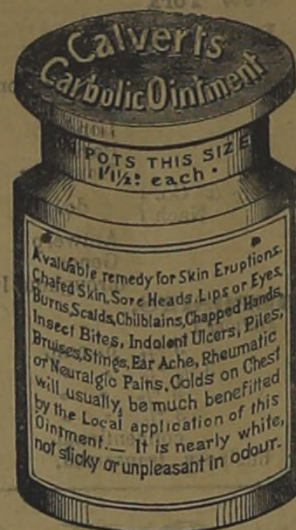
