THE CARVALHO CASE.

A REPLY TO DR. PALOMEQUE.—VI
(Continued from Wednesday.)

§ XX.—A word now as to Dr. Palomeque's theory of the indivisibility of the confession or declaration of his client. The principle is unknown in English practice, so we have to look to him for information. We understand him to say that if one part of the confession of the accused is accepted as evidence, then so must be the rest. This seems to us perfectly just. But from this he makes the deduction, which seems to us entirely unwarrantable, that if one part of the confession be true, then so is the rest. Carvalho declared that he killed Mr. Lewis, and at the same time declared that he did it in self-defence because Mr. Lewis gave him a buffet. We know the first assertion to be true, and therefore, according to Dr. Palomeque's line of argument, we have to accept the second part as equally true. This is precisely what we cannot grant. We are not acquainted with the system he here introduces of employing the confession of the accused as evidence, whether for or against him, but we cannot believe that any law compels us to receive as decisive evidence mere assertions which are neither proved, probable nor credible. When an assertion cannot be proved by witnesses nor by corroborative evidence, then we must take into account its probability, and accept it or reject it, according to that probability. That Carvalho confessed that he killed Mr. Lewis is of little importance, the deed was sufficiently proved without any such confession, and it would have been useless for him to deny it. We cannot see that this admission on his part of what he could not deny is any guarantee whatever of the truth of the rest of his confession. When a man is charged with so serious a crime as murder, and is unable to deny the act of having killed, he naturally seeks some other defence or excuse, of which self-defence is very likely to be the first. It seems to us that a charge of murder, with the proof of the body of the victim, is very much too serious to

be set aside by a mere assertion of self-defence and of a blow. Such an assertion would require very strong corroborative evidence or proof of likelihood before it could be accepted as absolving evidence. This is our view, and this is what it seems to us is required by respect for human life. Dr. Palomeque takes precisely the opposite view, and attaches more weight to his client's declaration of an improbable and incredible blow, than to the staring fact of the disfigured corpse and the absolute surety that his client fired the fatal shot. Once more his theory seems to us dangerous in the extreme to society, if society includes any respect whatever for human life. That would be a phenomenally stupid murderer who could not advance some excuse for his crime; and, according to Dr. Palomeque, any allegation or declaration made by the accused, however lacking in proof and improbable, has to be received as evidence on a par with those facts of his confession which are known to be true, unless directly disproved by the other side, and, as we have previously said, it is far more difficult to prove a negative than a positive. The proof required to show that a person visited a certain place, carried a certain article or performed a certain act, is comparatively easy; but the proof that he did not do these things is much more difficult and in some cases impossible. The advantages and opportunities of escape thus given to the criminal are obvious and enormous. This may be Uruguayan law, Dr. Palomeque tells us very positively that it is but if so we can only say again that it is a law entirely in favor of the criminal. He is still giving us lessons in the «Art of Murdering with Impunity» to which an important chapter might be added on the theory of the indivisibility of the confession of the accused, according to his application of it.

§ XXI.—Dr. Palomeque tells us we must accept the declaration of his client to the Judge of Instruction that he killed Mr. Lewis in self-defence for having struck him a blow. He calls this declaration this «material proof» (*prueba material*, *Dia*, March 27.) It also happens and is recorded by Dr. Palomeque (*Dia*, March 30) that, whilst flying from the scene of the event, his client confessed to a carman or driver (*carretilero*) that «he shot Mr. Lewis because he wouldn't give me the certificate of good conduct.» (*le di un tiro porque no quiso darme el certificado de buena conducta.*) But this latter confession, Dr. Palomeque tells us, cannot be admitted as legal evidence, it has no legal value whatever (*Dia*, March 30.) Now, which is more likely to be true? A confession spontaneously made the moment after the event and before there was time to think of defence or excuses, or a confession made two or three days later, in cold blood, before a Judge of Instruction, when the prisoner found himself confronted with a charge of murder, and had probably been instructed what line of defence to take by a lawyer. The most ordinary common sense immediately declares that the former is more likely to be true—but Dr. Palomeque tells us that we may not accept it, but must accept the declaration before the Judge. If this is law, then once more we have to say that it is law entirely in favor of crime, and yet another lesson in the «Art of Murdering with Impunity».

§ XXII.—Dr. Palomeque urges (*Dia*, March 31) that the previous good character of his client makes it impossible to believe that he committed murder. This would be a strong point if there were any doubts as to his personality, but there are none. There are very many instances on record of a person having preserved a good character for many years and then suddenly committing a murder or serious crime. Besides, we can reply in Dr. Palomeque's own words and say that the previous character of Mr. Lewis makes it impossible to believe that he struck Carvalho or offered him any violence, even if provoked. In any case, the law deals with questions of fact, not of belief. The disfigured corpse of Mr. Lewis is a fact beyond all dispute. Can as much be said for the buffet?

§ XXIII.—We now come to the matter of the revolver, and here we find Dr. Palomeque falling into some extraordinary errors. Dr. Palomeque says (*Dia*, March 31) that the occupation of his client (Carvalho) was Night Station Master at Bella Vista) made it necessary for him to carry a revolver. We can state on the authority of the General Manager of the Central Railway Company, that Carvalho's occupation did not require the carrying of a revolver; that Carvalho was not known to carry one habitually; that it is not permitted to the employees of the Company to carry revolvers when on duty; and that if any of them were known to do so, they would immediately be ordered to discontinue the practice.

Moreover, Carvalho was suspended from his post when he visited Mr. Lewis, so the excuse was no longer available.

Next, Dr. Palomeque contends that there is an unquestionable right to possess and carry arms, this being forbidden neither by Constitution nor law. So far as possessing them is concerned this is accurate, but it is entirely incorrect as regards carrying them. Dr. Palomeque forgets that there is a police regulation forbidding the carrying of arms under penalty of fine or confiscation—and it is a very great pity that it is not much more strictly enforced. Thus Dr. Palomeque is astray on two important points.

There is not a capital or important city in the United Kingdom, in Western and Northern Europe, or in the greater part of the United States excepting the wilder western towns, where the carrying of arms, and especially of a revolver, is not condemned by society and prohibited by the authorities. In Montevideo itself, as we have just said, it is forbidden by a police regulation. Why this practically universal condemnation? Because the presence of an arm, ready to hand in moments of excitement or passion, directly leads to acts of violence, to crimes, and to fatal deeds, just such as the death of Mr. Lewis. Because the revolver, especially, is a fatal weapon the use of which in public leads to the most deplorable and irreparable consequences, such as even those who employ it must regret in their cooler moments. Because, moreover, it takes men's differences and quarrels out of the domain of right and law, and relegates them to a domain of passion and violence which is the contrary of all civilisation. We do not hesitate to say, and Dr. Palomeque cannot deny, that a large number of the murders and deeds of violence that are so frequent in the River Plate, are directly due to the bad habit of carrying revolvers and using them on the least provocation, a habit which cannot but be sternly condemned by all who know what civilisation means and who have respect for human life.

Let us cite an instance. Not long ago two men had an altercation in a street of Buenos Aires, at midday. One of them pulled out a revolver and fired. He did not hit his opponent, but he did hit and kill an innocent and defenceless girl who was crossing the street some little distance off and who had nothing whatever to do with their quarrel. Such a deed as this, so miserable, so cowardly, so reckless, must fill every civilised man with the intensest horror. No words are too strong to condemn it, nor could a long life of the severest penitence atone for it. This is only one instance out of hundreds where innocent persons have been killed or wounded by the reckless use of revolvers, or where insignificant quarrels have developed into bloody murders. In such cases the revolver is not the legitimate defence of a civilised man, behind whom stands the law, it is the weapon of the assassin, the coward and the savage. This is the reason that its use has been condemned in all civilised lands and is sternly punished in most, and until this evil custom has been purged from River Plate cities, equally by law and by public opinion, they cannot claim to rank as really civilised.

Why should a man arm himself with a revolver? We do not refer to foolish youths who carry one for mere vanity or ostentation, but to sober men, responsible for their acts. There can be only one reply. Because he either expects or intends an act of criminal violence. And this indicates an uncivilised state of society, where the law affords insufficient protection, where deeds of violence are common, and where human life is not properly respected. No, Dr. Palomeque, the custom you defend of carrying and using arms is not the custom of civilised cities—though it may be of the River Plate.

§ XXIV.—Dr. Palomeque says (*Dia*, March 31) «The use of arms does not necessarily indicate the intention to kill.» Was his client, then, a child ignorant of the fatal effects of a revolver? For what other purpose than to kill could he have carried a loaded revolver in the face of a man at close quarters? If that was not intent to kill, what was it? Possibly Carvalho did not intend to kill, possibly his passion carried him further than he meant, but he did kill, and it is the deed itself, not the intention, that we are discussing, and for which the law—in a civilised country—would hold him responsible. Men who fire fatal revolver shots must be held responsible for their acts, not their intentions, if they did not intend to kill, he should have thought of that before he fired.

One more article, and we will have finished.

POLITICAL NOTES.

Neither of the Chambers sat on Wednesday, nor was any sitting convoked for yesterday.

The resignation of General Diaz as Minister of War is now fully confirmed, although not officially announced. It was presented on Wednesday afternoon, when the General took a formal farewell of his subordinates in the Ministry, and we understand that the President has already accepted it. The reason given in the letter of resignation is said to be «on account of the conversation we held yesterday.»

It seems certain that the successor of General Diaz will be General Luis Edward Perez, who held the same portfolio during part of the Herrera administration, and was one of the candidates for the presidency in the elections of 1890 and 1894. General Perez, it is stated, was first offered the post of Military Commander of the South, but declined this on the plea of poor health. The post, we believe, will now be offered to General Eduardo Vasquez.

Another resignation which was generally rumoured yesterday was that of Dr. Brian as Presidential Secretary—an act which would not be received with public lamentation the post of Surgeon Major of the Army being conferred on him instead. This would also probably bring about his resignation as President of the Municipality.

Other important political changes are said to be likely to occur very shortly, but we cannot yet say what they are, nor can we comment on the above whilst the present decree gagging the press subsists.

It is reported in official circles that the Government will not carry out its intention of mobilising the National Guard of the Capital, though it may form some corps of volunteers.

Up to the time of writing no Official Bulletin had appeared, though one was momentarily expected announcing the changes mentioned above, if not also giving news of the revolution. The air is very thick with rumours and reports, political and otherwise, but they are not of a nature that we may repeat.

THE «DIAMOND JUBILEE» MEMORIAL.

To the Editor.

Sir—I have read with great interest the letter of Mr. Robert Wingate, which is published in your issue of Thursday, on the subject of the Resolution which was carried *nem. con.* at the General Meeting of British Residents, duly convened by H. M. Minister Walter Baring Esq. and held at the British Legation on Monday 5th inst. As the proposer of the Resolution which was adopted by all those present without a dissentient voice being raised against it, I think some reply to Mr. Wingate's letter is due from me.

In the first place I must say that I personally very much regret that Mr. Wingate, and others perhaps, were prevented from attending the Meeting, and I am sure this regret is generally felt by everyone, but surely this was not the fault of those who were present, and who agreed *nem. con.* to the Resolution referred to. The Meeting was duly announced by advertisement in your paper for fully a week previously, and all British Residents were invited to attend and to offer suggestions.

In the second place I may assure Mr. Wingate the very suggestion he now makes, *iz.* that the disposal of the surplus funds available, should be left to the decision of a subsequent General Meeting, was actually proposed by myself at the Meeting held on 5th. inst. but it was objected to on the ground that if subscriptions were to be asked for, it should be stated what such subscriptions were for.

Without, however, discussing either the merits or the demerits of the Resolution arrived at, and in view of the fact that objections have been raised thereto, I too for my part join in your suggestion that another Meeting be held if possible to enable those who were unfortunately absent at the last Meeting to bring forward their proposals and assist in that which is so earnestly to be wished for, *viz.*, an unanimous idea for worthily celebrating our Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

SUNDRIES

—With regard to the controversy that has arisen respecting the disposal of any funds collected for a «Diamond Jubilee» memorial we are able to state that an extensively signed letter has been addressed to the British Minister requesting him to call another General

Meeting for the reconsideration of the resolution adopted at the Meeting of Monday last.

—Our London exchanges, which include dates up to March 18 show very little perception of the seriousness of the situation here, and their telegraphic news of events is scant in the extreme, this being, of course, attributable to the telegraphic censorship established here. Some of them gave echo to an absurd *canard* that Argentina and Uruguay were on the verge of open hostilities. The following official telegram was published in all the papers:—«Montevideo, March 13. Revolution without importance at all. Insurgents are running away, pursued by the Government forces. Don't give any credit to the news circulating there about supposed defeats of the national troops.» This might lend itself to a great deal of comment if such were permitted.

—The *B. A. Herald* tells the following amusing story.—The orderly peace-abiding citizens whose daily avocations chanced to take them past the door of Havas' Agency were startled at 8 on Tuesday morning by the sight of a ghastly, white-sheeted figure decorously—as far as it was possible—emerging from a hackney-carriage and hurrying within the portals of that newsy nest. The position of M. Julien Duben—for he it was—a very old employee of the house, was certainly embarrassing in the extreme, but necessity knows no laws, and duty, stern duty, must ever be held paramount, even when thieves have left you in the garb—euphemistically so-called—of our first parents. A sheet is as good as a fig-leaf any day and M. Duben's youthful slumbers, the soundness of which we envy, had enabled the thieves to enter his room and carry off every available stitch of wearing apparel. Our old friend Mr. Beccani soon set matters right with a \$100 bill which set in motion a stream of tasteful haberdashers and tailors whose garments restored in due time M. Duben's equanimity.

—We learn from London that Mr. A. I. Lewin has joined the Board of the Paraguay Central Railway. Mr. Frowin is very well known in Uruguay and River Plate railway circles.

—There is a letter in our office, from England, for Mr. Arthur Hope Fanshawe. He may have it on calling or sending his card.

—The first class passengers by R. M. S. «Nile» on Wednesday were Mr. Llewellyn Edwards, Miss Edwards, Mr. W. Jones, Asst. Paymaster, J. Fyfe U. S. N. Sr. G. F. de Coronel, 15 third class. There was a long list for Buenos Aires.

—General Tajes has not yet returned from Buenos Aires, and reports are most conflicting as to when he will.

—Considerable anxiety is felt as to the British steamer «Hydarnes» which left Liverpool for the River Plate on February 27 and has not yet been heard of. It is feared she may have been lost in one of the violent storms that occurred in the Bay of Biscay early in March.

—The Central Railway branch line to Nico Perez is interrupted and goods cannot be received for points beyond San Ramon.

—In a day or two we will publish the Report of the Central Uruguay Railway for the half-year ended Dec. 31, 1896. We regret to say that it is of a disappointing nature, though hardly anything else could be expected given the circumstances of the country at that period. The next report, it is to be feared, will be still less satisfactory.

—A telegram announces the death of Dr. Von Stephan, Minister of Posts and Telegraphs in the German Cabinet.

—The Bishop's Palace at Athens has been completely destroyed by fire.

The U. S. Congress has voted \$200,000 for relief of the sufferers by the recent serious Mississippi floods.

—A Rio Janeiro telegram says that the Uruguayan Chargé has presented another diplomatic protest against the protection given in Rio Grande to the «blanco» revolutionists.

—Telegrams continue to give a better aspect to the Cretan question. Italy is said to have refused to let her vessels join in any blockade of Greece. In Athens it is now believed that the Powers will insist on the immediate withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Crete, but will allow these of Greece to remain, and that the Powers are discussing King George's proposal to submit the future nationality of the island to a popular plebiscite, which is sure to be in favor of annexation to Greece. Turkey is protesting against the time that is being allowed to Greece to muster her army on the frontier. England is taking measures to prevent the exportation of war material to Greece.

—A Washington telegram says that it is possible the Senate will modify favorably the wool rate in the Dingley tariff already approved by the Representatives. Several influential senators, it adds, are showing themselves in favor of a less prohibitive policy towards foreign commerce.

BUENOS AIRES

—The wine production of this country is rapidly increasing and soon there will be an attempt made to export the article in large quantities. The greatest difficulty now existing is the lack of capital among producers, which means inability to keep wines for a number of years. This reason alone enables certain European brands to compete in this market.

—We regret very much to learn of the death from typhoid fever of Mrs. Tubbs, wife of the Rev. Professor Tubbs of the Methodist theological college in Mercedes; she leaves two little children. Mr. and Mrs. Tubbs came here from the States only two years ago and the sad news will be a severe blow to her family there.

—On the 21st instant the marriage of Mr. W. Graham Lloyd and Miss Emily Oylor will take place in the St. John's Church. Both are well known in the British community.

—A very pretty wedding took place on Tuesday evening in the Salvador Church in Belgrano, the occasion being the marriage of Mr. Harding Dyson of Rosario, and Miss Davidson of Belgrano. Rev. Mr. Tisdall officiated.

—The Lands and Colonies Office have just approved the measurement of 8000 hectares, 32 leagues of land in Tierra del Fuego, in favour of Mr. Menendez who is already the proprietor of several leagues in the Santa Cruz territory purchased from the late Mr. Grunhein.—B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 10.

The reply of Greece to the Powers is discussed by Correspondents in the various capitals. Russia and Germany it would appear are in favour of an immediate blockade of the Greek and Cretan ports. The Italian Cabinet has decided to join in coercive measures should all the Powers agree. In France there is much opposition to treating the Greek sinner harshly. The debate on the French Government's policy has been fixed for tomorrow. From Vienna it is reported that a battalion of an infantry regiment has been ordered to be ready to embark for Crete. The news from the island itself is not reassuring. Fighting still continues. The Greek Consul and Greek subjects have left Crete by order of the Admirals. The massacres in the neighbourhood of Sitia have been confirmed. It is now reported that 400 Moslems lost their lives.

A letter was received at the Mansion House yesterday from the Duke of Connaught, enclosing cheques for 512l. 11s. 2d. for the Indian Famine Relief Fund from the troops in the Aldershot district. The Fund was raised during the day to 406,000l.

In the House of Lords, yesterday the Working Men's Dwellings Bill was read a second time at the instance of the Marquis of Londonderry.

More questions were asked in the Commons with regard to the Cretan Crisis, but Mr. Curzon did not in reply give much information of a positive character. In Committee on the Education Bill the closure was applied to reject one amendment. Many amendments were ruled out of order or out of place. An important debate took place on Mr. Lloyd George's proposal to omit the sub-section relating to the association of schools. That amendment was also defeated by a large majority. Before the House adjourned, Sir W. Harcourt asked for an assurance that the forces of the Crown should not be employed against Greece till Parliament had had an opportunity of expressing an opinion thereon. Mr. Balfour said that this would be absolutely contrary to precedent.

At the sitting of the South Africa Committee yesterday two members of the Cape Parliament—Mr. Louw and Mr. Venturi—were re-called and cross-examined by Mr. Chamberlain and other members of the Committee, chiefly as to the treatment of the natives by the Chartered Company and the Imperial Government in South Africa. They thought that the natives were treated far too well by the Imperial Government, and should be taught properly to regard the white men as their masters. Sir Graham Bower who was next called, admitted that in October, 1895, Mr. Rhodes imparted to him information as to the projected rising in Johannesburg, and expressed his determination to act in connection with that rising. The substance of that communication he, the Imperial Secretary had not conveyed to the High Commissioner or to Mr. Chamberlain because he believed that Mr. Rhodes would himself have informed the High Commissioner before using the troops and because he believed that the event was far distant. Sir Graham's cross-examination had not been concluded when the Committee adjourned till Friday.

Crowded meetings were held at the City Temple yesterday in connection with the annual assembly of the National Free Churches Council. The Rev. Hugh Price Hughes preached a sermon. Dr. Monro Gibson giving his presidential address, urged that the Evangelical

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Free Churches should emphasize no longer the negative but the positive side of their work. A loyal address to the Queen on her Diamond Jubilee was voted. Dr. Guinness Rogers gave an address on the Old and the Present Nonconformity, and Dr. Clifford read a paper on the Present Aims of the Free Churches. A resolution was also adopted expressing the hope that the freedom of the Cretan, and other Christian populations may be secured without further bloodshed.

The thirty-seventh annual meeting of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom opened yesterday, under the presidency of Sir Stafford Northcote, at the Hotel Metropole. Mr. Bryce delivered an address on secondary education. Mr. Ritchie spoke regarding English trade in foreign countries, and resolutions on various subjects were adopted.

Animated debates took place in the County Council yesterday over the election of the three Chairmen. For the office of Chairman Dr. Collins had the support of the bulk of the Progressive party, while nearly all the Moderates voted for the re-election of Sir Arthur Arnold. Dr. Collins was chosen by 61 votes to 59. Mr. Beachcroft, the Moderate nominee, was elected Vice-Chairman by 62 to 61. Mr. McKinnon Wood, the Progressive nominee, being defeated. Mr. Torrance was unanimously chosen as Deputy-Chairman.

The show of the Royal Commission on Horse Breeding and the Hunters' Improvement Society was opened at the Agricultural Hall yesterday, when Queen's premiums of 15l. were awarded to 29 thoroughbreds for districts covering the whole of England, Wales, and Scotland. The money prizes, medals, and champion cups of the Hunters' Improvement Society will be awarded to-day.

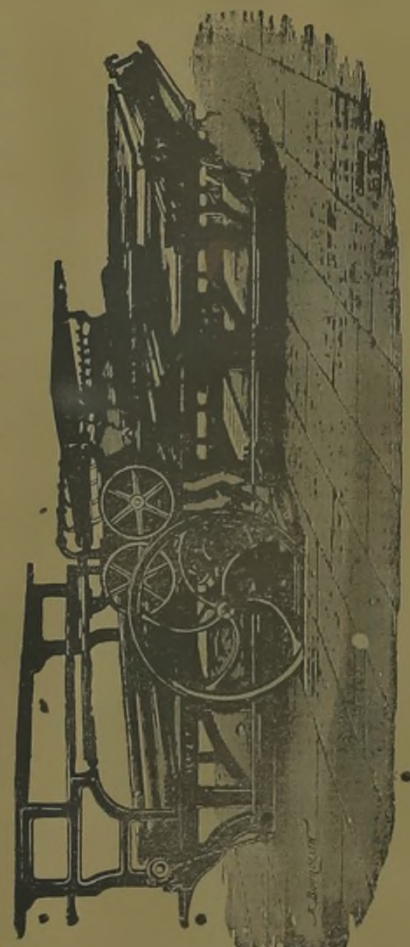

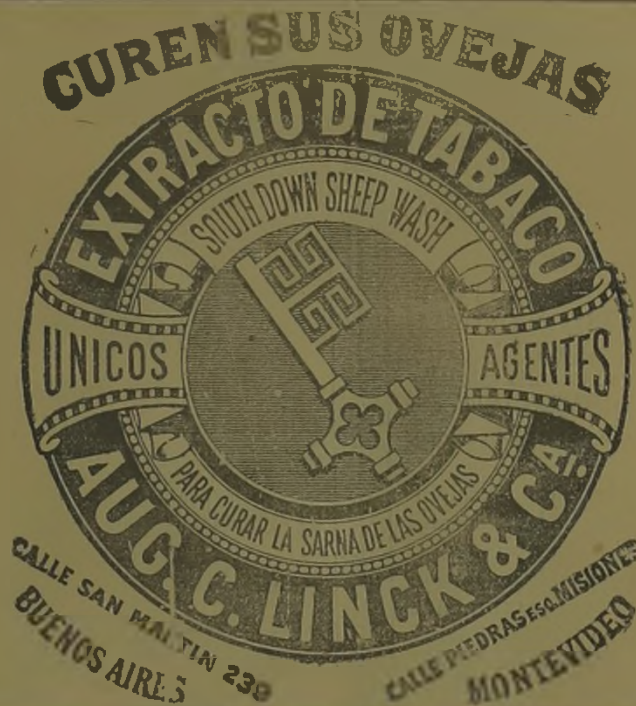
