POLITICAL NOTES.

The Senators held a short sitting on Monday, only routine business being transacted. A Message was received from the Executive relative to the arrangement of the Brazilian Debt. As this affects the Custom House duties, it was referred to the other Chamber.

Yesterday's *Razon* states that the Executive is just about to forward to the Chambers a Message with a Bill for creating extraordinary resources to meet the expenses incurred in fighting the revolution. The resources in question involve an operation of credit for \$2,000,000, guaranteed by the tobacco tax, and, according to the *Razon*, the Bank of the Republic will take part in the negotiation. No more details are available for the moment but doubtless they will appear in a day or two. We may add that an application of the Government for more resources can surprise no one, the chief wonder being that it has not been made before.

It is stated that the Legislative Committee of the Senate have reported in favor of the Bill recently presented by Dr. C. M. Ramirez for regulating the right of public meeting. It was more than we expected.

Plans for building the Correctional Prison for Women and Children were opened a few days ago. Four plans were presented, and have been set forth for public view on the ground floor of the President's house in Calle 18 de Julio. The Executive has issued a Decree completing the Jury which is to judge the plans.

General Vasquez and his suite still remain in the capital, and nothing definite is known as to their departure. General Tajes seems to be expected back from Buenos Aires to-day or to-morrow. Respecting the expected political changes we hear simply nothing whatever.

A very short Official Bulletin was issued on Monday evening, but we find nothing in it likely to interest our readers.

Football.

Albion F. C. versus H. M. S. "Retribution."

This match was played at Punta Carretas on Thursday last and proved an interesting and well-contested event. The result was a tie of 2 goals to 2, the same as the match between the same teams last year. The first goal was a disputed one, adjudged to the navy team by the Referee. Ramsay then scored one for the Albions with one of his usual swift shots. After the change over, the navy scored

again, by Mr. Clarke we believe, and just before call of time Ramsay saved the Albions by equalizing. For the "Retribution" Mr. Richards, Ward, Barry, Mr. Clarke and McKinley played a splendid game, and Drewitt and Munroe also did good service in their respective wings. For the Albions, Hogge and Adam worked hard as backs; Craven and Swindan played a good half-back game, and Buchanan, Lichtenberger and Stewart distinguished themselves among the forwards. There was a good gathering of spectators, despite athletic attractions elsewhere and depressing weather.

Albion F. C. versus Combined Navy.

This highly interesting match was played at Punta Carretas on Sunday in glorious weather and before fully 1500 spectators, being the largest gathering ever brought together by a football match in Montevideo. The result was a defeat for the plucky Albions, which is neither surprising nor creditable when it is remembered that the opposing team comprised the pick of the four British war vessels now in port. The Albions were also unfortunate in having to place substitutes, one of whom was unwell, in the field in place of two of their best men, Buchanan and C. Poole. The Navy scored 4 goals namely, one by Ramsay of the "Acorn", two by Jackson of the "Basilisk" and one by Hogge of the Albions who in trying to stop a long shot had the bad luck to put the ball through his own goal. The solitary point scored by the Albions was obtained from a scrimmage in front of goal. For the Navy, Jackson, Gaskell, Burnette, Ramsay and Ward played well; whilst Hogge, Lichtenberger and Stewart were the best of the losers. Some complaints were made of unnecessarily rough play on part of one or two of the Navy men, which the Referee would do well to check on a future occasion.

We believe that a return match is being arranged for next Sunday.

BRITISH BANK OF SOUTH AMERICA.

Mr. C. Carrington, in moving the adoption of the report at the thirty-fourth ordinary meeting of this company, at the offices, 2A, Moorgate Street, on Friday, March 26, regretted that it gave a very unsatisfactory and disappointing account of the business. It was not until the last three or four months of the year that they had any idea of the heavy loss that was about to fall upon the bank. When they closed the half-year's account on June 30 they had every reason to anticipate a prosperous year. The promise was such as to induce them to pay in September the usual dividend of 4 per cent., absorbing £20,000, and to add nearly £30,000 to the £20,000 brought forward. However, all the profit was swept away during the last six months of the year. That unsatisfactory result was mainly brought about by losses on exchange in Brazil. The loss occurred in the Rio de Janeiro branch, where the manager, notwithstanding repeated warnings from the board, allowed himself to be led away by over-confidence in the exchange brokers and the conviction that he and others entertained that in consequence of the very large crop of coffee a rise in the exchange was inevitable. The brokers sold bills which they had not got, and when the time came for the delivery of the bills the brokers were unable to deliver them, the consequence being that the bank had to go into the market and buy the necessary bills at a large loss. If the manager had attended to the instructions sent from London the loss would never have been made, and the manager was now on his way to England, at the request of the board, to explain his conduct. The secretary had also gone to South America to report on the working of all the branches, and while he (the chairman) did not think that such good business would be done in future, yet he did not wish to convey the impression that good business was not to be done. In making up the accounts full provision had been made for any bad debts or losses known up to the present time, and the accounts showed exactly the bank's position, which was simply that, after providing for all liabilities, the capital was intact, and the reserve of £350,000, less the £39,549 required to make up the loss by the fall on exchange on that portion of their capital employed in Brazil, was also intact; and those two sums were sufficient to pay for every share on which £10 or £15 had been paid. The withdrawal of £50,000 from the reserve to enable the payment of the usual dividend was only determined on after such consideration, and that fund was consequently reduced to £300,000.

Mr. G. Magaw seconded the motion, which was carried.

THE COMMERCIAL TRIP TO THE UNITED STATES.

We have referred on previous occasions to the trip of commercial representatives of the South and Spanish American Republics to the United States which is being organized to take place shortly, under the auspices of the Philadelphia Museums and of the leading commercial bodies of the United States. The delegate from Uruguay was to have been Mr. B. Lorenzo Hill, representative in the River Plate of the Standard Life Assurance Co. of Edinburgh, but unfortunately this and other business interests prevent him from having the Republic during the present critical situation, so he has been reluctantly obliged to refuse the invitation. However, some interest will be found in the following documents recently received by him and which he has allowed us to copy for publication.—

(Letter.)

Dear Sir, I have the honor to transmit to you an invitation from the Trustees and Officers of the Philadelphia Commercial Museums requesting your presence in Philadelphia in June next. I have to inform you that the President of the United States will be present at this meeting on June 1st and therefore you are requested to so time your departure from your country as to arrive in Philadelphia on May 31st.

THE "DIAMOND JUBILEE."

A WORLD-WIDE THANKSGIVING.

Arrangements are, says the *Daily News*, being made for special thanksgivings in the churches on Accession Day, Sunday, June 20th. At a given hour throughout the world, where the English Church has its representatives, there will be prayer and thanks giving. Of course, this religious observance of the Accession Day is not likely to be limited to the churches under episcopal organization alone. It will be participated in by the Roman Catholic Church and all other denominations flourishing under the freedom of the Queen. The Archbishop of Canterbury is expected to draw up a special form of prayer for the Church of England, and the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Westminster will probably do the same by direction of the Pontiff. It is probable that noon Greenwich will be selected for the hour of universal prayer; and generally it is hoped that at the conclusion of these services throughout world the National Anthem will be sure.

The Queen will be at Windsor Castle, and will spend the day in private thanksgiving. There is a talk of a special service in the morning (which would be attended by the Royal guests) at Westminster Abbey. Such service, if it should take place, would be fully choral, with a special Te Deum, such as is to mark the great celebration at St. Paul's on the 22nd June, and at a given signal the National Anthem would be sung as an anthem pure and simple.

As to the open-air services on the 22nd of June at St. Paul's

Cathedral, its central feature will be a specially-composed Te Deum. The composition has been entrusted to Dr. Marlin, organist of St. Paul's, who is now engaged upon it. He will have some 250 voices, taken from the choir of St. Paul's, St. George's Windsor, Westminster Abbey, and the Chapel Royal, St. James's Palace. The choir will stand prominently on the west steps of St. Paul's, around the clergy. A special organ is to be erected in one of the recesses on one side of the West Front, and band instruments may be called into use to give volume of sound in the great open space. The prayers will be brief, one of them, a special prayer for the long life and happiness of the Queen, and probably the ceremony will close with the National Anthem. There will be an adequate representation of clergy from all parts of the kingdom. The Archbishops, the Bishop of London, and the Bishop of Winchester will be there, the Deans of Windsor, Westminster and St. Paul's, and the Sub Dean of the Chapel Royal. There will be a procession of the clergy through St. Paul's to the West Front, where a special altar will be erected on the steps of the Cathedral.

SUNDRIES

—The Director of our afternoon contemporary the *Dia*, Sr. Baile y Ordoñez, has very courteously consented to publish the translation into Spanish of our recent articles in reply to Dr. Palomeque on the Carvalho case, and the first will appear to-day or to-morrow, being continued daily until concluded. This will bring them under the notice of a large circle of native readers to whom they were unintelligible in English. We do not intend to publish the translation in our columns, thinking that its appearance in the *Dia* will sufficiently serve the purpose, and also that our readers have had quite enough of the topic for the present.

—Owing to the rather late hour of yesterday's meeting at the Legation respecting the Diamond Jubilee Fund, we are obliged to defer a report until our next.

—According to a telegram, the London *Times* of the 18th has a leading article on the situation in Uruguay.

—A letter reached us yesterday from a camp subscriber suggesting that subscriptions for the "Diamond Jubilee" Memorial might be applied to building an esplanade at the back of the British Hospital, or to the foundation of a good English Library (this is certainly a want which deserves attention some day). As the suggestions arrived too late to be considered in yesterday's meeting, there is no further object in our printing the letter.

—If the Albions can get together 1500 spectators to witness one of their football matches, as was said to be the case last Sunday, it would not be a bad idea for them to play a special match and charge gate money, say 10 or 20 cents, giving the proceeds to charity or to the Red Cross.

—A letter from an Italian officer in Abyssinia to an Italian paper speaks of the impression made by his appearance on a bicycle among the children of nature. He says that while riding with a white flag attached to the steering gear towards the line of the Abyssinians, the outposts and picket-guards were so utterly surprised that they forgot all about asking him what errand he came on. According to the *Cycle*, he calmly descended when reaching the post, and demanded to be shown to the head quarters of Ras Mangasha. He was shown the direction, and accompanied by two Abyssinian horsemen, continued on his way. They rode at his side in mute admiration. When they arrived at the camp of Ras they informed the latter that a messenger of the Italians had come on a horse sent to him by heaven. The wily chief, not quite so glib as the rest of his troops, was considerably amused and requested the Italian officer to give an exhibition of riding on the wheel, which the latter gladly did. After looking at the different evolutions of the wheel for a time, the Ras allowed the messenger to return, but gave him no answer to the message he brought.

—The German Dr. Dryasdust seems to be always on the look out for some excuse for celebrating a literary centenary. The very latest of these festive and learned anniversaries, according to the *Munch Neueste Nachrichten*, was held in memory of the death of Baron Munchausen, which occurred on February 22, 1797. Many a reader of the fictitious adventures of the famous hero of the "Munchauseniad" (which was first published in English at Oxford during the lifetime of this prince of all liars) have no conception that the hero was a real person. Baron Hieronymus Karl Friedrich von Munchausen was a Hanoverian nobleman, a subject of our first three Georges; he was born in 1730

and died in 1797. He took service in a Russian cavalry regiment, but retired in old age to his ancestral estate at Bodenwerder, in Hanover, where he became notorious for the magnificent lies about his military adventures, with which he used to entertain his neighbors at his hospitable board. A collection of these stories, entitled "Vademecum für lustige Leute," was published at Berlin in 1781, without the baron's permission. The English work, "Baron Munchausen's Narrative of his Marvellous Travels and Campaigns in Russia," was an expansion and improvement of the Berlin collection.

—Yesterday's *Nacion* aimably suggests that the Red Cross expeditions should be prohibited, as they are mainly composed of spies in favor of the revolution!

—A London telegram, of which we indignantly refuse to believe a word, says that European sympathies, with the exception of students and socialists, are in favor of Turkey, it being believed that Greece, in precipitating events, has compromised the peace of all Europe. Seeing that the Eastern crisis, provoked by the barbarities of Turkey towards the Christians, has been simmering for some years, we fail to see the precipitation. Greece has only done what the "Great Impotences" themselves should have done long ago, that's all.

—On Monday afternoon President Borda paid a visit of nearly an hour to Commandant Rizzo, the wounded Chief of the "Artigas," receiving from his own lips a detailed account of the capture of that vessel.

—Numerous protests, says the *Razon*, are being made from all parts of the interior, of the wholesale manner in which the military are seizing horses from the estancias, not even leaving sufficient for the most necessary purposes of estancia life. Probably the Rural Association will be asked to intervene with the new Minister of War (a member of its Board) for the issue of some order for more moderation in this respect.

—Col. Candido Robido, Uruguayan Consul in Marseilles, embarked yesterday to return to his post.

—The marriage of Mr. Adolpho Eastman to Miss Maria Adela Montero, will take place on May 1st, and will be celebrated in the house of the bride's parents.

—We learn from the Buenos Aires papers that a representative Committee has been formed among the Uruguayan "colorados" resident there, with the object of bringing about a conciliation.

—We were wrong in saying recently that "Imperio" was the first Uruguayan horse taken to run in England. Many years ago a horse named "Victory" belonging to the former resident Mr. Longdale was taken home by Mr. Dawson and ran on the English turf, but without distinguishing itself.

—Old Mr. Chapman sat down at the table, and ordered a glass of milk. "See here!" he called to the waiter, and his voice was full of indignation, "here's a cow's hair floating around in this milk." "Well, sir," the waiter made answer, softly rubbing his hands together, "you wouldn't expect to find a horse hair in milk, would you?"

—On Monday evening there was a tremendous alarm in the Central Police Station, caused by a sudden revolver shot in the patio. The guard were called out, the doors rapidly closed, the authorities sent for, and there was unmitigated excitement until some one, more collected than the rest, found that nothing more serious had happened than the accidental discharge of a revolver which one of the warders was cleaning. Quite a crowd gathered in the Plaza in front of the Cabildo, but were promptly cleared out by the police.

—The Brazilian Government has issued the Decree authorizing the Brazil Great Southern Railway Company to build the "international" bridge over the River Cuareim, which will establish railway communication between Brazil and Uruguay. If the bridge has to be destroyed in case of war the Brazilian Government accepts responsibility for half its cost. The Railway Company is obliged to respect the regulations that will be issued concerning international traffic and Customs operations.

—The Greco-Turkish war has commenced in thorough earnest, and promises to be bloody if not long. After a hot fight the Turks have captured the important pass of Melouna (or Mıldouna) which leads to the plains of Thessaly, near Elassona, where Marshal Edhem Pacha, the Turkish Commander in Chief, has fixed his headquarters. The Greeks made a valiant resistance, but were dislodged after a terrible hand to hand fight. Some 30,000 men were engaged and there were heavy losses on both sides. The Turkish artillery is said to have done great execution. Fighting is also

reported from Janina, the capital of Epirus, from Damassi, and many other points on the Macedonian and Thessalian frontiers. In some of these engagements the Greeks have been successful. The bombardment of Preveza by the Greeks continues without decisive result. The Sultan has ordered all Greek residents in Crete to leave the island. The war correspondent of the *Daily Telegraph* is said to be wounded at Salonica.

LONDON NOTES.

TUESDAY, MARCH 23.

The report comes from Copenhagen that Russia has concluded a secret treaty with Turkey, guaranteeing the integrity of the latter, in return for an island in the Mediterranean. The Russian Minister at Athens yesterday had an interview with King George, and a Cabinet Council was subsequently called. The visit of M. Onou is supposed to have been connected with the warlike preparations made by Greece in the Gulf of Arta.

Yesterday being the centenary of the birth of the late Emperor William, an imposing memorial, consisting of an equestrian statue of that monarch and various allegorical figures in stone, was unveiled in Berlin, in the presence of the Emperor, the federal princes, and representatives of the foreign dynasties.

The House of Lords sat for a few minutes yesterday transacting formal business.

In the Commons approach to public business was delayed for three hours by discussion of a Bill promoted by the City of London for including Southwark in its boundaries. The Government declined to express any definite view on this Bill, which in the result was thrown out by 187 votes to 109, a majority of 18. The House resumed consideration in Committee of the Military Works (Money) Bill. The remaining clauses and the schedule were agreed to, the Bill being reported without amendment.

There was a very large and influential gathering at the Mansion House yesterday on behalf of the British and Foreign Sailors Society. The Duchess of Albany took part in the proceedings, over which the Lord Mayor presided. Archdeacon Sinclair, the Rev. John Watson (Dean of Marlborough), Lord Kinnaird, the Hon. T. A. Brassey, Mr. Tufnell, chairman of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, and other gentlemen addressed the meeting.

Sir Clements Markham read a paper before the Royal Geographical Society last night on "The North Polar Problem." In this he indicated the work which he thought should be undertaken by future expeditions. Dr. Nansen, who was present, expressed the view that what they mostly wanted from the Arctic regions were scientific observations. He did not think it would be difficult to reach the Pole, if it were worth while; but they would not bring back sufficient scientific observations to repay the waste of time and labour.

At a meeting held at headquarters in London yesterday the executive of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers decided to call out the whole of the men in the federated employers' establishments not affected by lock-out notices on Saturday next. Telegraphic instructions were sent to the district committees in the federated area, and as a result, should the lockout notices be enforced, at the end of the present week an aggregate of from twelve to sixteen thousand men will leave work. The masters meet at Carlisle to-day to consider the suggestion made by the north-east coast unionists as a possible preliminary to a conference of the two sides.

Two liners have been wrecked off the Welsh coast. The Harrison liner *Orion* went ashore at Penrhyn Point, near Holyhead, during a dense fog, and the Moss Line liner *Anubis*, after collision with the *Amethyst*, went down off Bardsey Island. In both cases the officers and crew were rescued.

At Bow-street Police Court yesterday the magistrate investigated a matrimonial case in which John Ramsay, an actor, was summoned by his wife for using threatening language. The evidence of the complainant was that the defendant used this language in consequence of jealousy arising out of the compliments she received from patrons in front of the stage. The defendant in turn made complaints of his wife, who is now, as Miss Gwynne Herbert, acting at the Comedy Theatre. Eventually the summons was dismissed.

—Gold opened in B. Aires yesterday at 301 and closed at 304.

—Exchange upon London was quoted in Rio Janeiro yesterday at 7 13/16 d. per milreis.

—London, 20. Wheat firm. Linsed, 29s. Maize, 14s.—Antwerp. Linsed 18.25 francs, maize 7.60. Wool, class B, 3.65 francs for May and September.

—At the half-yearly meeting of shareholders of the Banco Comercial held last Saturday, Sres. A. Hoffmann, E. MacEwen, A. Seré, F. Goyesche, M. Ila, E. Castellanos and A. Morales were re-elected Directors. The two last-named declined to serve so Sres. P. Mañi and José Saavedra were elected in their stead. The Report for the half-year shows a net profit of \$49,041, which added to \$2928 brought forward makes a total of \$51,969, equivalent to 3.26 % on the paid-up capital there remaining profits in expense estimated at \$14,167. The Directors recommended a Dividend of 3 % or \$12 per share, carrying forward \$4,149.89 to new account. The Reserve Fund has been raised to \$469,533.—The Bank is now paying the Dividend referred to, which was duly approved by the Meeting.

Both patients mended quickly, however, in the fine, pure air; and fears for Cecil's lack of entertainment vanished speedily. Whether she went with Milicent to herd the cows up through gorse and heather, or wandered with Katie along the beach below the cliffs, her young soul overbrimmed with pleasure. Moreover, she possessed those higher instincts which pierce the outer surface of things to that inner and hidden beauty linking them to the divine.

She sported with Beth and Nesta as with a pair of kittens, but Myles was ever her best approved companion. Instinctively she divined those subtler workings of his nature indiscernible to and unsuspected by less delicate perceptions; while to the boy's silent observation she typified an ethereal refinement long craved for by every perception of his being. 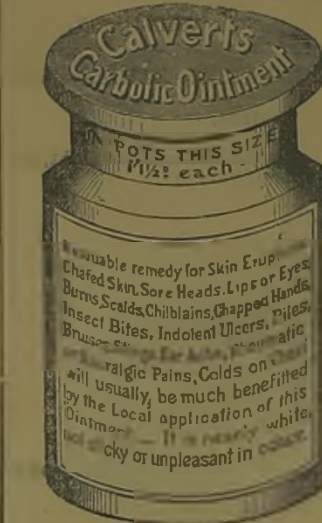
