The Position of the Argentine Republic.

The recent rise of the gold premium till it reached the extraordinary figure of 272, though steadily declining again, is a most eloquent sign of the monetary panic which exists on the neighbouring Bolas; while the numerous bankruptcies, the stagnation of business and the peremptory orders sent by the most prominent merchants to stop all further remittances of goods to the Plate, is a clear proof that unless something very much to be done to alleviate the market, the crisis through which Argentine commerce is at present passing, will prove but an insignificant preliminary squall preceding a tremendous storm, which may possibly put that highly favoured country many years back in the race of progress and leave deep scars upon its fair fame which it will take ages of steady labour to efface.

Fortunately the government seems at last to be awakening to the truth of the seriousness of the situation and it is said that efforts are being made to reduce the budget of national expenses by no less than ten millions. The fact that such a reduction could be possible is sufficient to show where much of the present evil has had its origin. Other factors there are, besides the foolish heaping up of unnecessary expenses, that must also be vigorously coped with, if any permanent good is to be accomplished. The disorganization in the national banking movement resulting from inconvertibility and hopelessly depreciated paper, demands immediate attention, while the tremendous fall in the value of property as demonstrated at the recent sale of the port lands, is a clear proof of the evil which has been wrought by the constant, excessive and unscrupulous issue of cedulas which has induced and encouraged most damaging over speculation, the bitter fruit of which is being reaped when the most valuable lands the country possesses, those of the Madero port, lands whose value should more than pay the immense cost of that important work, were offered for sale with easy payments at long dates and the sale had to be suspended after the adjudgment of one lot to Sr. Madero, for want of bidders.

Let us trust that the government at length really aroused by such palpable demonstrations, may take such salutary measures that they do not directly influence the market, by restoring confidence both at home and abroad, may suffice to arrest the progress of the approaching storm cloud and prevent its breaking with irresistible force upon the Argentine Republic.

Though the actual position of the Argentine Republic is critical, there is yet time to conjure the crisis, and to this desirable end the splendid harvests this year should materially conduce.

Argentine Republic

The State of Agriculture in the Argentine Republic.
The British Board of Agriculture have issued the following highly satisfactory memorandum on the state of agriculture in the Argentine Republic:—
"Accounts of the harvest in the Argentine Republic have been received by the Board of Agriculture from the Foreign Office, showing that it was expected to begin a few days after Dec. 2 in the northern provinces of Santa Fé and Entre Rios, where it is generally two to three weeks earlier than in the province of Buenos Aires, in which it is likely to be late this season. Published state-

ments forecast a greatly increased yield of wheat over last year, which was notoriously bad, and, owing to the much larger acreage sown, it is anticipated by many that the crops of cereals will be the largest ever known. The wheat crop in the Argentine Republic was so short last year that wheat was imported from Odessa and Genoa, which was quite a new feature in the grain trade of that country. "Grave apprehensions exist among farmers as to the mode of getting their produce to market in the coming season, on account of the increased yield of agricultural products, particularly as storage accommodation has yet to be created. The exports of wheat from the Argentine Republic in the first nine months of 1889 were 15,452 tons, compared with 172,353 tons in the corresponding period of 1888. The progress of agriculture in the Argentine Republic is illustrated by the fact of 32,49 ploughs having been imported in nine months of 1889, as compared with 20,160 in the whole of 1888, and 17,585 in the whole of 1887. One thousand seven hundred and seventy-two reaping machines were imported from January 1, 1889, to September 30, 1889, as against 2,718 in 1888, and 1,434 in 1887."

Fire.

About 11 on Monday night a fire broke out at Messrs. Sprout, Segar, and Co's premises, druggists, at 930 Calle Rivadavia, the alarm of fire being first given by a boy called José Seguro and Manuel Salazar, a peon who lived on the premises. Owing to the inflammable quality of the liquids, the conflagration speedily extended to a saddler's contents, partially consuming the contents and was only arrested by the firemen after a hard fight of four hours. The drug store was insured in several different companies to the amount of \$129,600; the amount of the losses has not as yet been calculated. Don Bernardo Benedit, the saddler, had his business insured for \$60,000, and has suffered losses to the amount of \$5,000.

Provincial Bank.

D. Nicasio Duarte has been named Accountant of this Bank, in place of Sr. Dessein, who has been appointed Inspector General.

Mendoza Bank.

The balance sheet shows a gross profit of \$828,378 and a net profit of \$762,177.

Public Library.

443 readers attended the Library, of whom 263 were foreigners.

Immigration.

In January and February last year 52,259 immigrants arrived here: in the corresponding period of this year the arrivals were only 34,596.

La Plata.

The tenders for the purchase of the Provincial Railways will be opened on the 18th inst., in the office of the Minister of Public Works. Should a sale be effected the Government will have to pay \$22,000,000 out of the purchase money to the Provincial Bank.

The President of the Hypothecary Bank has ordered the sale of a large number of properties, the owners of which are in arrears with their quarterly payments.

Railway News.

Dr. Arazo, President of the Railway Board, who is drawing up the estimates for the Andine Railway, complains that he has no books of the Company to guide him, as they were sent to Buenos Aires a few days before the decree appeared rescinding the contract with Clark and Sanford.

Messrs. Polacz and Co., concessionaires of the Reconquista and Formosa line, have asked Government to hand them over the lands for the line, as the owners of same refuse to give them unless they are first paid, in direct opposition to Article 96 of the Colonies' Act and Article 16 of the National Lands Sale Act, which provide that, in case of railways, the owners of land bought from Government are not entitled to any indemnity whatever.

The Andine railway carried, in 1889, 22,918 first-class passengers, 29,493 second-class and 200,163,633 kilos of goods, the figures exceeding those of 1888 by 60,647,951 and 13,915 respectively.

Engineer Wauer has made a report on the condition and service of the F. C. Argentine del Este during the month of Feb. last. The expense for the maintenance of the permanent way for the month of January was \$6,561.91, being at the rate of \$1.01 per kil. 729,714 tons of goods were carried; also 2,300 passengers.

Regattas.

Some of the comic papers desirous of being more than usually funny, keep an announcing the approach of Regattas to be given sometimes at the Pocitos and sometimes in the Bay, under the auspices of the Rowing Clubs, and, also, snidey athletic meetings at the Cricket Field in which Señoras distinguidas will take part; all of which however we fail to see the joke, we have no doubt there is one hidden away somewhere and we trust some body may enjoy a hearty laugh when they happen to discover it.

Government.

Notwithstanding the numerous versions that circulate nothing is yet definitely known concerning the constitution of the new ministry. The decrees are, however, confidently expected before the end of the week.

La Razon says that Dr. Ellauri has been invited to accept the portfolio of Government and ventures to think Señor Blas Vidal will accept the Ministry of Religion and Public Education. The same paper credits President Herrera with having declared to a friend: "I come to undertake a Pacific government and I

A committee of Brazilian residents were engaged with making the presentation, under the presidency of Sr. Alfredo Bastos, who made an eloquent speech which was answered by Sr. Bocayuva in an appropriate manner. The Argentine Minister Señor Guido, Dr. Magariños Cervantes and many others were present.

The representatives of the Press who have been designated to present Sr. Bocayuva with an album met yesterday at 2 o'clock. The album contains on the front pages a well written dedicatory composition of Dr. Martinez to Minister Bocayuva which is followed by 345 signatures.

Dr. Martinez of *El Siglo* presented the album in the name of the Press, with a few effective phrases, to which Sr. Bocayuva replied in suitable terms. The representatives of a large number of the Montevidean newspapers were present.

The Chief of the Foreign Offices Señor Hordeñana, called on Sr. Bocayuva yesterday to bid the distinguished diplomatist farewell in the name of the President of the Republic.

Sr. Bocayuva left yesterday afternoon for Rio in the «Portugal». The Brazilian residents and other friends accompanied him on board. The Brazilian man-of-war «Trajano» will escort the «Portugal» to Brazilian waters.

Diplomatic.

Dr. Ramiro Barcellos who is to take the place recently vacated by Sr. Ponte Riveiro, as Brazilian Minister in Uruguay, arrived on Wednesday in the «Desterro» from Rio Janeiro.

Dr. Moreno, the Argentine Minister to the Brazilian Republic, and Dr. Ernesto Frias the Oriental Minister to the Argentine Republic left on Wednesday for Buenos Aires in the «Venus».

Influenza.

Dr. Pedro Blanes is seriously ill with influenza complicated with pulmonary disorders. The attack is so intense that Drs. Serratos and Guena, who are attending him, give little hope of his recovery.

The Battle of Flowers.

It has been resolved that the Battle of Flowers which is to form the splendid finish of a rather tame but long spent Carnival is to take place at the Paso del Molino next Sunday. The Committee in charge of this attractive fete have made the necessary arrangements for the illumination of that part of the Calle Agraciada destined to the floral fray and also of the General Rondeau Avenue. The illumination will be effected with 60 large ornamental arches.

Mr. Langworthy Reappears.

If a telegram published by the *Razon* yesterday is to be trusted, Mr. Langworthy, the millionaire owner of the Florencia Colony, and the hero of the notorious Langworthy case which created such a sensation all over the world some twenty months ago, has been finding himself in hot water at Rosario Santa Fé, whither he has recently returned from Europe. He put up at the English hotel there, but it appears that his presence was not agreeable to the other Englishmen there, and they accordingly represented to the landlord that either Mr. Langworthy must leave or they would, at the same time using some very forcible expressions regarding his character. This appears to have touched the millionaire's sensibilities, and led to a violent scene. It is said that he contemplates legal action, and has moreover threatened to buy up the Hotel, its proprietor and all the English residents therein. The upshot of the affair remains to be learnt, but we do not think Mr. Langworthy will succeed.

Regattas.

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shall take special care not to provoke the resuscitation of questions that may raise animosities. I wish to concentrate all the action of my government in the regulation of the administration, and I shall avoid as much as possible all demonstration that might characterize it as exaggerated liberalism or as reactionary. Things are at present progressing favourably and nothing is so desirable for the country, in this respect, as the actual *status quo*."

Colonel Sixto Rodriguez has been appointed Aide-de-camp to the President of the Republic. He held the same post during the administration of General Tajes. Colonel Rodriguez has exercised his functions since the 1st March having officially accompanied President Herrera to the banquet recently given in his honour in the Solis.

General Tajes, the ex-president is still very much visited both by ministers and foreign consuls, deputies, senators and officers of high rank.

Death.

We regret to hear that the telegraph has announced the sad news of the death, in Boston U. S. A., of Mr. Howard, the father of the North American vice-consul in this city, Mr. Thomas W. Howard. Mr. Howard and family we believe had intended to have visited the United States shortly.

Fire.

We learn by telegram that a very serious fire has broken out in the town of Bahia, Brazil, caused by the explosion of a powder barrel. Some twelve houses have been destroyed, whilst thirty persons are reported as burnt or killed, and many more injured. The losses are said to be very heavy.

An English Opera Company.

We hear on good authority that Mr. Cleary, who went home in the P. M. S. «Don» has contracted with the National Theatre at Buenos Aires, on behalf of Mr. D'Oyly Carte, with the intention of bringing out a company for the representation of the series of Gilbert and Sullivan's Operettas during the coming winter. The same fact is mentioned in a telegram received from B. Aires to-day, although the English papers from there do not refer to the subject. We hope that the news is true and that the Company will not neglect to visit Montevideo in the course of their tour.

Sundries.

General Tajes will leave next Saturday for the splendid estancia of Sr. Darrota on the Quequen, where in company with a large number of friends he will pass some three or four days of vacation well deserved after the recent close of his arduous labours.

The roads and streets of the comparatively new suburb called Atacualpa are to be paved. The Board of Works is calling for tenders.

We note the death of William Bartlett an Englishman 22 years of age, who died on the 6th in the British Hospital.

The proposition made the Municipality by Doña Enriqueta M. de Sosa Diaz for herself and her children, by which she cedes the land situated at the east of the Central Cemetery to the Municipality, on the condition that they undertake the street paving themselves, has been accepted by the authorities.

Various Spanish artists here are preparing to give a representation of the Spanish Zarzuela «El anillo de Hierro» at the Solis to-night. The entertainment is dedicated to the President of the Republic Dr. Herrera y Obes, the company having contracted with the prima donna Cabrero and the tenor Blaya from Buenos Aires.

The Inspector of Theatres Señor Giribaldi, has called on the proprietors of the wretched Circo Oriental to intimate the necessity of their making a more decent entrance for the public, as the present entrance is so narrow as to be unsafe.

Yesterday was the 20th anniversary of the commencement of the revolution known as the invasion of General Aparicio. What tremendous advances the country has made since then!

We return the courteous salutations of the excellent artists Enrico Pogliani and Paride Povoleri, who form part of the first rate company of artists who will make their debut in the Politeama Theatre on Saturday in *Aida* one of Verdi's most deservedly admired operas. Señor Enrico Pogliani is entrusted with the important role of *Amonastro*, *Re degli etiopi*, of which part he is said to be a first rate representative. Señor Povoleri is a capital bass.

The grand gala function to take place to-night in the Solis in honour of President Herrera y Obes will be opened by the singing of the National Hymn. The Zarzuela which will follow, *El anillo de Hierro* is a well known favourite of the Montevidean public.

We think newspapers that take upon themselves to publish, gratis, the time tables of the different railways here, by so doing, also incur the responsibility of seeing that they properly correct them when altered by the Companies; otherwise they are liable to mislead the public.

The officers of the army are endeavouring to arrange that the usual yearly *paseo* or bivouac of the army at Punta Carretas shall take place this month.

All the blood horses raised in the stables of the Estancia del Colorado the property of the heirs of the late General Santos are to be sold by auction on the 30th. Amongst other animals there are 43 colts and fillies progeny of Celar, Pretendiente and Black Lyon.

The D'Oliveira anti-pyrene case is still dragging on before the Criminal Judge. Declarations were made on Wednesday by Mrs. D'Oliveira the mother of the deceased and also by the servant of the house.

We hear that President Herrera has declared that all the minor employees of government offices will be retained in their present posts irrespective of their political opinions as long as they are fitted for their work. This comfortable assurance has greatly relieved the feelings of certain avowed oppositionists, who were trembling for the fate of their bread and cheese. This declaration is another proof of the judicious policy of the new president.

Sometimes advertisers call and paying advertisements for a month or so in advance, leave directions for letters in answer to wait at the office of this paper till called for; they go away and leave no clue as to where they can be communicated with, and perhaps, in the meantime having obtained what they wanted, never send for any communications awaiting them. The consequence is that we go on advertising their wants till the end of the stipulated term and letters keep on piling up higher and higher for them. The advertisers may be dead for aught we know. We mentioned the matter to one of our subscribers the other day, who could not understand why he had received no reply to his letters with which he had twice answered one of these neglectful advertisers, and to show us that he appreciated our explanation, he gave us an illustration of how forgetfulness in business matters was treated by a North American. An English firm had sent to the United States a number of accounts for collection. In course of time some were returned as uncollectable; one due from a Mr. John Morgan being endorsed «Mr. John Morgan is dead».

The Criminal Judge has forwarded to the police station the clothes worn by Mr. Trimble on the occasion of his unfortunate encounter with Sr. Crossa. This has been done that Drs. Taglio, Perez and Grolero may report on the matter, their report being added to the other documentary evidence in the case.

Another individual was imprisoned yesterday for selling tickets in foreign lotteries. Most of these foreign lotteries are regular frauds and the police are to be commended for their diligence in preventing the sale of the tickets, as it is well known that the extract containing the list of prizes of these lotteries can be obtained before the lottery is played. If people must «try their luck» in lotteries let them buy tickets of the Caridad Lottery in which they have not to battle against fraud but have only the usual few thousand chances to one against their pulling off the big prize.

Stone throwing again. When will those awful boys be induced to stop their evil practice of stone throwing. A little boy named Kuby, standing on the balcony of his father's house in Calle Missones, yesterday was struck in the head by a stone thrown by some street urchins, and seriously wounded. The Police have at last promised to look into the matter.

The other day two ladies were walking along Calle Sierra and some boy or boys unknown, threw a brickbat from the other side of a wall and hit the elder lady in the face. When the ladies called on the owner to complain he of course said the brickbat could not possibly have come from his property as there were no boys there, though ladies distinctly heard the scarcely suppressed laughter of boys retreating within the further patios of the house. The ladies felt somewhat annoyed when they realized that they had no other resource than to retire gracefully, excusing themselves politely for having troubled the bland proprietor.

It is said that the Novelli Italian Opera Company will make their debut here very shortly before going to Buenos Ayres where the state of gold is at present not very encouraging.

The International Sanitary Convention has been published, we shall comment upon it in our next.

The celebrated ballet dancer Limido who was so much admired some time back in the Solis, when Ferrari put on the grand musical ballets *Exelsior*, *Brahma*, etc, has just died in Milan of influenza.

One hundred and thirty more immigrants have arrived in the «Eolo» from Buenos Aires.

Another Banquet.

We hear that a group of foreign residents representing various nations, have decided to celebrate another banquet in honour of President Herrera, who will be invited as well as General Tajes and the deputies and senators and the members of the Tribunal of Justice. This new banquet is to be a most brilliant and expensive affair the cost being estimated at 100\$ per cover.

Almost gone.

Sta. Isabel Torres was visiting at the house of Sr. Parno, No. 221, Calle Treinta y Tres, on Wednesday when on leaning over the balcony she was suddenly seized with giddiness and lost consciousness. Her body fell forward remaining in an almost impossible position half over the balcony.

It seemed as though she would fall into the street at every moment, and it is probable that the information given to the household by certain bystanders was only just in time to save her from almost certain death.

Telegrams

(From our Special Correspondent)

London, March 5.
An accident happened to the Scotch Express train last night, at Carlisle station. Owing to the slippery state of the rails the locomotive could not pull up the train in time, and it dashed into an engine that was a little way ahead. The two front carriages were telescoped by the shock, and four passengers killed, besides several injured.

In the House of Lords, Lord Salisbury has declared that it rested with the Commons to take steps in the Parnell case, seeing that imputations were made against members of his body.

Berlin, March 5.
Strikes are extending amongst the manufacturing hands. Five factories are closed and the hands of several other threaten to leave work. The factories are being guarded by the police.

B. Aires, March 6.
The petition of Messrs Sanford and Clark for reconsideration of the decree annulling the sale of the Andine Railway has been rejected and shelved.

Another meeting of Ministers has been held to give form to the proposed reduction in the budget, which now seems to be a certainty. The President, it is said, will return on the 15th, and will immediately make some important changes in the Ministry.

There have arrived here 15 mariners of the Italian bark "Giovanni," which founded 300 miles from Rio Janeiro. She was bound for Falmouth with produce.

The creditors of Sr. Carlos Schweitzer have decided to accept the properties he surrendered on their behalf. It is probable that the failure of the brokers who operated on his behalf will implicate several others of high standing. He himself is suffering from a severe attack of influenza.

The quarantine on vessels from Mata Grosso is about to be raised.

The market continues to improve. Gold fell to 24 3/4 cash, 24 end of month.

There are rumours afloat that a syndicate of English bankers will take 50,000 National Bank shares at 200 par.

Large orders to purchase wheat have come out to leading houses and have sent exchange up to 47 1/2 d.

It is said that large orders to buy Catalinas shares have been received from Montevideo.

The Bank of England rate of discount has been reduced to 4 1/2 per cent.

Wool from Ayacucho was sold to-day at 8 1/2, the highest price of the year.

Two more brokers have failed.

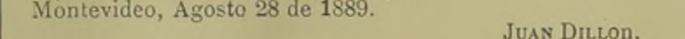
