## Once More.

Once more we are able to quote figures, taken from undeniable official sources, to prove the steady growth and progress of the Oriental Republic.

First, let us turn our attention to the Custom House receipts for the month of April, which are as follows:—

The monthly average, according to the estimate in the Budget is \$833,000, so that here, in one of the dullest months of the year from a business point of view, we have an excess of \$153,305.

But the growth of the Custom House income may be still better appreciated by taking the total for the first four months of the year and comparing it with that of preceding periods, as follows:—

The annual average for these five years is \$3,306,895, so that the receipts for the current year exceed the average by \$643,509, or considerably over half a million dollars.

These figures, we think, tell their own tale with sufficient eloquence. At all events they should be sufficient to show the alarmists, pessimists, and enemies of the Republic that our progress is no vain boast, but is founded on solid figures, and is no mere fluff and flash in the pan, but is steady and material.

Another note worth making concerns the increasing flow of immigration to our shores. From the table we published yesterday it will be seen that the arrivals from beyond seas, for the first quarter of 1890, were 8773 against 2924 departures, leaving a solid increment of 5,849 persons.

These figures may seem small when compared with the enormous immigration returns of the Argentine Republic, but that they represent a great increase for us will be understood when we mention that the increment for the whole year of 1887 was only 6612, and for the whole year 1888 only 8,980. Those for 1889 are unfortunately not to hand. The increment from the Argentine Republic during the quarter was 2192, the majority of whom may be set down as labouring men driven over here by the crisis.

## Colonia.

So little is at present known of the many departmental towns of this Republic, and the means of obtaining information are at present so limited, that we are glad to avail ourselves of any opportunity for making our readers better acquainted with the remoter portion of the land we live in.

We therefore translate from the *Tribuna Popular* of Tuesday afternoon the following paragraphs concerning the department of Colonia, purporting to come from an inhabitant well acquainted with the district. Of course we assume no responsibility for their accuracy.

The Department of Colonia has about 30,000 inhabitants, its superficial measurement is about 6000

square kilometres. It contains a million and a half head of cattle and there are over 300 rural establishments of the first class in which agriculture is highly advanced.

In the city of Colonia, the capital of the Department, there are consuls representing Argentina, the United States, England, France, Italy and Spain. There are two branches of the National Bank, 3 churches, 10 catholic and protestant chapels, over 50 schools, 6 clubs, 200 business houses, 5 manufacturing, 4 telegraph and 2 telephone lines, 10 maritime agencies, 25 hotels, 4 gas lighting and one electric lighting company, 3 light-houses, one being rotatory, 2 theatres and one more in design.

As for agriculture, Buenos Aires now produced more grain than Santa Fé, while from Rosario to Córdoba the railway runs through an avenue on whose sides extend immense cultivated zones.

This evolution cannot fail to exercise a beneficial influence on political science. We have now a strong State, a State which is empresario and banker, a centralising State, instead of inert automatic masses without the means of creating well-being. To furnish them with capital, to impel them to action, to stimulate them to work, is the best mode of making them free and happy.

We have not only to improve our flocks, we must promote the happiness of the people.

Dr. Zeballos then referred to his proposal in Parliament to grant gratuitous allotments of land to the naturalization of immigrants and other social questions.

Dr. Zavalia made a brief reply, referring in general terms to the natural riches of the Argentine soil and to the development of the same, as testified by the Exhibition, by the organization of which the Rural Society has again rendered a signal service to the country, and having expressed an ardent wish for the complete success of this beautiful feast of labourers the Minister, in the name of the President of the Republic declared the Exhibition to be open.

Dr. Zeballos then led the official party through the animal department, and the horses were trotted out for inspection, a curiosity being an extremely small pony belonging to Sr. Narciso Lozano. Afterwards there was a lunch and a "smash past" of the troops.

## Argentine Republic

### The International Rural Exhibition.

The opening of the Exhibition on Sunday was favoured with splendid weather, though the temperature was rather low, the consequence was a considerable influx of visitors, estimated at about 3000.

The principal building has a frontage of 130 metres on Calle Santa Fé, from which it is separated by a small garden. It is built in the form of a "chalet", with a wing, 50 metres in length, on each side, terminating in a smaller "chalet".

The central vestibule of the central "chalet" is adorned with choice plants and works of art. On each side is a staircase leading to the galleries of the upper floor, which is devoted to the exhibits of wool, skins, preserved meats and models. The ground floor is filled with agricultural, pastoral and natural products of all kinds, home and foreign. A fine collection of specimens of timber and ornamental woods from Tucuman attracts special attention; also the products of the Mercedes Mill, established only in 1883, but which by the adoption of the best modern machinery turns out flour which received a prize in the Paris Exhibition.

M. Hamonet, the seedsman and florist, exhibits a large collection of seeds, roots, plants, &c.

San Juan shows raisins of excellent quality, also a great variety of wines, the wines of Mendoza rival those of San Juan; one of the exhibitors of wine is Sr. Godoy, whose vineyard and "bodega" we visited when we were in Mendoza, and we testify to the good quality of the wines produced by him.

Behind this building is the one devoted to agricultural machinery, but Messrs. J. and J. Drisdale and Mr. Adde have each a special pavilion for machinery, etc.

Mr. Adde's consist, we believe, entirely of importations from Sweden, including interesting machines and apparatus for dairy use, and ploughs on improved systems. Both these installations will prove highly attractive to agriculturists and owners of sheep and cattle. Messrs. Shanks and Co. and Messrs. Foley are also large exhibitors of machinery.

The exhibition of horses and ponies, bulls and cows is very good, both in number and quality; there are 406 of the latter and 313 of the former.

The sheep are probably not the best in the country; they number 464, pigs 35, birds, dogs and rabbits 338. The show of birds is a poor one. Some fine dogs are shown, but the poor things are very unhappy in their extremely small cages.

The President of the Republic, being unable to open the Exhibition in person, deputed Dr. Zavalia, the Minister of the Interior, to represent him. The hour fixed for the ceremony was one o'clock, but it was past 2 o'clock when the Minister, accompanied by Dr. Zeballos, the President of the Rural Society, entered the large saloon, which was sufficiently capacious in 1886 for the purposes of the Exhibition of that year.

Seats had been placed there for about 800 persons, but not half of them were occupied.

Dr. Zeballos then read a long address, occupying about half an hour in delivery. Dr. Zeballos commenced by bestowing an eulogium on the Exhibition which, as he truly said, would be worthy of many European nations for the quality as well as the number of the animals exhibited, proving the progressive spirit of the Argentine cattle-breeders, who now possess some of the best animals shown

at the Royal Exhibition recently held at Windsor. He said that many gentlemen from France, Belgium and Germany, who were present, had expressed to him their admiration for the treasures of noble blood exhibited, and he prognosticated that, if the present progress of the cattle industry continued, the Argentine Republic, instead of importing animals for breeding would provide them for the other countries of South America.

Dr. Zeballos also called attention to the progress made in the production of race-horses, which now rival those of England and France, and, as regards sheep, we now produce Merino wool in greater quantities than any other country.

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## Railway News.

The Pacific Railway Company have been authorised to increase their passenger and freight traffic by 30 per cent, this with the increase authorized in January last is a total increase of 50 per cent.

The F. C. Villa María Refugio has been authorised to try as an experiment five wagons with tubular platforms recently received from North America.

The Board of Public Works are now taking the Argentine Great Western in hands. A letter was sent to the manager on Monday, enclosing along list of improvements that are to be carried out immediately, amongst others the dredging of the Tarigan Canal, enlargement of the San Juan Station, completion of the San Juan Station, addition of a ticket and parcels room to the Villa Mercedes Station, alter the brakes on 40 per cent of the rolling-stock, build auxiliary lines at Fraguay, Desaguadero, Junuyan, Santa Rosa, Alto Verde, Rivadavia, Jocoli, Rambon, Cañada de Gomez and Poitos. Besides which there are sundry directions for running of trains in combination with the Pacific Railway, so as to avoid an accumulation of traffic.

The Government have authorized the Department of Public Works to carry out the contract with Messrs. Villafañe and Co. with reference to the concession granted to this firm for the construction of a harbour of refuge in the Medrano and the opening up of a navigable canal.

The Southern Railway Company has presented to the E. P. for its approval, the plans and studies of the following railway lines: Cañuelas to La Plata 103 kilometres. Ayacucho to Balcarce, Lobería and Necochea. Pringles to Bahía Blanca 227 kilometres.

At an accident which, fortunately, is not very usual, is related from Sauce. The sparks from a locomotive on the Neco Perez line set fire to a rancho of Sr. C. Testa, at Mata Siete. The rancho was burnt to the ground, all the family possessions and a small store of grain being destroyed.

## Murder.

We seem to be entering on one of the periodical epidemics of murder and bloodshed, which, due to some unascertained causes, occasionally affect the lower classes here. For the third time within a few days we have to record a brutal murder, in which one of the actors has been a youth of little more. The present case took place about sunset on Tuesday, in the Camino Millan, section Reducto. The individuals José Santini and Gaetano Enamorato, both Italians and stonemasons, met and renewed an old quarrel, quickly passing from violent words to blows, and thence to knives. After a short struggle Enamorato fell having received two mortal wounds in the chest and lungs, and expired immediately. His opponent, Santini, was only slightly wounded.

His assassin Santini was a youth of 16. When the murder was consummated Santini threw away the knife, and seated himself by the corpse and gave way to an excess of grief and nervous excitement, in which state he continued when arrested, filling the air with his cries. It

## Official Journal.

Sr. Isodoro Jimenez Fernandez has proposed to the Minister of Government to establish an official journal or bulletin which shall contain all the laws, decrees and acts emanating from the public offices, together with a full report of the discussions of the Legislative Body. Sr. Fernandez asks for this a modest subvention of \$8000 the year, in return for which he undertakes to supply the Journal to all the public offices and consulates abroad, to present Government with 50 copies, and to devote to any indicated charitable institution the half of any profit he may make. We presume that he intends the Journal for public sale at a fixed price, but that is not stated, nor the frequency with which he proposes to issue it nor the form he intends to give it, all of them matters of importance.

## Telegrams

(From our Special Correspondent)

Buenos Aires, May 7.
