The Loan.

Official announcement has at last been made of the conclusion of negotiations with Messrs. Baring Brothers, for the six per cent loan of two million pounds sterling, and the corresponding contract was signed on Wednesday evening.

Although the negotiations have not been concluded without the delays and hitches usual in such cases, it must be owned they have been brought to an end in a wonderfully short time. The Message proposing the loan was only presented to the Chambers on Thursday, April 17, not two months ago, and the Legislative sanction was completely granted on Wednesday May 7, so that the actual negotiations with the bankers have been concluded within five weeks.

This, combined with the fact that the rate of issue, which we understand is 87 per cent, is the highest yet obtained for any Uruguayan loan, bears strong testimony to the increased credit of the Republic in the leading financial market of the world. Remembering also the trouble and delay our Argentine neighbours have had and are still experiencing in their endeavours to float new loans, it may be taken as a clear proof that, in spite of all fears to the contrary, our credit has remained unimpaired by the crisis that has so severely shaken them.

The favourable termination of this business has come at most opportune moment, politically and financially. The money thus brought to the public expenditure, will not only relieve the Government from its present embarrassment, the legacies of former administrations, but will materially help it in the path it has marked out for itself of assisting and developing by sound administration and properly applied State aid, the enormous resources of the country. Above all the work of colonisation, hitherto hampered by the lack of resources, will receive a fresh and notable impulse, and there is equally little doubt that many other public works of great national importance, will also be assisted in their development. The operation should also afford great relief to the money market, which, from causes unnecessary to dwell upon, has of late been in a very depressed and unsatisfactory state. The National Bank is already in a position to command part of the proceeds of the loan, and may therefore safely defy the attacks lately made upon its credit and good name.

It is furthermore announced that as soon as the loan is launched, Messrs. Baring Brothers will take charge of the newly christened Mortgage Certificates (ex-otulid) with a view to placing them in the European markets. This announcement strengthens what we have already said about the credit of the Republic.

There is little necessity for us to enlarge upon considerations which will suggest themselves to the mind of every intelligent reader. The announcement that the loan is concluded on most favourable terms is sufficient in itself, and needs no adornment. The only duty left us is one in which we know we shall be joined by every paper of the Republic, and that is, to offer our heartiest congratulations.

Death of Dr. Navarro Viola.

We regret to announce the death of this distinguished lawyer. He had been unwell for a few days, but on Monday night, feeling much better, he went out at 8 o'clock and returned at 10.30, when he complained of being terribly cold. At midnight he had a violent fit of coughing and a doctor was sent for, but not one could be found till it was too late. Dr. Viola died at 2 a.m. Dr. Tamini says that the cause was violent inflammation of the lungs. Dr. Luis Izo says that it was angina pectoris. Dr. Navarro Viola was at various periods Deputy to Congress, Provincial Senator and Councilor of Education. He was also one of the most learned advocates. He was 60 years of age.

The Ministerial Crisis.
Dr. Alcorta's resignation was in the following terms:—
Buenos Aires, June 7th.
To His Excellency the President of the Republic.
When I accepted the Ministry of Justice &c., I stated to you that the recititude of my intentions and the manner of fulfilling them would be in accordance with the antecedents of my public and private life.
Being now convinced that my continuance in office would be in opposition to those intentions, in consequence of your Excellency's attitude after what had been definitely resolved in the Cabinet meeting of the 6th and 7th instant, relative to the change in the Board of Directors of the National Bank, I consider it my duty to present to you my undeliberate resignation.
(Signed)
Almancio Alcorta.

Dr. Alcorta's resignation was accepted in the following terms:—
Buenos Aires, June 9th.—To the citizen Dr. Almancio Alcorta:—I communicate to you the decree issued on this date accepting your resignation of the Ministry of Justice, &c., and thanking you for the services rendered.
I am directed by the President to express his surprise at your resignation and at the terms in which it has been made, because the measures proposed by the Minister of Finance to which you allude in your letter, were not properly the matter of a Cabinet resolution, but of an arrangement between the Minister of Finance and the President, to whom it exclusively belonged either to accept or reject it in the form which was proposed, and there is nothing in his subsequent attitude which can justify the conviction, which you say you entertain, that your continuance in the Ministry would be in opposition to the recititude of your intentions and your manner of fulfilling them.

Silvestro J. Zavalía.

Sr. Urburu, in an interview with a reporter, said that he had presented in Cabinet meeting a detailed statement of his financial views, which occupied three quarters of an hour in explanation, at the termination of which the President and the other Ministers exclaimed "Approved," and congratulated Sr. Urburu on his zeal and on the precision of his conclusions.
An especial feature of the plan was the change in the Board of Directors of the National Bank and Sr. Urburu explained his reasons for believing that no reorganisation of the public finances would otherwise be possible, it being notorious that the directors had made a monstrous distribution of credits so that the capital, notes and deposits of the Bank were absolutely locked up.
When he first entered the Cabinet, Sr. Urburu told Dr. Pacheco that he ought to be financial representative of the Nation in Europe, and he offered him that mission, which Dr. Pacheco was disposed to accept. A loan was necessary to enable the Municipality to pay its creditors; also to create a department in the National Bank for granting small loans to manufacturers and agriculturists, and to assist the National Bank through the crisis.
Sr. Urburu named as his candidates for the Presidency of the Bank: Dr. Zavalía, Sr. Lezama, Dr. Dougan, Dr. Zavalía and others. On Saturday the President showed him another list, including Dr. Francisco Unzué, Sr. Urburu accepted, and he then wrote to the Directors of the Bank to see him on Monday, with the view of asking them for their resignations, and he and Dr. Alcorta had some interviews with Dr. Zavalía, in order to induce him to become President of the Bank. The above statement is entirely confirmed by Dr. Alcorta.

On Sunday, however, the President of the Republic sent Dr. Zavalía to Sr. Urburu to say that he could not consent to the removal of Dr. Pacheco from the Bank, whereupon Sr. Urburu declared immediately that he resigned his office.

Dr. Juan Agustín García has been appointed Minister of Finance, and the *Sud Americano* declares that he has received assurances from the representatives of the London bankers that the loan will be carried out as arranged by Sr. Urburu, namely by an immediate advance of £5,000,000, with the option of raising the other £3,000,000, the rate of interest to be 4 1/2 per cent and the issue of shares to be £100,000.

Dr. Astigarría is to be Minister of Justice, &c., the vice-president of the National Mortgage Bank, Sr. Ignacio Sánchez, becomes President *pro tempore*, but Dr. Miguel García Fernández is nominated for the post; Dr. Benjamín Aranz succeeds Dr. Avigian in the direction of Public Assistance. Dr. Ramon Mauoz and Sr. E. Frias will retire from the Board of the National Bank.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Wednesday, a Message was received from the Executive Power conveying the proposed law of fixed taxes (contribución inmobiliaria) for 1890-91. This was passed to the other Chamber. The Bill authorizing the E. P. to contract with J. M. Marinéz and Co., for the canalisation of the River Plate, was received from the other Chamber, and was referred to the Committee of Legislation.

The Modified Bill for canceling certain claims by means of the Amortizable Debt and closing the Debt was also received from the Representatives and was referred to the Committee of Finance. A quorum not being present no sitting was held.

Midland Railway.
The works of the Midland Railway between Paysandú and Salto have reached the "Dolores" example, in Guaviu. The three bridges in Guaviu, measuring from 30 to 40 metres each, are progressing actively under the superintendence of the engineer of the line, Mr. George Frewin.

The Loan.
It is officially announced that the negotiations with Messrs. Baring Brothers for the six per cent loan of two million pounds sterling (\$9,000,000) have been definitely concluded and that the contract with the representative of the Bankers was signed on Wednesday evening.

The National Bank has already received Treasury Bonds for \$5,640,000, the balance remaining at the order of the Government, to cover the deficit of the past administration.

According to *El Día* the loan is issued at 8 1/2 firm, which, deducting expenses and commissions, gives an actual rate of 80 per cent.

It is further stated that the representative of Baring Brothers has announced the willingness of them to make a large of the Mortgage Certificates (Cert. 135) with a view to launching them in Europe.

The Representation of the Minority.
The lecture on this subject, delivered last night at the Teatro on Wednesday evening, Dr. Gonzalo Ramírez, attracted a large audience, including many distinguished representatives of the bar and senate. His discourse is reproduced at length in yesterday morning's *Rezon*, and the scheme he proposed for reforming the present electoral system, in the same paper of yesterday afternoon. Unfortunately both of them are far too long for us to give even an idea of their aims, and we must content ourselves with saying that the learned doctor has listened to with the closest attention, and was frequently applauded in the warmest manner. The large and distinguished audience that attended is a proof of the hold this question has obtained, and the consequent general change of attitude with regard to electoral matters.

Ships to the «Tallapoosa»
On Thursday afternoon, the *Chilulimo*, when a few miles beyond Chilo Light Vessel, the *Rock* shifted, completely disabling the engines of the ship. Sail was set, so that it was, and the effort made to reach port under canvas. Ensenada was about eighteen miles away. Colonia twenty and Buenos Aires about thirty. The latter was of course the best place owing to the necessity of repairs of a large extent. In this crippled condition a bark was hailed and requested to report to the American Consul but either the Captain forgot or the "Tallapoosa" got it ahead of her. On Friday afternoon a tug offered to tow the vessel to the Boca for one hundred and fifty pounds (150) but as the Tallapoosa had six months stores on board and did not care to lay the tug off was naturally refused. She had sailed eight miles during the twenty four hours and it was only a question of time when she should arrive. The next day she made six more and all were satisfied and finally on the morning of the fourth day she reached the Outer Roads of Buenos Aires. From here a tug came to her assistance and after eleven hours work had got her just eight miles nearer Buenos Aires.

On Tuesday morning about noon she was towed into the Boca, where she at present awaits instructions from Washington with regard to the repairs. Though the Tallapoosa has been a familiar sight down here for a number of years and we have noticed that she had two little masts from which she festooned flags on gala days we imagine her staunchest champions would have ever dared to advance the opinion that she would ever have to sail round the River Plate. We overheard a funny description of her sailing qualities,—"She sailed fairly well but not enough to make you dizzy, when ever you could get her pointed the right way, but it took up about half of the surface of the River Plate to turn her round, and once after sailing for two hours we had to take sail off and anchor her by the stern and let her swing herself round towards Buenos Aires."—The captain of officers of the "Tallapoosa" are to be congratulated on their final arrival in port if not after a hazardous voyage surely a long and trying one.

Sundries.
—We learn that that very neglected spot, the Plaza Zabala, is at last to receive the attention of the Municipality, and that Sr. Rufin, who is represented as a "handsome engineer," when we presume means architect, is commissioned to make designs. There is some idea of placing a grid in the center. We would certainly advise the clearing away of the disgusting looking shanties on the south side, and the restoration of the seats which were removed without reason or reason 40 or 50 months ago.

—The well known pleasure of the Bay of Montevideo in 1890, by the Oriental painter Dr. Martino, entitled "Happy Times," has been bought by the Club Uruguay for \$500.

—An amusing story is going round Buenos Aires about an ex-coder in a publishing house in that city, who gave his patron the choice of either paying him his overdue salary (\$500) or fighting a duel with him, in order that as the ex-coder might kill him legally. The unromantic publisher refused to enter any fight, and called on the Criminal Judge about the matter, as the police are looking for the pugacious clerk.

—There being such a scarcity of daily papers in Montevideo, only 8 a.m. 22 or 23, it is said that a syndicate of 8 or 10 residents is about to start a new one which shall represent their interests and language. We could wish that both were very tolerably represented already.

—«Aida» was repeated at the Politeama on Wednesday, to a fair, large audience. Without any remarkable points, the performance was a good all round one, and gave much satisfaction. The chief honours were won by the prima donna, Sr. Peri, the contralto, Sr. Ojeda, and the tenor Sr. Ojeda. The orchestra was uncommonly good, and the dresses and scenery well up to the mark, though the limited stage room does not show them to advantage.

—The new Inspector of Police, Com. Pedraza, has passed a note to all the tramway managers, recommending strict observance of the regulations. It is to be hoped this will prove something more than a mere formality. At present the

Exportation of Live Stock.

The determination that a number of stock breeders have taken to make, on their own account and risk, experiments of the exportation of live stock to Barcelona, Liverpool, and London, deserves the support and praise of all who, putting routine aside, seek every means for the progress and development of stock raising and agriculture. Meetings have been held in various country districts where stock raising is carried on, and it has been decided by a number of progressive and pushing farmers to embark on their own account, on an equal number of sheep. The committee appointed to arrange the details will arrive in Montevideo in a few days. These stock farmers already count on the protection of Government, which will impose no difficulties in the way of carrying out their pioneering undertaking.

The decision of these farmers to seek new centres for the consumption of their products will also be supported by the various shipping companies whose vessels call at Montevideo, and we are already aware of offers made by an English and a Spanish Company. The vessels of these, will therefore be taken advantage of by the stock breeders for the transport of their stock, taking into consideration the facilities offered by them. It is thus very probable that the first consignment which will experimentally leave Montevideo for Barcelona and Liverpool will be taken by the steamer «Comde de Viñosa», which has already been destined and prepared for this purpose by her new owners.

If these experiments give the positive results which are hoped for, in view of the success obtained by similar undertakings in Buenos Aires, there will be formed in Paysandu and Salto, large deposits for live stock, whence the steamers may ship the animals directly for the European markets, thus avoiding the greater expenses of conducting them to the capital and still more, the consequent injury to the animals.

That these progressist stock breeders may attain success in their undertaking, is our desire, since they will thus open to the country new horizons for the extension and development of the many sources of wealth possessed in its agricultural products.

Ultima Hora

At the General Meeting of shareholders of the National Company of Credit and Public Works held in the San Felipe Theatre yesterday afternoon, 15,397 shares were registered, corresponding to 2,325 votes. Accountants, Santiago Micheloni and Horacio Areco.

The Directorate of the Company now consists of Edward Casey, Enrique Ballester, Herminio Arco, José Guerra and Asahel P. Bell.

The English Bank of Rio Janeiro will deliver to-day to the National Bank 9,000 sovereigns received yesterday from Rio Janeiro, and a further sum of \$9,000 sovereigns has been shipped at Rio for the same Bank to deliver to the National Bank against bills.

We also learn that the London and Brazilian Bank has ordered 15,000 sovereigns from Rio Janeiro to pay for bills purchased from the National Bank.

They are quite large enough for the number of visitors, only they certainly want putting in better order.

—The Club Nacional de Regatas holds its annual meeting for the election of committees, etc., next Sunday. Lists of candidates are already in circulation.

—Dr. Herrera y Salas has been named corresponding member in this city of the Medical and Surgical Society of Rio Janeiro.

—The well-known military Colonel Fortunato Flores, is seriously ill.

—The B. A. Standard considers that the retiring Argentine Ministers, Sr. Uribe and Dr. Alvarado, courted their notes of resignation in terms that are a direct insult to the President of the Republic. A little more diplomacy in style would have been in redoubt than an expression of resentment and wounded dignity. Does the Standard, then, consider the President so far above ordinary mortals that he must not be told of it when he does wrong, or does it think that his position calls upon him to swallow their self-respect, lastly feelings should be hurt?

—Once more our suggestions have borne fruit. The "enterprising youth" for whom we called to organise Cienfuegos has made his appearance in the nick of time. We learn on unimpeachable authority that Mr. Hamilton Dunlop, to whose energetic powers of organisation the successful Bachelors' Ball of last year was chiefly due, has taken the matter in hand, and that a meeting will shortly be held in his rooms to bring the matter to a head. We wish him every success.

—Yesterday afternoon's riot indulged in a long tirade against the Chief of Police, because he has prohibited the discharge of rockets. The real cause of vexation is that our contemporary could not disturb the neighbourhood by employing rockets to announce the issue of a bulletin. Our nerves may be hyper-sensitive, but we have always considered these rockets a most unmitigated and barbarous nuisance, and therefore trust the Chief of Police will adhere to his resolution like a man and an officer.

—The woman Juana Ochoa, recently entrapped into a false marriage at the Cerro, having been duly examined, has been found not in her right mind and has been remitted to the asylum.

—The removal of part of the prisoners in the Penitentiary to the newly established House of Detention in Calle Yi, took place early yesterday morning, under the guard of a platoon of Artillery.

—A naughty individual of the 2nd section has been guilty of the offence of carrying arms, and more dreadful still, when discovered, attempted to bribe the policeman with a voluptuous offer of 50 cents. But the officer was sternly incorruptible and marched his prisoner off to the Central Police Station, in which locality he is now cooling his heels.

—The Municipal Budget for 1890-91 is nearly complete. The expenses are estimated at about \$850,000 and the income at \$800,000.

—The French Government has declared Dahomey in a state of blockade. The French Minister has in ordered the Minister of War that no arms must be sent there. Fortunately, we had no intention whatever of doing so.

Telegrams

Buenos Aires, June 12.

Telegrams from London say that the resignation of Uribe has had a very bad effect there and may frustrate negotiations for the loan. On the other hand it is asserted that negotiations proceed favourably and only unimportant difficulties remain to be solved.

A company is being organized to establish a telephone line between Buenos Aires, and Rosario and Cordoba.

Sra. Juana Barrios de Urdapilleta is dead.

The contract for the sale of the Western Railway was signed to-day. The Provincial Government received two promissory notes for the difference between the price and the value due on the line, the purchasers to pay over the latter. This sum will be paid in 24 instalments of 25,000,000.

There is a great deal of talk for the railways and there is to be shown on foot to England, several magnificent goods forward. Ex-Governor Paz has declined to accept a seat in the Chamber of Deputies. All the recent nominations of Government are said to be *pro-rosario*.
