London Notes.

London, May 15.

The recent tide of benevolence on a grand scale still continues. Sir T. Powell Buxton has been informed that Mr. J. Passmore Edwards, the proprietor of *The Echo*, has decided to give 20,000l. to the extension fund now being raised for the erection and endowment of the Bethnal-green Free Library, provided that the other 20,000l. required is raised by public subscription.

Considering the extensive traffic between Liverpool and the River Plate, anything concerning the navigation of the Mersey must be of interest. Some time ago the decision of the Liverpool Dock authorities to take serious steps to cope with the difficulties of navigation at the mouth of the Mersey was announced, but it has been recently strongly impressed on the Mersey Dock and Harbour Board that the deepening of the bar is not the only problem to be solved. Mr. T. H. Ismay cites the experience of the great new Atlantic steamer, the *Majestic*, which during the recent low tides has been altogether excluded from the Liverpool Docks on account of their shallow sills. She incurred tonnage dues amounting to over 300l., but had, notwithstanding, to be discharged, loaded, and coaled by lighters in the river at heavy expense. The moral enforced on the Dock authorities is the necessity of widening and deepening the dock entrances. These entrances were mostly made at a time when vessels of 6,000 tons were considered leviathans. Now 10,000 tons is a measurement not at all regarded as the attainable maximum. Liverpool is urged to beware of the attractions of other ports for such vessels, and to bear specially in mind that its rival Manchester, now fast becoming a port, is promising 26ft. of water in its ship canal and 23ft. of water on the dock sills. The demand on the Liverpool Dock authorities is of general interest as affording a striking proof of the growth of our tonnage, for a few years ago Liverpool was the last place in the world that one would have heard referred to as deficient in dock accommodation.

The attempt of "Joe" Chamberlain to settle the Irish question has fallen very flat indeed. His proposals now regularly meet with the cold shoulder from friends and foes alike. His latest idea that the two great parties in the state could settle the land question by conference in present circumstances is nowhere more emphatically pool-pooled than in the Ministerial and "Unionist" Press. In London it is described as millennial and as a pleasing idea, but one belonging to a political situation widely different from that with which we have to deal. In Edinburgh Mr. Chamberlain is told that his proposal, admirable in itself (hopelessly impracticable). In Dublin, it is remarked that "his own experiences at the Round Table Conference form the best possible proof of the vanity of his propositions." In short, Mr. Chamberlain's vote is accepted by his fellow "Unionists" with satisfaction, but his statesmanship is declined with thanks. They won't let him settle the Irish question.

Prince Bismarck, we are told, is busy writing his memoirs. Those who have lately visited the Prince at Friedrichruh, confirm this news; but they say that the memoirs will not have any political character. The ex-Chancellor considers himself bound to secrecy regarding the political events in which he took part in an official capacity. His book will therefore have the character of sketches of those persons with whom the Prince has come into contact during his long career in office.

The recent election in East Bristol has resulted in a Liberal victory. Sir J. D. Weston polling 4775 votes out of 7277. The victory was a foregone conclusion, but not so the fact that the Liberal majority has doubled since 1886.

Her Majesty's notice of the bears which recently performed before the Royal children at Windsor Castle, has

made the fortune of their owners, Jean Barot and his companions, who have been engaged to exhibit the animals at the Royal Aquarium and Oxford Music Hall, at a remuneration of 45l. a week. Jean Barot and Co. are to be congratulated, but it is to be hoped that their good fortune may not lead to be an inconvenient immigration of performing bears into this country.

The activity of the police in Ireland has been testified to afresh by a seizure of arms made at Belfast, consisted of two dummy swords forwarded by a well-known firm in Covent-garden to a gentleman at Danganoo, who was projecting some amateur theatricals. As the authorities declined to give up the arms the piece has been postponed, and the matter is now receiving the attention of the Chief Secretary to the Lord-Lieutenant.

Poor King Dinah Salifou's visit to the Paris Exhibition was an ill fated one for him. That good natured African chief, went back to his subjects so delighted with the Exhibition and all he had seen that he wished to transform his state into a tropical France. Decree after decree was issued with this intention, until at last his subjects got tired of the new moulding process, and conspired together and murdered him. The dusky monarch was a magnificent specimen of the West African black, and the admiration of all the sculptors and painters who saw him at the Exhibition. He died at the Elisee, where he sometimes wore a Greek dress and sometimes a bishop's vestment which he had bought in the Spanish church of the Exhibition. The despatch telling of his assassination is silent about the fate of his wife, Queen Phillis.

"Women's Rights" are about to be acknowledged in an unexpected manner. The new edition of *"Men of the Time"*, prepared under the direction of Mr. G. Washington Moon, is to assume the more appropriate title of *"Men and Women of the Time"*, and, what is more important, it is to comprise some five hundred new names. This useful volume has grown in bulk and importance considerably since the late Mr. Knight Hunt published the tiny square book which formed the original edition just thirty-seven years ago.

The Working Girls' Convention held in New York may fairly claim to rank among notable signs of the times. Without much help from outsiders, a large number of young girls of a class who are generally considered somewhat helpless in the matter of organization have united in forming clubs for mutual assistance, enjoyment, and improvement and how widely their movement has spread is shown by the fact that several hundred delegates gathered at the Convention to talk over common interests and experiences. Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Chicago, San Francisco, and numerous other cities equally wide apart, were represented.

The "London Thirteen Clubs" held their first annual dinner at Anderson's Hotel on Tuesday, May 13. Goldsmith's Mr. Croaker would probably have expressed a pious hope that it might not "be their last"; but the club defers, and, so far from adopting the motto of Balzac's lugubrious story "Pour ne pas être treize," are bent on cultivating that unlucky number by way of showing their superiority to idle superstitions. More than a hundred persons nevertheless attended the banquet. The only restriction, was that they should feast, as some one has said, "in bakers' dozens," at table specially designed to accommodate that precise number.

Mr. Herkomer, has just been elected a Royal Academician. On this occasion the General Assembly of Academicians are not likely to hear any unfavourable criticism of their appointment. His fitness is unquestionable. It is a promotion by merit from the ranks of the Associates, leaving a vacancy there for the satisfaction of other, and, we may add, very numerous claims. In Mr. Herkomer's election no one branch of Art is unduly favoured. He is an all-round artist, who has graduated so to speak, in many branches. In him the painters in water colours, the oil painters, the etchers, and the art professors have their representative. As the founder of the famous art school at Bushey, with its lofty ideals, its theatre, and its highly artistic presentations of "Scenes in the Olden Time," he has special qualifications for aiding the educational designs of the Royal Academy. The only wonder is that this modern master has not sooner been distinguished as an R.A. But Royal Academy distinctions do not follow with promptitude an artist's arrival at fame. It was four years after the great picture of the Chelsea Pensioners was exhibited before Mr. Herkomer was made an A.R.A. However, his latest distinction has found him still young. Mr. Herkomer is only 41.

Argentine Republic

Chamber of Deputies.

In Friday's session the report of the Committee of Legislation was presented, recommending the approval of a bill prescribing that bills submitted to Congress should not be approved within two sessions should be sent to the Archives, excepting bills relating to codes or treaties with foreign countries.

Olavarría.

The Provincial Government will send a commissioner to investigate the charges of misconduct against the Municipal Government of Olavarría.

Dr. Burmeister.

The learned director of the Museum left for Europe on Saturday; he will be absent till the end of the year.

Frauds.

Sr. Camello is still investigating the frauds committed in the Riachuelo office for the receipt of port and wharf dues. Many sums paid by various ships have not been entered at all, others have been entered for less than the sums received. Three peons have been arrested who were caught in the act of stealing goods from the South Dock Custom House stores. Another important robbery in the Catalinas stores has been discovered.

Slaughterhouses.

During the month of May, 32,786 cows and oxen and 9090 calves were killed for consumption in Buenos Aires.

Quarantine.

The National Department of Hygiene has recommended the annulment of the decree of February 25th which declared the ports of Rio Janeiro and Santos to be suspected.

Cruelty to Animals.

The President of the Society for protection of animals has petitioned the Senate to pass the bill, which has been before for a year, defining acts of cruelty to and their punishment.

Banco Constructor.

The syndic of this company, Sr. Jaime J. Costa, reports that the Bank fulfils its objects and that it has a surplus of \$2,850,000.

Concert.

The concert, in aid of the Belgrano Anglican Church fund, which was recently postponed, will take place on Wednesday, June 25th. In the programme are the names of several well-known amateurs and artists, amongst whom we notice those of Miss Lumb, Madame Duhan, Miss Margaret Webster, Sr. Marici and Sr. Galvini.

Meeting.

The sixth meeting of the Scotch Church Young Men's Society took place in the school room on Thursday evening, Mr. R. Coddifellow in the chair. Mr. Cairnes read a very interesting paper on Anglo-Argentine and Argentine Politics. He eloquently supported the view that Anglo-Argentines should take an active part in the politics of their native land. He condemned the contrary course by sons of foreigners as having led to the present oligarchy. He said Anglo-Argentines were specially fitted to take a ruling influence in the affairs of the country and concluded by hoping that the day was not far distant when they would do so. In the discussion Messrs. Cameron Hayward, Grant and others took part and all agreed with the opinions expressed by the lecturer, which were carried "nem con" and the meeting dispersed.

The Central Argentine Railway.

The ordinary general meeting of the Shareholders of the Central Argentine Railway Company, Limited, took place May 16 at Winchester House, Old Broad-street. Mr. Walter Morrison, M.P., the Chairman, presided, and explained at some length the position and prospects of the Line. He referred to the continuous and serious depreciation of paper money in the Argentine Republic during 1889, which made it impossible to keep up rates as in preceding years. The approximate weekly traffic receipts for the first seventeen weeks of the current year showed an increase over those of the corresponding period of 1889, equal to 5.9 per cent. The Chairman also gave an account of the several extensions, and of the proposed agreement with the representative of the Syndicate formed to purchase the provincial Railways, of which the Company leases a total length of 204 miles, at an annual rental of £150 per mile. The Report was unanimously adopted; the dividend of 5 per cent, making 10 per cent. for the year, was declared; and the agreement in respect to the Provincial Railway was confirmed.

Railway News.

The Lacroze tramway has to pay up \$3,160 for injuring a thoroughbred mare belonging to Mr. E. Durand. The Lacroze, it is true, cannot be charged with reckless driving, but sometimes the tram drivers forget to blow the horn at the crossings, and accidents, of course, occur.

The B. A. Standard says it is quite evident the Government has no intention of entertaining Messrs. Clark and Sandford's petition for the resumption of negotiations for the purchase of the Andino Railway. On Saturday the Minister approved the estimates of that line as drawn up by Dr. Araoz.

The Western Railway will be delivered in a few days, and the difficulty about the landowners will be easily overcome, as the La Plata Government is desirous of affording every facility. Mr. H. G. Anderson, who represents the syndicate, had an interview on Saturday with Governor Paz, in regard to the difficulty as well as to the details of the delivery.

In regard to the quarrel between the tramway companies and the city improvement works, we may state that the conditions for allowing a tramway company to pass through a turn-up street are:—(1) The companies to throw boards across the ditches opened. (2) To have a sufficient number of "peones" to lift or replace the boards, as the case may be, and remove from between the rails the earth thrown up. (3) To close the streets by means of ropes, where such bridges are used, and light the street at night. (4)

The companies to pay 6 dollars per bridge to the contractors.

—Buenos Aires Great Southern Railway.—It is announced that Mr. John Edward Taylor has resigned his seat as director, and will be succeeded by Mr. Reginald John Neill, who has been for many years resident in Buenos Aires and a member of the company's local committee there.—Economist.

Manufacture of Paper.

The Finance Committee of the Chamber of Representatives has reported favourably on the application of the French merchant Marcel Dupuy for a concession for the establishment of a paper factory. The bases of the concession are as follows:—Motive power will be supplied by the river Santa Lucia, a canal and dike being built for that purpose at the "Paso de la Balasa" above the town of Santa Lucia, but without hindrance to navigation or prejudice to existing industrial establishments. Authority is granted to expropriate the necessary land, in conformity with the existing law, the area not to exceed 50 hectares. Exemption from Custom Duties on the introduction of all machinery, material, etc., not produced in the country. Exemption for ten years from all taxes on the land, buildings or produce of the factory. The works to be commenced within six months and to be concluded within eighteen months from the signing of the concession. The Bill to this effect will be discussed by the Chambers very shortly.

Maternal Asylum.

Several charitable persons, whose names are reserved, have presented to the National Committee of charity and Public Benevolence several small houses in calle Misiones, next to the School of St. Paul, for the establishment there of a Maternal Asylum. For this purpose the present houses will be pulled down and a new building erected. This will raise the number of Maternal Asylums in the City to five. The internal administration of the Institute will be confided to the Sisters of St. Vincent.

Deaths.

The death took place on Monday afternoon, at an advanced age, of Don Pedro Margat, a Frenchman, who had made Montevideo his home for over thirty years and had been the pioneer of the art of arboriculture in this country. His funeral took place yesterday and was largely attended by his numerous friends and bereaved family.

The death is also announced of Sr. Antonio Blanco, who has occupied various public posts including that of Jefe Politico of the department of Colonia.

The Sra. Carolina Perez de Aguirre, mother of Deputy Dr. Marun Aguirre, died yesterday morning. The funeral will take place at 9.30 this morning. The Señora Encarnación Cabrera de Muñoz, wife of General Meliton Muñoz, died at her residence in calle 18 de Julio, on Monday evening. The funeral takes place this morning.

Sundries.

—The number of prisoners remitted from the Penitentiary to the new House of Detention, amounts to 102.

—Telegrams from London announce changes in the Cabinet. Mr. W. H. Smith resigns his seat as Ministerial Leader being replaced by Lord Hartington, whilst Sir Henry James will replace Mr. Matthews as Home Secretary. This news seems to us a little mixed, for the present Cabinet is supposed to be Conservative and Lord Hartington, if we remember right, is leader of the betwixt and between party known as Liberal Unionists. As to Mr. Matthews' resignation, that we expect is very true, for according to all accounts he was getting more unpopular every day. Possibly these are signs of the approaching down fall of the present Government.

—Telegrams also tell us of troubles and impending strikes in the Post Office and Police departments. It is evident the Government is in hot water on every side.

—According to a telegram published by the *Razon*, Buenos Aires is in a comparative state of military occupation, the police have been armed with remingtons, and patrol the city at night, dissolving all groups of more than four

persons, whilst the garrison forces are on a war footing. If true, this means something.

—Yesterday afternoon's *Razon* has a remarkable account of the recovery of a Russian girl aged 30, recently arrived, who has just recovered from a cataleptic fit which lasted eleven days, during which she gave no signs of life.

—The Club Nacional has finally decided to postpone the three-unfortunate regatta until November, when, of course, a new programme will be arranged.

—The colonisation will shortly be commenced of camp lands near the Estancia Porvenir, in the department of Paysandu, acquired for that purpose by Sres. Jamusio, Etchemendi and Pestania. Arrangements are being made to receive some 250 families.

—There can be no rational doubt that we are improving. We are only just past the middle of June and the Civil and military lists for May are already announced as ready for payment. It is not so very long ago since these payments were habitually two and three months in arrears.

—It appears that the Law of Immigration as published on Sunday contains some confusion in its articles which will have to be rectified by the General Assembly. We accordingly defer our proposed translation until this has been done.

—The state of the unfortunate architect, Sr. Tosti continues to be a source of the greatest grief to his family and friends, especially as, with the customary cunning of the demented, he frequently manages to evade the vigilance imposed on him. It has been found that in one of his attacks of madness he gave away a considerable quantity of jewelry and money to unknown persons. It is feared that his state is incurable.

—The number of immigrants in the Hotel, awaiting places, has been reduced to 363.

—The question of the ill treated *morera* has not been allowed to die yet. There seems no doubt she has been severely injured, and the question now is, if the injuries were not inflicted in the Hospital, where and by whom were they caused. The reply now rests with the police.

—Under the auspices of the Verdi Institute, Sr. Alfredo Cerimele will give a mandolin concert early next month, in the Casino Italiano. Sr. Cerimele is reputed a notable performer on this peculiarly Spanish instrument.

—The marriage of Dr. Isabelino Bosch to Miss Teresa Santos will take place in the Church of San Francisco at half past three this afternoon, and promises to be a very fashionable, not to say swell, affair. In fulfilment of a long standing promise, the tenor Aramburo, whom the *habitués* of the Politeama are so anxiously waiting to hear, will sing a solo during the service. The date of his debut at the theatre is not yet fixed.

—The papers announce that a census has been carried out in the town of Melo, but as they omit to state the result, we remain little wiser than we were before.

—"Ernani" will be played at the Politeama to-morrow.

—The barabaras practical joke of serving a stranger with boiling hot mate has caused the death, in Buenos Aires, of a girl who, unused to the strange preparation, swallowed a quantity of it, and thereby scalded herself so severely that she died. How would the authors of this brutal foolishness feel if they were prosecuted for murder, as they richly deserve to be.

—Mr. G. C. Levey, whom some of our readers may remember as having visited the River Plate about this time last year, and also in connection with the proposal for an Exhibition, has just published, in London, a "Handy Guide to the River Plate", which seems to have met with a favourable reception.

—Mr. Levey has produced a handbook which will be much appreciated both by travellers who are about to go to the Plate and by home-staying investors who wish to have full information with regard to the countries mentioned in a compact form. Commencing with a description of the voyage out, which is prefaced by some useful hints as to the best means of going, enumerating the various steamship lines, and suggestions for outfit, &c., the book proceeds to give a detailed account of each republic, and the prospects of employment to be found there. Then follows a collection of valuable statistics with regard to the financial position, revenue and expenditure, population, and commerce of each State. The railways are described in detail, with particulars of their capital and traffic, and much other information is given which it is difficult to classify. We have much pleasure in recommending Mr. Levey's book to our readers.

—A subscriber remarked to us yesterday that it was simply "cutthroat weather." Personally we quite agree with him, though it does not seem to have made any impression on the police records or suicide list.

—A grand eclipse of the sun came off yesterday, at least, so scientific authorities assert. King Sol was evidently ashamed of the event, for, so far as we are concerned, he has hid his face most effectually for three days, or more.

—The new committee of the Club Uruguay consists of Sres. Juan C. Blanco, A. Morales, R. de Artega, J. P. Ramirez, Pablo de Maria, Pedro Piñeyro and Martin Lasala.

The death was registered yesterday of Andrew Reid, Englishman, aged 37, married, schistos of the liver, Maciel 189.

The well known baroque Sr. Primo Liendo, whilst alighting from a tramcar in calle Andes, on Monday evening, was seized with sudden giddiness, which caused him to fall heavily to the ground, receiving a severe cut in the head from a stone. He was taken home at once, and is now recovering.

It is telegraphed from Rio Janeiro that yellow fever is no longer epidemic, only a few casual cases remaining. The deaths from yellow fever during May numbered 109.

Business Notes.

—London, May 16.—Frozen Meats.—We still continue to receive liberal supplies from the River Plate, and so far the character is fully maintained. The total imports from the first four months of the present year amounts to 224,550 carcasses, or within 50 per cent, of what came from Australia and New Zealand combined. Prices for River Plate mutton range from 3d to 4½d per lb. A feature of interest during the present month has been the arrival at Liverpool of some 300 live sheep, per Zephyrus (s), from

the River Plate. The sheep were landed in satisfactory condition, only about three per cent. being reported to have died on the voyage. When marketed they were favourably received by buyers, and realised from 8½d to 8½d. per lb., live weight.

—Wool.—The colonial wool sales in London, which commenced on the 10th April, closed on the 10th May, taking in all 26 days. The quantities which have passed the hammer since the present series of sales commenced aggregate a total of 306,249 bales. Over all a slight decline has taken place, but in no case does it exceed ¼d. per lb., the average fall being equal to 5 per cent. This drop in prices has naturally affected the South American wools, and prices have given way in London, Antwerp, and Liverpool. We hear of very little business passing in River Plate wools in either London or Liverpool, principally owing to want of stocks. In Antwerp, the imports have been small and the demand slow.

—The B.A. Standard of Sunday announced that the loan was "done, irrevocably done" (the same words it applied to its very premature announcement of the sale of the Western Railway.) Yesterday's and Monday's telegrams, however, tell quite a different tale the loan still hangs fire.

—Sr. Joaquín Mambro has been conceded titles as broker and public auctioneer.

—The "Porto Alegre" brought yesterday, to the English Bank, from Pelotas, 76,477 mil reis, from Rio Grande, 70,103 m.r. To the London and Brazillian Bank, from Pelotas, 113,219 m.r., from Rio Grande 25,393 m.r. The "Jupiter" brought from B. Aires yesterday \$2000 to B. Tejada.

Shipping Notes

—The Chilean frigate of war Angamos has been lost off the Vallenar coast through striking on a hidden reef not marked on the charts. All hands were saved as well as a large portion of the war material and provisions. The captain in giving his account of the accident deprecates the almost total ignorance prevailing amongst mariners of this treacherous coast, and recommends that a special survey be made.

—The master of the English bk. Cambrian reports that on the voyage out from Cardiff, the mariner John Pery fell overboard from aloft and was drowned.

—The captain of the English str. Wicklow reports that on the voyage out from New-York he encountered violent storms which caused damage to the cargo.

—The captains of the English bk. Queen of the North from Hamburg, and steamer Aldersgate from London have made declarations respecting damage suffered by the cargoes on the voyage out.

—The vessel stranded on the English Bank on Monday proved to be a steamer lighter from Trieste, consigned to Garcao and Co. She was first taken in tow by the tug Republica, but this also got aground, and being in danger, made signals for the tug Emperor. After considerable trouble both were got off, and arrived safely in port yesterday morning without further damage.

—The thick fog that hung over the river and bay yesterday, delayed the arrival of the river steamers until nearly midday. For the same reason several ocean steamers in the outer roads could not be visited, and port operations generally were interrupted.

—Sailing vessel arrived, June 17. English bk. Cambria from Cardiff, Apr. 18, 1299 tons, capt. J. Munay, to A. Braga with coal.

—The tug "Emperor" was despatched to the East coast yesterday afternoon to see if the bad weather of the last two days had caused any disasters.

—The str. "Ciudad de Santander" has brought a quantity of war materials and provisions for the Spanish gun boat "Infanta Isabel". The Free despatch will be granted them.

—The str. "Apa" from Glasgow has entered port in safety after a narrow escape on the English Bank.
