### SUGGESTIONS FOR TRADERS WITH SOUTH AMERICA.

The Foreign Office have appropriately given a special circulation to a letter received from her Majesty's Minister at Santiago, in which he brings together, for general information, his views as to the steps to be taken by traders who may wish to develop their intercourse with the South American States. Financial crisis notwithstanding, there is a vast field of profitable trade over the lower half of the American continent, where, although there may be many difficulties to surmount, vast natural resources and considerable populations exist. It is an area governed with different degrees of success in its various parts—attractive from its extent to producers in general as an outlet offering profitable business. British capital long since found its way to that quarter of the globe in appreciable quantities, and internal peace, combined with sound financial policies, would alone now seem to be wanting to secure the proper utilization of the stores of natural wealth, with the consequent progress of local populations and extension of their consuming powers.

Taken as a whole, British traders have not much of which to complain in regard to their proportion of the trade conducted over the seaboard of the South American States. Still competitors—both in Europe and in the United States—have displayed remarkable avidity for snatching up all sorts of trifles, and great adaptability in meeting peculiar local tastes and customs. Such matters can no longer be ignored, and Mr. J. G. Kennedy—the Minister above referred to—submits the following suggestions for facilitating and increasing British trade in Spanish America:

1. The study of Spanish in commercial schools.  
2. The adoption of the metric system of weights and measures.

3. The issue of illustrated catalogues in Spanish; prices may be quoted in sterling, but weights and measures must be according to the metric system.

4. Let each manufacturer issue a telegraphic code arranged for his own special line of goods.

5. Study the wants of each country, and manufacture special lines of goods suited to the market. The low rate of exchange and a high tariff in Chile cause a demand for low-priced articles. This demand is met by the Germans, who suit themselves to the market, and the British resident retailer, however well he may be disposed to encourage home manufacturers, is compelled to import German goods to meet the popular taste.

Many first-class firms object to make and put their name on any but first-class goods; this gives a foreign imitator an opportunity of getting a high price for a worthless article.

Take, for instance, Rogers' cutlery and Gillette's pens. Why should not both these firms, with their magni-

cent plant, turn out an article to compete with the imitations which flood the market?

A high-class New York manufacturer gets over the difficulty by omitting his name on the second-rate article, and thus retains a connection with this market which otherwise he would have lost.

6. More discrimination in freights. These suggestions are pointed out enough, and being made by one who, from local knowledge, speaks with authority, we may leave them, without comment, to the consideration of those interested persons for whose benefit they are made.—*The Chamber of Commerce Journal.*

### Precautions against Railway Accidents.

Dr. J. M. Castellanos, Minister of Foment, has written to the Director General of Public Works as follows:—

"The frequent railway accidents which have occurred of late, caused the Ministry of Government, with date Feb. 4, to order the Director of P. W. to intimate to the various Railway Companies to proceed without delay to the fulfilment of articles 17, 30 and 34 of the decree of September 3, 1884.

"It is publicly notorious that these companies have not complied with these orders, for this very day there has occurred an unfortunate accident, the victim being one of the senior and meritorious employees of the Central Railway, which might have certainly been avoided if the Company had complied with that ordered by the law and prescribed by its own interests. Government cannot look upon such lamentable accidents with indifference, nor can it allow the lives of the passengers to be momentarily exposed by the negligence of the Companies.

"The accident which took place at dawn this morning might have cost the lives of many persons if the train had gone off the rails."

"Be so good, then, as to intimate to-day to the Companies concerned, to proceed to commence the works indicated in the above mentioned note within the term of eight days, under penalty of being made responsible for the damages and losses that may be occasioned should they not do so, also giving account to this Ministry, in due time, if any of them do not comply with the order, so that the corresponding resolution may be taken."

The measures referred to in the articles cited are the building of wire fences along the sides of the line, and the keeping of guards at level crossings. Several accidents have taken place of late at level crossings.

As rider to the above, we may add that Sr. Castellanos was a passenger in the train on Monday morning when the accident happened which caused the death of the guard Pascual Moreira, as recorded yesterday. The letter above cited was written the same day.

### Duty on Furniture

A short time ago the principal local manufacturers of furniture forwarded a petition to the Chambers, asking that their industry might be protected by the imposition of extra duties on imported furniture. The Finance Committee of the Chamber Representatives has now reported against the petition. Imported furniture at present pays a specific *ad valorem* duty of 48 o/o, and the additional 5 o/o recently imposed, making a total of 53 o/o. The revenue from this duty in 1890 (year of crisis) was \$108,580. The Committee thinks this duty quite high enough for protective purposes. Moreover the furniture imported is generally of a superior or luxurious description, such as is not produced in the country, and therefore an increased duty would injure trade without benefiting the local manufacturers.

The furniture here produced is mostly of an ordinary, cheap or inferior class, and does not compete in any way with that imported. And lastly, the Executive has recently declared that there is no further necessity just now for increasing the revenue by raising the duties. For these and other reasons, the Committee recommends the rejection of the petition.

### SUNDRIES.

—Owing to the quarantine now being imposed on vessels from Europe which have touched at Brazilian ports, the delivery of the mails brought by them is often seriously delayed, causing inconvenience and even loss. The Postmaster General has accordingly telegraphed to the Argentine Health authorities to know if the Sanitary Convention cannot be so stretched as to allow of the correspondence being fumigated immediately and thus delivered without further loss of time. Considering the extraordinary elasticity of this Convention in other particulars, we should hope no difficulty will be found in according to this very reasonable proposition. The reply of the Argentine authorities is still awaited.

—Christopher Columbus has now been Canonized as a saint, and members of the Roman Catholic Church are now at liberty to make their orisons to the great Genoese navigator. This is an honour to which the rough old sailor, when he lived in the flesh, we may be certain, never aspired. To keep him in countenance, Joan of Arc, the Maid of Orleans, has also been promoted by the Vatican to the saintly rank.

—Mr. A. B. Dutton has been appointed Honorary Secretary to the Winter Evening Entertainment Society, a post which is anything but a sinecure with regard to hard work, but entirely honorary with regard to credit. We understand that the W. E. S. hopes to give its opening entertainment of the season towards the end of this month or early in May.

—The Finance Committee of the Chamber of Representatives deserves congratulation on the very sensible report it has issued with respect to the petition of local furniture manufacturers for protection in the shape of increased duties on the imported article. The Committee not only shows strong resistance to any increase of the present high duties, but

evidences a spirit in favour of reducing them. We hope this favourable mood will be preserved. If local industries are not sufficiently protected by a duty of 53 o/o on the imported article, they cannot be good for much.

—The report just mentioned more than hints that the 5 o/o extra duty recently imposed on all imports is "evidently transitory." This is certainly welcome news, and we hope that events will prove its truth.

—Delta, the well-known dramatic critic of the *Siglo*, falls into a great mistake in saying that Sr. Emmanuel swerved from tradition and from the indications of the text in making *Othello* commit suicide by stabbing himself instead of cutting his throat. The latter form was entirely an innovation of Salvini's, though it has been frequently imitated since. Direct tradition, as well as the words of the text, point unmistakably to stabbing and not to cutting the throat, and consequently Sr. Emmanuel was entirely right in his procedure.

—Jack had gone off and got himself lost, and he had also found himself and walked home. "Are you not sorry that you ran away and got lost?" asked the paternal ancestor with a tone of grief and reproval. "I wasn't lost." "But nobody knew where you were." "I knew where I was myself." That settled it. A boy that knows where he is himself can never get lost.

—It is said that Ferrari is in treaty for the Solis Theatre, to bring a first class Italian Opera Company in August and September. A French Operetta Company are also said to be anxious to secure the theatre for a short season.

—The Finance Committee of the Representatives makes merry over an absurd petition of one Luis Degiovani to be allowed to establish an Official Orthopedic Institute, presumably at State charge, though he does not say so directly, but hints as much by enclosing the estimate of expenses. They say the petitions without precedent in legislative annals, and after various sarcastic remarks refer him "ante quien corresponda," which may be freely translated by "Go to Putney."

—The result of the scrutiny of the Colonia elections has not yet been published, but the general belief is that the election has fallen upon Sr. Alcides Montero, (ex-minister of finance) Talio Freire and Antonio Bachiini. These were all "official" candidates.

—It has frequently been said in England that the best way to prevent railway accidents would be to kill a director or a member of Parliament in one. Here the desired effect is likely to be attained in part through having frightened a Minister in one.

—With regard to the fatal railway accident of Monday morning, Pablo Mais, the driver of the cart which was run into by the train, has published a letter asserting that the accident was caused through the driver of the train not having sounded the whistle before approaching the level crossing. It was a bullock cart, and not a mule cart as stated yesterday. Three of the bullocks were killed, but Mais himself escaped, being on foot at the time.

—It is stated that the Minister of Foreign Affairs has terminated his plan of economies in the diplomatic staff. According to this the number of legations will be reduced to three, namely, at London, Madrid and Rio Janeiro. The Minister in Madrid will attend to Paris and Rome, and the Minister in London to Berlin. The Legations in Argentina, Paraguay and France will be reduced to Consulates General.

—The well known violinist, Sr. Romeo Masi, continues seriously ill.

—The Chilean gunboats in Buenos Aires are giving trouble. A group of disguised Chileans have tried to seize the "Pilcomayo" on behalf of the revolutionists. A combat ensued on board, and there were several killed and wounded. Other disorders have taken place and the police have had to arrest several Chilean emigrants. We should think such acts as these were undoubted infractions of international law. The Chileans have no business to carry their civil war into foreign territory or waters.

## LONDON NOTES

February 28.

The presence of the German Empress in Paris is creating considerable ferment in the minds of the French, and the hope is expressed that she will not prolong her stay. French artists are protesting against statements that they will exhibit at Berlin, and the chairman of the jury of selection has resigned. A Bonapartist meeting was held on Tuesday night in Paris, at which energetic protests were made against the visit of the Empress. Her Majesty's visit to Versailles and St. Cloud has especially caused irritation.

Considerable evidence has been given by Mrs. Agnes Anne Page, at

the Marlborough street Police-court, in support of her summons against Mr. Lawrence Wood, Consul-General for Persia, charging him with having by fraudulent representations obtained from her the sum of 16,700, with intent to defraud.

Mr. Ricketts, vicar of Hayfield, Stockport, objects to the description of Sunday schools as "nurseries for Heaven." Of late he assures us our Sunday schools have taken rather to train young people to tread the stage gracefully and bewitchingly. Presumptively this means that with their religious training the Sunday school pupils receive some instruction in elocution and music. The sorrowful result, if we may trust this authority, is that they are aspiring not to be a "Joseph," a "Samuel," or a "Timothy," but rather to be an "Irving," a "Sims Reeves," or an "Adelina Patti."

At Portsmouth, on Thursday, there was a grand ceremony on the occasion of the launch by the Queen of the two new battleships, the Royal Arthur and the Royal Sovereign. The ceremony was successful in every respect, the movement of the two ponderous vessels being hailed with enthusiastic shouts by the thousands of spectators assembled. Princess Beatrice accompanied the Queen from Windsor, and the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Edinburgh, and the Duke and Duchess of Connaught were present at the dock. After luncheon with Admiral Sir Edward Comberford at Admiralty House, her Majesty returned to Windsor Castle. Fortunately the weather was gloriously fine, so that there was nothing to mar the popular jubilation.

Mr. Furness, M. P., has undertaken in his private capacity to bring the points in dispute at the docks before the Federation with a view to settlement. It is proposed that the Shipping Federation shall not give preference of employment to non-union men; that shipowners, while recognising their right to "sign on" their crews either on shore or aboard ship, shall revert to the practice previous to the strike; that the Seamen's and Firemen's Union shall not insist upon a monopoly of employment for the members of that Union; and that men who sign on and go to sea shall observe their contract in accordance with the Merchant Shipping Act.

The annual meeting of the National Rifle Association, held yesterday afternoon at the Royal United Service Institution under the presidency of Lord Wantage, was marked by considerable discord towards the close, when the question of filling vacancies on the Council was under consideration. In two instances a poll was resolved upon.

As soon as the Army and Navy Estimates are through, the House of Commons will be asked to grant a vote on account of 3,917,000, £s. usual it covers all the departments of State, and affords opportunity for debating questions connected with any one of them.

The Sunday Closing Bill stood upon the Orders of the Day for Wednesday, but in a position which did not promise opportunity of reaching it. Being under the impression that as the Bill was on the Orders it would certainly be dealt with at the sitting, a lady well known in society summoned a prayer meeting to be held at the Westminster Palace Hotel with the object of strengthening the hands of the promoters of the measure.

The meeting duly took place, and it was not till it was concluded that those engaged in the service learned that the Bill had not been approached.

"Why do so many girls nowadays marry old men?" asks an elderly correspondent of our contemporary, "Woman." The questioner can tell you why. It is because in English society at the present day there is hardly such a thing as a young man. Old men who are young, and even middle-aged men who are young are occasionally met with. They are recognisable by the look, that they still allow themselves feelings, and not only enjoy themselves, but confess to so doing, whereas the young men nowadays rarely let themselves go as the phrase is, and are amazingly hard to please. After the exertion of dancing they expect their partners to entertain them and pay them compliments. Hence a girl who cannot do both is voted stupid and slow. Further it is noted as a peculiarity of these young men that not for the world will they wear any single article of attire that is not worn by every other young man. The cut and parting of their hair, the shape of their moustache, the hang of their coats are all precisely alike. They have, moreover, their shibboleths, which of course have nothing in common with the shibboleths of the Ibsen idolaters. The final *g* has, it is observed, also disappeared from their conversation, and they talk with the languor of persons just recovering from a severe illness. The worst of it is these old young men have persuaded society that no social gathering can be complete without them.

J. Chamberlain and Mr. Mundella. In reply, Mr. Goschen remarked that two years ago he had made a grant of 15,000, to the colleges and now about 15,000, more was asked for. Understanding that the grant already made had not had the effect of diminishing the subscriptions or donations to the colleges, he could not hold admitting that the deputations had made an impression upon him, as they had established a strong case. He could not say more without consulting his colleagues.

At the resumed inquest yesterday on the body of Frances Coles, the victim of the Whitechapel murder, a quantity of fresh evidence was brought forward, including that of Ellen Callan, a woman who stated that at half-past one o'clock on the morning of the crime she was with Coles in Commercial-street. A short man whom she described, and whom she could not identify as Sadler, accosted them there, and finally walked away with the deceased towards the Minorities. Some inconsistencies were pointed out in the witness's further evidence. The Coroner summed up at considerable length, treating unfavourably the supposition that Sadler was guilty of the murder, and the jury, after a quarter of an hour's deliberation, returned an open verdict, adding a rider to the effect that in their opinion the police did their duty in detaining the prisoner.

#### RIGHT EXPRESSION A PART OF CHARACTER.

In a lecture given to the students of the London Society for the Extension of University Teaching Mr. John Morley says, among other things:—“I have very little faith in rules of style, though I have an unbounded faith in the virtue of cultivating direct and precise expression. But you must carry on the operation inside the mind, and not merely by practising literary deportment on paper. It is not everybody who can command the mighty rhythm of the greatest masters of human speech. But everyone can make reasonably sure that he knows what he means, and whether he has found the right word. . . . It has been said a million times that the foundation of right expression is sincerity. That is as true now as it has ever been. Right expression is a part of character. As somebody has said, by learning to speak with precision, you learn to think with correctness. . . . If we are now on our way to a quieter style, I am not sorry for it. Truth is quiet. Milton's phrase lingers in our minds as one of imperishable beauty—where he regrets that he is drawn by I know not what, from beholding the bright countenance of truth in the quiet and still air of delightful studies. Moderation and judgment are, for most purposes, more than the flash and the glitter even of the genius. I hope that your professors of rhetoric will teach you to cultivate that golden art—the steadfast use of a language in which truth can be told; a speech that is strongly natural force, and not merely effective by declamation, an utterance without trick, without affectation, without mannerisms without any of that excessive ambition which oversteps itself as disastrously in prose writing as in so many other things.”—*Studies in Literature* (Macmillan)

#### MR. GOSCHEN'S SECOND RESERVE.

The *Bullionist* points out that panics are inseparable from an artificial system of centralisation, and it seems not to have occurred to Mr. Goschen's well-informed mind that it is better, and even easier, to remove the mechanism which produces panics than to ally them when they have become acute, or to avert them when they are actually at the door. One consideration should not be overlooked. Our trade steadily increases, and it consequently demands an augmenting of the amount of credit instruments to effect its complete and innumerable settlements. We require more current accounts, more bills of exchange, more cheques. The raising of the rate does not immediately bring gold from abroad; gold only comes when our trade has been paralysed. Under the prevailing system this is the intermediate and pernicious effect of raising the rate; but this method is the best, and, indeed, it is the only device which is open to the Bank of England.
