STATE BANKING.

Once more we are able to draw a pregnant lesson from the neighbouring Republic.

The Argentine Government, suddenly reversing the disastrous policy of the last six years which has landed the Republic in such a financial mud-hole as was never known before, is now making a strenuous effort to out the complicated Gordian knot by liquidating the State Bank, that is to say, the National Bank and the Provincial Bank of Buenos Aires. We believe the same process is also gradually to be applied to the other Provincial "free" Banks.

The not too consistent or complete reports of the telegrams on the one hand and our Buenos Aires contemporaries on the other leave us in some doubt as to all the details, but the above assertion is sufficiently correct as a basis to enlarge upon.

So far as the Argentine Republic is concerned there is no doubt that state banking has proved a most disastrous and ruinous failure—except to those few who have unfortunately been able to turn them to the most dishonest purposes and have in plain language robbed the Banks and swindled the share and note holders. State banking is a notoriously dangerous experiment and nowhere more so than in the River Plate, where neither the temperament, experience nor public morality of the States entrusted with the governing powers fits them to be exposed to the peculiar temptations offered by such a system.

It is an exceedingly significant fact that the State Banks with all the supposed intelligence of the nation behind them, with their exceptional monopolies, guarantees, privileges, interest and advantages, should have come to such utter grief, and that their issue should have been so tremendously depreciated, whilst the better-class private banks, although working against such powerful opposition, have steadily held their own in the face of a great crisis and their issue, where they have any, is entirely solvent.

That which has happened in Buenos Aires has also happened here, though we are very thankful to say, on a greatly diminished scale owing to the fact that the State interference with banking was considerably less. The private banks here still retained some of their rights of emission, and some of the privileges which in the other Republic had been accorded only to the State Banks. Hence, being conducted on sound principles and directed by honest men, they have hardly felt the storm, and their issue and credit stand as sound to-day as they did before there was a hint of crisis.

It is impossible to attach too great importance to the lesson thus taught, and if the Oriental Government ever entertained the idea of founding a State Bank on the model of those of our neighbours, it is to be hoped they will now abandon it. All the guarantees of the Argentine Government have not prevented their State banks from foundering and their notes from sinking to an almost nominal value, and there is not the faintest reason to suppose that the same system would not have exactly the same result on this side

of the River Plate. The Argentines have acknowledged their failure, although only at the eleventh hour, long after it was patent to all the world, then let us profit by their misfortunes and leave well alone. Let the Oriental Government leave State Banking alone, and no more system of introducing so pernicious a system into our financial world than they would think of giving yellow fever or cholera a free pass among our population.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Representatives, on Thursday, Sr. Marfatan and Campesiguy presented a bill for opening the port of Nuevo Berlin (Dept. of Rio Negro) to traffic. This was referred to the Committee of Legislation.

Sr. Ros asked that the Committee of Legislation should again be recommended to report immediately on the creation of a Department of Engineers. Dr. Melian Lafaurie explained that the delay was owing to the Minister of Fomento who was studying a scheme for the entire reorganization of the technical departments of the Nation.

The Bill concerning the Direction General of the Civil Registry, recommended by the committee of Legislation, was approved in general without debate, Sr. Gil reserving the right to propose some amendments in the discussion in detail.

The Bill conceding a pension to the granddaughters of Don Vicente P. Maciel, from the Senate, was then put in general discussion.

Sr. Gil spoke in opposition to the Bill. He thought the moment very inopportune for granting pensions and thus making free charges on the State. The system of pensions had been carried to an exaggerated point, and it was time to cut it short.

Sr. Johnson said that the committee were chiefly guided by the exceptional services of Sr. Maciel, who had left an imperishable name for philanthropy and self-denial.

The Bill was then put to the vote and was rejected by a majority of two thirds.

The petition of Sr. José C. de Oliveira for a monopoly for six years for the manufacture of artificial coal, unfavourably reported upon by the Committee of Finance, was unceremoniously rejected.

The sitting then concluded.

Paraguay.

The President, Sr. Juan G. Gonzalez, in his Message states that in 1890 the imports were valued at \$2,721,433 and the exports at \$3,900,729.

The total revenue was \$1,724,588, including \$986,939 for import duties and \$196,489 for export duties.

The expenditure was \$3,681,391, the deficit being covered by the issue of bonds, by discount of "vales" given for public lands and by advances made by the State Banks.

Death.

The death took place yesterday morning, after a severe and protracted illness, of Don Maximo Fleuryquin, for many years a member of the Chamber of Representatives and recently sitting for the Department of Soriano. He was also founder of the well known photographic establishment bearing his name. He will be buried at 9 a.m. to-day, with official honours.

SUNDRIES.

—A lengthy Cabinet Council was held on Thursday afternoon, and we understand that the question of economies in the diplomatic service was treated at length. This question, by the bye, is exciting vexed comment in the columns of some contemporaries whose sense of dignity is stronger than their appreciation of the necessity of economy. They do not seem to ask themselves how the legations are to be sustained without funds, and although frequently howling for more economy, in this case seem to think that glory is better than credit.

—Mr. Pinar's latest play "Lady Bountiful" recently produced at the Garrick Theatre, London, must indeed be a success, since we notice that a lengthy eulogistic criticism of it has crept into the columns of yesterday's "Signal."

—We hear that the eminent Cuban violinist Brindis de Salas, who created such a furor here some two years ago, will shortly revisit the River Plate. We shall be very glad to hear him again.

—Some of our contemporaries have given a half-hearted dissent to the recent assertion that the Minister of Finance had had an unpleasantness with a certain prominent military officer respecting the payment of claims on the Treasury. This, however, does not affect the remarks made in our recent article upon the subject, for if they are not applicable in the present instance they are decidedly so in plenty of other cases.

—The Ministry of Government has issued (rather late in the season) a call for tenders for making the winter uniforms of the Police, to be presented by the 20th instant. It is a peculiarity of the River Plate that, owing to the backwardness of the authorities, the winter uniforms of the military and police are generally delivered to them about the middle of spring and the summer uniforms somewhere in autumn, and consequently the poor fellows are generally most unseasonably dressed.

—This reminds us that several complaints have been made by our contemporaries of late that several important contracts for Government supplies or work have been made without the legal preliminary of calling for public tenders. This is an old and notorious abuse which, in times past, has cost the tax-payers many thousands of dollars. If it is true that it is being repeated—which we are not prepared to assert—the attention of the Chambers should at once be called to it, for such an abuse is entirely incompatible with the professed moral and administrative reform on which we are supposed to have entered.

—The War Department has acceded to the request of Colonel Fortunato Flores to have his name placed on the retired list, at half-pay. We understand that this was on account of an "incident" with the Minister of War in the course of which the gallant Colonel considered his military dignity severely wounded. This "incident" was in connection with the granting of the contract for coining the Paraguayan War Medals. It is generally reported that this contract has not been offered to public tender, as the law stipulates, but has been delivered to a certain Sr. Servone for \$20,000, although lower tenders have been made, notably one of the well-known jeweller Sr. Estebanet for \$16,000. It is to be hoped that an official declaration will be made clearing up this unclear business which represents some 4000 of the kind we do not want at the present juncture.

—At St. Cloud a traveller asked at what times the little steamers left.

"Every ten minutes" was the answer. "Monsieur will not have to wait more than a quarter of an hour."

—Considerable regret is felt in many quarters that, when the new Ministers were appointed some five weeks ago, a change was not made in the Ministry of War. The conduct of the present holder of the Portfolio, especially with regard to the recent frequent scandals in the army, is giving rise to very unfavourable comment, nor does he show much desire to abet his colleagues in their efforts at reducing the estimates.

—The company at the Politeama has been strengthened by the engagement of the Brothers Harto, three musical clowns already favourably known here from previous visits. They will appear this evening, together with the inevitable "Juan Moreira."

—As we expected, "The Ironmasters" was uncommonly well given by the Emmanuel company at the Solis Theatre, on Thursday evening. As *Clair de Lune* Raiter was fully equal to Jana Harding or any of her predecessors in the part, and it would indeed be difficult to improve upon Sr. Emmanuel as *Derby*. The rest of the parts, as usual, were very well played, and we are glad to say there was a good house, which shows that the public are beginning to appreciate the merits of this unusually complete company. This evening will be given *Dumas' Kean*. So far as the life of the great English actor is concerned, this piece is entirely imaginary and even ridiculous, but otherwise it is a strong and interesting play in which we are sure Sr. Emmanuel and his company will be seen to great advantage. Next week we hope to have some more Shakespeare.

—An English theatrical manager of position once uttered the dictum that Shakespeare spell ruin and Byron bankruptcy. If he had visited the River Plate he would have found that with all our false and perverted taste, Shakespeare is greatly appreciated here, although invariably given to be the language of the country. English people may neglect the immortal bard, but here he generally draws a crowded house, and without the necessity of expending a fortune on dresses, scenery and accessories. People here still consider the acting of a play as of more importance than the mounting.

—Diana, not the acclaimed goddess of the Ephesians, nor the heroine of Keats's exquisite poem, but a very sublimar servant, rejoicing in the doubly classical name of Dionysia Diana, has just been sentenced to a year's imprisonment for robbing her mistress. No wonder that astronomers predict an approaching eclipse of the moon.

—We hear that Mr. J. Astor, son of the recently deceased Yankee millionaire, will shortly arrive here in his magnificent yacht "Grants" which was built in England three years ago and cost £100,000. He is at present at Bahia Blanca, on the way from Valparaiso. After visiting the River Plate he will go to Rio Janeiro and thence across the Atlantic to the west coast of Africa.

—Sr. Rius, the bookseller of Soriano 155 is lamenting the dilapidation of one of his employees, who sold a quantity of goods collected the accounts in advance, pretended to Sr. Rius that they were not to be paid till the end of the month, and then disappeared. Fortunately the police have laid hands upon the swindler. Sr. Rius has our sympathies, for we were "shut" in the same manner not long ago.

—On Thursday afternoon, Sebastian Torres, aged 44, employed as peon in the quinta of Sr. Freyre, Camino Rivera, fell into a deep tank at the bottom of the garden, and was drowned.

—Sr. Antonio Bachini, recently elected deputy for Colonia, and editor of the *Diario de Buenos Aires*, arrived here yesterday. He will shortly start a paper here.

—The three children of the Argentine Minister here, Dr. Moreno, had a narrow escape on Thursday afternoon, the horses bolting in calle Agraciada with the carriage in which they were returning from school, and being overturned by collision with some trees. The three children were much frightened and shaken, but not hurt. The coachman was thrown out some distance and rather severely bruised.

—Sr. Bustelo, who arrived from Buenos Aires in the "Saturno" yesterday, laments the loss of his pocket book containing some \$350 and various papers, which he asserts was stolen from under the pillow of his bunk whilst he was sleeping in the same. Several suspected passengers were searched but to no avail.

BUENOS AIRES.

—On Tuesday a Cabinet Council was held which was attended by all the Ministers, by the Minister of Finance of the Province, and by the Presidents of the National, Provincial and Hypothecary Banks.

After two hours' discussion, the following decree was approved and issued:—

Buenos Aires, April 7th.

Considering: That a banking system based upon official banks leads, as is universally acknowledged by science and has been proved by our experience, to defects which sooner or later hinder or paralyse its progress and produces economic disturbances which compromise the highest public interests; that, if this system, implanted in the Republic by the force of tradition, has been able, at certain periods and under certain circumstances, to facilitate the economic movement and to render valuable services to the country, it could not escape the inevitable consequences originating in its very constitution which in making the Banks an internal part of the political and economic administration obliges its administration to take into account and accede to reasons or exigencies which ought not to influence the direction and administration of an institution of credit; that the Bank of the Province of Buenos Aires which served as an example and model to the banks subsequently founded by the Nation and the other provinces, though it was able under the regime of an unlimited issue of paper money to grant credits at long dates and thus promote the rapid development of industry and render inappreciable services in difficult moments to the Nation and to the province of Buenos Aires, has been unable to continue or to be initiated in its mode of operations when the unlimited faculty of issuing notes had ceased and it began to operate with guaranteed bank notes, because it is contrary to all rules of banking, and must necessarily end in paralysis, to receive deposits payable at sight in large amounts and to use them in discounting bills payable in periods of one to five years, however well the bills may be guaranteed; that the crisis through which we are passing exercises an unavoidable influence on the official banks and obstructs their natural action; that the liquidation of those Banks in the ordinary way is so serious a matter, affecting even questions of a public character, that it is the duty of the National Government to aid in averting those dangers, not only on account of the services rendered to the nation by those Banks, but in defence of the private interests involved, and especially of the most interesting classes of the population who made these Banks the receptacles of their savings and deposited in them all the fruits of many years of labour; that foreseeing the inevitable condition to which the Banks would be reduced, it is necessary to anticipate it in order to avoid it and to avert the consequent dangers, the President of the Republic, in Cabinet meeting, decrees:—

Art. 1.—All deposits at interest or on current account, now in the National Bank and Provincial Bank of B. Aires are hereby guaranteed by the Nation; and all bills under discount and securities held by said Banks, including the 4 1/2 per cent gold bonds guaranteeing the issue of notes, are hereby charged with the guarantee here by given.

Art. 2.—The National Bank and Provincial Bank of B. Aires shall suspend till the first June next the payment of deposits, of accounts current at sight.

Art. 3.—The banks may deliver to those depositors who solicit the same the amount of their deposits in bonds of the Internal Loan at 7 1/2 per cent, to this effect the Conversion Office, shall deliver to the banks at that rate fully paid up bonds in discount of bills or other securities.

Art. 4.—The said banks are authorized to pay in money to small depositors, but in amounts not exceeding in each case \$100 pm.

Art. 5.—At the next Session of Congress the Executive shall submit a proposal for converting the State banks into the Bank of the Republic, and shall at the same time ask Congress to provide the funds for paying the deposits of B. Aires Banks.

Art. 6.—Let this be communicated.

—On Tuesday the La Plata Chamber of Deputies passed a bill relating to the Hypothecary Bank in the following form: Art. 1. Pending the sanction of a definite law relating to the service of the coupons, the Hypothecary Bank is authorized to fix the interest to be paid for the April quarter. Art. 2. Certificates to bearer shall be given for the balance.

Art. 3. Cédulas shall be amortized by tender or by lot. Art. 4. The arrears due to the Bank prior to January

5. when a property offered for sale does not realise the debt due it may be sold at a second auction for the amount due in cedulas Art. 6. Mortgage may be satisfied in cedulas of any series of equal or greater interest and amortization. Art. 7. While the provisions of Art. 1 are being acted upon the tax of 20 o/o on cedulas shall be suspended. Art. 8. The provisions of the Law of 20th December 1890, authorizing the conversion of cedulas into gold bonds, are repealed.

The Government has recognized Mr. William Shaw Harris Gastrell as British Vice-Consul.

The meeting of Cedula Holders held on Thursday in the National Theatre was attended by a very large number of holders of Provincial Cedulas. The Committee advised the holders not to part with their Cedulas, it being certain that in time they would be paid in full. A sub-committee, consisting of Messrs. Jones, of the English Bank, Carabassa, Thomas Devotto, Manpas, of the French Bank, and Juan Auchorena, was chosen to receive deposits of unpaid coupons, together with powers of attorney from the holders of the cedulas authorizing the General Committee to institute proceedings before the Supreme Court for the recovery of coupons. The Committee is authorized in case the full amount should not be recovered to distribute proportionately the amount actually received.

Herman Rodolfo Frohchans Drad was arrested on Tuesday whilst trying to recover \$2,350 at an exchange shop at 516 Calle Reconquista, by means of a forged cheque, purporting to be drawn by Messrs Moore and Tudor.

The Board of Engineers advises that the \$50,000 deposited by Messrs Francis Younger and Co., as a guarantee for the construction of the Resistencia, Oran and Tartagal railway, should not be returned to these gentlemen, the stipulations in the contract not having been fulfilled.
