HERVEY'S SAUCE.

The Standard of Buenos Aires has been interviewing Mr. Maurice Hervey, who came to the Plate a few weeks ago as "Special Envoy" (a new term for Correspondent) of the Financial News of London, and has published to the world Mr. Hervey's views on Uruguayan affairs.

Mr. Hervey's five weeks of research and inquiry, reports our contemporary, failed to convince him that either the industrial and financial position of Uruguay or the alleged misgovernment of that Republic is as black as painted by the free-press (independiente) press of Montevideo, and reproduced by the press of Buenos Aires—which latter, by the way, seems to be, to a great extent, in the hands of ex-patriated Blancos. The locusts, not the Government, are responsible for the diminution in exports and imports (I) and in local trade. President Idiarte Borda is at present the best advised man in South America. The free-press cannot find terms strong enough wherewith to condemn him. His ministers are condemned also. Congress, we are told, has become the monopoly of Borda's Deputies. Therefore he must either resign or be turned out by force, and new Deputies (i.e. the disappointed candidates at the last elections) must be elected. But, Mr. Hervey, Señor Borda is quite unknown, even by sight. But, upon the proved evidence adduced (as apart from mere vulgar abuse of the man) the envoy of the Financial News has failed to see wherein he has so seriously offended, or to discover by whom he could be advantageously replaced. It is one thing to bring forward charges against a ruler; it is quite another thing to prove them.

In short the entire revolutionary movement is based upon political ambitions and supported by a tissue of allegations not a tithe of which have been proved to the satisfaction of any ordinarily intelligent man. And so forth.

Here we see once more an example of the extraordinary but painfully lively fallacy, that a peripatetic newspaper correspondent, visiting some place of which he has not the slightest previous knowledge, is, after a few days or weeks stay, able to form a clearer view and to give a more valuable and more correct judgment of the situation than residents with a long-standing knowledge of affairs, with interests at stake, and whose business it is to watch and gauge every passing event, every straw which shows how the wind blows.

We do not wish to impose either the sincerity or the ability of Mr. Hervey; we merely wish to ask what is his opinion worth under the circumstances that it should be set against the opinions of other press observers, possibly equally sincere and equally able, here and in Buenos Aires.

Mr. Hervey came to our office on his arrival in Montevideo some weeks ago. We did not "interview" him, but rather he "interviewed" us, for he asked us to give him some idea of what was going on and confessed that he knew practically nothing about the situation here, or the public men. Since then he professes to have mastered all the details of Uruguayan politics—we have been here many years but will not profess the same—all the details of the situation, and to be able to declare that the established independent press of this country and of Buenos Aires are mainly wrong in regard to Uruguayan affairs, and that there is nothing very serious the matter. He has only done what many another "special correspondent" has done before him, and we are criticizing not his views, so

much as the absurdity of the system which attaches special importance to opinions produced in this manner. And he illustrates his rapidly acquired wisdom—unless the Standard misrepresents him—by attributing the dissatisfaction to the "blancos" press, when, as it happens, there is not a single "blanco" organ published in Montevideo at the present moment, nor since December 1 last.

We would like to know how many bankers, merchants, brokers or prominent public men Mr. Hervey interviewed during his stay here. As a stranger to the country, what steps did he take to compare the present situation, politically and economically, with that of previous periods? Is he aware that there is a deficit in the Customs revenue this month of from \$200,000 to \$300,000 and a gross deficit of half a million since October? He says the locusts are responsible for the depression in trade, imports as well as exports; are they also responsible for the depopulation of the interior, and the emigration of thousands of Uruguayan to Argentina? Has he so carefully studied Sr. Borda's administration for the last three years, his acts and policy, as to be able to declare it free from serious offence and to know more about it than the local native and foreign papers that unanimously declare the contrary? Is he so intimate with the history of the recent elections, which dates back long before his arrival, as to be able to declare that the defeated candidates? Perhaps he will be surprised to learn that the "defeated candidates" exist only in his imagination, as the elections were entirely in the hands of the Government, the people did not vote, and all the official candidates were elected unanimously, none others appearing. We might ask many more similar questions, but it is hardly worth while.

We have no quarrel with Mr. Hervey, and still less with the important paper that he represents, we are simply asking how much value is to be attached to his opinions, and whether they are more likely to be correct than those of the local papers he so boldly contradicts, and which is likely to be the better informed. The only one point we can grant in his favor, is that he is disinterested either way, whilst those here, feeling the effects of the depression and desirous to promote a reaction, may take a bitter and therefore somewhat exaggerated view. But when Mr. Hervey takes upon himself to declare that there is no serious political dissatisfaction and no particular grounds for it, that the Government is free from serious offence, and that the locusts are the only real cause of the crisis, we take the liberty of replying, without wishing to be personal, not that he is mistaken, but that he is not in a position to form an opinion, and that he does not know what he is talking about.

According to the Standard, Mr. Hervey, on his arrival in Buenos Aires, was interviewed by the Nación of that city, but that paper declined to reproduce his views concerning Uruguay. The Standard calls this violation of press-etiquette. Would it not be nearer the mark to say that the Nación, which is on the spot and able to judge, recognized that Mr. Hervey's views were not sufficiently accurate or well-based to be worth reproducing?

POLITICAL NOTES.
The Chamber was closed yesterday afternoon with the usual formalities, a day sooner than was expected. The country is heartily glad to be rid of them.

The political world is all agog for the meeting to be held at the Obispo Theatre this afternoon, for the installation of the Directive Committee of the independent "colorados" elected last Sunday. Those who have accepted the nomination so far are Sres. T. Gomezzoro, Dr. J. Magariños Egoa, J. Varela, Dr. A. Floro Costa, Dr. D. Mendilharau, Dr. J. O. Blanco, Joaquín O. Marquez, José B. Gomezzoro, J. D. Gonzalez, Senator Blas Vidal, J. Saavedra, Dr. J. Salterain, Dr. S. A. Camp, Blas Vidal hijo, Dr. Martinez Vigil, E. H. Picardo, Dr. L. Barba-gelata, O. Travieso, Dr. G. L. Rodriguez, P. Bustamante and J. Barilo y Ordoñez. Only three are short, one of them being Don Eduardo Mac Eacoch, who it is to be hoped will not refuse. Up to the time of writing we have not heard of any attempt on the part of the Government to interfere with the meeting, though there is no knowing what it may do at the last moment. There is much talk in the air of other meetings, political and public, though no one will be surprised if at any moment the Government puts a stop to the whole movement by proclaiming a state of siege. In fact this is rumored as

loudly as ever, though nothing certain is yet known. There is little doubt that the President really entertains the idea, but the Ministers are said, for once, to be offering mild opposition to so extreme a step.

The declarations of the reactionary party are so far peaceful in the extreme. They desire a policy of reaction and of conciliation which will save the country from the horror of civil war by restoring their political rights to the "blancos." Nothing could be better than this and the only opposition really comes from the Government, which will bear nothing of either reaction or conciliation. It is now said, moreover, that the "blancos" are not averse to making peace with the independent colorados, and for that purpose are deferring their revolution in order to await the effect of the present reactionary movement. To every one except the Government this would be a good sign.

Yesterday's Siglo dwells forcibly on the extraordinary isolation of President Borda. His predecessors, Latorre, Santos, Teije and Herrera, to the last had powerful and influential followers both in political and military circles. But at Sr. Borda's side none such can be found. He has alienated even his own party, and is supported solely by the financial syndicates whose business he shares, the necessities he has put into office, and the power of distributing emoluments.

The Siglo also utters another warning against ex-president Dr. Herrera, who is maneuvering to join the reactionary party, although he is responsible for so many of the present evils, and is one of the last men from whom wholesome political reaction may be expected. Perhaps Dr. Herrera, who is no fool, sees which way the tide is beginning to flow, and wants to come in with the flood.

The Customs revenue for January will be about \$650,000. That for the same month last year was \$1,067,849.

The tenders for the construction of the Port were to have been opened yesterday afternoon. At the last moment, we are informed, a prolongation of the term was applied for by the representative of Walker and Co. (which is expected to be the favored firm) but we cannot say if it was granted. We will give the results in our next.

On Monday payment will commence, here and in London, of the February coupon for the quarterly interest of the Consolidated Debt, as also of the railway guarantees.

THE QUEEN'S GLORIOUS REIGN—CELEBRATIONS.

A piece of gossip has been floating about for the last few weeks, and has even appeared in one or two places in the Press, to the effect that her Majesty the Queen intends to signalize the conclusion of the sixtieth year of her reign by abdication in favour of the Prince of Wales. It seems to us the other day, as we dare say it has come to other London newspapers, in highly circumstantial form, declared to be vouched for "by good authority," and we were enjoined to set it out as by far the most important news of the day, as undoubtedly it would be if it were true. But it seems to us desirable to say, since such rumours are current, that they are happily as altogether improbable as they would be regretted if they were in any sense true.

Among many virtues, her Majesty has none greater than her discretion. If she entertained any such notion, there is only one person in the world who would be likely to know it, and that is Lord Salisbury, who is the least likely person to communicate it to anyone else. But there is no reason to suppose that the Queen has any such idea. We are glad to learn that the Queen is, with the exception of the slight lameness from which she suffers, exceedingly well. The trouble to her eyesight, of which something has already been said, is not greater than is incidental to her age, and is easily met by having such despatches as need to be submitted to her written in a specially large and legible handwriting. Her Majesty is in all respects as indefatigable and conscientious as ever in the discharge of her public duties, and apart from the loss which would be incurred by the removal of her powerful and estimable personality, there is no Minister who has had relations with her during the last ten years who would not feel that the loss of her influence and unequalled experience, especially in foreign politics, would be a national misfortune. It is not till the history of these times can be fully set out from private documents that the country will learn how much it has owed to her Majesty as a permanent Minister of Foreign Affairs.

It is true that during the coming celebrations all possible efforts will be made, as they should be, to spare the Queen any unnecessary physical exertion. She will necessarily in this matter be guided by the advice of her physicians, and there will certainly be no fear of misunderstanding on that ground. We might add, though it seems superfluous, that the change consequent upon any change in the occupancy of the throne during the Queen's lifetime

would be so many and so difficult that even on that ground alone the thought would be repugnant to practical statesmen.—Westminster Budget.

ENGLISH ABROAD.

LANCET.

It is astonishing to note with what obstinacy English travellers on the Continent maintain English habits, however unsuited they may be to their surroundings. Under the broiling sun of Italy or Spain we find English travellers asking for a grilled steak or roast beef. Of course the steak is tough, tasteless, and indigestible, the "rosbife" raw in the centre though burnt outside, nasty in flavour, and leathery in substance, thus constituting the most unsuitable article of diet that could be taken under the circumstances. Then the Englishman will pay 1s. 3d. for a 4d. bottle of English ale which is far too heavy and alcoholic for the climate, instead of drinking the pure wine of the country that is supplied without stint and gratuitously at all meals. These British peculiarities have done much to destroy the advantages of foreign travel and to render the better known hotels, which are frequented by English families, as expensive as the hotels in England. The experienced Continental traveller, who has learnt to do at Rome as the Romans do, very carefully avoids the hotels frequented by the English. He is, consequently, treated with much greater civility, is fed on dishes which the natives know how to cook and which the experience of centuries has proved to be better suited to the climate, and economises something like 50 per cent. on the cost of living. On the other hand, he may have to content himself with a very small washing-basin (the introduction of English habits in the matter of personal ablution is much needed), and the drainage of the hotel may leave much to be desired; nevertheless, even in this last particular improvements are being effected every day.

In one respect a retrograde tendency has been manifested abroad, notably in France. Efforts are made to exclude English medical practitioners from foreign health resorts. This narrow-minded policy will, of course, result in keeping away English tourists, and especially English invalids. The towns in question are bound to lose considerably, for such measures will check the influx of English gold. The hotel and lodging-house proprietors should enter a strong protest against any such legislation. They have incurred considerable expense so as to improve their drainage in the hope of attracting English visitors, but this outlay will be useless if there are no English practitioners on the spot. The presence also of English medical men might of advantage in helping by their advice the local authorities to raise sanitary conditions to the English level of excellence. Unfortunately, in this respect English practitioners abroad have sometimes been themselves to blame. They have not sought to associate with their fellow-practitioners who were natives of the country. They have taken no interest in local administrative matters. They have behaved as strangers in a strange land instead of seeking to fraternize with the natives and participate in their efforts. Thus jealousies have arisen where common interest should have cemented strong friendships. This has helped to strengthen the outcry against foreign medical men, and while some English practitioners abroad have known how to render themselves very popular with the native practitioners and the local authorities, others, on the contrary, seem to be unpopular.

SUNDRIES.

—We are requested to announce that the Rev. S. P. Craven D. D. will preach at the American Methodist Church at 11 a.m. this morning, after which the Holy Communion will be celebrated. The Rev. W. Groves will preach in the evening.

—The *Bien*, quoting a telegram from Bombay to the effect that the protestant clergymen had fled the plague-stricken city, draws a malicious comparison between protestant and catholic clergy, and says that nothing else could be expected of the "false apostles." This is as intolerant as it is in bad taste, and we may even add ignorant, for the occasions in which protestant and catholic clergy have worked side by side and in friendly fellowship with each other, in situations of the greatest personal danger, are sufficiently well known. The Head of the catholic Church, although he may have recently denied the validity, from the catholic point of view, of protestant orders, was too truthful and too charitable to make any such aspersions, on the contrary he has paid more than one compliment to the high standard of life of the protestant clergy as a body. Neither, we are sure, would any well-informed protestant cast so unjust a sneer at the catholic clergy. We are grieved to such an exhibition of narrow-mindedness and bigotry in the *Bien*, a paper which generally commands our respect.

—Some of our Native contemporaries have been repeating, apparently in all seriousness, an absurd paragraph to the effect that the Queen of England pays her cook a salary of £7000 sterling (the sterling is carefully added) the year, a higher salary than is paid to any American president or public official. Who is it that invents such obviously absurd stories?—Yet there is also some one to believe them, merely because they appear in print. The highest salary paid to any Crown Minister is £5000 the year, and to any officer of her Majesty's household £2000 the year. The Lady Housekeepers at the various Royal Palaces and Residences receive the very modest salary of £120 and £110 the year each. Is it in the least degree probable that the Royal Cook would be paid more than the Prime Minister of England, and three times more than the Lord Chamberlain? Instead of £7000 say 7030 francs the year, and it will probably still be over the mark.

—A sister paragraph to the above cites as something marvellous that 1000 pigs are slaughtered for food daily in London. What is that among 5,000,000 mouths?

—The Italian Government has bought the Borgheze gallery of paintings for 7 million lire or say £80,000.

—The following items are to hand from the Chilean Capital: Messrs T. B. Fowler, William H. Fowler and Thomas C. E. Fowler who have been in Santiago have returned to Buenos Aires. There are a number of spurious Chilean coins in circulation. Chile is to be represented at the Guatemala Exhibition on July 15 h. Mr. Patrick R. Irvine of the firm of Irvine and MacQueen died on the 13th instant. Mr. H. S. Sydney-Merritt has been appointed auditor in Chile for the San Life Assurance Co. of Canada. The P. S. N. C. S. S. Arica has been docked at Talcahuano. The Santiago Fire Brigade owes to the Bank of Chile over ninety thousand dollars. The Government has appointed Dr. Juan B. Caspades to study, in Europe, scholastic hygiene in relation to eye diseases. It is said that Mr. Fitzgerald will go to Valparaiso and deliver a series of lectures. The vessels on the Magellan station have been ordered to make a new survey for the cable to Punta Arenas.

—There is not the least truth in the report that Minister Miguel Herrera has written a long letter to the *Razon* defending the Government. At least the *Razon* says so, and it ought to know.

—Yesterday's *Nacion* says that the appointment of Sr. A. Pau to the Postmastership General is one of the best and most judicious appointments made ever made! This is not a quotation from *La Guayaba*, though it well might be for its extravagance.

—As anticipated, the police have prohibited the circulation of *La Guayaba*—we suppose because it praised the Government a little too much. The Editor Sr. Carlos Blixen

has appealed to the judges for redress. We do not suppose he will get it.

The remarks we reproduce today from the "Land on" "English Abroad," though written with a view to the continent, are also very applicable here, especially as regards the ending and ending.

—Reports from the interior already say that the recent rains, which became general throughout the Republic after the first day, have done an enormous deal of good, and will help to repair some of the ravages of those two plagues, locusts and drought, from which the camp was suffering.

—It is stated that the British Government paid the tenia Ivory, or Bell, before he left for New York, an indemnity of £10,000 in compensation for his imprisonment and trial. We have not heard of any Government here doing the like.

—One Frenchman has been killed and seven taken prisoners in a row with a Brazilian force on the disputed territory of French Guiana. They were gold-seekers. This may lead to trouble.

—The Commons have appointed a Commission to enquire into the doings of Dr. Jameson in the Transvaal.

—The bubonic plague has appeared on the island of Formosa, and at Goa in the Portuguese Indies. The alarm in Europe against its introduction there continues, and the Powers are combining to take preventive measures. At English ports vessels from the infected districts are subject to sanitary observation and disinfection, but not to quarantine. The Sultan has issued an order prohibiting all pilgrimages to Mecca while the plague continues.

—A London telegram states that a Mr. L. E. Jones, exporter of blood horses for Argentina, has been arrested under extradition on charge of having forged a bill for \$100,000 in New York. We think the individual is well-known in Buenos Aires.

—An old lottery ticket seller named Vicente Pinada, Italian, aged 63, committed suicide yesterday morning by throwing himself into the well of the conventillo Y 267, where he lived. Distress was the reason assigned, and he leaves six children in complete misery.

BUENOS AIRES.

—The inundation of the Chaco continues. The Governor, Colonel José M. Uribarri, telegraphs that the rivers Paraguay, Pilcomayo and Bermejo are still rising. The telegraph wires between Bermejo and Formosa and between Barraguanes and Corrientes are totally submerged, and the river Paraná has risen so between Florencia and Resistencia that the water already reaches within half a metre of the wires.

—The new acetylene gas was on Wednesday night exhibited in the Boas by Mr. Rottini who introduces it here. The light given by it is brilliant and the cost is exceptionally small. Mr. Rottini is about to apply for a patent.

—The ordinary general meeting of the Saint Andrew's Scotch Church was held on Thursday in the hall of the Church, and the following committee was elected: Messrs. Drysdale, Hugh Wilson and J. Murray Talloch. Mr. John Grant was chairman of the meeting. A very unusual thing for an church to have was a small surplus instead of a large deficit, as is usually the case in church finance.

—Dr. Quirino Costa has again acted as peace-maker. On Wednesday he made Dr. Basile and Dr. Alcobaides shake hands, metaphorically, in his presence. The two important officials gave mutual explanations and we common folk will probably benefit materially by the reconciliation.

—The National Government has bought 25 bicycles from the firm of Montreuil.

—The Public Works' Office has ordered the electric tramway company to suspend their works because North American white oak wood is being employed for the sleepers instead of huanabuy. All the sleepers already laid will have to be changed.

—Mr. Patrick Dillon of Lujan on Wednesday was married to Miss Emily Quirgo.

—The French Consul in La Plata has presented to Dr. Fria a claim on behalf of his countrymen for the destruction of their property by the locust commission in the department of Pilar. In the town of Belen three thousand eucalyptus, in their excessive zeal, have been destroyed by fire about 200 fruit-trees and a great deal of fencing.

—The locust Commission is having a good degree of success in raising funds for the extermination of the national pest. If a man can be found who knows enough to get at the root of the matter and begin a sensible campaign of extermination, there will be no lack of money to bring the here and give him a change to do his work. —B. A. Herald.

LONDON NOTES.

SATURDAY, JAN. 2.

The Czar has telegraphed to M. Felix Faure offering on the part of the Emperor and his family cordial congratulations on the occasion of the New Year. The Ambassadors were received in audience at the Elysee, and the usual complimentary speeches were exchanged.

King Humbert has been suffering somewhat serious indisposition, but was able yesterday to leave his bed for a short time. His physicians, states that his May's illness is the result of a severe cold received while out hunting.

Sir William Harcourt issued a letter to all the Liberal Members of the House of Commons, inviting

them to be in their places when Parliament meets, as matters of importance will be brought at once under discussion.

Mr. John Dillon, M.P., yesterday attended a meeting in Mr. Healy's constituency, which Cardinal Logue had expressed his disapproval of. A large party from Dundalk drove to the meeting headed by priests and urged on to the platform. Mr. Dillon restrained the people and held his meeting successfully near the same spot.

Grievance of teachers engaged in rural and other small schools were publicly ventilated at a conference in Exeter Hall yesterday by Mr. Macnamara, Mr. Voxell, M.P., Mr. Ernest Gray, M.P., and teachers who had come up from the country for the purpose. Rain ceased falling in Kerry yesterday, and as a consequence the slide of the bog towards Omeavore Valley stopped. It is estimated that upward of two hundred persons have been reduced to want through loss of stock and winter stores. A fund for their relief has been opened in Dublin.

Bolton Wanderers suffered another defeat yesterday, Liverpool scoring four goals to their one, and now takes the third place in the League competition.

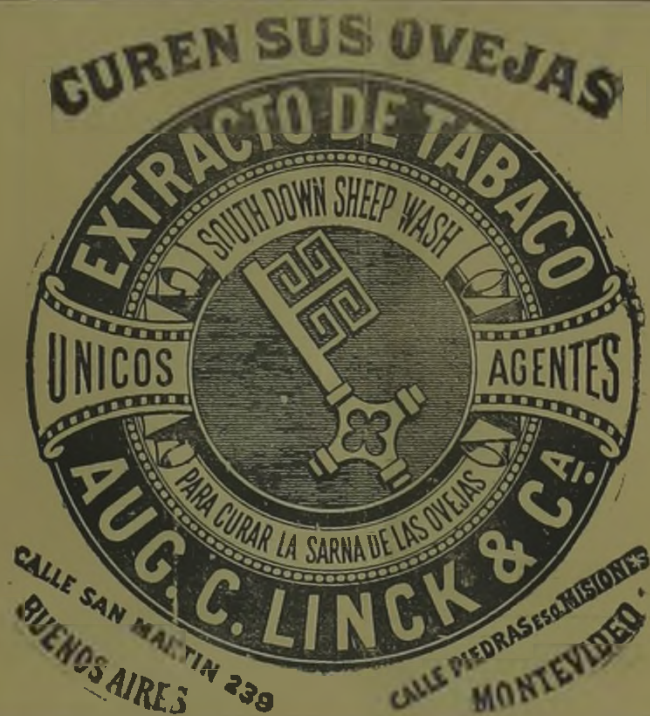
