NEWS OF THE DAY

MONTEVIDEO SUNDAY, AUGUST 2, 1891.

Parliament. The Permanent Committee.

On Friday, the report of the special Committee on the Message of the Executive referring to special financial measures during the crisis was distributed, but on the motion of Sr. Freire it was resolved to postpone the discussion until Monday.

Chamber of Senators. On Friday, the Cabinet Ministers being again present, the discussion in detail of the Bill for the liquidation of the English Bank was commenced.

The Minister of Finance regretted the absence of Sr. Cuevas, as he wished to reply to observations made by the latter on the previous day. He defended the action of the E.P. in closing the Tribunals, as the E.P. could not constitutionally ask the Tribunals privately to suspend their action for four or five days with regard to the Bank. Such an interference would be entirely unwarrantable. The action of the E.P. in the matter had been duly submitted to the Permanent Committee which would pronounce upon it in due time. The E.P. recognised that its measures involved serious responsibilities and even inconvenience, and therefore he hoped the Chamber would not prolong the evils by extending the discussion needlessly. Referring to the criticisms of Sr. A. F. Costa, the Minister asserted that it was erroneous to suppose there was anything irregular in the existence of the English Bank, which had punctually fulfilled all the formalities of law and the statutes of which had been duly sanctioned and registered in 1884. It was therefore a fully authorised and judicial institution, not contravening the constitution in any manner. He denied that the Bill before the Chamber was irregular, or that it was necessary always to legislate in the abstract. Special circumstances were continually arising which required to be met by special and particular laws, often of a purely transitory effect. The English parliament, which is the protype and model of all the parliaments of the world, frequently dictated such laws, dealing with the minutest matters. Three quarters of our laws were of the character called "private bills" in England, affecting certain persons, bodies or places. Such were the laws granting concessions and pensions, and such was the present Bill. He combated the use of the word "rescript" made by Sr. Costa, many laws were necessarily rescripts as they referred to circumstances already arisen. The Legislative Chambers could not act illegally, because it was always within their power to frame new laws or to revoke old ones. There was no illegality in the present Bill because it was opposed to existing laws, so long as it did not transcend the Constitution which

was the limit of all laws. If the Chamber approved it, it at once became law equal to any that preceded it.

The Minister was here subjected to a series of interruptions from Sr. Costa, who had finally to be called to order by the President of the Chamber. The Minister's replies to Sr. Costa several times provoked loud applause from the "bar" and the Chamber. The Minister, although again subjected to frequent interruptions, gave several statements concerning the condition of the Bank which completely refuted the charges of Sr. Costa.

After the interval the debate was prolonged for a short time further and the various articles were then voted in the form received from the other Chamber. Several modifications were proposed but none were accepted, the arguments advanced by the Minister of Finance in each instance being found satisfactory to the large majority of those present.

On the motion of Sr. E. Chincarro the second reading was suppressed and the Bill declared ready for communication to the Executive. The sitting then concluded.

Liquidation of the English Bank.

The following is the modified Bill as finally sanctioned by both Chambers, and which will receive the seal of the Executive and become Law immediately.

Art. 1.—The English Bank of the River Plate shall enter into liquidation, and shall not again operate as a Bank of issue.

Art. 2.—The English Bank of the R. P., in liquidation, shall be conceded one year of moratorium.

Art. 3.—The liquidation of the said Bank shall be carried out by a Committee composed of the present manager or of the person appointed in his stead by the Directorate in London, a delegate appointed by the creditors and a delegate of the State, appointed by the E. P. Both delegates shall receive a salary, to be paid out of the liquidation, equal to that of the manager or representative of the Directorate in London.

Art. 4.—The Liquidating Committee shall open at once the conversion of \$10 notes, and shall dispose of the more readily realizable values of the Bank to effect the conversion of higher notes in not more than six months. During this term the Committee may receive all kind of notes of the Bank in payment of credits of the Bank.

Art. 5.—The conversion having been entirely effected, or the cash necessary for the same being put apart, the Committee shall continue the operations of liquidation subject to the rules established by the Commercial Code in the case of judicial moratoria. Any questions that may arise between the creditors of the Bank and the Liquidating Committee shall be decided before the Tribunals of the Republic in accordance with common law, so far as not opposed to the present law.

Art. 6.—The Liquidating Committee is empowered to concede to the debtors of the Bank who are not in a position immediately to settle their accounts, a delay which shall in no case exceed the term fixed for the conversion of the notes, charging a conventional interest to be paid at the time of renewing the documents. The Committee may also concede discharges to insolvent debtors of the Bank provided all the members are agreed thereon.

Art. 7.—The Liquidating Committee, with the intervention of the Accountant General of the Nation and the Notary of Government and Finance, shall at once destroy by fire the omission and all material of omission found within the establishment, and shall proceed every month in the same manner with the notes converted or received in payment in that time.

Art. 8.—The Liquidating Committee shall deliver to the creditors of the Bank, when so solicited, certificates for the amount of their claims on the Bank.

Art. 9.—The Committee shall publish a monthly balance of the liquidation, signed by all the members.

Art. 10.—Until the creditors of the Bank appoint their delegate, the present manager and the State delegate shall take the precautionary and preservative measures claimed by the interests of the Bank and shall be authorised to collect its accounts.

Art. 11.—The moratoria and special form of liquidation established by this law shall be considered accepted so long as they are not opposed by the creditors of the Bank, in the number prescribed by Art. 170 of the Commercial Code, in a meeting of creditors to be convoked at once by the delegate of the Executive and the manager of the Bank.

Art. 12.—The E. P. shall issue the regulations for this Law.

Art. 13.—Let this be communicated, etc.

SUNDRIES.

The present Minister of Finance Dr. C. M. Ramirez, who enjoys a measure of public confidence and popularity denied to his recent predecessors in the portfolio, had another triumph in the Chambers of Senators on Friday, and carried his Bill respect-

ing the English Bank with flying colours. His speeches made their mark, not because he was the mouthpiece of Government, but because his arguments were so sound as his expressions were sensible and his oratory was brilliant. This is high praise but those who have followed the course of the debate will acknowledge that he deserves it. Sr. A. F. Costa again played the part of obstructionist, but was effectually crushed by the Minister who "scored" off him every time, to the evident delight of the Chamber. Once more we have great pleasure in congratulating Dr. Ramirez.

The Bill for the liquidation of the English Bank has passed both Chambers, and will receive the seal of the Executive without further delay, if it has not done so already. The Bill relative to the National Bank was discussed in the Senate yesterday, and if the discussion was not concluded, which we cannot say at time of writing, it was to be continued today, in the hope of bringing the enforced holidays to an end on Monday and resuming the ordinary course of business. The reopening of the Tribunals will be an enormous relief.

The Siglo states that the further financial measures of Government, including one relative to the minor omission of the National Bank, are already prepared, and will be presented to the Chambers early in the week. The Minister have been in almost constant council, and no one can just now accuse the Government of lack of energy.

Mr. Essex E. Reade, a gentleman who has come to the River Plate on business connected with Baring Brothers' affairs, is at present in Buenos Aires and will be in Montevideo shortly.

We understand that the \$10 notes of the English Bank will probably be converted this week.

The Minister of War has not yet heard the last of the unfortunate business of the coining of the Paraguayan medals, which has already cost him a rebuke from the Representatives. The local engravers who sent in tenders for coining the medals have published a joint protest asserting that the medals coined by order of the Minister are badly executed, not worth the money they cost, and not delivered up to time. If anyone less thick-skinned were concerned, such a declaration would make him very uncomfortable.

The English-speaking servants of the city are reminded of the invitation to tea extended to them by Mrs. Cooper, in the Lafone Memorial Hall, on Monday, from 3 to 5 p.m. Monday, it will be remembered is a bank-holiday in England.

The programme at the Politeama this evening consists of the comedy in 3 acts "Carnaval de Milan," and the spectacular military ballet "Landung of the Italians at Massonah."

A «Dependiente» writes to us to ask why, in one of our advertisements, Monday is referred to as a Bank Holiday? Without assuming any responsibility for the ideas of advertisers, whose text we do not feel at liberty to alter, we presume that it is so mentioned because the first Monday in August is a bank holiday in England, and therefore may not unreasonably be selected as the occasion of a modest festival by those English persons the nature of whose work prevents them from enjoying the ordinary commercial holidays of this country.

Remembering the peculiar conditions of journalism in this city and that the greater number of papers were always dependent on party or private subsidies, it is not surprising to note that the crisis has greatly reduced their number. Two years ago there were some twenty daily papers published here, but the list is now reduced to the following: Siglo and Razon (morning and evening editions each), Epoca, Bien, L'Italia, L'Union Française, Montevideo Noticias and MONTEVIDEO TIMES; afternoon papers, Tribuna, Dia and Republica. There are some flickering advertising sheets and weekly journals of which no account can be taken.

We received yesterday afternoon the first number of the Republica, a paper which is published to take the place of the recently defunct Ferro Carril, and is printed in the office of the latter. The director is Sr. Jose de la Peña, and its programme is «free and independent» though as yet we cannot say what line of policy it will espouse. It is lively and newsy and promises to be a great improvement on its weak and foolish predecessor.

The admirable administration and grand resources of the Post Office were well illustrated yesterday. We sent to purchase ten postcards of two cents, but the combined efforts of all the employees could only supply us with nine!

The new and vexatious law of stamps came into effect yesterday, and great was the annoyance and disgust of persons who, having bought revenue stamps a few days ago, and placed them on cheques or bills, found that they were already inoperative and must be replaced

by stamps bearing the date of the current quarter. This foolishness is to be repeated every three months. We maintain that a stamp once purchased ought to be always serviceable. It is absurd to have to change one's stamps every three months.

«Anent Kissing.»—Many ridiculous anecdotes are told to illustrate Puritanic horror of this pleasant and natural salute. Here is one of an English divine, who was known as the author of a Biblical concordance. He courted his wife seven years before he asked if he might kiss her. «Just as you please», she answered demurely. «Let us first ask a blessing», he said, after which he kissed her. «Why, it's good», he exclaimed, «Let us return thanks.» They were married in a few weeks. That brings to mind the saying of a young woman concerning a suitor whom she had rejected. In summing up his qualities, she said, «He was good-looking, he was educated, he was devoted, he sent me flowers—I always thought I'd love a man who sent me flowers—but, she concluded, in a tone of disdain, «he hadn't sense enough to kiss me when he had a chance.»

To-day the resident Swiss will celebrate, in usual style, the 60th anniversary of their independence as a federate republic. Happy little Switzerland which for six centuries has kept free from the turmoils of monarchical and imperial Europe. We wonder how many more republics will have joined the swelling list on the arrival of the next century? This is a question which our great-grand-children will be able to answer, but none of us.

Yesterday there were registered seven new cases and one death from small pox, also one case of diphtheria.

The interesting football match between the Club and the Junior Association will take place this afternoon, weather permitting, which is by no means certain.

Dense white fog prevailed over the river, bay and city on Friday night and the greater part of yesterday, with prospect of continuing. No steamer from Buenos Aires had arrived to a late hour.

We are pleased to notice that Mr. E. B. Greenwood, entirely recovered from his severe attack of small-pox, has resumed his post in the London and R. P. Bank.

As Messrs Alfredo Costa Gutierrez and Alfred Horne Lavalle were out driving on Friday afternoon, in a volante, the horses bolted and, coming into violent collision with a curbstone, the former gentleman was thrown out and received a severe wound in the eye.

LATEST. We learn that the Bill relative to the National Bank was fully sanctioned by the Senate yesterday afternoon. This and the Bill relative to the English Bank will be signed by the Executive and promulgated at once, so that business will resume its ordinary course on Monday.

sertion, he calls his interrogatory statements, questions, his first is a bare «assertion» without foundation as up to the time of writing he has not yet had the courage to come forward to verify it. Would not it have been wiser, if V. P. V. D. was so anxious to arouse the subscribers to the fact how their money was expended etc., first to communicate with the Committee, and peradventure if he be one of them, to call a meeting and investigate the matter, and not rush to the press.

It seems to me that no honourable man would want to write anything that he would be ashamed to put his name to. When a man's character is assailed in a newspaper, who is responsible? Is it the «we» of the editorial columns. What is a private citizen to do in contest with a misrepresentation multiplied into hundreds of copies of one newspaper, referred to in another, and then another. This has been done with the letter of V. P. V. D., reference has been made in the Buenos Aires papers, and no doubt will appear in the newspapers in England. A wrong done a man's character in a newspaper is more virulent than one done in private life. A man in a hot temper may say a thing he will be very sorry for in a few minutes after, but a virulent attack in a newspaper is a more deliberate thing, as it must be written out with a pen, and then it must be set up in type, and then the «proof» must be taken off, and read, and corrected, and then for some hours the presses are kept running, sending the misrepresentation abroad. Plenty of time to repent, plenty of time to cool off, and yet all that under an impersonality. This is contrary to that wise dictate of nature, «of doing to others as we would they should do to us;» it is an open violation of that Christian doctrine of charity, and is a sign of a weak mind which is not able to bear the lustre of merit and virtue. And here I cannot but observe, with too much truth, that those, who know a great deal of ill themselves, are apt to suspect ill of every body else. We may laugh at all this, but who doubts the superior, «live-with-ability» of such characters, as compared with the curled-lipped fault-finder for whom nothing on earth is good enough except their own detestable selves. You and I do not expect or desire that our characters and deeds shall pass without commentary. That would be to covet living burial. Since we are imperfect, no true commentary upon us can be made without involving criticism which, however just, it might pain us to hear. But it should be candid, courteous, kindly, and from high motive. He asks «what is the definition of Sailors' Home» I read once in the visitors book of a London Hotel, that «it was the nearest thing to Home, away from Home.» To realize this definition, Sir, is the highest aim of the «Sailors' Home» or the «Hotel for blue-jackets» as he sneeringly calls it.

All I desire is, that V. P. V. D. would kindly comply with the challenge given him by the Chairman, to furnish the Secretary, with proofs of his «assertions» in order that the matter may be promptly and satisfactorily investigated, or should he prefer to so by means of your paper, that he disclose his real name, as an evidence of good faith, especially when, as in the present case, casting serious reflections upon one's character.

to Argentina. These facts cause some surprise among those who do not stop to analyse the movement and classify those who go and those who come.

In the United States they are beginning to hold to the same opinion, and are undertaking to scrutinize the immigration which reaches those shores and a large number are turned back as undesirable population.
