## UNJUSTIFIABLE PANIC.

The market, victim of a series of disasters and possessed by a profound want of confidence, is at the present moment dominated by a panic which can only be termed entirely unjustifiable and which is manifested in an exceptionally violent run upon that magnificent institution of credit, the London Bank of the River Plate. And this run is taking place although, only a fortnight ago, in the panic not unnaturally caused by the suspension of the English Bank, the London Bank proved itself, as it had previously done under similar circumstances in Buenos Aires, to be a tower of credit, and an official investigation of its resources showed that it had sufficient cash in hand to cover twice its omission in circulation.

So far as can be ascertained, nothing, absolutely nothing, has occurred to justify the present run. Nothing is officially known to have happened to the head office in London, nothing has happened in Buenos Aires, and the reports that the run had extended to the latter city have not received any confirmation.

So far as we can ascertain the run began in this wise. About midday on Tuesday vague rumours, supposed to have originated in the neighbourhood of the Bolsa, began to be whispered that something had gone wrong in the head office in London; either that it had not been able to take up some bills due, or that it had suddenly suspended payment. Monday being Bank holiday in England, the office there was naturally closed, and even this simple fact seems to have increased the panic. It was also rumoured that the Bank's shares had suddenly fallen to a heavy discount. But, beyond the assertion that some unknown person had received a cipher telegram of dubious interpretation, no head at all could be traced to this rumour. Mr. Thurburn, the manager of the Bank, had received no news at all, and was entirely in the dark as to the cause of the run, which took him completely by surprise, though not, of course, unprepared. The managers of the other English Banks, who would have been the first to learn any sinister news, were equally ignorant and surprised. Yet the panic spread throughout the city with alarming rapidity; at half past two the Bank, which had been quiet enough two hours previous, was besieged, and before the evening the notes were generally refused throughout the city, though there never has been nor is there likely to be the least hesitation in converting them.

Although the present distressful situation and the prevalent want of confidence affect every one's nerves, and the recent suspension of the English Bank has given an unpleasant shock to English credit (thanks to Argentine dishonesty), such a panic as the present, directed towards an institution which has so recently given convincing proofs of stability, requires to be accounted for in some further manner. Therefore we express our conviction, although we confess we have no proof to bring forward beyond strong suspicion, that there are wreckers abroad, and that the malicious rumours have

been circulated and the run instigated by enemies of the Bank. Who those enemies are we cannot directly say, but it is notorious that they exist. The very strength and independence of the Bank, the contrast it forms to the National Bank and its refusal to weaken its credit by lending itself to speculation, doubtful business and financial intrigues, have raised up for it powerful enemies, who would not be too scrupulous about the means employed to wreck it. Expressions of a desire to injure or destroy it have been heard in high quarters. What wonder then that, knowing no other motive for the present panic, we attribute it to the deliberate malice of wreckers.

At any time so malicious an act would be highly criminal, but at the present, when everyone's nerves are already overstrained with financial worries, it is trebly so, whether it has merely been done for purposes of speculation or from a deeper design to injure the Bank. We do not think it too much, then, that Government should be asked to investigate the matter with the idea of discovering the source of the mischievous rumours and exposing the machinations which have so unscrupulous an object. The market has quite enough to suffer from without being entirely thrown off its balance by the malicious work of wreckers.

## MOST ILLOGICAL.

The regrettable crime of last Saturday, in a *café chantant* in calle Perez Castellanos, has brought forth an extraordinary amount of most illogical comment from several of our contemporaries. A hot-headed young fellow, flushed with liquor, enters a public place of entertainment, behaves in a disorderly manner, directly provokes an encounter with a low class person and consequently loses his life. Therefore, argue our contemporaries, the place is disorderly and immoral and should be closed at once. We cannot conceive more illogical reasoning. We do not defend the establishment in question, although we have reason to believe that the loudest complaints against it issue from those who have been ejected thence for disorderly conduct. We do not defend the crime, which was abominable and a violent, though not, as some have asserted, premeditated. But at the same time we do not think it just that all the blame should be thrown upon the establishment. Something should also be said about the bad behaviour of those who frequented it. As we remarked yesterday, there is a certain class of 'glided' youths in this city, mostly natives, well dressed, more flush of money than of brains, of respectable connections, but entirely without breeding. From some inexplicable reason these youths have not the remotest notion of behaviour in public places of entertainment, especially of the *café chantant* or variety class, and invariably prevent all attempts to establish such, however modest, well-intentioned or respectable, by their disorderly and even obscene conduct. We have seen this happen over and over again both here and in Buenos Aires, and we do not hesitate to proclaim it as a disgraceful fact. We have had the misfortune of witnessing several such disorders in the River Plate, and have found them invariably proceed from the class alluded to, and not from the artisan, working or lower classes, from whom such conduct might more reasonably be expected. And the unfortunate part of it is, that discredit is rarely if ever fastened upon the persons primarily responsible, as it should be, nor does the press have the courage to tell them the discreditable truth about themselves. The sufferers are those who attempt to provide the entertainment or those who attend to it from honest motives and with quiet intentions.

We do not wish to assert that the unfortunate victim in the present case was such a youth as those described above, but we wish to see the matter treated more justly. If he had not courted mischief he might have been alive to-day. Our contemporaries, whilst condemning the crime, should not overlook the conduct of those who frequented the place with the sole object of raising disorder and making themselves objectionable.

## Parliament.

The Permanent Committee held a sitting on Monday, when the recent extraordinary measures of the Executive during the crisis were considered. A Minute of Communication approving the measures and confirming the authority of the Executive to act as it had done, was put in general discussion.

Sr. Perez made a lengthy speech in support, analysing the faculties of the E. P., and concluded by saying

that although the action of the E. P. in a time of panic might be perfectly justifiable, it was not intended to concede to the E. P. the future power of decreasing indefinitely prolonged holidays, paralysing the national life. The Minute was then put to the vote and was approved in general.

The discussion in detail followed at once. Sr. Freire said that although the measures adopted had been productive of good, they had also created great inconvenience in other ways and had been subjected to severe criticism. He thought they should not be allowed to stand for precedent, and he proposed a verbal alteration in the Minute suppressing the remark that the E. P. had acted on an "indisputable right." After a short debate, this was put to the vote and the Minute was accepted with the alteration indicated.

The rest of the sitting was occupied in discussing a Message of the Executive asking permission to promote Colonel Fortunato Flores to the rank of General of Brigade, and Lieut. Colonel Enrique Pereda to the rank of full Colonel, on account of brilliant services in the Paraguayan war. This was conceded in full, and the sitting then terminated.

## Statistics.

We received yesterday from the Direction General de Statistics a pamphlet containing the foreign commerce, movement of navigation and other data of the Republic, corresponding to the year 1890. As was done last year, this pamphlet is a publication in advance of the more important of the data of the compendious Statistical Annuary for 1890 which may be expected to appear next December. As the crisis first fell upon us in the middle of 1890, these statistics will be of exceptional interest, and we will publish them by instalments, with the comments they suggest, as opportunity allows.

## The Run on the London Bank of the River Plate.

The run on the London Bank, which was initiated on Tuesday afternoon, continued yesterday with great violence, despite the notices in the morning papers showing that there were no grounds for alarm. The Bank opened its doors half an hour before the usual time and was quickly besieged by persons desirous of converting notes or cashing cheques. The crowd was so great that after a time only persons with cheques were admitted, the note-holders being despatched to the British, London and Brazilian, or Anglo-Argentine Banks, all of which had kindly undertaken to assist in the conversion of notes and were consequently thronged with people. The neighbourhood of the four Banks, all in a stone's throw of each other, was crowded all day, many being drawn there by curiosity. Extra policemen were on duty in the Banks and the neighbourhood, but there was no attempt at disorder. We understand that the cheques were mostly those on minor current accounts and small deposits at sight. It is needless to say that every claim was met without hesitation, extra clerks being laid on to facilitate despatch. Towards the afternoon the run sensibly diminished in violence, and it was found possible to close the doors of the Bank about half past three, all present being attended to by four o'clock.

The energetic manner in which the Bank has met the run has produced a very favourable effect, and we hope to see the force of the panic worn out to-day, though doubtless another busy day may be anticipated. The conviction seems to be gaining ground that there were no reasonable grounds for the run; many are of the opinion, expressed in our editorial, that it was the malicious work of wreckers, and would like to see an enquiry made into its sources. The notes of the Bank, which were freely refused on Tuesday evening, are beginning to circulate again. It is impossible as yet to give an idea how much has been withdrawn from the Bank.

We understand that the manager of the branch in Buenos Aires has telegraphed offering assistance but that it has not been yet thought necessary to accept it. The run has not extended to Buenos Aires, as was at first reported, nor is there any known foundation for the statement that the shares of the Bank had had a severe fall in the London market.

## SUNDRIES.

—It is generally reported that the Banco Popular de Rio Janeiro is about to send a special envoy here, on financial business which has not transpired, but which may be conjectured to include an enquiry into the real state of the market, and the likelihood of repayment of the Brazilian loan.

—The funeral of the Sra. Buxareo de Cibils yesterday afternoon was very largely attended, as she and her family occupy a high and esteemed position here.

—The following committee has been formed to draw up statutes for the proposed Association of University students.—Sres. A. A. Marquez, A. V. Varela, J. P. Spalter, J. Serrato and N. Milans.

—The 15th instant is fixed for the inauguration of the Nico Perez branch of the Central Uruguay Railway; after which date daily return trains will be run, as also on the Minas branch.

—The invitation to a tea at the Memorial Hall on Monday afternoon, extended by Mrs. Cooper to the English speaking servants of this city, was not so largely attended as it might have been, owing, we believe, to some misunderstanding having arisen abroad as to its object, which was simply to bring about a more confidential understanding between employers and employed. However, some 15 assembled, and passed a pleasant time, varied by chat, music, and a few kind words from the Rev. Chamberlain. It is hoped to hold another such meeting before long, when a larger attendance may be hoped for.

—The Salvation Army is slowly but surely extending its good work in this city. A new branch is to be opened this evening at the corner of calles Sarandi and Maciel, where meetings in Spanish will be held nightly at 8 p.m. and on Sundays at 3 and 7.30.

—An unfortunate accident happened at Maroñas, on Monday, to Casuriaga, one of our foremost jockeys. Whilst exercising one of the mares of the Stud Progreso, she swerved and brought him into violent collision with a post. He suffered internal injuries of a severe nature.

—A rumour has reached us from more sources than one, but we decidedly hesitate to believe it, that Mr. E. Casey is to be again despatched to London to carry out the financial arrangements of which, according to his assertion, he alone holds the key. We repeat this for what it is worth.

—Yesterday there were registered eight new cases and one death from small-pox, one case of diphtheria and one of typhoid fever.

—The man who said, "It is the unexpected that always happens," had probably been thanked by a lady after giving up his seat to her in a crowded tramcar.

—The manager of the Redneto tramline has prohibited the drivers and guards from smoking whilst on duty. We would like to see the prohibition extended to all the tram lines, as the smoking of the driver, and still more of the guard, is frequently a cause of annoyance to the passengers.

—It is telegraphed from London that a general strike of colliers in the Cardiff district is feared.

—It is telegraphed from Lisbon that Balmaceda's new cruiser "Presidente Erraguriz" has found stokers and engineers and has sailed for Chili.

## THE END OF THE WORLD.

"The end of the world" is a favourite theme with a large class of religious teachers, and has been so from time immemorial. But not alone have prophecies and speculations on this startling subject been confined to religionists. Every race of people in every age has had its lurid predictions by seers and oracles of the end of the world. There are now living many persons who remember the excitement and alarm which was produced nearly fifty years ago by the preachings of William Miller, of New York, who declared that the end of all flesh was near, and who set the day of final consummation for a date in October, 1844. Miller published a pamphlet entitled "The Midnight Cry," embellished with terrifying pictures of the monstrous beasts which are set forth in the apocalyptic books of the Bible. Since the days of Miller have come many other interpreters of prophecy, who, nothing daunted by the failure of all the predictions that had gone before them, did not hesitate to appoint dates for the consummation of the end of the world. The last of these is Professor Sotton, of Yale College, who has recently laid before the public his explanation of the ancient prophecies, and has set the year 1893 for the time of the end. The data which have been relied on to furnish a basis for the production of the final day are found in the prophecies of Daniel and in the Apocalypse of St. John. In both those books are set forth in detail

predictions of events which are to occur, and historic panoramas of numerous momentous happenings are unfolded to the view. For each set of events a period of beginning and a time of duration are set, and at the conclusion of the several series of happenings the final consummation is to come. The prophet Daniel, while the Jews were in captivity in Babylon, received revelations which are claimed to give accounts of what was to happen down to the end of the world, the starting point being the command by Cyrus for the rebuilding of the temple at Jerusalem. There are several periods which intervene between that event and the final consummation. Among these are seventy weeks supposed to end with the crucifixion of Christ and the subsequent destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans. Then there are periods of 1,260 days, 1,290 days, 2,300 days, and a time, times, and a half time, which are also subdivisions of the grand duration preceding the end. Very much the same periods of time are also specified in the Book of Revelation, and students of prophecy for a thousand years have been endeavouring to harmonise those two sets of data and to explain just what is meant by the expressions "days" and "times" used by the sacred writers, and to identify the principal events that are to mark the close of epochs. The books that have been written on these subjects would fill a house, and the various and conflicting conclusions that have been worked out are almost past computation. The result is that every date heretofore fixed for the end of the world has disappointed all who trusted in it, and our old planet, scarred and seamed with the effects of innumerable physical convulsions and stained with the crimes of its inhabitants through all the hoary centuries of its history, is still rolling around on its path through the heavens, its people planting and reaping, and carrying on their affairs as if no terrible prediction had ever been made.—New Orleans Picayune.

A NEW OIL DISTRIBUTOR FOR SHIPS.

An oil distributor has been brought out by Captain C. C. Conves, of Penarth, and tried with satisfactory results on the s.s. *Arava*. The new invention distributes oil in a perfectly even and continuous flow from the bows of the vessel. It consists of a circular tank or reservoir above a cylinder, and this is fixed in the fore-peak of the ship, as near the bow as possible, and at such a height as to be a little above the water-line when the cargo is on board. Two small copper pipes run from the bows (one on each side), and by means of brass cocks the oil in the cylinder is allowed to run out just over the broken water caused by the passage of the vessel. The pipes at their outlets are not above 1/16 inch in diameter, so that the quantity of oil they allow to run out is small, though quite sufficient to subdue the heaviest seas. A strong steel piston works on a spindle rod through the cylinder, and forces the oil through the pipes when the cocks are open, so that the jets flow several feet out beyond the bows, and prevent the water coming inboard. The cocks are quite separate, and will allow of the oil being distributed on one side only if need be. The reservoir will hold about seven gallons of oil, and the cylinder about five, which will last some four hours with the jets full on. Seal oil has been tried with the best results, but other kinds of crude oil can be used at pleasure.—Industries.

## SMALL-POX INDICATIONS.

It seems very clear that the metropolis has been recently passing through one of those experiences which have so often been the precursors of epidemic small-pox. Between the end of March and the middle of May the number of small-pox cases under treatment in the small-pox hospitals for the metropolis increased from seven to thirty-five. Then, however, an abatement set in; which has been maintained up to Saturday last when the number had diminished to sixteen. In this respect small-pox has followed its usual seasonal course, and the urgency of the recent experience lies, not so much in the increase during the past spring as in the fact that such increase, though followed by an abatement may foretell a second increase when the seasonal activity of the disease again takes place in November next. Whether this will occur or not depends largely on the activity of our sanitary authorities during the next four months in preventing the recurrence of cases which might form a link connecting the past with a future extension. Never has the metropolis been more fitted to prevent such an occurrence, in so far as measures of isolation and disinfection are concerned, than at the present moment. The sources of information should be prompt and complete, the means of isolation are readily available, and our metropolitan sanitary organisation has in most districts been made more thorough

and perfect than heretofore. In one respect only are there indications of failure, and that is as to vaccination, which at the present time is not being applied to our infant population with the same promptitude as formerly.

WHALES IN CENTRAL AFRICA

How very little we even yet know of Central Africa is strikingly evinced by the fact that porpoises are said to exist in the Victoria Nyanza. This, at all events, is affirmed by Dr. Peters, who describes some "large greybelly" species rolling in "the tepid flood" of that vast sheet of water.
