A COUNSEL OF MODERATION.

If it may be allowed to a humble, foreigner paper like ourselves, to offer, without desire of offence or impertinence, a modest word of counsel to some of our important native contemporaries, we would venture to say that they are not playing at all a worthy part in making an exacerbated party question of the recent miserable conspiracy at La Unión. In the present trying and critical situation of the country they have a higher mission to fulfil than arousing party rancour, or the publication of vain and profitless recriminations. We cannot conceive a more inopportune moment for the accusations and provocations with which they still continue to fill their columns, although public interest in the conspiracy has long died out, in fact it never survived the moment in which it became known that Government itself was only a degree less guilty than the so-called “conspirators” and that the whole affair was a discreditable barrack farce. Where there is so much to be condoned on both sides, a policy of speedy forgiveness and forgetfulness is the only proper course. The recriminations of the party organs not only unnecessarily delay the healing of the sore, but protract the prosecution of those measures which are so urgently claimed for the reparation of the situation. Perhaps the most lamentable phase of the whole affair has been the unjustifiable block it has caused in important public business, a block from which we are still suffering.

Moreover, we think we can venture to assure the contemporaries alluded to that these violent partisan articles and publications are of no interest to a large number of their readers. They must remember that, after all, questions of party politics and personalities only concern a comparatively small section of the public. There is a large and weighty majority here, including all the foreign population and many of the natives, whose interest in politics of this nature is remote. They desire, as we do, to see the country prosperous, advancing, honestly governed and respected, but, again like ourselves, they do not see how these ends are to be attained, least of all in the present critical situation, by the excitement of strong party feelings which prevent either side working for the country’s good, and they are deeply disappointed to see the newspapers to which they look for guidance and information wasting their time as well as lowering their tone over questions of such secondary importance. The question of the day is not one of *colorados* or of *blancos*, had it been so the conspiracy would not have been the farce it was. The question is *The Crisis*, and in the face of that all merely party matters sink into insignificance.

May we then hope that these few friendly words from an onlooker will not be taken amiss, and that the violent recriminations and even personalities which have so unfortunately been aroused will be relegated to the columns of those minor and not particularly scrupulous or respectable papers which unfortunately exist, while the leading and respectable journals (following the almost judicial moderation displayed throughout by the *Siglo*) will address themselves to the really important questions of the day.

Parliament.

The Chamber of Senators sat for a few minutes on Wednesday. The minutes of five preceding sessions were read and approved. The petition of various Bolsa brokers, asking that the Bill concerning the liquidation for July might be despatched, was referred to the Committee of Finance. No further business was transacted.

Patentes.

The Ministry of Finance has issued the decree regulating the Law of Licenses (*patentes*) for the Capital. The term fixed for the payment of ordinary licenses is from November 16 to December 31, 1891. The complimentary license of 1 per mil on importers and exporters, and slaughtering industries, must be paid during January, 1892. The additional license of 2 per mil on insurance, telegraph, telephone and lighthouse companies, must be paid six-monthly, in July, 1892, and January 1893.

4. *Premio Charrua*. 2500 metres. Handicap for all horses. Entrance \$30, prize \$500.
5. *Premio Tenabaty*. 1400 metres. For colts and fillies born since August 1, 1888, excluding winners of “classic” prizes. Weight, Americans, 56 kilos; those born in the country and Europeans, 50 kilos. Entrance \$30, prize \$400.
6. *Premio India*. 1750 metres. Handicap for all horses. Entrance \$30, prize \$400.

Entries for these events close on Saturday evening.

Gran Premio Internacional, to be run on January 1, 1892, 3000 metres. For all horses. Weight by age. Entrance \$25. Prizes, \$1000 and \$100. Entries for this event close November 1.

The Port Question.

The news we gave yesterday about the reduction of the crushing port dues which have so greatly contributed to driving trade from the port, is fully confirmed.

On Wednesday afternoon a conference took place between the Ministers of Finance and of War and Marine and the representatives of the leading shipping agencies. Dr. Ramirez was warmly congratulated on the attitude he has shown throughout. His Bill is now ready for presentation to the Chambers. The principal clauses of the Bill are described as follows.—1. Suppression of the dues corresponding to the National lighthouses (Punta del Este, Flores Island, English Bank, Cerro and Colonia).—Reduction of \$80 in the packet license established by the law of May 11, 1881; this license being thus reduced to \$10.—Reduction on the dues corresponding to the private lighthouses, which in future shall be as follows: Cape Santa Maria 2 cents; Polonia 1 1/2 cents; José Ignacio, Punta Brava, Farallon and Pamela, 4 cents, divided as follows, for the four lighthouses 4 cents, to Montevideo only 2 cents, postage (Pamela and Farallon) 3 cents.—Exoneration from light dues for vessels calling at ports of the Republic only to take orders, coal, provisions, pilots or crew, or to effect repairs.—Extension of the concessions for the private light houses to time sufficient to compensate for the reduction in the dues.

It is calculated that according to these reductions, a vessel of 1500 tons, which at present has to pay dues amounting to some \$300 would only pay \$100. The general reduction is calculated at some 48% or almost one half.

Dr. Ramirez certainly deserves the greatest praise for initiating this much-needed reform. It is to be

hoped the Chambers will lose no time in seconding his patriotic intentions by approving the Bill.

SUNDRIES.

—Sr. Remigio Castellanos has withdrawn the resignation which, for political reasons, he had presented of his post as Jefe Político of the Department of Flores. The rumoured resignations of the Jefes Políticos of Cerro Largo and Soriano are contradicted. The “conspiracy” was at the bottom of these, as of many other, difficulties.

—The telegraph brings news that the death has occurred in Leamington of Mr. Charles J. Shaw, partner in the former commercial house of this market, Shaw Brothers.

—After a lot of trouble and deliberation the authorities have come to the important conclusion that the city of Mercedes was founded in 1788, and have issued a decree accordingly. The unfortunate part of the affair is that the worthy inhabitants of Mercedes were under the impression that the city was founded in 1791, and were just preparing to celebrate its centenary in grand style. Now they find themselves three years after the fair.

—The new “Velo Club,” at Sarandí 303, was successfully inaugurated yesterday with a “clunch.” We had a look through the rooms of this establishment. Although the accommodation is somewhat limited, the furniture and installation is most luxurious, and in excellent taste.

Special attention will be paid to the wines and cooking. It is intended to keep the Club very select and to limit the number of members in proportion to the size of the rooms. We have little doubt that, despite the crisis it will prove successful. We may add that it is purely a social club and throws its door open to members of all nationalities.

—More yards of “declarations” concerning the “conspiracy” were published yesterday, and also more contradictions. We will be merciful and not weary our readers with either.

—It is said that the Bill for compulsory use of the Metric-Decimal system of weights and measures, will be discussed in the Chambers next week. What has become of the Silver Coinage Bill? Sleeping the sleep of the just?

—President Pellegrini had the greatest chance of his life, the greatest that any public man of this generation has had, but he has utterly failed to improve it, and has utterly broken down as a statesman, uttering a splendid reputation, and now we are to see him in the more familiar rôle of a party leader, leading brute force against public opinion, and in this line we may find a return of his former energy and lost reputation. It is a great pity that he could not rise to the level of his opportunity and the country’s need.—B. A. Herald.

—There is some idea that Monday next may be proclaimed a holiday, to make up for the one lost on Sunday, but we have not yet heard anything official to that effect. A holiday would be very welcome in this, the most delightful season of the year, but there are so many crowded into other less appropriate seasons that there are none left for us now.

—“Stand-by O’Gorman” Montevideo “special telegrams” to the B. A. Standard are causing general amusement here on account of the humor and powers of invention they manifest. The Standard now ranks as the principal comic journal in the River Plate, a post which was for a long time occupied, though for different reasons, by the defunct Reporter of Rosario. The latter succumbed, not to the crisis as was generally supposed, but to the shock of seeing one of its numbers issued without a typographical error and without some extraordinary violation of Her Majesty’s English.

—The Irish parties at home are, we regret to say, getting into hot water with each other instead of using the death of Parnell as the opportunity for that conciliation which all their well-wishers desire and which alone can bring about the strength derived from union. It is telegraphed that serious disorders have taken place in Cork between the Parnellists and anti-Parnellists. Fighting was free, many heads were broken and the police had great trouble in restoring order.

—A welcome rumour has reached us that Dr. Ramirez is ready not only with the Port Bill referred to elsewhere, but with the schemes relative to the National Bank for which everyone has been clamouring and which will now be published soon. We hope this is true, the mere announcement raises our spirits a degree or two.

—The death took place on Wednesday evening, after a protracted illness, of Sr. Manuel Larraide, one of the leading members of the National party and a highly esteemed citizen.

—On Tuesday night some audacious thieves violently broke into the quinta of the Correa family in the Camino Cibils. Not content with carrying away a quantity of

valuable articles, such as jewelry, harness and clothes, they did considerable wanton damage by the destruction of pictures, windows and furniture. The quinta was not occupied at the time, being in charge of a care-keeper who slept in an out-house some little distance away. The attack was evidently a pre-concerted one, carried out with audacity and malice. The police are looking for the thieves, and until they are caught we would advise residents in the neighbourhood to be on the look-out.

—We are requested to announce that there will be a choral and instrumental rehearsal of the cantata “Roth” at the Lafone Memorial Hall, at 8 p.m. to-morrow (Saturday) evening.

—We hear that the Directors of the National Bank have already withdrawn the twenty-eight notices of dismissal distributed amongst its staff.

—The annual examinations of the pupils of the public schools will commence in the 15th of next month, and will continue until the schools close for the summer holidays about the middle of December.

—The French Operetta Company at the Eden Oriental will make its debut next Tuesday with a special performance for families and the press. The Theatre will be thrown open to the public on Sunday evening that they may judge of the improvements introduced by the energetic and popular Sr. Arons.

—A telegram from London announced the death of Colonel Hewitt, the last surviving officer of the battle of Waterloo.

—Warm weather turns our thoughts to out-door promenades and music. The Artillery Band will now play in the Prado from 2 to 6 every Monday and Thursday afternoon, and the open-air military concerts in the plazas Constitución and Independencia will commence next week. This music, which is certainly a delightful institution, is about the only consolation the people get out of the army which costs the country so much.

BUENOS AIRES

—The Board of Directors of the new State Bank was installed on Monday by the President of the Republic himself. He made a speech to the directors in which he said that the Bank, was founded against the opinion of a certain clique, but that the real opinion of the Republic and the capital was favourable to the Bank! It is thought to be weak because it is based upon a debt of the community which guarantees the existing money, but all the great institutions of credit in the world have been created in moments of crisis and some upon the basis of a debt worse guaranteed than the note-issue and which yet have existed for a century. This bank not founded to assist the Treasury—(Dr. Lopez said it was absolutely necessary to pass the bill because the Treasury wanted money)—it will be the Treasury of the Nation and the Directors will be able to judge for themselves whether the Treasury needs assistance from the Bank. The bank is not founded for political motives, as is proved by the composition of the Board of Directors. The bank is founded solely for the service of industry and commerce, and specially of the small industries, the most beneficial to the country because they grow and are developed by intelligence and perseverance. The President declared that he would take especial care to remove all official pressure from the directors, and he begged them to devote their attention to the interests of the whole Republic, its industries and commerce. Sr. Van Eicken has declined to be a director of the bank. One half of the employees of the National Bank will be transferred to the new bank, which will have agencies in all the principal colonies of Santa Fé.

—Mr. Popper’s “capataz” at the Sloggett gold-washing station in Tierra del Fuego has absconded with 25 kilograms of gold (worth about £3000). He went to Punta Arenas and there embarked in a German steamer for Valparaiso, but the Chilean Minister has telegraphed to the Intendant of Valparaiso to detain the delinquent on landing and the Intendant has promised to do so.

—Messrs. Luis M. Pirán and Co. have asked for permission to canalize the River Salado at their own expense, undertaking to give a depth which will allow vessels of at least 200 tons to ascend to the distance of 80 kilometres from its confluence with the Paraná, where they would construct a port. The Canal would drain a large district now a swamp. As compensation they ask for 32 leagues of land in the Chaco.

—At a Cabinet Council held on Monday, it was resolved to send a circular to the Governors of provinces reminding them of the duty imposed upon them by the Constitution and the laws of guaranteeing the free exercise by the people of their political rights, and it was also resolved to appoint national Commissioners in Tucuman and Córdoba, who are to act under the orders of the registration boards in the places

where the inscription takes place, and they are to adopt all the measures which they may consider necessary for guaranteeing the liberty of every citizen to approach the registration table for inscription and they are to maintain order and they are to forbid to join any group of persons near the registration tables or in any political manifestation. Colonel Salvador Tula, commanding the 10th regiment in named commissary in the province of Córdoba, and Col. Ramon J. Bravo, commanding the 11th battalion, is named commissary in the province of Tucuman.

—In Monday’s session the Provincial Senate authorized \$10,000 to be spent in exterminating the locusts; it also passed the bills ordering the immediate release of acquitted prisoners; establishing that the Hypothecary Bank shall accept payment of mortgage debts in cedulas of any series of equal or greater interest; conceding to the Municipality of Lincoln half the unoccupied “obras” within the boundaries of that place; authorizing the Bank to suspend the service of Cedulas A. in gold and authorizing debtors in that series to pay in paper cedulas.

—The President of the National Bank has advised the Finance Minister that since August 1890 to August 1891, the bank has received mortgage guarantees and retrocessions to the amount of \$761,339 gold and 19,829,152 paper and has solicited and obtained embargoes to the value of 1,125,896 gold and 17,268,381 paper.—B. A. Herald.

CLIPPINGS

The European labouring classes are not doing well in Alexandria, and the Vice-Consuls’ Englishmen against coming to Egypt unless well trained. In the first place a knowledge of Arabic and of at least one European language in addition to English is indispensable, and employers prefer to engage individuals personally know to them, rather than strangers. Vice-Consul Alban, by the way, has been told by a dealer at Alexandria that, when making his orders in England at some of the largest houses, he has seen foreigners enter and be unable to find any one on the premises who could converse with them. “I can hardly conceive,” adds Mr. Alban, “that many export houses in England can be so far behind the times as this, though there are still very many who persist in sending circulars and price lists to foreign countries written in English only, regardless of the fact that, to a large proportion of the persons for whose benefit they are intended, the English technical terms, weights and measures, are utterly unintelligible.”

There has been an increase of late in the direct shipments of Egyptian cotton to America. America generally buys in Liverpool Egyptian cotton for the manufacture of sewing thread, but about two years ago she began to import direct from Alexandria.

The papers which are being read at the meetings of the Library Association at Nottingham enlighten us as to many of the poor librarian’s burdens. There is the pamphlet literature with which he is flooded; the books sent for inspection; the newspapers sent freely for a month or two until the readers have begun to look for them and then stopped; the catalogues poured in by second-hand booksellers, and the difficulties of the dictionary catalogue to the reader with a limited knowledge of books. Mr. Dent mentioned that “The Recollections of a Country Parson” is asked for by people in search of a work of broad humour, and Mr. Burnand’s “About Buying a Horse,” for useful hints about a horse’s points. Geo. MacDonald’s “Orts” was as often required as a novel, the “Rosa Gardens” was mistaken for a work on the culture of roses. Cross references are not unfrequently copied literally as the titles of books, and once a cross reference under the name of Mr. Gordon Stable was asked for as a work on stable management. Not long ago a pupil teacher returned “Fuller’s Worthies,” because he could not find the biography of Lord Palmerston in it. Sometimes the jumbling of titles in the mouths of messengers at the lending counter is sufficiently ludicrous to atone for many worries. Only the other day he was asked for the works of Joe Stevens, meaning those of Josephus, and an assistant vainly tried to find Canon Liddon’s “Broken Fowl” which was at last found to be Canon Knox Little’s “Broken Vow.” The junior assistant suggested quite seriously that the work might be among the “Bantam” lectures.

Of the four presidents which the London Library has had since 1841, the most conspicuously original, Mr. Harrison, the librarian, says, says, Carlyle, who often visited the Library. His conversation was most amusing, full of extravagant statements, and always ending with a loud laugh, apparently at himself. He used the Library books extensively for his later works, and was guilty of the reprehensible practice of writing in the margin of their books. His remarks were never meaningless, but chiefly consisted of corrections of date

or errors in the text. One remark of his, however, is a criticism. It occurs in Charles Dibdin's collection of songs, the last page of which contains the ordinary version of "Rule, Britannia." At the foot of this beautiful song Carlyle wrote "Cock-a-doodle-doo!" with a small forest of notes of exclamation after it.

There is a fact about the French Revolution more wonderful in its way than any which can be discovered in old newspapers by M. Gustave Isambert or any other searcher of public records. It is the fact, gathered from private letters of the period, that in those stirring times, when all the world was ringing with the events in Paris, there were actually people in that city living in absolute ignorance of the horrors around them. There was no Reign of Terror for them. They lived, veritable recluses, in their quiet suburban houses, hearing nothing, reading nothing of the turmoil which startled and terrified the nations. One wonders much what manner of people these oyster-like folks might be. Nothing sounds more incredible today. Yet there are many things in history not half so well authenticated, though history is curiously silent on so strange a circumstance.

Drastic laws have been passed this year by two of the States of the Union—namely, Texas and Kansas—against the acquisition of land by aliens. According to the Texas law, no person not a citizen of the United States may acquire or own any interest in the lands within the State, and conveyance to any company or corporation wholly or partly composed of foreigners is declared to be void. Only aliens who become citizens of the United States can escape this law. The Kansas measure is not so drastic, but there no corporation, more than 20 percent, of the stock of which is held by aliens, can acquire or hold any real estate.

Mr. J. Armistead, of the Fishery, Dumfries, who has the reputation, it seems, of being the first gentleman to make a commercial success of the culture of fish, says that to turn a lot of small fry into rivers simply means murdering them, as they are swallowed up by the larger fish. The best way is to turn them into the small tributaries running into the lakes or into ponds made for the purpose. In these places the results are satisfactory. Carried out properly, there was nothing more certain than that excellent results would follow from fish culture. Turning out 10,000 fry into a river, he considers, a mere nothing; in America they deal with them by million. Frank Buckland reckoned that not one egg out of a thousand, if left to nature, produces a mature fish. By artificial cultivation we succeed much better than this.

A disappointing feature connected with Japanese trade is stated by our Consul at Hiogo and Osaka to be the fact that the code of commercial honour among a certain section of Japanese merchants is no better than it was when the treaty ports were first opened to foreign trade. When a profit is realisable goods ordered are taken delivery of with commendable and praiseworthy promptitude, but should the carrying out of an engagement be connected with a loss, then the importers are compelled to wait for that reaction, "tending sometimes over years," which will permit of the buyers clearing their purchases with a minimum of loss to themselves. Only in a very few instances is anything ever obtainable to cover unavoidable holding charges. This state of things exists not only where foreigners are interested, but also frequently applies to transactions among Japanese.

M. BLOWITZ ON THE PANAMA CANAL

According to a statement in the Paris papers a commissary of police has lately betaken himself to the offices of some of the engineers who were engaged upon the Panama Canal in order to make certain inquiries. A number of documents have been seized and brought before the experts charged with drawing up a report upon the agreements entered into between the Panama Company and those engaged in the completion of the Canal. It is well known (writes the Paris correspondent of the Times) that the agreements with the contractors were made on a very large scale, too large undoubtedly, that the company is ruined, and that the contractors have become enriched. The question is to know if the contractors have been paid for work which they did not do, and if the administrators have put the subscribers' silver into their own pockets. Now, it is certain that if M. de Lesseps had been a very careful calculator he would not have undertaken the Suez Canal any more than the Panama Canal. Without the army or fellows given by Ismail Pasha—men who worked like oxen and lived on one onion a day—the Suez Canal would have cost double what it did; there would have been the same vicissitudes, and the Canal would not perhaps have been finished to his hour, or ever, because there would have been no precedent of ultimate success to sustain weariness and despair. As for the contractors, without these fellows there would also have been inquiries in their case just as to-day. M. de Lesseps, when he undertook the Panama Canal, unfortunately forgot the fellows, and he had not learned that each worker at Panama, cost fifty times as much as a fellow, and did half as much work. The idea of the fourteenth committee, which invites the French Government to internationalize the Panama Canal, ought not to be rejected. What unfortunately leads one to fear that the committee, while inviting the Government to internationalize the Canal, has only yielded to a desire to procrastinate, are the following details, which, for the most part, are unknown to the public. The fourteenth

committee was overwhelmed with petitions emanating from the principal holders of Panama stock, who asked the Government to invite the Governor of the Crédit Foncier, whose financial popularity is immense, to take in hand the cause of the Panama Canal and try to save it. M. Christophle is indeed at this moment the man who could be best called upon, inasmuch as to him French thriftiness responds with the most eagerness and the greatest confidence. The fourteenth committee has not even summoned M. Christophle in order to question him or to ask his opinion. It has listened to some engineers, some surveyors, some responsible people, some journalists, some advocates, and some contractors, but it has not summoned M. Christophle.

SHIPPING CASUALTIES

The Board of Trade Returns of the wrecks and casualties to British ships during the year 1888-1890, which have just been published, show that the improvement which marked the preceding years was still maintained. Taking vessels owned in the United Kingdom only, the losses at sea were 496 vessels, with a gross tonnage of 192,696 tons. No year in all the thirteen for which the figures are given can boast of so small a number of wrecks. Indeed the average for the whole time exceeds the latest total by 180. In the year 1888-1889 the tonnage of the lost vessels was rather less, but the average of the 13 years is 36,505 tons greater. The most striking diminution is in the number of "missing" vessels. For each of the four years ending in June, 1881, the average number of these vanished ships was 74. During the next four years the total was nearly twice as great, giving an annual average of 143. Since 1885 the falling-off has been very marked, the figures for the successive years being 59, 44, 66, 50, 53, and in the year ending June, 1890, only 37. If we add to these numbers the similar records relating to ships owned in the Colonies and India, the lost vessels number 738, with a gross tonnage of 238,423 tons. Fifty-two were sailing vessels and the remaining 11 steamships.

Although these numbers are so much smaller than those for previous years, they are, nevertheless, terribly and needlessly large, and the loss of human life which they have been attended is much of it preventable. Altogether 1,637 lives were lost in 1888-1890, against 2,233 in the preceding year, 2,534 in 1887-8, 3,454 in 1886-7, and an average of 2,564 for the ten years before. Navigation it seems, therefore, is getting steadily safer year by year, partly, perhaps, from the increased size of passenger vessels. Nevertheless there is room for great improvement still. Thus the Returns contain a table classifying the causes with give rise to the grand total of 3,662 casualties to merchant vessels registered in the United Kingdom. From this table it appears that 23 cases of total loss and 38 of serious accident were attributable to defects in equipment or stowage, 89 ships were lost and 165 seriously injured in consequence of some error on the part of either master, officer, crew, or pilot. There is also room for much improvement in means of saving life, for the whole number of persons saved was only 2,488, not one of whom owed his escape to life buoys or appliances kept on board the ship other than the boats. Lifeboats saved 325, rocket or mortar apparatus or ropes from shore 192, coastguard and other small craft 120, ships and steamers 675, while 1,144, or nearly half the total, escaped in their own boats. Clearly we have yet to discover, or at least to introduce, some means of escape from a ship sinking for out at sea which shall remain effective when the boats are damaged or lost.

TOTAL LOSSES OF MERCHANT VESSELS.

Lloyd's sends us a return showing the number, tonnage, and nationality of steam and sailing vessels totally lost and condemned during the quarter ended 30th June, 1891. The total number is shown to have been 167, and the tonnage 103,328 tons. As to the manner of loss they are thus divided: abandoned at sea, 14; condemned, 16; burnt, 2; collision, 15; foundered, 11; lost in manner unknown, 3; missing, 20; wrecked on rocks, 86. The material of the lost vessels was: Steel, 7—11,467 tons; iron, 37—41,179 tons; wood and composite, 123—50,682 tons. Although the number of British ships totally lost is large, the percentage lost of the number owned compares favourably with other countries. The 63 lost belonging to the United Kingdom represent 0.58 per cent, and the 17 owned by the British colonies is equal to 0.61 per cent. Norway lost 41 vessels, which is equivalent, to 1.21 per cent, of the vessels owned in that country.

THE NEW EXPLOSIVE, FORTIS.

The results of the experiments with the new explosive, fortis, at Liège have been truly remarkable. The substance is considered to have a force of from 30 to 40 lb. per cent. over that possessed by any other explosive known. But where is this sort of thing going to stop? May we not finally arrive at the discovery of an explosive of such terrific force as to put the whole of mankind at the mercy of any one man or malignant creature, and make it possible that a desperate revolutionary who wants to upset the established order of things should do it thoroughly by blowing up the planet?
