The M. V. R. C. crew left on Thursday afternoon in the Saturno. The Club Nacional will probably start favourites for the International Race, but the Teutonia crew is also considered strong, and that of the M. V. R. C. is by no means to be despised, though they have not been in training so long as the Club Nacional crew. Not much is known about the Rosario and B. A. R. C. crews. The International Race this year, on account of the unusual number of entries, promises to be the most interesting held since it was instituted. Either of the Montevideo crews is considered to have an excellent chance for the Double Sculls, and Fliege is considered a very likely winner for the single sculls. It is to be hoped, we might almost say expected, that neither of the Clubs will return empty-handed.

The North-Eastern of Uruguay Railway Company.

The ordinary general meeting of the North-Eastern of Uruguay Railway Company, Limited, was held on Tuesday, Sept. 23. In moving the adoption of the report, the chairman observed that almost every railway connected with the River Plate has experienced some adversity this year. In the case of their own company, however, they have been enabled to pursue the even tenor of their way. The Central Uruguay Company has duly paid all the rent that is receivable by their company, and he has no doubt that they will continue to do so. An arrangement has been

entered into between Dr. Ellauri, the Special Commissioner, of the Uruguayan Government and the Council of Foreign Bondholders, affecting the guaranteed interest of railways in the republic, and the shareholders will be asked to agree to the arrangement formally. He said “formally” because it really does not affect their company in any way. He may say that, though the arrangement in question involves a compromise, it is the best that can possibly be effected, and thinks it is to the interest of the railway companies to agree to it. Mr. George Cooper seconded the motion. Mr. J. Schofield inquired whether the rent due to the company will come after or before the debenture interest of the Central Company, in the event of the company's surplus earnings not sufficing to meet both. The chairman replied that the matter has not been gone into, the contingency alluded to being regarded as so improbable. The solicitor of the company, Mr. Bischoff, stated that there can be no competition between the two charges. The debentures have a certain security and so has the lease. If the Central Company makes default in the paying rent to the North-Eastern Company they will forfeit the lease. The chairman, in reply to Mr. Hankey, stated that last year the earnings of the North-Eastern Company—of which, however, no distinct accounts were kept—nearly covered the amount of the rent. The motion was then unanimously adopted, and resolutions were afterwards passed declaring balance dividends at the rates of 7 per cent. and 5 per cent. per annum on the preference and ordinary shares respectively, and authorising the directors to ratify the arrangement referred to between Dr. Ellauri and the Council of Foreign Bondholders, and to accept the same on behalf of the company, with or without any modifications which might seem to the board expedient or desirable.

More Suicides.
The suicide mania which has suddenly broken out again, possibly in obedience to some uninvestigated law of periodicity, is assuming alarming proportions, but neither legal nor moral means are being taken to repress it. The law of the country is perhaps unique in that it does not consider suicide a punishable offence. We have two fresh cases to chronicle today, fortunately only one of them being fatal.

Bernabé Diaz Moreira was a young Oriental, about 21 years old, son of a well-known estanciaero of Mercedes. He had come to Montevideo with the intention of taking his degree at the University, and was lodging at the Hotel Internacional, Ituzaingó 89. Lately he had fallen behind in his studies, and it was feared would not pass his approaching examination. This (and, it is added, an unhappy love affair) had preyed upon his spirits. On Thursday he went to his room in the Hotel, locked himself in, and blew out his brains with a revolver. When the door was forced open he was already dead, the weapon still in his hand. The sad news was telegraphed to his parents in Mercedes. The corpse was claimed for burial by the Minister of War, his uncle.

The other story is an even sadder one. Eduardo Ambuzetti is a young Italian, aged about 23, with a wife and three small children. Oppressed by the crisis and unable to find work, he was quite unable to provide for his family. In the efforts to find bread for the children his wife had even abandoned herself to a life of shame. Overwhelmed with misery, Ambuzetti resolved to take his life, and on Thursday evening went to the apartment occupied by his wife in a disreputable quarter, and there took a strong dose of chloro-hydrate of cocaine, which he had by him for medical purposes. The dose did not prove fatal, and a doctor was called in who administered an antidote, but the unhappy man is not yet out of danger.

Brazil.

The following is the decree issued by President Fonseca, dissolving the Chambers.—“The National Congress elected September 1, 1890, is hereby dissolved. The Nation will be called upon, at a period to be fixed hereafter, to elect new representatives. For this purpose Government will issue electoral regulations, assuring the country full liberty in the elections. The new Congress will proceed to revise the Constitution of February 4 of 1891, in the points which will be indicated in the convocatory decree. This revision will not in any case affect the Constitutional dispositions establishing the Republic and the inviolability of rights concerning liberty and individual security.—Decree da Fonseca.—*Tristao Alencar Araripa*.”

A telegram published yesterday says that the elections for the new Chambers will take place very shortly, probably in January. It is added that there is no intention of restoring the monarchy or altering the republican form of government. It is intended however to deal severely with any disturbers of the peace, and persons suspected of being inimical to the government will be summarily banished without trial! Owing to the Government censorship of the telegraph offices all messages must at present be looked upon with the greatest suspicion. It is not generally thought that there have been any disturbances as yet. It was telegraphed from Buenos Aires, however, that there were rumours of a revolution having broken out in Rio Grande.

SUNDRIES.
—Neither of the Chambers held any sitting on Thursday. Yet for all their apalling neglect of public business, the Honourable Senators and Deputies show no hesitation in drawing their salaries as they come due, nor do they show much anxiety to reduce them from their present excessive rate. It is fortunate for them that they are not in a bank or a house of business, where they would be turned into the street quickly enough if they did not perform the duties for which they were paid.

—The mail delivery by the R.M.S. “Trent” was small, the bulk of papers having come on the Sunday by the “Sorata.” The fresh dates are only up to October 7. We do not find anything in them concerning the chief question of the day, namely the Conversion Scheme. The only first class passengers by the “Trent” for this port were Mr. and Mrs. A. Pike from Southampton.

—The B. A. Standard understands that an effort is being made by a few amateurs to organise a performance of the opera “H. M. S. Pinafore,” to take place next season in aid of a local charity. The enterprise is one which cannot be too highly commended, as with a little energy on the part of those interested in amateur theatricals, a very creditable representation could be confidently anticipated, and a handsome sum realized. Such a performance, if organised, will naturally challenge comparison with the memorable one given in the San Felipe three seasons ago. Notwithstanding the success of that, we think operettas are a mistake for amateurs, especially in these latitudes.

—The French Chamber of Commerce has petitioned the Minister of Finance to give legal currency to the new Brazilian gold coins, the value of which is the same as that of the old ones, namely \$ 10.56, \$ 5.28 and \$ 2.64 respectively. The Chamber makes the petition on an account of having received a large number of the new coins, and expecting more. They only differ from the old coins, which are legal currency, in form and design. This petition reminds us that nothing further has been heard of the Silver Coinage Bill, though the want of minor change is still a serious hindrance to retail business. Like several other matters of importance, this Bill is blocked in the Chambers, obedient to some interested impulse from without.

—The Gefe Politico of Paysandú writes to the Minister of Foment that the invasion of locusts is the most formidable remembered there, but that the use of wire whips or flails for their destruction has proved very successful. The hopper (*kaltona*) or locust larva is expected to appear within three weeks, but not in such large quantities as if the flying locust had not been well attacked in the first instance. When it appears it will be the object of another vigorous onslaught. So far the damages done are slight. It may be said that the wheat and clover, the two most important products of the department, are saved, and it is also thought the vines will be saved. Some of the young maize crops have disappeared, but it is not too late in the season to replace them.

—We think he would have played a more honorable rôle by doing this than by “lunching” in a place and company which bear such a character.

—The *Siglo* very correctly calls on the Minister of Finance, to resume the monthly publication of the Treasury Balances, which have not seen the light since May last. In the present situation they are of special interest. We should think this is one of the few civilized countries in the world where estimates for the future are drawn up without reference to the accounts of the past, and where there is such difficulty in obtaining an account of the expenditure of public money. No wonder the Budget invariably goes astray.

—Contrary to the announcement made some ten days ago, the military bands have not yet commenced playing in the plazas of an evening, nor are we able to say when they will do so.

—It is telegraphed from Hong Kong that three cities, whose names have been rendered unintelligible in transmission, in the east of China, have been destroyed by earthquakes with terrific loss of life. The recent earthquake in Japan is now said to have cost 10,000 lives.

—The auctions for tomorrow's races commenced on Thursday evening without much animation. Financiers are favourite for the *Premio Donnina* closely followed by Tangarupá, Charrua stands first for the *Premio America*, and Jonquil for the *Premio Charria*.

—The *Siglo* announces that the National Bank has resolved to sell by auction all its properties in the “Barrio Reus del Norte” which it took over for an unsatisfied mortgage of some two million dollars or more from the National Company of Credit, etc. This Barrio, it will be remembered, was one of the wild speculations of Dr. Reus, over which so much fuss was made during the “boom.” Like almost everything else undertaken by him and the National Company it has turned out a failure and a loss.

—Sarcastics and his wife don't agree very well. The other morning he discovered that she had appropriated his only necktie. Sarcastics: “What in thunder are you wearing my cravat for?” Mrs. S.: “Because I haven't any of my own.” Sarcastics, gloomily: “Oh, I see, it is the only tie there is between us.”

—The Message from the Executive to the Chambers asking amnesty for the persons concerned in the recent conspiracy, is ready and will probably be forwarded to-day. Dr. Terra, Sr. Gotusso and Col. Pamplillon are still under arrest, their applications for bail having been refused on technical grounds. These are the only remaining prisoners, so far as we know.

—“Oh, yes,” said Mrs. Parvenu talking about music at Mrs. Sudden's reception, I just dote on them sympathy concerts, and my husband insists on our prescribing for the whole series. Ain't them Beethoven rhapsodies real elegant?”

—The “revolution” has served as a pretext for the promotion of several officers in the 4th Infantry and Artillery Regiments. This means further additions to the army estimates. The Uruguayan army is a more rapacious plague than the locusts and will finish by devouring everything.

—It is high time that the authorities took steps to check the sale of filthy books which go on in many of the booksellers shops and in the streets and restaurants. So open is this disgraceful traffic that one can hardly sit down in a hotel or café without having some disgusting publication thrust under one's nose. These books, in which the letter-press and illustrations are indecisibly revolting and obscene, cannot but have a most demoralising effect on the minds of the youth of both sexes into whose hands they fall. The strange part of the matter is that this spawn of the printing-press nearly all comes from Spain or France, and therefore must either pass the Custom House or be smuggled. In either case the authorities are severely to blame for not repressing their introduction, and they are still more to blame for allowing their open sale. The matter is a very serious one for the morals of the rising generation.

—A very extensively signed petition has been presented to the Chief of Police, asking that Don Juan Reynes may be appointed to the vacant post of commissary of the 2nd section of the capital. Sr. Reynes has hitherto been 2nd officer of the section.

—It is telegraphed that the second opera of the inspired composer Pedro Mascagni, author of “Cavalleria Rusticana,” has just been produced in Italy with equal success to his first brilliant production. It is based on Erekman-Chatrain's idyllic tale “L'Ami Fritz.”

—Sr. Manuel Berasteguy, ex-treasurer of the Minas branch of the National Bank, has been arrested for embezzling \$3803.23 from that establishment. He has confessed the offence.

—The death has just taken place in Buenos Aires of Sr. Washington Maciel, belonging to a well known Montevideo family. He was only 19 years old.

—Yesterday afternoon's telegram from Buenos Aires once more wore an uneasy aspect, being full of revolutionary rumours, though not of a very definite character. The army seems to be at the bottom of the trouble. It generally is, in South America.

—It has been resolved to open the new Italian Hospital, in Tres Olivos, as soon as possible, extra subscriptions being called for the purpose. The new committee consists of Dr. C. Brandis, Sres. L. Andreoni, L. Rosello, D. Percontino, A. Parma, G. Chichizola, Manzoni and A. Pastora.

—A most absurd thing occurred in port yesterday. The German steamer Löwenburg arrived from abroad, and received its health visit, but the doctor ordered that the quarantine flag should not be lowered till the vessel was “well in port.” Obeying the ridiculous order, the Captain brought the steamer up, still flying the yellow flag, to within a stone's throw of the Custom House mole, in fact until the vessel touched bottom. Meantime the traffic steamer Emperor had come up alongside, and the captain, not noticing the yellow flag, shook hands with the captain of the Löwenburg over the side. For this offence he was fined \$35; *Cosas del país*.

BUENOS AIRES
—The Government has put an end to the contract with Mr. Waldorp, as chief engineer of the La Plata port works, and has placed the works under the control of the Provincial department of Engineers.

—John Gunning Windsor, a boy of eleven, whilst bathing on Sunday in the river at Campana, with a younger brother, got out of his depth and was drowned.

—The meeting of American citizens convoked by the American Minister to consider what steps should be taken for the protection of the interests of American residents in Buenos Aires in the British Cemetery, in view of the order of the Municipality for the closing of the same, was held at the American Legation on Wednesday afternoon. The meeting was a fairly representative one. Mr. Pitkin was unanimously voted into the chair. Dr. Drees stated the object of the meeting and the purport of the correspondence which had taken place between the respective Committees of the English and American sections of the Cemetery, referring to the arrangements made with the Municipality for the grant of land at the Chacarita Cemetery to be used by the American, British and German residents in place of the Cemetery in Calle Victoria. The history of the robbery is simply this:—On the 17th of August the manager of the London and River

Plate Bank was informed by Mr. Hogg, the sub-manager, that the sum of \$670,000 was missing. Inquiries were made and it was found that \$570,000 had been ordered to be deposited in a safe on the 1st of August, \$100,000 being subsequently added to the amount. Messrs. Pitt & Clark were arrested.

The Judge begins by briefly recapitulating the circumstances of the robbery, mentioning Messrs. Fennessy, Hogg and Anderson as the principal witnesses. The testimony of these gentlemen, however, was insufficient for the police and other authorities. Each of the witnesses had his own hypothesis in regard to the robbery of the sum mentioned which, according to Mr. Pitt, had been deposited in safe No. 5. Mr. Pitt was arrested, as he had charge of the safe, and Mr. Clark, the accountant who signed the balance-sheets presented by the former without verifying them, was also arrested. These gentlemen were civilly responsible but there was no proof of their being criminally responsible. The cashier Pitt declared that he had deposited the money in safe No. 5, and that sometimes he was assisted by other employees in putting money in the safe. But from July 25 to August 1, according to the declarations of the clerks, such assistance had not been given him. But these declarations threw no light upon the question whether the money had been deposited in the safe.

The Judge then gives an account of the character of Mr. Pitt, who had been an exemplary employee of the Bank during 24 years and had been in the habit of handling large sums of money. His Lordship finds no proof that Mr. Pitt's carelessness in regard to the keys of the safe was criminal. There was no proof of the circumstances which appeared to tell against Pitt. The charge that the robbery might have been committed while sending notes to the Caja de Conversión to be changed was not proved. His Lordship finds that there is no charge against Pitt.

His Lordship is convinced that Mr. Clark is perfectly innocent. Clark's conduct in signing a balance sheet he had not verified constitutes an irregularity, but could not be considered as criminal. Clark and Pitt were two old employees of the Bank. The one had confidence in the other, a circumstance that explains the irregularity in question.

For the foregoing reasons, the Judge dismisses the case and orders it to be declared that the proceedings taken against Messrs. Clark and Pitt in no way injure their good name.—B. A. Standard.

LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 28.

M. Ribot was present at the unveiling of the statue to General Faidherbe at Bapaume yesterday. In his speech, the Minister of Foreign Affairs dwelt upon the progress made by France during the last twenty years, and the proud position which she has attained among the nations. The Republic, said the Minister, would continue to cultivate peace, the more that at the present moment she could do so with dignity.

The Emperor Francis Joseph arrived in Prague on Saturday, and met with an enthusiastic welcome from the populace. A Correspondent indicates it as a noteworthy feature of this reception that it was shared in by Czech and German alike. The Emperor in his speech at the Exhibition said that perfect national prosperity could only be brought about by the unification of the two races which form the Bohemian people.

Of the English travellers wounded in the railway accident near Burgos last week, Mr. Fletcher and Mr. Seymour Lucas are making progress towards recovery. Mr. William Cotton, whose leg is fractured in two places, will probably recover, but it is feared that he will remain lame. The funeral of the Spanish victims of the catastrophe took place yesterday.

Mr. Henry Irving was entertained at a public luncheon at the Bristol Liberal Club on Saturday. Replying to the toast of his health, he indulged in some interesting reminiscences of his early life. Whilst himself claiming a special interest in the welfare of the city, he added that his distinguished colleague, Miss Ellen Terry, was, he might almost say, cradled in the Bristol Theatre.

Some thousands of persons participated in a demonstration in Hyde Park yesterday in support of the London carpenters and joiners in their struggle to obtain an eight hours day and a readjustment of wages.

There were renewed disturbances at Eastbourne on Saturday and again yesterday, when members of the Salvation Army attempted to hold open-air services. Many of them were injured, some of the women being led away in a fainting condition.

Dr. John James, ex President of the Wesleyan Conference, died suddenly on Saturday night at Trevano, near Helston, the residence of Mr. Bickford-Smith, M. P., where he had been staying during the past fortnight.

Revision Courts were held in two of the metropolitan constituencies on Saturday. The claim of Mr. T. Eccleston Gibb, Liberal candidate for East St. Pancras, to be on the voters' list in respect of premises in Piccadilly-street, Somers Town, was objected to, but after discussion was allowed. In Finsbury the names of Mr. H. J. Wilson, M. P., and Mr. Bramwell Booth were struck off, the latter having previously been on the register for the local quarters of the Salvation Army in Clerkenwell-road. Gloomy weather was associated

with the closing day of the Manchester Meeting. For the Lancashire Plate a field of nine competed. After a capital race Signorina beat the favourite, the Duke of Westminster's Orme, by half a length, Martagon being third. Blue Peter won the Bowdon Selling Plate, Charing Cross the Eglinton Nursery, Undecimus the Oldham Welter, Manfield the Paddock Plate, and Fleetfoot the Saturday Plate. Murrum and Royal Stag ran a dead heat for the New Barnes Handicap, and divided the stakes.

SEPT. 29.

Sir W. Harcourt last night attended the annual meeting of the Derby Liberal Association. Addressing the members at the close of the business proceedings, he expressed his conviction that the General Election would probably come much sooner than many persons expected. He recommended Irish voters everywhere to support Liberal candidates, as the party of which they were members were alone capable of satisfactorily settling the Irish question. Nothing would do more to raise the general tone of the country than a successful effort to improve the condition of the agricultural population. With regard to the demand for hard-and-fast legislation as to hours of labour, he inquired whether the subject could not better be dealt with by the working men themselves. Reference was also made to Free Education and the question of the Disestablishment of the Church of England in Wales.

Mr. Arnold Morley, M. P., addressing a meeting at Nottingham last night in connection with the opening of a new Congregational Sunday School, combated the idea that Non-conformists were indifferent to the religious education of their children. Whilst they thought the State should provide free education, there was nobody more anxious or capable of securing to their families proper religious instruction. Mr. Morley advocated the teaching in schools of the elements of great public questions on which children would afterwards have to form a sound judgment.

Sir James Fergusson arrived in Manchester yesterday afternoon, and in the evening addressed a meeting of his supporters in the New Islington Hall. A Correspondent states that the facts disclosed as to the number of public companies of which the Postmaster-General is a director, are likely to prove exceedingly embarrassing to him. So far as it has proceeded the canvass of the Irish electorate has been favourable to the Liberals.

General von Caprivi, speaking on Sunday at Osnabrück at a banquet held in celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the foundation of his regiment, stated that the chief desire and aim of the Emperor were the welfare of his people and the preservation of peace. The political horizon, said the Chancellor, was unclouded.

Mr. Alderman Tyler and Mr. H. S. Foster were yesterday formally installed as Sheriffs of London. The ceremony at Guildhall was followed by the Hall of the Stationers' Company, of which guild the senior Sheriff is a member.

Orchestral rehearsals for the Birmingham Festival commenced at St. James's Hall yesterday, and will be continued to-day, to-morrow, and on Thursday.

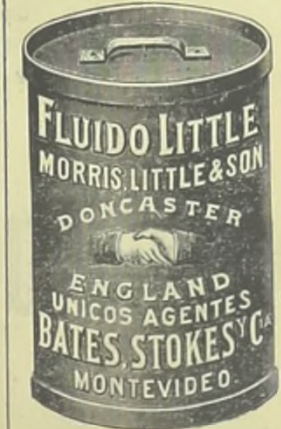
