THE CIAVASCO AFFAIR.

The remarkable affair of Ciavasco Tiscornia, of which we have given the chief details, has given rise to animated discussion and to a remarkable diversity of opinions. To us, it seems to illustrate forcibly three things.—First, how wrong leaders go to another; secondly, the chaos and obfuscation prevailing even amongst the highest authorities when so-called "military" offences are in question; and thirdly, the absence of even rudimentary justice where military affairs are concerned.

The whole chain of events sprung from the first offence committed by the military authorities in illegally forcing Ciavasco to serve against his will. Finding the law powerless to protect him, he did as many others would do under the same circumstances, he took the law into his own hands and tried to recover his liberty by escape. Being captured, a repetition of the act led to the death of the lieutenant sent to hunt him down. We do not pretend that Ciavasco was warranted in this homicide, unless in immediate fear of his life, but we unhesitatingly lay the lieutenant's death primarily at the door of the military authorities who sent him on an improper and ignoble mission. For this homicide Ciavasco was put into the Penitentiary, where he remained until the events occurred with which our readers are recently acquainted.

The Superior Tribunal, who took up his case, issued two decisions which it is impossible to reconcile. They decided that he was not guilty of murder in killing Lieutenant Humida, because he acted in justifiable self-defence—that is to say, defence of life or liberty. At the same time they decided that he must be handed over to the military authorities as a deserter. Now if he was a deserter, he was not justified in resisting his arrest at the hands of Lieut. Humida, and therefore their first decision was wrong. If their first decision was right, he was not a deserter and the military authorities have no power over him. The two decisions are absolutely incompatible. In any case, the first decision is virtually an acknowledgment that the law of the land as administered is insufficient to protect the citizens, and that they are justified in taking it into their own hands, even to the extent of homicide, without being subject to proper trial afterwards. We can hardly imagine a more dangerous doctrine.

The whole matter, as already said, hinges on the question of whether or not Ciavasco was a deserter. If he was forced to serve against his will, he was not a deserter, and so far from his being handed over to the military authorities for trial, it is they who ought to stand as the accused parties and who should be made to answer for their attacks on his liberty. They are the criminals, not he.

This, we maintain, (though we know many will differ from us) is a question which the military authorities are incompetent to try. They are accusers, they cannot therefore be judges as well. The injustice of such a proceeding is too monstrous, it is equivalent to handing over the lamb to the wolves, or the plunderer to the thieves. Ciavasco claims to be a civilian illegally deprived of his rights. Then, to hand him over to the military authorities for trial, is to prejudice the case against him. Justly, such a case can only be judged by an independent court, in which the word of the soldier shall have no more weight than that of the civilian. No military court fulfils this first condition. Before the officers of his late regiment are allowed any jurisdiction whatever over Ciavasco, they should be made

to prove their assertion that he is a deserter. Without proof, it should carry no weight, or otherwise farewell to all civil liberty, for every civilian will be at the mercy of the first body of armed and uniformed men who choose to claim him. Such a proceeding is even more barbarous than those of the old slave days. Before a runaway slave was handed over to an owner, the latter had at least to prove his ownership. Here, the bare assertion of an officer is sufficient to deliver a man to the cruelties of the barracks, which, if we are to believe one-fourth part of what we are told about them, are equal to the worst related of slaves.

Another incident of the case illustrates the absolute obfuscation regarding military authority. The Chief of a regiment commits a violent assault on a civilian in the discharge of his duty. The police, who are witnesses of the affair, march the injured man to prison and let his assailant go free, merely, we suppose, because he happened to wear a uniform. A greater burlesque was never invented. If such an incident were enacted on the stage, no civilised audience would accept it as even remotely probable, yet here we find it seriously carried out in real life.

Another very unpleasant phase of the matter has been the peremptory tone assumed throughout by the military authorities, who seem to think themselves at liberty to treat civilians as they please and to set at defiance the judicial authorities of the land. There is already more than sufficient cause to look upon these military authorities, and their barbarous, arbitrary and violent modes of procedure, with disfavour, and it is certainly more than time that they were taught the necessary lesson that they are not superior to ordinary law and justice, and that in time of peace their position is an entirely secondary one.

There has been a mass of correspondence published on the matter, but no two authorities seem able to agree in their conclusions, and it is painful to see how many of them, deceived by the glitter of a uniform, when discussing military matters abandon even the most rudimentary ideas of common justice. No less obfuscation than this could propose such a barbarity as the delivering of a man fighting for his liberty to the jurisdiction of the very men who were accused of robbing him of that liberty and of whose cruelties he complained.

European residents and readers cannot fail to be painfully impressed with such incidents, which chiefly serve to illustrate how much there is still lacking in the civilisation of the country and the necessary subjection of the army.

Parliament.
In the Chamber of Senators, on Saturday, the discussion in detail of the Port Dues Bill was resumed, Art. 3 being still in consideration.

Sr. Costa thought that enough had been said for the present regarding the conduct of the Executive Power and some of its Ministers. He then proceeded to defend at some length the numerical calculations on which his plan of appropriation was based. In reply to some interruptions from Sr. Herrera y Obes he returned to the question of legislative morality. He believed it absolutely necessary for the restoration of the country, to expropriate the lighthouse services, so as not to legitimate the atrocious concessions. It was only too evident that private interests intervened, how then was the country to be delivered from its painful situation? Even foreign papers insulted us because we could not arrest these atrocities. We must have the courage to do this if we wish to be a nation and not a monastery. (Sr. Costa was here several times interrupted by loud applause from the bar, and the President of the Chamber had to call for order). After some more remarks on the calculations, Sr. Costa concluded by asking Sr. Herrera y Obes to resign to oblivion any personal charges made in the course of the debate.

Sr. Herrera y Obes thought it a great failing in respect that the powers of the State should be criticised in the violent manner of Dr. Costa. He then proceeded to another long argument on the question of figures, in which he was several times interrupted by Sr. Costa.

Sr. Carve said that although it was undeniable that the lighthouse concessions had great vices, at the same time all except one of them had a legal base which might cause troublesome questions. He thought it best to follow the recommendation of the Committee and throw a veil

over these concessions, exception only being made of the Polonia concession which had no legal base whatever.

Sr. Herrera spoke again, defending the Polonia lighthouse, which question, he said, could not be solved by sword-cuts, in this arbitrary fashion.

Sr. Carve replied that this was contrary to the decisions of the Committees. The State was justified not only in expropriating the lighthouse without indemnity, but also in demanding from the concessionaires the dues that they had been so long collecting unjustly. It was not patriotism but private interest which supported this illegal concession.

Sr. Herrera said that it was not intended legislature should stamp the concession as legal, it was merely that it was inconvenient to expropriate it just now. It was necessary to put it on one side by means of a transaction.

Sr. Muñoz said he would vote for the article in the original form, he did not see the object of so many amendments and modifications. The original form was simpler and more convenient.

The question was still pending when the hour sounded and the discussion was once more adjourned.

The Conversion Scheme.

The following notice appeared in the London papers of Nov. 30—
To the Holders of Uruguayan Bonds.—The Council of Foreign Bondholders, acting in conjunction with the Committee of Uruguayan Bondholders, desire to notify the Holders of Uruguayan Bonds that they have received the official text of the Law dated October 7th, 1891, as approved by the Senate and Chamber of Representatives, authorising the Executive Power to carry out the Arrangement for the Conversion and Consolidation of the External Debt of the Republic.

The Arrangement submitted to the Public Meeting of Bondholders at the Cannon-street Hotel on August 31st has been accepted by the Government of the Republic, and the mode adopted for giving effect to the Arrangement as prescribed by the law in no way affects its principles or impairs the security and benefit thereby given to the Bondholders.

As there has been some misapprehension on the matter, the Council and Committee think it desirable to state that the Arrangement ratified by the Government expressly provides for the daily payment of 45 per cent of the Customs duties to the Agents of the Bondholders at Montevideo, and this provision is also embodied in the New Bonds.

The Council have much pleasure in stating that the London and River Plate Bank (Limited) have accepted the appointment as agents for the Bondholders to receive the above-mentioned payments.

Uruguay Unified Five per Cent Bondholders' Committee.

The London Standard of Dec. 1, makes the following remarks, referring to the notice given above—
"The subject notice has been sent to us by Messrs. Glyn, Mills, Currie, and Co. At the same time we have received a translation of the 'arrangement' made on Friday last between Dr. Ellauri and the Council of Foreign Bondholders, of the 'agreement' of August last, a copy of the law supposed to embody this agreement, which even in the Council's own translation, does not cover or fulfil some of the most vital points therein—it omits, for example, the 'daily payments' of Customs revenue—and finally a copy of the new arrangement of the debt itself. This last provides for the unification of all the debts of the Republic, external and internal, in Three-and-a-Half per Cent. Bonds, to the total amount of 20,500,000. The entire population of this Republic is only about 750,000, if so many. It has other debts not embraced in this unification, and the law, as passed by the Legislature, gives power to issue further loans. The Five per Cent Bondholders do not, apparently, mean to submit to the new scheme. Their Committee has to-night issued a 'warning,' and announces that it will call a bond-fide meeting soon. It will have to be quick about it, also the entire acknowledged debt of Uruguay will be confused together in a mass no one can handle."

We reserve until to-morrow an article from the Financial News of Dec. 1, more strongly condemnatory than those already quoted, and advising bondholders to have nothing to do with the enforced Conversion.

The local Nacion of Sunday has an article rejoicing over the assumed acceptance of this Scheme which has covered every one concerned in it with discredit, and full of the grossest mis-statements, apparently devised for the purpose of misleading the market here. Amongst a mass of falsities, it perpetrates the following, which are in direct contradiction to the facts as now known to our readers.—"The Consolidation of the debt is an accomplished fact. . . . Government has received documents proving the conclusion of the works. . . . The intrigue against the interests and credit of the country in London and European markets has met the complete failure it deserved. . . . All is now definitely concluded. . . . The conclusion of the arrangement in London has eliminated the last obstacles.—We need hardly quote more to show that the Nacion is adding insult to injury in its treatment of the creditors of the country and those who are trying to save the country and themselves from a rascally scheme, fostered by unscrupulous speculators, and condemned by every English journal of importance."

The Buenos Aires Nacion of Sunday publishes the following telegram furnished to it by Dr. Luis F. Fuentes, to whom it assigns, we know not with what justification, the position of "representative" of the dissident bondholders.—"London, Dec. 24. To Sr. Fuentes, Noetzelin, finding himself lost, for no one takes their bonds for conversion, asks a prorogue. Will he get it? Do they expect to tire us out? They are mistaken. The convention not to convert the bonds is signed. We will resist and triumph. The Committees are approaching Dr. Ellauri."—Montevideo, Dec. 26. To the Representatives of the Committee in London. Government has appointed January 31 as absolute term. Remember article 10 of the Law of Conversion. Fuentes."

We do not know what authority Dr. Fuentes has for mentioning Jan. 31 as an absolute term (? for conversion.) No official notice to that effect has been issued here. Art. 10 of the Law of Conversion is as follows.—"The E. P. shall render account of the execution of this Law to the H. General Assembly, the service of the debt and the railway guarantees being meanwhile suspended."

We leave our readers to form their own judgment on the above telegrams.

interested parties, not Bondholders, such as an insertion in the General Bond that the duties will be paid daily to the London and River Plate Bank, has no legal effect whatever. Congress also wiped out the Clause compelling Uruguay to provide, out of other sources of revenue, the amount necessary to pay 3 1/2 per cent on the debt, in case the Customs revenue proved to be not sufficient. Although in the contract it was stipulated that Uruguay should emit no new debt for three years, Congress reserved the right to issue about three millions sterling to build the Western Railway, in which Messrs. Cassel and Noetzelin, the authors of the scheme, are interested. It must not be forgotten that about 1,700,000 new Bonds are to be emitted to settle the claims of the Western Railway, and to provide commissions for those interested in this new conversion job. A public meeting should be called at once, and every bond-fide Bondholder should reject this scheme.

The English Bank. We have received, but have not space to publish yet, the report issued in London by the Official Receiver, Mr. C. J. Stewart, for the liquidation of this Bank.

As we anticipated to our readers some weeks ago, the situation of the Bank is highly favorable. The B. Aires branch shows a surplus of \$2,001,598.

Some attention should be paid to the ventilation of the Lira hall, at present conspicuous by its absence. The heat there on a warm evening is intolerable and prevents one enjoying the music.

The concert of Miss Mary Benport, at the Lira on Saturday, was well attended and highly successful, the very clever playing of this little lady provoking great applause.

A violent gale blew in the port during midday on Sunday, but we have not heard of any damage of consequence as yet.

Our weekly contemporary the Uruguay News shows the cloven hoof very plainly in its last number and comes out as a thick-and-thin supporter of the Government, doubtless for the same interested reasons that the Financial Times, from which our contemporary approvingly quotes, is the only London paper which has ventured to support the scandalous business of the Conversion scheme.

The statements made by the U. News are a clumsily concocted tissue of wilful misrepresentations, to be detected at half a glance by any one who has followed the history of the case in our columns.

Our contemporary, obviously irritated by the accuracy of our independent statements, vents its spite in a charge that we have been attacking the plans of a financier to whom we owe important favours.
