LONDON NOTES

MONDAY, JAN. 9.

A deputation headed by Mr. William O'Brien, Mr. John Dillon, and others, waited upon Mr. John Morley at Dublin on Saturday to bring to his notice the lamentable condition of the peasantry in the congested districts, advocating a system of migration as a remedy, and urging that powers similar to those possessed by the Crofters' Commission in Scotland should be conferred upon the existing Irish body. Mr. Morley, in reply, pointed out some of the practical difficulties which stood in the way of great and sweeping operations, but said that much good might be done on the lines the deputation had indicated. He promised that, with all the powers at his command, he would press upon his colleagues of the Congested Districts Board the views that had been urged, and was convinced that the members of that Board would apply their attention with all the greater earnestness to the task which the late Government, unfortunately with some limitations, imposed upon them, limitations which it would be the object of the present Government to remove as soon as an opportunity occurred.

This morning there appeared another article on the effect of the new railway rates, and also the text of a correspondence which has taken place between the Board of Trade and the Railway Companies Association. On behalf of the Board, Sir Courtenay Boyle says that many complaints have reached them of increased rates, and that if these increases are widespread a profound feeling of dissatisfaction may be produced among traders. They therefore ask for the observations of the association with regard to the present position of the question. In reply, Sir Henry Oakley, as hon. secretary of the Association, says it is the intention of the companies to provide special rates, wherever reasonably required, as quickly as possible. They are anxious to minimise the disturbance to trade, and hope that many of the "alleged grievances" will disappear before the end of February. Sir Robert Ball completed his course of lectures to a juvenile audience at the Royal Institution on Saturday, his last subject being "The Stars."

Sir Charles and Lady Hall, with Signor Piatti, opened the Popular Concert at St. James's Hall on Saturday afternoon, the first of the New Year.

After a long absence in the United States, Mr. and Mrs. Kendal had a hearty welcome at the Avenue Theatre on Saturday evening, on appearing in an amended version of "A White Lie."

The latest phase of the cotton trade dispute is a proposal by the operative spinners to appoint representatives to meet the employers' representatives on Thursday to discuss the points of difference.

The first train on the Liverpool Overhead Railway, which extends for seven miles along the docks, ran on Saturday. The cars were propelled by electricity, and the trip was carried out successfully. The official opening will take place next month, when Lord Salisbury has promised to be present.

The Executive Council of the Foresters Friendly Society have issued a report to their 700,000 members on the old age pension and other questions. With regard to old age pensions, they express the opinion that the policy of complete freedom from any financial association with the State is the only safe one. They feel that the acceptance of the extension of the system of State pensions would deal a heavy blow at the principle of self-help and self-reliance.

To-morrow, in Paris, begins the trial of the persons under arrest upon charges in connection with the Panama revelations. A Paris Correspondent states that M. Charles de Lesseps and his colleagues have been allowed to see counsel, and they have also been visited by their wives. A number of witnesses are to appear for the prosecution, among them being M. Rousselle, who reported in favour of a lock canal. Three witnesses have also been subpoenaed on behalf of M. de Lesseps.

On Saturday the Fairfax court-martial ended in the acquittal of the prisoner, the charge against him not being proved. The court found that the stranding of the Howe was due to the inaccuracy of the chart and to the fact that the vessel diverged from the course taken by her leader.

Yesterday afternoon the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh and their children, including Princess Marie, arrived at Sigmaringen for the wedding of the latter to-morrow, and were welcomed at the station by Prince Ferdinand and his father, Prince Leopold of Hohenzollern. They also met with an enthusiastic reception from the townspeople, who were all in the streets. After dinner at the Castle several of the guests attended the Court Theatre. The Emperor William left Berlin last night to attend to-morrow's ceremony.

The strike among the miners of the Saar coal districts in Germany has spread to Rhineland and Westphalia. Meetings have been held, and resolutions adopted unanimously in favour of ceasing work. At one of

these at Bochum four thousand persons were present, including delegations from all parts of the district where the miners had promised to abide by the decision of the meeting. The centres of the strike are now Saarbrücken, Gelsenkirchen, Bochum, and Essen.

The means taken to free the ground from frost at Cardiff having proved quite successful, the international Rugby football match between England and Wales was decided on Saturday. Wales, after appearing to be well beaten, played up with such determination towards the finish that they just managed to defeat England by the majority of one point, viz., 12 to 11. Club football on that same day was greatly interfered with by the weather, but the League brought off their matches. Sunderland by a victory over Preston secured the lead in this organization.

At the Middlesex Session on Saturday, a plasterer named White was sentenced by Mr. Littler to terms of imprisonment equal to five years' penal servitude for shocking cruelty to his three children. He had broken the nose of one, struck another in the eye with the buckle end of a strap, and kicked and persistently starved them all. Mr. Littler regretted that he could not order him to be flogged.

Dr. Graham, who is charged with having given a false certificate of the death of Matilda Clover, who was poisoned by the notorious man Neill, was on Saturday committed for trial from the Bow-street Police-court. Bail was allowed.

Mr. Horace Smith gave his decision at the Clerkenwell Police-court on Saturday on the summons against the London School Board in respect of defective drains at the Yerrbury-road School. He made orders for the abatement of the nuisance which he found existed, and for the closing of the school till he is satisfied that it has been made fit for habitation. He also allowed the Islington Vestry, on whose behalf the summons had been taken out, five guineas costs. The summons relating to the Hanover-street School was adjourned sine die, it being understood that the Board would do the necessary work.

George Herbert Bush, a young fellow who had stated that he had caused the death of Annie West, the girl lately found dead in a ditch at Walthamstow, was brought before the Stratford magistrates on Saturday. The police had found no confirmation of his story, and it was said that on a previous occasion he had been discharged after making a groundless confession of murder. On Saturday, to be detained in prison, he broke three of the cell windows. He was remanded for a week.

The Board of Trade returns for last month show a decrease of 12½ per cent. in the imports of December, 1891, and in the exports a decline of 2½ per cent. As to imports, the decrease is mainly in shipments from America. In the exports, the decline is accounted for rather by the diminished selling prices of goods than by a decrease in the volume of trade.

Is it possible to introduce the decimal system of weights, measures and coinage into the United Kingdom? The New Decimal Association think it is, and they are shortly to have an opportunity of stating their case before the Chancellor of the Exchequer and the President of the Board of Trade. A good many influential people are at the back of this movement; several of the Colonial Agents-General have declared in favour of it, and our own Chambers of Commerce are also said to support the innovation. No doubt the use of a common system of weights and measures would be of the greatest benefit to the foreign trade. Japan, always to the front in such matters, has already adopted the decimal plan, efforts are being made to introduce it into China, while the United States are seriously considering the question. But we cannot blink the fact that a vast amount of popular prejudice would have to be overcome before the system could be successfully introduced here. A British cook ordering half a kilo of potatoes from the greengrocer or a labourer calling for a quarter litre of ale would doubtless be pleasing spectacles, but seem to belong to a rather remote future. Possibly a compromise could be effected whereby the old names might be applied to the new measures. Anyway, the alteration would have to be a gradual one, beginning with the foreign trade and filtering through to the body of the nation.

Writing of the first performance of "I Rantana" in Vienna on Saturday night, a Correspondent there says: It was a musical event of the highest interest. Signor Mascagni appears to have fully shared the artists' anxiety regarding it, for he telegraphed that he was with them in spirit. The leading Vienna critics say that the good reception which the opera had is as much due to the excellent performance as to the passionately dramatic music, which could not fail to impress the public. Dr. Hanslick considers that from a musical point of view it is not possible to consider "I Rantana" an advance upon "L'Amico Fritz." Herr Ludwig Spindler says: "After the reports from Florence and Rome, there was no being sure of a success for 'I Rantana' in Vienna." The first act was received indifferently, but after the second act a storm of applause broke out. The third act was, but at the end the audience was enthusiastic enough. The opera suffers from the lack of proportion in the wedding of a highly tragic music with a rustic subject. It will never approach the success of "Cavalleria," which took public and critics by storm.

Mount Etna suddenly closed its long continued eruption of 173 days. The lava ceased to flow, the craters no longer cast up gas and smoke, and abundant snow spread a thick white carpet over the scene of so much fiery activity. The eruption died with the old year.

One incidental effect of the suppressing of the guessing competitions lately in vogue will be to stop the largely increased demand which had sprung up for Rogé's "Thesaurus." Messrs. Longmans, the publishers of that useful work, found the sale of the book, which is ordinarily a steady one, with little or no fluctuation, went up all of a sudden with a bound. The reason must be obvious to all who are acquainted with the book. In it words are arranged in groups, so that ideas that have any sort of connection with each other are grouped together. As a rule of course it is used by authors and translators for seizing a word which has been floating about in the mind, but which somehow will escape, although words that are almost synonymous may readily occur. With such a help as this it was tolerably easy—given a certain number of guesses—for missing word competitors to hit upon every word that could reasonably be supposed to finish an incomplete sentence.

We are apt to complain of tips and Christmas boxes in England, but Frenchmen were worse off than we are in this respect. In France the New Year, with its "étrennes," makes everybody shudder but those whose revenue is considerably in excess of their ordinary expenditure. As an instance of the enterprise of certain classes in asking for New Year's gifts, one of the Paris papers declares that some gas man called upon a lady occupying a flat the other day and asked "to be remembered," as the phrase goes in our own language. "But I do not use gas," the lady declared. "No, Madame," replied one of the men, "but the people down below in this building have it. You may remember that there was an explosion here only last year."

PRINCE BISMARCK AS A CHAMPION OF PARLIAMENT. BERLIN, JAN. 6. Prince Bismarck, since his resignation, or as he calls it, dismissal, lets no opportunity pass by without vindicating the constitutional rights of Parliament against the Monarch and the Government. He does it with such zeal that it seems as if he wanted to make good the sins which he has on his conscience as regards the lowering of the Reichstag's authority in public opinion. But, be this as it may, it can only serve the cause of Parliamentarism if a man like Prince Bismarck openly stands up for the rights of the Reichstag as an indispensable corrective of the power of the Crown. It does not alter the effect whether he does this from sincere conviction or for other reasons. The significance of his present endeavours to raise the level of Parliament would, of course, achieve greater success if he were to take his seat and let his voice be heard there personally, instead of anonymously launching his arguments into the Press devoted to him. Prince Bismarck as regards the Military Bill sides with the Opposition as he did in the commercial treaty questions, and the comments of his Hamburg organ on the Emperor's recent speech might have been published in any Liberal paper. The "Hamburger Nachrichten" says: it would be deplorable if the right were witnessed of the Reichstag deciding about the Bill under the pressure of the personal will of the monarch. The authority of the members of Parliament would suffer great injury if they accepted such pressure in order to avoid a conflict, and they would expose themselves to the suspicion that not "salus publica," but "regis voluntas" was for them "suprema lex." This policy of yielding would have great consequences at the next elections, and this all the more as the electors are being continually weighted by new burdens. Conservatives especially would lose ground with the population, in favour of the Radical parties, as Conservatism has shown itself incapable of resistance to influence emanating from high quarters.

THE BILLS FOR THE COLUMBUS CELEBRATION. NEW YORK, JAN. 6.

The Grand Jury of Brooklyn have made a presentment declaring that all the money expended by the city in its corporate capacity on the occasion of the recent Columbus celebrations was expended in defiance of the law and illegally, and that the bills paid were out of all proportion to the goods furnished or the services rendered on the occasion. The Grand Jury recommend that proceedings should be taken against all the receivers of such illegal payments, as well as against the Mayor, Comptroller, Auditor, and Aldermen for the return of the money, and they have further indicated about twenty Aldermen who acted as supervisors in connection with the payments. It is alleged that under colour of a pretended right the money was taken from the Contingent Fund.
